

You've got to be crazy to look a gift horse in the mouth, right? I'm going to have to risk that label by saying politely that I realize how esteemed the motives of the EVF are in regard to replacing our present fire pit at the Bistro Patio. The EVF has the bully pulpit of a front-page article to present their goals I get to write a Pulse letter that has been thoroughly scrutinized for what I say. The EVF has constantly said they welcome our suggestions for their charity. Getting rid of that poorly-designed sore thumb should probably be handled as regular maintenance, not as an example of our philanthropic benevolence. The reason to replace the fire pit is that people tend to trip over it. After a few drinks, patio patrons, will trip over a larger one also. At the 2014's Stakeholders' meeting, residents using canes or walkers begged for a level pathway to the bocce courts in order to navigate safely. It received the most recommendations that day. We won't see that goal achieved for several more months. Funding that would be truly helpful to the handicapped in our community.

The Association currently has \$10.7 million in Reserves on deposit earning under one percent interest. At the last Association Board study session the Policy Sub-committee brought a proposal to the Board that would allow one of the Districts to borrow money from the Reserves for a period of one year and pay interest at the rate of two percent. A few members expressed concern that if the District defaulted on the loan their money would be at risk. However, this would be the same with a bank loan since the Reserves are used as collateral for the loan. After a long discussion, a majority of the Board voted to have the bank, that is paying us under one percent, lend the Association some of that same Reserve money, on behalf of the District, at a rate of 2.7 percent thus paying to borrow our own money! From a common sense approach and as a former Controller for the Villages it appears that this use of Association funds is not in the best interest of all of the members. Should we not be using the money for the benefit of the community?

I read in the newspaper that The Evergreen Foundation was donating a gift of \$5,000 for a fire pit on our Bistro Patio. When did the general population of The Villages vote to have a fire pit? It seems the community is being cut out of the decision making process for this item.

Cost was estimated at \$9000. The request included special chairs and outside bar service. Who will pay for the rest of this? Who will pay for the natural gas use, the extra insurance for an open flame? Who is responsible for the upkeep?

This will not add heat to our outside activities. It will be a small zone being used by a few. The current fire pit is not being used. I, personally, would like the current fire pit removed to increase patio space for our restaurant sponsored events.

Why are we giving away a large portion of our patio for this sometimes amenity? Where will we put the tables on the patio for the activities that might be enjoyed by the whole of our community?

A huge thank you to all who completed the Community Survey! We are pleased to announce that as of the deadline for this paper we had a whopping return of over 60 percent. There are still a few more surveys coming in, and we will continue to accept them until completion of the processing procedure. Hamlin & Harkins, Ltd. had previously indicated 30 percent would be considered a good return, and we are pleased to have exceeded that figure by such a wide margin.

The General Plan Committee is also very appreciative to have had the help of many Villages' volunteers and staff. Our praise goes out to Elections Inspectors Claudia Nicolai, Jeanne Filice and

Vera Buescher, as well as to the DAC delivery volunteers, and staff members Julia Meadows, Mary Tatum, Scott Hinrichs, and Kory Tran. We couldn't have done it without you!

Now, you're probably wondering about the results of the survey and the promised Gift Certificates. We are planning a Town Hall meeting in late summer or early fall at which time Hamlin Harkin, Ltd. will present the findings of the survey. Once the results have been presented,



we will have a drawing for the 10 Gift Certificates. You do not need to be present to win (you are eligible if you returned a completed survey), and the presentation material will be publicized after the meeting for the benefit of those who cannot attend.

#### Coming September 10: Villages Age Certification Survey

Arriving with September's monthly statement will be the biennial age certification for all residents of The Villages.

To continue our community's status as a senior community, The Villages must comply with the state and federal laws that govern California senior housing developments. Federal law requires that at least 80 percent of the occupied units are occupied by at least one person who is 55 years of age or older. Furthermore, The Villages Association and Homeowners Corporation must conduct periodic surveys to verify and document that the community is in compliance with the federal 80 percent occupancy rule. Failure to satisfy the legal requirements may result in a determination that our community is not a lawful senior community and therefore mean that we must allow persons of all ages to live here.

In order to fulfill the requirements imposed upon the Corporation, one resident of your condominium or home must complete and sign the Age Certification (under penalty of perjury). Please note that if you are an offsite owner, you must have one of the tenant(s)/resident(s) complete and sign the Certification. Offsite owners are responsible for ensuring completion and return of the Certification by one of their tenant(s)/resident(s).

Please return the Age Certification on or before October 15, 2015. You may either mail the completed document back to us in the enclosed envelope or drop it in the box located at Building A. (For convenience, additional drop boxes are available at the Cribari Center just outside the Post Office and in the parking lot adjacent to Building A.)

We appreciate you taking the time to complete and return the Certification. Please be assured that the information that you provide is used strictly for the Corporation's records and to document our community's compliance with applicable laws. A summary of the survey results (not including names or addresses) will be made available following completion of the survey.

# Water Conservation—How are we doing?

In April, Governor Brown mandated a statewide 25-percent reduction in water usage. San Jose then set its own goal at 30 percent. In May, the community officially implemented water reduction efforts to comply with the state and city mandates.

So, how are we doing? Excellent! To gauge our performance, we compare the June/July period this year to the June/July period two years ago (2013). Here are the numbers:

Overall, the community reduced its water use by 37 percent.

The Association reduced its water use by 54 percent. As part of that reduction, residential water use reduced by 22 percent and irrigation water use reduced by 62 percent.

The Club reduced its water use by 72 percent (not including golf). Golf course usage remained about the same in total use; however, potable water usage (greens) was down by 24 percent and recycled water use increased by 6 percent.

The Estates water usage was also down, by 54 percent.

The foregoing numbers are impressive and are a direct result of the collective efforts of all Villagers. What's more impressive and what's actually measured by the city and state is the potable water use, which is down 52 percent community-wide.

On the Association side, the new Water Conservation Committee has been effective working with the DACs to create a heightened awareness of the situation, and its efforts have produced measurable results. And, the turf reduction efforts have played a big role as well. I have worked (and will continue working) closely with your landscape team to monitor the landscape to limit the amount of turf that's lost during this drought. We continue to hand water plants, flowers and trees in need. There are also plans in development to add Association landscaped areas to the recycled water system in the future. Recycled water is not restricted and costs roughly 40 percent less than potable water, which is what's being used Association-wide currently.

What does this mean in terms of dollars? The community's cost of water for the June/July 2014 period was \$701,000; the cost of water usage for this past June/July period was \$494,473 (that's \$206,527 less this year). I suspect we will see similar results for the August/September period as well. As far as what the three boards decide to do with the water cost savings (compared to budget) this year has yet to be determined—it's early in the fiscal year, so the plan at this point is wait and see how the costs incurred through the year compared to budget. The water cost budget for this fiscal year was increased roughly 15 percent. Surely we'll beat that number. With an El Niño predicted this year, the outcome could be much better than we think at this time.



Question from Prakash Deshmukh: Regarding "Electronic Accounting Information" to Villagers (Association/Homeowners Documents Available by e-mail).

Is it possible to ask for only HOA bills on e-mail every month? It may save the Villages \$20,000 to \$30,000 per year.

General Manager's Response: The HOA assessment bills are hand delivered each month to resident Villagers. They are only mailed to non-resident owners (about 300). Once a month each year they are mailed. We are in the process of updating the primary management system software, which is a fairly intensive project. Once that system is updated, we hope to provide member access to their accounts, payment of invoices online and by credit card. If we did e-mail monthly statements, the cost savings would be \$6,000 to \$7,000 per year. We're about six months away.

# From ValleyCrest: Talking Turf

I wanted to give everyone a brief update on what's happening on the course. All the ball washers and benches will be removed and repainted. They will be removed a few at a time, and there will always be at least one of each on the teeing area. If you notice some have disappeared don't worry, they are just receiving some TLC and will be back on the course shortly.

The pump station currently has two pumps operating the reclaimed water. Since the city has repaired the pumps we have not noticed any pressure issues on the course. Changes to the central computer system have also been made to help with the pressure issues. The third pump was pulled on August 14 for repair. This pump should be back online mid-September. The two pumps currently working allow us to water around 1500GPM. This allows us to complete the nightly watering cycle before play. Once the third pump is back our flow will increase to around 2250GPM and will create a shorter water window. A shorter water window means the irrigation will be done earlier in the night, so those of you that like to play early won't have a wet course to deal with.

Slit seeding has begun on the course to repair the areas that declined while the pumps were being worked on. Mechanical seeding followed by a light topdressing of mulch will be applied to the weak areas. These areas will be roped off and you will notice some portable sprinklers running to help with germination. The fairways and green surrounds will be the first areas we slit-seed, followed by the rough.

A special thank you to the Fantasyland golf tournament committee. We had a great time working with all of you and we appreciate the recognition during your luncheon. The Villages Golf and Country Club is a special place and we are proud to be part of the team. See you on the course.



# Locked yourself out?

Have you ever locked yourself out of your unit? If you have, you have a couple of immediate options: find your hide-a-key or contact Public Safety. On average, Public Safety unlocks approximately 512 units a year.

During new resident orientation at the Public Safety Office, we advise and require a key to all of the Association units. Many times, Public Safety will respond for an unlock, only to find out the home has been rekeyed.

If this has ever happened to you or you just want to make life easier, there may be a solution for you. There are locks on the market now that do not require a key. You can have it programed to an easily remembered number or use an electric key fob.

The new locks are not too difficult to install and normally can be done in less than an hour—if you are somewhat of a handyperson. If you are not, there are many licensed contractors/handymen who can install it, program it and show you how to use it.

There are many different types of keyless locking systems on the market, which are available at the local hardware stores for a nominal price.

# Red Cross blood drive September 19

Give the gift of life by scheduling your appointment today for the Red Cross blood drive Saturday, September 19, from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. at Foothill Center.

Why should you do this? Here's just one story of how your blood donation can save a life.

As the captain of her high school soccer team, Carolyn Strzalka was a healthy teen and never imagined she would need blood. After she began having sharp abdominal pains, her gall bladder was removed two days before she started college. But she continued to have pain after she arrived on her college campus. She was taken to the emergency room where she learned she was bleeding internally. She received two blood transfusions to help her survive.

"I am beyond thankful for the blood donors whose donations have allowed me to be alive today," said blood recipient Strzalka. "These donors have a special place in my heart because I have type O negative blood and can only receive blood from other type O negative people."

# Where do Foundation Donations go?

For the past few years, The Evergreen Villages Foundation board has asked our fellow Villagers to donate toward our mission of raising money for capital improvements. This week, I want to give you a brief summary of how we use *your* dollars. We keep 80 percent of our assets in a low risk investment account at Morgan Stanley and the remaining 20 percent in a bank account for ready access to fund projects as we approve them.

Once we receive a request for funding, our Projects Committee ensures that all needed information is covered and makes a decision as to whether or not the project meets Foundation criteria. We look always for requests that promise to serve as many neighbors as possible, that qualify as capital improvements, and that are supported by the VGGC Club Board. Within those broad criteria, we look for projects that address health, safety, water and energy conservation, education and the general well being of Villagers.

The next step is consideration by the full Foundation board of directors. We have agreed that applications for funding that demonstrate financial support from the club or group making the request are best for us to pursue, though we will occasionally make smaller grants for the total cost of a project

Perhaps the most important fact for all Villagers to be aware of is that every dollar they donate goes directly to projects, not to administrative costs. We can only do that thanks to the personal donations of Foundation board members, who voted recently to cover *all* administrative expenses (\$6,000 to \$10,000 per year) as individuals. That's our commitment to *you*. **Can we count on your commitment in return?** 

The Evergreen Villages Foundation is an independent 501(c)(3) tax-exempt charitable foundation. All donations are tax deductible to the full extent of the law. Check out our Cribari Information Center near the Boutique or ask any board member for more information. Our next board meeting will be September 9 in the Patio Room and we welcome guests.

# FTB web pay

Do you make your California income tax payments online? If so, you are registered with what is called the MyFTB.

As a result of IRS and other large-scale hacking incidents, the Franchise Tax Board (FTB) is taking down part of the MyFTB system to increase security. Taxpayers who have existing accounts on MyFTB may continue to use those accounts while increased identity-proofing processes are installed and tested. However, no new accounts may be registered until the process is complete. The expected completion date is January 4, 2016.

Also, beginning January 4 taxpayers will be required to reregister existing MyFTB accounts using a two-step process:

• First, the taxpayer will go online to begin the new process.

• Second, the FTB will mail a PIN to the mailing address attached to the account and the taxpayer must go online to complete the process.

Remember that all official FTB web pages are located at www.ftb.ca.gov. Unless it has been successfully closed down, there is currently a scam site called www.myftb.com. This site will attempt to retrieve personal information from you. Both the IRS and FTB web sites end in ".gov", not ".com".

Note: The Senior Resource Services (SRS) office hours for drop-in assistance are Monday, Wednesday and Friday from 10 a.m. to noon. The SRS office is located in the Cribari Center across from the Post Office. You may also leave a message at 408-239-5253. The purpose of SRS is to provide education and general business and financial information. All assistance is free and confidential. You should ask your professional adviser about your individual situation.

#### SRS Question:

# What is the maximum social security benefit?

The maximum benefit depends on the age a worker chooses to retire. For a worker retiring at age 66 in 2015, the maximum amount is \$2,663. If the worker retires at age 62 in 2015, the maximum amount is \$2,025. But if the worker retires in 2015 at age 70, the maximum is \$3,501.

Forgiveness and happiness are close relatives. The secret of happiness lies in not only forgiving others, but yourself as well.



# FROM THE BOOKSHELF

"A God in Ruins" by Kate Atkinson: This is a companion book to Atkinson's "Life After Life." Teddy had been reconciled to death during the war and then suddenly the war was over and there was a next day and a next day and a next day. Part of him never adjusted to having a future. This book tells the story of the 20th century through Ursula's younger brother Teddy—wouldbe poet, heroic pilot, husband, father, and grandfather—as he navigates the perils and progress of a rapidly changing world. After all that Teddy endures in battle, his greatest challenge is living in a future he never expected to have. Mystery. 2015.

"Stone Mattress" by Margaret Atwood: This is a collection of short fiction that speaks to our times with nine tales of acute insight, turbulent relationships, and psychological aberration. A recently widowed fantasy writer is guided through an ice storm by the voice of her late husband in "Alphinland," the first of three stories about the romantic entanglements of a group of writers and artists. In "The Freeze-Dried Groom," a man who bids on an auctioned storage space has a gruesome surprise. In "Lusus Naturae," a woman born with a genetic abnormality is mistaken for a vampire. In "Torching the Dusties," an elderly lady with Charles Bonnet syndrome attempts to cope with the little people she sees while a newly formed populist group prepares to burn down her retirement residence. And in "Stone Mattress," a long-ago crime is avenged in the Arctic via a 1.9 billion-year-old stromatolite. Darkly humorous. Fiction. 2015.

"The Melody Lingers On" by Mary Higgins Clark: From "The Queen of Suspense" comes a tale of deception and missing billions. Lane Harmon, an assistant to a famous upscale interior designer, is accustomed to visiting opulent homes and finds the glimpse into these gilded worlds fascinating. When she is called to a modest town house outside New York City, she knows the job is unusual. Then she learns the home belongs to the wife of notorious and disgraced financier Parker Bennett who was last seen two years ago on his sailboat in the Caribbean. After he went missing, the world discovered the \$5 billion-dollar investment fund he managed had also vanished. His clients and the federal government want to trace the money and bring Bennett to justice, if he's still living. Mystery. 2015.

"No Fortunate Son" by Brad Taylor: When veteran operator Pike Logan and partner Jennifer Cahill receive a letter from Blaisdell Consulting—the umbrella cover company for their real employer, a top secret counterterrorist unit called the Taskforce—they expect orders for their next mission. Instead, they learn that their latest actions have gotten them fired, despite having saved thousands of lives. Pike's fury is redirected when their commander, Colonel Kurt Hale, asks them for help with a personal matter. His niece Kylie, an exchange student in England, has gone missing. "A Desperate Fortune" by Susanna Kearsley: For nearly 300 years, the cryptic journal of Mary Dundas kept its secrets. Now amateur codebreaker Sara Thomas travels to Paris to crack the cipher. Jacobite exile Mary Dundas is filled with longing—for freedom, for adventure, for her lost family. When fate opens the door, Mary dares set foot on the path. And as her gripping tale of rebellion and betrayal is revealed, Sara faces events in her own life that require letting go of everything she thought she knew—about herself, about loyalty, and especially about love. 



# Hot Water Recirculation System

Objective: To reduce the quantity and cost of water lost while waiting for hot water to arrive at a sink, tub, or shower. In some homes, it takes one minute or more for hot water to be available, thus permitting the cold water in the pipes to run into the sewer.

Suggested Recirculation System: Install two new parts to the water system. A water pump on the Hot Water Tank and a "Check Value" under the sink that is located furthest from the tank.

The system permits the cold water located in the hot water pipes over night to return to the hot water heater via the cold water pipes instead of running into the sewer. Once the hot water arrives to the sink area, the check valve permits it to flow into the sink for your use. Meanwhile, the cold water that was returned to the hot water heater is available for future use.

This approach will provide warm to hot water within several seconds, but it is not an

instant hot water system which requires a dedicated water return pipe.

A pump with a built-in timer is installed on the hot water line from the water heater.

A patented sensor valve opens when the water on the hot water side cools and pushes the cool water back to the water heater.

As the temperature in the hot water line hits 98 degrees, the valve closes.

#### Hot Water Recirculation System Estimated Installation Time and Cost for Villagers:

Given an electric outlet is close (within 10 feet) to the hot water heater, the estimated time to install the pump and the check valve is one to two hours. The cost for this work, including materials and sales tax, is \$320. The project cost can be invoiced

The "material only" cost for those individuals able to install the pump and check-valve themselves is \$199.

A cost estimate will be provided by the plumbing company for replacing other equipment mentioned below prior to starting the installation of the pump. Your water system will not be turned off unless the wall valves require

- Materials: Pump and flex pipe for the water heater, and check valve including two flex water lines for the bathroom
- · Labor Included: A Plumber to install the pump and check valve (Assuming an electrical connection is available near the hot water tank)



He next follows with the Queen of Spades, then leads the good 8 of Clubs, and now plays a Diamond. West wins the trick with the Ace, and plays his last 2 good cards, the Jack and 10 of Hearts. Great! The contract is made exactly.



#### A message from your Community Standards Administrator

#### By Maria Elizabeth Hernandez

As your Community Standards Administrator it is my responsibility to routinely inspect the community for rules being broken. As you may know, the Association's rules were developed and approved by your Board of Directors. They are revised from time to time when recommendations are made by members, the Rules Committee, or the General Manager. The rules are designed to provide uniformed protections for all Villagers.

I would like to inform Villagers of the most common Association rules being broken that I've noticed when conducting my inspections.

Rule 2.07 Common Area Alterations: Owners (or residents) may not alter, or install any improvement on common area, including common area landscape, without the prior approval of the Architectural Committee (AC).

Rule 2.21.12 Association Common Areas: Residents will not place items in common areas including utility closets except where specified in Rule 2.08 and/or AC approval. Prohibited items include but are not limited to yard art, statuary, figurines, potted plants and planter boxes.

Rule 2.08.3 Maintenance of Villas and Limited Common Areas: Each resident is responsible for keeping the garage, carport, patio, and other limited common areas that are open to view by others in a clean, orderly and sanitary condition.

Rule 2.08.4 Maintenance of Villas and Limited Common Areas: A 36-inch-wide, clear pathway must be maintained on all exterior stairs, stairway landings and villa entryways. Potted plants, or other decorative items, may be permitted within a minimum of five feet of the front entry door as long as they do not encroach into the 36-inch-wide pathway.

Rule 2.10.2.D Sound, Visual, and Odor Restrictions: Decks, patios, balconies and porches are not intended for storage. This restriction includes, but is not limited to, refrigerators, freezers, and household furniture. Storage cabinets over three feet in height must have AC approval.

Rule 2.23 Wood Preservation Requirements – Common and Limited Common Area: A. Wood Decks and Railings 1. Potted plants, figurines, or other decorative items are not permitted on wood railings; 2 Potted plants, including those in trays or pots that have holes in either the sides or bottoms, are not to permit water or moisture to reach the wood deck; 3. All items must be supported above the deck flooring in a manner that permits moisture under the item to evaporate; 6. Vine growing plants are not to cling to wood decks, railings or walls; 7. Trees planted in the limited common area shall have sufficient clearance from walls and fences. Trees shall not exceed seven feet in height without AC approval.

Please take some time to check around your home to see if any of these rules are being broken and try to correct them before I come by to inspect.

# Association/Homeowners documents available via e-mail

Per an amendment to California Civil Code, homeowner associations are permitted, with owner's written consent, to distribute annual disclosures, (like the pro forma budget summary) and other specified association documents to owners via electronic mail, facsimile, or other electronic means (such as posting on the association's website) instead of mailing those documents or via personal delivery. This has the potential to cut costs for the Villages. Delivery and postage costs for the Villages' annual distribution of the pro forma budget summary alone are close to \$1,000, not to mention the paper and printing costs that run about \$8,000.

In order to transmit association documents via e-mail or by posting on the homeowners association's website, 1) the homeowners association must first receive the owner's written consent, and 2) the homeowners association sends a separate notice to the owner that the documents have been posted and are available for viewing.

Consent forms for owners to request delivery of documents have been developed for both The Villages Association and Homeowners Corporations. These forms provide an owner's consent to delivery electronically, of documents that are capable, under current laws, of being distributed electronically. Owners have the right to revoke this request and receive "hard copies" of the documents by sending a written revocation signed by the owner, to the applicable corporation.
