We hope these meetings are continued on a regular basis and that the Association Board adopts a similar program.

Brian Bagley: I read recently in the Villager about Brian Bagley losing his job and it reminded me of the Board's decision to outsource golf course management to ValleyCrest. When it first happened, I questioned the wisdom of handing control over a major community asset (and revenue generator) like our golf course to an outside contractor, just to save \$10 per month per household. It seemed like we risked far more in potential lost revenue than we gained in cost savings.

So I reread the many Pulse letters in the Villager Online, but few asked why or how the decision was made. Then I realized that Board members receive no special training to prepare them to make these kinds of decisions.

I would therefore like to suggest that we require, on an ongoing basis, that all new Board members complete a leadership program designed for community boards like ours. A quick Google search found many such courses, short in length and often offered online. It would be no imposition on anyone's time. And I think the knowledge and larger perspective that such courses offer, would reap real dividends for everyone, far exceeding any additional cost to the Villages each year. -Martha Stillman

Veterans Club: Several months ago I joined the new Villages Veterans Club. You may have seen us at the 4th of July Parade. The membership is over 100 and growing because it provides useful information and shared stories of the members' military experiences.

The Club meets monthly on the second Friday at 1400 (vets know what time that is) at Foothill Center. We have high quality speakers who describe the range of benefits available and how to take advantage of what you have earned through your service. There are also dependent's benefits you probably aren't aware of.

There's been negative publicity about VA health services, but not in our area. The hospital at Palo Alto and the clinic in San Jose provide top-level services. Appointments are available within a reasonable period. Also, there is a drop-in opportunity once a week for emergency needs. I can speak personally about the value in that I saved over \$6,000 on hearing aids that the VA provided free of charge, including batteries for life.

FROM THE CLUB BOARD

Open meeting with the GM and Club Board President

Kathy Beymer provided Darren and I with an excellent recap of the open meeting at Cribari conference room as follows:

On Thursday, August 20, a new experiment in open communication was initiated by Board President Wayne Weiler and General Manager Darren Shaw. Residents were invited to have an open meeting with two of our leaders to discuss Club-related business. At the end of the meeting, there seemed to be a universal feeling of "What a great idea this was; let's do it again". Darren Shaw remarked that he has to walk a fine line of not interfering with social club's inner workings, and he hoped most clubs would protect the safety of names and addresses and assumed that they asked member permission to include email addresses and telephone numbers. There was a comment about mandatory ID cards at the restaurant being very inconvenient at times. There was a suggestion to provide more furniture and shade at the new Cribari Plaza. There were questions about the recent survey and since there was such a good response (1300 responses), someone remarked that success was due to our deep interest in where we live. There was a relaxed give and take and a true meeting of minds with the promise that we would try to do this again on a quarterly basis. 

Coming September 10—Villages Age Certification Survey

Arriving with September's monthly statement will be the biennial age certification for all residents of The Villages.

To continue our community's status as a senior community, The Villages must comply with the state and federal laws that govern California senior housing developments. Federal law requires that at least 80 percent of the occupied units are occupied by at least one person who is 55 years of age or older. Furthermore, The Villages Association and Homeowners Corporation must conduct periodic surveys to verify and document that the community is in compliance with the federal 80 percent occupancy rule. Failure to satisfy the legal requirements may result in a determination that our community is not a lawful senior community and therefore mean that we must allow persons of all ages to live here.

In order to fulfill the requirements imposed upon the Corporation, one resident of your condominium or home must complete and sign the Age Certification (under penalty of perjury). Please note that if you are an offsite owner, you must have one of the tenant(s)/resident(s) complete and sign the Certification. Offsite owners are responsible for ensuring completion and return of the Certification by one of their tenant(s)/resident(s).

Please return the Age Certification on or before October 15, 2015. You may either mail the completed document back to us in the enclosed envelope or drop it in the box located at Building A. (For convenience, additional drop boxes are available at the Cribari Center just outside the Post Office and in the parking lot adjacent to Building A.)

We appreciate you taking the time to complete and return the Certification. Please be assured that the information that you provide is used strictly for the Corporation's records and to document our community's compliance with applicable laws. A summary of the survey results (not including names or addresses) will be made available following completion of the survey.

As your Community Standards Administrator it is my responsibility to routinely inspect the community for rules being broken. The Association's rules were developed and approved by your Board of Directors. They are revised when recommendations are made by members, the Rules Committee, or the General Manager. The rules are designed to provide uniformed protections for all Villagers.

I would like to inform Villagers of the most common Association rules being broken I've noticed while conducting inspections.

Rule 2.07 Common Area Alterations: Owners (or residents) may not alter, or install any improvement on common area, including common area landscape, without the prior approval of the Architectural Committee (AC).

Rule 2.21.12 Association Common Areas: Residents will not place items in common areas including utility closets except where specified in Rule 2.08 and/or AC approval. Prohibited items include but are not limited to yard art, statuary, figurines, potted plants and planter boxes.

Rule 2.08.3 Maintenance of Villas and Limited Common Areas: Each resident is responsible for keeping the garage, carport, patio, and other limited common areas that are open to view by others in a clean, orderly and sanitary condition.

Rule 2.08.4 Maintenance of Villas and Limited Common Areas: A 36-inch-wide, clear pathway must be maintained on all exterior stairs, stairway landings and villa entryways. Potted plants, or other decorative items, may be permitted within a minimum of five feet of the front entry door as long as they do not encroach

into the 36-inch-wide pathway.

Rule 2.10.2.D Sound, Visual, and Odor Restrictions: Decks, patios, balconies and porches are not intended for storage. This restriction includes, but is not limited to, refrigerators, freezers, and household furniture. Storage cabinets over three feet in

height must have AC approval.

Rule 2.23 Wood Preservation Requirements – Common and Limited Common Area: A. Wood Decks and Railings 1. Potted plants, figurines, or other decorative items are not permitted on wood railings; 2 Potted plants, including those in trays or pots that have holes in either the sides or bottoms, are not to permit water or moisture to reach the wood deck; 3. All items must be supported above the deck flooring in a manner that permits moisture under the item to evaporate; 6. Vine growing plants are not to cling to wood decks, railings or walls; 7. Trees planted in the limited common area shall have sufficient clearance from walls and fences. Trees shall not exceed seven feet in height without AC approval.

Please check around your home to see if any of these rules are being broken and try to correct them before I come by to inspect.

Association/Homeowners documents available via e-mail

Per an amendment to California Civil Code, homeowner associations are permitted, with owner's written consent, to distribute annual disclosures, (like the pro forma budget summary) and other specified association documents to owners via electronic mail, facsimile, or other electronic means (such as posting on the association's website) instead of mailing those documents or via personal delivery. This has the potential to cut costs for the Villages. Delivery and postage costs for the Villages' annual distribution of the pro forma budget summary alone are close to \$1,000, not to mention the paper and printing costs that run about \$8,000.

In order to transmit association documents via e-mail or by posting on the homeowners association's website, 1) the homeowners association must first receive the owner's written consent, and 2) the homeowners association sends a separate notice to the owner that the documents have been posted and are available for viewing.

Consent forms for owners to request delivery of documents have been developed for both The Villages Association and Homeowners Corporations. These forms provide an owner's consent to delivery electronically, of documents that are capable, under current laws, of being distributed electronically. Owners have the right to revoke this request and receive "hard copies" of the documents by sending a written revocation signed by the owner, to the applicable corporation.

Forms of owner's written consent are available in Business Administration Buildings A and B, and on The Villages web site, http://www.thevillagesgcc.com (Click on Resident Info and then Click on Resource Files.) For info, call Julia Meadows at 223-4634.

Why I give blood—a personal story

Cancer took my beloved aunt from us in 1996. Married to an Army Colonel and with a career herself as a professional bridge player, she traveled the world and had a full life. But as she struggled with this disease at the end of her life, all we could do was try to keep her as comfortable as possible. One treatment that helped provide her a brief spurt of energy and feeling like her old self again was blood transfusions. However, her doctor recommended stopping transfusions because as he told me, "it will not save her life and the blood could better be used for someone whose life can be saved." That hit me hard, what a decision to put on me: help my aunt in the short term or save the life of another.

I vowed that day to do what I can to help others avoid having to make such a decision. The more who give, the more blood that will be available for all who need it whether it's to ease their end of life journey or save their life.

Are you financially literate?

Are you financially literate? Being financially literate means you understand the core concepts of money management and are able to apply them in a manner beneficial to your family's longterm financial comfort and security.

How do you rank your knowledge of personal finance? An online resource for personal finance has a 30-question guiz. The guiz covers credit card debt, mortgage loans, auto insurance, life insurance, home ownership and general investments. The concept of the quiz is a self-check on information useful to know for personal money management. Our SRS volunteer's score was 28 out of 30; what is your score?

Some questions require a calculation or two; you are encouraged to use a calculator.

Which two questions did our SRS guinea pig miss?

1. Suppose you charge \$100 on a credit card. If you paid only \$15 each month, which card would charge you less over the next 12 months?

Your possible answers include a choice between APR percentages and fees.

bipartisanship in the Congress and what could be done about it, Congresswoman Lofgren told a story about when she first went to Congress. "Radiant Angel" by Nelson DeMille: After a showdown with the notorious Yemeni terrorist known as The Panther, John Corey has left the the Anti-Terrorist Task Force and returned home to New York City, taking a job with the Diplomatic Surveillance Group. Although Corey's new assignment with the DSG—surveilling Russian diplomats working at the U.N.—is thought to be "a quiet end," he is more than happy to be out from under the thumb of the FBI and free from the bureaucracy of office life. But he realizes something the U.S. government doesn't: The all-too-real threat of a newly resurgent Russia. Fiction. 2015.

"Blood on Snow" by Jo Nesbo: This is the story of Olav, an extremely talented "fixer" for one of Oslo's most powerful crime bosses. But he is also an unusually complicated fixer. He has a capacity for love that is as far-reaching as his gift for murder. He is straight-forward, and calm in the face of crisis with a storyteller's hypnotic knack for fantasy. He has an "innate talent for subordination" but running through his veins is a "virus" born of the power over life and death. And while his latest job puts him at the pinnacle of his trade, it may be mutating into his greatest mistake. Mystery. 2015.

"God Help The Child" by Toni Morrison: Morrison weaves a tale about the way the sufferings of childhood can shape, and misshape, the life of the adult. At the center is a young woman who calls herself Bride, whose stunning blue-black skin is only one element of her beauty, her boldness and confidence, her success in life, but which caused her light-skinned mother to deny her even the simplest forms of love. There is Booker, the man Bride loves and loses to anger. Rain, the mysterious white child with whom Bride crosses paths. And finally, Bride's mother herself who takes a lifetime to come to understand that "what you do to children matters. And they might never forget." Fiction. 2015.

"Leaving Berlin" by Joseph Kanon: Berlin 1948. In the West, a blockaded city is barely surviving on airlifted supplies; in the East, political reconstruction is being undermined by the Cold War. Espionage is a fact of life. Culture has become a battleground, with intellectuals being lured back from exile to add credibility to the competing sectors. Alex Meier, a Jewish writer, fled the Nazis for America before the war. But the politics of his youth have put him in the crosshairs of the McCarthy witch hunts. He makes a desperate bargain with the fledging CIA: he will earn his way back to America by acting their agent in his native Berlin. Soon things go wrong and Alex finds himself a wanted man. Mystery. 2015. Large Print.

"Early Warning" by Jane Smiley: It is 1953. Walter Langdon, who with his wife, Rosanna, sustained their lowa farm for three decades, has died, leaving their five adult children looking to the future. Only one will remain to work the land, while the others scatter. As the country moves out of post-World War II optimism through the landscape of the Cold War and the social and sexual revolutions of the 1960s and '70s, and then into the unprecedented wealth—for some—of the early 1980s, the Langdon children each follow a different path in a changing world. And now they have children of their own. This continues Smiley's trilogy, a saga that began with "Some Luck" and will span a century in America. Fiction. 2015. Large Print.



Locked yourself out?

Have you ever locked yourself out of your unit? If so, you have a couple of immediate options: find your hide-a-key or contact Public Safety. On average, Public Safety unlocks approximately 512 units a year.

During new resident orientation at the Public Safety Office, we advise and require a key to all of the Association units. Many times, Public Safety will respond for an unlock, only to find out the home has been rekeyed.

If this has ever happened to you there may be a solution. There are locks on the market now that do not require a key. You can have it programed to an easily remembered number or use an electric key fob.

The new locks are not too difficult to install and normally can be done in less than an hour—if you are a handyperson. If you are not, there are many licensed contractors/handymen who can install them. There are many different types of keyless locking systems on the market, which are available at the local hardware stores for a nominal price.

Dealer has 3 possible losers in Hearts, 2 losers in Diamonds, and 2 losers in Clubs.

Strategy: Needs to modify losers. It looks kind of bleak.

West leads the Ace of Diamonds, continues with another Diamond, East takes the trick with the King, switches to the King of Clubs, then the Queen of Clubs, and South wins the trick with the Ace He leads a low Heart, notices—to his horror—that East has no trumps, plays the Ace from his hand. He then leads a low Heart, West takes the trick with the King, switches to a Spade, South covers with the King on the board. He then leads the Jack of Hearts, next a Club, and West trumps. He then plays another Spade, East, the Jack, South wins with the Ace, follows with the Queen of Hearts, then a Spade to the Queen on the board, and leads the last card, a Spade. He trumps the good Spade in his hand; however, the contract is down one. Some West players might raise the Diamond bid but North would always bid 3 Hearts. As it turns out 3 Diamonds could be made, but 3 Hearts down one is less penalty points for the North-South team.

tags and will need to fill out a parking form for Public Safety if you plan on leaving your vehicle in the parking lot.

The cost includes two nights lodging in a deluxe room, a show with dinner, luggage handling, buffet breakfast on December 3 and 4, and round trip motor coach transportation. Upon arriving at the hotel, the Eldorado bellhops will deliver your luggage to your rooms (one bag per person) and tipping will be applicable. Upon departure, our bags will be picked up from our room (inside the room, not outside) and delivered to the bus. The Royalty Tours driver will load the luggage. Tips for the bellhop and bus driver are not included in the price.





Planning an estate or garage sale?

Residents, or those working on the behalf of residents, are advised to call the Public Safety Administration office at 239-5246 before planning or opening a sale at the Villages. All sales on Villages property are subject to Association Rule 2.02 Residence Use and Occupancy Restrictions.

Homeowner Rule 3.2.10, Estate and Garage Sales states: 3.2.10 Estate and garage sales are permitted subject to the following:

A. A permit for the sale shall be obtained from the Public Safety Office prior to holding the sale and placement of advertising.

Also, effective July 1, 2012, all estate and garage sales in the Association will require a permit. The owner of the property must request the permit from Public Safety Administration in Building C.

The Villages Association Rule 2.02. 5., Residence Use and Occupancy Restrictions applies:

- 5. Estate and garage sales are permitted subject to the following:
- A. Public Safety will not allow entry to anyone who is not authorized by name in advance (Club Rule 1.01, Access to the Villages).
- B. All sales activity and sale items must be contained with the residence or garage.
 - C. Sales maybe held only between 9 a.m. and 4 p.m.
 - D. Sales period may not exceed two days.
- E. Only one sale per resident household per year will be permitted. In the event of the death of a resident of the unit, a subsequent estate sale will be permitted. A permit is required and can be obtained from Public Safety.

Note: When placing classified ads for estate or garage sales in The Villager, you will need to attach proof of the permit to your Classified Advertising form.

What is Vial of L.I.F.E.?

What is the Vial of L.I.F.E.? The Vial of L.I.F.E. is "Lifesaving Information For Emergencies." It's a place for you to store important medical information that emergency medical personnel (firefighters, paramedics, Public Safety officers and hospital staff) need in a time of crisis. By completing the Vial of L.I.F.E. form, you can provide the emergency personnel with vital lifesaving information even if you are unable. It is very important that you keep this information up to date, accurate and placed in a prominent spot in your refrigerator—an empty or incomplete form does little to help those who need your medical history. By the way, it is also advisable to have completed, up-to-date forms in each of your vehicles to assist EMS in the event of an accident

The Vial of L.I.F.E. kit is available free as a public service from the San Jose Firefighters Union Local 230 and the San Jose Fire Department. It can be obtained by contacting Public Safety, the gate at 223-4665; Public Safety Administration at 239-5246 or San Jose Fire Department Emergency Medical Services Division
