The VMA also offers grocery and pharmacy shopping trips the first and third Wednesdays of each month for those Villagers unable to drive. The process for getting on the list is:

Notice of Proposed Changes to Villages Golf and Country Club Board of Director Policies:

At The Villages Golf and Country Club (Club) Board of Directors October 27, 2015, monthly meeting, the following proposed changes to Club Board Policies have been approved for 30-day notice publication in The Villager as required by Club Policy CPo 101, VGCC Policies.

The proposed changes to the following policies will be discussed and considered, as well as oral and written comments from members and residents at the January 12, 2016 study session and considered for formal approval at the January 26, 2016 monthly meeting.

Per Policy CPo 101, VGCC Policies, response to the proposed policy changes may be made by one or more of the following methods: 1) Participation in the discussion of the change at the Club Board of Directors study session (January 12, 2016), 2) via-email with comments sent to the Club Board at least seven (7) days prior (no later than January 5, 2016) to the Club Board of Directors study session, or 3) via written comments addressed to the Club Board and delivered to Building A at least seven (7) days prior (no later than January 5, 2016) to the Club Board of Directors study session (January 12, 2016).

The proposed revisions have been compiled from recommendations from the Ad-Hoc Policy Review Committee.

Policy deletions are noted in strikethrough font, additions are underlined, and the purpose of the change is in italics.

CPo 101-VGCC Policies: Purpose of the proposed change(s): to conform policy to practice.

Title: VGCC POLICIES—CPo 101

OBJECTIVE: Provide guidelines for developing Club policies and procedures. GOVERNING DOCUMENTS / LEGAL REQUIREMENTS: None.

POLICY: The Club Board (Board) establishes policies and procedures that shall be used to manage and govern the Club's operations. A policy is a predetermined course of action established as a guide toward carrying out the Mission of The Villages Club Board of Directors, which is "TO PROVIDE A SAFE, ATTRACTIVE COMMUNITY THAT OFFERS AN ENRICHING LIFESTYLE FOR ITS RESIDENTS." A policy lays out what the Board wants done. The procedure, which is a subset of and integral to the policy, describes how it should be done in much more detail. Policies deal with the "what" and "why". Procedures deal with the "how." Policies and procedures are required by the Board in order to provide clear communication among Club members, non-members living or visiting the Villages, and individuals contracted / hired / employed by residents, or the Club's Managing Agent.

A new policy and its procedure (if any) and changes to existing policy and its procedure shall be established by a majority vote of the Directors at a Club Board (Board) meeting. The motion establishing the new policy or the change shall be in the form of a Policy Resolution which states, not only the policy or the change to be enacted, but also the reasons for the motion. A motion made in this form will be recorded in the Minutes of the Board meeting that establishes why the new policy or the change in an existing policy was felt to be necessary. Such a record will assist future boards in understanding the reason for the action.

The Club Board shall provide written notice to members/residents of any proposed change to a policy or procedure (including the addition of a new policy or procedure) at least 30 calendar days before the Club Board votes on the proposed change. The notice shall include the text of the proposed change, a description of the purpose and effect of the proposed change and a request for member/ resident comment on the proposed change. Included in the notice shall be an announcement of the date and time of the study session at which the Club Board will consider the proposed change as well as oral and written comments from members/residents.

Delivery of the above notice may be made to the members/residents by one or more of the following methods: Personal delivery, mail, The Villager newspaper, or as recorded in our governing documents.

The normal format of a Policy Resolution is: WHEREAS, [first explanatory item]; and WHEREAS, [second explanatory item]; and

WHEREAS, [next to last explanatory item]; and WHEREAS, [last explanatory item];

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Policy Committee develop a policy statement which [description of new policy or change in existing policy].

A new policy statement shall be on a page having a header "Club Policy" and shall generally contain the following elements:

TITLE – the title of the policy.

• POLICY NUMBER - a number identifying the policy. The format is CPo nnn, where CPo signifies a Club Policy and nnn is a three-digit number.

· OBJECTIVE - what is to be accomplished by the policy.

 GOVERNING DOCUMENTS / LEGAL REQUIREMENTS – references to any governing or legal documents which require or pertain to the policy.

- · POLICY the policy statement itself.
- · LIMITATIONS any specific limitations in or pertaining to the policy.

· IMPLEMENTATION PROCEDURES - procedures by which the policy is to be implemented. Not all policies will require separate Implementation Procedures. If the Implementation Procedure is reasonably short, it can be included on the page with the other policy elements. If it is not, it should be included on one or more pages with the header "Club Procedure" and given a PROCEDURE NUMBER of the form CPr nnn, where CPr signifies a Club Procedure and nnn is the same three-digit number as the associated policy.

· Beginning 01/01/2012, all future new policies or revisions to existing policies will combine the CPr with the CPo except in those cases where multiple procedures are necessary under a policy.

CPo 106- Board Member Communication Protocol: Purpose of the proposed change(s): to conform policy to practice.

Title: BOARD MEMBER COMMUNICATION PROTOCOL—CPo 106

OBJECTIVE: Establish a Club Board of Directors (Board) procedure for written communications.

GOVERNING DOCUMENTS / LEGAL REQUIREMENTS: None.

POLICY: Board Members have the right, as residents of The Villages, to express their opinions with the understanding that they follow the procedures stated below.

LIMITATIONS: None.

IMPLEMENTATION PROCEDURES: There are several methods of written communication available to Board members.

1. Pulse letters - All such letters shall clearly state that any opinions expressed therein are those of the writer and not the Board or management.

2. Villager Articles under the heading of "from the Board"- Prior to submittal, all such articles should shall be reviewed by the Board for comments with final approval given by the President. The writer of the article shall be identified.

3. Individual Board member Villager Articles - At the President's initiative, a Board member may be requested to write an article on a special subject. Approval by the President Board is required before submission.

4. President's message - The message must indicate that it is from the Presi-

- B. Via e-mail with comments sent to the Club Board at least seven (7) days prior to the Club Board of Directors study session.

dent and not from the Board. The President shall use discretion as to the need for Board comment.

5. Board information delivered through the mail or in the resident's tube - requires Board review and acceptance prior to issue.

6. FastLane - Information is limited to announcements of upcoming meetings and events and Board decisions and shall not be used for opinions of the Management or the Board.

MESSAGE FROM THE GOLF COURSE SUPERINTENDENT

From the Golf Course Superintendent Michael Scully

The golf course maintenance team has been hard at work seeding the bare and/or thin areas on the golf course with perennial rye grass. As of October 29 we are almost completely done with all of the fairways and have completed some rough areas near 1 green, 3 green, and 11 right rough. There are areas on the course in all stages of seeding. Some locations have just been seeded, some areas have newly emerging rye grass, and some areas that were previous bare or thin areas have been completely filled in with new grass. We have fertilized all of the seeded locations with 15-15-15 which is also called a starter fertilizer. This will help the young turf thrive and establish quickly while setting down good roots as well. Seeded locations are being roped off to allow the new turf to get established as cart traffic will slow down or stop the new grass from growing properly. After about two weeks from the day we seed the grass will be ready for mowing. In the third to fourth week we can take the ropes down. We will continue to water the newly seeded areas for about two weeks and we continue to ask for your support in allowing us to water these areas. The older the grass gets the less we have to water it during the day. On November 2 when the course is closed all day we plan to aerate the final two fairways on 3 and 16. Currently the forecast is showing rain for November 2 so we may not be able to aerate as we need sunny weather in order for the plugs to dry and for us to conduct the cleanup process. If we cannot aerate the remaining fairways we will shift gears toward more seeding in the primary rough areas and on green surrounds as well as work on detailing the golf course.

On October 29 we set out the new green tee markers for the forward tees. Currently all holes except for 7 and 16 have forward tees but that could soon change to include all holes. The forward tees are meant to be used by all players to include both men and women. The forward tees allow the golf course to play shorter thus making the course more enjoyable for players of all types. The 18 Hole Ladies group played in a Halloween tournament on October 29 to test out the forward tee locations using score cards that were developed by Mike Reed at the Pro Shop. The ladies went all out on the tournament by having a longest drive contest using a marshmallow as well as having spiders and other seasonal appropriate items on the course. I purchased pumpkins for each tee to add some maintenance charm to their event. The forward tees that are currently on the course are temporary and it's possible down the road that permanent tees will be built. I encourage everyone that golfs or used to golf to get out there and try them out as you might find the course is more playable from these forward locations. It's possible that some holes may allow you to get on the green in one shot and on others in two shots and so on so please come out and give them a try.

The greens continue to improve on a daily basis. We are rolling the greens several times a week. We are also grooming the greens several times a week. Grooming takes place while we are mowing greens as the groomers are already on the cutting units and can be turned off or on quite easily. Grooming thins out the grass on the greens, which results in smoother and faster greens. We will continue grooming until the grass on the greens slows down guite a bit due to cooler weather patterns. Grooming is a standard practice on golf course greens and we will continue on with this process in the spring of next year when we cannot perform the practice any longer this year.

Title: DIRECTORS ON ADVISORY COMMITTEES—

CPo 110

OBJECTIVE: The purpose of this policy is to enable a director to render an objective decision on a Committee's recommendation.

GOVERNING DOCUMENTS / LEGAL REQUIREMENTS: None.





Art Film of the Month

Many more rare examples of Middle Eastern art will be featured in the next program in the "Masterpieces of Ancient Art" series. This DVD reflects new scholarship on the Royal Tombs, rulers and the architecture of their palaces, now the modern states of Iraq and Syria. The art objects and carved stone reliefs decorate the mudbrick walls showing the battles and power of the kings who ruled the Assyrian Empire. During the new dynasty of Hammurabi, famous for his Code of Law, many examples of old Babylonian artistic skill are evident in sculptural reliefs and god statues in their temples. One of these traditional clay plaques depicts the important goddess Ishtar, the "Queen of the Night" in a frontally nude view in which no other goddess was posed. Ishtar was specifically associated with lions in the metaphor of sexuality noted in the last century history of the plaque. The film also shows the magnificent Ishtar Gate to the city, a re- construction is "now in the Pergamon Museum in Berlin, with lions of molded glazed brick in bright colors. The lion was represented for three millennia in Mesopotamia as symbol of the ruler who is protector of his people and repels all forces of chaos.

Dr. Diana McDonald will guide us in this fascinating film tour of more masterpieces of Middle Eastern ancient art and stories of their creation. Knowledge learned should empower the students to make educated decisions about the importance of sleep.

Dr. Dement is Chief Emeritus of the Division of Sleep at Stanford University School of Medicine. He is now completing his 43rd year of teaching one of the most popular classes on the Stanford campus, "Sleep and Dreams."



It's never too early to start working on strategy! We have lots of tips to share, but here is a top 10 to get started:

1. Never run backward to get a ball. This is the easiest way to get injured. Turn and run back or shuffle sideways to avoid trips or falls!

2. Warm up before playing. Pickleball is active; stretch for a few minutes first to warm up muscles and avoid injury

3. Get your serve in. It's better to have a soft serve; then develop lobs, fast serves and slices later. If you practice during a game and miss your spot, you lose the opportunity to score points.

4. Keep the volley going. Sure, it's fun to slam a ball into your opponent's face – but if you hit the net, you've just lost the point. Be patient – the perfect opportunity will arise.

5. Get to the net. The most effective place to stand is close to the kitchen line. You can volley, smash and dink from here. Standing far back (except on the initial volley) encourages your opponent

to "dink" it over the net – hitting a shot you cannot reach.

6. Keep your eye on the ball. Like all paddle sports, keeping your eye on the ball at all times allows you to hit more accurately. Also, it's a good reason not to run backward; it's too easy to trip while looking up at a high lob coming toward you!

7. Communicate with your partner. If your partner is watching the ball, they may not realize a shot is going out of bounds. Remember - praise them when they make a great shot!

8. Learn to dink. Being able to just tap the ball over the net when a hot volley is going is priceless.

9. We all make bad shots-don't dwell on them and psych yourself out!

10. And finally...stay calm. Remember the TV show "Kung Fu"? Focus, Grasshopper!







Dealer has a possible loser in Spades,1 loser in Hearts, and 1 or 2 losers in Diamonds.

Strategy: Try to lose no Spades by finessing.

West leads the Jack of Clubs, South wins with the Queen, plays a low Spade to the Ace on the board, continues with another Spade, finesses the Jack, and leads the King of Spades to capture the Queen. Now South switches to the King of Diamonds, East takes the trick with the Ace, and plays a Heart. South wins with the Ace, follows with the King, then leads a Diamond to the good Queen on the board. He plays the Ace of Clubs, sluffs a Heart from his hand, follows with another Club, and trumps it. He leads two more spades and then plays his last card, the 8 of Diamonds, which East takes with his Jack. Well done! The contract is made with an overtrick.

* North has an opening hand, changing suits and bidding at the 2 level promises 10+ HCP and doesn't say anything about support in the opener's first bid. Remember when responder introduces a new suit, it forces one more round of bidding.

^ 2 Spades promises 6 or more cards in Spades.

** North jumps to game since he has an opening hand and doesn't want to take the chance of his partner passing at the 3 level.





Stay sharp while giving back with the most satisfying volunteer service in The Villages.

Help some 250 Villagers with their income tax returns and feel their appreciation. No prior experience is required.

To volunteer to be part of the tax return team, call Alan Waltho at 408-238-3435 or e-mail alan. waltho@att.net.

SRS will have an electronic income tax preparation site at Cribari Center for the preparation of 2015 returns. Volunteers will prepare free Federal and State returns for low to moderate income taxpayers. Providing this valuable service will require motivated and active volunteers willing to undergo training and willing to volunteer four to five hours each Thursday morning from early February to the middle of April, a total of 10 mornings. While it is helpful for volunteers to be there each Thursday, it is certainly understood if a session must be missed.

In early January you will receive free tax law and tax return preparation training provided by the IRS. The returns are prepared using software developed for the IRS. You can use an IRS computer or your own computer. During the preparation Thursdays, an on-site supervisor is available to answer your questions and your work is always reviewed. Of course a fringe benefit is using the computer program to prepare your own returns.

Last year we had to turn away many Villagers. With your help, we could serve more of our neighbors.

The Villages tax preparation site is sponsored by the Retired Service and Senior Volunteers, AARP, and the IRS Tax-Aide Group in the City of San Jose.

Note: The Senior Resource Services (SRS) office hours for drop-in assistance are Monday, Wednesday and Friday from 10 a.m. to noon. The SRS office is located in the Cribari Center across from the Post Office. You may also leave a message at 408-239-5253. The purpose of SRS is to provide education and general business and financial information. All assistance is free and confidential. You should ask your professional adviser about your individual situation.
