# FROM THE ASSOCIATION BOARD

# The Association and Insurance Coverages

The Villages Association purchases insurance to protect the Association and its members from a variety of risks. Limits of liability and coverages are benchmarked with similar communities throughout California. The Master Property Policy provides replacement cost coverage of \$527,912,866 for common areas and condominium units subject to a \$5,000 deductible per occurrence. This includes the exterior building structure as well as interior walls, plumbing contained within the walls or foundation, utility services, floor coverings, window coverings, cabinets, permanently attached fixtures and built-in appliances. The Master Property Policy coverage includes, but is not limited to, damage resulting from fire, wind, smoke and vandalism.

Earthquake and flood are insured under a separate policy with a limit of \$40,000,000. The Association purchases a \$2,000,000 primary earthquake/flood policy, followed by a \$10,000,000 self- insured retention (SIR). Payment of the SIR would be recovered from all owners on an equal basis. The \$10,000,000 SIR is followed by an additional \$28,000,000 of earthquake/flood coverage. The policy is subject to a deductible of 10% of damaged buildings with a minimum earthquake deductible of \$100,000 and a \$50,000 minimum flood deductible.

The Villages also purchases various liability policies to protect the Association. The following is a summary of these policies:

- General Liability: This policy pays on the behalf of The Villages all sums The Villages is legally obligated to pay as damages resulting from bodily injury and/or property damage to third parties, including defense costs. The limit of liability is \$1,000,000 per occurrence and \$2,000,000 in the aggregate. There is no deductible.
- Automobile Liability: The policy pays on the behalf of The Villages all sums that The Villages is legally obligated to pay resulting from bodily injury and/or property damage to third parties arising out of the ownership, maintenance or use of any automobile, including defense costs. The limit of liability is \$1,000,000 for each accident.
- Directors and Officers Liability: This policy protects the Directors & Officers against claims involving allegations of wrongful acts while performing their respective duties. The limit of liability is \$3,000,000 per claim and in the aggregate.
- Umbrella Liability: The policy provides additional limits of liability in excess of the General Liability, Automobile Liability, and Directors & Officers Liability policies. This policy provides an additional \$25,000,000 limit of liability over these primary liability policies.

Villager unit owners have their own exposures not addressed by The Villages Association insurance policies. For example, unit owners need to be aware how they are individually impacted by the deductibles assumed under The Villages Association insurance policies. The \$5,000 property policy deductible is paid by the Village Association unless the cause of the damage is the result of the ownership or actions of the unit owner (e.g., damage caused by a ruptured washing machine hose, broken water line to a refrigerator, etc.). Also, The Villages Association self- insures a \$10,000,000 layer of earthquake/flood excess of the \$2,000,000 primary policy. A loss penetrating into the self-insured layer would be recovered from all villa owners on an equal basis. The Senior Resource Services Center can provide an excellent document entitled "Trying to understand the Villages' earthquake insurance coverage" ("Out of Pocket" expense for each villa owner).

Villagers are required to maintain their own insurance to protect their personal liability, property and any loss assessments. The policy is commonly referred to as a HO6, and the following are the coverages required by the Association:

- 1. Personal Liability Coverage in an amount not less than \$300,000;
- 2. Property damage insurance covering contents and personal property within the villa in an amount deemed appropriate by the owner;
- 3. Loss assessment coverage in an amount equal to or greater than the amount of the deductible under the hazard insurance policy carried by the Association—currently \$5,000.

Renters must also maintain property and liability coverage (commonly referred to as a HO4 policy) as follows:

- 1. Personal Liability Coverage in an amount of not less than \$300,000;
- 2. Contents insurance in an amount deemed appropriate by the renter.
- It is recommended that you review your insurance needs with your personal insurance agent. For additional information regarding The Villages insurance coverage, you can contact The Villages insurance broker, Hays Companies, at 866-795-4297, or the Senior Resource Service Center at 408-239-5253.

# FROM THE CLUB BOARD

At the October 27, 2015 board meeting, the Club Board approved changes to Club Rules 1.14.1.H, Golf Facilities, Competitive Prizes. The changes deal with the creation of Villages gift cards that replaced gift certificates, and establishment of an expiration date for sweeps awards.

On September 1, 2015, The Villages stopped selling gift certificates and began selling gift cards at the Pro Shop and Clubhouse that do not have an expiration date and can be used at either location.

Gift certificates will continue to be accepted at the place of purchase, or can be exchanged for the new Villages gift cards at the place of purchase.

The other rules revision established an expiration date for sweeps awards. Sweeps awards will now expire at the end of the year they are awarded. Recipients of sweeps awards will have two options: use the sweeps awards before their expiration date or convert them at the Pro Shop to gift cards before they expire. Converting the sweeps awards to gift cards maintains the sweeps award value. As stated above, the gift cards can be used at both the Pro Shop or the Clubhouse and do not expire.

# Use of the Fitness Center

The Fitness Committee would like to remind the users of the Fitness Center about tailgating and wearing proper shoes. The Fitness Center Guidelines state:

- 1. Qualified residents will use their validated resident ID cards for entry to the Fitness Center. The card may not be loaned to an unauthorized individual. Violation will be cause for suspension of privileges.
- 2. All users will be required to use the card to enter the Fitness Center. No tailgating. Each person entering the Fitness Center needs to use his/her photo ID to gain access. If there is more than one person at the door all individuals need to use their photo IDs to log in. Public Safety is reporting on usage of the Fitness Center on a monthly basis and the numbers are low—indicating users are tailgating. Also, people inside the center are letting individuals in who are at the door without a badge. If you forgot your card or did not complete the appropriate training and had your Villages Identification Card activated by Public Safety, you should not be allowed access.

Also, wear appropriate gym shoes. Potentially unsafe footwear such as loose-fitting sandals, shoes with leather soles and similar non-athletic shoes as well as bare feet are prohibited.

# MESSAGE FROM THE GOLF COURSE SUPERINTENDENT

On 11-9 we had another significant rain fall event on a day that we were closed until 12:00 for maintenance. Again our plans for some aeration and fertilization of fairways as well as rough locations came to a screeching halt due to the rain. We need rain so badly that we will take it whenever we can get it. Due to the rain on 11-9 we were not able to aerate the short nine due to much moisture in the soil. We may not be able to aerate the remaining areas on the golf course due to the colder weather that has moved in as the turf will not have time to recover. Speaking of cool weather the frost is right around the corner for the Evergreen area. On 11-12 we came very close to having our first frost of the season with a low of 38 degrees. I saw some patchy frost but nothing major enough to stop play. I update the golf course hot line on a daily basis by no later than 6:30 on Mondays, Wednesdays, Fridays, the weekend, and not later than 7 on the other days. This is the best way to get the up to date information on current course conditions.

As I am sure many of you have noticed we continue to make a lot of ground growing perennial rye grass in thin and or bare areas. We have moved on to seeding areas in the rough and areas in the fairways that have almost completely dormant bermuda grass. Areas that were seeded a couple of weeks ago or longer are completely filled in or almost filled in. Traffic control continues in these spots and I take down the ropes after I feel that the new turf can take the cart traffic. We continue to fertilize these areas so they can root in successfully as well as water them as needed. I am very happy with our seeding projects and we will continue with the process until the first hard frost. On 11-6 we will be put-

This fertilizer needs to be watered in right away so we will be turning on the sprinklers for about 10 minutes. The fertilizer will significantly help the cool season grass that is already on the courses as well as help the new young rye grass that was recently planted.

The week of 11-16 we will be pumping down some of the lakes on the golf courses to make sure they have enough available capacity to hold excess water should we see heavy flows from an El Nino winter. The water pumped will go onto the short nine that will most likely provide some soggy playing conditions in some areas. Although not ideal for players on the short nine its a much needed tactic to make sure the lakes can hold the water that the rains could bring us this winter so not to have too much flow onto the golf course. I will be working with the pro shop to make sure they are aware of when the pumping will be taking place so players can be informed.

Finally the greens remain in excellent condition and are rolling true. We will be making a preventive snow mold application on the greens to make sure we do not get this fungus as it thrives off of rainy, foggy, and overcast weather. We continue to groom the greens as needed to ensure good speeds and a smooth roll. We also continue to roll the greens several times a week.

# Villages age certification survey results

In order to maintain our community's status as a senior community, The Villages must comply with the State and Federal laws that govern senior housing developments. To that end, Federal law requires that at least one person 55 years of age or older reside in a minimum of 80 percent of the occupied units. To validate the foregoing, Federal law requires The Villages Association and Homeowners Corporation to conduct periodic surveys (every two years). Failure to satisfy the legal requirements could result in a determination that our community is not a lawful senior community and therefore mean that we must allow persons of all ages to live here.

Out of 2,309 units (condominiums) comprising The Villages Association, 2,272 are occupied, and 1,914, or <u>82 percent</u>, <u>of Association</u> residents, returned completed surveys certifying that at least one member of the household is 55 years of age or older—confirming that the Association is in compliance. The percentages reflected are the number of certifications returned, not the total number of units.

# PG&E offers red flag notifications

This is a story of a happening in The Villages. The family has requested their story be published. They hope it will help others deal with family and friends.

Reagan was shocked to receive a Late Payment notice from PG&E. She then noticed it related to her parent's address. PG&E's enclosed note explained that, as previously requested, she was receiving a copy of the delinquency notice sent to her parents.

Reagan then remembered she had filed a "Request for Third-Party Notification" form with PG&E. If PG&E sent her parents a "Payment Late" notice, PG&E would alert Reagan to its sending. Filing the request did not obligate Reagan to pay her parents' bill. It simply was a notification of a payment problem.

Reagan visited her parents the very next weekend. She asked her father if they had a financial problem. He was surprised by the question and assured her that her mother, as always, was promptly taking care of the bills.

Investigation showed mother promptly opened bills upon receipt and meticulously filed them. Unfortunately, for several months now, mother had completely forgotten a step—to write payment checks. She also had quit reconciling their bank account.

Reagan and her father are thrilled that PG&E had alerted them to the problem. Perhaps this PG&E service is an appropriate way for you to help monitor an aging relative or friend? You are not required to be a relative to file this form.

The SRS office has copies of this PG&G "Request for Third-Party Notification" if you would like one.

However, I have seen a number of my clients benefit in many ways from this Estate tax planning tool. Those who contribute funds to the trust are, in many cases, able to take a substantial tax deduction for the present value of future charitable contribution to be made upon their demise. In addition, if the trust is set up properly, the contributor enjoys an annual distribution from the trust during his or her life time. At the same time, the charitable remainder named, such as EVF, is able to rely upon future funds to continue the legacy of enriching our environment. The Villages Medical Auxiliary (VMA) serves the medical supply needs of Villagers first. However, Medical Equipment Director Gary Walden points out that, "When we don't have use for items, space to store them or the items need special cleaning, we reach outside our community."

Villager Marilou Ancheta is one of our caring Villagers who the VMA helps with medical supplies for her missionary work in the Philippines. A retired nurse, Ancheta built a clinic to minister to the Aeta tribe in Pampanga Province, Philippines.

R o g e r M a r t i n e z , representing a volunteer group called Assalvi, takes the VMA donations of large items such as hospital beds. These are items that Hospice of the Valley and other agencies are unable to use. Martinez fills crates with the items he collects and ships them from the Port of Oakland to El Salvador.

The eyeglasses and cases, cell phones and hearing aids the VMA collects are given to the Lions Club for their distribution to the needy. For example, cell phones are swiped clean and distributed to women's shelters for a one-time call. This is critical when a woman is in a dangerous situation, as she can use the phone to call for assistance.

The VMA partners with Convalescent Home Ministry where Villager Charlotte McCracken collects items such as lap blankets, bingo game prizes and more and distributes them to local convalescent homes for distribution to patients.

Medications both prescription and over the counter are collected and delivered to the Sheriff's Department for proper disposal.

The VMA hosts the Red Cross Blood Drive twice a year to assist in adding to the community blood supply.





It's my favorite time of the year. America will soon begin to devour turkey...last year between Thanksgiving and Christmas, it totaled well over a million pounds! We've come a long way since the first observance of Thanksgiving when probably only one or two gobblers went down.

Thanksgiving Day is engraved in the foundation of America. It is older than our Constitution or the Declaration of Independence. And it is engraved on my heart.

In the years following the American Revolution, our nation's decision makers looked for images that would identify America—something that would say, "Move over, world, there's a new kid on the block!" -The turkey was the featured guest at the first dinner on the moon with the astronauts. The eagle wasn't even invited.

-Turkeys gobble. Eagles give only a high-pitch, sounding like an annoying car alarm.

-Turkeys can run up to 25 miles per hour. Eagles don't even like to run.

-The average American consumes about 20 pounds of turkey annually. It's a felony to eat an eagle.





To rehab, Mohan revived his college love of tennis and played USTA here including earning doubles championships the last three years.

He and Nalini have found the Villages beautiful and friendly. He enjoyed his SIRS #38 Presidency in 2013 and getting acquainted with a variety of residents, productive in their work lives and who have continued to contribute according to their experiences and talents.

He and Nalini are well-traveled so their bucket list is only a river cruise through Europe and Tahiti. However their 15 years of late October trips to Kauai can hardly be beat. He calls it a "little slice of Paradise."

Mohan hopes to be remembered for his respect for others and ability to focus on honesty, integrity and values that will be passed on to the next generation.

All Pass

West leads the 2 of Spades, South covers with the Ace in dummy, East, the King, and now South knows the distribution of Spades. He switches to a Heart, East, the King, South plays the Ace from his hand, and West trumps. He plays to the Ace of Diamonds, then a low Club, East wins with the Ace, follows with a Heart, West trumps again, leads the King of Clubs, then a Diamond. South wins with the King on the board, follows with the Queen of Spades, next leads a Heart and trumps it in his hand. He plays a Diamond, trumps it on the board, leads another Heart, and trumps it in his hand. Now he plays the good Jack of Diamonds and follows with his last card, the good Jack of Clubs, which is taken with a Spade on the board. Great! The contract is made exactly. If he had pulled trumps in the beginning, it would have been played as a NoTrump contract and then South would go down. By the way sometimes leading a trump is a good opening lead; especially, when the opponents have bid two suits, West doesn't have any great leads, plus his distributional hand might have declarer thinking about cross ruffing to make his contract. He could lead a low Club, and East would get in and immediately lead Hearts.

\* Even though East has an opening hand, he will be silent and see what the opponents do since he knows North has at least 5 Hearts which is his best suit.




Beloved Mother of Norman and Patrick Bowers. Grandmother to Patrick and Brent Bowers, and Diane Clarkson.
