# See Villages Band's Special Holiday Concert

This year, we're mixing up a batch of seasonal music that will delight you even more than your favorite concoction of eggnog or hot buttered rum. The Villages Concert Band and the Leland High School Choirs and Wind Ensemble will combine to present a concert of holiday favorites at Cribari Auditorium Tuesday, December 8 and Thursday, December 10 at Leland High School.

**Clubhouse Patio fire pit:** I witnessed men starting demolition of the old fire pit using a chipping hammer and a hand held concrete cutter. Concrete was flying everywhere.

None of the men were wearing OSHA required safety glasses, ear protection, or hard hats. I told the Village's supervisor who was monitoring the work to tell the men that they should be wearing safety gear.

I suggest that all of the Village's workers and subcontractors complete OSHA 10 and 30 classes available on line for \$80.00. If not currently in existence, I suggest that the Villages maintain a current employee health and safety manual that complies with 2015 OSHA standards.

I can provide a soft copy of our company's EH&S manual, if needed, that has complete policies and procedures along with forms that require supervisors verify proper safety procedures are being followed.

The goal is to make sure that all of the Village's workers and subcontractors do not get hurt on the job so they can go home to their families in good health.

If a worker is hurt on the job and isn't following OSHA guidelines our insurance carrier might not honor the claim, and costs could be paid by the Villages.

# Association Roof Preventative Maintenance Project

Per the Reserve Fund Plan and with Association Board approval we commenced the Association Roof Preventative Maintenance (PM) Project in November. We retained Legacy Roofing as the contractor for the scope of work.

There are typically three roof types in Villages Association districts. They include concrete tile roofs, asphalt membrane (also known as flat or built-up (BUR) roofs) and asphalt shingle (also known as composition) roofs.

Annual roof maintenance and repairs occur in the Village Association districts. In most cases, the need for roof maintenance is typically triggered by a call from a resident about water staining or intrusion in the ceiling. For concrete tile roofs, problems arise from broken tiles, debris, unsealed roof penetrations and failing flashings. For BUR flat roofs problematic conditions typically occur with debris and at drains, seams, coping/flashing and unsealed penetrations. For composition roofs failing conditions include debris on the roof, torn shingles, missing shingles and unsealed penetrations.

With proactive inspections and corrective action, the roof PM program contributes to a reduction of overall leak incidents. Although most variables are controllable, several remain inevitable and will continue to occur (including damages from foot traffic, extreme weather, aging roof assemblies and original construction methods and deficiencies). Roof PM provides for an opportunity to address these conditions.

The scheduled sequence (in address order) will be as follows:

**BUR (Built Up Roof) Systems**: Village Cribari (16 buildings), Village Verano (58 buildings), Villages Heights (14 buildings) and Village Hermosa (42 buildings).

Concrete Tile Roof Systems: Village Hermosa (42 buildings), Village Heights (2 buildings), Village Del Lago (55 buildings), Village Sonata (30 buildings), Village Valle Vista (29 buildings) and Village Olivas (90 buildings).

**Composition Roof Systems (shingles)**: Village Glen Arden (24 buildings), Village Cribari (78 buildings), Village Verano (58 buildings) and Village Heights (21 buildings).

All utility room, trash enclosure and carport roofs are included. Gutter cleaning and repair maintenance is excluded (currently in progress via J&M Gutter Service).

Access to the buildings will be from the exterior. Although the contractor will attempt to mitigate impacts, all residents should expect noise, dust, odors, equipment setups, and contractor traffic. Maintenance Services area supervisors will oversee the project execution in the field.

#### Association/Homeowners documents available via e-mail

Per an amendment to California Civil Code, homeowner associations are permitted, with owner's written consent, to distribute annual disclosures, (like the pro forma budget summary) and other specified association documents to owners via electronic mail, facsimile, or other electronic means (such as posting on the association's website) instead of sending those documents out by regular mail or personal delivery. This has the potential to provide cost savings to The Villages. Delivery and postage costs for the Villages' annual distribution of the pro forma budget summary alone are close to \$1,000, not to mention the paper and printing costs that run about \$8,000.

In order to transmit association documents via e-mail or by posting on the homeowners association's website, 1) the homeowners association must first receive the owner's written consent, and 2) the homeowners association sends a separate notice to the owner that the documents have been posted and are available for viewing.

Consent forms for owners to request delivery of documents have been developed for both The Villages Association and Homeowners Corporations. These forms provide an owner's consent to delivery electronically, of documents that are capable, under current laws, of being distributed electronically. Owners have the right to revoke this request and receive "hard copies" of the documents by sending a written revocation signed by the owner, to the applicable corporation.

# Beware of telephone and e-mail scams

Residents are urged to be aware of scams aimed at obtaining personal information enabling unscrupulous persons to steal your identity. There are various ways being used to get you to slip up and release your Social Security Number, credit card numbers, bank account numbers, or other information you should never give to anyone whom you don't know.

Among some recent scams perpetrated over the telephone or through e-mail are the "Grandchild in trouble" ruse where a youthful voice on the phone tries to convince you that a beloved relative is in dire trouble. Another is the "Bank calling you to tell you there is a problem with your account/ credit card/etc." (According to bank officials, banks do not do this.) Another is the "Friend traveling abroad in trouble," which encourages you (usually through an e-mail message) to wire money to a friend who has been robbed of his or her money and passport. In all cases, you should stop and think before you act—call your friend at home, or think about whether your grandchild would really be in this situation (and then work it out through the parents), or call or go down to the bank and ask bank personnel whether they tried to contact you. In all cases if you reason out the situation, you'll probably see through the trickery.

Recently, there have been instances when scammers have called and directly asked for personal data over the phone. And online scammers are using ploys involving jury duty and other misleading covers, reinforcing the need to think first before you answer phone or e-mail queries for information.

Remember, never give out personal information to any stranger on the phone or through e-mail trying to get you to act immediately. Take the necessary time to check the source of the message. The extra time it takes may save you the hassle of changing your credit card and/or account numbers, or the grueling task of trying to recover your stolen identity.

If you receive any strange sounding calls or messages through your e-mail report them to the source they claim to be from. (Some of the scams are so absurd that they are obviously fraudulent.)
All financial institutions have telephone numbers or e-mail addresses where you can report fraudulent activity.

Depending upon the type of fraud, there are numerous agencies you can contact to report criminal activity. You may call the San Jose Police Department's 311 number to report credit card fraud or attempts to steal your identity. The FBI and Federal Trade Commission also have fraud departments. Furthermore, these attacks fall under the category of elder abuse. The county district attorney's Elder Abuse Unit can be reached at the toll free number 1-855-DAELDER or 1-855-323-5337.

You can fight back by not being fooled. Simply remember to stop, not to panic, think about the situation, and report illegal activity.

# Clearing guests at the Plaza

In an effort to assist residents in clearing their guests at the community's entrance (the Plaza), Public Safety has some helpful hints.

1. If you are expecting a guest, please inform them that they will be asked for a house number by the Public Safety Officer when they approach the front gate. Most services we provide are tied to the house number. If your guest does not know your house number, there can be a delay, as we then need to search the system for your name.

2. Inform your guests that the left lane is for guests and the right lane is for residents. Often, guests will go to the shorter line, which is the residents' and cleared vendors' lane. When this occurs, traffic stops until we inform the guest to drive around the Plaza to enter the guest lane, so we can assist them.

3. The most convenient way to clear your guest is to enter their name(s) on your personal guest list via www.gateaccess.net. This expedites your guest being cleared. If they are not on your guest list, the Public Safety Officer must contact you to clear your guest. If you do not have access to a computer to clear your guest, please contact the Public Safety Plaza via telephone (408-223-4665) before your guest arrives and we will be happy to assist you in adding your guest to your guest list.

Additionally, in an effort to control traffic when a long line forms, we will stop traffic in one or the other lanes to reduce traffic in the other lane. Most of the time only one gate arm will open at a time, but there are times when both will open. It normally occurs when the barcode reader reads the barcode and the officer presses the guest lane button at the same time.

As we approach the holiday season, please drive safely and if you need a ride home from the Clubhouse or Bistro, contact the Public Safety Plaza.

# Holiday safety tips

The winter holidays are a time for celebration, and that means more cooking, home decorating, entertaining, and an increased risk of fire and accidents. The Villages Medical Auxiliary urges Villagers to take precautions as you decorate and entertain this holiday season. Protect yourself, your guests and your home.

**Holiday Lighting:** Carefully inspect new and previously used light strings, and replace damaged items before plugging lights in. Do not overload extension cords

**Decorations:** Use only non-combustible and flame-resistant materials to trim a tree. Choose tinsel and artificial icicles of plastic and non-leaded metals.

**Holiday Entertaining:** Unattended cooking is the leading cause of home fires in the U.S. When cooking for holiday visitors, remember to keep an eye on the range. Test your smoke alarms.

**Trees:** When purchasing an artificial tree, look for the label "fire-resistant." When purchasing a live tree, check for freshness. A fresh tree is green, needles are hard to pull from branches, and when bent between your fingers, needles do not break. When setting up a tree at home, place it away from fireplaces, radiators and portable heaters. Place the tree out of the way of traffic and do not block doorways. Cut a few inches off the trunk of your tree to expose the fresh wood. This allows for better water absorption and will help to keep your tree from drying out and becoming a fire hazard. Be sure to keep the stand filled with water, because heated rooms can dry live trees out rapidly. Make sure the base is steady so the tree won't tip over easily.

Menorah: Keep candles away from combustible materials.

**Fireplaces:** Before lighting any fire, remove all greens, boughs, papers and other decorations from fireplace area. Check to see that the flue is open. Use care with "fire salts," which produce colored flames when thrown on wood fires. They contain heavy metals that can cause intense gastrointestinal irritation and vomiting if eaten. Do not burn wrapping papers in the fireplace. A flash fire may result as wrappings ignite suddenly and burn intensely. Above all enjoy the holiday season and be safe.

A will is a gift to your family and a simple, legally binding will can be obtained for free in California.

Our state law recognizes a free "fill-in-the-blanks" form called a Statutory Will. The form allows you to select:

- · who is to inherit your assets;
- who is to be guardian of your minor children;
- who is to be executor of your estate and trustee of any trusts created for your children.

This Statutory Will is designed for single, married and divorced people with relatively small estates. If complicated or unusual provisions are desired, an attorney should draft the document.

This form is available free from the California State Bar at www.calbar.ca.gov. SRS has made copies of the Statutory Will form if you would like to pick one up at our office. You may wish to get a copy for your grandchildren's parents (your kids!)—and encourage them to get a will.

Note: The Senior Resource Services (SRS) office hours for drop-in assistance are Monday, Wednesday and Friday from 10 a.m. to noon. The SRS office is located in the Cribari Center across from the Post Office. You may also leave a message at 408-239-5253. The purpose of SRS is to provide education and general business and financial information. All assistance is free and confidential. You should ask your professional adviser about your individual situation.

# Property tax due December 10

Don't forget that December 10 is the final date for paying your first installment of your Santa Clara County real estate tax for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2016.

You may pay online at www.scctax.org. There has been a major change in the County rules; there is no longer a fee for paying electronically. As the site suggests: "Save a stamp! Save a tree! Pay by ECheck...There's no fee."

However, there is still a 2.38 percent fee for paying with a credit card and a 1 percent fee for paying with a debit card.

If you pay with a paper check, your payment envelope needs to be postmarked by December 10

## SIR 38 luncheon

Donn Posner will be the speaker at the SIR 38 Luncheon in the Clubhouse on Tuesday, December 15. His presentation, "Sleep Like a Baby," will cover such topics as defining sleep, Sleep 101, the Basic Sleep Period, phase, continuity, transient vs. chronic insomnia, initiation vs. maintenance insomnia, demographics and consequences, medical and psychiatric morbidity, how insomnia is addressed, sleep and aging, sleep of the young, sleep across the lifespan, age effects on sleep, treatment options: pharmacotherapy:



pluses and minuses, CBT-I: pluses and minuses, debunking sleep hygiene.

Dr. Donn Posner, Ph.D., CBSM, is a clinical/research psychologist at the Palo Alto VA. Currently he is working on a grant, which hopes to clarify the relative efficacy of each of the components of Cognitive Behavioral Therapy for Insomnia (CBT-I) and for whom each piece works best.

Prior to his role at the VA he spent 25 years serving as the Director of Clinical Behavioral Medicine for Rhode Island and Miriam Hospitals, and was also the Director of Behavioral Sleep Medicine for the Sleep Disorders Center of Lifespan Hospitals. Finally, he was a Clinical Associate Professor in the Department of Psychiatry and Human Behavior at the Warren Alpert School of Medicine at Brown University. For 20 years Dr. Posner had served as the primary supervisor for a rotation of the Behavioral Medicine track of the clinical psychology internship at Brown. The rotation focuses on the assessment and treatment of Sleep and Anxiety Disorders, and is one of the few rotations of its kind in the U.S. He also mentored post-doctoral fellows and lectured on Behavioral Sleep Medicine and Anxiety Disorders to interns. fellows, and residents in internal medicine and psychiatry. In addition, he was a consultant for the Veteran's Administration roll out of CBT-I and trained VA clinicians across the country in the implementation of this treatment.

Dr. Posner is one of the authors of Cognitive Behavioral Treatment of Insomnia: A Session-by-Session Guide (New York: Springer/Verlag). He is a member of the American Academy of Sleep Medicine and is one of the first certified behavioral sleep medicine specialists recognized by that group. He is also a founding member of the Society of Behavioral Sleep Medicine and was recently awarded the society's Peter Hauri Career Distinguished Achievement Award. Most recently Dr. Posner has been consulting around the country at clinical psychology programs and sleep centers assisting them on how to set up a Behavioral Sleep Medicine program and how to effectively deliver these treatments.

Can 21st-century molecular biology answer age-old questions about the human experience? Can studying proteins and DNA help us understand how we make our choices in sex and love? How we communicate? Where our emotions come from? Or why we age and die?

Join the Ethical Humanist Club at its meeting on Monday night, December 19, at 7 p.m. at the Vineyard Center where we will see Dr. Peter Schattner discuss his book, "Sex, Love and DNA: What Molecular Biology Teaches Us About Being Human".

In "Sex, Love and DNA," readers discover how proteins and DNA affect our lives. Based on the latest scientific discoveries, his book explores the amazing world of molecular biology through stories of people who don't feel pain because of rare genetic variants, children whose DNA enables them to perform unusual



feats of strength, and people who can't speak or read simply because they lack certain proteins. Written in language that anyone can understand, "Sex, Love and DNA," will show you how science is revolutionizing our understanding of what it means to be human.

Dr. Schattner's presentation cites a few stories from his book. The presentation, and book, are intended to entertain and inform everyone from professional biologists to those with no background in science at all.

Dr. Schattner is an award-winning scientist, educator and writer with 30 years of research experience spanning diverse fields from molecular biology and genetics to biomedical instrumentation and theoretical physics. His work in molecular biology has ranged from designing computer programs that detect functional non-protein elements in DNA to developing algorithms that identify DNA regulatory regions. He was also responsible for the development of the instructional material for BioPerl, a widely used computer framework for DNA and protein analysis.

He is the author of numerous scientific articles and reviews as well as the textbook Genomes, Browsers and Databases. He was a Woodrow Wilson Fellow and a winner of the American Institute of Ultrasound in Medicine's Award for Technical Innovation.

Wednesdays at 1:30 p.m. is drop-in pickleball. Mike and Julie Walias are available to instruct and assist forming groups. This is a great opportunity both to learn and meet potential partners. Both courts have been filled, so come on out!

Now for more info about pickleball—it is recognized as the fastest growing sport in the United States, with clubs and courts appearing throughout the country. Pickleball started in 1965, when two families in Bainbridge, Washington were trying to come up with a game the entire family could play. They wanted something fun that allowed all ages to participate. Contrary to popular legend, the name "Pickleball" came from Joan Pritchard, one of the "parents" of pickleball: "It reminded me of the Pickle Boat in crew where oarsmen were chosen from the leftovers of other boats." This debunks the story about the family dog "Pickles" inspiring the name (the dog came along a couple of years later).

Because of the simplicity of the game, it quickly caught on, spreading from within Washington to the rest of the country; then throughout the world. Although many Villagers think of pickleball as a game for seniors, it is now taught in many elementary and high schools. Because of the nature of the game – it starts at the baseline, and then becomes more of a "net" game; it is easier on our "older" joints, making it very popular with seniors.

Many senior/retirement communities are putting in dedicated pickleball courts now, due to the growing demand. For example, Stoneridge Creek in Pleasanton recently mailed out a brochure for their new expansion. Second on the list of amenities is—you guessed it—pickleball! More and more, dedicated pickleball courts are something new buyers are looking for in their community. Many area realtors say it's considered a selling point for a development.

This is why the Evergreen Foundation is holding a pledge drive to build pickleball courts here at the Villages. They feel this will only enhance the Villages experience and desirability. Since the courts are smaller than tennis courts, we use blue tape to indicate the playing area. It's time to sign up for the last tournament of the year. This is the last chance for fame and glory and a little cash. We will shortly be announcing the 2016 schedule, which we expect will be another successful year.

With this in mind I would like to remind our members that a way to improve the Villages golf experience is to improve our speed of play. The following is a set of guidelines the Club and Pro Shop have developed that will achieve our goal of 4.0 to 4.5 hour rounds.

Follow these suggestions and, equally important, encourage your partners and guests to do the same:

- Don't be a spectator in the cart! Cart mates should drop one player off at his/her ball and the other player should drive to their ball to prepare for their shot.
- Once you have located your ball and are waiting for others to hit, you should think about your upcoming shot. Club selection, target, wind conditions and so forth can all be determined while waiting for others to hit.
- A golfer should always be ready to play their shot when it is his/her turn, or alternatively, play "ready golf". It is OK to play your shot when ready, if you are not in the line or way of another golfer e.g. on the other side of the fairway.
  - Be ready to putt when it is your turn to putt.
  - Record scores at the next tee...do not remain at the green to record scores.
- If someone in your group is not playing ready golf, remind him or her of these suggestions to encourage them to pick up the pace. Remember, there are other players behind you. If you are falling behind the group in front of you, please do what you need to do to catch up.

If these tips aren't helping you to catch up let the group behind you play through, or alternatively, split up into twosomes until you catch up. You can then rejoin into your foursome when you do catch up. Two players take half the time on the Tee and half the time on the Putting Green. You will catch up sooner than you think.

# **TENNIS TALK**

Sandie Parker Jones-vivacious, adventuresome and loyal. Sandy was born in Charleston, SC., as the first child, not meeting her father again until she was two. He was an Army Captain in the Screaming Eagle 101st Airborne Division and fought in the Battle of the Bulge. She describes him as definitely one of the "Greatest Generations", who returned home to work at the Stanford Institute in Huntsville, Ala. with Werner Von Braun for a year and then moved the family to Santa Clara to be Contract Administrator for Missiles at Lockheed. What a resume! Of course the family came along. Sandy adjusted to each move and enthusiastically participated in the cheerleading, dance drill team and chased boys.

Now Sandie says her life folds into three chapters:

Chapter One: She attended San Jose State University and during her Junior year she married Dick Holden, a pitcher for the Giants. They were married for 25 years and had two sons, Dave and Bob. Their honeymoon was at Spring Training in Arizona. She promised her parents she would finish college and she did 14 years later with a B.S. in Social Science. After Dick's father died in 1962, he took over his business, Radiation Detection Co. in Gilroy where she served as a bookkeeper. They bought the Old Almaden Social Hall built in 1921 with two acres and there began Sandy's love for horses. They had three horses and (eventually a pony for the grandkids). After church the family of four would all play tennis together at the San Jose Swim and Racquet Club in Willow Glen. Otherwise Sandy was a "baseball, swim teacher and soccer mom" for 25 years.

Chapter Two: "The Cowgirl Years" - 1988-2007. Sandy belonged to the Santa Clara Horseman's Association and stayed in the family home, which backed onto 3,000 acres (Almaden Quicksilver Park). There she met Bill Parker, recently single and they married in 1989 and built a ranch in Mariposa, a short ride to Yosemite. From 1989-2001 Sandy also worked for San Jose Unified as did Bill. They briefly lived here in Montgomery while building a new home. These were happy years but Bill died suddenly of heart disease in 2008. 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Dealer has 1 winner in Spades, 1 winner in Hearts, 3 or more winners in Diamonds, and 1 winner in Clubs.

Strategy: South must set up the Diamonds. Since transportation is a problem, let the opponents take the first Diamond trick in case there is a bad break in Diamonds. Then the declarer can get rid of the losers in the other suits, make the contract, and maybe even make an over trick.

West leads the 3 of Spades, South wins with the Jack on the board, then plays a low Diamond, East takes the trick with the 9, switches to a Spade, South covers with the Ace, leads his last Diamond, and runs the Diamonds. After that South leads a heart from dummy, plays the Ace in his hand; next the Ace of Clubs then leads a Heart, East wins with the King, and leads his last card, the King of Clubs. Great. The contract is made with an overtrick. Normally with 5 cards out, the chances of a 3-2 split are 68 percent but 4-1 is 28 percent, and South couldn't take the chance of that situation. However, if it had been 5-0 in diamonds a 4 percent break then South would have failed making his contract. Sometimes it is better to let the opponents take a trick in order to run a suit when there is a transportation problem getting to the board.

When South opened the bidding with 1 NoTrump, North's hand goes up in value with a good six-card suit. Thus North had no problem bidding game.



# What is Vial of L.I.F.E.?

What is the Vial of L.I.F.E.? The Vial of L.I.F.E. is "Lifesaving Information For Emergencies." It's a place for you to store important medical information that emergency medical personnel (firefighters, paramedics, Public Safety officers and hospital staff) need in a time of crisis. By completing the Vial of L.I.F.E. form, you can provide the emergency personnel with vital lifesaving information even if you are unable. It is very important that you keep this information up to date, accurate and placed in a prominent spot in your refrigerator—an empty or incomplete form does little to help those who need your medical history. By the way, it is also advisable to have completed, up-to-date forms in each of your vehicles to assist EMS in the event of an accident

The Vial of L.I.F.E. kit is available free as a public service from the San Jose Firefighters Union Local 230 and the San Jose Fire Department. It can be obtained by contacting Public Safety, the gate at 223-4665; Public Safety Administration at 239-5246 or San Jose Fire Department Emergency Medical Services Division at 277-4084.




