Stop signs could be enforced by placing a suitable bump before the crossing

We would probably need to install them only on Fairway and Villages Parkway.

Water heaters: It's difficult to write this letter because I am not a licensed contractor. Very few of us in The Villages are. We have had a continuing problem getting our hot water heater to re-light after being turned off in order to save energy when we are gone. Ours is a new water heater. When we contacted the contractor who put it in, they recommended a \$2,000 plus re-install of the gas lines to it. After some considerable re-lighting attempts I came to the solution: I didn't turn up the heat immediately, but rather wait 15 minutes with only the pilot light running.

Pulse letters must be verified for accuracy by the editors. So, when you call a contractor or plumber, I recommend that you ASK them to allow the pilot light to remain on for 15 minutes before turning up the heat. There are reasons for this that I am not permitted to publish. We like to take our contractors' recommendations in honesty, since we are not experts. Please do this before spending a lot of money unnecessarily.

FROM THE CLUB BOARD

Villages Solar Project update

The Villages Golf and Country Club is one of the most environmentally conscious communities of its type in America. For example, as San Jose Municipal Water's largest customer, we have reduced our potable water consumption by 66 percent and accomplished more than 7 acres of turf reduction. Over a decade ago we shifted to recycled water for our golf course for everything but the greens. The Villages recently received a Water Hero's award from the Santa Clara Valley Water District.

However, since March 2015, we have been attempting to get approval from the San Jose City Planning and Public Works Department on a 614 kilowatt solar project, which would dramatically reduce our reliance on PG&E, while providing Villagers a savings of over \$20,000 per month. The project is to be located in our Recreational Vehicle (RV) lot. Unfortunately, we have been given one roadblock or excuse after another. The latest demand relates to a Private Service Drain Release Easement (PSDRE) requirement that deals with a miniscule amount of water that will not reach the ground directly under the ground mounted solar panels next to the driveway. Hydro calculations show the RV lot parcel (with solar panels) will not result in additional runoff into an existing drainage inlet at the SW corner of the RV lot. The SW corner of the RV lot (lowest point in the lot) currently has two large manhole grated covers that drain into a public works storm drainage pipe (5 feet in diameter). In over 25 years of operation, there has never been a problem. The situation has become extremely frustrating and costly to The Villages. Why is San Jose so opposed to this project that will be good for California?

Christmas tree pickup this year will be on the following days:

- · Monday, December 28 and Tuesday, December 29
- Monday, January 4 and Tuesday, January 5

Place the tree at curbside no more than 24 hours before pickup day and note the following before putting out your tree:

- 1. All tinsel, ornaments, garland, etc. must be removed.
- 2. All metal/plastic stands or buckets must be removed.
- 3. Wood stands are acceptable.
- 4. Trees should be cut to no longer than 5 feet lengths.

Help, I'm really confused

Very often Husband and Wife divide household duties. For example he pays the bills, manages the finances and takes care of the cars. She cleans the house, cooks and manages their social life. However, recently Husband was in the hospital for two weeks and in a rehab facility for physical therapy for another four weeks. Wife realized she didn't know how to keep the finances going while he was gone. She knew he mostly took care of things on the computer but did not know which sites to use or the necessary user names and passwords. And yes, she asked her neighbor to take her car to the gas station because she had never before needed to pump her own gas.

With this scenario in mind, SRS has a new handout titled "Finances - What Does Your Spouse Need to Know".

There are two sections to the handout; the first section is titled "Small Picture". This list is the basics for everyday finances; e.g. where are the bank accounts, what is automatically deposited, which bills are paid automatically and how the accounts are reviewed and reconciled at the end

If one spouse typically pays all of the bills, SRS suggests the other spouse take over that responsibility periodically—say every six months. Let the spouse who has been handling the finances use the opportunity to talk about why things are done the way they are. Both must promise not to grumble or criticize but to use it as a mutual learning experience.

The second section, titled "Big Picture," takes a general look at your finances such as what does it cost to live per month and how will finances change when one partner dies.

The handout also includes a reference to the SRS handout titled "Location of Important Documents and Information". This handout has long been a favorite handout of Villagers. It is now in larger print and is expanded to include even more information.

Note: The Senior Resource Services (SRS) office hours for drop-in assistance are Monday, Wednesday and Friday from 10 a.m. to noon. The SRS office is located in the Cribari Center across from the Post Office. You may also leave a message at 408-239-5253. The purpose of SRS is to provide education and general business and financial information. All assistance is free and confidential. You should ask your professional adviser about your individual situation.

Take steps to protect yourself from falls

Yearly, one in every three adults ages 65 or older falls and two million are treated in emergency departments for fall-related injuries. Thankfully, falls are not an inevitable part of aging. In fact, many falls can be prevented. We can take action to protect ourselves.

Lack of exercise can lead to weak legs and this increases the chances of falling. Exercise programs such as Tai Chi can increase strength and improve balance, making falls much less likely. Here at the Villages we have Tai Chi classes, hiking and other exercise groups that are good for the body and the mind.

Some medicines—or combinations of medicines—can have side effects such as dizziness or drowsiness. This can make falling more likely. Having a doctor or pharmacist review all your medications can help reduce the chance of risky side effects and drug interactions.

Poor vision can make it harder to get around safely. We should all have our eyes checked every year and wear glasses or contact lenses with the right prescription strength to ensure we are seeing clearly.

About half of all falls happen at home. Make your home

- 1) Removing things you can trip over (such as papers, books, clothes, and shoes) from stairs and places where you walk.
 - 2) Installing handrails and lights on all staircases.
- 3) Removing small throw rugs or use double-sided tape to keep the rugs from slipping.
- 4) Keeping items you use often in cabinets you can reach easily without using a step stool.
- 5) Putting grab bars inside and next to the tub or shower and next to your toilet.
 - 6) Using non-slip mats in the bathtub and on shower floors.
- 7) Improving the lighting in your home. As we get older, we need brighter lights to see well. Hang lightweight curtains or shades to reduce glare.
- 8) Wearing shoes both inside and outside the house. Avoid going barefoot or wearing slippers.

Coming home, the bus had to pull over due to a coolant leak. After the driver added the coolant, we were off to a pit stop for food and leg stretching at Ikeda's. While there a resident fell, struck her head and fell on her knee. Driver again called 911 with paramedics arriving in a few minutes. After evaluation and the fact she had struck her head she was taken to Kaiser in Roseville. I called The Villages to get the contact number for the resident's daughter and made the call...the daughter was very thankful that her mom was taken to Kaiser and knew exactly where it was located and said she would be on her way to check on her mom and let me know how she was doing. The resident did spend the night in the hospital and was released to her daughter.

The rest of us boarded the bus and resumed our trip back to The Villages. The bus unfortunately lost all of its coolant climbing the Sunol grade, so the driver, my husband and the former driver for Royal Coach began filling the coolant receptacle tank with bottled water we had in luggage compartment and the bottled water that residents were drinking (haha) and after seven gallons of water the coolant receptacle tank still would not hit the fill line...

So, yes you guessed it, the driver called Royal Coach again and asked for another bus to be brought out and a mechanic for the bus we were in. It is Friday night; 6 p.m. on 680...traffic! However, the driver from the yard kicked it into overdrive and arrived within an hour and 15 minutes. Then we unloaded all passengers and luggage out from the poor broken bus into our new ride. We arrived safely back at The Villages and everyone



Join the Ethical Humanist Club at its meeting on Monday night, December 21, at 7 p.m. at the Vineyard Center where we will see Dr. Peter Schattner discuss his book, "Sex, Love and DNA: What Molecular Biology Teaches Us About Being Human".

In "Sex, Love and DNA," readers discover how proteins and DNA affect our lives. Based on the latest scientific discoveries, his book explores the amazing world of molecular biology through stories of people who don't feel pain because of rare genetic variants, children whose DNA enables them to perform unusual feats of strength, and people who can't speak or read simply because they lack certain proteins. Written in language



that anyone can understand, "Sex, Love and DNA," will show you how science is revolutionizing our understanding of what it means to be human.

Dr. Schattner's presentation cites a few stories from his book. The presentation, and book, are intended to entertain and inform everyone from professional biologists to those with no background in science at all.

Dr. Schattner is an award-winning scientist, educator and writer with 30 years of research experience spanning diverse fields from molecular biology and genetics to biomedical instrumentation and theoretical physics. His work in molecular biology has ranged from designing computer programs that detect functional non-protein elements in DNA to developing algorithms that identify DNA regulatory regions. He was also responsible for the development of the instructional material for BioPerl, a widely used computer framework for DNA and protein analysis.

He received his Ph.D. from M.I.T under Nobel Laureate Steven Weinberg and has held research and teaching positions in computational biology, biomedical engineering and physics at the University of California, California State University, Stanford Research Institute and Diasonics, Inc., where he contributed to the early development of medical ultrasound and MRI scanners. He is the author of numerous scientific articles and reviews as well as the textbook Genomes, Browsers and Databases. He was a Woodrow Wilson Fellow and a winner of the American Institute of Ultrasound in Medicine's Award for Technical Innovation.

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

Clearing guests at the Plaza

In an effort to assist residents in clearing their guests at the community's entrance (the Plaza), Public Safety has some helpful hints.

1. If you are expecting a guest, please inform them that they will be asked for a house number by the Public Safety Officer when they approach the front gate. Most services we provide are tied to the house number. If your guest does not know your house number, there can be a delay, as we then need to search the system for your name.

2. Inform your guests that the left lane is for guests and the right lane is for residents. Often, guests will go to the shorter line, which is the residents' and cleared vendors' lane. When this occurs, traffic stops until we inform the guest to drive around the Plaza to enter the guest lane, so we can assist them.

3. The most convenient way to clear your guest is to enter their name(s) on your personal guest list via www.gateaccess.net. This expedites your guest being cleared. If they are not on your guest list, the Public Safety Officer must contact you to clear your guest. If you do not have access to a computer to clear your guest, please contact the Public Safety Plaza via telephone (408-223-4665) before your guest arrives and we will be happy to assist you in adding your guest to your guest list.

Additionally, in an effort to control traffic when a long line forms, we will stop traffic in one or the other lanes to reduce traffic in the other lane. Most of the time only one gate arm will open at a time, but there are times when both will open. It normally occurs when the barcode reader reads the barcode and the officer presses the guest lane button at the same time.

As we approach the holiday season, please drive safely and if you need a ride home from the Clubhouse or Bistro, contact the Public Safety Plaza.





Dealer has a possible Spade loser, and 2 possible Heart losers.

Strategy: Obviously this deal is very distributional and he should take out trumps before playing the Diamonds. From the bidding we know that West has loads of Clubs; therefore, there is a good chance that East has one or both of the honors in Hearts.

West leads the Ace of Clubs, South sluffs a Spade from dummy, trumps in his hand, switches to a Spade to the Ace on the board. He plays a low Heart and finesses the Queen. At this point South knows East will take one Heart trick. He leads the Queen of Diamonds, overtakes it with the King on the board, now plays a Heart, East covers with the Jack, South wins with the Ace, follows with another Heart to the 10 on the board, and East, the King. He leads the Jack of Spades, South, the King, and now leads the 9 of Hearts, plays the Ace and Jack of Diamonds, now his last Diamond to the 10 on the board, follows with another good Diamond, sluffs his last Spade in his hand, and claims since his last card is a trump. If South decides that East has both honors in Hearts, he could finesse the 10 on the first round of trumps, noticing that West has none, then play another Heart and eventually win all the Heart tricks. South would now be able to make 7 Hearts! The chances that East has all the hearts is about 10 percent.

* Bidding the opponent's suit shows a limit raise, promising 3 of the bid suit plus 10 - 12 HCP (North decides his void in opponent's suit gives him the required points).

^ Since South has a void he is hesitant to bid Blackwood until he finds out more about his partner's hand. Bidding 4 Diamonds shows first or second round control in the suit, North, likewise, bids Spades to show a stopper. Now South feels better about asking for Aces.




