
Wild Turkeys in the rain

The *Mercury News* had a headline on 8/1/16: "PG&E customers face triple whammy in gas and electricity bills." Such sudden increases in our living expenses will continue to occur in the future. We live in an environment of aging electricity, gas, water grid infrastructures, wider temperature swings caused by climate change, earthquakes, cyber threats to our utility grids, etc. So how do we protect ourselves from eventualities that can have a major negative impact on our lifestyles? By developing alternatives where we can. One such area is energy. Especially when we have the right, as provided by the Solar Rights Act.

Others have done it. Sugarloaf (San Mateo) and Fairwood Greens (WA) HOAs have modified their CC&Rs with policies to allow their members to install solar power alternatives. I'm sure many other HOAs have done it too. It's the smart thing to do. So why can't we? Why can't we empower ourselves to be able to keep our electricity and gas costs under control – and not be at the mercy of utility companies? I would be willing to volunteer helping the Association Board to come up with a solution for this issue.

I have long wanted to install solar panels on our single story condo but I have understood that it wouldn't be permitted. The board is now considering a policy to allow such installation.

The problem they have is our unit is easy, one floor, no one shares the benefit of our roof. My proposal would have been that I would accept charges for roof damage/repair for our share of the roof. I don't think this is the problem for the board's policy. The problem is with the units upstairs and down that share the same roof.

I suggest that the policy be written to allow solar to be installed, where desired, by the owners of the single-story units and that the multistory owners be surveyed as to whether they would install separately from the neighbors upstairs and downstairs, or if those owners agree to also install on the same roof and share the installation costs that would also be allowed!

In all cases, those who install solar would be responsible for their share of roof repairs involved.

Those Association members who have all electric residences will suffer from the continuing escalation of the cost of electricity. Personally, I believe at some point solar power for all electric homes will be almost a requirement, with those without having lower property values. I would like to see the Association Board Directors work to come up with a fair and reasonable policy for solar installation and use by its members. Yes, it will be a difficult task to come up with such a policy, but please don't take the easy way out by just saying no solar is our policy. Thank you.

The Villages' 2016 Solar Production

It was a very long process to obtain the necessary permitting from the City of San Jose. After the granting of all the permits and approvals, construction went smoothly. PG&E made the necessary upgrades to assure safety and grid integrity for our solar production, and we started energy production late afternoon of September 20.

The graph shows that even with only 10 days of production in September we achieved 28,170 kWh. For the full month of October, 62,720 kWh were generated. The total for 2016 was 184,660 kWh. Unfortunately, we missed the summer season where production would be the highest. PG&E has not yet provided us with credits for our production so we don't know where we are on our financial plan but the credit for 2016 should be around \$40,000. Stay tuned for updates.

Association/Homeowners documents available via e-mail

Per an amendment to California Civil Code, homeowner associations are permitted, with owner's written consent, to distribute annual disclosures, (like the pro forma budget summary) and other specified association documents to owners via electronic mail, facsimile, or other electronic means (such as posting on the association's website) instead of sending those documents out by regular mail or personal delivery. This has the potential to provide cost savings to The Villages. Delivery and postage costs for the Villages' annual distribution of the pro forma budget summary alone are close to \$1,000, not to mention the paper and printing costs that run about \$8,000.

In order to transmit association documents via e-mail or by posting on the homeowners association's website, 1) the homeowners association must first receive the owner's written consent, and 2) the homeowners association sends a separate notice to the owner that the documents have been posted and are available for viewing.

Consent forms for owners to request delivery of documents have been developed for both The Villages Association and Homeowners Corporations. These forms provide an owner's consent to delivery electronically, of documents that are capable, under current laws, of being distributed electronically. Owners have the right to revoke this request and receive "hard copies" of the documents by sending a written revocation signed by the owner, to the applicable corporation.



Solar power electricity: I am led to believe that there is a state mandate to allow individual condominium owners access to common areas to install Solar Power panels to produce electricity to supplement that provided by PG&E. The economics for this is the pricing structure employed that increases the incremental cost as more electricity is demanded. This was not the pricing structure employed when the units in Hermosa and Heights were build which made HEAT PUMPS an economical choice. Assuming that PG&E will not change its pricing structure in the foresee-able future, it is an economic decision that makes Solar Power a viable choice and for the ABOD to tackle the problem of how to allow each Condo owner to choose to add solar panels on common property roofs. This is an engineering problem to be solved without damaging the new roofs presently being installed in Hermosa. I believe this is possible in a cost effective way. Certainly we all have been getting several calls per week from companies wishing to sell either the solar power on an as used basis or selling the solar system.

Let's get on with it!

The official payment site for federal and state fees charges about 2.3 percent for the convenience fees. I hope it is possible to set up a payment account to accommodate people who want to use their credit cards.

Publisher's Note: This past year, a number of programs were evaluated that provide an option for members to pay their monthly assessments and charges by credit card. We are in the final stages of the selection process and look to roll out a new program within a couple months. The fee associated with the credit payments will likely be 3 percent; the fee will be paid directly to the third-party provider of the service.

I am a resident of the Heights. I pay \$350-\$400/month for electricity. My village does not have gas connections. So many of my neighbors and our household suffer high energy costs. I wish to exercise my right as provided by the "Solar Rights Act" to install solar panels.

There may be some logistic and legal issues of roof sharing, long-term ownership, etc. particularly in duplex condos. If residents understand the benefits of Solar power, especially insurance against future rate hikes and earning potential, these issues will dissolve.

These are direct cost-cutting and revenue-generating benefits of solar power:

- Reduce monthly cost of electricity.
- Generate surplus power so it becomes source of revenue.
- Reduce panel cost by availing cash subsidy by California state, Federal and vendors. See PG&E ad.

• Benefit from charging electrical vehicles in our garages.

Instead of closing off solar forever, the ABOD should come forward to educate benefits of solar installation as shown by our respected Villagers, John Stratakos and Mike Kane. The ABOD must form favorable Solar Power guidelines like many HOAs have, so our residents participate and benefit from new technology.

Pulse Letter Writing Tips

By the Communications Advisory Committee

From time to time, Pulse letters become contentious over various issues. Please keep in mind that the Pulse column benefits greatly from positive letters as well as expressions of concerns. We encourage residents also to submit appreciative letters about your experiences here at The Villages. Please consider that Pulse letters are often viewed by those considering moving to the Villages, so excessively negative letters may lead to the impression that our wonderful community is an undesirable one.

We recognize that some community-related complaints should be aired to a wider audience. If you feel a negative or critical letter would benefit the community, here are some tips for making it more effective.

- First think about whether direct action would serve your cause better than an angry letter. Dealing directly and diplomatically with the source of your discontent may solve the problem without having to publicly air it. Use Pulse as a backup if you don't get satisfaction.
- If you go ahead with a letter, give yourself a chance to cool off. Letters written in the heat of anger often come off as comical later.
- Regardless of how upset you are, read the instructions provided. The Pulse letter section has guidelines; follow them carefully.
- If you are responding to an event, meeting, article or letter, say so right away. Name the source of your discontent in the first sentence of the body of your letter.
- Introduce your problem and sum up your objection and include a few sentences to support your view. Suggest alternatives or solutions to the problem.
- Keep the letter as constructive as possible. Don't appear to be overly emotional. Limit your exclamation points. Don't be rude or threatening. Be polite. Regardless of your letter's topic, be respectful to the publication, its staff, to those you disagree with, and to the readers. Do not resort to personal attacks or use insulting language. Staff members are more likely to rectify or accede to your complaint or concern if they are not put in defensive mode.
- Proofread your letter. Readers tend to discount authors who write letters that contain bad grammar and are poorly-written.
- Finally, be concise and focused. Remember, there is a 200-word limit.

By the way, it is also advisable to have completed, up-to-date forms in each of your vehicles to assist EMS in the event of an accident



Access to online accounts: Helping your executor and loved ones

In this digital age, if you die or become incapacitated, your executor and loved ones will need access to your online accounts. If someone you trust doesn't know your passwords or usernames, who will take care of your bank accounts, automatic payment plans, investment information, electronic mortgage statements, and credit card bills? Who will monitor your email? Your Facebook page?

The best plan is probably the simplest. Just make a list of your user names, passwords, PINs, and related accounts, and then make sure the right person knows how to get access to the list. The hard part is remembering all the passwords you've accumulated, and keeping the list up to date.

Be sure to include information on how to access:

- computers
- Internet service providers or Web hosting services
- email accounts (email providers all have their own rules about access after a death; some allow next of kin access, some won't give access to anyone)
- blogs
- photo storage sites
- social networking sites such as Facebook, Twitter, and LinkedIn
- online subscriptions (for example, magazine subscriptions that renew automatically or subscriptions to sports websites)
- financial sites (banks and brokerages) where you have money saved or invested
- mortgage providers
- college savings and retirement plans
- companies (such as banks or utilities) where you have set up automatic bill-paying
- software applications (for example, tax return or legal document preparation programs or websites), and
- cell phones.

SRS Quick Fact:

2017 estate exemption

Estates of decedents who die during 2017 have a basic estate tax exclusion amount of \$5,490,000. If the decedent was married and all property was held as community property, the asset amount before an estate return is required is \$10,980,000.

The estate tax law is inflation indexed; in 2016 the exemption was \$5,450,000 and \$10,900,000. The annual gift tax exclusion continues to be \$14,000 in 2017.



"Night School" by Lee Child: This is the 20th Jack Reacher thriller by Lee Child., It is 1996 and Jack Reacher is as always on the hunt for terrorists and other miscreants. This time he is teamed up with an FBI agent and a CIA analyst. An undercover agent in a Jihadist slleeper cell in Hamburg Germany has heard a Saudi courier whisper "The American wants 100 million dollars." Who is he and what can he be planning, which needs \$100 million dollars? It surely must be far bigger than any previous terrorist attack worldwide. Many false leads and double crosses later we can be sure Jack will get his man and prevent disaster or maybe not. Mystery 2016.

"Woman of God" by James Patterson and Maxine Paetro: This novel is a departure by James Patterson from his normal subject matter, which includes polished lawyers/detectives that bring sophisticated criminals to heel while charming beautiful ladies. The present heroine, Brigitte Fitzgerald, has lived the live of a dedicated Christian, serving God as a doctor healing the wounded in the Sudan. Now, many years later she is in the running to become the first female Pope. Can she be elected, overcoming a 2000-year male dominated tradition and rejuvenate the Roman Catholic Church? "Thanks for Being Late" by Thomas L. Friedman: As in his previous books, such as "The World is Flat," Friedman tries to make sense of the rapid changes in almost all areas of our life. Moore's law has made computing cheap and widely available, with fiber optic cables spanning the globe that make internet communications fast and inexpensive (and long distance hacking an always present threat). Market globalization makes consumer items inexpensive, but threatens the prosperity of a large number of sometimes ill prepared citizens. Overall this hangs the strong possibility of climate change, which may carry severe consequences all over the earth. All these forces are currently accelerating. Where all this will lead nobody knows, but Friedman's book can serve as a field manual for how the world may find a way to wrestle its way through this tsunami of change and how you can prosper or at least survive in the years to come. 303.48 Social pressures - causes of change.

"Moonglow" by Michael Chabon: "Moonglow" unfolds as the deathbed confession of a man the narrator only refers to as "my grandfather." It is a tale of madness, of war and adventure, of sex and marriage and desire, of existential doubt and model rocketry, of the shining aspirations and demonic underpinnings of American technological achievements at mid-century, but also of the destructive impact—and the creative power—of keeping secrets and telling lies. Could this be the great American novel for the 20th century, sometimes also called the American century? Read the novel and find out. Fiction 2016.

"Chaos" by Patricia Cornwell: Another Dr. Kay Scarpetta mystery. This time she investigates the death of a bicyclist, who was attacked with almost superhuman force. A suspicious call, allegedly from Interpol, indicates that it may be the work of cyberbully Tailend Charlie. Unfortunately even her tech-savvy niece, Lucy, can't trace him. 

'Great Decisions' course

Senior Academy is offering the four-week "Great Decisions 2017" Discussion Course on four consecutive Thursday evenings, March 9, 16, 23 and 30, from 7 to 9 p.m. Our first meeting (Thursday, March 9) will be held at Vineyard Center.

This course is based on America's largest discussion program on world affairs. It provides background information and policy options for the most critical issues facing the U.S. each year. "Great Decisions" is produced and developed annually by the Foreign Policy Association in New York. The grassroots discussion model adopted by "Great Decisions" more than 50 years ago continues today, with tens of thousands of participants taking part in discussions nationwide annually.

The topics for this year's discussions are:

- The Future of Europe
- Conflict in the South China Sea
- Saudi Arabia in Transition
- Prospects for Afghanistan and Pakistan

The educational source of information for the discussions is a "Briefing Book," received in advance. Students are required to study the Briefing Book before discussions begin. This will take about two hours' time.

Each evening of the course there will be a very current 25-minute video program led by experts in foreign policy. Small discussion groups follow, so participants must be able to work cooperatively in a group. After each session students will be balloted online for their opinion and choice of policy options. This is called the "National Opinion Ballot" and a report of the results is sent to the U.S. Department of State.

Techniques and tips for driving in the rain

While we are currently experiencing a dry spell, it is still late fall with the possibility of more rain in the forecasts. Rain is blamed for thousands of accidents every year—many of which can be prevented. To follow are a few tips that apply to driving in adverse weather on Villages streets, as well as on highways and local throughfares.

- Allow more travel time. Plan to drive at a slower pace than normal when the roads are wet. Keep in mind that traffic is likely to be moving at a slower pace than normal.
- Brake earlier and with less force than you would normally. Not only does this increase the stopping distance between you and the car in front of you, it also lets the driver behind you know that you're slowing down.
- Turn on your headlights, even if it is only spinkling lightly. It helps you see the road, and more importantly, it helps other motorists see you. Furthermore, California

law requires that when you use your windshield wipers, your headlights must be on.

- Defog your windows. Rain will quickly cause your windshield and windows to fog up. Switch on both front and rear defrosters and be sure the fan is turned on.
 Watch out for pedestrians. An ordinarily observant pedestrian may become distracted
- Watch out for pedestrians. An ordinarily observant pedestrian may become distracted by adjusting an umbrella or raincoat. Plus raindrops deaden sounds so that auditory clues for measuring car distances become skewed—be extra observant of pedestrians walking in groups or with their dogs.

While most people slow down in the rain, others don't. Always drive defensively and be aware of those around you at all times—you can help prevent accidents by being a careful driver.

PG&E Scams and how to diffuse them

A 97-year-old resident called *The Villager* office and warned about a possible PG&E scam that just happened to her. A caller was offering a discount on her utility bill and wanted her to provide her PG&E account number from her bill in order to qualify for the discount. Maintaining her composure, our smart senior listened to the pitch and then decided to hang up on the caller. She smelled a rat. She could have done one more thing: call PG&E directly at 1-800-743-5000 and ask whether the caller was promoting a legitimate PG&E program, or was just looking for an opportunity to steal her identity and wreak havoc on her life.

The PG&E website offers advice to help you spot utility scams and gives some examples of how they are perpetrated. They can be in the form of phone calls, e-mails or face-to-face exchanges at your front door. When someone calls on the phone claiming to be from PG&E, don't rely on caller ID, because some scammers are able to make their calls appear as if they are coming from PG&E. Know that PG&E will never ask for financial information over the phone or demand payment via prepaid card or money order. Legitimate callers will not use high-pressure tactics or threaten to immediately disconnect your power. In some cases, the caller may say you're entitled to a refund and that they need your bank information. If you hear any of these red flags, hang up and call PG&E directly.

A typical e-mail scam demands immediate payment for a fake bill. If you are suspicious of an e-mail you have received, do not click on any links or open attachments. PG&E will always ask you to sign into your "My Energy" account before entering personal account information online. If someone shows up at your front door, always ask for identification before allowing someone into your home. All PG&E employees carry IDs and will be willing to show them to you. If you want to verify anything suspicious, call PG&E directly. Scammers often prey on the elderly, so be doubly cautious with callers or personal visits. If you have doubts in any way, call PG&E to report the issue. However, if you feel threatened, notify law enforcement immediately.

PG&E provides these tips on its web site:

- Safeguard your personal information and credit card numbers by avoiding giving the information out over the phone. If you have second thoughts after you gave your credit card or checking account information over the phone, report it to the credit card company or bank and law enforcement.
- Beware of emails requesting your personal information. PG&E does not e-mail anyone requesting that they provide personal information without first logging into your online PG&E account. (When in doubt, call PG&E.)

Don't hesitate to call if you're concerned about the legitimacy of a call about a past due bill, service request or request for personal information

- Ask to see identification before letting anyone who claims to be a PG&E representative inside your home. PG&E employees always carry their identification and are always willing to show it to you.
- Call the PG&E Customer Service line at 1-800-743-5000 if a person claiming to be an employee shows identification and you still feel uncomfortable. We will verify an appointment and/or the presence of PG&E in the community. If you still feel threatened, notify local law enforcement.
- Expect to receive an automated call from PG&E 48 hours before a scheduled visit. You may also receive a personal call from a PG&E gas service representative before a scheduled visit.

Remember to always be safe. Do not go near the construction crews. If your ball goes near any of the construction, please take a clear and safe drop without penalty.

Tips from the Pro: Pitching Over the water on #9 & #18 How many times have you found yourself in good shape after two or three shots on hole #9 or #18 only to hit your pitch into the water hazard fronting the green? Here are some tips to make that shot easier.

Pre-shot apprehension will create tension and lead to poor performance. So relax, envision the shot clearing the hazard and landing next to the hole. Keep your hands and arms loose.


Play the ball back in your stance. Both #9 and #18 are downhill lies just prior to the water hazards, so be sure to play your pitch shot back in your stance so you catch the ball first.

Stay still over the ball. Excessive lateral or vertical movement of the body will change your connection to the ball. So keep your head and legs still while playing this pitch. Swing the arms back and through with the arm swing matching the shot.

If you have trouble hitting this shot fat...try to open the clubface at address to activate the bounce on the bottom of your wedge. This will allow the wedge to slide through impact and not dig. Take your wrists out of the shot and swing your

And the biggest tip of all...Do not lift the club through impact; trying to "help" the ball get in the air leads to disaster. The club must move down on the ball and must strike the turf after the ball in order to create the backspin necessary to get the ball up and over the water. In other words, you have to hit down on the ball. Let the club naturally bottom out at the ball as part of the arc of the swing...no need to lift the club through impact, so keep those arms extended.

Try some of these tips and let us know how you do. See you at the course!

Dealer has 1 possible loser in Spades, 1 or 2 in Hearts, and 2 losers in Clubs.

Strategy: Take out trumps and hope to discard a Club loser on one of the good Diamond winners.

West leads 5 of Clubs, South covers with the 8 from the board, East wins with the Ace, returns a Club, West takes the trick with the King, and switches to a Heart. South plays low from dummy, East, the Queen, South covers with the Ace, then leads the King of Spades and notices East is void. He continues with the Queen, then a low Spade, and it doesn't matter which card West plays. He chooses the 9, South wins with the 10, and then leads the Ace of Spades to capture the Jack. After that he plays the King of Diamonds, then a low Diamond to the Queen in his hand, next the Ace of Diamonds, sluffs a Heart from the board, then leads the 10 of Hearts, East covers with the King, switches to a Diamond, South trumps the trick on the board and follows with the last card, the Jack of Hearts. Great! The contract is made exactly. If West had initially led any other suit other than a Club, then South would make an over trick by ruffing a Club on the board before the opponents can use their good Clubs.

- * After an opening bid of 1 NT or 2 NT, responder can transfer (called Jacoby transfer) to a major at the cheapest level. Responder is showing at least 5 cards in the major.
- ^ Opener will jump to 3 of the major with a good fit and usually 17 HCP.






