This will be a regular meeting of the club with a brief update on club business and activities as well as an opportunity to see pictures taken by the club's trail cameras.



The topic of Solar has come up at the ABOD meeting. I served for two years on the General Plan Committee and thought I should remind Villagers of the survey results. Recall the General Plan Committee drove a survey done by Hamlin-Harkins in 2015 and got an incredible response rate from Villagers. The topic of Solar comes up in the survey 14 times. Here are some highlights where the Villagers interest for Solar appears in the survey. For example, in question 10 slide 35, "How interested are you in the following possible new amenities?" The Villagers' answer was "Solar array systems to reduce energy use" is the #1 ranked new amenity. In addition, solar is mentioned in the original survey results that Donna Hamlin presented at the Town Hall meeting in October 2015 (Life at the Villagers) on slides: 21, 30, 37, 45, 46, 48, 78, 85; twice on slides 35, 40, and 51. From the Survey, Villagers are very interested in adding more Solar as an amenity. I look forward to the Boards doing more investigation and analysis on this topic. Also, I would encourage all committees to review the survey, as it may provide some useful information.

Association/Homeowners documents available via e-mail

Per an amendment to California Civil Code, homeowner associations are permitted, with owner's written consent, to distribute annual disclosures, (like the pro forma budget summary) and other specified association documents to owners via electronic mail, facsimile, or other electronic means (such as posting on the association's website) instead of sending those documents out by regular mail or personal delivery. This has the potential to provide cost savings to The Villages. Delivery and postage costs for the Villages' annual distribution of the pro forma budget summary alone are close to \$1,000, not to mention the paper and printing costs that run about \$8,000.

In order to transmit association documents via e-mail or by posting on the homeowners association's website, 1) the homeowners association must first receive the owner's written consent, and 2) the homeowners association sends a separate notice to the owner that the documents have been posted and are available for viewing.

Consent forms for owners to request delivery of documents have been developed for both The Villages Association and Homeowners Corporations. These forms provide an owner's consent to delivery electronically, of documents that are capable, under current laws, of being distributed electronically. Owners have the right to revoke this request and receive "hard copies" of the documents by sending a written revocation signed by the owner, to the applicable corporation.

PUBLIC SAFETY *Techniques and tips for driving in the rain*

As our wet winter begins, there is more rain in the forecast. Rain is blamed for thousands of accidents every year—many of which can be prevented. To follow are a few tips that apply to driving in adverse weather on Villages streets, as well as on highways and local throughfares.

• Allow more travel time. Plan to drive at a slower pace than normal when the roads are wet. Keep in mind that traffic is likely to be moving at a slower pace than normal.

• Brake earlier and with less force than you would normally. Not only does this increase the stopping distance between you and the car in front of you, it also lets the driver behind you know

that you're slowing down.

• Turn on your headlights, even if it is only spinkling lightly. It helps you see the road, and more importantly, it helps other motorists see you. Furthermore, California law requires that when you use your windshield wipers, you headlights must be on.

• Defog your windows. Rain will quickly cause your windshield and windows to fog up. Switch on both front and rear defrosters and be sure the fan is turned on.

• Watch out for pedestrians. An ordinarily observant pedestrian may become distracted by adjusting an umbrella or raincoat. Plus raindrops deaden sounds so that auditory clues for measuring car distances become skewed—be extra observant of pedestrians walking in groups or with their dogs.

While most people slow down in the rain, others don't. Always drive defensively and be aware of those around you at all times—you can help prevent accidents by being a careful driver.



Tax season approaches—Prepare for another round of IRS scams

Once again large numbers of people across the nation being targeted by Internal Revenue Service (IRS) telephone scams. Criminals pretending to be IRS agents are calling random telephone numbers throughout the United States trying to harass people into sending pre-paid debit cards to pay fake fines and owed taxes. Scammers generally ask for payment by wire transfer or pre-paid debit cards.

Real IRS agents are once again responding to this rash of criminal activity. According to US Department of Treasury investigators these impersonation scams are widespread and some of the most pervasive in the history of the agency.

If you receive such a call, please remember that the IRS does not call individual taxpayers on the telephone to collect fines or funds owed. The agency sends notices through the mail.

And according to the IRS web site (www.irs.gov): "Remember: The IRS doesn't initiate contact with taxpayers by email to request personal or financial information. This includes any type of electronic communication, such as text messages and social media channels."

If one of the impersonators calls you, he or she will probably begin with the threat of jail and demands of immediate payment to avoid prison time. The scammers' primary goals are to intimidate victims by associating themselves with the IRS and frightening them into sending payment to them via a means of transfer that is not easily traced (prepaid debit or wire transfer). Do not allow yourself to be rushed into taking the wrong action.

To defeat such scams do not allow yourself to be intimidated. Either try to get as much information about the caller or hang up the phone on the fake IRS agent. After you get off the phone with the criminal, call the IRS at 1-800-366-4484 to report the illegal activity.

In addition to the usual scams, a large amount of taxpayer data was stolen from the IRS last year. The perpetrators are likely to use this information to file false tax returns for the victims and attempt to hijack their refunds. Taxpayers should try to be very aware of any irregularities this tax season and immediately report any suspicious activity to the IRS. You can go to the IRS website, *irs.gov*, to report phishing, identity theft or other suspicious messages you receive.

If you are contacted by fake IRS scammers, the IRS web site offers the following advice:

· If you receive an email claiming to be from the IRS that contains a request for personal

information, taxes associated with a large investment, inheritance or lottery.

Then: 1. Don't reply.

2. Don't open any attachments. They can contain malicious code that may infect your computer or mobile phone.

3. Don't click on any links. Visit the identity protection page on the IRS web site if you clicked on links in a suspicious email or website and entered confidential information.

4. Forward the email as-is to the IRS at phishing@irs.gov. Don't forward scanned images because this removes valuable information.

5. Delete the original email.

• If you receive a phone call from someone claiming to be from the IRS but you suspect they are not an IRS employee...

Then 1. Record the employee's name, badge number, call back number and caller ID if available.

2. Call 1-800-366-4484 to determine if the caller is an IRS employee with a legitimate need to contact you.

• If the person calling you is an IRS employee, call them back.

• If not, report the incident to the Treasury Inspector General for Tax Administration (TIGTAwww.treasury.gov/tigta/) and to the IRS at phishing@irs.gov (Subject: 'IRS Phone Scam')

• If you receive a letter, notice or form via paper mail or fax from an individual claiming to be the IRS but you suspect they are not an IRS employee ...

Then go to the IRS home page and search on the letter, notice, or form number. Fraudsters often modify legitimate IRS letters. You can also find information at "Understanding Your Notice or Letter or by searching Forms and Pubs."

If it is legitimate, you'll find instructions on how to respond or complete the form.

Bob Marquis retires again

Bob Marquis has lived nearly half his life at the Villages and spent 26 of those years as a volunteer medical equipment driver for the Villages Medical Auxiliary (VMA).

Recently retired from the VMA, Marquis enjoyed making deliveries. "It makes you feel good knowing that you can still be useful and appreciated" he said. He would deliver a cane, a wheelchair, or other item for residents to borrow. When the resident no longer needed the equipment, he would go and pick it up, delivering it back to the VMA's storage shed. On average, he spent about half an hour a week delivering or picking

up equipment. "I still get calls from residents asking for things," he said with a smile.

Originally, the VMA served Cribari and Montgomery, the only Villages built, but with more villages, came a larger clientele and a wider area to serve. Marquis has seen this growth during his long life at the Villages. When he moved in, there were tiny bushes behind his home that are now full grown oak trees. Never married,



with no children—"that I know of," he chuckled, the retired high school teacher taught business classes for 14 years at James Lick and 16 years at Mt. Pleasant high schools. The state is losing money on him, he said. "Little did they know I



IRS, FTB and AARP certified volunteers will be ready to prepare your 2016 Federal and State income tax returns starting Thursday, February 2, 2017 until Thursday, April 13. This is a free service available to Villages residents. Please note we are not allowed to do returns involving complex real estate or business expenses.

The service is available by appointment only, every Thursday morning from February 2 to April 13, 2017, between the hours of 9 a.m. and 1 p.m. in the Redwood Room at Cribari Center. Appointments may be made by calling the Evergreen Community Center at 408-270-2220.

Please remember to bring all pertinent tax papers, i.e. forms 1099, 1098, W-2, social security income statements, medical and charitable donation receipts, etc. and your last year's tax return. Please arrive 15 minutes before your appointment time so that our greeters can check that you have all the required information.

Note: The Senior Resource Services (SRS) office hours for drop-in assistance are Monday, Wednesday and Friday from 10 a.m. to noon. The purpose of SRS is to provide education and general business and financial information. All assistance is free and confidential. You should ask your professional adviser about your individual situation.

Do you know when your father served in the military? Do you know how many years your mother taught school? Do you remember the name of her school? SRS has an outline to record obituary data. Complete the form for your parents or for yourself. This is one of SRS's most frequently asked for handouts.

In Memoriam and Obituary notices

In Memoriam notices are run free of charge.

Notices include name of deceased, date of birth and date of passing. Brief notices of memorial gatherings may be included with the notice, providing event is held in a Villages facility.

What is Vial of L.I.F.E.?

What is the Vial of L.I.F.E.? The Vial of L.I.F.E. is "Lifesaving Information For Emergencies." It's a place for you to store important medical information that emergency medical personnel (firefighters, paramedics, Public Safety officers and hospital staff) need in a time of crisis. By completing the Vial of L.I.F.E. form, you can provide the emergency personnel with vital lifesaving information even if you are unable. It is very important that you keep this information up to date, accurate and placed in a prominent spot in your refrigerator—an empty or incomplete form does little to help those who need your medical history. By the way, it is also advisable to have completed, up-to-date forms in each of your vehicles to assist EMS in the event of an accident

The Vial of L.I.F.E. kit is available free as a public service from the San Jose Firefighters Union Local 230 and the San Jose Fire Department. It can be obtained by contacting Public Safety, the gate at 223-4665; Public Safety Administration at 239-5246 or San Jose Fire Department Emergency Medical Services Division at 277-4084.



The topics for this year's discussions are: The Future of Europe, Conflict in the South China Sea, Saudi Arabia in Transition, and Prospects for Afghanistan and Pakistan

The educational source of information for the discussions is a "Briefing Book," received in advance. Students are required to study the Briefing Book before discussions begin. This will take about two hours' time.

Each evening of the course there will be a very current 25-minute video program led by experts in foreign policy. Small discussion groups follow, so participants must be able to work cooperatively in a group. After each session students will be balloted online for their opinion and choice of policy options. This is called the "National Opinion Ballot" and a report of the results is sent to the U.S. Department of State.

Three Prayers for the President

FOR YOUR HEALTH

Today the 45th president of the United State was inaugurated. I hope you noticed that my title did not say, "Three *cheers* for the President" - but "three *prayers* for the President." My sermon topic this Sunday will not be about politics, but about praying for our nation and its leaders. Gary Hill will sing, "It's Time to Pray" and the congregation will sing the prayer, "God Bless America."

There is a special kind of prayer that is guaranteed to increase your desire as well as your effectiveness in praying. Jesus taught this kind of praying and the early Church practiced it. Theologians call it "corporate prayer"; I prefer calling it "teamwork." This kind of praying comes in various sizes. The New Testament gives illustrations of groups from two or three gathering together, to as many as 120 the day the Church was born. **Private prayer** is not a true picture of the prayer life of the early Church. Praying with one another — "teamwork praying" is a major Bible teaching without which the church cannot experience the potential power of prayer.

So, imagine me as your coach and you are my aspiring baseball team. (We are obviously going to be a winning team.) So I give you my pep talk and then I hand each of you a ball, a glove and a bat. And I tell you, "Practice hard every day and we'll all get together in three months when we have our first game." So after three months my team gets together and takes the field in the season's opener. We get beat badly! Baseball-just like prayer, is "teamwork"-doing it together. Don't miss this: winning team members keep themselves in shape with personal training, but

Recently, I was reading my Fall edition NCGA Golf and saw an article on Sabrina Igbal, the daughter of our former PGA Shaheen Iqbal. Now here is a rule that applies to all water hazards:

1. If the ball is playable in the water hazard, you are permitted to play the ball as it lies, provided you do not ground your club. Rule 26-1

2. The player may play a ball as near as possible from where the previous stroke was made, under penalty of one stroke. Rule 26-1a

3. The player may drop the ball at a spot behind the hazard that is on a line created by the point where the original ball last crossed the margin of the water hazard and flagstick. Rule 26-1b

TENNIS TALK

OK, so I didn't win the Pulitzer for writing Tennis Talk columns last year. But this is a new year and I feel confident about my improved chances to win one in 2017.

Speaking of 2017, this column wishes everyone a very "Happy New Year!", whether you play tennis or not. However, it has not been happy so far as too few tennis players have found how to play between the raindrops.

For them and all tennis players, there are a couple of court-keeping/public safety announcements to make: First, all rollers used to dry the courts (as much as possible) need to be hung up on the hangers designed for their storage on the outside of the fences. They should not be left inside the courts, alongside the edges of a court for safety reasons. Another reason for hanging them immediately after use is to ensure that the rollers will dry, keeping them as round as possible for future efficiency. Tips from the Pro: Quick Putting Tip...

There are two necessities for successful putting, only twoproper line and proper speed. Which one do you think is most important? If you said "line," you are wrong. The principles of physics dictate that speed affects line and break, so in that regard, speed has to be most important. Also, the premise of golf is to minimize the number of strokes taken, so a miss with proper hole speed is much more efficient than a miss that was close in line but 10 feet short or long. So remember when reading a putt, use your eyes, use you sense of feel and use your past experience...first determine the speed you are going to hit the putt with, then derive your line off that speed.

Some tips to help you practice speed...

Practice putting looking at the hole; Practice hitting six putts from 10 feet, then six putts from 20 feet, then six putts from 30 feet...do not aim at a hole, but rather a distance marker (like the fringe or a golf club on the ground), and try to roll your balls so they all end up in a group close together...make sure the backstroke length increases as you go from 10 to 20 to 30 feet; Practice lag putts with a club laying 2.5 feet behind the hole and try to roll putts between the hole and the club; Try to stop the through stroke as soon as you hear the putter hit the ball...it's been proven over time and through statistics that the putters who let the backstroke determine speed and not a long follow through are the best of the best putters (watch Ben Crenshaw or Dave Stockton putt)...so lengthen your back-stoke and shorten your follow through.

Let us know if any of these tips prove helpful, I think they will. See you at the course!
