on November 24, 1950 and ran for 1,200 performances. The show was instantly considered a classic masterpiece and subtitled "A Musical Fable of Broadway." "Guys and Dolls" has seen numerous revivals on Broadway including shows in 1965, 1977, 1992 and 2009, and it has won 10 Tony Awards throughout its history"



Report on the February 2 Open Meeting with Club **Board President and Villages General Manager**

Because these informational meetings are quarterly, I have fallen into the habit of introducing my notes on them with references to the season and how it influences our mood. So, you should expect me to describe how we came out of hibernation during blustery weather to get some news about what's going on. Old-timers and newcomers braved the gloomy rain showers on February 2 to say how much they appreciated the competence, professionalism, and the achievements of our departing manager, Darren Shaw, and how they wished they could keep him here at the Villages. Darren thanked everyone for their sincere praise, and said, "When you do what I do, after a while you want to do something different. You realize it's time for a change." His new job in Scottsdale will be in a larger, "open-age" golfing community, and it will be different from what he does here.

Club Board President Bill DeVincenzi told us that he had just had lunch with five students from San Jose State who would be working on their class projects with Jerry Neece and the rest of the Board on improving the marketing of The Villages. He said it will be beneficial to get the generations together because we have much to offer each other.

Then we progressed to questions. The first was for Bill: "What are the three most important issues that the Club Board is dealing with right now?" The first one is obvious, finding a new general manager. The second one is getting projects done. Bill had explained in detail at the beginning of the January 31 Board Meeting all the obstacles and hurdles the Board must overcome to get a project started. The solar project had taken a year just to get approval from the city. He summarized those obstacles they are faced with and said that one aspect would be taken care of in the next fiscal budget, hiring "another Tom Muniz". Right now, Tom is juggling about 40 projects, and it's just too much for one person, so they are providing for some help for Tom in the next budget. The Board will let our next manager decide how he wants to handle the new position.

The third important issue the Board is dealing with now is the Fiscal Year 2018 budget. It's a process they're deeply involved in, trying to get the best deal for Villagers. The minimum wage will be going up (about \$150,000), and we'll be giving employees a two-percent raise (about \$100,000). Water, power, and the landscape contract will be going up. There will be some savings (\$30,000 or 40,000 on insurance), but with adding a new position and the expected increases, they now estimate a monthly assessment increase to about \$311 or \$312 for Fiscal Year 18, up from the current \$305. Bill repeated that they have to take into account our demographics: most of us are on fixed incomes; hence the Board must do their best to control the budget increases.

There were several questions about Comcast, and we were reminded that two Comcast Town Halls were scheduled on February 20 at 2:30 and 6:30. It was noted that Comcast has five and a half years left on their contract. Since, in the future, they will be concerned about our renewing that contract, they will be more amenable to providing improvements in service. We once again are considered preferred customers, and we have our own dedicated phone number to call for service (number found on Channel 26). The X1 platform upgrade will be available in March free of charge. Someone joked that his wife still regrets the loss of Turner Classic Movies, and he wished we could get that back.

On the previous Tuesday, following the research the TAC (Technology Advisory Committee) had provided, the Board voted to install cameras at the parking lots adjacent to the Pro Shop/Business Offices. The Board had a choice of an expensive high resolution system, a less expensive lower resolution system that would still give full coverage, and the last choice of doing nothing. The Board had decided on the lower resolution cameras. Someone commented that, since the lower resolution cameras would not be able to distinguish facial features or license plate numbers, the coverage might not be enough. He suggested doing nothing. Our Board President reasoned that, ever since an auto break-in last fall, they felt it was the Board's obligation to make an attempt to get a picture of such an event if it happens again. The color, make, and model of the car could probably be identified, and high resolution pictures are taken of autos when they leave the Villages. Perhaps they could be matched.

The last few questions seemed to be asking for reassurance. Was Darren going to leave employee evaluations before he left? Was he going to give advice on where to look for a new manager, since he has inside knowledge of the field? Yes to both questions. Was the Board going to keep up the work that Darren had started in encouraging employees to continue their education and advance in their professions? Board Member Jerry Neece told about a mentoring program we are starting for our employees and their families, so that we can use our talents as mentors to help them advance. Bill pointed out that that we can't compete with outside business in offering higher wages, but we an offer other perks of appreciation and scholarships for employees and their families

Something New for Members of The Villages Association

As you know, The Villages Association is a common interest development (CID) subject to California Civil Code Sections 4000-6150 (also known as the Davis-Stirling Act). Passed in 2016 and effective in 2017, California Senate Bill ("SB") 918 adds a new Civil Code Section 4041(a). This new section requires all CID owners to annually, and in writing, provide the HOA (The Villages Association), their contact information for sending HOA notices, and to inform the association whether the residence is owner-occupied or rented.

Associations are required to solicit these notices at least 30 days prior to the annual association disclosures. For The Villages Association, that is the Annual Budget Report and Annual Policy Statement sent to all owners in May. If an owner does not annually provide this notification, the association must deem the residence address as the address for notifications. In March, we will include with your monthly statement a form to complete and return that complies with this new law.



Association/Homeowners documents available via e-mail

Per an amendment to California Civil Code, homeowner associations are permitted, with owner's written consent, to distribute annual disclosures, (like the pro forma budget summary) and other specified association documents to owners via electronic mail, facsimile, or other electronic means (such as posting on the association's website) instead of sending those documents out by regular mail or personal delivery. This has the potential to provide cost savings to The Villages. Delivery and postage costs for the Villages' annual distribution of the pro forma budget summary alone are close to \$1,000, not to mention the paper and printing costs that run about \$8,000.

In order to transmit association documents via e-mail or by posting on the homeowners association's website, 1) the homeowners association must first receive the owner's written consent, and 2) the homeowners association sends a separate notice to the owner that the documents have been posted and are available for viewing.

Consent forms for owners to request delivery of documents have been developed for both The Villages Association and Homeowners Corporations. These forms provide an owner's consent to delivery electronically, of documents that are capable, under current laws, of being distributed electronically. Owners have the right to revoke this request and receive "hard copies" of the documents by sending a written revocation signed by the owner, to the applicable corporation.



What does the social services coordinator do?

The Villages Medical Auxiliary (VMA) board members are often asked what the social services coordinator does. This question comes up a lot since the majority of our funding is used to provide health-based programs and professional social service referrals for all Villagers and your families.

The VMA's professional social services coordinator is the person Villagers can turn to for referral services to aid in living independently in your own home. And when the time comes that alternate living arrangements need to be made, the coordinator can also assist family members in managing the situation.

The coordinator manages the VMA's health-based programs. In 2017 alone we have 15 programs scheduled for Villagers and your families, all at no charge. In addition, we have three monthly support groups and two health clinics (blood pressure and flu shots).

Mental health, health care, home management and monitoring services are all inquiries that the coordinator handles on a monthly basis. Public Safety incident reports often result in follow-up by the coordinator to see if additional assistance is needed.

All of these personal contacts are managed with complete privacy and professionalism by our Social Services Coordinator Cristina Silva. Born in Santa Clara Valley, Silva earned her bachelors' and masters' degrees from Santa Clara University in psychology with minors in both religious studies and sociology. Her office hours at the Villages are 9:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. Monday through Thursday. She can be reached at 408-238-4029, or csilva@ncphs.org.

Do you need to file?

During tax season the SRS volunteers are frequently asked this question: I don't have much income; do I need to file a tax return?

For most people, the need to file a return depends on their gross income. Based on your tax filing status and age, you must file a tax return if your gross income equals or exceeds the amount in the chart below. If your income is this amount, a return is required even if you are sure you will have no tax due after deductions such as medical expenses, charitable contributions or home mortgage interest.

For example, if you are single and under age 65, you must file a return if your gross income is \$10,350 or more.

Single and under 65	\$10,350
Single and 65 or older	11,900
Married filing jointly, both spouses under 65	20,700
Married filing jointly, one spouse 65 or older	21,950
Married filing jointly, both spouses 65 or older	23,200
Married filing separately, any age	4,050

If you are married and both of you are at least age 65 and your gross income is \$23,200 or more, you must file a tax return.

Gross income means all income you received in the form of money, goods, property, and services that is not specifically exempt from tax, including any income from sources outside the United States. Do not include social security benefits unless one-half of your social security benefits plus your other gross income and any tax-exempt interest is more than \$25,000 (\$32,000 if married filing jointly).

SRS worked with several Villagers last year who received a notice from the IRS because they did not file a return. These Villagers had sold stock and received a Form 1099B reporting the gross proceeds. They did not file because they knew the stock was sold at a loss. However, without a return the IRS does not know there is a loss after deducting the cost of the stock.

As with all tax law, there are some exceptions to this general rule. For example, if you have more than \$400 in self-employment income such as commission income, you must file a return to pay the self-employed social security tax. Another example is if you received advance payments of the health premium tax credit, you must file a return.

Even if you are not required to file it may be to your advantage to file to get a tax refund. For example, if you have had withholding from your pension, you should file a return to request a refund of the withheld tax. The same is true if you paid estimated tax and you do not owe any tax.

If you are unsure of your need to file a return, SRS suggests you make an appointment for the free preparation of tax returns available in The Villages. A trained volunteer will determine whether a return is necessary. The phone number to call for an appointment at The Villages is the Evergreen Community Center, 408-270-2220. Your appointment will be for a Thursday morning at the Redwood Room in the Cribari Center.

Note: The Senior Resource Services (SRS) office hours for drop-in assistance are Monday, Wednesday and Friday from 10 a.m. to noon. The SRS office is located in the Cribari Center across from the Post Office. You may also leave a message at 408-239-5253. The purpose of SRS is to provide education and general business and financial information. All assistance is free and confidential. You should ask your professional adviser about your individual situation.

Basic tax forms available

SRS has basic federal and California tax forms available for Villagers to pick up. The less frequently used forms will need to be printed from the Internet. Our supply is limited; please only take one copy of each form you need.

You may also order the forms you need by telephone or download them from the government web sites. Federal forms may be ordered by calling 1-800-829-3676 (1-800-Tax-Form) or downloaded from www.irs.gov. California forms may be ordered at 1-800-338-0505. California forms may be downloaded from www.ftb.ca.gov. Detailed instructions for finding forms on the web sites are in the SRS article published January 26.





What is Vial of LJ.F.E.?

What is the Vial of L.I.F.E.? The Vial of L.I.F.E. is "Lifesaving Information For Emergencies.' It's a place for you to store important medical information that emergency medical personnel (firefighters, paramedics, Public Safety officers and hospital staff) need in a time of crisis. By completing the Vial of L.I.F.E. form, you can provide the emergency personnel with vital lifesaving information even if you are unable. It is very important that you keep this information up to date, accurate and placed in a prominent spot in your refrigerator—an empty or incomplete form does little to help those who need your medical history. By the way, it is also advisable to have completed, up-to-date forms in each of your vehicles to assist EMS in the event of an accident

The Vial of L.I.F.E. kit is available free as a public service from the San Jose Firefighters Union Local 230 and the San Jose Fire Department. It can be obtained by contacting Public Safety, the gate at 223-4665; Public Safety Administration at 239-5246 or San Jose Fire Department Emergency Medical Services Division at 277-4084.

Techniques and tips for driving in rain

There will be more rain in the forecast. To follow are a few tips that apply to driving in adverse weather on highways and local streets.

• Allow more travel time. Plan to drive at a slower pace when the roads are wet. Keep in mind that traffic is likely to be moving slower than normal.

• Brake earlier and with less force than you would normally. Not only does this increase the stopping distance between you and the car in front of you, it also lets the driver behind you know that you're slowing down.

• Turn on your headlights, even if it is only spinkling lightly. It helps you see the road and helps other motorists see you. California law requires that when you use your windshield wipers, your headlights must be on.

• Defog your windows. Rain will quickly cause your windshield and windows to fog up. Switch on both front and rear defrosters.

• Watch out for pedestrians. An ordinarily observant pedestrian may become distracted by adjusting an umbrella or raincoat. Raindrops deaden sounds, so that auditory clues for measuring car distances become skewed—be extra observant of pedestrians walking in groups or with their dogs.


Prisons and the wine industry don't have a whole lot in common; unless you're Greg Bergersen & Rick Quesada, that is. These two corrections officers at Valley State Prison in Chowchilla, California (Bergersen is recently retired, Quesada is still active) launched their own line of wines in 2014, aptly named Solitary Cellars Wine Company. The tagline for their wine business is, "Solitary Cellars - Wines Without Restraints." Their wine club is called the Chain Gang, with two levels, Minimum and Maximum Custody. You get the picture.

The tasting room, dubbed the North Block Tasting Room, reflects their shared 45 years in law enforcement and corrections, complete mug shots, a replica jail cell, a box of actual prison "shivs" (makeshift knives) and the duo's endless and colorful prison stories.

Solitary Cellars' wines is produced using grapes from several of California's best wine-growing regions, including Sonoma County, Lodi, the Santa Lucia Highlands, Lake County, Santa Barbara County and, of course, the Central Valley. "When people come in, they're shocked at the quality of the wines," adds Bergersen. "We attribute that to great growers in great growing regions."

The Solitary Cellars current portfolio consists of the 2014 Code Three (a red wine blend) (Lodi); 2012 and 2013 Liberty Oak Tempranillo (Lodi); 2014 Solitary Cellars Albariño Lodi ; 2013 Evasion Syrah Rosé (Fresno); 2012 and 2013 Solitary Cellars "East Block" Old Vine Zinfandel (Lodi); 2013 Santa Lucia Highlands Syrah; 2013 Shenandoah Valley Barbera (Amador); 2013 Monterey Pinot Noir.



"Witness to the Revolution" by Clara Bingham: If you think we are living in a turbulent and uncertain time revisit 1969-1970. The Vietnam war was unpopular and not going well. The dead toll of Americans approached 50,000. There were 9,000 protests and 84 acts of arson or bombings. The ascendant counter culture was challenging nearly every aspect of American society. It might sound familiar even if the players and their politics are very different today. The insights provided in this book may be more relevant than you imagine. Nonfiction, 303.48, United States, social conditions, 1960-80, 2016.

"Swing Time" by Zadie Smith: Two brown girls dream of being dancers. One has talent and makes it to the chorus line, but struggles with adult life. The other has ideas, leaves their old neighborhood behind and travels the world as an assistant to a famous singer and observes close-up how the 1 percent live. She ends up in West Africa where diaspora tourists travel to find their roots and young men risk their lives to escape into a different future. Fiction, 2016.

"Thrice the Brinded Cat Hath Mew'd" by Alan Bradley: A strange title for a mystery novel about a 12-year-old would-be girl detective, Flavia de Luce. A reviewer calls her as addictive as dark chocolate, another calls her a combination of Eloise and Sherlock Holmes. In this novel she is kicked out of a boarding school in Canada, sails home to England and finds her father in the hospital, where she cannot visit him because he has to rest. On an errand for the vicar's wife she discovers a reclusive wood carver, but finds him dead, hanging upside down on his bedroom door. Her investigative juices start flowing, but trouble awaits her. Ye Olde England at its unlikely best? Find out. Mystery, 2016.

"A Terrible Beauty" by Tasha Alexander: Another mystery about the British upper class with too much time on their hands. Lady Emily organizes a trip to Greece. Quickly she immerses herself in tours of ancient ruins and slightly more scandalous endeavors with her dashing husband, Colin. But then a man long believed dead, Lord Philip—Colin's best friend and lady Emily's first husband—shows up at their island village. Will his undying love for Emily drive him to claim what was (is?) his or can they share? This sounds like a plot for a PBS TV show about the antics of English men abroad and at home. Mystery 2016.



Senior Academy: 'Eagles of Alaska and Images of the Amazon' Senior Academy is presenting Joan Sparks on Wednesday,

March 1 from 2 to 4 p.m. at Foothill Center to share her adventures in Alaska and the Peruvian Amazon. This event is free and open to all Villagers.

Joan was invited to photograph bald eagles in Alaska with a team of National Geographic photographers. During the wintertime, two to three thousand eagles congregate on an unfrozen two-mile stretch of the Chilkat River to feed on the salmon. Joan will share her photos and experiences of the Alaskan winter landscape, including images of the Mendenhall Glacier at the ground level up close, and the Lynn Canal fiord via ferry to Haines, Alaska where the eagles nest. You'll learn about the perseverance and skills the eagles have to be able to survive in



such a hostile environment. She will also bring and demonstrate the clothing that she wore in the subzero weather to help prevent hypothermia and frostbite-no easy task when the weather is 22 below zero.

Joan will also show photos of her two-week trek into the Peruvian Amazon, also with National Geographic. The destination was in one of the most remote areas of the jungle. The photo team hiked everywhere, discovered plants, birds and reptiles common to the area. As Joan says, "It was a challenging trip at best, hiking with all the photo gear, trudging through knee high mud, bugs galore-colorful and poisonous-to watch out for, beautiful birds that were candy to your eyes and monkeys constantly chattering." Come join us for this Senior Academy event and see the jungle through Joan's lens-bugs not included!

Joan is a retired national gymnast, international gymnastic judge and college professor. Through the years, she has expanded her photography interest to include landscape, portraiture, flowers and wildlife. In recent years she has shown her photos in The Jennings Pavilion in Atherton, Filoli Gardens in Woodside, Triton Museum in Santa Clara, the Main Street Cafe in Los Altos and the Seymour Marine Discovery Center at the Long Marine Lab in Santa Cruz. Occasionally, I will go for a motorcycle ride with friends to get away from the busy daily challenges of life. There is nothing like the open road with the wind in your face. Some people always focus on the negatives of riding a motorcycle and never experience the power of the throttle in their hands. Even though there are dangers on every road we travel, there is a freedom in riding a motorcycle that I can't explain to the person who has never ridden one.

I've gone on short trips and long trips that have taken me to unfamiliar roads, sights and places. Some roads were easy to ride with long, straight views into the distance, other roads required more caution and skill on the windy and twisty roads. As riders have said, "It's the ride and not the destination."

At some point you will come upon a road that is elevated and curvy not allowing you to see the other side. There are those who have traveled on that road with ease and grace while others ride with fear and extreme caution because of their unfamiliarity.

There are times you can go through challenges that are very similar and you breeze along with ease and confidence because you have been there before. Did you know there are dirty little secrets lurking in our oceans and lakes? I recently read an article, "Ball Retrievers" by Alan Shipnuck about two teenagers from Carmel, CA., who discovered thousands of golf balls polluting the waters off Pebble Beach golf course in 2015. Alex Weber, 16, and Jack Johnston, 16, free dive with mesh collection bags and pick up the balls. "The balls are recovered in various stages by the bagload, and marine life might mistake the string used to manufacture older models for sea grass." Microplastics are also released as golf balls decay and over 600 kinds of sea creatures and birds consume the particles. The teens have collected 9000 balls that are stored in Alex's garage. The teens made a YouTube video of their discovery and made a PowerPoint presentation that they presented to the Pebble Beach Co. and the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, NOAA. As a result, the Pebble Beach Co., the Monterey Bay Aquarium and NOAA are putting together plans to protect the ocean environment. Monterey Bay Aquarium has committed their dive team to underwater cleanups. In our own community, Scott Steele tells me that a company provides cleanup of the Villages' lakes quarterly and a diver fishes the balls out. They charge 10 cents per ball! It is good to know that the lakes won't be polluted. The teen diver, Alex, would like players to print their phone numbers on their balls so she could call and say, "Hey man, that was a crappy shot you hit. Now come retrieve your ball."

I am not putting my phone number or name on balls! I couldn't take the embarrassment.

Rules Corner: This will be an intermittent article when space is available to remind us of some common Rules of Golf. Although I will try to be accurate with my synopsis, it is always recommended to review the Rules of Golf.

Rule 21 is cleaning the ball. You may clean the ball any time you can legally lift it, with three exceptions:

1) To determine if your ball is fit to play (checking for damage),

2) To identify it, or

3) If it is assisting or interfering with play.

For #1 and #2, you may clean only to the extent necessary to determine if the ball is yours and fit to play. For #3, you cannot clean at all. Penalty for breach of Rule 21 is one stroke.

Tips from the Pro: The Hook...Don't Get Caught Playing Hooky

It's not fair to always talk about the slice, although it is the most common miss of the amateur golfer. We must give a fair shake to those who hook the ball. A hook is a golf shot that has right to left sidespin so the shot goes excessively left for a right hander (right for a left hander). The reason for a hook is that the clubface at impact is *closed* (pointed left) relative to the path of the club. There are two main reasons people hit hooks:

1. The grip is too strong or over to the right and underneath the handle creating closed clubface positions from the get go – Check your grip and make sure your hands are neutral... the back of the right hand should point to the target *not* the ground

2. Hanging back through impact casing the body to stop and the hands and arms to continue rotating causing a "flip" of the clubhead and a resultant *closed* clubface at impact – Make sure that you completely rotate and pivot on the downswing...get that right shoulder under your chin and finish up on your right toe.

Good luck and let us know how these tips work if you are a "hooker." See you at the course!





Dealer has 1 or more in losers in Spades, possibly a loser in Hearts, and probably 2 in Diamonds.

Strategy: Try to trump a Spade in dummy before taking out all the trumps.

West leads 10 of Clubs, Jack, Queen, South trumps, switches to the Ace of Hearts, then the King and is happy to see the Hearts are divided evenly. He then plays a Spade, finesses the Queen, East covers with the King, shifts to a Diamond, South, the King, and West wins with the Ace. He leads the Queen of Diamonds, then a Spade, South takes the trick with the Ace, leads another Spade, trumps it on the board. He follows with the King of Clubs, East covers with the Ace, South trumps, then plays a Spade, East takes the trick with the Jack, next leads a Club, South trumps it and claims since has another trump plus the last Spade. Well done. The contract is made exactly. If East had not bid, some players would lead the Queen of Diamonds, top of an interior sequence. This would make South very happy as he would just lose one Diamond trick and be able to make 4 Hearts. Also South has to make a decision concerning playing the Hearts. There is a well-known maxim "Eight ever, nine never." This is called the Guideline of 8, meaning if a player has Ace, King, and Jack of a suit and missing the Queen, the odds favor taking a finesse with 8 or fewer cards in the suit, and with 9 or more cards play the Ace and King hoping the Queen will drop.



The Great Pacific Race is a bi-annual, self-supported rowing race where crews attempt to row from Monterey to Honolulu. 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
