Association/Homeowners documents available via e-mail

Per an amendment to California Civil Code, homeowner associations are permitted, with owner's written consent, to distribute annual disclosures, (like the pro forma budget summary) and other specified association documents to owners via electronic mail, facsimile, or other electronic means (such as posting on the association's website) instead of sending those documents out by regular mail or personal delivery. This has the potential to provide cost savings to The Villages. Delivery and postage costs for the Villages' annual distribution of the pro forma budget summary alone are close to \$1,000, not to mention the paper and printing costs that run about \$8,000.

In order to transmit association documents via e-mail or by posting on the homeowners association's website, 1) the homeowners association must first receive the owner's written consent, and 2) the homeowners association sends a separate notice to the owner that the documents have been posted and are available for viewing. Consent forms for owners to request delivery of documents have been developed for both The Villages Association and Homeowners Corporations. These forms provide an owner's consent to delivery electronically, of documents that are capable, under current laws, of being distributed electronically. Owners have the right to revoke this request and receive "hard copies" of the documents by sending a written revocation signed by the owner, to the applicable corporation. Forms of owner's written consent are available in Business Administration Buildings A and B, and on The Villages web site, http://www.thevillagesgcc.com (Click on *Resident Info* and then Click on *Resource Files*.)

Something New for Members of The Villages Association

As you know, The Villages Association is a common interest development (CID) subject to California Civil Code Sections 4000-6150 (also known as the Davis-Stirling Act). Passed in 2016 and effective in 2017, California Senate Bill ("SB") 918 adds a new Civil Code Section 4041(a). This new section requires all CID owners to annually and in writing provide the HOA (The Villages Association), their contact information for sending HOA notices, and to inform the association whether the residence is owner-occupied or rented.

Associations are required to solicit these notices at least 30 days prior to the annual association disclosures. For The Villages Association, that is the Annual Budget Report and Annual Policy Statement that is sent to all owners in May. If an owner does not annually provide this notification, the association must deem the residence address as the address for notifications. In March, we will include with your monthly statement a form to complete and return that complies with this new law.

The Club governing documents provide that there shall be seven directors, and an election will be held during May and June for two director positions to serve three-year terms. The Club Board is responsible for the management of Club operations. The Club is responsible for all recreational, social, and cultural events in operation at The Villages, maintenance of the streets, the community centers and adjoining swimming pools, the Clubhouse/Pro Shop complex, the two golf courses, and tennis courts.

The Villages Association and Club Boards of Directors met Tuesday, February 28 for their regularly scheduled meetings in the Villages Clubhouse. Numerous items of business were discussed and voted upon.

Association Treasurer's Report

For the month of January 2017

Association Operating Results:

January Revenues: Revenue for January was below budget by \$400 due to less than planned laundry and trash credits offset by third-party assessments.

January Expenditure: Expenses were above budget by \$9,300. Favorable expenses include: Water +\$4,800, Pest Control +\$1,700, Intra-co Transfers + \$1,200, Trash +\$1,100

Unfavorable expenses include: Repair and Maintenance -\$7,800 (roof repairs and interior damage, Fairways and Montgomery), Electricity +\$5,600, Planting +\$3,700 (timing) Net negative budget variance for the month was \$9,700.

YTD Revenue: Revenue YTD (seven months of operation) are above budget by \$1,000 due mostly to third-party assessments.

YTD Expenses: Association expenses YTD are \$237,000 favorable to budget. Favorable performers are: Water, \$126,000 below budget; Planting, \$52,000 below budget—primarily due to timing; Irrigation Maintenance - \$43,800 (timing); Repair and Maintenance - \$18,500; Pest Control - \$10,600; Intra-co. transfers, \$8,600; Trash Expense -\$7,700.

Unfavorable expenses were: Electricity - \$13,900 (rate hike); Chemicals - \$6,100 (water feature treatment); Operating expenses -\$5,000; Insurance -\$4,600 (third-party policy review) YTD net positive budget variance is \$238,200.

As of February 21, there was \$20,820 in resident/member accounts receivable more than 60 days late. This is a new record and is down \$3,942 from the prior month). Well done staff!

Association Replacement Reserve Plan

Year-to-date expenditure of the reserves total \$3,739,000, which is 45 percent of the budget. Principal expenditures this month include: Irrigation Coverage -\$122,000 (Cribari, Hermosa, Highlands, Del Largo & Olivas); Roofs in Hermosa \$56,000; Building Components \$40,000; Landscaping, Verano and Del Lago, \$38,000 The Reserve Portfolio balance as of January 31, 2017 was \$11,645,000. The average interest rate on this investment has increased to 1.54 percent.

Club Financial Report

Operating Financial Commentary for the month of January 2017 January Operating Statement Review

For the month of January, total revenue was \$45,800 unfavorable to budget, 4.9 percent lower than the budget of \$940,200. Traditionally, January is slower for the golf course and restaurant and this year was no exception. Rainy weather on 20 days of the month severely impacted golf play (green fee revenue of \$50,600 vs. budget of \$81,400). Food and bar sales combined for an unfavorable to budget posting of \$20,900 or 12 percent less than the budget of \$177,900. The Bistro exceeded budgeted sales, yet banquets and the restaurant didn't fare as well. Revenue from resident activities also performed significantly below budget for the month at -\$13,000 (with an offset on the expense side). Notable favorable to budget revenue categories were advertising income +\$6,400, other income +\$5,100 (Business Office income and gain on sales of golf course tractors), lessons/classes +\$4,800, billable services +\$2,100 and Pro Shop merchandise sales +\$1,800.

Total expenditures were \$61,900 favorable to budget, 6.4 percent less than the budget of \$961,700. Water expense on the golf course was the primary driver, performing favorably to budget by +\$25,800. Other significant favorable to budget expense categories were employee expense +\$20,300 (3.3 percent less than the budget of \$613,700), resident activities +\$8,500, total landscape +\$5,100, food/ bar cost of sales \$5,200 and repair and maintenance +\$3,500. Notable expense categories unfavorable to budget were postage and delivery -\$2,000 (timing of the directory delivery) and utilities -\$10,600 (excluding water - gas, electricity, telephone and trash). The net positive operating budget variance for the month was +\$16,100. See table below.

Year-to-date revenue is \$75,000 favorable to budget, 1.0 percent higher than the budget of \$7,213,000. Year-to-date expenditures are \$80,000 favorable to the budget of \$7,201,000 (1.1 percent). For G&A, the expense categories of legal fees, professional fees and employee expense have all been less than planned, helping to generate a \$32,000 positive net variance. Community Activities has generated a \$23,000 positive net variance due to favorable resident activities revenue and advertising income. Revenue was on budget at \$3,051 (non-Estates single family homes). Expenditures for the month were \$1,000 unfavorable to budget (legal fees for additional work on the governing document rewrite). The year-to-date net negative operating budget variance is \$601.

Estates revenue tracked budget for the month at \$11,837. Expenditures were \$2,657 favorable to budget, 29.5 percent less than the budget of \$9,012. The main driver was favorable water expense +\$2,442. Other significant favorable expense categories were electricity +\$466 and irrigation maintenance +\$100. The only notable unfavorable expense category for the month was legal fees -\$494 for additional work on the governing document rewrite.

Year-to-date, water expense is unfavorable to budget -\$4,031 (water feature leak) while total landscape +\$5,562 (timing) and electricity expense +\$2,084 are favorable to budget. The year-to-date net positive operating budget variance is \$4,104.

Prisons and the wine industry don't have a whole lot in common; unless you're Greg Bergersen & Rick Quesada, that is. These two corrections officers at Valley State Prison in Chowchilla, California (Bergersen is recently retired, Quesada is still active) launched their own line of wines in 2014, aptly named Solitary Cellars Wine Company. The tagline for their wine business is, "Solitary Cellars - Wines Without Restraints." Their wine club is called the Chain Gang, with two levels, Minimum and Maximum Custody. You get the picture.

The tasting room, dubbed the North Block Tasting Room, reflects their shared 45 years in law enforcement and corrections, complete mug shots, a replica jail cell, a box of actual prison "shivs" (makeshift knives) and the duo's endless and colorful prison stories.

Solitary Cellars' wines is produced using grapes from several of California's best wine-growing regions, including Sonoma County, Lodi, the Santa Lucia Highlands, Lake County, Santa Barbara County and, of course, the Central Valley. "When people come in, they're shocked at the quality of the wines," adds Bergersen. "We attribute that to great growers in great growing regions."

The Solitary Cellars current portfolio consists of the 2014 Code Three (a red wine blend) (Lodi); 2012 and 2013 Liberty Oak Tempranillo (Lodi); 2014 Solitary Cellars Albariño Lodi; 2013 Evasion Syrah Rosé (Fresno); 2012 and 2013 Solitary Cellars "East Block" Old Vine Zinfandel (Lodi); 2013 Santa Lucia Highlands Syrah; 2013 Shenandoah Valley Barbera (Amador); 2013 Monterey Pinot Noir.



Measure H parcel tax exemption filing March 31; May 5

On March 31 and May 5, you may file for exemption from the annual \$100 Evergreen School District parcel tax on your principal residence if you are at least age 65 or will be age 65 by June 30, 2018. If there are joint owners of your principal residence, only one owner needs to be age 65.

If you had the exemption from the parcel tax for 2016/2017, you received an exemption renewal notice from the School District in early February 2017. You likely renewed your exemption by mail using the School District's return envelope. If so, there is nothing more you need to do. The event on March 31 and May 5 is for new exemption requests.

If you would like to apply for the exemption for the 2017/2018 tax year, the School District is making it easy for you. Evergreen School District representatives will be at The Villages on Friday, March 31 (Cribari Conference Room) and Friday, May 5 (Cribari Forum Room) from 1:30 to 4 p.m. to approve your parcel tax exemption request form.

You must file for the exemption in person with documents to prove (1) your property ownership, (2) your residency, and (3) your age.

Your 2016/2017 property tax statement will prove your ownership. Your driver's license or CA identification card will prove your residency and age. Your documents will be reviewed and immediately returned to you.

If you are new to The Villages and the address on your driver's license does not match your property tax statement,

please also bring your PG&E bill to prove your residency. If you do not yet have a property tax statement, bring your escrow purchase statement and related papers.

The exemption form is current available at the SRS office if you would like to complete it before you arrive. The one page form is also available at www.eesd.org; select Community and scroll down under I WANT TO download the senior exemption form. If you download the form, please print and complete two forms or else make a copy of your completed form. Don't worry if you don't do this in advance; forms will be available on site.

You may also apply for the exemption at the School District Office at 3188 Quimby Road, Monday - Friday from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. through May 31, 2017. If you cannot get to the Cribari Center or the District Office, please call Pearl Casey of the District at 408-270-6863 to make personal arrangements.

Note: The Senior Resource Services (SRS) office hours for drop-in assistance are Monday, Wednesday and Friday from 10 a.m. to noon. The SRS office is located in the Cribari Center across from the Post Office. You may also leave a message at 408-239-5253. Fall Prevention and Pain Management Workshop

Yearly, one in every three adults ages 65 or older falls and two million are treated in emergency departments for fall-related injuries. Thankfully, falls are not an inevitable part of aging. In fact, many falls can be prevented. We can take action to protect ourselves.

The most common method for relieving pain is medication. Some medicines-or combinations of medicines-can have side effects such as dizziness or drowsiness. This can make falling more likely. Is medication the best way to manage our pain?

Attend the Fall Prevention Pain Management Workshop for a discussion on the impact of falls on the elderly, contributing factors for falls, and fall prevention and intervention programs. The pain management portion of the workshop includes a discussion on how important effective pain management is for older adults, methods for assessing and managing pain both pharmacological and non-pharmacological, and pain management strategies.

The workshop presenters are medical professionals from "With Grace," a local Hospice and Palliative Care organization.

After graduating with mechanical engineering degrees from the University of Minnesota and

Stanford, Jim worked at SRI International for 45 years where he performed research on the effects of explosions on structures. After retirement from SRI, he joined the Palo Alto Camera Club where he has learned advanced photography skills that he has used to capture the people and culture of other countries including Viet Nam, Cambodia, Laos, Myanmar, Guatemala, Argentina, Chile and Cuba.

In February of 2015, he was a visiting artist to Cuba. As such, he had none of the usual restrictions tourists have on where he could go and whom he could talk to. He quickly gravitated to learning how average Cubans have lived under the Castro regime. He is still processing what he learned about the disadvantages, as well as some advantages, of being a Cuban citizen. 





Third & Last Publication--Proposed By-Laws Amendment: The Executive Committee proposes to amend the Bylaws as follows:

ARTICLE II. MEMBERSHIP

Section A. Permanent resident men having a Villages handicap from the Northern California Golf Association are eligible to be members of the Villages Men's Golf Club. Membership shall be terminated by resignation, loss of handicap, or by termination of Villages residency.

Section B. Permanent resident men who wish to support the Men's Golf Club, but no longer play golf are eligible to be Associate members of the Men's Golf Club. Associate members will pay the same dues as members, but do not have to have a handicap, nor pay NCGA dues. Associate members are eligible for all activities of the Men's Club except golf events and the Hole-in-One Insurance program. Associate membership shall be terminated by resignation or by termination of Villages residency.


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BOCCE BEAT

Living on McCarty Ranch Drive (for 25 years) is a couple named Dolores Escobar Hamilton and Glen Hamilton. Both are extremely accomplished people. Dolores is a former Dean of the College of Education at San Jose State University from 1988-1998, while Glenn earned his (Ph.D.) in Meteorology at the University of Stockholm. He was a Naval Aviator, researcher, author, and retired at the rank of Captain. Following 26 years in the U.S. Navy, he worked for NASA in Marine Meteorology.



Both have enjoyed the many activities at the Villages. For

example, Glenn was on the Villages Rules Committee for four years. He was President of Tennis Club in 1997. He also oversaw the building of the viewing stand. Glenn has been active in the SIRS 114 club. He was also an 18 hole golfer,

Dolores was President of the Tennis Club in 2010. She played USTA and interclub. Dolores chaired the Senior Academy Executive Board for six years, where she reinstated its 501(c)(3) tax status and established the first partnership with the Osher Institute of Life-long Learning. Her leadership provided the foundation for the club to grow from 30 members to over 400 today.

Dolores holds Professor Emeritus status at San Jose. She has taught at the elementary school level, as well as having been a university professor for more than 20 years. During her tenure as Dean, she administered an annual budget of over \$5 million dollars to support professional preparation programs; she supervised a staff of 150 personnel.

While Dolores has published professional books, this year she co-authored a children's book, "The Awesome Miss Seeds," a biography of her mentor, a courageous woman who overcame her disabilities to become a leader in education.

In their twilight years Dolores and Glenn enjoy the support and friendship of Villagers as roles have changed from one of equal partners to one of caregiver and her devoted husband.



Tips from the Pro:

Solid Iron Striking: One of the most frustrating things in golf is nailing a drive long and down the middle and then following it with a lousy iron shot. The art of striking an iron in golf is one that has perplexed many a golfer over the years. Here are a few tips to help with that iron approach: Lean that shaft left! Every solid iron striker has this attribute-forward shaft lean. Most good ball strikers start the swing with a forward press of the hands. But more importantly at impact, the shaft leans forward. This creates, at impact, a trapping of the ball; in effect hitting down on the ball. This compresses the ball allowing it to roll backwards up the clubface creating backspin and loft. Keep your head still! Staying connected to the ball is key to solid ball striking. Moving the head vertically or laterally will change the bottom point of the swing arc creating miss-hits. *Move the Ball Back!* Most amateur golfers play the ball too far forward. Make sure that the ball is played under your sternum for most iron shots. And for those short irons (9-iron and all wedges), play the ball just in back of your sternum. This will allow you to strike the ball first more often and not scrape the ground in front of the ball.

West leads the 6 of Spades, South covers with the Queen on the board, switches to a Heart, and finesses the Queen in his hand, He then plays the Jack of Clubs, West ducks and South feels lucky and repeats the finesse in Clubs and wins with the 10 on the board, and then leads a Heart to the Ace in his hand. He continues with another Heart, East wins with the King, shifts to a Spade, South covers with the 10, and West takes the trick with the King. He plays the Jack of Diamonds, East, the 7, and South ducks, too. West continues with his last Diamond, East wins with the Ace, switches to a Spade, South, the Ace, proceeds with the King of Diamonds, then plays the 7 of Clubs to the King on the board, and leads the last card, the good Jack of Hearts. Great. The contract is made exactly. South has to be careful how he plays the hand and needs to hold up his Ace of Spades and try to have West lead the Diamonds.
