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VAT: 'Guys & Dolls'—ticket buying alternatives

"Guys & Dolls" is just one week away and will brighten your Spring! If you love musicals you will love the songs of this multiple Tony-award winning musical comedy.

There will be one evening performance at 7:30 p.m. on Friday, March 31, and two matinees at 2:30 p.m. on Saturday, April 1, and Sunday, April 2. All performances are in the Cribari Auditorium.

Reserved seat tickets are \$15 each and will go on sale tomorrow, Saturday March 25 from 10 a.m. to noon at the Cribari Center Redwood and Terrace Rooms. Can't be there tomorrow? Don't worry—see below.

To ensure fairness, each member of the Villages public buying tickets will go through this process: 1. Get a number chit. 2. When your chit number is called, proceed to the Ticket Sales Area, where you can buy up to a maximum of six tickets for each performance. 3. If you need more tickets, repeat steps 1 and 2 above. There are *no* refunds or exchanges for any tickets purchased. **Please note**: Number chits will be passed out starting at 9 a.m. Ticket buyers may queue or create a sign-in sheet before 9 a.m. but they must be present at 9 a.m. to receive a number chit. Ticket sales will begin promptly at 10 a.m.

Once the Cribari ticket sales have closed, remaining tickets can be purchased from Sunday, March 26 through Thursday, March 30, either via phone at 408-228-3246 or by emailing tickets@the-vat.org. Any remaining tickets will also be sold before each performance. There is no limit to the number of tickets that can be ordered via phone or email.

When ordering tickets via phone or email, please provide your first and last name, house number, number of tickets desired, and at which performance(s). Also, please let us know if anyone has a walker, wheelchair, or other mobility issues, as this impacts seat location. You will receive a call or email confirming your ticket purchase. Tickets will be at the Will Call table in the Cribari Center Lobby 30 minutes before the performance starts.

Don't miss "Guys & Dolls!" It looks like a "sellout" so don't delay getting tickets!

'Hamilton' ticket lottery for May 31 show

Here's another chance for Hamilton tickets! We have tickets for Wednesday, May 31, 2 p.m. at the Orpheum Theatre. Coach will leave at 11:30 a.m. Bus and dinner are included in the price of \$300 per person.

Lottery forms will be available for pickup in Building B from Ruth DePonzi beginning Monday, March 27 after 8:30 a.m., or you may download the lottery form from Fast-Lane on March 24. Fill out the lottery form with *all* information; put in an envelope marked "Hamilton lottery" and drop in Ballot Box (Lottery) located in Building B by cut-off date Friday, April 7.

The public drawing will be held Tuesday, April 11, in the Cribari Auditorium at 3 p.m. You *must* be present if your lottery envelope is pulled and your name is called or another name will be called. Envelopes will be drawn by an impartial resident. If duplicate lotteries are entered you will be disqualified. Bring your resident ID card to show the person doing the registration.

For this trip you will be able to get *two* tickets per household. Dinner will be at the Pompei Grotto with entrée choices of Dungeness Crab Louie Salad, Pan Seared Salmon or New York Steak. Dinner comes with appetizers of Bruschetta and Calamari, choice of New England Clam Chowder or Mixed Green Salad with Balsamic Vinaigrette, also choice of house wine or draft beer, coffee or tea and dessert!

SENIOR RESOURCE SERVICES

Whatever happened to that old 401(k)?

As people jump from job to job, they are leaving more 401(k)-style accounts and pension benefits with employers. Unfortunately, some people lose track of their money.

Are you one of the people who might have lost track of an account or a benefit? If so, what can you do? The first step is to find your old employer and send a letter or email requesting information about your retirement benefit. If the company no longer exists or you just can't find it, below are three free resources available to help find a lost retirement account:

1. Pension Counseling Projects: www.pensionrights/org/find-help

Operated by several nonprofit organizations these nonprofits help callers located unclaimed retirement benefits.

2. Labor Department, Employee Benefits Security Administration's Participant and Compliance Outreach, Education and Assistance Program: www.askebsa.dol.gov or 1-866-444-3272 Offers help online, over the phone and in field offices.

3. Pension Benefit Guaranty Corp.: www.PBGC.gov 1-800-400-7242

This government agency offers telephone assistance and publishes "Finding a Lost Pension." It maintains a database of participants in underfunded pension plans that the agency has taken over and whom it cannot locate, as well as participants in terminated pension plans whose employers could not locate them.

Finding a lost 401(k) account can get tricky if the balance in the account is \$5,000 or less. Federal law allows plans to transfer these small balances to individual retirement accounts at a financial services firm without the missing participant's consent.

You can call or search the online databases of companies that accept transfers of small balances from 401(k) plans. They include Millennium Trust Co., PenChecks Trust, Inspira and Retirement Clearinghouse LLC. All this will take time, but you are the winner if you find your lost account.

Note: The Senior Resource Services (SRS) office hours for drop-in assistance are Monday, Wednesday and Friday from 10 a.m. to noon. The SRS office is located in the Cribari Center across from the Post Office. You may also leave a message at 408-239-5253. The purpose of SRS is to provide education and general business and financial information. All assistance is free and confidential. You should ask your professional adviser about your individual situation.

March 31 Evergreen tax exemption filing

If you do not have an exemption from the annual \$100 Evergreen School District parcel tax, you may file for the exemption in the Cribari Conference Room on Friday, March 31 from 1:30 to 4 p.m. Complete information about the exemption was in the March 2 Villager; The Villager is available online at http://eedition.thevillagesgcc.com if you can't find your copy. You need to bring your property tax bill and your driver's license or other identification proving your age.

If you have the exemption already but cannot remember whether you mailed your renewal form, the School District will have a list to check your exemption status.

Something New for Members of The Villages Association

As you know, The Villages Association is a common interest development (CID) subject to California Civil Code Sections 4000-6150 (also known as the Davis-Stirling Act). Passed in 2016 and effective in 2017, California Senate Bill ("SB") 918 adds a new Civil Code Section 4041(a). This new section requires all CID owners to annually and in writing provide the HOA (The Villages Association), their contact information for sending HOA notices, and to inform the association whether the residence is owner-occupied or rented.

Associations are required to solicit these notices at least 30 days prior to the annual association disclosures. For The Villages Association, that is the Annual Budget Report and Annual Policy Statement that is sent to all owners in May. If an owner does not annually provide this notification, the association must deem the residence address as the address for notifications. In March, we included with your monthly statement a form to complete and return that complies with this new law.

5. Should I bring my old equipment?

A: No. Please leave all old equipment at home.

6. What is the purpose of this event?

What if I don't want to schedule an appointment and I want to install it myself?

A: We will have Self-Install Kits available, too, for you during our events, or you can visit your local Xfinity Store and swap out your old equipment there. Please note you will only be able to do a Self-Install Kit for your Internet services. All X1 boxes will be installed by a tech.

Notice of Proposed Changes to Villages Association Policies—103 Board and Member Meetings

The following proposed changes to The Villages Association Board of Directors Policies were approved by the Association Board of Directors at its February 28, 2017, monthly meeting for a 30-day member comment period before formal approval consideration. The Board will consider oral and written comments regarding the proposed changes at the March 14 study session before coming back to the Board for formal consideration at the April 11 study session or the formal Board meeting on April 25.

Response to the proposed policy changes may be made by one or more of the following methods: 1) Participation in the discussion of the proposed changes at the Association Board of Directors study session, or 2) via written comments delivered to the Board through the Association Operations Manager Maria Shaw's (mshaw@the-villages.com) office.

The purposes of the proposed changes are administrative in nature, and others conform policy to practice.

Deletions are noted in strikethrough font, additions are underlined.

APr 103-01 Board and Member Meetings

BOARD MEETING PROCEDURE

Board Meetings

All villa owners (resident or non-resident), individuals renting villas, invited guests and management personnel may attend meetings of the Board of Directors of the Corporation, except when the Board adjourns to Executive Session to consider litigation, matters relating to the formation of contracts with third parties, member discipline, or personnel matters.

The following are <u>not</u> considered Board meetings:

- Individual contacts or conversations by a Board member with any other person.
- Attendance of a majority of the Board at a purely social or ceremonial event provided the majority of the Board does not discuss among them selves specific business within the Board's jurisdiction of business.
- Attendance of a majority of the Board members at an open and noticed meeting of a "standing committee" of that body provided that the Board members who are not members of the standing committee attend only as observers.

Attendance at Board meetings is subject to acceptable conduct. Anyone who intentionally interferes with or otherwise disrupts the Board's conduct of the meeting will be requested to vacate the meeting room. Refusal to vacate when requested may result in disciplinary action, as defined in the Association's Rules. When deemed necessary to maintain order, the Board may request intervention by Public Safety. **Meeting Notice**

Except in the case of an emergency meeting or Executive Session meeting, notice of the time and place of a Board meeting including agenda items will shall be posted at Cribari Center and via Fastlane at least four (4) days in advance of the meeting and may also be posted on Channel 26 community television, via Fastlane at least four (4) days in advance of the meeting and, if time permits, notice will also be published in The Villager.

Regular monthly Board meetings are held on the last Tuesday of the month. Exceptions to the meeting schedule are sometimes approved by the Board to avoid conflicts with holidays and scheduled events.

Combining the November and December monthly meetings to a single meeting in <u>December</u> is one exception. A second possible exception is to move the date of the April meeting to early May to accommodate the budget development process.

Special Board meetings may be called by or at the request of the President or any two (2) Directors. Notice of special meetings shall be given to the Directors at least four (4) days prior to the meeting date, unless the notice requirement is waived by the Directors, which would constitute and emergency situation. Notice of the time and place of a Board meeting including agenda items will shall be posted at Cribari Center and via Fastlane at least four (4) days in advance of the meeting and may also be posted on Channel 26 community television, via Fastlane at least four (4) days in advance of the meeting and, if time permits, notice will also be published in The Villager. An emergency meeting of the Board may be called by the President, or by any two members of the Board other than the President, if there are circumstances that could not have been reasonably foreseen which require immediate attention and possible action by the Board, and which of necessity make it impracticable to provide advance notice to the members.

Meeting Agenda

The Board meeting agenda identifies matters to be reported to, discussed by, and acted on by the Board at its meeting. A draft agenda is normally prepared by the President no later than 5:00 p.m. on the Friday prior to the meeting. Directors and the General Manager may submit items to be included on the agenda. A request supported by at least two other Directors may not be refused by the President.

Except for emergency situations as described above, the agenda is not subject

to addition or change once the meeting is called to order. If a topic is important enough for Board consideration, it is important enough that the Board have full knowledge and understanding prior to formal discussion.

The agenda functions as a tool to move along discussion of the issues and actions. The meeting agenda will contain the following:

Time and Place

Time, date and location of the meeting.

Call to Order

The President or other presiding officer (Chair) will call the meeting to order. Once called to order, the meeting will be conducted in accordance with accepted parliamentary procedure. *Robert's Rules of Order* will be used as a parliamentary guide.

Roll Call

Director's names are called to verify attendance and the presence of a quorum as defined in The Villages Association Amended Bylaws, Article 7.11.

President's Report

The President may provide a summary report of Board activities, including any special, Executive Session, or emergency meetings held since the last regular monthly meeting. The President may also use the report as an opportunity to inform the Directors and audience about matters of special interest to the community.

Treasurer's Report

The Treasurer will provide a summary report of the Corporation's general financial performance and status for the period since the last report and year-to-date. The report may be supplemented by management reports of specific financial and business activities. **General Manager's Report**

The General Manager will provide a summary report of management activities during the period since the last report and other matters of interest to the Board and membership. **Committee Reports**

Committee Chairmen or their designees will provide summary reports of their activities as requested by the Chair.

Open Communication

An opportunity will be provided for audience members to address the Board on any Association-related matter. The time allotted to each speaker will be determined by the Chair. The Chair has sole discretion to permit response to questions and opinions.

Consent Agenda

Items such as prior meeting minutes and committee reports will be submitted for Board consent approval; for example, "Consent to approve minutes and committee reports as submitted." A consent agenda alleviates the need for a verbal report on routine administrative items. The Board may remove an item from the consent agenda for purposes of separate discussion or action. However, the Chair will not normally invite audience comment on the item.

Unfinished Business

Unfinished Business is the consideration of those items purposely deferred by the Board from one meeting to another. Reports to the Board will include prior agenda submittals and any pertinent information received since the Board's last consideration. At the Chair's discretion, time will be allotted for comment from the audience on each agenda item considered by the Board. The Chair has sole discretion to permit Director response to questions or opinions presented by the audience. However, the Chair will not normally invite audience comment on the item.

The names of makers of motions and seconders shall be recorded in the Minutes of the meeting The motion shall be read by the Recording Secretary immediately prior to the Board vote.

New Business

New Business is the consideration of those items presented for the first time. Each listed item will include a description to clarify the action or motion sought.

The names of makers of motions and seconders shall be recorded in the Minutes of the meeting. The motion shall be read by the Recording Secretary immediately prior to the Board vote.

It shall be the practice of the Board to delay decision on New Business items until at least the next regular monthly meeting to allow opportunity for Director study and member comment. Exception to the practice may be made at the discretion of the Board for contracts, committee appointments, and other matters where timeliness is a factor.

The Chair may allow Director discussion and questioning of the presenter upon first presentation of a New Business item. However, the Chair will not normally invite audience comment on the item.

Notice of scheduled Board meetings and other events of note.

FROM THE BOOKSHELF

"Strangers in Their Own Land" by Arlie Russell Hochschild: This study goes beyond the commonplace liberal idea that many on the political right have been duped in voting against their own economic self interest. In the "red" America she explores, Hochschild discovers powerful feelings—fear of economic decline and cultural eclipse, a deep resentment of the scorn of coastal liberals and a perceived betrayal by the federal government. This helps explain the emotional appeal of President Trump. This results in a remarkable portrait of America's deep political divide and leads to profound thoughts about a way forward for us all. Nonfiction, 303 social processes, 2016.

"News of the World" by Paulette Jiles: A historical novel about Texas in the aftermath of the civil war. Captain Kyle is all but destitute after the war and drifts through northern Texas, performing live readings from newspapers to paying audiences hungry for news of the world. At a stop in Wichita Falls he is offered \$50 to deliver a young orphan to relatives in San Antonio. Four years earlier she was captured by a roving band of Kiowa Indians. The child does not speak English anymore and refuses to get "civilized." On their 400-mile journey through unsettled territory the two lonely survivors forge a bond that marks the difference between live and death, but what will happen once they arrive in san Antonio? Fiction 2016.

"A Brief History of Creation" by Bill Mesler and H. James Cleaves II: This study provides an essential and illuminating history of western biological science, tracing the triumphs of iconoclastic scientists, who have sought to uncover the mystery of how life first came to be on this earth. The narrative culminates in an analysis of models for life's genesis such as its origin around deep sea hydrothermal vents or even extraterrestrial origins. The origin of life may remain unclear and impossible to prove, but once life started there was no stopping it, although species come and go, maybe even our own in some hopefully distant future. Nonfiction, 576.8, Genetics and evolution, 2016.

"The Sleeping Beauty Killer" by Mary Higgins Clark and Alafair Burke: After 36 suspense novels Mary H. C. is still going strong, this time not supported by her daughter Carol, but Ms. Burke, a former prosecutor and teacher of criminal law, with a side line of writing novels. The present case involves Casey Carter, who 15 years ago was accused and convicted of murdering a famous philanthropist. Now, after serving her 15 year sentence, she persuades Laurie and her under suspicion team to re-investigate her conviction and clear her name. Powerful interests oppose this move, but Laurie must face this and more to do what she thinks is right and give Casey a chance to prove she is innocent. Mystery 2016.




considered holding the event at La Scala in Milan or Portofino on the Italian Riviera, but the bus fare became exorbitant, so we chose Cribari Auditorium.



The purpose of the study session is to allow a topic to be studied by the Board in open session, prior to a formal decision being made at the monthly board meeting. Formal Board decisions will not normally be made at the study session, unless timing is such that a decision must be made. Rather, agenda items the Board deems appropriate will be brought back to the formal board meeting for consideration.

The President of the Board at his/her discretion shall conduct the meeting, dispensing with the normal formalities of the board meeting following the order of the agenda, which was published four days in advance of the study session. The President at his/her discretion may limit resident participation during the discussion of agenda items.

An opportunity will be provided for audience members to address the Board on any Association-related matter. The time allotted to each speaker will be determined by the Chair. The Chair has sole discretion to permit response to questions and opinions.

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

PICKLEBALL

Calling all Pickleball Players! Wow! The Pickleball Club is delighted to see the increase in new membership and players attending Drop-In Pickleball. Due to popular demand, Mike Walias will have a special session every Wednesday and Friday; 1 to 1:30 p.m. for beginners only, on courts 5 and 6. From 1:30 to 3 p.m., our regular Drop-In for all players will be held. Mike will assist in forming groups and giving tips to players.



If you aren't sure of all the rules, here is some basic information to get you started! The court is badminton sized, but with a low net, like tennis. Blue tape outlines the shape, enabling both tennis and pickleball to be played on the same court. The result is three "boxes" on each side of the net. The one closer to the net, is called the "Kitchen" or "Non-Volley Zone," the two further back are the service areas.

Here at the Villages, almost all games played are doubles, involving four players. The rules are a little different than other court games, but the basics are summarized below. The diagram of the court shows how players are set up to play.

Start of Game – Player one serves the ball. Serving is done underhand, and the ball must contact the paddle below the players' waist. The server stands behind their back service line, and the ball must bounce in player fours service area. If the ball lands in the "kitchen", that players turn immediately ends.

Return of Ball – When player four returns the ball, they can hit it to either side of the opposite court, but must first allow it to bounce once. Before player one or two can hit it back, they must let the ball bounce once as well. After the two initial volleys, the ball is no longer required to bounce before being hit.

Continuation of game – After the initial two hits, players have the option of hitting the ball on the fly (volleying) or letting it bounce once. The point continues until one side misses – either hitting the ball into the net or landing outside the court.

The Kitchen – Players can never step into the "Kitchen" area and volley a ball. The only time a player can step in the kitchen is if the ball bounces first – and then they should step out. This is a common error to make, so be careful!

TENNIS TALK

This week's tennis talk topic is "Foot Faults". But do gentlemen call foot faults? Really! We have no official to call on or a friend of the court available when we play socially, so we need to pay attention to these ourselves. Many of us play USTA matches also. Here is what the USTA rules [The Code] say:

"It is a foot fault when a foot just touches the line, even when the player does not follow the serve to the net

24. Calling foot faults. The receiver or the receiver's partner may call foot faults only after all reasonable efforts, such as warning the server and attempting to get an official to the court, have failed and the foot fault is so flagrant as to be clearly perceptible from the receiver's side.

25. Service calls in doubles. In doubles the receiver's partner should call the service line, and the receiver should call the sideline and the center service line. Nonetheless, either partner may call a ball that either clearly sees."

Do you know how far you carry each one of your woods and irons in the air? If not, you should! This information is essential when playing golf, and especially at The Villages. Why? Because we have many forced carries on our golf course. Forced carries are shots that force you to carry your ball over an obstacle. Because we have many sand bunkers as well as well-placed lakes and streams; knowing how far you keep your ball in the air is important to course strategy and ultimately scoring. When you practice at the range, make notes as to how far you carry each club in your bag. Then refer to those notes when playing. Our range is marked very well with yardage signs. We are also in the process of securing a Launch Monitor that will give you your carry yardage for each club you hit by measuring your club speed, ball speed and spin rate. We will assist you any time with figuring out your yardages! Just let us know...See you at the course!

Turf Rejuvenation Program commences

At the October 25, 2016 Association board meeting, the directors voted to move forward with a community wide turf rejuvenation program at a cost of \$198,383. The work entails slit-seeding (a planting process) roughly 30 acres of common area with Tall Fescue grass. This work is the second part of a two-part project intended to fill in community turf areas that have either died, or have become infested with noxious grasses or weeds over time due to the most recent drought period.

The first part of the project was approved on February 23, 2016, when the Association Board voted to address areas of the community's turf that were not properly irrigated, due to system inefficiencies. The cost of the work was \$272,000. These turf areas were easy to identify after five years of drought conditions. Working through 2016, BrightView Landscape implemented irrigation coverage improvements in each of the 12 districts. Now that all the work is complete, the timing is right to seed these areas.

The first step in the preparation process for a slit-seeding program like this is to kill all the weeds and noxious grasses (in all 30 acres). Round Up will be used to achieve the objective (signs and notices will be posted). This means that many turf areas in the community will brown out, and they will stay that was for a couple of weeks before the seeding process can take place. Even then, please keep in mind that it will take time for the grass to grow in, so areas will look sparse for a couple months. (Mowing and day watering schedules will be adjusted accordingly.)

Small sized cardboard (2' x 2' or smaller) – Flatten and place inside recycle container Items such as cereal and cracker boxes, wine boxes, bottled water cardboard containers, beverage boxes, small cardboard boxes, etc.

- · Remove all plastic and packaging from cardboard containers and dispose of properly
 - Flatten cardboard (release all seams so cardboard lays flat)
 - · Place inside white recycle dumpster or blue recycle carts (as applicable)

Medium to large sized cardboard (in smaller quantities) – Flatten and place beside the green garbage dumpster or blue recycle carts (as applicable) inside the trash enclosure Items such as small appliance and furniture boxes, small moving boxes, etc.

- Remove all plastic from cardboard containers and dispose of properly (garbage).
- Flatten cardboard (release all seams so cardboard lays flat)
- Place neatly beside the green garbage dumpster or blue recycle carts (as applicable) *Curb side garbage and recycling pick up: Cardboard must be flattened and bundled and placed next to the recycle cart.

Large sized cardboard and larger quantities of cardboard - Flatten and bring to green dumpsters at Corporation Yard

Large quantities of cardboard and large cardboard items such as appliance and furniture boxes, moving boxes, etc.

- · Remove all plastic and packaging from cardboard containers and dispose of properly (garbage).
 - Flatten (release all seams so cardboard lays flat)

Strategy: Set up Clubs while still having control in all the other suits and being able to get to the board.

West leads the 2 of Spades, North, the Queen, switches to a Diamond, East ducks, and South successively finesses the Jack. He then plays the 10 of Clubs, West ducks, South covers low from the board, East wins with the King, plays a Spade, and South takes the trick with the Ace. Now South has to be careful as the opponents have the rest of the high Spades plus the Ace of Diamonds. He hopes the Clubs are divided 3-2. South next leads the Ace and then the Queen of Clubs, and now runs the rest of them. He next plays a Heart to the Ace, continues with the King and gives up. He has 2 Diamond cards left, which East will take in Diamonds or he might have saved a Spade and would just play the Ace of Diamonds, and lead a Spade to his partner's King. Great! The contract is made with an extra trick.

- * At this point North knows they have the minor suits and tries for a NoTrump contract by bidding Spades showing 1 or more honors.
- ^ South has stoppers in Hearts and happily bids game in NoTrump.




