# Mayor Sam Liccardo to speak at Senior Academy lecture

Sam Liccardo, Mayor of San Jose, will be the speaker at the Senior Academy for Education's Harrington Lecture to be held on Wednesday, April 12, at 7 p.m. in the Clubhouse. The lecture is free, and open to all Villagers. Advance reservations are not required. Mayor Liccardo will talk about issues facing our community, including seniors, and discuss some innovative programs he plans to implement.

Twice a year, the Senior Academy seeks exceptional speakers to present the Harrington Lectures in honor of Richard R. Harrington, a key figure in the founding of Senior Academy in 2002. A past chairman of the Villages Board of Directors, his goal was to encourage Villagers to become life-long learners by offering opportunities to hear expert speakers on subjects of interest, gain new insights, and keep mentally active.

Saratoga, California and graduated from San José's Mayor Liccardo grew up i Bellarmine College Prep and Georgetown University, prior to receiving a law degree from Harvard Law School and a master's degree from Harvard's John F. Kennedy School of Government. He served as a criminal prosecutor in the Santa Clara County District Attorney's office, was elected to San Jose City Council in 2006 and 2010, and elected Mayor of San Jose in 2014. As Mayor, he has crafted innovative programs to reduce homelessness, created after-school programs for low-income children and expanded youth learning opportunities, forged pension reform agreement with the unions, etc. He also launched San Jose's "Smart City Vision," partnering with the tech community to leverage technology and data to improve safety and services, with a goal of making San José the most innovative city in America.

### regularly scheduled March meetings

The Villages Association and Club Boards of Directors met Tuesday, March 28 for their regularly scheduled meetings in the Villages Clubhouse. Numerous items of business were discussed and voted upon.

### Association Treasurer's Report For the month of February 2017

### **Association Operating Results:**

*February Revenues:* Revenue was above budget for February by \$1,100 due to favorable laundry concession income and third party assessments.

February Expenditure: Expenses were above budget by \$9,000.

Unfavorable expenses include: Repair and Maintenance \$9,200 above budget due to repairs in Cribari, Hermosa and Glen Arden; Planting - \$6,000 (timing); Chemicals -\$2,900 (water feature); Electricity -\$2,400; Miscellaneous - \$1,600.

Favorable expenses include: Irrigation Maintenance -\$5,800 (timing); Pest Control - \$2,500; Intra-co Transfers - \$1,900; Trash Expense - \$1,100.

Net budget variance for the month was \$7,900 unfavorable.

**YTD Revenue:** Revenue YTD (eight months of operation) are slightly above budget by \$2,400 due to higher than planned third party assessments (+\$3,400) offset by laundry concession income and golf-cart storage/charging fees (-\$880).

**YTD Expenses:** Association expenses YTD are \$227,800 (4.5 percent) favorable to budget. Favorable performers are: Water, \$126,000 below budget; Irrigation Maintenance - \$49,500 (timing); Planting \$45,100 (timing); Pest Control - \$13,100; Intra-co transfers, \$10,400; Repair and Maintenance - \$9,300; Trash

Expense - \$8,700; Legal/Professional Fees - \$2,100.

Unfavorable expenses were: Operating expenses + \$13,900; Electricity + \$16,400; Chemicals + \$9,000; Operating Supplies + \$4,600; Insurance (third party review) + \$4,500.

YTD net variance is \$230,300 below budget.

As of March 20, there was \$10,627 in resident/member accounts receivable more than 60 days late. This is \$10,193 less than last month, another new record. **Association Replacement Reserve Plan:** 

Year-to-date expenditure of the reserves total \$4,081,000, which is 49 percetn of the budget. Principal expenditures this month include: Roofs – \$163,000, principally Hermosa; Building Repairs - \$69,000 including Highlands, Hermosa and Cribari; Retaining Walls \$61,000 – Hermosa, Montgomery and Highlands.

The Reserve Portfolio balance as of February 28, 2017 was \$11,637,000. The average interest rate on this investment has increased to 1.56 percent.

### Club Financial Report For the month of February 2017

### February Operating Statement Review

Total revenue for the month was \$40,400 unfavorable to budget, 4.2 percent lower than the budget of \$955,000. Most of the negative variance was due to rainy weather, which put a damper on golf play (green fee revenue was \$30,300 unfavorable to budget, 32.8 percent shortfall). There were 13 days in February in which rain severely impacted play. The course was even closed for three days. On a positive note for the golf program, merchandise sales, golf cart rentals and driving range income performed significantly better than the budget (actual revenue was \$18,500 vs. budget of \$8,700). Other revenue categories unfavorable to budget were: resident activities -\$8,800 (offset on the expense side); other

income -\$4,100, lessons/classes -\$3,900; resale transfer fees -\$3,100 and billable services -\$2,200 (timing). Food sales had a good month, exceeding the budget of \$142,500 by 3.1 percent for a total of \$147,000.

Total expenditures were \$28,600 favorable to budget, 3.0 percent less than the budget of \$945,300. Resident activities were \$20,200 less than budget (timing). Other expense categories significantly favorable to budget were employee expense +\$9,100 (1.5 percent less than the budget of \$588,500), repair and maintenance +\$6,700, tree trimming \$2,600 (timing on the golf course) and food cost +\$2,700. Food cost for the month was 31.1 percent, better than the budget of 34 percent. Notable expense categories unfavorable to budget were Pro Shop merchandise cost of sales -\$3,900 (to be expected since revenue was significantly higher), advertising and promotion -\$3,300 (Bistro snacks and winemaker dinner), intracompany cost transfers -\$3,300, professional fees -\$3,000 (Clubhouse kitchen cleaning offset in employee expense), trash -\$2,100, and irrigation supplies -\$2,000 (timing). The net negative operating budget variance for the month was -\$11,800. See table below.

The above table shows the "All Other" department with the largest positive net variance of \$38,000 due to the timing of planting expense and savings in water expense. For G&A, the expense categories of legal fees, professional fees and employee expense have all been less than planned, helping to generate a \$31,000 positive net variance. Community Activities has generated a \$30,000 positive net variance due to favorable resident activities revenue and advertising income. Savings in employee expense and the timing of EPC expenses has helped produce a \$21,000 positive net variance in Public Safety. The Clubhouse/Restaurant has a positive net variance of \$13,000 due to savings on the expense side in food cost (32.2 percent vs. budget of 34.0 percent). The Golf Course/Pro Shop has a \$12,000 positive net variance due to savings in water expense.

### Homeowners' Financial Report

### For the month of February 2017

**Operating Statement Review**Revenue was on budget at \$3,051 (non-Estates single family homes). Expenditures for the month were \$67 favorable to budget due to less than planned legal fee expenses. **The year-to-date net negative operating budget variance is \$535.** 

Estates revenue tracked budget for the month at \$11,837. Expenditures were \$1,296 favorable to budget, 12.1 percent less than the budget of \$10,733. The main drivers were favorable planting expense +\$632 (timing) and electricity ex-

pense +\$434. There were no notable unfavorable expense categories to report for the month.

Year-to-date, water expense is unfavorable to budget -\$4,031 (water feature leak) while total landscape +\$6,294 (timing) and electricity expense +\$2,518 are favorable to budget. **The year-to-date net positive operating budget variance is \$5,400.**



# Emergency savings and mental traps

Why don't more people save for emergencies? Conversely why do many people not use emergency savings wisely? The National Endowment for Financial Education has studied four mental traps that keep people from saving for emergencies or cause them to make unwise choices. Two of the traps apply to not having a fund and two apply to not properly using the fund.

1. I can't afford an emergency fund. Financial planners urge everyone to have at least six to nine months of income in savings. For many people this is simply an unrealistic amount. So change your goal; even \$500 is meaningful. It's likely achievable and validates your progress. Then raise the bar higher to \$1,000, then \$2,000 – and never stop.

2. I don't believe I'll need it. We must understand it isn't a question of "if" unexpected events will happen; the question is "when" will they happen. There is a 60 percent probability that you will experience a financial shock in 2017 and these odds are consistent from year to year. How old is that car you're driving? When was the last time you had to replace an appliance? What is your co-pay if you have a medical emergency?

3. I don't want to withdraw what I've saved. Diligent savers who squirrel away emergency money often don't want to use it when hit with an unavoidable financial event. Watching their savings drain away feels like failure. Instead they turn to credit cards—an alternative that can be much more costly. Using emergency savings is a mark of financial competence when there is an emergency.

4. I spent my fund and I just don't want to start over. It hurts losing your safety net, but you must acknowledge this will happen, perhaps several times throughout your life. You must concede your savings has served its purpose. And then you must start rebuilding for your next unforeseen event.

Are you or your children guilty of mental traps associated with emergency savings?



Jezibaba arrives and agrees to turn Rusalka into a human—but warns her that if she doesn't find love she will be damned, lose her speech and the man she loves will die...And this is just the first act—we have two more acts to experience in this dreamlike two-hour opera.





# **Turf Rejuvenation Program commences**

At the October 25, 2016 Association board meeting, the directors voted to move forward with a community wide turf rejuvenation program at a cost of \$198,383. The work entails slit-seeding (a planting process) roughly 30 acres of common area with Tall Fescue grass. This work is the second part of a two-part project intended to fill in community turf areas that have either died, or have become infested with noxious grasses or weeds over time due to the most recent drought period.

The first part of the project was approved in February 2016, when the Association Board voted to address areas of the community's turf that were not properly irrigated, due to system inefficiencies. The cost of the work was \$272,000. These turf areas were easy to identify after five years of drought conditions. Working through 2016, BrightView Landscape implemented irrigation coverage improvements in each of the 12 districts. Now that all the work is complete, the timing is right to seed these areas.

The first step in the preparation process for a slit-seeding program like this is to kill all the weeds and noxious grasses (in all 30 acres). Round Up will be used to achieve the objective (signs and notices will be posted). This means that many turf areas in the community will brown out, and they will stay that was for a couple of weeks before the seeding process can take place. Even then, please keep in mind that it will take time for the grass to grow in, so areas will look sparse for a couple months. (Mowing and day watering schedules will be adjusted accordingly.) Please refer to the schedule to learn more about when your district is scheduled.



West leads 9 of Clubs, North, Jack, East, the Ace, plays a low Diamond, and South, the Ace. He leads the 10 of Hearts, East takes the trick with the Ace, follows with a Diamond, and West wins with the King. He shifts to a Spade, East covers with the Jack, and South the Ace. He switches to a Heart to the King on the board, then leads a Club to the King in his hand and runs the rest of them. He then plays a Spade, uses the 10 from the board, East wins with the King, continues with another Spade and now South has only trumps left in his hand. Great! The contract is made exactly. North felt his 4 Hearts were very good and raises the bid. South has no intention of bidding game since East has opened with 1 NoTrump.




