



San Jose Mayor to speak at Clubhouse

Sam Liccardo, the current Mayor of San Jose, will be the speaker at the Senior Academy for Education's Harrington Lecture to be held on Wednesday, April 12 at 7 p.m. in the Clubhouse.

Those attending will have an opportunity to hear details on the Mayor's Budget, which was released on March 17. A 20-page document plus three appendices, the document includes the mayor's seven Special Initiatives, which include 32 new airline routes serving the city, 605 teens obtaining their first jobs through "San Jose Works," 167.3 miles of streets repaved and resurfaced, and 590 homeless veterans housed in the "All The Way Home" campaign. The lecture is free, and open to all Villagers. Advance reservations are not required.

It's an outrage! It's my opinion the Association Board of Directors (ABOD) is attempting to change the meaning of the CC&R's without any discussion or agreement with the community. All of this to the detriment of every Villa owner in all twelve Villages. In the recently published "Maintenance Matrix" they have changed the responsibility of the electrical sub-panel from the Association to the Owner. This was done by soliciting an opinion letter back in April, 2013. That letter was contrary to two previous legal opinions, one in 2011 and another in early 2013. Since then, I have thoroughly and completely discredited the lawyers letter with every regulatory jurisdiction that has oversight of sub-panels, however, they are still using that letter to change the meaning of the CC&R's. This action is creating a dangerous precedent. The ABOD must comply with the CC&R's. Every Villa owner should contact the Board by way of a written letter, or note, to demand that the CC&R's be respected and followed. This means that the responsibility of the sub-panel remains with the Association as specified by the CC&R's. Your review of sections 9.1.1 and 9.1.4 will confirm who has the responsibility of the sub-panel.

Tax time means another round of IRS scams. Be ready!

Once again large numbers of people across the nation being targeted by Internal Revenue Service (IRS) telephone scams. Criminals pretending to be IRS agents are calling random telephone numbers throughout the United States trying to harass people into sending pre-paid debit cards to pay fake fines and owed taxes. Scammers generally ask for payment by wire transfer or pre-paid debit cards.

If you receive such a call, please remember that the IRS does not call individual taxpayers on the telephone to collect fines or funds owed. The agency sends notices through the mail.

And according to the IRS web site (www.irs.gov): "Remember: The IRS doesn't initiate contact with taxpayers by email to request personal or financial information. This includes any type of electronic communication, such as text messages and social media channels." If one of the impersonators calls you, he or she will probably begin with the threat of jail and demands of immediate payment to avoid prison time. The scammers' primary goals are to intimidate victims by associating themselves with the IRS and frightening them into sending payment to them via a means of transfer that is not easily traced (prepaid debit or wire transfer). Do not allow yourself to be rushed into taking the wrong action.

To defeat such scams do not allow yourself to be intimidated. Either try to get as much information about the caller or hang up the phone on the fake IRS agent. After you get off the phone with the criminal, call the IRS at 1-800-366-4484 to report the illegal activity.

In addition to the usual scams, a large amount of taxpayer data was stolen from the IRS last year. The perpetrators are likely to use this information to file false tax returns for the victims and attempt to hijack

their refunds. Taxpayers should try to be very aware of any irregularities this tax season and immediately report any suspicious activity to the IRS. You can go to the IRS website, irs. gov, to report phishing, identity theft or other suspicious messages you receive.

If you are contacted by fake IRS scammers, the IRS web site offers the following advice:

• If you receive an email claiming to be from the IRS that contains a request for personal information, taxes associated with a large investment, inheritance or lottery.

Then: 1. Don't reply.

2. Don't open any attachments. They can contain malicious code that may infect your computer or mobile phone.

3. Don't click on any links. Visit the identity protection page on the IRS web site if you clicked on links in a suspicious email or website and entered confidential information.

4. Forward the email as-is to the IRS at phishing@irs.gov. Don't forward scanned images because this removes valuable information.

5. Delete the original email. • If you receive a phone call from someone claiming to be from the IRS but you suspect they are not an IRS employee...

Then 1. Record the employee's name, badge number, call back number and caller ID if available.

2. Call 1-800-366-4484 to determine if the caller is an IRS employee with a legitimate need to contact you.

• If the person calling you is an IRS employee, call them back.

• If not, report the incident to the Treasury Inspector General for Tax Administration (TIGTA www.treasury.gov/tigta/) and to the IRS at phishing@irs.gov (Subject: 'IRS Phone Scam')



SENIOR RESOURCE SERVICES *Time to file—time to pay*

Tuesday, April 18, is Tax Day. If you need additional tax forms, the SRS office still has basic forms available. The SRS office will be open on Monday, Wednesday and Friday next week from 10 a.m. to noon. The final day for the free tax preparation service is Thursday morning, April 13.

If you can't file on time, what should you do? First advice: Do not panic. You may request a Federal six-month extension of time to file. You do not need to explain why you are asking for additional time. However, note that an extension only extends the date to file your return; it does not extend the date to pay your tax. The final payment date of your 2016 income tax is April 18, 2017.

There are three ways to request an automatic extension of time to file from the IRS.

1) The fastest and easiest way is through www.irs.gov. Enter "Free File Extension" in the search box. Taxpayers can electronically request an extension on Form 4868. This service is free for everyone, regardless of income. Filing this form gives taxpayers until October 16 to file their tax return. Remember, to get the extension taxpayers must estimate their tax liability on this form and pay any amount due.

2) You may pay your estimated income tax due and indicate that the payment is for an extension using Direct Pay, the Electronic Federal Tax Payment System, at www.irs.gov. There is no need to file a separate Form 4868 extension request when making an electronic payment and indicating it is for an extension. The IRS will automatically count it as an extension. There is no charge for a direct deduction from your checking or savings account. However, there is a fee for a debit card (\$2.50 to \$4) and a fee for a credit card (1.87 to 2.25 percent).

3) You may file a paper Form 4868 and enclose the payment if tax is due. SRS has copies of the form if you wish to pick one up from the office.

If you believe you do not owe any California tax, no form is required to be filed with the Franchise Tax Board. Your due-date for filling a return is automatically extended for six months. If you estimate you owe California taxes, the FTB requires a "Payment Voucher for Automatic Extension for Individuals" (FTB Form 3519) postmarked by April 18 or your taxes paid electronically from your home computer at www.ftb.ca.gov.

Taxpayers should file even if they can't pay the full amount of estimated tax due. By filing either a regular return or requesting an extension by the April 18 filing deadline, they will avoid the latefiling penalty, which can be 10 times as costly as the penalty for not paying.

Taxpayers who pay as much as they can by the due date reduce the overall amount subject to penalty and interest charges. The interest rate is currently four percent per year, compounded daily. The late-filing penalty is generally five percent per month and the late-payment penalty is normally 0.5 percent per month.

The IRS will work with taxpayers who cannot pay the full amount of tax they owe. Other options to pay, such as getting a loan or paying by credit card, may help resolve a tax debt. Most people can set up an installment agreement with the IRS using the Online Payment Agreement tool on IRS.gov.

California has comparable interest and penalties and payment agreements.

Note: The Senior Resource Services (SRS) office hours for drop-in assistance are Monday, Wednesday and Friday from 10 a.m. to noon. The SRS office is in the Cribari Center across from the Post Office. You may also leave a message at 408-239-5253. The purpose of SRS is to provide education and general business and financial information. All assistance is free and confidential. You should ask your professional adviser about your individual situation.

<u>SRS Reminder</u>: Property tax due April 10

Don't forget that Monday, April 10 is the last date for paying your second installment of your Santa Clara County real estate tax for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2017.

You may pay online at www.scctax.org. There is no fee for paying electronically. Just have your checkbook in front of you so you can record the routing and account number.

However, there is still a 2.38 percent fee for paying with a credit card and a 1 percent fee for paying with a debit card. If you pay with a paper check, your payment envelope needs to be postmarked by April 10.

Diebenkorn grew up in San Francisco, and first discovered Matisse as a Stanford University art student in the early 1940s. 

VMA supports Parkinson's patients and caregivers

Many Villages' residents suffer from Parkinson's disease. To help these Villagers the Villages Medial Auxiliary (VMA) provides information and loan of medical equipment.

"Knowledge is power," quoted Alice Pratte, Parkinson's Caregiver Support Group facilitator. A former nurse and widow whose husband lived with Parkinson's for 15 years, Pratte uses her knowledge to help others. Parkinson's caregivers meet to share, to laugh and to cry. "They learn so much from each other," Pratte said.

For example, how would a caregiver find out that silk pajamas are a big help in turning over? Or, that applesauce helps to get pills down and there is a special technique to aid in swallowing? That there is cutting edge research going on and improved "deep brain stimulus" treatment? These are some of the topics the caregivers group discusses along with shared experiences. The Parkinson's Caregivers Support Group meets the first Wednesday of each month in Cribari Center's Redwood Room.

Pratte also leads a Parkinson's Support Group for Villagers with Parkinson's. This group meets four times a year. The next meeting is April 25.

What causes Parkinson's? "Genetics are a big factor and pesticides. In the Central California Valley where pesticides were everywhere, there is such a high number of cases, the area is referred to as "Parkinson's Alley," Pratte said.

Pratte has nothing but praise for the VMA. During her hus-





band's illness he was able to get free supplies, and borrow a wheelchair, walkers, a transfer board and a shower chair.

The VMA Board thanks Alice Pratte for her tireless efforts to provide her expertise in facilitating the Parkinson's support groups. And we recognize the contributions of George Pratte who, through his personal experience of living with Parkinson's, saw the need for the Parkinson's support groups and along with his wife Alice started this effort to help Parkinson's patients and their caregivers.

When Rusalka insists, claiming they are full of love, he says she will have to get help from the witch Jezibaba, then sinks back into the lake in despair. Jezibaba arrives and agrees to turn Rusalka into a human—but warns her that if she doesn't find love she will be damned, lose her speech and the man she loves will die...And this is just the first act—we have two more acts to experience in this dreamlike two-hour opera.

Art Film of the Month

On Tuesday, April 11 at 7 p.m. in Vineyard Center we will welcome a new and novel series in our monthly programs. These dramatic films are written and narrated by Dr. Simon Schama, Professor of Art and History, Columbia University, prolific author and BBC television host. This Power of Art series in Tales of Two Artists documents the early lives and careers-in vivid and sometimes tragic scenes. Vincent van Gogh (1853-1890) was the son of a Protestant pastor. His troubled childhood, missionary work in London slums and Belgian coal mines led to his poverty and depression. With painting he found a means to communicate and symbolize his experiences and profound spirituality. Before his early death Vincent created a series of canvases with the intense color showing his deep awareness of nature and loneliness. He called the intensity of his colors "the excess of an ardent temperament." Next, Dr. Schama reveals the turbulent life of Amerighi da Caravaggio (1571-1610), an important painter of the Baroque era who was all but forgotten until mid-29th century when his profound influence on Rubens, Bernini and Rembrandt was recognized and acknowledged. Caravaggio's painting combined a dramatic use of light (tenebrist or chiaroscuro) and the realistic depiction of human form and emotion was adapted by his followers. His early training was in Rome and Milan; in one year in Naples he became established as the most prominent painter due to his high-ranking family connections. He then spent a year in Malta with the Knights Order until news of his arrest, and imprisonment caused their evicting him. After a year living with a friend in Sicily he was still unable to obtain pardon from the pope in exchange for his paintings. He returned to Rome, penniless. Caravaggio's death in 1610 is shrouded in mystery, exact burial site unknown. Art historians now agree that "What begins with the work of Caravaggio is quite simply, Modern Painting." The only way to get there now is the four-hour train through rugged terrain. If you are able, the four-day hike on the Inca Trail



takes you to this mysterious sacred Inca site. How was this stone/brick estate built in such a remote location? The Incas did some marvelous engineering, including getting plenty of fresh water to this site. Rick Deutsch will be talking to us about the construction of the long lost city on such a stunning site.

Rick has lived the Carpe Diem (seize the day) lifestyle, enjoying adventure travel worldwide. Besides Machu Picchu he has hiked in many rewarding places including the Galapagos, the Great Wall, Mt. 



Notice of Proposed Changes to Villages Golf and Country Club Rules **Proposed Changes to Rule 1.01 Access to The Villages and Rule 1.40** Villages Board Approved Clubs and Organizations

At The Villages Golf and Country Club (Club) Board of Directors March 28, 2017, monthly meeting, the following proposed changes to Club Rules have been approved for 30-day notice publication in The Villager.

The proposed changes to the following will be discussed and considered, as well as oral and written comments from members and residents at the May 16, 2017, study session and considered for formal approval at the May 30, 2017, monthly meeting.

Response to the proposed rules changes may be made by one or more of the following methods: 1) Participation in the discussion of the change at the Club Board of Directors study session, 2) via-email with comments sent to the Club Board at least seven (7) days prior to the Club Board of Directors study session, or 3) via written comments addressed to the General Manager's office delivered at least seven (7) days prior to the study session.

Rule deletions are noted in strikethrough font, additions are underlined, and the purpose of the change is in italics.

Rule 1.01 Access to The Villages

The purpose for the proposed changes is to specify the amenities which nonresident owners, and members of the country clubs with which The Villages has a reciprocal arrangement, may use.

1.01 ACCESS TO THE VILLAGES

Access to The Villages is limited to owners, owner employees and contractors, residents, residents' guests, residents' employees and contractors, Villages' employees and contractors, and authorized service providers and others listed in this Rule.

1. Entry

A. Only vehicles with bar code stickers are allowed to enter through the righthand lane.

B. Vehicles without bar code stickers must enter through the visitor lane.

C. Emergency vehicles may enter through the most expedient lane.

D. All persons entering The Villages must provide approved identification upon request by Public Safety personnel.

2. Bar Code Stickers

A. Each resident must register all vehicles with Public Safety within two weeks of establishing residency in the Villages. Registration requires verification of a valid state registration and resident ownership of the vehicle. Registered vehicles and motorized recreational vehicles are eligible for a bar code sticker.

B. A Villages employee is eligible to receive one bar code sticker. Temporary employees will not receive bar code stickers.

C. Day to day contractors who are contracted by The Villages are required to display a bar code sticker on their vehicle.

D. The General Manager will determine which Club vehicles should receive bar code stickers.

E. Residents moving from The Villages shall notify Public Safety.

F. Residents who transfer vehicle ownership shall notify Public Safety.

G. Employee severance or transfer of ownership of the employee's vehicle will result in termination of the employee's vehicle access authorization.

H. Non-resident owners will not be issued vehicle bar code stickers for any vehicles. I. When a bar code sticker has been issued, it shall be activated immediately. Bar codes issued to new residents will be deactivated if they fail to attend new resident orientation within 60 days.

3. Access Through the Visitor Lane

A. Vehicles without barcodes, or without activated barcodes, with the following occupants, may enter through the Visitor Lane:

<u>A.</u> Anyone who shows a valid Resident Photo Identification Card.

B. A Villages employee with a valid Employee Photo Identification Card.

G. Licensed real estate agents presenting a business card who are previewing homes or the community, or showing homes or the community to prospective buyers, or in connection with an actual or possible home sale transaction.

H. Professionals who lease Villages office space.

I. Non-resident guests of Villages clubs or organizations who have been authorized by an appropriate officer of the organization.

J. Members of other private clubs that which enjoy reciprocity with The Villages who can demonstrate the right of such reciprocity. outside country clubs, with which The Villages has a reciprocal agreement, may use The Villages' dining facilities, the restaurant and the Bistro, and the golf course and the Pro Shop. Reciprocal privileges do not extend to other amenities. They must show proof of membership in the other country club.

K. Non-resident owners with a Non-resident Photo ID card. Non-resident owners are limited to use of The Villages' dining facilities, the restaurant and the Bistro, and the golf course and the Pro Shop, and access to their units in the Villages. 4. Identification Cards

A. All residents must obtain Photo Identification (ID) Cards which remain the property of the Club.

B. Villages Employees must have Photo ID Cards. Contractors who work for any of the Villages three corporations and their employees must obtain Photo ID cards which they will purchase.

C. Non-resident owners may obtain Non-resident Photo ID Cards which remain the property of the Club.

5. Guest Bar Codes

A. Upon completion of a written application by residents, Public Safety may approve and issue guest bar codes for regular visitors subject to the following conditions:

1) The total number of guest bar codes may not exceed five per residence.

2) Guests must present the vehicle to Public Safety with proof of ownership and current registration.

3) Guest bar code stickers are automatically renewed at the end of the calendar year unless the resident sponsor instructs otherwise.

4) Guest bar code stickers, issued for a guest, shall be valid only during the time the sponsor is a resident.

5) If resident sponsors are cited for rule violations and they lose their privileges, guest bar code privileges will be suspended for the entire period that the residents lose their privileges.

B. Fees

The Club Board will establish fees for guest bar code stickers and publish them in the fee schedule.

6. Transfers

A. Access authorizations are never transferable.

B. Misuse of access authorization will result in revocation of the authorization by the General Manager or his or her designee. The Club Board may overrule the decision of the General Manager upon application by the resident.

Rule 1.40 Villages Board Approved Clubs and Organizations

The purpose for the proposed changes is to improve safety in The Villages by prohibiting outside advertisement of Villages club events, to improve guidelines for clubs by requiring new clubs to have club Bylaws, to clearly limit club memberships to residents, and to consistently use the term "Board recognized" instead of "Board approved" for clubs.

C. Anyone for whom Public Safety has received telephone, written, or online Gate Access authorization prior to arrival.

B. Additional Authorizations

E. Federal, state, local government, or public utility vehicles in the performance of their duties, and summons servers.

F. U.S. Postal Service vehicles and other service vehicles, such as UPS and Federal Express.

1. The Club Board encourages the formation by residents of clubs and organizations for educational, Villages Services; (Villages Medical Auxiliary, Senior Resource Services, Evergreen Foundation), recreational, cultural, supportive, and social purposes. Hereafter, the term "club" refers to "club or organization." 2. Non-residents may attend and participate in <u>club</u> activities as invited guests, but cannot be members.

3. Residents may not use public media to publicize club meetings and events, to invite members of the public to join the club, to attend the club's activities, or (Continued on page 18)

to attend other classes at The Villages. In this context, "public media" includes the internet, social media such as Facebook and Twitter which will be seen by non-residents, and publications which circulate outside The Villages such as the *Evergreen Times* and *Spotlight*.

<u>Residents may post club activities and notices on Nextdoor but must use the</u> <u>"Choose Neighbors: The Villages [only]" option.</u>

<u>Club officials may post notices of upcoming club events in *The Villager*, on <u>Channel 26</u>, and Fast Lane, subject to their guidelines.</u>

<u>4. Villagers may invite guests to attend club meetings and events, subject to that club's own rules and other Club Board Rules. A list of the names of the guests must be provided to Public Safety.</u>

5. The Club Board has set the criteria for approving recognizing clubs and organizations as follows:

A. Organizers <u>must</u> submit a written request for recognition to the Club Board. The request must include:

> 1) A statement of purpose in the form of a Charter or Bylaws, including, at minimum, the purpose of the club, the titles of officers, number of meetings, annual elections, quorum of general meeting, and nomination procedure for club officers including the right of self-nomination.

2) Names and addresses of organizing members

3) Statement of anticipated facility or property use needed, such as expected membership total, frequency of meetings and activities, and special activity support needed.

B. A minimum active membership of 20 residents must be maintained, except for Villages Service Organizations. Non-residents may attend activities as guests by invitation.

C. Membership must be open to all residents who meet the requirements for membership.

D. On an annual basis, <u>clubs and</u> organizations shall provide an up-to-date resident membership roster to the Community Activities Office. Non-compliance could lead to the Club Board withdrawing recognition of the organization.

E. No illegal activity or publication of false or misleading information or activity that ridicules, defames, slanders, libels, or degrades The Villages, any resident of The Villages, or an organization within The Villages is permitted. Such activity shall may be a cause for termination of recognition status.

F. Board recognized Villages organizations and clubs are prohibited from distributing materials <u>and/or sending emails</u> that include partisan political opinions or endorsements to any Villager, with the exception that partisan political clubs may distribute such materials to their own group's membership.

I. PREFACE

This document outlines policies for the management of The Villages Association Corporation Replacement Reserve Funds-Accounts. II. INVESTMENT OBJECTIVES

A. Safety

A prime objective is to select investments on which the principal and interest or dividend will be paid when due.

B. Liquidity

Investments will be acquired with the expectation of being held to maturity. However, instruments are to be purchased giving consideration to a possible emergency requiring they be sold with little or no loss in value of the asset.

C. Income Return

If possible, after giving consideration to safety, liquidity and purchasing power, the funds should secure (real) income.

III. TAX CONSIDERATIONS

It is recommended that competent tax experts be consulted regarding tax matters.

IV. AUTHORIZED INVESTMENTS

A. United States Government Securities

1. Treasury Bills, Notes, and Bonds.

B. Other Investments

1. Certificates of Deposit Insured by the FDIC, <u>Federally</u> Insured Credit Unions and Money Market Funds.

2. Interest bearing loans between Villages Association districts and/or appropriate loans to The Villages Golf and Country Club Corporation.

V. INVESTMENT STRATEGY A. Scheduling

Investment scheduling is an ongoing process. Cash flow projections are an integral part of the investment process. These projections are to be prepared on a continuing basis to deal with the trade-off between investment return and liquidity and to recognize the limitations inherent in accurately forecasting future costs and the need for cash ahead of schedule.

<u>APo 411 Member Initiated Solar Installation</u> were conditionally approved by the Association Board of Directors at its March 28, 2017, monthly meeting. However, before formal approval consideration, the proposed changes must be noticed and published 30 days as required by California Civil Code 4360. To that end, the proposed changes will be considered for formal approval at the May 16, 2017, study session (9:30 a.m. at Foothill Center). The Board will consider oral and written comments regarding the proposed changes at the study session. Response to the proposed policy changes may be made by one or more of the following methods: 1) Participation in the discussion of

B. Forecasting Rates of Return

Predicting interest rate trends is not to be attempted in connection with the investment of t_{The} Villages Association Corporation Replacement Reserve Funds-Accounts.

C. Maturities

Maturities of investments are to be structured so that cash-equivalent funds are available to meet the cash drawdowns. To avoid possible principal loss or penalties, investments should be held to maturity. Investments may be sold, if approved by the General Manager or the Treasurer of the Association Board of Directors, and, if possible after consultation with the Reserves Portfolio Review and Advisory Committee Association's Finance and Reserve Management Committee. Reports to the Board shall provide an approximation as to when the funds in the reserve balance will be required for drawdown. Time Period: Five years is the maximum maturity for any single security.

D. Short-term Investments

A sufficient amount is to be maintained in this account to meet scheduled demand and for contingencies.

E. Special Conditions

There will be no margin purchases.

VI. MANAGEMENT

A. Discretion to Act

The responsibility to manage the funds rests with the General Manager or delegate. The General Manager may delegate the daily authority to manage the funds to the Villages Golf and Country Club Chief Financial Officer (CFO). (See "Two-person Rule" under "Checks and Controls.")

B. Transactions

Accounts may be established with commercial banks, Federal Credit Unions, brokers, and the Federal Reserve. These institutions will not have any discretionary power. Performance of the financial institutions carrying tThe Villages Association Corporation Replacement Reserve Funds-Accounts should be evaluated at regular intervals.

C. Governing Documents

Exercise of responsibility must conform to the governing documents and policies of the Villages Association Corporation.

VII. ACCOUNTING

A. Segregation of Accounts

The Villages Association Corporation's Replacement Reserve accounts Funds shall not be comingled with funds of other corporations or Operating Accounts.

B. Financial Reports

Average maturities

C. Frequency of Reports

Monthly and Quarterly summaries

VIII. CHECKS AND CONTROLS

2. Annual independent audit with notification to the General Manager and the Villages Association Board of Directors.

3. "Two-person Rule": All transactions require the approval of two persons authorized by the Villages Association Board of Directors. At least four persons should be authorized, all of whom are officers of the +Villages Association Corporation.

4. Villages Association Finance and Reserve Management Committee as defined by Association Policy 205.

B. Communications

Committee members should be kept informed on at least a quarterly basis. These policies should be reviewed periodically to conform to any pertinent changes.

C. Documentation

Any document signed by the authorized persons is to be retained, and it becomes part of the records available for review.

TITLE: Member Initiated Solar Installation POLICY NUMBER: APr 411

Solar Energy Systems (SES) within the confines of the Villages Association may be installed by members upon common area roofs only as permitted under this policy and AC Rules.

Definitions:

Introduction:

"Solar Energy Systems (SES)" means any Photovoltaic collector with ancillary equipment, including but not limited to mounting systems, wiring systems, disconnects, ground fault protection and over current protections.

Capitalized Terms unless defined in this Policy are defined in the amended CC&R's.

The Association is a "condominium development" as defined in Civil Code 4125 where each owner has a separate interest in space called a Unit as well as an undivided interest in the common area of the project in which the Unit is located.

Approval Process:

Applications must be fully compliant with the Architectural Rules. All provisions of Section 10 of the CC&R's and Rule D-[29] apply.

Any Member wishing to install a SES, must complete an application for Common Area Alterations and submit it to the Association Architectural Committee.

The Architectural Committee shall review the application and offer recommendations, if any, to the applicant for reasonable restrictions or alterations and make a recommendation to the Board subject to any applicant alterations.

After conditional approval by the Board, the application will be subject to a member vote by Unit owners in the Project, in accordance with the CC&R's.



USGA has created a mobile app, "Rules of Golf," available for IOS and Android. This app can be found at http://www.usga. org/content/usga/home-page/apps.html

The Decisions Book was an additional option and Scott distributed this booklet to the members at the Spring Luncheon. All contain more information than we need to play and enjoy the game of golf, but being intellectually curious, I know we'll all take a peek!

Remember, we don't have to be experts but should try to maintain an "even playing field" of fair play. The more we learn about the rules, the more consistent we will be. We should also have the Pro Shop at 408-274-3220 on speed dial if we need to consult one of the pros during play. In the interest of steady pace in stroke play only, if there is doubt as to procedure, USGA Rule 3-3, one can announce that she will play a second ball, make note of the score on each, and obtain a ruling at the end of the game.

Teddy Morse reported that Marcia Hembree and Barbara Karayn won the Par 3 scramble on Thursday, March 23. Congratulations, ladies!


PICKLEBALL

How to keep score

Calling all Pickleball Players!

Drop-in is Wednesday and Friday at 1:30 p.m., with beginner sessions from 1 to 1:30 p.m. Mike Walias is available to instruct and assist forming groups. This is a great opportunity both to learn and meet potential partners.



Today we discuss how to score a game. The first team to reach 11 points wins, and must win by two points. The server continues to serve until they fail to score a point. The only oddity is the first serve of the game. After deciding which team should serve first, the player to the right (Player one) serves first.

Player one serves until they lose a point, when the service will move to their opponents.

It's important to call the score, including the server number prior to each serve. That helps keep the server and the score straight. To minimize the advantage of serving first, only one player on a team gets a service turn on the first turn of the game. Call the score in the order of server's score, receiver's score, and then the server number. When starting a game, the score is always Zero-Zero-Start or Zero-Zero-Two. This signifies neither team has a point, and the game at the start. Once the first server has completed their turn, the receiving team goes. Whoever is on the right side of the court serves for that turn only. The next time that team gets the serve back; it may be the other player on the right, and they will go first and be server number "One." Beginning players often mistakenly assume that the player keeps the same server number throughout the game. Just remember service number only applies to that turn. For example if the score of the serving team is 3 and the score of the receiving team is 6, and the first server for that side is serving, the score would be announced as 3-6-1. If no point is scored, the serve moves to the second player, and the score is now called as 3-6-2, signifying the second server on that team.

Tips From The Pro: Check your Posture...


Correct golf posture is essential to the rotation and balance necessary to create an effective golf swing. Golfers with too much knee bend tend to slide rather than turn and have poor footwork as the weight is on the heels. Golfers who bend at the hip and not the waist, or who bend over too much tend to move up and down adjusting their spine angle to create a turn...this causes miss hits. The average tour pro tilts forward at the waist 30-35 degrees with minimal knee bend. This allows the arms to hang loose under the shoulders and the spine to turn without tension.

See the accompanying picture and a walk-through to get you in good, athletic posture... 1. Hold the club in front of your belly button with your arms and legs straight. Stand up tall with your shoulders pulled back and stick your chest out (photo #1).

2. Tilt forwards making sure you tilt at the hips only. Your lower back should remain flat rather than rounded. Feel like you are pushing your behind backwards (Photo #2).

3. As the club lowers to touch the ground behind the ball, flex your knees slightly (Photo 3). Avoid making the mistake of many amateur golfers by over-bending your knees.



Turf Rejuvenation Program commences

At the October 25, 2016 Association board meeting, the directors voted to move forward with a community wide turf rejuvenation program at a cost of \$198,383. The work entails slit-seeding (a planting process) roughly 30 acres of common area with Tall Fescue grass. This work is the second part of a two-part project intended to fill in community turf areas that have either died, or have become infested with noxious grasses or weeds over time due to the most recent drought period.

The first part of the project was approved in February 2016, when the Association Board voted to address areas of the community's turf that were not properly irrigated, due to system inefficiencies. The cost of the work was \$272,000. These turf areas were easy to identify after five years of drought conditions. Working through 2016, BrightView Landscape implemented irrigation coverage improvements in each of the 12 districts. Now that all the work is complete, the timing is right to seed these areas.

The first step in the preparation process for a slit-seeding program like this is to kill all the weeds and noxious grasses (in all 30 acres). Round Up will be used to achieve the objective (signs and notices will be posted). This means that many turf areas in the community will brown out, and they will stay that was for a couple of weeks before the seeding process can take place. Even then, please keep in mind that it will take time for the grass to grow in, so areas will look sparse for a couple months. (Mowing and day watering schedules will be adjusted accordingly.)

Dealer has 1 or 2 losers in Spades, 1 in Hearts, 3 losers in Clubs.

Strategy: The lead will determine whether a Heart ruff is possible and how to ruff the losing Clubs.

West leads the 3 of Hearts, East, the Jack, South, the Ace, switches to the Ace of Clubs, and then plays the Ace and King of Diamonds noticing East has only 2 Diamonds. At this point South leads the King of Spades, West wins with the Ace, then plays the King of Hearts, then a Diamond, North, the Jack, East trumps, and South covers with a higher Spade. He shifts to a Club, trumps it on the board, then plays the Queen of Spades to pull the last trump. He leads three good Diamonds from the board discarding 3 Clubs from his hand, and claims since his last two cards are Spades. Great. The contract is made with an overtrick. If West had initially led the King of Clubs, then South would trump a Club on the board, lead a Spade to the King in his hand, then West would lead a Heart, South would play the Ace, take out the last 2 trumps, then play the Diamonds sluffing off the remaining Clubs making 2 overtricks!

* This promises 4 Hearts and an opening hand since his partner would be forced to bid at the 2 level. North aware of this possibility jumps to game since he has a 10 HCP plus 4 Spades and extra points for distribution.






