

Free CPR/AED Class on May 13

The Villages' Emergency Preparedness Committee (EPC) will offer a free American Red Cross CPR/AED class on May 13, from 8:45 a.m. to 1 p.m. in the Cribari Conference Room. This is a half-day class and only covers CPR and the use of AED devices. It does not cover First Aid topics which are typically covered in the full day Red Cross class on CPR/AED plus First Aid. To register for this half-day class, please contact Simon Cintz at training@thevillagesepc.org or 408-274-4549. Each person should bring a mat or large towel for floor activities. Class size is limited.

AED (Automatic External Defibrillator) devices are available at eight locations throughout The Villages, including our pools, gym, and Clubhouse. AEDs are designed to be used with CPR to help heart attack victims. Upon completing this class, you will receive an American Red Cross Certificate of Completion for CPR/AED that is valid for two years.

Solar for condos, PG&E bills and attic insulation

Part of the justification for installing solar panels on condo roofs is the high level of PG&E bills, especially for those condos in Hermosa and The Heights, which have no gas and rely on electrical heat pumps as their primary source of heat.

Heat pumps work by transferring heat from the outside air to the interior of the condos and they work well most of the time. However, when the outside temperature falls close to freezing, they become very inefficient.

One resident of The Heights reported PG&E bills of over \$500 per month during the winter.

Heat rises and therefore, a main source of heat loss is through the roof. Similarly, during the summer, the roof can be a major source of heat gain with the temperature in the attic space rising

Insulation is characterized by its R-value; the larger the R-value the better the insulation.

The condos in The Villages were built between 1967 and 2001 and met the building codes at the time, which for roof insulation was typically R-14. The current building code specifies a R-value for The Villages of between R-30 and R-38.

There are a number of ways of reducing heat loss and therefore PG&E bills, including installing double-glazing. However, double-glazing is expensive, typically costing \$10,000 to \$15,000 per condo and also requires AC approval. A more cost effective investment is to install additional attic insulation. The cost of installing R-30 insulation over the existing insulation depends on the area of the condo but is typically a few thousand dollars. This can reduce the heat loss through the roof by about 70%.

Therefore, prior to condo owners considering solar to offset high PG&E bills, it is recommended that they consider adding additional attic insulation.

Note: Adding additional attic insulation may not be possible in all villages, depending upon the design of the roof.

Update from the GM Search Committee 2017 Director Elections – Just Around the Corner!

The three Villages Corporations (Club, Association and Homeowners Corporation) are preparing for this year's annual membership meetings and elections.

Elections will be conducted in May and June and this year's annual meetings will be held on Wednesday, June 14 at 4:00 p.m. in The Villages Clubhouse. The Villager newspaper will soon begin publishing candidate statements and candidate questions and answers.

Board of Directors Elections for 2017

Club: There will be two director vacancies on the Club Board. The Amended and Restated Bylaws of the Corporation provide that there shall be seven directors. The two directors for which terms expire are William DeVincenzi and Jerry Neece. Both are eligible to run for re-election. Those who will continue to serve during the ensuing year are Howie Blumstein, Rick Casey, Debbie Champion, Mike Poellot, and Wayne Weiler. The Club Nominating Committee has announced Jim Neill and Robert (Bob) Wilk as its candidate nominations. In addition, per the Club Bylaws, any Member in Good Standing may also place his or her in nomination for election to the Board by filing with the Secretary of the Club a notice of intent signed by at least two percent of the Members in Good Standing of the Club (51). Self-nominations for the annual election of Directors must be received no later than 5 p.m. on May 1, 2017.

The Club Board has set May 1, 2017 as the Record Date (Bylaws Section 3.6) for the 2017 Director Election. Only those Members in the records of the Club on May 1, 2017, shall be entitled to notice and only Members in Good Standing as of the record date shall be entitled to vote.

Association: On the Association's Board, there will also be two director vacancies. As with the Club, the Amended and Restated Bylaws of the Association Corporation provide that there shall be seven directors. The two directors for which terms expire are Jim Neill and Robert (Bob) Wilk. Both are eligible to run for re-election. Those who will continue to serve during the ensuing year are Garry Ashby, Sherry Benz, John Campbell, Brooks Fuller and Peter Nicholls. The Association Nominating Committee will announce its candidate nominations at the Association's April 25 monthly meeting. In addition, any Member who satisfies the qualifications set forth in Section 5.2 of the Association Bylaws may place his or her name in nomination for election to the Association Board by giving written notice to the President or Secretary of the Association. Notice of self nomination must be received prior to the Association's deadline for nominations which is May 1, 2017.

The Association Board has set May 1, 2017 as the Record Date (Bylaws Section 3.6) for the 2017 Director Election. Only those Members in the records of the Association on May 1, 2017, shall be entitled to notice and only members in Good Standing as of the record date shall be entitled to vote.

Homeowners: The Homeowners' Corporation Board will have two director vacancies. The Bylaws of the Homeowners Corporation provide that there will be five directors. The two directors for which terms expire are G. Burt Lancaster and Teddy Morse. Both are eligible to run for reelection. Those who will continue to serve during the ensuing year are Mike Kane, Julian Rodriguez, and Greg Stewart. Any Member in Good Standing may place his or her name in nomination for election to the Board by giving written notice to the President (G. Burt Lancaster) or Secretary of the Corporation (Julian Rodriguez) no later than 5:00 p.m. on May 1, 2017. To date, Teddy Morse and Jeannie Omel have declared their candidacies.

IRS Resolutions: For all three corporations, vote packages will also include a ballot resolution, Excess Membership Income Over Membership Expenses Refunded to Members. An approval vote of these resolutions will enable the corporations to avoid income tax on operating surpluses by refunding these surpluses to the membership in the form of assessment reduction in accordance with IRS Revenue Ruling 70-604.

Inspectors of Election: In addition, all three Villages' corporate Boards have appointed Vera Buescher, Claudia Nicolai and Jeanne Filice as Inspectors of Election to perform any acts as may be proper to conduct the election with fairness to all members and also to perform their duties impartially, including, but not limited to, assigning persons to assist in counting and tabulating votes as the inspectors deem appropriate.

All ballot packages are scheduled to be distributed May 12 with the deadline of Monday, June 12, at 8 a.m. for the return of ballots. Ballot counting will take place in an open meeting on Tuesday, June 13 at 9:30 a.m. in Vineyard Center and the results are to be announced the following day, Wednesday, June 14 at the annual meetings.

Along with voting, your Boards encourage you to attend the Annual Meetings of the Members on Wednesday, June 14 at 4 p.m. in the Clubhouse. After the conclusion of the meetings, members will be treated to a community celebration with refreshments.

Attention Single-Family Homeowners

At the request of our homeowners, your Board has been working for several years to update our CC&Rs and Bylaws to comply with current law. We are pleased to tell you that your Board completed its work with the Corporation's legal counsel to update the existing CC&Rs (Declaration of Covenants, Conditions and Restrictions) and Bylaws to comply with current law. We now need your "Yes" vote to complete the project.

In November 2016, a Homeowners' Informational Forum was held to give all single-family homeowners an opportunity to hear a presentation by the attorney concerning the proposed amended documents, ask questions and provide comments. The forum was well-attended, and those in attendance were engaged and some members suggested changes to the documents. The Board considered all comments made and decided it was appropriate to make additional changes to the documents.

A week before the annual meeting notice and vote package, we will distribute the vote package for the updated Second Amended and Restated CC&Rs and Bylaws. This package will include the most recent draft of the updated governing documents.

Again, the Board's primary goal in amending the existing documents is to update the documents to comply with current law and industry practice.

Bylaws: Changes in the updated Bylaws include revisions to Article 4, entitled "Membership Voting." Article 4 was rewritten to require that all membership votes be conducted by secret written ballot using a double envelope system. This is a change from the current Bylaws that mandate that membership votes may be conducted at either a membership meeting or via "written ballot." One reason the Board made this change is because the Homeowners' Corporation has been using the secret written ballot and double envelope system for all membership votes for many years, and believes it is best to continue that practice. In addition, the Association and Club conduct their votes using a double envelope system, and the Board believes it appropriate that its voting procedures conform to the way the Association and Club conduct their votes.

CC&Rs: Section 3.20 was revised to provide that "only lots greater than one-half ($\frac{1}{2}$) acre may be subdivided, subject to approval of the city, the Architectural Control Committee, the Board, and a majority of the Total Voting Power of the Corporation." The lot that contains "the Mansion" is the only one that is bigger than one-half ($\frac{1}{2}$) acre and the Board wants to make sure that the membership has a vote on whether that lot can be subdivided in the future.

Changes were made to Sections 7.3.3 ("Front Setback Requirements") and Section 7.3.4 ("Side Setback Requirements") to update the front setback and side setback measurements and insert the names of the affected "Village" (e.g., "Village Hermosa") after the tract number.

The governing document amendment vote ballot deadline will be the same deadline as the annual meeting ballot deadline, Monday, June 12, 2017, at 8 a.m.

The Board believes that the proposed governing documents are in the best interest of all Corporation Members. If you have questions, you are encouraged to contact your Homeowners' Board (President Burt Lancaster, Vice President Teddy Morse, Secretary Julian Rodriguez, CFO Greg Stewart or Assistant CFO Mike Kane) or Interim General Manager Julia Meadows. The Board has also scheduled an informational open house on Thursday, May 18 from 5 to 8 p.m. in the Fairway Room at the Clubhouse where members are encouraged to attend and ask questions. (There will be refreshments.)

SENIOR RESOURCE SERVICES

Yes, this tax form is real

Three Villagers have come to the SRS office with a form 4734D from the California Franchise Tax Board (FTB). All three had the same question: Is this form a legitimate communication from the FTB or is it a scam?

The form is titled "Request for Tax Information and Documents". All three taxpayers were expecting refunds from their 2016 California income tax return. Instead of the refund, they received this notice requesting copies of their Social Security cards, W-2 and 1099 forms and paycheck stubs.

The volunteer searched the FTB website to verify that 1) the 4734D form is indeed a FTB form and 2) the form received by the Villager has the same fax number, telephone number and address as shown on the FTB site.

According to the FTB, this request is sent when there is a question as to the taxpayer's identity. The taxpayer's refund will not be approved until the additional documentation is provided.

All three Villagers had financial changes during the year such as major medical expenses, and they had never requested large refunds before. The FTB wanted to assure the refund would indeed be paid to the taxpayer and not to someone filing a false return.

If this happens to you, we suggest you call the number on the notice. Have a copy of your current and prior-year returns. We understand that in many cases the FTB, with a few questions, will be able to determine that you did indeed file the return. No additional information will need to be provided. If the FTB still wants documentation we suggest you fax the requested information. Yes, even

a copy of your Social Security card.

SRS applauds these Villagers for considering the notice might be a scam and not immediately giving out personal information. We also appreciate the FTB verifying the return does indeed belong to the taxpayer.

Note: The Senior Resource Services (SRS) office hours for drop-in assistance are Monday, Wednesday and Friday from 10 a.m. to noon. The SRS office is in the Cribari Center across from the Post Office. You may also leave a message at 408-239-5253. The purpose of SRS is to provide education and general business and financial information. All assistance is free and confidential. You should ask your professional adviser about your individual situation.

Unless otherwise indicated, all hikes meet at Cribari Center at 8:30 a.m. and depart at 8:45 a.m.

Saturday, April 22: Amy Meier (408-799-4274) will lead a 9 mile, 1300 ft. elevation hike in the combined Rancho Canada and Calero County Parks. Wednesday, April 26 (Rambler): Rich Bainbridge (408-960-8335) and Wendy Ledamun (406-274-4215) will lead a rambler hike to Evergreen Plaza via Montgomery Hill. We'll adventure out of The Villages through The Estates and then head north on Yerba Buena Road along the boundary of Montgomery Hill Park. We'll take a left onto Verona Road where we begin a slight downhill walk through the Fowler Creek neighborhood to Evergreen Plaza. We'll head home via our "usual" route.

Saturday, April 29: Nature hike on San Bruno Mountain, organized by Dan Kato and led by Doug Allshouse and David Nelson of the Native Plant Society. This will be an easy walk around the saddle and bog, a 2.6-mile sojourn with bay, San Francisco and ocean views. It features grasslands, mono-cultures of gorse, a eucalyptus forest, the headwaters of Colma Creek, and a rare upland wetland. We should see golden violet and silver lupine, the host plants for the endangered Callippe Silverspot and Mission Blue butterflies. The bog is a wetland with sky lupine, sedges, rushes, cow parsnip, willows, and creek dogwood. Bring layers because the saddle may be windy, but the bog is generally sheltered. There is a \$6 fee for park admission payable at the ranger kiosk. Meet in the main lot just past the ranger kiosk. For (Continued on page 21)

Private tour and exhibit at SFMOMA

Here is the outing you have been waiting for—

Tuesday, May 23 is the day to go see the beautiful San Francisco Museum of Modern Art (SFMOMA). We will depart the Villages at 8:45 a.m. and return to the Villages by 5 p.m. The cost per person is \$70 per person; this includes museum entry, exhibit, tour and transportation. SFMOMA will be splitting us in two groups so you can get the most out of the private tour of Doris and Donald Fisher exhibits and followed by the Matisse/Diebenkorn exhibit and tour. Registration begins on Monday, April 10, in the Community Resource Center, Building B.

The tour of the Doris and Donald Fisher Collection at SFMOMA guides visitors through the Fisher Collection galleries, located throughout the building. Founders of San Francisco-based Gap, Inc., the Fishers have had a lifelong love of modern and contemporary art, which shines through in multiple exhibitions drawn from their holdings. Select additional works from the museum's collection add depth and context. Notable stops include the focused exhibition Alexander Calder: Motion Lab, four galleries dedicated to Ellsworth Kelly, and the diverse works of Gerhard Richter.

Presenting a new view of two of the 20th century's most extraordinary painters, Matisse/Diebenkorn is the first major exhibition to explore the profound inspiration Richard Diebenkorn (1922–1993) found in the work of Henri Matisse (1869–1954). It brings together 100 extraordinary paintings and drawings—40 by Matisse and 60 by Diebenkorn—that reveal the connections between the two artists in subject, style, color, and technique.

The exhibition unfolds across the arc of Diebenkorn's career—from early abstractions, through his Bay Area figurative years, to his majestic Ocean Park series—all in direct dialogue with works that he knew and admired by Matisse. Diebenkorn grew up in San Francisco, and first discovered Matisse as a Stanford University art student in the early 1940s. Over the next four decades, he pursued a serious study of the great French modernist's work, drawing from his example to forge a style entirely his own.

You will be able to eat either at SFMOMA or at one of the eateries in the area of Yerba Buena Gardens. Yerba Buena Gardens, the crown jewel of San Francisco is within walking distance of SFMOMA for you to enjoy the gardens, visit the Martin Luther King Jr. Memorial, 120-gallon waterfall, several fountains and much more. The Jewish Contemporary Museum has also opened in the Yerba Buena Gardens. You don't want to miss your chance to see this!

Bitten by depression

A message from a VMA volunteer:

On my last visit to the doctor, she asked if I was depressed. My reply was of course not. I am a mature human being in control of my emotions and I will not allow myself to be depressed. We had just moved from another state and I had not made many friends and missed the friends we had left behind. The doctor replied that it is important for both mental and physical health to recognize depression and find ways to control one's energy levels. She maintained that depression is a state of low energy and an aversion to activity that can affect your thoughts.

My doctor felt a visit to a therapist could be helpful. In addition, she suggested exercise such as a walk in the fresh air, eating a healthy diet, decrease alcohol consumption, and joining a group such as one that engages in volunteer work.

Once back home, I did some research on depression. The following is some of what I learned. A decreased ability to concentrate, feelings of sadness, anxiety, emptiness, helplessness, worthlessness and guilt can all be symptoms of a depressed mood. Life events to include the normal aging process, dealing with multiple medical issues, a death or a serious diagnosis in the family, a feeling of isolation, loss of friends, or financial hardship can all lead to depression. Loss of interest in activities that were once pleasurable and now no longer are can be indicative of depression.

It has been estimated that two-thirds of people with depression do not actively seek treatment. A depressed mood may not always require professional treatment and may be temporary. Sometimes depression can be a side effect of medications. There is a variety of treatments for depression. Doctors are trained to evaluate the necessity of drugs or other interventions.

After a few weeks of following my physician's advice, my mood seems to have changed for the better. If you feel like I did, you might want to talk to your doctor.

Tips From The Pro: Are you "up to speed"? One of the most important elements to playing well is knowing the speed of the greens and using that information properly. The most common error when putting is speed control, not directional control. Also, the biggest variable in golf, other than the weather, is course conditions. And more specifically, the putting greens conditions. Greens can vary in speed, and on any given day, can roll differently. Obviously the green speeds vary from course to course...but green speeds also vary at the same course from day to day. It is always a good idea to arrive for your round early enough to not only warm up at the range, but also hit some warm up chips and putts so that you can learn the speed of the greens that day. I suggest, before you play, take 10 minutes hitting some putts ranging from 15-40 feet; and then 10 minutes hitting some chips and pitches. This will give you the information you need to properly gauge the speed of the greens as you start your round. So the next time you play remember to get "up to speed" before you tee off.

Turf Rejuvenation Program continues

At the October 25, 2016 Association board meeting, the directors voted to move forward with a community wide turf rejuvenation program at a cost of \$198,383. The work entails slit-seeding (a planting process) roughly 30 acres of common area with Tall Fescue grass. This work is the second part of a two-part project intended to fill in community turf areas that have either died, or have become infested with noxious grasses or weeds over time due to the most recent drought period.

The first part of the project was approved in February 2016, when the Association Board voted to address areas of the community's turf that were not properly irrigated, due to system inefficiencies. The cost of the work was \$272,000. These turf areas were easy to identify after five years of drought conditions. Working through 2016, BrightView Landscape implemented irrigation coverage improvements in each of the 12 districts. Now that all the work is complete, the timing is right to seed these areas.

The first step in the preparation process for a slit-seeding program like this is to kill all the weeds and noxious grasses (in all 30 acres). Round Up will be used to achieve the objective (signs and notices will be posted). This means that many turf areas in the community will brown out, and they will stay that was for a couple of weeks before the seeding process can take place. Even then, please keep in mind that it will take time for the grass to grow in, so areas will look sparse for a couple months. (Mowing and day watering schedules will be adjusted accordingly.)

He plays a Spade, South takes the trick with the Ace, follows with the Ace of Hearts, and is very happy to see the King fall under the Ace. Unfortunately that means the trumps are divided 4 to 1. He continues to play a Heart to the Queen on the board, follows with the King of Clubs, stuffing a Spade from his hand, then the Queen of Clubs and stuffs a Diamond. Now he leads a Spade, trumps it in his hand, follows with a Heart; West covers with the Jack, shifts to the 10 of Spades; East, the Jack, and South trumps it. He leads a Diamond to the Jack on the board, continues with the King, and West wins with his last trump. He plays his last card, the Queen of Spades, and South uses his last card, a trump and takes the trick. Well done. The contract is made with 2 overtricks. If South had initially played a Heart and finessed his Queen he would have lost three Heart tricks instead of two and only made 3 Hearts.

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



Residents, or those working on the behalf of residents, are advised to call the Public Safety Administration office at 408-239-5246 before planning or opening a sale at the Villages. All sales on Villages property are subject to Association Rule 2.02 Residence Use and Occupancy Restrictions.

Homeowner Rule 3.2.10, Estate and Garage Sales states: 3.2.10 Estate and garage sales are permitted subject to the

A. A permit for the sale shall be obtained from the Public Safety Office prior to holding the sale and placement of advertising.

Also, effective July 1, 2012, all estate and garage sales in the Association will require a permit. The owner of the property must request the permit from Public Safety Administration in Building C.

The Villages Association Rule 2.02. 5., Residence Use and Occupancy Restrictions applies:

- 5. Estate and garage sales are permitted subject to the following:
- A. Public Safety will not allow entry to anyone who is not authorized by name in advance (Club Rule 1.01, Access to the Villages)
- B. All sales activity and sale items must be contained with the residence or garage.
 - C. Sales maybe held only between 9 a.m. and 4 p.m.
 - D. Sales period may not exceed two days.
- E. Only one sale per resident household per year will be permitted. In the event of the death of a resident of the unit, a subsequent estate sale will be permitted. A permit is required and can be obtained from Public Safety.

Note: When placing classified ads for estate or garage sales in The Villager, you will need to attach proof of the permit to your Classified Advertising form.
