Monet at Legion of Honor—2nd trip

Our first scheduled trip to see the Monet exhibit sold out, and we are now offering a second trip on Tuesday, May 9.

"Monet: The Early Years" will be the first major U.S. exhibition devoted to the initial phase of Claude Monet's (French, 1840-1926) career. Through approximately 60 paintings, the exhibition demonstrates the radical invention marking the artist's development during the formative years of 1858 to 1872. In this period the young painter developed his unique visual language and technique, creating striking works that manifested his interest in painting textures and the interplay of light upon surfaces.

We will depart the Villages at 8:15 a.m. The trip escort will ask for two groups, each group entering 15 minutes apart for a docent-led tour. Following our tour, your leader will ask you to meet at the bus at a certain time to depart to Pier 39 where you can find many places to enjoy lunch. We are so lucky to live in such a beautiful area with so many gorgeous trees. We lost several due to drought and storms, but I am thrilled that so many of the redwood trees are fighting their way back! I run the golf course every Monday and have looked at most trees that look totally brown. But I have discovered that almost all of them are sprouting green shoots and will make a total recovery. These glorious redwoods are capable of surviving fire and drought for hundreds of years, and I'm sure ours will do the same.

I have only found four trees that have no green growth, near the fairways on holes 2, 3 and on 12. Other than that, they are all alive. I have heard that there is a plan to cut down 50+ trees on the golf course. That would be very detrimental to the landscape, very expensive for us and not necessary. This might be the recommendation of an arborist who gets paid for cutting down trees, but I doubt that an independent arborist would agree.

Let's work together to save these magnificent trees---and save some money at the same time. -Patty Burke

2017 Director Elections – Just Around the Corner!

The three Villages Corporations (Club, Association and Homeowners Corporation) are preparing for this year's annual membership meetings and elections.

Elections will be conducted in May and June and this year's annual meetings will be held on Wednesday, June 14 at 4:00 p.m. in The Villages Clubhouse. The Villager newspaper will soon begin publishing candidate statements and candidate questions and answers.

Board of Directors Elections for 2017

Club: There will be two director vacancies on the Club Board. The Amended and Restated Bylaws of the Corporation provide for seven directors. The two directors for which terms expire are William DeVincenzi and Jerry Neece. Both are eligible to run for re-election. Those who will continue serving during the ensuing year are Howie Blumstein, Rick Casey, Debbie Champion, Mike Poellot, and Wayne Weiler. The Club Nominating Committee has announced Jim Neill and Robert (Bob) Wilk as its candidate nominations. In addition, per the Club Bylaws, any Member in Good Standing may also place his or her in nomination for election to the Board by filing with the Secretary of the Club a notice of intent signed by at least two percent of the Members in Good Standing of the Club (51). Self-nominations for the annual election of Directors must be received no later than 5 p.m. on May 1, 2017.

The Club Board has set May 1, 2017 as the Record Date (Bylaws Section 3.6) for the 2017 Director Election. Only those Members in the records of the Club on May 1, 2017, shall be entitled to notice, and only Members in Good Standing as of the record date shall be entitled to vote.

Association: On the Association's Board there will also be two director vacancies. As with the Club, the Amended and Restated Bylaws of the Association Corporation provide for seven directors. The two directors whose terms expire are Jim Neill and Robert (Bob) Wilk. Both are eligible to run for re-election. Those continuing to serve during the ensuing year are Garry Ashby, Sherry Benz, John Campbell, Brooks Fuller and Peter Nicholls. The Association Nominating Committee will announce its candidate nominations at the Association's April 25 monthly meeting. In addition, any Member who satisfies the qualifications set forth in Section 5.2 of the Association Bylaws may place his or her name in nomination for election to the Association Board by giving written notice to the President or Secretary of the Association. Notice of self nomination must be received prior to the Association's deadline for nominations, which is May 1, 2017.

The Association Board has set May 1, 2017 as the Record Date (Bylaws Section 3.6) for the 2017 Director Election. Only those Members in the records of the Association on May 1, 2017, shall be entitled to notice and only members in Good Standing as of the record date shall be entitled to vote

Homeowners: The Homeowners' Corporation Board will have two director vacancies. The Bylaws of the Homeowners Corporation provide for five directors. The two directors for which terms expire are G. Burt Lancaster and Teddy Morse. Both are eligible to run for re-election. Those continuing to serve during the ensuing year are Mike Kane, Julian Rodriguez, and Greg Stewart. Any Member in Good Standing may place his or her name in nomination for election to the Board by giving written notice to the President (G. Burt Lancaster) or Secretary of the Corporation (Julian Rodriguez) no later than 5 p.m. on May 1, 2017. To date, Teddy Morse and Jeannie Omel have declared their candidacies.

IRS Resolutions: For all three corporations, vote packages will also include a ballot resolution, Excess Membership Income Over Membership Expenses Refunded to Members. An approval vote of these resolutions will enable the corporations to avoid income tax on operating surpluses by refunding these surpluses to the membership in the form of assessment reduction in accordance with IRS Revenue Ruling 70-604.

Inspectors of Election: In addition, all three Villages' corporate Boards have appointed Vera Buescher, Claudia Nicolai and Jeanne Filice as Inspectors of Election to perform any acts as may be proper to conduct the election with fairness to all members, and to perform their duties impartially, including, but not limited to, assigning persons to assist in counting and tabulating votes as the inspectors deem appropriate.

All ballot packages are scheduled to be distributed May 12, with the deadline of Monday, June 12, at 8 a.m. for the return of ballots. Ballot counting will take place in an open meeting on Tuesday, June 13, at 9:30 a.m. in Vineyard Center and the results are to be announced the following day, Wednesday, June 14 at the annual meetings.

Along with voting, your Boards encourage you to attend the Annual Meetings of the Members on Wednesday, June 14, at 4 p.m. in the Clubhouse. After the conclusion of the meetings, members will be treated to a community celebration with refreshments.

Free CPR/AED Class on May 13

The Villages' Emergency Preparedness Committee (EPC) will offer a free American Red Cross CPR/AED class on May 13, from 8:45 a.m. to 1 p.m. in the Cribari Conference Room. This is a halfday class and only covers CPR and the use of AED devices. It does not cover First Aid topics which are typically covered in the full day Red Cross class on CPR/AED plus First Aid. Class size is limited.

AED (Automatic External Defibrillator) devices are available at eight locations throughout The Villages, including our pools, gym, and Clubhouse. AEDs are designed to be used with CPR to help heart attack victims. Upon completing this class, you will receive an American Red Cross Certificate of Completion for CPR/AED, which is valid for two years.

Club and Association Boards met for regularly scheduled April meetings

The Villages Association and Club Boards of Directors met Tuesday, April 25 for their regularly scheduled meetings in the Villages Clubhouse.

Numerous items of business were discussed and voted upon.

Association Financial Report

For the month of March 2017

Revenue was \$1,800 unfavorable to the budget of \$615,900 for the month, due to less than planned laundry concession income -\$2,000 (timing) offset by revenue from third party assessments. Expenditures for the month were \$6,900 (1.2 percent) unfavorable to the budget of \$555,000. The main drivers were repair and maintenance -\$20,000 (mostly due to roof leak interior repairs in nearly all districts), water expense -\$6,300, electricity expense -\$2,700 and operating supplies -\$2,400, which were offset by significant positive budget variances in insurance expense +\$8,100 (new premiums in effect), planting +\$6,000 (timing) and intra-company cost transfers +\$5,900.

Year-to-date (nine months of operations), revenue is \$5,532,900, slightly ahead of the budget of \$5,532,300 due to higher than planned third party assessments (\$3,700) offset by laundry concession income and golf cart storage/electricity fees (-\$2,900). Total operating expenditures, year-to-date, are \$5,413,400 or 3.9 percent less than the budget of \$5,634,400. Approximately 54 percent of the positive budget variance is in water expense at +\$120,000. Other notable categories favorable to budget expense are irrigation maintenance +\$51,200 (timing), planting expense +\$51,100 (timing), intra-company cost transfers +\$16,300, pest control +\$14,500, trash expense +\$9,900, insurance expense +\$3,500 and legal fees +\$2,200. Expense categories significantly unfavorable to budget are electricity -\$19,000 (rate hikes), repair and maintenance -\$10,700 (roof leak interior repairs), chemicals -\$9,000 (water feature organic treatment program) and operating supplies -\$6,900. **The year-to-date net positive budget variance is \$221,600**.

Club Financial Report

For the month of March 2017

Total revenue for the month was \$47,300 favorable to budget, 4.8 percent higher than the budget of \$991,400. Nearly every revenue category exceeded the budget for the month. The golf program had a strong month with green fees performing favorably to budget by +\$11,400 (11.4 percent) with 592 more rounds played compared to March 2016. This was much needed to help recover from the impact of heavy rains on green fee revenue in January and February. Merchandise sales were \$7,000 better than the budget of \$4,800, more than doubling expected revenue. The Cleveland Wedge Experience was a big success with 22 wedges sold. Food sales were +\$16,100 (10.4 percent) favorable to budget, all in the Bistro. Other revenue categories significantly favorable to budget were lessons/classes +\$5,000, resident activities income +\$2,800, golf cart rentals +\$2,700 and other income +\$2,500. Revenue categories significantly unfavorable to budget were billable services -\$3,700 (timing), and late fees -\$2,700.

Total expenditures were \$30,900 favorable to budget, 3.2 percent less than the budget of \$971,400. Employee expense had the largest positive budget variance +\$41,600 (6.8 percent less than the budget of \$608,700) due to a favorable adjustment to the group medical expense related to the prior month's billings. Other expense categories significantly favorable to budget were water +\$22,900, planting expense +\$9,100 (timing) and fees, dues and licenses +\$3,600 (timing). Notable expense categories unfavorable to budget were electricity expense -\$13,800 (will be adjusted in future months after further analysis), resident activities -\$9,900 (offset with higher revenue), food cost -\$6,800 (due to higher revenue), Pro Shop cost of sales -\$5,200 (due to higher revenue), and property taxes -\$4,000 (supplemental tax bill for the Fitness Center).

The net positive operating budget variance for the month was +\$78,200. See table below.

The above table shows the Golf Course/Pro Shop department with the largest positive net variance of \$53,000 due to higher than planned revenues (merchandise sales and cart rentals) and savings in water expense. The "All Other" category has a \$48,000 positive net variance mostly due to the timing of planting expense and savings in repair/maintenance and water expense. For G&A, the expense categories of legal fees, professional fees and employee expense have all been less than planned, helping to generate a \$38,000 positive net variance. Community Activities

has produced a \$33,000 positive net variance due to favorable resident activities revenue and advertising income. Savings in employee expense and the timing of EPC expenses has helped produce a \$31,000 positive net variance in Public Safety. The Clubhouse/Restaurant has a positive net variance of \$22,000 mainly due to savings on the expense side in food cost (32.5 percent vs. budget of 34.0

percent). The Community Centers are showing a net negative budget variance of \$8,000 due to higher than planned electricity expense and property tax expense (Fitness Center).

Operating Statement Review for March 2017

Revenue was on budget at \$3,051 (non-Estates single family homes). Expenditures for the month were \$45 favorable to budget, due to less than planned insurance expense (new premiums in effect), offset by higher than planned legal fee expenses. The year-to-date net negative operating budget variance is \$490.

Estates revenue tracked budget for the month at \$11,837. Expenditures were \$5,717 favorable to budget, 52 percent less than the budget of \$10,822. The main drivers were favorable water expense +\$2,882 and planting expense +\$2,000 (timing). There were no notable unfavorable expense categories to report for the month.

Saturday, April 29: Nature hike on San Bruno Mountain, organized by Dan Kato and led by Doug Allshouse and David Nelson of the Native Plant Society. This will be an easy walk around the saddle and bog, a 2.6-mile sojourn with bay, San Francisco and ocean views. It features grasslands, mono-cultures of gorse, a eucalyptus forest, the headwaters of Colma Creek, and a rare upland wetland. We should see golden violet and silver lupine, the host plants for the endangered Callippe Silverspot and Mission Blue butterflies. The bog is a wetland with sky lupine, sedges, rushes, cow parsnip, willows, and creek dogwood. Bring layers because the saddle may be windy, but the bog is generally sheltered. There is a \$6 fee for park admission payable at the ranger kiosk. Meet in the main lot just past the ranger kiosk. For detailed questions, call or text Doug at 415-269-9967. Bring water, a snack or light lunch. Longer hikes to the top of the mountain can be arranged if desired. Round trip car mileage about 80.

Wednesday, May 3 (Rambler): Terry and Gary Holmquist (408-531-9779) will lead a hike in the northern part of Santa Teresa County Park. It will be nearing the end of wildflower season but there should stil be a good display. It will be approximately a four mile route with about a 500 foot elevation gain. There will an optional lunch afterwards at Sweet Tomatoes.

Saturday, May 6: Nancy Rumple at 408-238-7535 will lead the long hikers on a 10 mile hike along the Sierra Vista Trail and on the Lower Caleveras Fault Trail. We will hike past the Historic Ranch House and continue on up with a 1400 ft. elevation gain to the overlook and picnic area where we will eat lunch. Along the way we will see a variety of wild flowers. Bring lunch, water and sticks. Wear boots and layers. Restrooms and water are not available in Sierra Vista. The Ramblers can enjoy a shorter hike along the ridge line with beautiful views of the Alum Rock park canyon. Maps will be available. Round trip car mileage about 25 Heavy rain cancels. This is the third time, hopefully rain won't



Presenting a new view of two of the 20th century's most extraordinary painters, Matisse/Diebenkorn is the first major exhibition to explore the profound inspiration Richard Diebenkorn (1922–1993) found in the work of Henri Matisse (1869–1954). It brings together 100 extraordinary paintings and drawings—40 by Matisse and 60 by Diebenkorn—that reveal the connections between the two artists in subject, style, color, and technique.

The exhibition unfolds across the arc of Diebenkorn's career—from early abstractions, through his Bay Area figurative years, to his majestic Ocean Park series—all in direct dialogue with works he knew and admired by Matisse. Diebenkorn grew up in San Francisco and first discovered Matisse as a Stanford University art student in the early 1940s. Over the next four decades, he pursued a serious study of the great French modernist's work, drawing from his example to forge a style entirely his own.

"Hillbilly Elegy" by J.D. Vance: Vance, a former marine and Yale Law School Graduate, offers a probing look at the struggles of America's white working class through his own story of growing up in a poor Rust Belt town. 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

They explained USGA Rule 26 regarding the three options when our ball enters a standard water hazard (marked by yellow posts): 1) Play the ball as it lies (if possible), or 2) under penalty of one stroke, play the ball under the stroke and distance procedure, or 3) also under penalty of one stroke, drop a ball behind the hazard keeping the point at which the original last crossed the margin of the hazard between the hole and the spot on which the ball is dropped. Relief for a ball in a lateral hazard will be covered next time.

Handicap Adjustment When Playing Different Tees: The question comes up quite often lately as many of our tournaments and our "regular" weekly games have us playing from different tees. Without getting into the controversy of whether or not this is fair, let me explain what the NCGA Handicap Manual says should happen (Section 3-5). The main tees used by Villages Men's play is either the #4 tees or #3 tees. The USGA rating is 70.9/121 from the #4 tees, and 68.0/117 from the #3 tees. Therefore, in mixed competition, everyone starts with the course handicap based on their NCGA handicap index for their set of tees. Then, what is supposed to happen is the lower course rating is subtracted from the higher course rating, i.e. 68.0 subtracted from 70.9 equals 2.9 (USGA says to round up) for a difference of three strokes. So, three strokes should be added to the players on the #4 tees (although USGA and NCGA permit subtracting three strokes from those playing the #3 tees, allowing tournament director's choice.

Now some will say that it doesn't matter when teams are the made up of the same numbers of players from each tee, but is it the same when POTY points or skins are involved. I'll let you make your own decision.



Wednesday, May 10 (Rambler): Wendy Ledamun (408-274-4215) and Rich Bainbridge (408-960-8335) will lead a rambler hike to view the "The Angel on Yerba Buena". We'll walk through the Estates to Yerba Buena, then head up and over the hill to the Silver Creak Linear Park - Picnic Meadow. Course Maintenance: As you may have noticed, we core aerated and sanded the fringes on Monday, April 17. This was done as part of a long term project to remove the ripples in our fringes caused by excessive thatch layer. The goal is to ultimately have a fringe that is narrower in width and rolls smooth and flat. We will keep you informed as we continue to work on the fringes.

On Monday, April 24 we verti-cut the greens. This helps open them up and spread the last remaining sand into the remaining cavities. It also removes thatch layer, which is crucial going into the warm summer months. Vertical mowing will be a regular practice this spring and will keep our greens firmer and faster throughout the season.

We are now back to rolling the greens 3-4 days per week. Let us know how you like the green speeds and conditions over the next two weeks as we re-introduce our regular rolling regimen.

I will continue to include course maintenance updates in my article going forward to keep you up to date and informed.



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Attention Single-Family Homeowners—voting package coming

At the request of our homeowners, your Board has been working for several years to update our CC&Rs and Bylaws to comply with current law. We are pleased to tell you that your Board completed its work with the Corporation's legal counsel to update the existing CC&Rs (Declaration of Covenants, Conditions and Restrictions) and Bylaws to comply with current law. We now need your "Yes" vote to complete the project.

In November 2016, a Homeowners' Informational Forum was held to give all single-family homeowners an opportunity to hear a presentation by the attorney concerning the proposed amended documents, ask questions and provide comments. The forum was well-attended, and those in attendance were engaged and some members suggested changes to the documents. The Board considered all comments made and decided it was appropriate to make additional changes to the documents.

On May 7 we will distribute the vote package for the updated Second Amended and Restated CC&Rs and Bylaws. This package will include the most recent draft of the updated governing documents.

Again, the Board's primary goal in amending the existing documents is to update the documents to comply with current law and industry practice.

Bylaws: Changes in the updated Bylaws include revisions to Article 4, entitled "Membership Voting." Article 4 was rewritten to require that all membership votes be conducted by secret written ballot using a double envelope system. This is a change from the current Bylaws that mandate that membership votes may be conducted at either a membership meeting or via "written ballot." One reason the Board made this change is because the Homeowners' Corporation has been using the secret written ballot and double envelope system for all membership votes for many years, and believes it is best to continue that practice. In addition, the Association and Club conduct their votes using a double envelope system, and the Board believes it appropriate that its voting procedures conform to the way the Association and Club conduct their votes.

CC&Rs: Section 3.20 was revised to provide that "only lots greater than one-half (½) acre may be subdivided, subject to approval of the city, the Architectural Control Committee, the Board, and a majority of the Total Voting Power of the Corporation." The lot that contains "the Mansion" is the only one that is bigger than one-half (½) acre and the Board wants to make sure that the membership has a vote on whether that lot can be subdivided in the future.

Changes were made to Sections 7.3.3 ("Front Setback Requirements") and Section 7.3.4 ("Side Setback Requirements") to update the front setback and side setback measurements and insert the names of the affected "Village" (e.g., "Village Hermosa") after the tract number.

The governing document amendment vote ballot deadline will be the same deadline as the annual meeting ballot deadline, Monday, June 12, 2017, at 8 a.m.

The Board believes that the proposed governing documents are in the best interest of all Corporation Members. If you have questions, you are encouraged to contact your Homeowners' Board (President Burt Lancaster, Vice President Teddy Morse, Secretary Julian Rodriguez, CFO Greg Stewart or Assistant CFO Mike Kane) or Interim General Manager Julia Meadows. The Board has also scheduled an informational open house on Thursday, May 18 from 5 to 6:30 p.m. in the Fairway Room at the Clubhouse where members are encouraged to attend and ask questions. (There will be refreshments.)

Turf Rejuvenation Program continues

At the October 25, 2016 Association board meeting, the directors voted to move forward with a community wide turf rejuvenation program at a cost of \$198,383. The work entails slit-seeding (a planting process) roughly 30 acres of common area with Tall Fescue grass. This work is the second part of a two-part project intended to fill in community turf areas that have either died, or have become infested with noxious grasses or weeds over time due to the most recent drought period.

The first part of the project was approved in February 2016, when the Association Board voted to address areas of the community's turf that were not properly irrigated, due to system inefficiencies. The cost of the work was \$272,000. These turf areas were easy to identify after five years of drought conditions. Working through 2016, BrightView Landscape implemented irrigation coverage improvements in each of the 12 districts. Now that all the work is complete, the timing is right to seed these areas.

The first step in the preparation process for a slit-seeding program like this is to kill all the weeds and noxious grasses (in all 30 acres). Round Up will be used to achieve the objective (signs and notices will be posted). This means that many turf areas in the community will brown out, and they will stay that was for a couple of weeks before the seeding process can take place. Even then, please keep in mind that it will take time for the grass to grow in, so areas will look sparse for a couple months. (Mowing and day watering schedules will be adjusted accordingly.)



West leads the 5 of Hearts, South covers with the Ace from the board, switches to a Spade to the Ace in his hand, and continues with the King. He then finesses the 7 of Hearts, East wins with the Queen, switches to a Diamond, South, the Queen, West, the King and he wins with the Ace on the board. He follows with the Jack of Hearts, East takes the trick with the King, then plays a Club, South covers with the Ace in dummy, now plays the 2 good Hearts sluffing the 2 Diamonds from his hand. South leads the King of Clubs, discards the Jack from his hand, next the good 10 of Clubs, shifts to a Diamond, trumps it in his hand, now leads his last card, a Spade, and East takes the trick with the Queen. Well done. The contract is made with an extra trick. South can also make 4 NoTrump, but bidding 5 Spades gives South more points.

* North has16 HCP and jumps to game.





Water District property tax exemption

If you are a low-income senior, you may qualify to have a parcel tax removed from next December's property tax bill.

First, dig out your 2016-2017 property tax bill. Look at the list of Special Assessment Taxes in the center of the bill. Is there a line labeled "728 SCVWD Safe Clean Water"? The Santa Clara Valley Water District offers a property tax exemption from this special assessment for qualifying low-income seniors. Now is the time to request an exemption for your 2017-2018 property tax assessment.

To qualify you must be 65 years or older by June 30, 2018 – i.e. the end of the 2017/2018 property tax year. The qualifying senior or his/her living trust must be listed as an owner on the deed and the senior must live in the property as his/her primary residence. Only one owner needs to be age 65.

Your 2016 total household income must have been less than \$48,375. Social Security and nontaxable income is included in the calculation of income.

This income limit is based on 75 percent of California's Median Household Income so it changes every year. The income limit started at \$32,850 in 2000, and has now increased to \$48,375 - an increase of 47.26 percent in 17 years.

Once you have qualified for this exemption, you will receive a verification form by mail each April. You verify that the address is still your personal residence and that your income does not exceed the new income limitation.

The one-page application form is available at the SRS office or online at www.valleywater.org. You will need to attach a copy of your driver's license or some other document to prove your age. Don't delay; the application is due by June 30.

Note: The Senior Resource Services (SRS) office hours for drop-in assistance are Monday, Wednesday and Friday from 10 a.m. to noon. The SRS office is in the Cribari Center across from the Post Office. You may also leave a message at 408-239-5253. The purpose of SRS is to provide education and general business and financial information. All assistance is free and confidential. You should ask your professional advisor about your individual situation.

Stop by the VMA's history display at Fiesta Time

It's The Villages 50th Anniversary and the Villages Medical Auxiliary (VMA) is joining the festivities by honoring our donors. Stop by the Cribari Center Terrace Room, Saturday, April 29 between 11 a.m. and 3 p.m. Visit our history display showing 41 years of VMA service to our community. Meet former and current volunteers. Check out the various types of medical equipment we loan Villagers and get your blood pressure checked.

The VMA was formed just nine years after the Villages' first residents moved in. The model used was hospital auxiliaries. The year was 1976 and the first service offered was monthly blood pressure checks. This is now a weekly service.

Through donations of money and medical equipment, the VMA gradually accumulated wheel chairs, walkers, crutches, etc. A storage facility was obtained and the loan of equipment free to Villagers began.

In 1992 funds were raised and arrangements made with the Visiting Nurse Association to have a part-time nurse at the Villages. This proved to be very helpful. However, soon it was apparent that most of her work was assessing residents' needs rather than providing care. The VMA decided a social worker might better provide these assessments.

In 1994 the nurse's services were discontinued and the VMA now supports, through donations, the contract for a professional social services coordinator to link Villagers and your families with community services. Services include: referrals for alternate transportation, caregivers, housekeepers and assisted living facilities; aid to families after the death of a loved one; home welfare checks and more. In addition, the social services coordinator organizes health-based speakers and workshops.

None of these services would be possible without Villager financial support through donations. Join us April 29 in recognizing those Villagers whose contributions enable the VMA to provide much needed services to our community.
