Update from the GM Search Committee

The application deadline closed April 28. The GM Search Committee reviewed the applications as they were submitted using an assessment sheet developed by the committee. We received 37 applications. One of the important criteria for candidates moving forward in the process is community management experience, including management of complex communities with multifunction facilities, i.e., condominiums, recreational facilities, food and beverage. Thirteen qualified candidates met this criteria.

This week the search committee sent a questionnaire to the candidates. The questionnaire is designed to give the committee more information about the candidates' experience and management style. The candidates have a week to return the questionnaire. After evaluating the questionnaires, the committee will schedule telephone interviews.

The committees' timeline has it completing its work the middle of June at which time the committee will turn its list of qualified candidates over to the Club Board for further evaluation.

2017 Annual Meetings of the Membership and Votes

The three Villages Corporations (Club, Association, and Homeowners Corporation) are preparing for this year's annual membership meetings and votes. Votes will be conducted in May and June, and this year's annual meetings will be held on Wednesday, June 14 at 4 p.m. in the Villages Clubhouse.

The Villager newspaper is now publishing candidate statements and candidate questions and answers. This year, for all three corporations, directors will be elected by acclamation. However, per the governing documents, notices for the membership meetings will be sent to all members and included will be the ballots for the ballot resolution Excess Membership Income Over Membership Expenses Refunded to Members. An approval vote of these resolutions will enable the corporations to avoid income tax on operating surpluses by refunding these surpluses to the membership in the form of assessment reduction in accordance with IRS Revenue Ruling 70-604.

In addition, The Villages Homeowners' Corporation, will be conducting a separate vote on updating its governing documents.

Club: There will be two director vacancies on the Club Board. Those who will continue to serve during the ensuing year are Howie Blumstein, Rick Casey, Debbie Champion, Mike Poellot, and Wayne Weiler. The Club Nominating Committee has announced Jim Neill and Robert "Bob" Wilk as its candidate nominations, and both will be elected by acclamation with terms to begin June 14 and that expire in June 2020.

Association: On the Association Board, there will also be two director vacancies. Those who will continue to serve during the ensuing year are Garry Ashby, Sherry Benz, John Campbell, Brooks Fuller, Peter Nicholls, and Bob Wilk. The Association Nominating Committee announced Matthew Giordono and Frank Veloz as its candidate nominations, and both will be elected by acclamation with terms to begin June 14 and expire in June 2020.

The Association Board has set May 1, 2017 as the Record Date (Bylaws Section 3.6) for the 2017 Director Election. Only those members in the records of the Association on May 1, 2017, shall be entitled to notice and only members in good standing as of the record date shall be entitled to vote.

Homeowners: As with the Club and Association, the Homeowners' Corporation Board, will have two director vacancies. Those who will continue to serve during the ensuing year are Mike Kane, Julian Rodriguez, and Greg Stewart. Teddy Morse and Jeannie Omel have declared their candidacies, and will be elected by acclamation with terms to begin June 14 and that expire in June 2020.

All ballot packages are scheduled to be distributed May 12 with the deadline of Monday, June 12, at 8 a.m. for the return of ballots. Ballot counting will take place in an open meeting on Tuesday, June 13 at 9:30 a.m. in Vineyard Center, and the results are to be announced the following day, Wednesday, June 14 at the annual meetings.

Along with voting, your Boards encourage you to attend the Annual Meetings of the Members on Wednesday, June 14 at 4 p.m. in the Clubhouse. After the conclusion of the meetings, members will be treated to a community celebration with refreshments.

FROM THE VILLAGES GOLF COMMITTEE

Golf Club volunteers increase play and revenue

As a private country club, the Villages golf membership generates a significant amount of business for our golf course. Volunteers organize weekly golf days for our members and in some cases, guests. Revenue from these volunteer efforts exceeds \$300,000 a year.

Men's Games: George Olsen – Organizes a Saturday morning game that now typically puts 64-70 golfers on our course weekly. This is open to all Men's Club members, Villagers, and may include guests. Roy Crews – Organizes a Monday/Tuesday (Monday if possible – Tuesday if there's a Monday conflict for course maintenance or conflicting play) game similar to the Saturday game (above) typically with 40-48 golfers – open to Men's Club members, Villagers, and may include guests. Jim Holt/Dave Needham – Organize a Wednesday morning game similar to the above with 32-40 golfers. The 9-Hole Pinseekers play on Tuesday. The Par 3 Ironmen play on Thursday.

Women's Games: Betty Sharps and Ann Crews organize 18-hole play. Patty Hayes organizes 18-hole play. Diana Hallock organizes the Working Women's 18-hole play on Saturdays. Teddy Morse organizes Par 3 play on Thursdays. 18-Hole Women's Club has a shotgun on Thursdays. 9-hole Swingers have a shotgun on Tuesdays. Par 3 Shonis also have a shotgun on Tuesdays.

Though we are always working to increase play on our courses, it's heartening to see the extent of the play of our current membership and the revenue this play generates.

Free CPR/AED Class on May 13

The Villages' Emergency Preparedness Committee (EPC) will offer a free American Red Cross CPR/AED class on May 13, from 8:45 a.m. to 1 p.m. in the Cribari Conference Room. This is a half-day class and only covers CPR and the use of AED devices. It does not cover First Aid topics which are typically covered in the full day Red Cross class on CPR/AED plus First Aid. Class size is limited.

AED (Automatic External Defibrillator) devices are available at eight locations throughout The Villages, including our pools, gym, and Clubhouse. AEDs are designed to be used with CPR to help heart attack victims. Upon completing this class, you will receive an American Red Cross Certificate of Completion for CPR/AED, which is valid for two years.

Frequently Asked Comcast Questions:

1. Why wasn't my district listed in the paper?

A: Due to the size of the Villages we are deploying a phased approach, this way we can ensure that your experience goes as smoothly as possible. Rest assured that we will get to you should you need assistance with this process. Comcast is committed to ensuring this is a great experience for the Villagers. Please keep an eye out on the paper as your district will be announced as the schedule is updated monthly. You can also check the office and Cribari Center bulletin boards for the event calendar dates.

2. What will I need to bring?

A: Nothing is needed for these events. You will simply provide Comcast with your address and phone number and we will schedule a tech appointment for you to swap out your equipment.

3. What if I am unable to make the event that is designate for my district?

A: After Comcast has completed all the district's events, they will be back on site and will host a list of events of varying times to catch anyone they missed.

4. Do I have to wait for the events or can I swap my equipment out now?

A: For your convenience, Comcast will be on site to schedule the appointments for you. However, you are more than welcome to schedule your own appointments and upgrade your equipment by calling our designated Bulk Services Call Center at 1-855-307-4896. (Additional fees may apply if you do not wait for your scheduled village swap-out event.)

5. Should I bring my old equipment?

A: No. Please leave all old equipment at home.

6. What is the purpose of this event?

A: This event is strictly to set appointments for technicians to come out to your unit and swap out your equipment with the updated equipment.

7. What if I don't want to schedule an appointment and I want to install it myself?

A: We will have Self-Install Kits available, too, for you during our events, or you can visit your local Xfinity Store and swap out your old equipment there. Please note you will only be able to do a Self-Install Kit for your Internet services. All X1 boxes will be installed by a tech.

HIKING CLUB SCHEDULE

Unless otherwise indicated, all hikes meet at Cribari Center at 8:30 a.m. and depart at 8:45 a.m.

Saturday, May 6: Nancy Rumple at 408-238-7535 will lead the long hikers on a 10 mile hike along the Sierra Vista Trail and on the Lower Caleveras Fault Trail. We'll walk through the Estates to Yerba Buena, then head up and over the hill to the Silver Creak Linear Park - Picnic Meadow. From there we'll show you the "Angel"...you may want to bring a pair of binoculars! On the way home, we will stop for coffee at Starbuck's or an early lunch at one of the restaurants.




Celebrate July 4th-50th Anniversary Style

Private tour and exhibit at SFMOMA

Here is the outing you have been waiting for—Tuesday, May 23, is the day to go see the beautiful San Francisco Museum of Modern Art (SFMOMA). We will depart the Villages at 8:45 a.m. and return to the Villages by 5 p.m. The cost per person is \$70. This includes museum entry, exhibit, tour and transportation. SFMOMA will be splitting us in two groups so you can get the most out of the private tour of Doris and Donald Fisher exhibits, followed by the Matisse/Diebenkorn exhibit and tour. Registration begins on Monday, April 10, in the Community Resource Center, Building B.

The tour of the Doris and Donald Fisher Collection at SFMOMA guides visitors through the Fisher Collection galleries, located throughout the building. Founders of San Francisco-based Gap, Inc., the Fishers have had a lifelong love of modern and contemporary art, which shines through in multiple exhibitions drawn from their holdings. Select additional works from the museum's collection add depth and context. Notable stops include the focused exhibition, Alexander Calder: Motion Lab, four galleries dedicated to Ellsworth Kelly, and the diverse works of Gerhard Richter.

Presenting a new view of two of the 20th century's most extraordinary painters, Matisse/Diebenkorn is the first major exhibition to explore the profound inspiration Richard Diebenkorn (1922–1993) found in the work of Henri Matisse (1869–1954). It brings together 100 extraordinary paintings and drawings—40 by Matisse and 60 by Diebenkorn—that reveal the connections between the two artists in subject, style, color, and technique.

The exhibition unfolds across the arc of Diebenkorn's career—from early abstractions, through his Bay Area figurative years, to his majestic Ocean Park series—all in direct dialogue with works he knew and admired by Matisse. Diebenkorn grew up in San Francisco and first discovered Matisse as a Stanford University art student in the early 1940s. Over the next four decades, he pursued a serious study of the great French modernist's work, drawing from his example to forge a style entirely his own.

You will be able to eat either at SFMOMA or at one of the eateries in the area of Yerba Buena Gardens. Yerba Buena Gardens, the crown jewel of San Francisco, is within walking distance of SFMOMA for you to enjoy the gardens, visit the Martin Luther King Jr. Memorial, 120-gallon waterfall, several fountains and much more. The Jewish Contemporary Museum has also opened in the Yerba Buena Gardens. You don't want to miss your chance to see this!

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

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Attention Single-Family HomeownersBallots are coming!

At the request of our homeowners, your Board has been working for several years to update our CC&Rs and Bylaws to comply with current law. We are pleased to tell you that your Board completed its work with the Corporation's legal counsel to update the existing CC&Rs (Declaration of Covenants, Conditions and Restrictions) and Bylaws to comply with current law. We now need your "Yes" vote to complete the project.

In November 2016, a Homeowners' Informational Forum was held to give all singlefamily homeowners an opportunity to hear a presentation by the attorney concerning the proposed amended documents, ask questions and provide comments. The forum was well-attended, and those in attendance were engaged and some members suggested changes to the documents. The Board considered all comments made and decided it was appropriate to make additional changes to the documents.

On May 7 we will distribute the vote package for the updated Second Amended and Restated CC&Rs and Bylaws. This package will include the most recent draft of the updated governing documents.

Again, the Board's primary goal in amending the existing documents is to update the documents to comply with current law and industry practice.

Bylaws: Changes in the updated Bylaws include revisions to Article 4, entitled "Membership Voting." Article 4 was rewritten to require that all membership votes be conducted by secret written ballot using a double envelope system. This is a change from the current Bylaws that mandate that membership votes may be conducted at either a membership meeting or via "written ballot." One reason the Board made this change is because the Homeowners' Corporation has been using the secret written ballot and double envelope system for all membership votes for many years, and believes it is best to continue that practice. In addition, the Association and Club conduct their votes using a double en-

velope system, and the Board believes it appropriate that its voting procedures conform to the way the Association and Club conduct their votes.

CC&Rs: Section 3.20 was revised to provide that "only lots greater than one-half (1/2) acre may be subdivided, subject to approval of the city, the Architectural Control Committee, the Board, and a majority of the Total Voting Power of the Corporation." The lot that contains "the Mansion" is the only one that is bigger than one-half (1/2) acre and the Board wants to make sure that the membership has a vote on whether that lot can be subdivided in the future.

Changes were made to Sections 7.3.3 ("Front Setback Requirements") and Section 7.3.4 ("Side Setback Requirements") to update the front setback and side setback measurements and insert the names of the affected "Village" (e.g., "Village Hermosa") after the tract number.

The governing document amendment vote ballot deadline will be the same deadline as the annual meeting ballot deadline, Monday, June 12, 2017, at 8 a.m.

The Board believes that the proposed governing documents are in the best interest of all Corporation Members. If you have questions, you are encouraged to contact your Homeowners' Board (President Burt Lancaster, Vice President Teddy Morse, Secretary Julian Rodriguez, CFO Greg Stewart or Assistant CFO Mike Kane) or Interim General Manager Julia Meadows. The Board has also scheduled an informational open house on Thursday, May 18 from 5 to 6:30 p.m. in the Fairway Room at the Clubhouse where members are encouraged to attend and ask questions. (There will be refreshments.)

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
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

Tips From the Pro: Going to the beach isn't always fun. Greenside bunker shots can be difficult, especially if the bunkers are designed with tall lips like ours at The Villages. Here are a few thoughts to help you escape those deep greenside bunkers: 1. Be aggressive—a tentative swing doesn't work in the sand. 2. Use a Sand Wedge or Lob Wedge. They are designed with lots of loft, a wider sole and more bounce; perfect for sand. 3. Open the clubface-you want the bounce on the sole to hit the sand first NOT the leading edge. 4. Set up for a greenside bunker shot: Wide stance, hands low, ball position forward, weight in left hip. 5. Aim and hit 1 inch to 3 inches behind the ball. Don't look at the ball, look at your spot.

The greenside sand shot is the only shot in golf in which we do not hit the ball. We hit behind the ball and project the ball out with all of the sand around and under the ball. Why don't we hit the ball first? Because sand is light and airy and not compact like soil, so the ball does not compress against the clubface in the sand like it does on the turf.



Turf Rejuvenation Program continues

In October, the Association Board approved a community wide turf rejuvenation program at a cost of \$198,383. The work entails slit-seeding (a planting process) roughly 30 acres of common area with Tall Fescue grass. This work is the second part of a two-part project intended to fill in community turf areas that have either died, or have become infested with noxious grasses or weeds over time due to the most recent drought period.

The first step of the preparation process for a slit-seeding program like this is to kill all the weeds and noxious grasses (in all 30 acres). Round Up will be used to achieve the objective (signs and notices will be posted). This means that many turf areas in the community will brown out, and they will stay that was for a couple of weeks before the seeding process can take place. Even then, please keep in mind that it will take time for the grass to grow in, so areas will look sparse for a couple months. (Mowing and day watering schedules will be adjusted accordingly.)

Strategy: Since there are 4 trumps out including the Queen, play 1 round of trumps and see if the Queen falls on the Ace before trying a finesse. Next set up the Hearts.

West leads 4 of Diamonds, East, the Queen, South covers with the Ace, switches to the Ace of Spades and is very happy to see a singleton Queen. He proceeds with the King, and a low Spade to the Jack on the board. He then plays a Heart to the King in his hand, then another Heart, West, the Jack, South covers with the Queen from the board, and East wins with the Ace. He then leads a low Club, South uses the Ace from the board, continues with a Club to the King in his hand, and now follows with his last Club and trumps it on the board. He cashes in the good 10 of Hearts, then leads a Diamond, trumps it in his hand. South now has two cards left, a good Heart and a trump. Great. The contract is made with 2 overtricks. Really the slam is not biddable. It just happened due to the distribution of the cards.

* This is a preemptive bid showing a good six-card suit in Diamonds, Hearts, or Spades with 6 to 10 HCP.

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

New IRS program = possible new scams

New scams are predicted because of a new IRS program. Starting this month, the IRS will begin sending letters to a relatively small group of taxpayers whose overdue federal tax accounts are being assigned to one of four private-sector collection agencies. SRS discussed this new IRS program in an article in December 2016.

Taxpayers being assigned to a private collection firm will have had multiple contacts from the IRS in previous years and still have an unpaid tax bill. The IRS will notify a taxpayer before transferring their account to a private collection agency.

Once the IRS letter is sent, the designated private firm will send its own letter to the taxpayer confirming the account transfer. To protect the taxpayer's privacy and security, both the IRS letter and the collection firm's letter will contain information that will help taxpayers identify the tax amount owed and assure taxpayers that future collection agency calls they may receive are legitimate.

Unfortunately, with new programs will come new scams. Be on the lookout for scammers posing as private collection firms for the IRS. The real collection firms will only be working with taxpayers who have had a tax debt for years and have previously been contacted by the IRS about their account transfer.

If you are unsure if you have an unpaid tax debt from a previous year, which is what the private collection firms will handle, you can go to IRS.gov and check your account balance: www.irs.gov/balancedue. If the account balance is zero, that means nothing is due and you should not be getting a contact from the IRS or a private collection firm. Ignore any calls or letters purporting to be collecting your supposed debt.

The SRS office is in the Cribari Center across from the Post Office. You may also leave a message at 408-239-5253. The purpose of SRS is to provide education and general business and financial information. All assistance is free and confidential. You should ask your professional advisor about your individual situation.

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

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How to keep your brain in tip-top shape

Village resident Dr. Judith London is presenting a workshop on how to keep your brain in tip-top shape, Wednesday, May 10, from 10 a.m. to noon in the Cribari Conference Room. Just like we exercise to keep our bodies in shape and thus maintain our mobility as we age, exercising our brain is important to slow the process of memory loss.

Dr. London is a licensed psychologist who has conducted individual and group therapy for more than 30 years. She has written the booklet, "How to Keep Your Brain in Tip-Top Shape," a natural outgrowth of her investigations into memory research after writing "Connecting the Dots: Breakthroughs in Communication as Alzheimer's Advances" and "Support for Alzheimer's and Dementia Caregivers: The Unsung Heroes."

"People are living longer than ever before. Naturally, everyone wants to maintain a sharp brain as well as a healthy body and make those golden years worthwhile," she said. A brief explanation of memory followed by some of the 33 tips she has compiled will be included in this Villages Medical Auxiliary (VMA) presentation.

Dr. London has been an adjunct professor at New York University, a trainer and workshop leader in the areas of dementia and communication, managing stress, keeping your brain in tip-top shape, and a featured columnist on recovery from addiction. Currently, she leads the Memory Caregivers Support Group here at the Villages and at an Alzheimer's residence.
