2017 Annual Meetings of the Membership and Votes

The three Villages Corporations (Club, Association, and Homeowners Corporation) are preparing for this year's annual membership meetings and votes. Votes will be conducted in May and June, and this year's annual meetings will be held on Wednesday, June 14 at 4 p.m. in the Villages Clubhouse.

The Villager newspaper is now publishing candidate statements and candidate questions and answers. This year, for all three corporations, directors will be elected by acclamation. However, per the governing documents, notices for the membership meetings will be sent to all members and included will be the ballots for the ballot resolution Excess Membership Income Over Membership Expenses Refunded to Members. An approval vote of these resolutions will enable the corporations to avoid income tax on operating surpluses by refunding these surpluses to the membership in the form of assessment reduction in accordance with IRS Revenue Ruling 70-604.

In addition, The Villages Homeowners' Corporation, will be conducting a separate vote on updating its governing documents.

Club: There will be two director vacancies on the Club Board. Those who will continue to serve during the ensuing year are Howie Blumstein, Rick Casey, Debbie Champion, Mike Poellot, and Wayne Weiler. The Club Nominating Committee has announced Jim Neill and Robert "Bob" Wilk as its candidate nominations, and both will be elected by acclamation with terms to begin June 14 and expire in June 2020.

Association: On the Association Board, there will also be two director vacancies. Those who will continue to serve during the ensuing year are Garry Ashby, Sherry Benz, John Campbell, Brooks Fuller and Peter Nicholls. The Association Nominating Committee announced Matthew Giordono and Frank Veloz as its candidate nominations, and both will be elected by acclamation with terms to begin June 14 and expire in June 2020.

The Association Board has set May 1, 2017 as the Record Date (Bylaws Section 3.6) for the 2017 Director Election. Only those members in the records of the Association on May 1, 2017, shall be entitled to notice and only members in good standing as of the record date shall be entitled to vote.

Homeowners: As with the Club and Association, the Homeowners' Corporation Board will have two director vacancies. Those who will continue to serve during the ensuing year are Mike Kane, Julian Rodriguez, and Greg Stewart. Teddy Morse and Jeannie Omel have declared their candidacies, and will be elected by acclamation with terms to begin June 14 and expire in June 2020.

All ballot packages are scheduled to be distributed May 12, with the deadline of Monday, June 12, at 8 a.m. for the return of ballots. Ballot counting will take place in an open meeting on Tuesday, June 13 at 9:30 a.m. in Vineyard Center, and the results are to be announced the following day, Wednesday, June 14 at the annual meetings.

Along with voting, your Boards encourage you to attend the Annual Meetings of the Members on Wednesday, June 14 at 4 p.m. in the Clubhouse. After the conclusion of the meetings, members will be treated to a community celebration with refreshments.

Public Safety/Fire Department/EMS

How does the process work when you have a medical emergency? Should you call 9-1-1 or Public Safety? How is Public Safety notified when 9-1-1 is called?

When you have a medical emergency, you should immediately call 9-1-1. After you call 9-1-1, the dispatcher will notify Station 11, or another Station near The Villages. Your Public Safety Officers assigned to the Plaza monitor San Jose Fire Department's scanner. When they hear Station 11 or an address within The Villages, they immediately dispatch a Public Safety Officer to the address in question. We will open the residence and address the medical emergency pending the arrival of the Fire Department and EMS. Once the Fire Department arrives on scene, they take over the medical responsibilities. The Public Safety Officer will then return to the Plaza to escort the EMS ambulance to the residence.

If you call the Plaza requesting an officer due to a fall or injury, an officer will respond to the call. Once on scene, if the officer deems the situation requires an additional medical response, he will call 9-1-1.

All of your Public Safety Officers are CPR/AED and First Aid trained. The officer on patrol has a triage medical kit and an AED within the Public Safety patrol vehicle.

4. Do I have to wait for the events or can I swap my equipment out now?

A: For your convenience, Comcast will be on site to schedule the appointments for you. However, you are more than welcome to schedule your own appointments and upgrade your equipment by calling our designated Bulk Services Call Center at 1-855-307-4896. (Additional fees may apply if you do not wait for your scheduled village swap-out event.)

5. Should I bring my old equipment?

A: No. Please leave all old equipment at home.

6. What is the purpose of this event?

A: This event is strictly to set appointments for technicians



Mary and I moved to the Villages in 2012 and since retiring in 2013, I have been actively involved in the Governance of the Association, first as a member of the Hermosa DAC and then as ABOD Treasurer.

Fiscal Management has always been important to me both in my career as a Program Manager, where I was responsible for P&L, then on the Hermosa DAC and the ABOD. On both, I

managed to save money; on the DAC, I saved over \$3,000 on electricity that was incorrectly billed and on the ABOD, through the buyout of the Montgomery Loan, Montgomery saved money and earned the Association over \$62,000 in tax free interest, over the life of the investment.

As Treasurer, I have also endeavored to actively direct both the operational and reserve budgets to minimize HOA increases.

I was also active on the Utilities Cost Containment Committee (now part of the Technical Advisory Committee), which was responsible for the Club Solar. I have also championed solar on condo roofs (which is still work in progress).


construction company). It was in San Francisco where I met my wife, Geri. We raised our three children in Walnut Creek and now have four grandchildren.

Question 2: What are the most important issues for the Club Board to consider and how are you prepared to handle them?

Jim Neill

The most important issue for the Club Board is to finalize the selection of the new General Manager, and, after he joins the Villages, to integrate him as team leader into the existing staff structure and the community.

As a member of the GM Search Committee, I am pleased to advise that we have a very strong list of well qualified candidates that the committee is reviewing. We are currently assessing their responses to written questions we have sent them. Through this process we anticipate reducing the number of candidates who we will telephone interview and then interview face to face. However, the final decision on the appointment of the GM will be made by the Club Board from a shortlist submitted by the committee.

Once the Club has made its decision, it may be several months before the new GM is on board since he may have to work out his notice period with his existing employer.

As soon as he arrives, I envision a period of Integration Training by Senior Staff and the Boards into the way the Villages operates and the responsibilities of staff and the GM. We are fortunate to have a very experienced team of season managers, led by Julia Meadows in her role as Interim General manager, to co-ordinate this training as well as to run the Villages in the interim. The other important issue is the operational budget of 2018-2019. We have been very fortunate in the current budget cycle where we have benefited from some positive contributions to the operational budget; (no increase in landscape costs, overestimate last year in water increases, reduction in insurance premium etc.). We are extremely unlikely to benefit from such factors next year and costs are likely to increase due to rising interest rates and inflation; the board will have to work hard to minimize the impact upon assessments.

Robert "Bob" Wilk

There are two issues I consider important:

The first is to openly receive the new General Manager and help guide him/her towards a smooth transition as quickly as practical.

The second is to continue with improving the Villages. As I have learned, it is not possible to remain as you are. You are either moving forward or falling behind. For the Villages, "falling behind" would mean a downward spiral with outdated facilities and a deteriorating reputation, resulting in lower home prices. "Moving forward" should be accomplished in a well planned, controlled manner, to avoid cost surprises; leading to a vibrant community. What we do, how we do it, and when we do it is an issue worthy of this Board and future Board's consideration.

The Villages is celebrating its 50th anniversary this year. This shows that we have had good management over the years, but it also points out that we have aging condos, facilities and infrastructure. The Association Board is responsible for the management of the condos and related common areas, and, the maintenance of condo common elements such as exterior walls, roofs and landscaping.

The most important recurring issue that I see is to ensure that adequate *funding* is in place to perform required maintenance and repair. I have experience working with our Controller and others on Villages budgets.

Second, the Association carries property damage and liability *insurance* for all buildings in the condo areas. I have experience working with the three Boards on insurance and will be up to speed when annual policy renewals are considered.

Third, the Association shall have an annual review or *audit* of its books and financial statements, which is conducted by a public accountant. This is to verify that our financial procedures are sound and in accordance with our CCRs. I will have input to the process and will ask questions during the exit briefing. In general, I will establish good working relationships with other Board members, DAC's, residents and staff and work diligently with the best long term interests of Villagers in mind.

Attention Single-Family Homeowners-Please vote!

At the request of our homeowners, your Board has been working for several years to update our CC&Rs and Bylaws to comply with current law. We are pleased to tell you that your Board completed its work with the Corporation's legal counsel to update the existing CC&Rs (Declaration of Covenants, Conditions and Restrictions) and Bylaws to comply with current law. We now need your "Yes" vote to complete the project.

In November 2016, a Homeowners' Informational Forum was held to give all singlefamily homeowners an opportunity to hear a presentation by the attorney concerning the proposed amended documents, ask questions and provide comments. The forum was well-attended, those in attendance were engaged, and some members suggested changes to the documents. The Board considered all comments made and decided it was appropriate to make additional changes to the documents.

On May 7 the vote packages were distributed for the updated Second Amended and Restated CC&Rs and Bylaws. This package will include the most recent draft of the updated governing documents.

Again, the Board's primary goal in amending the existing documents is to update the documents to comply with current law and industry practice.

Bylaws: Changes in the updated Bylaws include revisions to Article 4, entitled "Membership Voting." Article 4 was rewritten to require that all membership votes be conducted by secret written ballot using a double envelope system. This is a change from the current Bylaws mandate that membership votes be conducted at either a membership meeting or via "written ballot." One reason the Board made this change is because the Homeowners' Corporation has been using the secret written ballot and double envelope system for all membership votes for many years, and believes it is best to continue that practice. In addition, the Association and Club conduct their votes using a double envelope system, and the Board believes it appropriate that its voting procedures conform to the way the Association and Club conduct their votes.

(Continued from page 13) CC&Rs: Section 3.20 was revised to provide that "only lots greater than one-half (1/2) acre may be subdivided, subject to approval of the city, the Architectural Control Committee, the Board, and a majority of the Total Voting Power of the Corporation." The lot that contains "the Mansion" is the only one that is bigger than one-half (1/2) acre and the Board wants to make sure that the membership has a vote on whether that lot can be subdivided in the future.

Changes were made to Sections 7.3.3 ("Front Setback Requirements") and Section 7.3.4 ("Side Setback Requirements") to update the front setback and side setback measurements and insert the names of the affected "Village" (e.g., "Village Hermosa") after the tract number.

The governing document amendment vote ballot deadline will be the same deadline as the annual meeting ballot deadline, Monday, June 12, 2017, at 8 a.m.

The Board believes that the proposed governing documents are in the best interest of all Corporation Members. If you have questions, you are encouraged to contact your Homeowners' Board (President Burt Lancaster, Vice President Teddy Morse, Secretary Julian Rodriguez, CFO Greg Stewart or Assistant CFO Mike Kane) or Interim General Manager Julia Meadows The Board has also scheduled an informational open house on Thursday, May 18 from 5 to 6:30 p.m. in the Fairway Room at the Clubhouse where members are encouraged to attend and ask questions. (There will be refreshments.)

Question 2: What are the most important issues for the Homeowners' Board to consider and how are you prepared to handle them?

Theodora "Teddy" Morse

The most important issue for the Homeowners' Corporation Board is completion of the update of our governing documents and an affirmative vote by our members. Communicating the importance of this vote and explaining the updates to our members and the benefits of these updates is critical.

The updated documents bring us in compliance with current law and remove any references to the Davis Stirling Act, which governs condominium developments. The Homeowners' Corporation is governed by corporate law.

The updates specify that elections are to be held by secret written ballot and clarify property setbacks and maximum height restrictions by Village as well as track number. The setbacks and maximum height restrictions apply only to new construction. Current homes are grandfathered in and thus can be reconstructed after being destroyed or damaged by fire or other casualty. I, along with my fellow board members, met numerous times to review the governing documents word for word with input from an attorney to make sure that they comply with the law and meet the needs of our community. Through this process I've become well versed in the documents, and the knowledge I've gained will benefit our homeowners.

Jeannie Omel

Most homeowners move into The Villages because they are seeking a private, tranquil, safe community in which they can still own and care for a home.



On the second Sunday in May we celebrate Mother's Day. It is one of our nicest and most cherished customs.



is determined by the best five holes with half the handicap subtracted, then ranked. That is how the ties are broken. There will occasionally be real ties.

Before play, Scott and Hannah reviewed Rule 26 - Water Hazards. The focus for May was lateral hazards. At the Villages, there are lateral hazards on 1, 6, 7,11, 16 and 17. The hazard boundary is indicated by the red stakes. The ball is considered in the hazard if the ball lies inside the line of the stakes. If the ball is in the water, the option is to mark the path of entry into the water and to drop the ball within two club-lengths of and not nearer to the hole. If the path is blocked you may select a point on the opposite margin of the water hazard equidistant from the hole. There is a one stroke penalty. The other option, if the ball is not in the water, is to play the ball from the hazard. There is not a penalty for this course of action although footing and ball location can be challenging.

Mark your calendars and invite your outside golfing friends to the Invitational. This is always a fun and worthwhile event. The deadline for registration is May 23. The fee is \$85. This is a great value, not only do you get a great day of golf. You and your guest will have breakfast before play begins, an actually useful memento of the event - no more clubs left on the course, and a lovely High Tee. 



Tips from the Pro:

High Launch – Low Spin - Driving the ball for distance is something we all strive to do. Driving the ball long is one of the biggest advantages anyone can have in golf. With today's radar based measuring devices, we have determined that a driver ball flight with High Launch and Low Spin is the best combination for distance. The absolute best combination is 14-17 degree launch angle with an 1800-2200 spin rate. Go ahead and try something new. Try to attain numbers that equate to higher launch and lower spin for you. We can measure this with our launch monitor here at The Villages.

How do you attain higher flight and lower spin? Try a 12 degree or 13 degree driver. Try a lighter shaft with a lower kick point. Try to tee it higher and tilt your right shoulder and hit up on it more. Try a lower spinning golf ball. Try a driver with a lower center of gravity that is

Turf Rejuvenation Program continues

In October, the Association Board approved a community wide turf rejuvenation program at a cost of \$198,383. The work entails slit-seeding (a planting process) roughly 30 acres of common area with Tall Fescue grass. This work is the second part of a two-part project intended to fill in community turf areas that have either died, or have become infested with noxious grasses or weeds, over time due to the most recent drought period.

The first step of the preparation process for a slit-seeding program like this is to kill all the weeds and noxious grasses (in all 30 acres). Round Up will be used to achieve the objective (signs and notices will be posted). This means that many turf areas in the community will brown out, and they will stay that way for a couple of weeks before the seeding process can take place. Even then, please remember that it will take time for the grass to grow in, so areas will look sparse for a couple of months. (Mowing and day watering schedules will be adjusted accordingly.)





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

Uncle Sam's spending

With tax filing season officially over, many taxpayers are asking themselves, "Where are my tax dollars going?"

To answer this question, below is a Taxpayer Receipt showing how each \$100 of your tax was spent in 2016.

This list was prepared by the Committee for a Responsible Federal Budget, a nonpartisan and non-profit group in Washington that monitors federal spending. The group's three chairmen are Republican Mitch Daniels, Democrat Leon Panetta and Independent Tim Penny.


Note that half of all federal spending is for Social Security benefits, supplemental benefits and health programs such as Medicare and Medi-Cal.

The above tax figures include all federal revenue. The individual income tax provided nearly half the total (47 percent), while payroll taxes contributed about 34 percent. The rest of the federal revenue came from corporate income tax (9 percent) and the remainder from levies such as customs duties and excise taxes (10 percent).

Revenue from taxes does not cover all the government's expenditures. In 2016 for each \$100 of taxes spent, the amount of \$15.24 was borrowed to cover the deficit in current spending.

June 30 is the deadline to request an exemption from the water district parcel tax. This tax is labeled SCVWD Safe Clean Water on your property tax bill. To qualify for the exemption you must be at least 65 years old as of June 30, 2018 (the end of the next County fiscal year) and your 2016 household income, including social security, must be below \$48,375. The income limit is inflation indexed so some Villagers who once did not qualify, may now file for the exemption. Applications are available at the SRS office.
