Attention residents: Please note the X1 Platform Box requires Xfinity Internet service. For residents who do not have Xfinity Internet, and would like to upgrade to our X1 Platform box, please take advantage and sign up during the scheduled Comcast events. For those who already have Xfinity Internet, please come down and ensure you have the most updated equipment. We look forward to assisting you all!

## Schedule of Xfinity Voluntary Box Swap-Out Events

As Comcast mentioned during its Town Hall events in February, representatives will be back on site to assist residents with swapping out their old Comcast equipment. Comcast team members will be working with and through each village individually. (See schedule below.) **Please ONLY come to the designated event on your village's day.** For some villages there will be more than one date to choose from. There will also be make-up days scheduled in the future.

For residents living in Olivas, Highlands (excluding single-family homes), Montgomery, and Cribari districts, please feel free to come at your leisure between the allotted time frames on your event days. There is no formal presentation at 1 p.m., Comcast will strictly be doing individual account reviews and scheduling appointments as needed. As we begin working with our larger districts, please check the schedule for which day is designated for your house number.

**Make-Up Days** will be incorporated into the last hour of our Cribari district event days. If you missed us during your designated district day and had any questions for us, please stop by at your leisure between 3 to 4 p.m. Tuesday, June 20; Thursday, June 22; and Friday, June 23.

Attention Villagers—Please note: In order to get Comcast's updated X1 Platform Box and voice-activated remote, you need to have Comcast's Performance Internet services. Comcast is onsite as a courtesy to assist with upgrades and waiving installation fees. There is no formal presentation as Comcast will strictly be doing individual account reviews. If you are unable to attend these events, you can call into the Dedicated Bulk Call Center at 1-855-307-4896. If you schedule an installation through the call center and not through attending an onsite Comcast event, you will be charged the installation fee. If you have attended an event and an installation charge appears on your bill, please wait to see your credit on the following billing cycle."

## Frequently Asked Comcast Questions:

1. Why wasn't my district listed in the paper?

**A:** Due to the size of the Villages, we are deploying a phased approach. This way we can ensure that your experience goes as smoothly as possible. Rest assured that we will get to you should you need assistance with this process. Comcast is committed to ensuring this is a great experience for the Villagers. Please keep an eye out on the paper as your district will be announced when the schedule is updated monthly. You can also check the office and Cribari Center bulletin boards for the event calendar dates.

2. What will I need to bring?

**A:** Nothing is needed for these events. You will simply provide Comcast with your address and phone number and we will schedule a tech appointment for you to swap out your equipment.

3. What if I am unable to make the event that is designated for my district?
A: After Comcast has completed all the district's events, they will be back on site and will host a list of events at varying times to catch anyone they missed.

4. Do I have to wait for the events or can I swap my equipment out now?

A: For your convenience, Comcast will be on site to schedule the appointments for you. However, you are more than welcome to schedule your own appointments and upgrade your equipment by calling our designated Bulk Services Call Center at 1-855-307-4896. (Additional fees may apply if you do not wait for your scheduled village swap-out event.)

5. Should I bring my old equipment?

A: No. Please leave all old equipment at home.

6. What is the purpose of this event?

**A:** This event is strictly to set appointments for technicians to come out to your unit and swap out your equipment with the updated equipment.

7. What if I don't want to schedule an appointment and I want to install it myself?

**A:** We will have Self-Install Kits available, too, for you during our events, or you can visit your local Xfinity Store and swap out your old equipment there. Please note you will only be able to do a Self-Install Kit for your Internet services. All X1 boxes will be installed by a tech.

## Donate your glasses, hearing aids, cell phones

The Villages Medical Auxiliary

Wondering what to do with your old prescription glasses, hearing aid or cell phone? Donate it to the Villages Medical Auxiliary (VMA). The VMA provides these items to the Lions Club organization and in turn the Lions Club distributes the items to those in need.

Prescription glasses are sent to a facility in Vallejo, California where they are cleaned,

Prescription glasses are sent to a facility in Vallejo, California where they are cleaned, calibrated and frames repaired, if needed. From there the glasses are delivered to optical clinics run by the Lions Club organization. There are Lions Club optical clinics in 206 countries around the world. The newest clinic is in San Leandro, California and serves the eye care needs of the homeless and others without medical insurance.

Professional audiologists prepare the hearing aids for use by cleaning them and adding new ear pieces. The hearing aids are then distributed to the homeless and the uninsured for a \$100 life-time rental fee. The Lions Club assists those unable to pay. When the hearing aid user is finished with the hearing aid, it is turned in and prepared for another user.

Cell phones are given to the police department where the cell phone information is cleared and the phones are distributed to battered women for 911 calls.

The Lions Club and the VMA thanks Villagers for participating in this program to help those in need. Drop your glasses, hearing aids and cell phones off at the VMA office during office hours Monday through Friday 9:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m.

## Assessed value notice for your home

By June 30 you will receive your 2017-2018 Notification of Assessed Value from The County Assessor. This notice will show the assessed value of your home as of January 1, 2017. This assessed value is used to calculate your property tax due in December 2017 and April 2018.

Around the December 10 property tax payment date, a few Villagers will come to the SRS office stressed because they believe their property tax bill is not correct. December is not the time to worry about your property tax. You need to think about your property tax now when you receive your Notification.

What follows will help you navigate your notice information:

In the upper right corner are two lines labeled "Total," with a dollar amount directly to the right. The specific line you need is the first one labeled "Total." It appears just above "Homeowner Exemption." This is your Total Assessed Value for property tax.

In the first paragraph the notice indicates whether your assessed value is the "Factored Base Year Value" or the "Market Value." Your property tax each year is calculated on the lower of these two values.

Factored Base Year Value (known as Proposition 13 value): This is what you paid for your home plus an annual inflation adjustment of no more than 2 percent. A California senior can make a one-time election to transfer his or her previous home's Factored Base Year Value to their Villages' residence if that amount is lower. The transferred base year is then adjusted by the same 2 percent each year.

Market Value (known as Proposition 8 value): This is the fair market value of your property as of January 1, 2017. The assessment notice includes website instructions to learn which properties were used by the county for comparable sales to estimate your fair market value.

If you don't understand your assessment, stop by the SRS office and a volunteer will help explain it to you.

If your assessment is Market Value and you think the assessment is substantially too high, you have until August 1 to request an informal review of the Assessor's valuation. The instructions for requesting the review are included on the valuation form. It is important that a review request be filed as quickly as possible. Do not wait for your tax bill; you will miss the appeal filing deadline.

Note: The Senior Resource Services (SRS) office hours for drop-in assistance are Monday, Wednesday and Friday from 10 a.m. to noon. The SRS office is in the Cribari Center across from the Post Office. You may also leave a message at 408-239-5253. The purpose of SRS is to provide education and general business and financial information. All assistance is free and confidential. You should ask your professional adviser about your individual situation.

## HIKING CLUB SCHEDULE

Unless otherwise indicated, all hikes meet at Cribari Center at 8:30 a.m. and depart at 8:45 a.m. Bring water, snacks and lunch, and always wear layered clothing appropriate to the current weather; hats and sunscreen are also recommended.

Saturday, June 24: Dan Kato will lead long hikers and ramblers on a hike starting at the intersection of Route 9 and Skyline Blvd along Saratoga Gap Trail and the Bay Area Ridge Trail. At Charcoal Road, the long hikers will head off on a loop around Table Mountain and return via the Bay Area Ridge Trail. The Ramblers will cross the Skyline Blvd. and return via the Achistaca Trail. The long hike is about 8 miles and the Rambler hike about 4 miles with some moderate hills. Both hikes are in mostly shaded forest. Bring snacks, water and a lunch. Afterward there will be an optional stop in Saratoga for post-hike refreshments. Round trip by car is about 60 miles.

Wednesday, June 28 (Rambler Hike): Johanna Bakker (408-223-2190) will lead a hike to Point Lobos State Natural Reserve, one of the most beautiful hikes by the ocean. We'll meet at 8:30 a.m. and leave at 8:45. It's located just south of Carmel and is approximately 60 miles each way. The drive takes about 1 ½ hours. Bring lunch, a hat and lots of water.

Saturday, July 1: Richard Bainbridge (408-960-8335) will lead a hill hike, starting from the parking lot of the upper garden. The hike will be along the Cougar, Richter, Oak and Buffalo trails to the Bay and Meadow trails. A renovation and partial rerouting of the upper Bay trail and Meadow trails has recently been approved by the VG&CC board and is expected to take place in October or November after the first winter rains. Since the upper trails are presently in poor shape some scrambling is anticipated there. Rich will point out how and where the trails will be rerouted and widened to county park standards. Finally the hike will lead to the picnic area at the highest point of our hill lands for a view and a snack or light lunch, before descending back via the Rawhide, Indian and Sky trials.

**Saturday, July 8:** Wate and Johanna Bakker (408-223-2190) will lead a Coastal hike from Gazos Creek to the Ano Nuevo SP., along HWY 1. The hike will be along a beach, dunes, a rocky coastline and a coastal plain. Wate will lead a long hike of about 7 miles. Johanna will lead a shorter hike of 4-5 miles. Afterward we will stop at the Davenport bakery to sample their pies. Car round trip mileage about 100.



"Abigail Adams: Letters" by Edith Gelles, Editor, The Library Of America: From virtually the moment she married the ambitious young lawyer John Adams in 1764, Abigail Smith Adams was more or less on her own. Depending upon the type of fraud, there are numerous agencies you can contact to report criminal activity. You may call the San Jose Police Department's 311 number to report credit card fraud or attempts to steal your identity. The FBI and Federal Trade Commission also have fraud departments. Furthermore, these attacks fall under the category of elder abuse. The county district attorney's Elder Abuse Unit can be reached at the toll free number 1-855-DAELDER or 1-855-323-5337.

You can fight back by not being fooled. Simply remember to stop, not to panic, think about the situation, and report illegal activity.



Dr. Russell "Clyne" Soley, scientist and engineer at IBM and United Technology, dedicated golfer, golf book author, Villages Golf Club Champion in 1968, and long time Villager – didn't really make a secret of his golf techniques that led to his 86 Holes-in-One (81 on the Villages Par 3 course, and two on the Villages 18-hole course).

Dr. Soley's philosophy on improving your golf game had four basic steps: 1) Play the Par 3 course as much as possible; 2) Practice short chips frequently (his research indicated that success at chipping into the hole was relatively independent of your handicap level); 3) Practice only 3 foot to 9 foot putts (under 3 foot are rarely missed and those over 9 feet are rarely made; also on long putts being close short is better than being six feet past the hole), and 4) be sure and use enough club on par 3 tee shots and long course approach shots (his research showed that 9 out of 10 shots come up short). He noted that most people spend time on the driving range where improvement of 1-2 strokes per round may be gained, but improving your short game can get improvements of 6-9 strokes per round.

Dr. Soley spoke from experience – he played many more rounds on the short nine (Par 3) course than the long course, on the order of 5700 rounds vs. 2600 rounds over his 25 years of residence at the Villages. His rationale was that it improved and maintained his game at a higher level for a longer period of time.

The Clyne Soley Tournament is coming up this Saturday. It will be a shotgun start with a choice of four tee times – 8 a.m., 10:30 a.m., 1:30 p.m., and 3:30 p.m. The Reception will follow at 5 to 7 p.m. in the Clubhouse Sunset Room with an introduction to the Soley family and presentation of awards.

The Villages clubs—the Ironmen and the Shonis are dedicated to play on the Par 3 course each week. Come out and join us and improve your golf game!

Tips from the Pro: Are you properly grounded?

The golf stance is one set up aspect that is often overlooked, but very important to performance. If your stance is too wide, it locks up your lower body and inhibits athleticism...a stance that is too wide also will inhibit turn and create either lack of motion or too much left to right lateral motion. A stance that is too narrow will cause a lack of balance and as a result the golfer's swing will get too short and vertical. Jack Nicklaus used to say that he used 13 different stance widths... different for each club in the bag. I like that philosophy! Start with a 7-iron and put your feet about shoulder width apart. Widen the stance about ½ inch for each club longer than the 7-iron up to your driver. Your driver stance should be about 2 inches wider than your 7-iron stance. Then narrow vour stance about ½ inch for each club shorter than the 7-iron. Your sand wedge stance should be about 2 inches narrower than your 7-iron stance. Work within these parameters and see if it helps your balance and footwork. And remember that if you are losing flexibility, flare your toes out 45 degrees for more flexibility to turn.





## What do I do with this?

Do you have an item you want to get rid of but you are not quite sure what to do with it? Often wonder if it should it be donated, recycled or thrown away and how or where to do that? Each week we will highlight a particular item and give you suggestions for the best way of recycling or disposal.

## Plastic—Recycle container

\*No plastic bags may be placed in the recycle container. Clear plastic bags may be used only to hold shredded paper or textiles (for easier recycling purposes).

Plastic items labeled 1-7 inside chasing arrows, baby wipe containers, beverage bottles, bleach and detergent bottles, buckets (remove handle), flower pots, food containers (i.e. cottage cheese and margarine tubs, yogurt cups), household cleaner bottles, prescription bottles, shampoo bottles, plastic take out and food containers and compact disc cases.

All items must be empty and rinsed.

## Plastic products—Garbage container

Plastic bags (all types), bubble wrap, credit cards, disposable razors, hoses, ointment and toothpaste tubes, plastic without numbers 1-7, PVC piping, shoes, straws, tarps, toys, utensils, cellophane food bags (i.e. pasta, bagged salad, candy, etc.), polystyrene/foam take-out, egg and food containers, frozen food bags or pouches, plastic or wax liners from food packaging and plastic wrap.

Return plastic bags to grocery store for recycling.

## Turf Rejuvenation Program continues

In October, the Association Board approved a community wide turf rejuvenation program at a cost of \$198,383. The work entails slit-seeding (a planting process) roughly 30 acres of common area with Tall Fescue grass. This work is the second part of a two-part project intended to fill in community turf areas that have either died, or have become infested with noxious grasses or weeds, over time due to the most recent drought period.

The first step of the preparation process for a slit-seeding program like this is to kill all the weeds and noxious grasses (in all 30 acres). Round Up will be used to achieve the objective (signs and notices will be posted). This means that many turf areas in the community will brown out, and they will stay that way for a couple of weeks before the seeding process can take place. Even then, please remember that it will take time for the grass to grow in, so areas will look sparse for a couple of months. (Mowing and day watering schedules will be adjusted accordingly.)


West leads the 3 of Hearts, East, the King, South, the Ace, switches to the Ace of Diamonds, then the Jack, overtakes it with the King, and runs the rest of Diamonds. He then plays the Queen of Clubs, East takes the trick with the Ace, continues with the King, then leads a Heart, South wins with the Queen, next plays a Club to the Jack on the board. He leads a Spade to the Queen in his hand, West, the Ace, follows with his last card, the good Jack of Hearts. Great! The contract is made exactly. If West had initially led the 6 of Spades, South would get an extra trick with the 10 on the board, making 4 instead of 3 NoTrump.

\* North had just 8 HCP but did have a good six-card suit and gave himself 2 extra points, which would allow him to bid 2 Diamonds. A responder should have 10 points to bid a new suit at the 2 level.





## Planning an Estate, Garage or Moving Sale?

Residents, or those working on the behalf of residents, are advised to call the Public Safety Administration office at 239-5246 before planning or opening a sale at the Villages. All sales on Villages property are subject to Association Rule 2.02 Residence Use and Occupancy Restrictions.

Homeowner Rule 3.2.10, Estate and Garage Sales states:

3.2.10 Estate and garage sales are permitted subject to the following:

A. A permit for the sale shall be obtained from the Public Safety Office prior to holding the sale and placement of advertising.

Also, effective July 1, 2012, all estate and garage sales in the Association will require a permit. The owner of the property must request the permit from Public Safety Administration in Building C.

The Villages Association Rule 2.02. 5., Residence Use and Occupancy Restrictions applies:

5. Estate and garage sales are permitted subject to the following:

- A. Public Safety will not allow entry to anyone who is not authorized by name in advance (Club Rule 1.01, Access to the Villages).
  - B. All sales activity and sale items must be contained with the residence or garage.
  - C. Sales maybe held only between 9 a.m. and 4 p.m.

D. Sales period may not exceed two days.

E. Only one sale per resident household per year will be permitted. In the event of the death of a resident of the unit, a subsequent estate sale will be permitted. A permit is required and can be obtained from Public Safety.

**Note:** When placing classified ads for estate or garage sales in The Villager, you will need to attach proof of the permit to your Classified Advertising form.
