## Xfinity Make Up Box Swap-Out Events

Hello Villagers! Comcast has completed all district events and will now be hosting "Make Up" event days. Please note, these events are not mandatory, Comcast is onsite as a courtesy to assist with updating your current TV set top boxes with our new X1 Platform Box. In order to get Comcast's updated X1 Platform Box and voice-activated remote, you need to have Comcast's Performance Internet services. There is no formal presentation as Comcast will strictly be doing individual account reviews. If you are unable to attend these events, you can call into the Dedicated Bulk Call Center at 1-855-307-4896. If you schedule an installation through the call center and not through attending an onsite Comcast event, you will be charged the installation fee. If you have attended an event and an installation charge appears on your bill, please wait to see your credit on the following billing cycle.

#### 1. Why wasn't my district listed in the paper?

A: Due to the size of the Villages we are deploying a phased approach. This way we can ensure that your experience goes as smoothly as possible. Rest assured that we will get to you should you need assistance with this process. Comcast is committed to ensuring this is a great experience for the Villagers. Please keep an eye out on the paper as your district will be announced as the schedule is updated monthly. 2. What will I need to bring?

A: Nothing is needed for these events. You will simply provide Comcast with your address and phone number and we will schedule a tech appointment for you to swap out your equipment.

## Page 4 The Villager June 29, 2017 Club and Association Boards met for regularly scheduled June meetings

The Villages Association and Club Boards of Directors met Tuesday, June 27 for their regularly scheduled meetings in the Villages Clubhouse. Numerous items of business were discussed and voted upon.

#### Association Financial Report For the month of May 2017

**May Operating Statement Review:** Revenue was \$300 unfavorable to the budget of \$615,900 for the month, due to less than planned laundry concession income -\$1,200, offset by higher than budgeted third party fees +\$900. Expenditures for the month were \$1,000 favorable to the budget of \$628,700. Water expense was +\$31,700 favorable to the budget of \$150,900. It includes the adjusted actuals for March and April as well as an accrual of 94 percent of the budgeted water expense for May. Other notable expense categories favorable to budget were insurance +\$8,100 (lower premium renewal), repair and maintenance +\$4,600 and intra-co cost transfers +\$4,100. The largest notable expense categories unfavorable to budget for the month are landscape related (due to timing). During springtime, many planting and irrigation projects take place throughout the districts. Planting expense was \$26,800 higher than the budget while irrigation maintenance was \$12,700 more than planned. Other expense categories with significant unfavorable variances were electricity -\$5,500 and operating supplies -\$2,700.

Year-to-date (eleven months of operations), total revenue is 6,772,500 which is 11,100 favorable to the budget of 6,761,400, due to higher than planned third party assessments (+5,000) and proceeds from a foreclosure sale (+7,800). Year-to-date operating expenditures are 6,706,600 or 2.8 percent less than the budget of 6,901,900. Approximately 77 percent of the positive budget variance in expenditures is in water expense at +151,300. Other significant favorable to budget expense categories are intra-co cost transfers +20,300, planting expense +19,800 (timing), insurance expense +19,700, irrigation maintenance +18,700(timing), pest control +15,000, and trash expense +12,100. Expense categories significantly unfavorable to budget are electricity -19,600 (rate hikes), repair and maintenance -17,800 (mostly from roof leak interior repairs), chemicals -13,500(water feature organic treatment program) and operating supplies -10,700. The year-to-date net positive budget variance is 206,500.

#### Club Financial Report For the month of May 2017

**May Operating Statement Review:** May was an outstanding month in terms of revenue for the Club. Total revenue was \$115,500 favorable to budget, 11.1 percent higher than the budget of \$1,036,700. Nearly every revenue category exceeded the budget. For the second month in a row, an all-time record was set in combined food and bar sales at \$251,000 for the month, which was 15 percent higher than the budget of \$217,700. Pro Shop merchandise sales were off the charts at \$23,200 (budget was \$8,000). Green fees were also favorable to budget by +\$6,800. Total rounds played (5,671) in May were the highest over the last 16 months with strong member play. Resident activities income and lessons/classes outperformed the budget by \$20,800 (timing). Advertising income was higher than planned by +\$12,500, mostly due to a high demand for ads in the annual Resource Guide publication. Community events income was \$12,500 more than planned due to the timing of revenue related to the Fiesta Time event. The only revenue categories significantly unfavorable to budget were late fees -\$2,800, driving range income -\$1,700 and golf cart rentals -\$1,100.

Total expenditures were \$119,100 favorable to budget, 11.3 percent less than the budget of \$1,056,000. The main driver was in electricity expense (+\$122,400 favorable to budget). In May, YTD credits from electric meters in the solar program were posted to the financial statements. At this time, savings in electricity expense are adequate to offset the monthly solar lease and to accumulate funds for the future balloon payment in 2023. Water expense was +\$62,500 favorable to the budget of \$98,000. It includes the adjusted actuals for March and April as well as an accrual of 94 percent of the budgeted water expense for May. Other notable categories favorable to budget were employee expense +\$13,400, vehicle gas and maintenance +\$9,200 (YTD correction) and printing expense +\$3,600 (budget documents). Total cost of sales had the largest negative budget variance -\$43,000 (42 percent more than the budget of \$101,500) for a couple of reasons. One, due to higher sales in food/bar, Pro Shop merchandise and resident activities, the cost of sales was correspondingly higher. Second, the Fiesta Time community event was captured in cost of sales but was not a planned event in the budget. Other notable expense categories significantly unfavorable to budget were interest expense for the solar lease -\$18,300 (YTD entry for seven months), repair and maintenance -\$6,800, professional fees -\$6,000, gas expense -\$4,400 and planting expense \$3,200 (timing). The net positive operating budget variance for the month was \$234,600. See table below.

The above table shows the Golf Course/Pro Shop department with the largest positive net variance of \$149,000 due to higher than planned revenues (merchandise sales and cart rentals) and savings in water expense. The Clubhouse/ Restaurant has a positive net variance of \$124,000 mainly due to higher than planned food/bar sales and electricity savings. For G&A, employee expense and professional fees have been less than planned, helping to generate a \$78,000

Savings in employee expense and the timing of EPC expenses has helped produce a \$32,000 positive net variance in Public Safety. The Community Centers are showing a positive net variance of \$15,000 due to less than planned electricity expense.

#### Homeowners' Financial Report For the month of May 2017

**May Operating Statement Review:** Revenue was on budget at \$3,051 (non-Estates single family homes). Expenditures for the month were \$100 favorable to budget due to less than planned insurance expense (new premiums in effect) offset by more than planned legal fee expenses. The year-to-date net negative operating budget variance is \$112.

Estates revenue tracked budget for the month at \$11,837. Expenditures were \$1,127 favorable to budget, 9 percent less than the budget of \$12,152. The main driver was favorable to budget water expense +\$1,557. Notable unfavorable expense categories for the month were planting expense -\$663 and irrigation maintenance -\$258, both due to timing.

Year-to-date, significant favorable to budget expense categories are planting expense +\$7,519 (timing), electricity expense +\$3,564, irrigation maintenance +\$1,253 (timing), pest control +\$505 and water expense +\$407. The only notable unfavorable expense category is legal fees -\$359 (revision of governing documents). The year-to-date net positive operating budget variance is \$13,828.





Departure time from the Village's east parking lot at Cribari Center will be at 10 a.m., with an estimated return time of 6:30 p.m. Limited tickets are available—one bus only! Register beginning Monday, July 3, in the Community Resource Center, Building B. The cut-off for registration will be on Friday, August 18, with the final count due to the Potomac at this time.

Get here early for this one! The world-famous Blue Angels will be performing this year and if you have never seen the flyover by the Blue Angels you truly don't know what you have missed. If you have witnessed their flyover, had goose bumps, your spine tingling and your heart racing... well I guess I don't have to tell you know how great they are, you already know! Below is a brief synopsis on the USS Potomac.

The cost is \$178 per person and your ticket for the Potomac is tax deductible (retain your ticket for your 2017, \$75, tax return). Your donation is for a very good cause as it goes toward education and maintaining this historical vessel for events such as ours. Once aboard the USS Potomac we will enjoy a three-hour cruise on the Bay and an air show. We will enjoy sandwiches, fruit, chips, dessert, soft drinks, coffee, tea or bottled water, and there is a hosted wine bar aboard the Potomac.

We will arrive at Jack London Square where the Potomac is docked by 12:15 p.m. Enjoy the Farmer's Market, shops, book store, antiques, novelty stores and much more. Any purchases made may be left at the Potomac's Visitor Center during our cruise and picked up prior to leaving that day (bring a pen to mark your bag.) We board the Potomac by 1:15 p.m. for the sail time of 1:30 p.m. for the cruise. The Potomac will be positioned underneath the Blue Angels' flight pattern for this awesome show.

The USS Potomac was originally built in 1934 as the Coast Guard cutter Electra, and converted to the presidential yacht in 1936 by President Franklin D. Roosevelt, who had her re-commissioned as a U.S. Navy vessel. After the President's death in April 1945, the USS Potomac began a long and ignominious decline from her former role in world affairs. Falling into private hands and later seized in San Francisco Bay as a front for a drug-smuggling operation in 1980, the proud vessel's hull was pierced and she sank at Treasure Island. She was re-floated by the Navy two weeks later and sold by the U.S. Customs to the only bidder, the Port of Oakland, for just \$15,000. The Port of Oakland then spearheaded a cooperative effort with organized labor, maritime corporations and dedicated volunteers to complete a \$5 million restoration. The Association for the Preservation of the Presidential Yacht Potomac now operates this National Historic Landmark as an active memorial to Franklin Delano Roosevelt.







ciary law for retirement investments has finally been adopted...kind of, sort of...This law determines how brokers and investment advisers make recommendations to their retirement account (including 401(k) and IRA) clients and requires

The long talked about fidu- the advisers to make public any conflicts of interest and all fees that the investor must pay when making an investment.

> The catch is that, while the law went into effect on June 9, many aspects of the law do not become official until January 1 of 2018. Also, there is talk of

amendments to the law being made before then and there are some lawsuits that have been filed about certain aspects of the law. While the Department of Labor currently has no "fiduciary police" to enforce the law, money managers are on their honor between now and next year.

The purpose of the fiduciary law is to ensure that brokers and investment adviser's recommendations are

in the best interest of the client, not the best interest of the broker. Currently, brokers are held to a suitability standard, which does little to make fees and conflicts of interest known to clients. There are only modest "suitability" constraints on recommendations for clients. It should be noted that many brokers and advisers probably do currently act in a client's best interest (to keep your business).

This law was first drawn up



in the Obama Administration and then was slowed twice since Donald Trump has been President. However, many brokers and advisers that deal with retirement assets for their clients could see the writing on the wall and have already made changes to how they do business. A few insurance companies have gotten out of the business entirely. Some mutual funds have created "clean share classes" that eliminate all fees except for the investment management fee of the underlying assets. Some brokers have eliminated retirement accounts where fees are paid by commissions. However, the big changes are yet to come, especially when it is required that all fees must be disclosed. This could particularly affect brokers for annuities, where fees currently are not disclosed and are purported to be quite high.

The law does provide somewhat of an out for brokers and clients. The broker can ask the client to sign a "Best Interest Contract Exemption (BICE)" which would allow the client/ broker relationship to remain pretty much as it is now and for the broker to continue to be paid by commissions (which must be fully disclosed). If you are asked to sign such a document, it would be wise to determine the cost and value of alternatives.

The new law may end up by causing higher fees for some, as the investment people want to be paid for taking on "fiduciary responsibility." Relationships with investment advisers, which are now paid by a stipulated fee, will not likely be directly affected. While it may not happen, the SEC is considering another law that would broaden the fiduciary scope to all public investment relationships, not just retirement accounts.

Since the thrust of the changes should be to your benefit, you should keep your eyes and ears open for these changes and ask your current broker or investment advisers how this new law will affect them and you. After the first of next year there will likely be a lot of new information about investment fees available which should give you a better basis for evaluation.

## **Turf Rejuvenation Program continues**

In October, the Association Board approved a community wide turf rejuvenation program at a cost of \$198,383. The work entails slit-seeding (a planting process) roughly 30 acres of common area with Tall Fescue grass. This work is the second part of a two-part project intended to fill in community turf areas that have either died, or have become infested with noxious grasses or weeds, over time due to the most recent drought period.

The first step of the preparation process for a slit-seeding program like this is to kill all the weeds and noxious grasses (in all 30 acres). Round Up will be used to achieve the objective (signs and notices will be posted). This means that many turf areas in the community will brown out, and they will stay that way for a couple of weeks before the seeding process can take place. Even then, please remember that it will take time for the grass to grow in, so areas will look sparse for a couple of months. (Mowing and day watering schedules will be adjusted accordingly.)


