Why can we not get something more reliable than this Mickey-Mouse deal? I request other villagers to be aware of this problem and always be careful. I paid the price.

Notice of Proposed New Association Architectural Rule D-29 Solar Electric Energy Systems on Individual Unit Sloped Roofs

The following proposed The Villages Association Architectural Rule <u>D-29 Solar</u> <u>Electric Energy Systems on Individual Unit Sloped Roofs</u>, has been approved by the Association Board of Directors for publication and 30-day member comment period prior to formal approval consideration as required by California Civil Code 4360. The proposed rule will be considered for formal approval at the August 15, 2017, study session (9:30 a.m. at Foothill Center). Response to the proposed rule changes may be made by one or more of the following methods: 1) Participation in the discussion of the change at the Association Board of Directors study session at which the proposed rule change will be considered, 2) via e-mail with comments sent to the Board via mehernandez@the-villages.com, 3) via written comments delivered to the Board through the Community Standards/Association Administrator Maria Hernandez in Bldg. A.

The purpose of the proposed rule is to provide specific requirements for member solar installations.

D-29 Solar Electric Energy Systems on individual Unit sloped roofs

Solar Panel systems placed on Association owned sloped roofs may only be installed when all the below stated conditions and requirements have been met. Please refer to the following additional documents: Association Policy APo/APr 411, AC Solar Energy Systems Submittal Requirement Form and Revocable Easement Agreement. A building permit will be required after all the below mentioned conditions have been approved.

General

1.1 Solar panel system approval is a contract only between the Unit Owner(s) and the Villages Association. The solar panel installer is not a party to the contract. Therefore, all solar panel systems and their installation must be the property of the Unit Owner.

1.2 An AC Solar Energy Systems Submittal Requirement Form application, signed by the owner, including complete plans and specifications, must be submitted to the Architectural Committee (AC) for approval. The application shall include written comments by the owners of adjoining units. Owners will be given full and careful consideration by the AC.

1.3 Solar panels may not be installed on sloped roofs in Montgomery Village due to the fragile nature of the existing tiles.

1.4 All the items listed on the attached Architectural Committee Solar Energy Systems Submittal Requirements Form must be submitted to staff before review by the AC.

1.5 All documents must be clear and legible.

1.6 All plans must be drawn to sufficient scale and clarity to provide accurate depiction of the project.

1.7 All Photographs, if desired or requested, must be sufficiently clear to understand the applicant's unique conditions.

1.8 Installation of the solar panels can only be performed by contractors licensed by the California State Contractors' Board in the following fields: electric (C10) and solar (C46).

1.9 The Unit Owner shall, at the Owner's sole cost and expense, purchase an insurance policy and keep in effect, a general liability policy with limits no less than \$300,000 protecting against liability claims for bodily injury and property damage. The Unit Owner shall include The Villages as an additional insured on the policy as respects the terms of the contract.

2.0 Since the structure of the Unit may be disturbed in the process of installing the SES, the applicant shall be responsible to maintain the structural integrity of the Unit.

2.1 If the Association is, required, for any reason to restore the Unit to conform

1.3 The Architectural committee will review the project and make one of the following decisions.

- 1. Approve the project.
- 2. Deny the project as submitted. (Reason for denial will be provided in writing with a copy provided to the Board.)
- 3. Hold the project over to a future meeting with a list of additional items to be provided.
- 4. Conditionally approve the item when additional materials are provided.

1.4 Projects approved by the AC will be forwarded to the Association Board of Directors (ABOD) for conditional approval. ABOD conditional approval will allow the applicant to continue the process per the current Association CC&R's and State of California Civil Code.

1.5 If applicable and in accordance with the CC&R's, the ABOD will have the Project vote counted and, if approved, the Applicant will, at their own expense, notarize and record the required deed restriction (Revocable Easement) to their property using the forms and instructions provided to them by staff.

1.6 The applicant shall provide proof to the ABOD of the recordation including a copy of the signed and notarized document, the recordation number, and the recordation date. The ABOD will then give final approval subject to the applicant submittal of plans and specification to the City of San Jose Building Department to obtain the required permits. City of San Jose Building Department Permit plan comments to be provided to the AC.

1.7 At the completion of the installation of the solar panels and after the City of San Jose has finalized the permit, the applicant shall notify the AC and the Maintenance Department. They shall both inspect the completed installation and all the ancillary items required for the system to function. The staff shall then issue a notice to allow the utility company to activate the system.

Association/Homeowners documents available via e-mail

Per an amendment to California Civil Code, homeowner associations are permitted, with owner's written consent, to distribute annual disclosures, (like the pro forma budget summary) and other specified association documents to owners via electronic mail, facsimile, or other electronic means (such as posting on the association's website) instead of sending those documents out by regular mail or personal delivery. This has the potential to provide cost savings to The Villages. Delivery and postage costs for the Villages' annual distribution of the pro forma budget summary alone are close to \$1,000, not to mention the paper and printing costs that run about \$8,000.

In order to transmit association documents via e-mail or by posting on the homeowners association's website, 1) the homeowners association must first receive the owner's written consent, and 2) the homeowners association sends a separate notice to the owner that the documents have been posted and are available for viewing.

Consent forms for owners to request delivery of documents have been developed for both The Villages Association and Homeowners Corporations. These forms provide an owner's consent to delivery electronically, of documents that are capable, under current laws, of being distributed electronically. Owners have the right to revoke this request and receive "hard copies" of the documents by sending a written revocation signed by the owner, to the applicable corporation. Forms of owner's written consent are available in Business Administration Buildings A and B, and on The Villages web site, http://www.thevillagesgcc.com (Click on *Resident Info* and then Click on *Resource Files*.) to its original plan, the cost of such restoration shall be borne by the Owner. A document to this effect will be recorded in the office of the Santa Clara County Recorder to provide constructive notice to future Owners.

Process

1.1 Initial submittal of the AC Submittal Requirement Form and the NEIGHBOR AWARENESS FORMS as well as supporting documentation and scaled drawings to staff.

1.2 When application materials are deemed complete by staff the project will be set for public hearing.

Credit cards and eCheck now accepted for Assessment payments

Many Villagers have been patiently waiting for this to happen—beginning July 1, 2017, Villagers will have the option to pay monthly assessments online via credit card or eCheck.

The Villages has entered into an agreement with PayLease to provide members this opportunity. VISA, MasterCard and Discover are the only credit cards that can be used for payments, and there will be a 3 percent fee charged by PayLease for providing this service. There is a flat rate of \$2.95 for Echecks. These fees go directly to PayLease. The Villages does not receive any part of the fees.

Log in to www.Paylease.com. Follow the instructions to sign up. You will need to check the Resident box. Search for your property - "The Villages Golf & Country Club". Click on "This is my property." Under "New Users Registration," enter your house account number found on the top right of your statement. Example: 6000-01. Your name should appear in the box. Homeowners' Corporation Board update

Governing documents approved: Thank you for approving the updates to our governing documents. We can now move ahead knowing that we are in compliance with the law and have guidance provided by our governing documents. Our next step in making sure that we are meeting the needs of our homeowners is to review our Homeowner Rules. The rules were last reviewed in 2012, so it's time to take another look at them. This will be an internal board/homeowner project, and does not require attorney review or outside financial expenditures.

Board President Burt Lancaster retires: After serving as president of the Homeowners' Corporation (HOC) Board for eight years Burt Lancaster retired from the board. Many in the community know Lancaster because he also served a three-year term on the Club Board of Directors and the Club Marketing and Nominating committees. In addition Lancaster is a Senior Resources volunteer, president of the Republican Club, owns his own consulting business and is ready to lend a hand to friends and family when asked.

Everyone who knows Lancaster appreciates his wisdom. "Burt has been a great mentor for me as a new director," said HOC Board Director Mike Kane. "All of us on the board have learned from Burt and will do our best to carry his words of wisdom forward as we serve our homeowners," said Board Director Teddy Morse. "I especially recognize Burt for his distinguished and unselfish service given through his positions on the Villages' governing boards and committees," said Board Director Julian Rodriguez. Lancaster was honored for his service at the June 14 annual meeting.

Election of officers: At its June 15 board meeting the 2017-2018 HOC Board of Directors elected its officers for the year: President Teddy Morse, Vice President Julian Rodriguez, Secretary Greg Stewart, Chief Financial Officer (CFO) Mike Kane, and Assistant CFO/Architectural Control Committee Liaison Jeannie Omel.

What's new for 2017-2018?

To reduce the length of the board's quarterly business meetings and to have more time for in-depth discussions with residents when issues warrant them, this year the board will schedule work study sessions. This process works well for the Club and Association boards to provide the necessary time for review and discussion of issues. The HOC Board's first study session for this year is July 26 at 9 a.m., location to be determined. AT&T low income savings and free

special needs phones

If you have low income, AT&T may qualify you for a reduced monthly rate. AT&T defines low income as no more than \$26,400 annually for a household of one or two people and \$30,700 for a household of three. Income includes all sources of income including social security. The income limit was increased for inflation beginning June 1, 2017.

The AT&T special rate for basic service is, roughly, 50 percent of the regular rate. Plus, you do not pay most federal and state surcharges or fees. For example, a plan called the "California LifeLine-Measured Rate" permits 60 untimed local calls for \$4.72 a month. Calls outside your local zone and long-distance calls are excluded from this flat rate. The California LifeLine Flat Rate provides unlimited local calling for \$7.47 a month.

SRS has a handout explaining this service and listing the AT&T number to call for a special rate.

Do you have either impaired hearing or low vision? If you do, you qualify for a free telephone equipped with special features designed to assist you with your vision or hearing deficiencies.

Unlike other assistance programs, a specific income minimum is not necessary for you to qualify for a free phone. Obviously, there must be a recognizable medical need. A medical professional must certify you are deaf, hard of hearing, speech impaired, blind, cognitive impaired, have low vision, or restricted mobility. A licensed medical doctor, audiologist, optometrist or hearing aid dispenser may make the certification. The free telephone program is sponsored by the California Public Utility Commission.

To apply for the program, the two-page application form is available at the SRS office. After mailing in the application, you will be contacted to determine the equipment best suited to your needs. You can see the type of telephones available at ddtp.cpuc.ca.gov ...and then click on equipment. The phones are organized by five categories:

Hearing Seeing Moving Speaking Learning or Remembering



Departure time from the Village's east parking lot at Cribari Center will be at 10 a.m., with an estimated return time of 6:30 p.m. Limited tickets are available—one bus only! Register beginning Monday, July 3, in the Community Resource Center, Building B. The cut-off for registration will be on Friday, August 18, with the final count due to the Potomac at this time.

Get here early for this one! The world-famous Blue Angels will be performing this year and if you have never seen the flyover by the Blue Angels you truly don't know what you have missed. If you have witnessed their flyover, had goose bumps, your spine tingling and your heart racing... well I guess I don't have to tell you know how great they are, you already know! Below is a brief synopsis on the USS Potomac.

The cost is \$178 per person and your ticket for the Potomac is tax deductible (retain your ticket for your 2017, \$75, tax return). Your donation is for a very good cause as it goes toward education and maintaining this historical vessel for events such as ours. Once aboard the USS Potomac we will enjoy a three-hour cruise on the Bay and an air show. We will enjoy sandwiches, fruit, chips, dessert, soft drinks, coffee, tea or bottled water, and there is a hosted wine bar aboard the Potomac.

We will arrive at Jack London Square where the Potomac is docked by 12:15 p.m. Enjoy the Farmer's Market, shops, book store, antiques, novelty stores and much more. Any purchases made may be left at the Potomac's Visitor Center during our cruise and picked up prior to leaving that day (bring a pen to mark your bag.) We board the Potomac by 1:15 p.m. for the sail time of 1:30 p.m. for the cruise. The Potomac will be positioned underneath the Blue Angels' flight pattern for this awesome show.

The USS Potomac was originally built in 1934 as the Coast Guard cutter Electra, and converted to the presidential yacht in 1936 by President Franklin D. Roosevelt, who had her re-commissioned as a U.S. Navy vessel. After the President's death in April 1945, the USS Potomac began a long and ignominious decline from her former role in world affairs. Falling into private hands and later seized in San Francisco Bay as a front for a drug-smuggling operation in 1980, the proud vessel's hull was pierced and she sank at Treasure Island. She was re-floated by the Navy two weeks later and sold by the U.S. Customs to the only bidder, the Port of Oakland, for just \$15,000. The Port of Oakland then spearheaded a cooperative effort with organized labor, maritime corporations and dedicated volunteers to complete a \$5 million restoration. The Association for the Preservation of the Presidential Yacht Potomac now operates this National Historic Landmark as an active memorial to Franklin Delano Roosevelt.

Stay active with Jazzercise

We know that exercise is good for us, but just what are the proven benefits. I'd like to tell you about a recent study that caught my eye. The participants were individuals at risk for falling because of poor balance, slow reaction time, and advanced age. All were aged 67 or older and two-thirds were female. Classes that focused on balance and coordination, muscle strength and aerobic capacity were set up. Each class began with 5 - 10 minutes of warmup that included stretching of the major muscle groups and ended with 10 minutes of cool down. The remaining 45 minutes of the hour long class included balance and coordination exercises, aerobic exercise and strengthening exercises using hand weights. All performed to popular music. At the end of the class it was found that participants were 40 percent less likely to fall and one-third less likely to suffer fall related injury compared with those who did not attend such classes. Coincidently the study classes closely mirror those of Jazzercise. So stay safe and join us.



TENNIS TALK

By George Beck

We have many new members in our Tennis Club. Following are a few tips on etiquette and courtesy on the tennis court gleaned from knowledgeable coaches and players that *all* members may find useful:

The server should call the score prior to every serve. If you have played tennis in The Villages for at least a week, you have heard more than one discussion over the game score. We also know that senior moments are a way of life here. Help yourself, your partner and your opponents by the simple act of calling out the score.

When receiving serve and the service is **obviously** a fault, **don't return it**. If it's close, returning it is a natural, reflexive action. However, when it misses by a couple of feet and it is returned with gusto, the ensuing action of the ball bouncing around the court delays play and, it could be argued, takes the server out of his/her rhythm. If it is physically not possible for one to keep from doing this, it is suggested that the server be offered the courtesy of two additional serves.

Keep all 3 balls in play. This does not mean the server must hold all three balls. Nor does it mean that play should be delayed to pick up a stray ball if the server already has two. However, if the server has one ball and the other two are elsewhere on the court, all players should be responsible for picking them up. This is more than an act of civility. Keeping all 3 balls in play in logical rotation ensures an even wear in the life of the balls and a more predictable action when

An update on the algae on the lake on #6 & #7...

We recently applied a trial amount of a product called Amazing Dave's, which is a hydrogen peroxide based product that has shown success with similar lake algae.

The trial showed moderate success so we are purchasing more for application. We will also drag the lake as necessary. We are also looking into fountains and an underwater circulatory system as churning the water helps alleviate the stagnant algae growth as well. We hope these multiple solutions in combination will abate the algae. Time will tell. We appreciate your patience and understanding.

The re-landscaping of the area surrounding the new pump station behind #6 tee will be done on July 8. We hope to have this area completely re-sodded and landscaped by the end of this week.

The Board approved the removal of a number of dead trees from the golf course. This process will continue through the second week in July. Please be safe near the tree removal areas. We are also evaluating and will be trimming those trees that are overgrown.

Tips from the Pro: Newer is Better! The golf industry has changed a lot over the years. The changes in equipment, courses and apparel have all happened so fast it's hard to keep up. But the bottom line is these changes are all positive and help better the game of golf and make it more fun for the average golfer. The changes in golf equipment are probably the most drastic. With computer based R&D, these golf companies are continually modifying their product to allow for better and easier performance. If you are one of those with 10-year-old clubs and golf balls saying "Aww heck it doesn't matter...it's not the bow and arrow, it's the Indian using it" or "I'm no good anyway, new equipment won't help"...well you are wrong. New and modern equipment will help you, and will make the game more fun, I guarantee it! Modern irons are sleeker with more game improvement aspects like a lower center of gravity and clubfaces that flex as well as consistent performance of heel and toe mishits. Modern woods have larger heads and more trampoline effect and now launch the ball higher with less side spin, so they not only go further, they go straighter. And obviously the modern golf ball is much more elastic and not only goes further, but lasts much longer. As I see members' bags and equipment around the clubhouse, I see a lot of



Turf Rejuvenation Program continues

In October, the Association Board approved a community wide turf rejuvenation program at a cost of \$198,383. The work entails slit-seeding (a planting process) roughly 30 acres of common area with Tall Fescue grass. This work is the second part of a two-part project intended to fill in community turf areas that have either died, or have become infested with noxious grasses or weeds, over time due to the most recent drought period.

The first step of the preparation process for a slit-seeding program like this is to kill all the weeds and noxious grasses (in all 30 acres). Round Up will be used to achieve the objective (signs and notices will be posted). This means that many turf areas in the community will brown out, and they will stay that way for a couple of weeks before the seeding process can take place. Even then, please remember that it will take time for the grass to grow in, so areas will look sparse for a couple of months. (Mowing and day watering schedules will be adjusted accordingly.)

West leads the two of Hearts, South, the Jack, switches to a Diamond, wins with the Ace in his hand, then plays a Diamond, and West takes the trick with the King. He leads a Spade, East wins with the King, leads a Heart, South covers with the Ace, switches to a Diamond to the Queen on the board, follows with the Ace of Clubs, plays the 8 of Clubs, finesses the Jack, continues with the King, and then leads the thirteenth Club. South now plays a Spade, West takes the trick with the Jack, then leads the King of Hearts, continues with his last card, the good 10 of Hearts. Great. The contract is made with an extra trick. By the way, South's bid of 1 NoTrump shows 12 - 14 HCP and 11 HCP is not enough points for responder to raise to game; especially, when 7 HCP are Queens and a Jack.







