

Villagers are well served by our EPC volunteers who continually provide important guidelines for Villages' residents in case of emergencies, such as an earthquake. A friend in Amarillo has had to evacuate her home more than once due to fire threats and she gave me a list of critical items she keeps ready to grab quickly. I'm sharing highlights (a few new ideas for me):

 Obvious: Clothes (change of clothes for everyone, shoes, jacket, underwear, etc.), flashlights and emergency food.

Critical: Medications (for several days) & copy of prescriptions, medical records including doctors' contact info.

 Financial: estate documents including Advance Health Care Directive, checkbooks/financial records (zip drives ?), copies of property tax forms, property deed, vehicle title, latest tax return, PG&E/phone bill for proof of residence address.

· Insurance documents (personal, property, vehicle).

Home and car keys (may leave car keys if car isn't being moved).

CURRENT contact info for family/friends.

· Important documents, photos, precious mementos.

Let's hope we'll never have to evacuate our lovely homes here.

# A MESSAGE FROM COMMUNITY STANDARDS

# Regarding the Annual Random Smoke and Carbon Monoxide and Insurance Certification

Once again it's that time of the year that I have to start the Annual Random Smoke and Carbon Monoxide and Insurance certification verification from Association members/residents per the Association CC&Rs and Board Policy APo 408 and Procedure APr 408 (Smoke Detector Installation, Maintenance, Repair and Replacement) and the Association CC&Rs and Board Policy APo 409 and Procedure APr 409 (Home Owner & Resident Insurance Requirements and Verification)

In August, you will receive a lavender notice requesting that you contact me at your earliest convenience so we can schedule an appointment for the Smoke and Carbon Monoxide inspection as well as to provide a copy of your current insurance policy certificate (coverage page or declaration), which provides the information below.

Insurance Required:

Owners - Property and Liability insurance is commonly referred to as HO6.

- 1. General liability coverage must be maintained in an amount of not less than \$300,000.
- 2. Property damage insurance covering the contents and personal property within the condominium in an amount deemed appropriate by the owner.
- 3. Loss assessment coverage must be maintained in an amount equal to or greater than the amount of the deduction under the hazard insurance policy carried by the Association (currently \$5,000).

Renters - Property and Liability insurance is commonly referred to as HO4.

- 1. General liability coverage must be maintained in an amount of not less than \$300,000.
- 2. Property damage insurance covering the personal property within the condominium in an amount deemed appropriate by the renter.

A 30-day period in which to submit the required documentation will be provided.

Owners and renters can also request that their Insurance Company forward a copy of the updated Insurance Certificate when issued or renewed. A copy of the declaration page from the policy is also acceptable as proof of insurance as long as it shows all of the requirements.

This is a mandatory procedure required by the Association's governing documents. It is for each resident's protection to have the correct amount of Property and Liability coverage. # Association/Homeowners documents available via e-mail

Per an amendment to California Civil Code, homeowner associations are permitted, with owner's written consent, to distribute annual disclosures, (like the pro forma budget summary) and other specified association documents to owners via electronic mail, facsimile, or other electronic means (such as posting on the association's website) instead of sending those documents out by regular mail or personal delivery. This has the potential to provide cost savings to The Villages. Delivery and postage costs for the Villages' annual distribution of the pro forma budget summary alone are close to \$1,000, not to mention the paper and printing costs that run about \$8,000.

In order to transmit association documents via e-mail or by posting on the homeowners association's website, 1) the homeowners association must first receive the owner's written consent, and 2) the homeowners association sends a separate notice to the owner that the documents have been posted and are available for viewing.

Consent forms for owners to request delivery of documents have been developed for both The Villages Association and Homeowners Corporations. These forms provide an owner's consent to delivery electronically, of documents that are capable, under current laws, of being distributed electronically. Owners have the right to revoke this request and receive "hard copies" of the documents by sending a written revocation signed by the owner, to the applicable corporation.

Forms of owner's written consent are available in Business Administration Buildings A and B, and on The Villages web site, http://www.thevillagesgcc.com (Click on *Resident Info* and then Click on *Resource Files*.)

# Pool Usage for Guests and Children under 18 Years

As a reminder, guests must be accompanied by a resident, who is present in the pool area, at all times. The pool areas include the pools, spas, and surrounding fenced-in area of each area of each facility. Additionally, children under 18 years of age may use the Cribari, Montgomery, and Vineyard pools and pool areas, but only between the hours as follows:

Cribari pool 10 a.m. to noon Montgomery pool vineyard pool 2 p.m. 2 p.m. to 4 p.m.

Children under 18 years of age may not use the spas. Diapers and training pants are not permitted in the pools. Children must be toilet trained and wear swimsuits.

As noted above, all children must leave the pool area at the end of children's hours.

# Guest/Common Parking within the Condominium Development

Association Rule 2-17, Section 2: Villages-registered golf carts/LSV, motorcycles and two-axle passenger vehicles that are of a type customarily used for personal transportation may be parked within the Condominium Development subject to local posting by Public Safety and as approved by the Board. Overnight parking of these vehicles is restricted to the garage, carport or driveway assigned to the resident's villa. No vehicle that is incapable of being parked within the entire boundary of the garage, carport or driveway may be parked within the Condominium Development. Temporary exceptions may be authorized by Public Safety.

Cribari and Del Lago Districts are permitted to park in common area parking for a maximum of 48 hours.

# Running out of funds, Part 2

"I thought I had planned ahead, but I'm almost out of money. What can I do?" A Villager occasionally asks SRS this question. Last week we considered assets other than one's owned residence. This week we address the question, "How can I use my real estate investment for living expenses?" To keep it simple, we will presume that the homeowner is single and has no mortgage. There are too many possibilities to list them all. Here are some suggestions.

Example #1: Many condos and houses have two bedrooms and two baths. The Villager may rent the extra bedroom and bath. Realtors inform us that room rents are usually between \$750 and \$850 a month plus half of the utilities, depending on the size of the room, privacy, laundry facilities, and availability of parking. This monthly rental income covers The Villages monthly assessment for many owners.

Example #2: A reverse mortgage is another possibility. All current SRS volunteers have received some training in reverse mortgages. The resource volunteer will give you:

- A computer printout of a FHA-insured reverse mortgage taking monthly payments. This printout will also detail the fees.
  - · A list of brokers and lenders who have obtained reverse mortgages for Villagers.
  - · An outline from a presentation on Reverse Mortgages.

When you purchased your first home and borrowed on a 25-year mortgage, you paid fees. Those fees did not seem all that high because you divided them by 25 years and viewed them as an annual cost. Just as there were fees when you obtained a traditional mortgage, there are fees that are paid immediately from the reverse mortgage proceeds. Because of the upfront costs of a reverse mortgage, most financial advisers suggest reverse mortgages don't make sense if you suspect you will not remain in your home at least another five years.

Example #3: A woman sold her condo in Olivas for \$800,000. She purchased a condo in Cribari for \$400,000. After paying selling expenses and moving expenses, she still had \$320,000 to invest for earnings and use the earnings and the principal as needed for her living.

Example #4: A man sold his condo in Cribari for \$425,000. Using the "New Lifestyles" booklet the SRS volunteer gave him, he toured retirement apartments and was amazed at the beautiful apartments available. He selected one with transportation and dining rather than with amenities he doesn't use. After selling and moving expenses, he had \$380,000 to add to his Social Security. He's optimistic about his economic future.

Example #5: A woman sold her condo in Montgomery for \$595,000 and rented a unit in Cribari for \$2,600 a month. After selling and moving expenses, she invested \$535,000 in a conservative income fund earning 3 to 4 percent. She no longer has property taxes and association fees to pay.

Many Villagers are resistant to change. SRS stresses the importance of consulting members of your family and professional advisers before you make major decisions. You once saved for your future; you are now in that future. Start using your savings. As our name implies, Senior Resource Services wants you to understand you have resources. SRS wants to help you understand the beneficial uses available to you in these resources.

# HIKING CLUB SCHEDULE

Unless otherwise indicated, all hikes meet at Cribari Center at 8:30 a.m. and depart at 8:45 a.m. Bring water, snacks and lunch, and always wear layered clothing appropriate to the current weather; hats and sunscreen are also recommended.

Saturday, July 22: Oakland Bay Bridge Hike. Rich Bainbridge (408-960-8335) and Wendy Ledamun will lead a hike along the Bay Bridge Bicycle/Pedestrian Path that runs along the eastern span of the San Francisco-Oakland Bay Bridge to the newly opened Vista Point on Yerba Buena Island. The Vista Point offers sweeping views of the East Span of the Bay Bridge, San Francisco Bay and Oakland. From there, we will take the free shuttle to the Avenue of the Palms on Treasure Island. We'll proceed on foot to 13th Street where we'll have lunch at the Aracely Cafe (https://www.aracelysf.com/). We'll hop the shuttle for the trip back to the Vista Point after lunch and head back to Oakland. Bring water and dress in layers. The path is 4.5 miles r/t. Round trip by car is approximately 100 miles.

Wednesday, July 26 (Rambler Hike): Sy Gelman (408-532-1239) will lead a hike on the Los Alamitos Trail. Following the Los Alamitos creek and starting at Almaden Lake Park the trail is primarily flat and mostly paved trail. Estimated mileage is about 4-5 miles. Afterwards, lunch at a local restaurant is an option. Meet at Cribari at 8:30 a.m. Round trip auto mileage is around 25 miles.

Saturday, July 29: Mount Madonna County Park. The long hikers will hike about 8 miles on various trails with 1000-ft elevation gain through the Redwoods led by Nancy Rumple at 408-238-7535. The Ramblers can hike 4-5 miles with a leader chosen by the participants. We will also visit the white fallow deer herd in the park. Bring lunch, water and sticks. Wear boots and layers. This is about a 60 mile round trip drive.

Wednesday, August 2 (Rambler): Johanna Bakker (408-223-2190) will lead a hike through the redwoods at Montalvo in Saratoga. We will end up at the lookout for a view of the valley. Bring water and a snack. We can add lunch in Saratoga at one of the many restaurants. Because of rush hour, we will go via Blossom Hill Road, all the way to Los Gatos and from there to Saratoga; that should work well, especially now that the schools are out. Johanna will have directions if needed, so we will meet at 8:30 as usual.

Saturday, August 5: Wate and Johanna Bakker (408-223 2190) will lead an urban hike in San Francisco. We will start at the Embarcadero, have coffee at El Fornaio and climb up the steps to the Coit Tower (with rest stops) and from there stroll to Chinatown for lunch. We will return to the waterfront, visiting some gardens on the way. The hike will be 4-5 miles with 400-500-ft elevation gain and is suitable for both Ramblers and Long Hikers. Dress in layers and bring water. Car round-trip mileage is about 110.





"Transit" by Rachel Cusk: In the wake of her family's collapse, a writer and her two young sons move to London. This upheaval is the catalyst for a number of transitions—personal, moral, artistic, and practical—as she endeavors to construct a new reality for herself and her children. Filtered through the impersonal gaze of its keenly intelligent protagonist, "Transit" delves deeper into the themes first raised in Cusk's critically acclaimed novel Outline, and captures with unsettling restraint and honesty the longing to both inhabit and flee one's life. "Apprentice In Death" by J.D. Robb: The shots came quickly, silently, and with deadly accuracy: three people dead at Central Park's ice-skating rink. But the number of people with that particular skill set is finite: police, military, professional killers. Eve's husband, Roarke, has unlimited resources at his disposal. 

# Turf Rejuvenation Program continues

In October, the Association Board approved a community wide turf rejuvenation program at a cost of \$198,383. The work entails slit-seeding (a planting process) roughly 30 acres of common area with Tall Fescue grass. This work is the second part of a two-part project intended to fill in community turf areas that have either died, or have become infested with noxious grasses or weeds, over time due to the most recent drought period.

The first step of the preparation process for a slit-seeding program like this is to kill all the weeds and noxious grasses (in all 30 acres). Round Up will be used to achieve the objective (signs and notices will be posted). This means that many turf areas in the community will brown out, and they will stay that way for a couple of weeks before the seeding process can take place. Even then, please remember that it will take time for the grass to grow in, so areas will look sparse for a couple of months. (Mowing and day watering schedules will be adjusted accordingly.)

Strategy: Try to set up the Clubs while still having controls in the other suits. Since East bid, there is a good possibility that he has the King and Queen of Spades providing the opportunity to finesse and get another trick in Spades.

West leads the 10 of Diamonds, South, the Ace, switches to the Jack of Clubs, East ducks, continues playing the 6 of Clubs, East wins with the Ace, and South plays the 10 of Clubs in order to reach the board. East now plays a low Diamond, West, the 9, and South does not play the King. West then leads a Heart, South, the Ace, switches to the 6 of Spades, covers with the Jack on the board, and East, the Queen. He leads the Queen of Diamonds, South, the King, switches to the 9 of Spades, East ducks, South, the 10. He leads a low Club to the 9 on the board, plays the King of Hearts, then leads a Club to the King in his hand; next the Queen, and plays the last card, the Ace of Spades. Great! The contract is made with an extra trick. If South had played the King of Diamonds on the second Diamond lead, then when East gets in he can make another Diamond trick and prevent South from making an overtrick.

- North knows they have Clubs but 3 NoTrump is easier to make than 5 Clubs. He bids the Hearts to show a stopper.
- ^ South is happy to see the Heart bid, and bids game in NoTrump since he has a Spade stopper plus an opening hand.

# Mary Lou Gilleland


April 2, 1928 - June 18, 2017


