Napa Wine Train, all aboard!

Friday, September 8, is the time to get aboard the Napa Wine Train. The Wine Train route is a three-hour, 36-mile, round trip excursion from the historical town of Napa through one of the world's most famous wine valleys to the quaint village of St. Helena and return.

Dine in style with choice of four entrée selections (vegetarian menu is available upon request). The Villages will have the first seating excursion, which begins in the Dining Car, approximately 1-1/2 hours later we will be escorted to a Lounge Car to enjoy dessert and coffee.

Lounges and Wine Tasting Cars are lavishly restored 1915 vintage turn-of-the-century Pullman carriages replete with swivel lounge chairs, love seats, rich polished woods, etched glass. One lounge features a Tasting Bar and piano and you can visit this car during the journey.

Plan on arriving at Cribari Center's east parking lot at 7:15 a.m. The bus will depart from The Villages no later than 7:30 a.m. Group check-in is at 11:30 a.m. at Napa Train Station. There will be a wine symposium (tasting) prior to boarding the train at 12 p.m. Departure from Napa will be at 12:30 p.m. and return at 3:30 p.m.

Upon return to the Napa Train Station you will have approximately 45 minutes to shop in the Retail Wine Shop and the Boutique. Plan to be ready to board the bus for return to The Villages at 4:15 p.m.

Register in the Community Resource Center, Building B starting Monday, July 31. The cost of this outing, which includes bus, train ride, gourmet lunch, is only \$165 per person.

I genuinely appreciate that ground cover anchors the hillside and helps prevent mudslides. I also enjoy sitting on the patio and looking at our small area of flowers. However, when I look over the fence, the hillside remains an eyesore. Seeding wild flowers among the anchor cover and adding decorative rocks are ideas that might help create some beauty. I have worked with representatives of the landscaping department with limited success.

When driving around, I find much of the landscaping very appealing. I see landscape workers busy maintaining and enhancing areas that show off the charm and beauty of The Villages. Many of the techniques being used by the landscaping staff, in highly visible areas, would also be effective in less visible areas. I expect landscaping in all areas to reflect positively on The Villages. After all, we live here, entertain guests on our patios, and encourage friends to move here. We see planned landscaping, or, in a few areas, a lack of planning. Not so visible areas need landscaping and a plan, too.

Association/Homeowners documents available via e-mail

Per an amendment to California Civil Code, homeowner associations are permitted, with owner's written consent, to distribute annual disclosures, (like the pro forma budget summary) and other specified association documents to owners via electronic mail, facsimile, or other electronic means (such as posting on the association's website) instead of sending those documents out by regular mail or personal delivery. This has the potential to provide cost savings to The Villages. Delivery and postage costs for the Villages' annual distribution of the pro forma budget summary alone are close to \$1,000, not to mention the paper and printing costs that run about \$8,000.

In order to transmit association documents via e-mail or by posting on the homeowners association's website, 1) the homeowners association must first receive the owner's written consent, and 2) the homeowners association sends a separate notice to the owner that the documents have been posted and are available for viewing.

Consent forms for owners to request delivery of documents have been developed for both The Villages Association and Homeowners Corporations. These forms provide an owner's consent to delivery electronically, of documents that are capable, under current laws, of being distributed electronically. Owners have the right to revoke this request and receive "hard copies" of the documents by sending a written revocation signed by the owner, to the applicable corporation.

The Board will consider oral and written comments regarding the proposed changes at the September 12, 2017, study session (1:30 p.m. at Foothill Center). Rules Introduction

The purpose of this revision is to clarify the hierarchy of the Governing Documents and to clarify the basis of, and enforcement of, rules.

INTRODUCTION

Basis for Club Rules

To protect our property, our peace of mind, our safety, and our enjoyment of the many facilities in The Villages, the Club Board of Directors has approved rules <u>Rules</u> that are meant to be fair and reasonable for everyone. It is anticipated that each member's <u>Member's</u> observance of these rules will be on the basis of "being a good neighbor."

The Villages Golf and Country Club (Club) is <u>a</u> non-profit mutual benefit corpo-

each occupant <u>Owners and residents</u> are advised to know and abide by the Club Rules. All registered residents (Responsible Resident) shall be <u>are</u> responsible for the conduct of their <u>household members</u>, guests and visitors, including rule <u>Rule</u> violations by those persons. All non-resident owners <u>Non-resident Owners</u> shall be <u>are</u> responsible for the conduct of the occupants of their residences, and shall will receive copies of any rule violation notices sent to the occupants.

The <u>Introduction and the</u> following Club Rules have been approved by the Club Board to govern the use of property and to regulate activities within The Villages.

Authority to Establish Rules

The Club Board of Directors derives its authority to establish rules from the Corporation's governing documents, Articles of Incorporation, <u>Incorporation</u> and Bylaws.

- The hierarchy of authority for the community's governing laws is as follows:
- 1. Statutory and Common Law Foundation Federal, state, and local law
- 2. Articles of Incorporation
- 3. Bylaws
- 4. Rules, Policies and Resolutions

Enforcement of Rules

The Bylaws establish the Board's authority to enforce Club Rules, including suspension of the member's Club privileges for a period not to exceed thirty (30) days for each violation, and by levy of the imposition of a monetary assessment penalty (fine) and the suspension of the right to use the Club's recreational and other facilities, not to exceed thirty (30) days for each violation. After an adequate investigation of an alleged violation, that a rule violation has occurred the responsible resident and non-resident owner, Owner, if applicable, shall will be notified and a hearing held, in accordance with the procedures outlined in the paragraph of Club Rule 1.02.5 1.02 titled Enforcement and Penalties for Traffic Violations Violations, and Club Rule 1.71, Enforcement of Non-Traffic Rules.

Reporting Rule Violations

Public Safety

Protection of persons and property is a basic requirement for Villages residents. The General Manager has established the Public Safety department to provide this service. It is essential that owners, Owners, residents, guests, and resident residents' employees comply with all the rules Rules in order to have an orderly and peaceful community.

Enforcement of public safety is placed in the office of the Director of Public Safety. Admittance to The Villages is restricted to those who have approval for entering. Public Safety officers are instructed to respond to emergency requests only. The Director of Public Safety will consider other requests on a case-bycase basis.

Rule 1.10 Clubhouse

The purpose of this revision is to clarify the dress code, and include the Bistro Patio as a dining area.

1.10 CLUBHOUSE

The Villages Clubhouse is available for the use of residents and guests. It includes the Restaurant and Bistro Restaurant, the Bistro and Bistro Patio, as well as large banquet rooms for scheduled social events. The banquet facilities may be reserved by Villages residents, Villages clubs and organizations, and outside parties. The Club Board has delegated responsibility of management, reservations and use of the Clubhouse to the Food and Beverage Department.

The Bistro Patio includes all the outdoor area where tables and chairs are set up near the Bistro and Pro Shop.

A. Availability

The Restaurant is open Tuesday through Sunday as posted and the capacity is 78. The Bistro is and Bistro Patio are open every day as posted and the capacity is 65.

The menus and specials are published weekly in The Villager, The Villages GCC Fast Lane and on Channel 26.

The Clubhouse and Bistro also offer meals packed to go, which may be ordered by phone for pick-up at either restaurant which happens to be open for that meal period.

Excluding the Bistro and Bistro Patio, The the Clubhouse is closed on Mondays, except for special events.

The banquet rooms may be reserved for use individually or in any combination. The Fairway Room and Oak Room each have a capacity for 120 and the Sunset Room capacity is 100.

B. Reservations

Subject to prior booking dates for outside group events a Clubhouse Annual Master Calendar is established by the Food and Beverage Department for reservations by Board recognized Board-recognized organizations. After the Master Calendar is established, all remaining dates are available for reservation according to the following priority:

- 1) Boards of Directors and management
- 2) Villages clubs, organizations and Board-appointed committees
- 3) Individual Villages residents
- 4) Outside groups

Reservations would be appreciated by groups of all sizes. Groups of eight or more, to be readily accommodated, are required to make reservations. Reservations will be held for 15 fifteen (15) minutes only.

C. Clubhouse Dress Code

1) In general At all times, everyone must be dressed in street clothes, including footwear. Appropriate attire, from sports to casual to dressy, is expected within the Clubhouse. Metal spiked golf shoes are always prohibited.

<u>2)</u> After 5:00 p.m., dinner attire is required in the Restaurant. Allowable items include dinner attire includes:

- a) For women: Dresses, skirts, slacks, dress jeans, blouses, suits, jackets and sweaters.
- b) For men: Slacks, dress shorts and jeans, dress shirts with or without collars or turtleneck sweaters, suits, jackets and sweaters. Ties are optional. No hats - medical reasons excluded.

The Food and Beverage Manager may alter this dress code for special events,

3) No smoking is permitted indoors. Smoking is prohibited indoors and on the Bistro Patio.

4) Only freestanding decorations, including balloons, signs or streamers, may be used. Nothing will may be affixed to an exposed surface within the Clubhouse. Decorations and decorating are the responsibility of the resident-sponsor.

5) Confetti, including glitter, is not permitted on linen-covered tables. Prior approval by Management must be obtained for any use of confetti or similar material for table decorations. Confetti, glitter, and similar materials are not permitted for table decorations without approval by Food and Beverage Management, and are never permitted on linen-covered tables. Confetti, rice and other materials are not permitted to be thrown inside or outside the building.

6) Balloons, signs, or other route indicators, are not permitted within The Villages. Balloons or signs are permitted outside and adjacent to the Clubhouse, only if they extend no further than the building's curb.

E. Food Service

1) Food service reservations may be made in all areas of the Clubhouse through the Food and Beverage department Department.

2) Bringing outside food or beverage beverages into the Clubhouse or onto the Bistro Patio is prohibited unless approved in advance by the Food and Beverage Department. Fees may be charged for special services.

3) All Clubhouse services will include a service charge and sales tax.

4) The Food and Beverage Department offers catering services to private Villages residences, to all Club Community Centers, Cribari Plaza, and the Gazebo Park.

5) Customer removal or take-out of left-over food from buffet service is not permitted.

F. Public Safety

Anyone scheduling an event at the Clubhouse that includes non-resident guests must notify Public Safety of the name, location and time of the event and the names of the arriving non-resident guests.

G. Fees

A schedule of charges and restrictions for all reservations and special services is available at the Clubhouse office (408-223-4687).

Services may be added to a resident's monthly bill, or may be paid by cash or approved credit card. Reciprocal guests may use cash, inter-club charge, or credit card. Other guests may use cash or credit card.

Use fees Use-fees for the Clubhouse facilities are established by the Club Board.

Rule 1.70 Public Safety

The Rules Committee recommends deleting Rule 1.70, Public Safety, as redundant, because the identical language is contained in the Rules Introduction.

1.70 PUBLIC SAFETY

Protection of persons and property is a basic requirement for Villages residents. The General Manager has established the Public Safety Department to provide this service.

It is essential that owners, residents, guests and resident employees comply with all the rules in order to have an orderly and peaceful community.

Enforcement of public safety is placed in the office of the Director of Public Safety. Admittance to The Villages is restricted to those who have approval for entering. Public Safety officers are instructed to respond to emergency requests only. The Director of Public Safety will consider other requests on a case-by-case basis.

D. Decorum

Residents and quests attending functions at the Clubhouse are expected to dress and conduct themselves according to these stated rules Rules. Violations of this rule the Rules will be corrected immediately by the Manager on duty.

1) Abusive behavior by residents or guests toward employees or other customers will not be tolerated. is prohibited.

2) Excessive noise, as determined by the Clubhouse Manager, will not be permitted. is prohibited.

HIKING CLUB SCHEDULE

Unless otherwise indicated, all hikes meet at Cribari Center at 8:30 a.m. and depart at 8:45 a.m.

Saturday, August 5: Wate and Johanna Bakker (408-223 2190) will lead an urban hike in San Francisco. We will start at the Embarcadero, have coffee at El Fornaio and climb up the steps to the Coit Tower (with rest stops) and from there stroll to Chinatown for lunch. We will return to the waterfront, visiting some gardens on the way. The hike will be 4-5 miles with 400-500-ft elevation gain and is suitable for both Ramblers and Long Hikers. Dress in layers and bring water. Car round-trip mileage is about 110.

Wednesday, August 9 (Rambler): Ramon and Marianna Reza (714-306-5333) will lead a hike on the Cogswell Marsh Trail. This flat gravel trail begins and ends at the Hayward Shoreline Interpretive Center and is 3.6 miles long, round trip. It skirts along a freshwater marsh - a haven for migrating birds - until it reaches the SF Bay. The SF and Oakland skylines can be seen across the water. Bring water and dress in layers. Lunch at the nearby Bay City Bistro is an option. Since bathrooms are not available on this hike, the Bay City Bistro is also providing us pre-hike access to their bathrooms. Round trip auto mileage is approximately 80 miles. To minimize traffic delays, we will meet at the Cribari Center at 9 a.m. for a 9:15 a.m. departure.

Saturday, August 12: Gary and Terry Holmquist (408-531-9779) will lead a hike at Coyote Hills Regional Park in Newark. The hike will head out from the visitors center to the bay and then return to a view point at Red Hill overlooking the park. Total distance will be approximately 5 miles. Long hikers can do a longer route to the nature center across Rt 84 and back and climb some of the hills. We will have lunch at the picnic area near the visitors center. We can also spend time touring the visitor center and some of the boardwalks into the nearby marshland. The trail is flat and usually cooled by winds off the bay so that it should be pleasant even if the day is warm. Bring water, lunch and perhaps binoculars for bird watching. Round trip driving distance is 60 miles.

Wednesday, August 16 (Rambler): Bonnie Preston (408-531-1513) will lead us on a Salt Marsh Safari boat tour through the Alviso Slough to explore the natural history of the South San Francisco Bay. This free program is sponsored by the Santa Clara Park and Recreation District and is an educational boat tour where we will learn about the natural history of the South San Francisco Bay and how the landscape has changed over time. It will be from 10 to 11 a.m. sharp so we will meet at 8:15 a.m. and leave promptly at 8:30 a.m. due to slow commuter time. We can walk around the site and eat at a favorite local restaurant when finished. It is limited to 16 people so call Bonnie ASAP to secure a spot. She will give you all the information you'll need.

Saturday, August 19: Amy Meier (408-799-4274) will lead a hike in the Purisima open space area, starting at the trailhead near Highway 1, south of half Moon Bay. The trail is frequently shaded by redwood trees but also contains sunny areas with grass and chaparral. We expect that the nearby ocean will keep us cool. The elevation difference is about 1800 ft and the distance is 9-10 miles. Wear layers and bring plenty of water and a lunch. A stop in Half Moon Bay for a libation and/or more food is possible. Round trip car mileage 120.



The Villages Medical Auxiliary (VMA) has knee scooters to help you get around when recovering from foot or ankle surgery. Hand/foot exercisers are available to help you after knee or hip surgery. Having trouble getting out of bed, the VMA has bed rails.

Other equipment provided for loan by the VMA include: For the bath/shower - shower seats, transfer benches,

bathtub boards, tub safety rails. We have walkers with two, three or four wheels. We have adjustable canes, quad base canes, and crutches.

For toilet assistance there are bedside commodes, over the toilet commodes, elevated toilet seats and toilet arm rests.

If you have a question about any of our medical equipment or want to schedule a drop off or pickup, call the VMA office (408-238-4230) Monday through Thursday from 9:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. If it's an emergency and you need medical equipment when the VMA office is closed, contact Public Safety.

Villager Gary Walden and his fleet of Villager volunteers maintain the equipment and deliver and pick up the equipment at your doorstep. There is no need to come to the office. Reasons to use a reverse mortgage when purchasing a home

Did you know you could use a reverse mortgage to purchase a home if you are age 62 or older? This is a fantastic opportunity for a senior citizen to buy a new home, live mortgage-payment-free and keep an additional nest egg for the future.

An example is Lux who recently sold her home for \$800,000, netting approximately \$690,000. She wanted to purchase a place for \$650,000, which would give her a reserve of only \$40,000. However, she learned she could purchase the property for \$280,000 cash and a \$370,000 reverse mortgage. She is very excited because this will leave her almost \$410,000 in cash reserves. Yet, because it is a reverse mortgage she will not have to make any mortgage payments until her home is sold or she no longer uses it as her primary residence. Of course she will still be responsible for property taxes, HOA assessments and property insurance. (Note: The reverse mortgage loan amount is calculated on the home price and your age, if a couple, the younger borrower's age is used).

There is an extra bonus for Lux because her purchase price of \$650,000 is less than her sales price of \$800,000, so she will be able to transfer her property taxes to her new home. She had lived in her home for over 30 years so her property taxes are quite low.

If you know of anyone who might be in this situation, please suggest that they consult their tax adviser and talk to a Senior Equity Reverse Mortgage specialist. The SRS office has a list of loan specialists who have obtained reverse mortgages for Villagers.



"War Cry" by Wilbur Smith: As a member of the Courtney family, Leon Courtney knows how quickly fortunes can be won and lost. Over the course of more than two centuries, generations of his family have risen and fallen with the tides of history. Leon, too, has experienced his own share of triumph and pain. In the wake of his wife's death, the renowned big-game hunter is raising his young daughter, Saffron, alone in colonial Kenya. In the 1920s, the continent of Africa is a dangerous place. As Leon attempts to navigate the murky political waters of this most exquisitely beautiful and wildest of lands, his daughter grows into an independent and headstrong young woman bound for a far different life in Britain, as a student at Oxford. Smith captures the tensions that will spark a war across continents—and the uncertainty and hopes of a father and daughter caught in its grips. Fiction. 2017.







Time to make your 2018 Telephone Directory updates

It is time for input for the 2018 Villages Telephone Directory. To verify that your listing is correct or if you want to make a change or update your information, please contact Public Safety Administration (Building C) at 408-239-5246, option 2, as soon as possible. The deadline for any changes for the 2018 Telephone Directory is Friday, September 15.

Guest/Common Parking within the **Condominium Development**

Association Rule 2-17, Section 2: Villages-registered golf carts/LSV, motorcycles and two-axle passenger vehicles that are of a type customarily used for personal transportation may be parked within the Condominium Development subject to local posting by Public Safety and as approved by the Board. Overnight parking of these vehicles is restricted to the garage, carport or driveway assigned to the resident's villa. No vehicle that is incapable of being parked within the entire boundary of the garage, carport or driveway may be parked within the Condominium Development. Temporary exceptions may be authorized by Public Safety.

Cribari and Del Lago Districts are permitted to park in common area parking for a maximum of 48 hours.

During hot weather, take care to avoid heat stress

If you are 65 years of age or older, it becomes more important to avoid heat stress during periods of hot weather. Since elderly people do not adjust as well as young people to sudden changes in the weather, it is important to take precautions to avoid pushing the body past its stress limit.

Older, at-risk adults should be visited twice a day and monitored for signs of heat exhaustion. If they do not have air conditioning in their homes, then they should be taken to air-conditioned locations-at the very least, they should have a fan.

To prevent heat stress or heat stroke, which occurs when the body becomes unable to regulate its own temperature, 1.) drink cool, nonalcoholic, non-caffeinated beverages (unless your water intake is being regulated by a doctor-if that is the case, follow the doctor's directions). 2.) make sure to rest during hot periods. 3.) cool off by taking a cool shower, bath or sponge bath. 4.) remain indoors during the hottest part of the day, if possible stay in an air-conditioned environment. 5.) wear lightweight clothing. 6.) do not engage in strenuous activities.

Heat exhaustion can develop over several days of exposure to hot weather if the body is unable to replace lost fluids.

The symptoms of heat exhaustion include heavy sweating, paleness, muscle cramps, tiredness, weakness, dizziness, headache, nausea or vomiting, fainting, moist or even cool skin, a fast and weak pulse rate and fast and shallow breathing.

Heat stroke, the most serious heat-related illness, may be the result of a long period of heat stress or may come quickly if the person is exposed to extreme temperatures. Heat stroke occurs when the body loses its ability to sweat and is unable to cool down. Body temperatures may rise to 106-degrees or higher within ten to 15 minutes. Untreated heat stroke is likely to result in death or permanent disability if not treated immediately.

The symptoms of heat stroke include a very high body temperature (above 103-degrees F), reddened, hot and dry skin (no sweating), a rapid and strong pulse, a throbbing headache, dizziness and nausea.

What do you do if you see someone with severe heat stress?

Act quickly because you may be dealing with a life-threatening emergency. First call 911 for immediate medical assistance, then call Public Safety at 223-4665 while you begin cooling the person off.

If you are outdoors get the person to a shady area. Cool the person rapidly, using whatever means you can-provide a cool bath or shower, spray the person with cool water from a hose or wrap the person in a cool, wet sheet and fan him or her vigorously. Monitor the person's body temperature and continue cooling efforts until body temperature drops below 101-degrees F. If emergency personnel are delayed, call a hospital emergency room for further instructions. Do not give the person any alcoholic beverages-water is best. Above all, get medical assistance as soon as possible.

COMMUNITY CHAPEL

If you are running behind, it is very difficult to **catch up** if you don't have the **mustard**. In most cases in life, once you have fallen behind it is as if the force of gravity weighs you down with every effort to move ahead.

As a young athlete in my day, training was paramount to one's success in completing the race and finishing well in the competition. Each day there was the challenge of conforming to the rigor of training and putting the proper time in for workouts. It was like walking on a tight rope, any deviation from the routine such as not getting proper rest, eating the wrong foods, skipping your workouts or becoming ill, could set you back.

Nothing deterred me from training; I would run in the rain, the snow, on cloudy days and hot and humid days. There were days that I simply did not want to do it. I find it interesting when you don't want to do something, how difficult it is for the body to respond. So, I would press on and in not too long a time, the body would respond favorably, enabling me to enjoy the workout. The days that I allowed myself to become lazy in my workouts would cause me to do double duty next time in order to regain my momentum.

Today my workouts are a lot different but nevertheless still challenging. My workouts today consist of the rigor of exercising my faith under all circumstances. Faith requires you to trust something or somebody with your life and all that pertains to it. We trust our spouses, our doctors, our bankers, our lawyers, our food producers, our vehicles and our politicians while we find it difficult to exercise our faith in trusting God. Yet our currency states, "In God We Trust"—is that true for you?




TENNIS TALK



Regarding the Annual Random Smoke and Carbon Monoxide and Insurance Certification

Once again it's that time of the year that I have to start the Annual Random Smoke and Carbon Monoxide and Insurance certification verification from Association members/residents per the Association CC&Rs and Board Policy APo 408 and Procedure APr 408 (Smoke Detector Installation, Maintenance, Repair and Replacement) and the Association CC&Rs and Board Policy APo 409 and Procedure APr 409 (Home Owner & Resident Insurance Requirements and Verification)

In August, you will receive a lavender notice requesting that you contact me at your earliest convenience so we can schedule an appointment for the Smoke and Carbon Monoxide inspection as well as to provide a copy of your current insurance policy certificate (coverage page or declaration), which provides the information below.

Insurance Required:

Owners - Property and Liability insurance is commonly referred to as HO6.

General liability coverage must be maintained in an amount of not less than \$300,000.
 Property damage insurance covering the contents and personal property within the condominium in an amount deemed appropriate by the owner.

3. Loss assessment coverage must be maintained in an amount equal to or greater than the amount of the deduction under the hazard insurance policy carried by the Association (currently \$5,000).

Renters - Property and Liability insurance is commonly referred to as HO4.

1. General liability coverage must be maintained in an amount of not less than \$300,000.

2. Property damage insurance covering the personal property within the condominium in an amount deemed appropriate by the renter.

A 30-day period in which to submit the required documentation will be provided.

Owners and renters can also request that their Insurance Company forward a copy of the updated Insurance Certificate when issued or renewed. A copy of the declaration page from the policy is also acceptable as proof of insurance as long as it shows all of the requirements.

This is a mandatory procedure required by the Association's governing documents. It is for each resident's protection to have the correct amount of Property and Liability coverage. 
Dealer has Spade losers unless he trumps on the board, maybe a Heart loser, possible one or more Diamond losers and a Club loser.

Strategy: Try to trump some of the Spade losers and finesse the Queen of Diamonds.

West leads the 5 of Spades, East, King, South wins with the Ace, plays a low Diamond and successfully finesses the Queen. He switches to a Heart to the Ace in his hand, follows with a Spade, trumps it on the board, continues with another Heart to the King in his hand, leads a Spade and trumps it on the board. He now leads the Ace of Diamonds, then the thirteenth Diamond, sluffs the Jack of Spades from his hand, and West trumps. Now West plays the Queen of Spades, South trumps, follows with the Queen of Hearts, next leads his last card, a Club, which East wins with the King. Great! The contract is made exactly. By the way 3 NoTrump could also be made but game in the major provides more points.

This is an artificial bid saying nothing about Clubs but asking partner if he has a 4-card major suit.

South bids his 4 card major and North is delighted that he has the suit and bids game due to his HCP. Remember with 2-four card suits, go up the ladder, and with 2-five card suits, go down the ladder bidding the higher one first.

Turf Rejuvenation Program continues

people what they wanted, they would have said 'faster horses'

One of my favorite stories - and it may only be a story - holds that around the year 1900 in New York City, the greatest minds of the day thought that the biggest problem New York would face 100 years hence would be horse poop! Based on the growing population and the projections for economic growth, they were convinced that the horse droppings would be waist high by year 2000! Perhaps someday people will look back at our time and snicker about our inability to see the solutions to world hunger, radical jihad, climate change, etc. that were coming.

In October, the Association Board approved a turf rejuvenation program. The work entails slit-seeding (a planting process) roughly 30 acres of common area with Tall Fescue grass. This work is the second part of a two-part project intended to fill in community turf areas that have either died, or have become infested with noxious grasses or weeds, over time due to the most recent drought period.

The first step of the preparation process for a slit-seeding program like this is to kill all the weeds and noxious grasses (in all 30 acres). Round Up will be used to achieve the objective (signs and notices will be posted). This means that many turf areas in the community will brown out, and they will stay that way for a couple of weeks before the seeding process can take place. Even then, please remember that it will take time for the grass to grow in, so areas will look sparse for a couple of months.


