Notice of Proposed Changes to Club Rules

At the July 25, 2017 Club Board meeting, the following proposed changes recommended by the Club Rules Committee to Club rules were approved by the Club Board of Directors for 30-day notice publication prior to formal approval consideration at the September 27, 2017, monthly Board meeting. The Board will consider oral and written comments regarding the proposed changes at the September 12, 2017, study session (1:30 p.m. at Foothill Center). Response to the proposed rule changes may be made by one or more of the following methods: 1) Participation in the discussion of the change at the Club Board of Directors study session at which the proposed rule change will be considered, 2) via e-mail with comments sent to the General Manager's office at least seven (7) days prior to the Club Board of Directors study session (jmeadows@the-villages.com), and 3) via written comments to the General Manager's offices delivered at least seven (7) days prior to the Club Board of Directors study session.

Note: Deleted items are in ~~strike through font~~, inserted items are in underlined font, and the purposes of the proposed changes are in *italics*.

Rules Introduction

The purpose of this revision is to clarify the hierarchy of the Governing Documents and to clarify the basis of, and enforcement of, rules.

INTRODUCTION

Basis for Club Rules

To protect our property, our peace of mind, our safety, and our enjoyment of the many facilities in The Villages, the Club Board of Directors has approved rules Rules that are meant to be fair and reasonable for everyone. It is anticipated that each member's Member's observance of these rules will be on the basis of "being a good neighbor."

The Villages Golf and Country Club (Club) is a non-profit mutual benefit corporation organized under the Nonprofit Mutual Benefit Corporation law, organized to manage, maintain, and operate land and facilities owned by the corporation. It qualifies as a Senior Citizen Housing Development under the provision of California Civil Code 51.3. [new paragraph]

Upon the purchase of a condominium or a single family home within The Villages, the owner Owner becomes a member Member of the Club and is subject to the rules Rules and policies Policies approved by the Club's Board of Directors. The owner Owner and registered resident, if not the owner, Owner, are provided a copy of the Club Rules at the time of residency registration. ~~The owner and each occupant Owners and residents~~ are advised to know and abide by the Club Rules. All registered residents (Responsible Resident) shall be are responsible for the conduct of their household members, guests and visitors, including rule Rule violations by those persons. ~~All non-resident owners Non-resident Owners~~ shall be are responsible for the conduct of the occupants of their residences, and shall will receive copies of any rule violation notices sent to the occupants.

The Introduction and the following Club Rules have been approved by the Club Board to govern the use of property and to regulate activities within The Villages.

Authority to Establish Rules

The Club Board of Directors derives its authority to establish rules from the Corporation's governing documents; Articles of Incorporation; Incorporation and Bylaws.

The hierarchy of authority for the community's governing laws is as follows:

1. ~~Statutory and Common Law Foundation~~ Federal, state, and local law
2. Articles of Incorporation
3. Bylaws
4. Rules, Policies and Resolutions

Enforcement of Rules

The Bylaws establish the Board's authority to enforce Club Rules, including ~~suspension of the member's Club privileges for a period not to exceed thirty (30) days for each violation, and by levy of the imposition of a monetary assessment penalty (fine) and the suspension of the right to use the Club's recreational and other facilities, not to exceed thirty (30) days for each violation.~~ After an adequate investigation ~~of an alleged violation, that a rule violation has occurred~~ the responsible resident and non-resident owner, Owner, if applicable, shall will be notified and a hearing held, in accordance with the procedures outlined in the paragraph of Club Rule 1.02-5 1.02 titled Enforcement and Penalties for Traffic Violations Violations, and Club Rule 1.71, Enforcement of Non-Traffic Rules.

Reporting Rule Violations

Complaints of rule Rule violations should be made to Public Safety either in person to Public Safety at Administration Building C or by phone (408-239-5246) or by mail ~~to~~ or e-mail to the Director of Public Safety, Villages Golf and Country Club, 5000 Cribari Lane, San Jose, CA 95135. Anonymous correspondence ~~sent to a Board member, the General Manager, or any employee~~ will be disregarded. All valid non-anonymous written complaints will receive a written response. The Director of Public Safety and staff will make their best efforts to maintain confidentiality of all complainants.

Public Safety

~~Protection of persons and property is a basic requirement for Villages residents. The General Manager has established the Public Safety department to provide this service. It is essential that owners, Owners, residents, guests, and resident residents' employees comply with all the rules Rules in order to have an orderly and peaceful community.~~

Enforcement of public safety is placed in the office of the Director of Public Safety. Admittance to The Villages is restricted to those who have approval for entering. Public Safety officers are instructed to respond to emergency requests only. The Director of Public Safety will consider other requests on a case-by-case basis.

Rule 1.10 Clubhouse

The purpose of this revision is to clarify the dress code, and include the Bistro Patio as a dining area.

1.10 CLUBHOUSE

The Villages Clubhouse is available for the use of residents and guests. It includes the ~~Restaurant and Bistro~~ Restaurant, the Bistro and Bistro Patio, as well as large banquet rooms for scheduled social events. The banquet facilities may be reserved by Villages residents, Villages clubs and organizations, and outside parties. The Club Board has delegated responsibility of management, reservations and use of the Clubhouse to the Food and Beverage Department.

The Bistro Patio includes all the outdoor area where tables and chairs are set up near the Bistro and Pro Shop.

A. Availability

The Restaurant is open Tuesday through Sunday as posted ~~and the capacity is 78. The Bistro is and Bistro Patio are open every day as posted and the capacity is 65.~~

The menus and specials are published weekly in The Villager, ~~The Villages GGG Fast Lane and on Channel 26.~~

The Clubhouse and Bistro also offer meals packed to go, which may be ordered by phone for pick-up at either restaurant which happens to be open for that meal period.

Excluding the Bistro and Bistro Patio, ~~The~~ the Clubhouse is closed on Mondays, except for special events.

The banquet rooms may be reserved for use individually or in any combination.

The Fairway Room and Oak Room each have a capacity for 120 and the Sunset Room capacity is 100.

B. Reservations

Subject to prior booking dates for outside group events a Clubhouse Annual Master Calendar is established by the Food and Beverage Department for reservations by ~~Board-recognized~~ Board-recognized organizations. After the Master Calendar is established, all remaining dates are available for reservation according to the following priority:

- 1) Boards of Directors and management
- 2) Villages clubs, organizations and Board-appointed committees
- 3) Individual Villages residents
- 4) Outside groups

Reservations would be appreciated by groups of all sizes. Groups of eight or more, to be readily accommodated, are required to make reservations. Reservations will be held for ~~15~~ fifteen (15) minutes only.

C. Clubhouse Dress Code

~~1) In general~~ At all times, everyone must be dressed in street clothes, including footwear. Appropriate attire, from sports to casual to dressy, is expected within the Clubhouse. Metal spiked golf shoes are always prohibited.

2) After 5:00 p.m., dinner attire is required in the Restaurant. Allowable items

include dinner attire includes:

- a) For women: Dresses, skirts, slacks, dress jeans, blouses, suits, jackets and sweaters.
- b) For men: Slacks, dress shorts and jeans, dress shirts with or without collars or turtleneck sweaters, suits, jackets and sweaters. Ties are optional. No hats – medical reasons excluded.

The Food and Beverage Manager may alter this dress code for special events, except for the no metal spiked golf shoe rule.

D. Decorum

Residents and guests attending functions at the Clubhouse are expected to dress and conduct themselves according to these stated rules. Violations of this rule the Rules will be corrected immediately by the Manager on duty.

- 1) Abusive behavior by residents or guests toward employees or other customers will not be tolerated: is prohibited.
- 2) Excessive noise, as determined by the Clubhouse Manager, will not be permitted: is prohibited.
- 3) No smoking is permitted indoors. Smoking is prohibited indoors and on the Bistro Patio.
- 4) Only freestanding decorations, including balloons, signs or streamers, may be used. Nothing will may be affixed to an exposed surface within the Clubhouse. Decorations and decorating are the responsibility of the resident-sponsor.
- 5) Confetti, including glitter, is not permitted on linen-covered tables. Prior approval by Management must be obtained for any use of confetti or similar material for table decorations. Confetti, glitter, and similar materials are not permitted for table decorations without approval by Food and Beverage Management, and are never permitted on linen-covered tables. Confetti, rice and other materials are not permitted to be thrown inside or outside the building.
- 6) Balloons, signs, or other route indicators, are not permitted within The Villages. Balloons or signs are permitted outside and adjacent to the Clubhouse, only if they extend no further than the building's curb.

E. Food Service

- 1) Food service reservations may be made in all areas of the Clubhouse through the Food and Beverage department Department.
- 2) Bringing outside food or beverage beverages into the Clubhouse or onto the Bistro Patio is prohibited unless approved in advance by the Food and Beverage Department. Fees may be charged for special services.

Pool Usage for Guests and Children under 18 Years

As a reminder, guests must be accompanied by a resident, who is present in the pool area, at all times. The pool areas include the pools, spas, and surrounding fenced-in area of each area of each facility. Additionally, children under 18 years of age may use the Cribari, Montgomery, and Vineyard pools and pool areas, but only between the hours as follows:

| Vineyard pool | 2 p.m. to 4 p.m. |

Children under 18 years of age may not use the spas. Diapers and training pants are not permitted in the pools. Children must be toilet trained and wear swimsuits.

As noted above, all children must leave the pool area at the end of children's hours.

Guest/Common Parking within the Condominium Development

Association Rule 2-17, Section 2: Villages-registered golf carts/LSV, motorcycles and two-axle passenger vehicles of a type customarily used for personal transportation may be parked within the Condominium Development, subject to local posting by Public Safety, and as approved by the Board. Overnight parking of these vehicles is restricted to the garage, carport or driveway assigned to the resident's villa. No vehicle incapable of being parked within the entire boundary of the garage, carport or driveway may be parked within the Condominium Development. Temporary exceptions may be authorized by Public Safety.

Cribari and Del Lago Districts are permitted to park in common area parking for a maximum of 48 hours.

- 3) All Clubhouse services will include a service charge and sales tax.
- 4) The Food and Beverage Department offers catering services to private Villages residences, to all Club Community Centers, Cribari Plaza, and the Gazebo Park.
- 5) Customer removal or take-out of left-over food from buffet service is not permitted.

F. Public Safety

Anyone scheduling an event at the Clubhouse that includes non-resident guests must notify Public Safety of the name, location and time of the event and the names of the arriving non-resident guests.

G. Fees

A schedule of charges and restrictions for all reservations and special services is available at the Clubhouse office (408-223-4687).

Services may be added to a resident's monthly bill, or may be paid by cash or approved credit card. Reciprocal guests may use cash, inter-club charge, or credit card. Other guests may use cash or credit card.

Use fees Use-fees for the Clubhouse facilities are established by the Club Board.

Rule 1.70 Public Safety

The Rules Committee recommends deleting Rule 1.70, Public Safety, as redundant, because the identical language is contained in the Rules Introduction.

1.70 PUBLIC SAFETY

HIKING CLUB SCHEDULE

Unless otherwise indicated, all hikes meet at Cribari Center at 8:30 a.m. and depart at 8:45 a.m.

Saturday, August 12: Gary and Terry Holmquist (408-531-9779) will lead a hike at Coyote Hills Regional Park in Newark. The hike will head out from the visitors center to the bay and then return to a view point at Red Hill overlooking the park. Total distance will be approximately 5 miles. Long hikers can do a longer route to the nature center across Rt 84 and back, and climb some of the hills. We will have lunch at the picnic area near the visitors center. We can also spend time touring the visitor center and some of the boardwalks into the nearby marshland. The trail is flat and usually cooled by winds off the bay, so it should be pleasant even if the day is warm. Bring water, lunch and perhaps binoculars for bird watching. Round trip driving distance is 60 miles.

Wednesday, August 16 (Rambler): Bonnie Preston (408-531-1513) will lead us on a Salt Marsh Safari boat tour through the Alviso Slough to explore the natural history of South San Francisco Bay. This free program is sponsored by the Santa Clara Park and Recreation District and is an educational boat tour where we will learn about the natural history of the South San Francisco Bay and how the landscape has changed over time. It will be from 10 to 11 a.m. sharp so we will meet at 8:15 a.m. and leave promptly at 8:30 a.m. due to slow commuter time. We can walk around the site and eat at a favorite local restaurant when finished. It is limited to 16 people so call Bonnie ASAP to secure a spot. She will give you all the information you'll need.

Saturday, August 19: Amy Meier (408-799-4274) will lead a hike in the Purisima open space area, starting at the trailhead near Highway 1, south of Half Moon Bay. The trail is frequently shaded by redwood trees but also contains sunny areas with grass and chaparral. We expect that the nearby ocean will keep us cool. The elevation difference is about 1800 ft and the distance is 9-10 miles. Wear layers and bring plenty of water and a lunch. A stop in Half Moon Bay for a libation and/or more food is possible. Round trip car mileage 120.

Wednesday, August 23 (Rambler): Rich Bainbridge (408-960-8335) and Wendy Ledamun (408-274-4215) will lead a hike in Coyote Creek. Be sure to take plenty of water. We'll meet at Cribari Center at 8:30 a.m. and leave at 8:45 a.m.

Saturday, August 26: Rich Bainbridge (408-499-1789) and Wendy Ledamun (408-712-7908) will lead a hike in Wunderlich County Park in Woodside. The hike is approximately 4 1/2 miles and winds through beautiful stands of mixed redwoods, madrones, oaks, and a lovely open meadow. Elevation gain is moderate with hiker friendly switchbacks. Bring water. After the hike, we'll stop at Robert's Market in Portola Valley for lunch or a sweet treat! Round trip driving distance is 70 miles.

Wednesday, August 30 (Rambler): Al Girolami (209-531-6553) will lead a hike to Coyote Lake- Harvey Bear Ranch County Park. The hike will be 4 miles on a mostly wide trail with an elevation gain of about 550 feet. The trail is less than 40 percent shaded so bring a hat, poles and plenty of water. We will part at the no fee Mendoza Ranch entrance and hike up the Coyote Ridge Trail, then go up the Mummy Mountain Trail to the top at 1274 feet with a great view of Coyote Lake. We will then complete the loop downhill to the parking area. For those interested in attempting the Santa Clara County Park # PixinParks challenge, Mummy Mountain is one of the necessary 7 destinations to qualify for a free T-shirt. We'll meet at Cribari at 8:30 a.m. and carpool for the 50 mile round trip. After concluding the hike, there will be an optional lunch at Denny's in Gilroy.

Consequently, Mia's bank accounts are titled as Payable on Death (POD) accounts, which means that upon Mia's death the bank accounts will automatically pass to her one or more named beneficiaries. Probate will not be required on the bank accounts.

Her primary asset, her condo, is in her name alone. Upon her death, it will require probate to transfer the ownership. Before January 1, 2016, Mia would have had to set up a living trust for her condo or add one or more joint tenants to her deed.

Joint tenancy does avoid probate, but it can cause problems of its own. Mia's joint tenants would legally own part of her condo. She would need their permission to sell or refinance. Their creditors could lien her condo. Upon creation of the joint tenancy, Mia would need to file a gift tax return. And most importantly, she can't change her mind and take the others off her deed.

On January 1, 2016, a new type of deed took effect in California: The Revocable Transfer on Death deed (TOD) also called a beneficiary deed. It names the beneficiaries who will receive the property when one dies without the need for probate.

The TOD deed can be revoked at any time. Your heirs do not own any of the property during your life, avoiding the above problems. But when you pass away, the real estate is transferred to the designated beneficiaries just like your Payable on Death bank accounts.

The form is available at the SRS office. It is also available at the Sacramento Law Library at www.saclaw.org/legal-forms. Click "Deeds and real estate forms".

SRS suggests that Mia chat with an attorney before making this change. Her decision for a TOD deed may be confirmed or she may be persuaded that another solution such as a Living Trust is better for her.

Next week we will discuss some administrative guidance for this form.

“The Chosen” by Gregg Zoroya: A single company of U.S. paratroopers—calling themselves the “Chosen Few”—arrived in Afghanistan in late 2007 hoping to win the hearts and minds of the remote mountain people and extend the Afghan government’s reach into this wilderness. Instead, they spent the next 15 months in a desperate struggle, living under almost continuous attack, forced into a slow and grinding withdrawal, and always outnumbered by Taliban fighters descending on them from all sides. Zoroya is an award-winning journalist and has written about the impact of war on troops and issues related to the care of veterans. 958.1. Afgan War. 2017

“Three Days In January” by Bret Baier: On January 17, Eisenhower spoke to the nation in one of the most remarkable of farewell speeches. Ike looked to the future, warning Americans against the dangers of elevating partisanship above national interest, excessive government budgets (particularly deficit spending), the expansion of the military-industrial complex, and the creeping political power of special interests. Seeking to ready a new generation for power, Eisenhower intensely advised the 43-year-old Kennedy before the inauguration. Five decades later, Baier makes clear that Eisenhower, an often forgotten giant of U.S. history, still offers vital lessons for our own time and stands as a lasting example of political leadership at its most effective and honorable. 973.921. 2017.

“Golden Prey” by John Sanford: A Biloxi, Mississippi, drug-cartel counting house gets robbed, and suitcases full of cash disappear, leaving behind five bodies, including a 6-year-old girl. Lucas Davenport takes the case, which quickly spirals out of control as cartel assassins—including a torturer known as the “queen of home-improvement tools”—compete with Davenport to find the Dixie Hicks shooters who knocked over the counting house. Things get ugly real fast, and neither the cartel killers nor the holdup men give a damn about whose lives Davenport might have saved; to them, he’s just another large target. Mystery. 2017.

“Lillian Boxfish Takes A Walk” by Kathleen Rooney: Lillian Boxfish took 1930s New York by storm, working her way up by writing copy to become the highest-paid advertising woman in the country. Now it’s 1984 and Lillian is 85 years old but just as sharp and savvy as ever and on her way to a party. On a walk that takes her more than 10 miles around the city, she meets bartenders, bodega clerks, security guards, criminals, children, parents, and parent-to-be while reviewing a life of excitement and adversity, passion and heartbreak, illuminating all the ways New York has changed—and has not. A love letter to a city from the Jazz Age to the onset of the AIDS epidemic, the Great Depression to the birth of hip-hop. Fiction. 2017.

“Camino Island” by John Grisham: A gang of thieves stage a daring heist from a secure vault deep below Princeton University’s Firestone Library. Their loot is priceless but Princeton has insured it for \$25 million dollars. Bruce Cable runs a popular bookstore in the resort town of Santa Rosa on Camino Island in Florida. Very few know that he occasionally dabbles in the black market of stolen books and manuscripts. Mercer Mann is a young novelist with a severe case of writer’s block. She is approached by a mysterious woman working for a mysterious company with a generous offer of money to go undercover and infiltrate Bruce Cable’s circle of literary friends, getting close enough to learn his secrets. 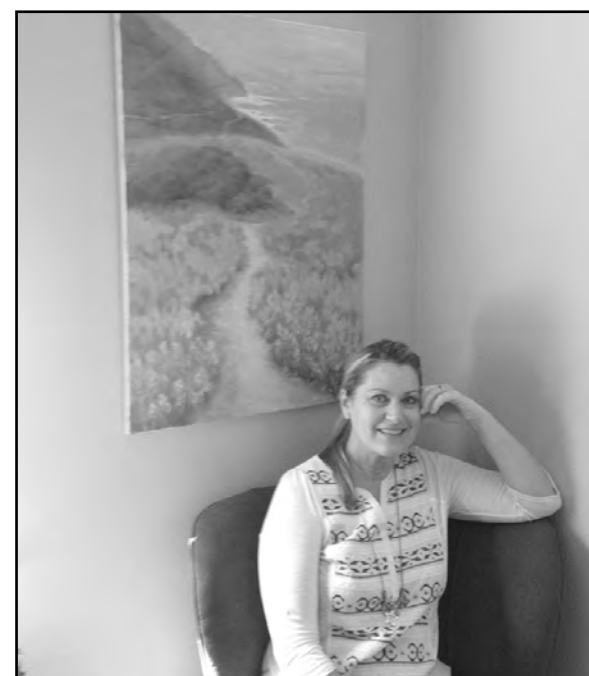

The Villages Amateur Theatre is bringing you a great comedy written by one of the masters, Noel Coward. This is an experience you will not want to miss.

Here is the plot provided by Wikipedia: "'Blithe Spirit' tells us the story of the socialite and novelist Charles Condomine, who invites the eccentric medium and clairvoyant, Madame Arcati, to his house to conduct a séance, hoping to gather material for his next book. The scheme backfires when he is haunted by the ghost of his annoying and temperamental first wife, Elvira, after the séance. Elvira makes continual attempts to disrupt Charles's marriage to his second wife, Ruth, who cannot see or hear the ghost."

The play ran for 1,997 performances in London and for 657 performances on Broadway. Noel Coward adapted the play for film and directed a musical adaptation, "High Spirits," on Broadway. It was also adapted for television in the 1950s and 1960s and for radio. The play was revived again in London in 2004, 2011 and 2014. It returned to Broadway in February 2009.

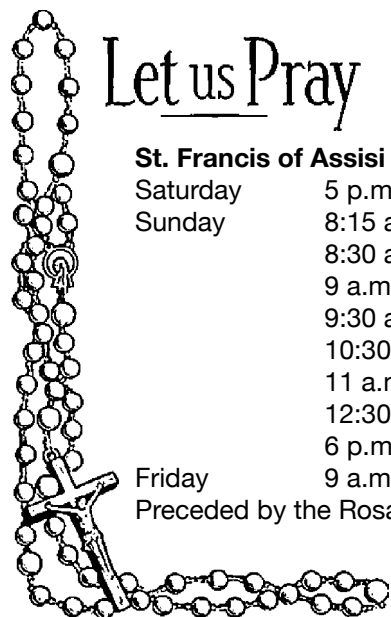

She then accepted and rejoiced as she thanked God for such a quick answer to her prayers. God will answer our prayers but we must remove our pride and excuses first for Him to bless us. *Remember to look for God's answer to our prayer. Don't miss it!*

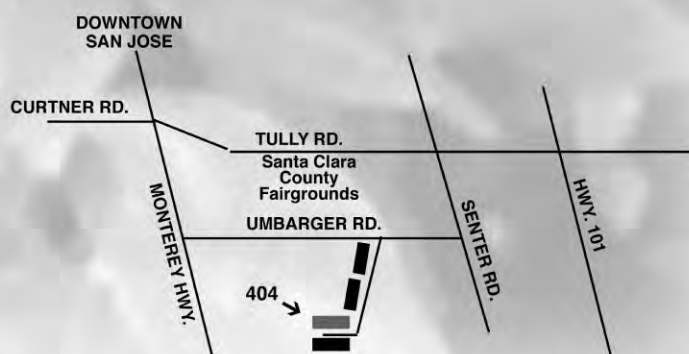

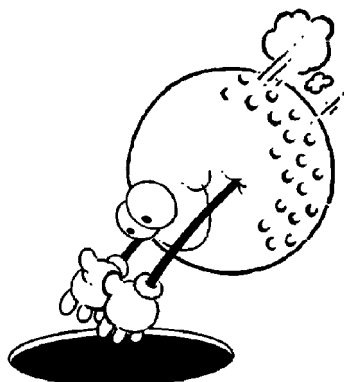

Cardboard—Must be flattened

Small sized cardboard (2' x 2' or smaller)—Flatten and place inside recycle container. Items such as cereal and cracker boxes, wine boxes, bottled water cardboard containers, beverage boxes, small cardboard boxes, etc.

- Remove all plastic and packaging from cardboard containers and dispose of properly (garbage).
- Flatten cardboard (release all seams so cardboard lays flat)
- Place inside white recycle dumpster or blue recycle carts (as applicable)

Medium to large sized cardboard (in smaller quantities)—Flatten and place beside the green garbage dumpster or blue recycle carts (as applicable) inside the trash enclosure. Items such as small appliance and furniture boxes, small moving boxes, etc.

- Remove all plastic from cardboard containers and dispose of properly (garbage).
- Flatten cardboard (release all seams so cardboard lays flat)
- Place neatly beside the green garbage dumpster or blue recycle carts (as applicable)

*Curb side garbage and recycling pick up: Cardboard must be flattened and bundled and placed next to the recycle cart.

Large sized cardboard and larger quantities of cardboard—Flatten and bring to green dumpsters at Corporation Yard

Large quantities of cardboard and large cardboard items such as appliance and furniture boxes, moving boxes, etc.

- Remove all plastic and packaging from cardboard containers and dispose of properly (garbage).
- Flatten (release all seams so cardboard lays flat)

Turf Rejuvenation

Program continues

In October, the Association Board approved a turf rejuvenation program. The work entails slit-seeding (a planting process) roughly 30 acres of common area with Tall Fescue grass. This work is the second part of a two-part project intended to fill in community turf areas that have either died, or have become infested with noxious grasses or weeds, over time due to the most recent drought period.

The first step of the preparation process for a slit-seeding program like this is to kill all the weeds and noxious grasses (in all 30 acres). Round Up will be used to achieve the objective (signs and notices will be posted). This means that many turf areas in the community will brown out, and they will stay that way for a couple of weeks before the seeding process can take place. Even then, please remember that it will take time for the grass to grow in, so areas will look sparse for a couple of months.

Fiscal Year 2017/2018 Annual Street Maintenance Project

On June 27 the Club Board approved the retention of K&M Asphalt Maintenance for the FY'17/18 Street Maintenance Project. This project provides for maintenance of roadways, parking lots and pathways in selected areas.

Designated locations undergo repairs, seal coat, paving, crack fill and striping on an annual basis. This year, the work is planned in Glen Arden, Highland and Montgomery. Work will also take place on Villages Parkway and Villages Fairway Drive.

Please be aware of construction signage, restrictions and closures. Notices are being delivered to homes directly impacted restrictions and closures. Updates will be posted in *The Villager*, on Channel 26 and Fast Lane.

The project is planned to take place over the months of August and September as follows:

Parking and Minimal Restrictions for the following work:

- August 4 through 10 Concrete Repairs (throughout community)
- August 10 through 15 Asphalt Repairs (Montgomery, Glen Arden and Highland)
- August 11 through 15 Paving Preparation (Montgomery, Glen Arden and Highland)

Street Closures Planned for the following work:

- August 16 Paving at Lower Prestwick Circle and Kilmarnok Drive (Glen Arden)
- August 17 Paving at Falkirk Drive, Helmsdale Drive and Galloway Drive (Glen Arden and Highland)
- August 18 Paving at Helmsdale Court, Caledonia Drive, Findhorn Court and Tayside Court (Highland and Montgomery)

Seal coat work planned for September will be announced in a separate notice.

Please note the following:

1. Access to driveways and unassigned parking lots may be restricted. Please be aware of construction signage.
2. Work hours are planned between 7 a.m. and 6 p.m.
3. For work in districts, vehicles and golf carts (not used during construction days) are okay to remain on driveways or concrete parking lots. If you plan to use your vehicle or golf cart (on construction days), consider parking on adjacent streets.
4. We ask for your assistance in protecting your personal property (including vehicles, golf carts, etc.). Construction equipment and vehicles will be present along roadways. Use of parking by construction crews may be used on a temporary basis.
5. Noise will be heard due to use of equipment. Dust will be generated due to the construction work.

Strategy: Take out trumps and try to get 1 less loser in Hearts or Clubs.

West leads the 4 of Clubs, East, the King, South, the Ace, following with the Ace and King of Spades, then a low Spade to the Jack on the board. He switches to a Diamond to the Queen in his hand, next the 10, West, the Jack, South plays the Ace, and then leads the King of Diamonds sluffing a Club from his hand. He continues with his last Diamond on the board, trumps it in his hand, follows with the Queen of Clubs, then leads a Heart, finesses the Queen, East wins the trick with the King, then plays the Jack of Clubs, and South trumps. He now leads a Heart to the Ace on the board, and plays the last card, a Heart, which East takes with the Jack. Great! The contract is made with an overtrick.

* South has 17 HCP and jumps to show his strength and suggests game or a higher contract. North's bid of 4 Spades shows a minimum hand and no interest in a slam contract.

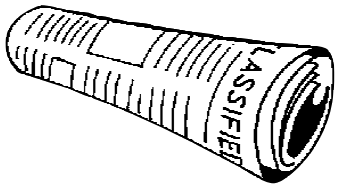

Planning an estate, moving or garage sale?

Residents, or those working on the behalf of residents, are advised to call the Public Safety Administration office at 239-5246 before planning or opening a sale at the Villages. All sales on Villages property are subject to Association Rule 2.02 Residence Use and Occupancy Restrictions.

Homeowner Rule 3.2.10, Estate and Garage Sales states:

3.2.10 Estate and garage sales are permitted subject to the following:

A. A permit for the sale shall be obtained from the Public Safety Office prior to holding the sale and placement of advertising.

Also, effective July 1, 2012, all estate and garage sales in the Association will require a permit. The owner of the property must request the permit from Public Safety Administration in Building C.

The Villages Association Rule 2.02. 5., Residence Use and Occupancy Restrictions applies:

5. Estate and garage sales are permitted subject to the following:

A. Public Safety will not allow entry to anyone who is not authorized by name in advance (Club Rule 1.01, Access to the Villages).

B. All sales activity and sale items must be contained within the residence or garage.

C. Sales may be held only between 9 a.m. and 4 p.m.

D. Sales period may not exceed two days.

E. Only one sale per resident household per year will be permitted. In the event of the death of a resident of the unit, a subsequent estate sale will be permitted. A permit is required and can be obtained from Public Safety.

Note: When placing classified ads for estate or garage sales in *The Villager*, you will need to attach proof of the permit to your Classified Advertising form.

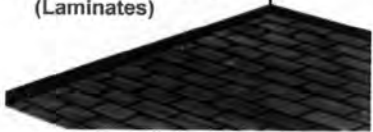
