#### See Sunni Gibbons' home studio on Art Tour

Sunni Gibbons will open the door to her home art studio on Saturday, August 26, from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. for the Arts & Crafts Association Home Studio Art Tour. She has lived in The Villages for three years.

Born in San Diego, Sunni moved with her military family every two years. She attended the military dependent's high school in Port Lyautey, French Morocco and graduated from Marymount International High School in Barce-Iona, Spain. She studied art at San Jose State University and Hancock College, earning her B.A. in Painting from the University of Washington and her graduate degree from SJSU.

Although she worked in watercolor for 30 years painting big flowers, her chief medium now is oil. Her largest work, a 28 x 8-foot mural at the Santa Maria Museum of Flight in Santa Maria, California, is titled "Celebrating Aviation's Heroines." It took nine months to accomplish and was designed and produced entirely by computer. Her farm worker paintings - possibly her favorite series-study the relationships of the workers to their work and their camaraderie with each other. Five of the farm worker paintings were displayed in the Clubhouse lobby last year.

Relationships seem to be a theme in other paintings by Sunni as well. Her "Generations -Self Portrait" showing her family and ancestors, won a blue ribbon in last year's Juried Show in The Villages.

Sunni does get immersed in each piece or series she paints. She welcomes you to visit her house on August 26.



The other item of business at the July study session was the setting of the quarterly meeting schedule for 2017-2018. Meetings are on the second Thursday of October, January and April with the annual meeting in June. The meeting schedule is as follows:

## Association/Homeowners documents available via e-mail

Per an amendment to California Civil Code, homeowner associations are permitted, with owner's written consent, to distribute annual disclosures, (like the pro forma budget summary) and other specified association documents to owners via electronic mail, facsimile, or other electronic means (such as posting on the association's website) instead of sending those documents out by regular mail or personal delivery. This has the potential to provide cost savings to The Villages. Delivery and postage costs for the Villages' annual distribution of the pro forma budget summary alone are close to \$1,000, not to mention the paper and printing costs that run about \$8,000.

In order to transmit association documents via e-mail or by posting on the homeowners association's website, 1) the homeowners association must first receive the owner's written consent, and 2) the homeowners association sends a separate notice to the owner that the documents have been posted and are available for viewing.

Consent forms for owners to request delivery of documents have been developed for both The Villages Association and Homeowners Corporations. These forms provide an owner's consent to delivery electronically, of documents that are capable, under current laws, of being distributed electronically. Owners have the right to revoke this request and receive "hard copies" of the documents by sending a written revocation signed by the owner, to the applicable corporation.

Forms of owner's written consent are available in Business Administration Buildings A and B, and on The Villages web site, http://www.thevillagesgcc.com (Click on *Resident Info* and then Click on *Resource Files*.)

## 2018 Telephone Directory updates

It is time for input for the 2018 Villages Telephone Directory. The deadline for any changes for the 2018 Telephone Directory is Friday, September 15, 2017.

## Pool Usage for Guests and Children under 18 Years

As a reminder, guests must be accompanied by a resident, who is present in the pool area, at all times. The pool areas include the pools, spas, and surrounding fenced-in area of each facility. Additionally, children under 18 years of age may use the Cribari, Montgomery, and Vineyard pools and pool areas, but only between the hours as follows:

Cribari pool 10 a.m. to noon Montgomery pool noon to 2 p.m. Vineyard pool 2 p.m. to 4 p.m.

Children under 18 years of age may not use the spas. Diapers and training pants are not permitted in the pools. Children must be toilet trained and wear swimsuits.

As noted above, all children must leave the pool area at the end of children's hours.

#### Guest/Common Parking within the Condominium Development

Association Rule 2-17, Section 2: Villages-registered golf carts/LSV, motorcycles and two-axle passenger vehicles of a type customarily used for personal transportation may be parked within the Condominium Development, subject to local posting by Public Safety, and as approved by the Board. Overnight parking of these vehicles is restricted to the garage, carport or driveway assigned to the resident's villa. No vehicle incapable of being parked within the entire boundary of the garage, carport or driveway may be parked within the Condominium Development. Temporary exceptions may be authorized by Public Safety.

Cribari and Del Lago Districts are permitted to park in common area parking for a maximum of 48 hours.

## VMA elects Bill Bing as VP

At its August Board meeting, the Villages Medical Auxiliary (VMA) Board of Directors welcomed Bill Bing as its new vice president. Bing joins the VMA after nine years of volunteering for the Villages Association and Club boards.

Bill and his wife Arlene moved to the Villages 19 years

ago while he was still working as a business development manager for an engineering software startup. He did his first volunteering as treasurer of the Valle Vista District Advisory Committee. In 2004 Bill was elected to his first of two terms on the Association Board. He served as treasurer for four years, then vice president and president. the boards become more transparent while enabling resident input at meetings. He learned that, in general, whatever the board vote, about 80 percent of the residents will go along and 20 percent will disagree. "That's the way it is on most issues," Bill said.

After his board service, Bill took some time off for a second hip replacement. With volunteering in his genes, he couldn't stay away and joined the Club Nominating, Fitness and the Technical Advisory committees.

Bill joined the VMA because of all the programs and assistance provided by the VMA to Villagers. "I want to help the VMA serve residents more effectively and efficiently," said Bill. "I hope more Villagers will volunteer for this very worthwhile and valuable organization."

Joining Bill as elected officers of the VMA are President Mattie Alesi, Secretary Betty Lanctot and Treasurer Ken Begley. Former Vice President Teddy Morse will continue her VMA participation as Communication Director.



## HIKING CLUB SCHEDULE

**Saturday, August 19:** Amy Meier (408-799-4274) will lead a hike in the Purisima open space area, starting at the trailhead near Highway 1, south of half Moon Bay. The trail is frequently shaded by redwood trees but also contains sunny areas with grass and chaparral. We expect that the nearby ocean will keep us cool. The elevation difference is about 1800 ft and the distance is 9-10 miles. Wear layers and bring plenty of water and a lunch. A stop in Half Moon Bay for a libation and/or more food is possible. Round trip car mileage 120.

Wednesday, August 23 (Rambler): Rich Bainbridge (408-960-8335) and Wendy Ledamun (408-274-4215) will lead a hike in Coyote Creek. Be sure to take plenty of water. We'll meet at Cribari Center at 8:30 a.m. and leave at 8:45 a.m.

**Saturday, August 26:** Rich Bainbridge (408-499-1789) and Wendy Ledamun (408-712-7908) will lead a hike in Wunderlich County Park in Woodside. The hike is approximately 4 1/2 miles and winds through beautiful stands of mixed redwoods, madrones, oaks, and a lovely open meadow. Elevation gain is moderate with hiker friendly switchbacks. Bring water. After the hike, we'll stop at Robert's Market in Portola Valley for lunch or a sweet treat! Round trip driving distance is 70 miles.

Wednesday, August 30 (Rambler): Al Girolami (209-531-6553) will lead a hike to Coyote Lake- Harvey Bear Ranch County Park. The hike will be 4 miles on a mostly wide trail with an elevation gain of about 550 feet. The trail is less than 40 percent shaded so bring a hat, poles and plenty of water. We will park at the no-fee Mendoza Ranch entrance and hike up the Coyote Ridge Trail, then go up the Mummy Mountain Trail to the top at 1274 feet with a great view of Coyote Lake. We will then complete the loop downhill to the parking area. For those interested in attempting the Santa Clara County Park # PixinParks challenge, Mummy Mountain is one of the necessary seven destinations to qualify for a free T-shirt. We'll meet at Cribari at 8:30 a.m. and carpool for the 50 mile round trip. After concluding the hike, there will be an optional lunch at Denny's in Gilroy.

**Saturday, September 2:** Akiko Giordono (408-238-5437) will lead a hike along the shady south rim trail of Alum Rock park. ## Administrative guidance for Transfer on Death deed

Last week SRS published an article about the Transfer on Death deed (TOD deed).

Many Villagers have their bank accounts titled as Payable on Death (POD). At his or her death the bank accounts will automatically pass to one or more named beneficiaries. Probate will not be required on the bank accounts.

One's condo can be titled in a similar way using a Transfer on Death deed. It names the one or more beneficiaries who will receive the property when one dies without the need for probate. A Living Trust certainly avoids probate; the POD deed is an alternative for those who do not have a living trust.

Important points to remember about the TOD deed:

- 1. All owners must fill out their own TOD deed. This means that a married couple must fill out and record two separate TOD deeds.
  - 2. Each form must be notarized.
  - 3. The TOD form must be recorded within 60 days of being signed and notarized.
- 4. The property description and your name must match the title documents exactly. We suggest you copy the property description from your deed and include it as an attachment.
- 5. You must list the beneficiaries by name and their relationship to you (spouse, son, daughter, friend, etc.) A beneficiary does not have to be a relative.
- 6. The page of instructions is page 2 of the 3-page form. This page 2 must stay with the form or it is not considered a complete form.

Take the completed form to the Santa Clara County office at 70 West Hedding Street in San Jose. The Recorder's office is on the First Floor in the East Wing. Take your checkbook or cash. The recording fee will likely be around \$40 to \$75. If you wish to mail the form, call the Recorder's Office at 408-299-5688 to get precise instructions and cost. Or you may hire your attorney to record the deed.

You may revoke your TOD deed at any time by notarizing and recording a Revocation of Revocable Transfer on Death Deed. This form is very similar to the TOD deed itself. It must be recorded prior to your death to be effective.

The TOD form is available at the SRS office as well as a list of notaries in or close to The Villages. Both the TOD deed and the Revocation are available at the Sacramento Law Library at www.saclaw.org/legal-forms. Click on Deeds and Real Estate.

As before, SRS suggests you speak with your attorney before making this change.

Note: The Senior Resource Services (SRS) office hours for drop-in assistance are Monday, Wednesday and Friday from 10 a.m. to noon. 

"The Lost City Of The Monkey God" by Douglas Preston: Since the days of conquistador Hernan Cortes, rumors have circulated about a lost city of immense wealth hidden somewhere in the Honduran interior, called the White City or the Lost City of the Monkey God. ### Fiscal Year 2017/2018 Annual Street Maintenance Project

## Turf Rejuvenation Program continues

In October, the Association Board approved a turf rejuvenation program. The work entails slit-seeding (a planting process) roughly 30 acres of common area with Tall Fescue grass. This work is the second part of a two-part project intended to fill in community turf areas that have either died, or have become infested with noxious grasses or weeds, over time due to the most recent drought period.

The first step of the preparation process for a slit-seeding program like this is to kill all the weeds and noxious grasses (in all 30 acres). Round Up will be used to achieve the objective (signs and notices will be posted). This means that many turf areas in the community will brown out, and they will stay that way for a couple of weeks before the seeding process can take place. Even then, please remember that it will take time for the grass to grow in, so areas will look sparse for a couple of months.

Now South knows where the trumps are and leads the Ace of Clubs, continues with the King, then the Queen and trumps the last Club with the Queen of Hearts. He then plays a Heart to the King, follows with the 10 of Hearts, next the 9. South now plays a low Spade, finesses the King, East wins with the Ace, leads a Spade, West takes the trick with the Queen, switches to the good Queen of Diamonds, then leads the last card, the 8 of Diamonds, and South trumps. Great! The contract is made exactly.

\* Some South players might open with 2 NoTrump but that is dangerous with two doubletons, and one doubleton doesn't even have an honor.

^ After North's weak bid, South jumps to game having 20 HCP.








