**Ad-Hoc Food and Beverage Committee:** Helps to develop guidelines for garnering member input relating to the Clubhouse experience, to increase member use of the restaurant, Bistro, banquet facilities, and to increase member satisfaction.

**Club Architectural Committee (AC):** Advises the Board on matters related to the exercise of architectural control over the Club properties and assists the Board in notifying affected resident and members of proposed changes.

**Communications Advisory Committee (CAC):** Advises the Board regarding the community's internal communication media.

**Emergency Preparedness Committee (EPC):** Develops and implements those parts of The Villages Emergency Preparedness Plan assigned to the Committee, as defined in The Plan.

**Facilities Projects Committee:** Interacts with the Community to establish the functional design requirements for replacement, repair and capital improvement projects as requested by the Board and ensure those functional requirements are fulfilled by the project.

**Finance and Reserve Portfolio Advisory Committee:** Advises the Board on all matters of financial importance which the Board deems necessary and provides guidance for managing and investing the Club's Reserve Funds.

**Fitness Center Advisory Committee:** Provides recommendations to the Board on matters pertaining to the Fitness Center.

Swimming Pools Advisory Committee (SPAC): Provides recommendations to the Board regarding the swimming pools including the entire fenced pool area.

Rules Committee: Provides advice to the Board on rule-related matters.

**Technology Advisory Committee (TAC):** Advises the Club Board on technology matters relating to The Villages. The mission of the TAC is to introduce technologies into The Villages that will benefit the residents of The Villages.

**Marketing Committee:** To make The Villages the country club community of choice for seniors in northern California. Develops marketing tactics, programs and advertising techniques designed to generate interest and enhance the community's overall exposure to the prospective buyer market and to enhance and improve internal (Villager and guests) use of community amenities.

**Villages Golf Committee (VGC):** Reviews the total golf program of The Villages and makes appropriate recommendations to the Board of Directors.

## **Proposed Homeowners' Rule Changes**

The Homeowners' Corporation Board of Directors met Thursday, November 9 in an open workshop to review its rules. Amongst the review of other proposed changes, a comparison between the Association and the Homeowners' rules was also discussed. In addition, as a result of the newly approved amended Homeowners' Corporation Bylaws, a proposed Election Rule was developed.

A Town Hall Meeting to review and hear comments regarding the proposed changes is scheduled for Tuesday, December 5, from 4:30 to 5:30 p.m. at the Fairway Room at the main Clubhouse. Complete copies of the rules, proposed changes and proposed new election rule are available

in Business Administration Building A and on The Villages website.

The proposed changes are as follows:

### 1) Rule 3.2.2 Occupant Registration

The Association requires new residents (owner, tenant or lessee) to attend New Resident Orientation. The board agreed to amend the rules from "encouraged to attend" to "required to attend". **2) Rule 3.2.5 E Sold/Pending Riders** 

The Association allows a sold or pending sale rider at the bottom of existing real estate signs. The board agreed to delete the statement, "No sign may be displayed indicating a dwelling has been sold or that a sale is pending."


### 3) 3.2.6 B Rental or Lease or Exchange Written Acknowledgement of Rules

This rule requires the owner to "submit a written affidavit signed by all proposed occupants attesting to their receipt of a copy of the Homeowners' and Club rules." In practice, this rarely happens, thus the board requested that a statement be added to the rental/lease application requesting that the renter/leaser attest on the application that they received the binder with the Club and Homeowners' Corporation rules.

### 4) 3.2.14.A.2 Vehicle Registration

The Association allows three (3) registered vehicles and there has been homeowner requests for three (3), thus the board agreed to increase the number of registered vehicles to three (3) and maintain the language that an additional vehicle may be included if that vehicle is a golf cart. **5) 3.2.14.B Parking Street** 

The current rule states "Parking on the street or in areas designated for guest parking is subject to the Club Rules and is "generally" limited to short-term guest or visitor parking only". The board removed the word "generally" thus reinforcing the board's position that homeowners park within the boundary of their property.

## 2017 Villages Age Certification Survey Results

In order to maintain our community's status as a senior community, The Villages must comply with the State and Federal laws that govern senior housing developments. To that end, Federal law requires that at least one person 55 years of age or older reside in a minimum of 80 percent of the occupied units. To validate the foregoing, Federal law requires The Villages Association and Homeowners Corporation to conduct periodic surveys (every two years). Failure to satisfy the legal requirements could result in a determination that our community is not a lawful senior community and therefore mean that we must allow persons of all ages to live here.

Out of 2,309 units (condominiums) for The Villages Association, 2,261 are occupied, and 1,861, or 82 percent of Association residents returned completed surveys certifying that a least one member of the household is 55 years of age or older.

We are so excited that the Club Board has approved replacement of four pieces of equipment in the fitness center. These pieces of equipment have exceeded their life expectancy and are often broken. We will be getting a new lat pulldown, seated leg press and a treadmill. We will be replacing one recumbent bike with a recumbent stepper. A recumbent stepper is similar to an elliptical machine except it is done in a seated position. It accomplishes a good cardio workout as well as arm and leg strength workout. According to our research, fitness centers as well as rehab centers carry this piece of equipment and it is highly recommended for the age group of our fellow Villagers. Hollis told the SRS volunteer, "It's too late to help my neighbor, but hopefully there is still time to help me."

Hollis married 15 years ago and moved into her husband's condo in The Villages. Both have adult children from a prior marriage. Other than one joint checking account, both keep the assets they owned before their current marriage in their individual names. The title to their Villages home is solely in her husband's name.

Hollis' neighbors were also in their second marriage. The husband sold his home and came to live with his new wife in her Villages home. Recently his wife died and left her property to her only son. The son intends to quickly sell the condo and has given the husband 30 days to move.

Hollis is concerned she will be forced from her home if her husband should die. The SRS volunteer spoke with an attorney, who suggested that Hollis' right to continue to live in their home after her husband's death depends on whether she has acquired a legal interest in it sufficient to avoid a forced sale and eviction. This legal interest could exist because she has a community property interest or if her husband has made some legal provision for her.

Hollis believes she has no community property interest and that her husband wants to preserve his separate property for the eventual benefit of his children. She also believes her husband would want Hollis to live there after his death.

The attorney suggested the husband could give Hollis either an "estate for years" or a "life estate." Hollis could continue to reside in the property either for a specified number of years, or for the rest of her life. If an expiration is specified, ownership of the property would revert at that specific time to the husband's children or his other beneficiaries. Such a provision can be set up

On October 14, 2016, new U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development ("HUD") regulations took effect for evaluating claims of harassment in housing because of race, color, religion, sex, national origin, disability, or familial status under Title VIII of the Civil Rights Act of 1968 ("Fair Housing Act").

At The Villages Association Board of Directors October 31, 2017, monthly meeting, the Board approved to publish for 30-day notice proposed new Association <u>Policy APo 117 – Hostile Environment</u>. The purpose for the proposed policy establishes the process by which Members and Residents may report hostile environment harassment to the Association and the Association's policies against such harassment.

The proposed change will be discussed and considered, as well as oral and written comments from members and residents at the December 12, 2017, board meeting. (Due to the holidays, there is no study session scheduled for December.)

Response to the proposed policy change may be made by one or more of

the following methods: 1) Participation in the discussion of the change at the Association Board of Directors meeting, 2) via-email (<u>mehernandez@the-villages.</u> <u>com</u>) with comments sent to the Association Board at least seven (7) days prior to the Association Board of Directors board meeting, or 3) via written comments addressed to the General Manager's office delivered at least seven (7) days prior to the board meeting.

## Hostile Environment Harassment POLICY NUMBER: APo 117

**OBJECTIVE:** This policy establishes the process by which Members and Residents may report hostile environment harassment to the Association and the Association's policies against such harassment.

**GOVERNING DOCUMENTS / LEGAL REQUIREMENTS:** The Department of Housing and Urban Development Rule outlined in Section 100.600 of the Code of Federal Regulations.

**POLICY:** Hostile Environment Harassment means unwelcome conduct towards a resident based on his or her race, color, religion, sex, familial status, national origin or disability, that is sufficiently severe or pervasive as to interfere with a resident's ability to sell, rent, use or enjoy their unit and/or the common area. **LIMITATIONS:** None.

### IMPLEMENTATION PROCEDURES:

1. <u>Reporting to Association</u>. Any Member or Resident who believes they are the subject of Hostile Environment Harassment, or who witnesses what they believe to be Hostile Environment Harassment against another Member or Resident should immediately report the conduct to the Association. Reports may be given orally or in writing (including email) to the Association Board through the General Manager's Office at the address below, or to any known Board member. The Member or Resident is encouraged to provide reports in writing and provide as much detail as possible.

2. <u>Association Investigation</u>. The Board of Directors ("Board") shall exercise due diligence, including engaging legal counsel, if appropriate, in reviewing and investigating all reports of Hostile Environment Harassment. The Association agrees that no one should be subject to Hostile Environment Harassment and will employ this Policy when such Harassment is reported. It is important, however, for Members and Residents to keep in mind that the Association cannot be a guarantor of safety. If at any time a person feels threatened by someone else, the Association strongly encourages that person to contact the police right away.

3. <u>Totality of the Circumstances</u>. In determining whether Hostile Environment Harassment exists, the Board shall consider the totality of the circumstances, including the nature of the conduct, the context in which the incident(s) occurred, the severity, scope, frequency, duration, and location of the conduct, and the relationships of the persons involved. Evidence of psychological or physical harm is not necessary to demonstrate that Hostile Environment Harassment exists. A single incident may constitute Hostile Environment Harassment if the incident is sufficiently severe.

## Food and Beverage Advisory Committee POLICY NUMBER: CPo 223

### **OBJECTIVE:**

The purpose of the Food and Beverage Advisory Committee is to garner member input relating to the Clubhouse experience to increase member use of the restaurant, Bistro, banquet facilities, and to help increase member satisfaction.

## GOVERNING DOCUMENTS / LEGAL REQUIREMENTS: None.

Committee: FOOD AND BEVERAGE ADVISORY COMMITTEE

Responsible to: Club Board of Directors

### Composition:

Voting Members: Five to seven (5-7) resident owners in good standing appointed by the Board of Directors.

Non-Voting Members: The number of associate members shall be determined by the committee with the approval of the Board. Associate members can actively participate in committee discussions but do not have a vote. Board Liaison (non-voting)

**<u>Staff Support</u>**: As designated by the General Manager. The Director of Food and Beverage may attend, but is not required to attend these meetings.

**Member Term:** Since this is a newly formed committee, the initial terms will be 3 members with a term of two years; the remaining members will have an initial term of one year.

Thereafter, two-year staggered terms by Board appointment, from January 1 through December 31. Reappointment is possible subject to a two-term limit. There must be a one year break in service after two consecutive terms before reappointment. A vacancy prior to completion of a term will be filled by appointment by the Board for the remainder of the vacant term. If the vacancy is less than one year, the appointee shall be eligible to be reappointed for two full consecutive terms.

**<u>Officers</u>:** The committee shall elect a Chair and other officers, as it deems necessary. Officers shall be elected to one year terms.

**Subcommittees:** The committee may appoint subcommittees, as it deems necessary to perform its appointed tasks.

**Meetings:** The committee shall meet at least quarterly. Meetings shall be scheduled on either Tuesdays, Wednesdays, or Thursdays.

4. <u>Enforcement</u>. If the Board determines that a Member or a Member's tenant, guest or household member has engaged in Hostile Environment Harassment, the Association shall take reasonable steps within the scope of its enforcement authority to address and correct the harassment. This includes: calling the Member to a hearing and imposing sanctions (e.g., levying fines and/or suspending membership rights); inviting the Member to participate in Internal Dispute Resolution (APo/Apr 109); requesting that the Member mediate or arbitrate the issue; and filing suit to obtain a court order compelling the Member to cease the conduct. All costs associated with enforcement, including attorneys' fees, may be levied against the Member as a Reimbursement Assessment.

### Responsibilities:

- 1. To garner member input relating to the Clubhouse experience to increase member use of the restaurant, Bistro, banquet facilities, and to help increase member satisfaction.
- 2. To provide minutes of meetings to the Club Board and Management.
- **3.** To provide suggestions to the Club Board and Management relating to Food and Beverage.

The three walkers today could take their pull carts and clubs along with them, and all placed (but barely). So, who knows why? In any case, it turned out to be a pleasant day, and the new grass in the fairways was sprouting well.




