

Subject: VGCC monetary methods of enforcing rules and regulations

The "Ringing the cash register" approach to maintaining order in VGCC is unacceptable.

Examples are: Rules 1.02 "Traffic Within the Villages" and Emergency rule 1.54 "Harassment" First example: I understand the importance of having regulations and safety, but the fines and additional punishment are unacceptable and unnecessarily punitive. Traffic fines are assessed to the entire unit, not individuals. The punishment for the third violation is the revocation of VGCC privileges, which are suspended and are applied to all occupants and visitors of the address. This DOES NOT solve the problem, which is that the violator is driving poorly. Why not suspend driving privileges until a certified traffic school session is completed? Driving violations have nothing to do with VGCC privileges.

Second example: Rule 1.54 "Harassment" has fines of \$1,000 to \$5,000. I have not seen any information on this rule, and there has not been a definition or examples published. Why can't security officers be trained to diffuse situations? The police can be called if necessary.

Solving problems is the answer, not fines.

Notice of New Club Rule 1.54 Harassment

At The Villages Golf and Country Club Board of Directors October 31, 2017, monthly meeting, the Board approved new emergency Club Rule 1.54 Harassment, effective immediately. The purpose of this rule is to prevent harassment of residents, Club employees, and others while on Club property.

Rule 1.54 Harassment

Members and residents may not engage in any unwelcome conduct towards a Club employee, or towards another resident or guest or any other

"Unwelcome conduct" includes, but is not limited to, unwelcome advances, derogatory or demeaning comments or slurs, unwelcome touching, or other conduct that a reasonable person would find offensive that is based on the recipient's age, race, color, religion, gender, familial status, national origin, disability or actual or perceived sexual orientation or gender expression. Unwelcome conduct also includes any actions or statements that are aimed at preventing the recipient from reporting such unwelcome conduct.

The recipient's silence is not to be interpreted as consent. These actions are unacceptable even if the member or resident didn't intend to cause any offense, or was "just making a joke."

Members and residents are responsible for the conduct of their household and guests.

Proposed Homeowners' Rule Changes

The Homeowners' Corporation Board of Directors met Thursday, November 9 in an open workshop to review its rules. Amongst the review of other proposed changes, a comparison between the Association and the Homeowners' rules was also discussed. In addition, as a result of the newly approved amended Homeowners' Corporation Bylaws, a proposed Election Rule was developed.

A Town Hall Meeting to review and hear comments regarding the proposed changes is scheduled for Tuesday, December 5, from 4:30 to 5:30 p.m. at the Fairway Room at the main Clubhouse.

Complete copies of the rules, proposed changes and proposed new election rule are available in Business Administration Building A and on The Villages website.

The proposed changes are as follows:

1) Rule 3.2.2 Occupant Registration

The Association requires new residents (owner, tenant or lessee) to attend New Resident Orientation. The board agreed to amend the rules from "encouraged to attend" to "required to attend".

2) Rule 3.2.5 E Sold/Pending Riders

The Association allows a sold or pending sale rider at the bottom of existing real estate signs. The board agreed to delete the statement, "No sign may be displayed indicating a dwelling has been sold or that a sale is pending."

3) 3.2.6 B Rental or Lease or Exchange Written Acknowledgement of Rules

This rule requires the owner to "submit a written affidavit signed by all proposed occupants attesting to their receipt of a copy of the Homeowners' and Club rules." In practice, this rarely happens, thus the board requested that a statement be added to the rental/lease application requesting that the renter/leaser attest on the application that they received the binder with the Club and Homeowners' Corporation rules.

4) 3.2.14.A.2 Vehicle Registration

The Association allows three (3) registered vehicles and there has been homeowner requests for three (3), thus the board agreed to increase the number of registered vehicles to three (3) and maintain the language that an additional vehicle may be included if that vehicle is a golf cart.

5) 3.2.14.B Parking Street

The current rule states "Parking on the street or in areas designated for guest parking is subject to the Club Rules and is "generally" limited to short-term guest or visitor parking only". The board removed the word "generally" thus reinforcing the board's position that homeowners park within the boundary of their property.

Special PG&E rate for medical equipment users

Most PG&E customers at the Villages use the standard baseline quantity billing method. Energy costs are charged by the tier they are in. You have a Tier 1 allowance, once you use that amount, you go into a Tier 2 Usage level that is higher in cost. If your health, or the health of another person living at your residence changes dramatically, and you must use special medical equipment that is on 24 hours a day, your energy usage will rise dramatically and you will move into the higher cost usage tiers quickly. This will lead to higher PG&E bills. If this is your situation, you might be a good candidate for PG&E's Medical Baseline Allowance program. It permits you to receive additional quantities of energy at the low baseline price.

How do you qualify for the medical baseline allowance? A licensed California doctor must certify that a full-time resident in your home qualifies with one or more of the following:

- Dependent on life-support equipment such as medical devices used to sustain life in the home or relied upon for mobility there. A list of such equipment can be found at pge.com.
- Being treated for a life-threatening illness or compromised immune system with special heating and/or cooling requirements to sustain the patient's life or prevent deterioration of the patient's medical condition.
- A paraplegic, hemiplegic, quadriplegic or multiple sclerosis patient with special heating and/or cooling needs.
 - A scleroderma patient with special heating needs.

Other medical conditions may also qualify if the doctor determines the condition requires essential special heating or cooling to sustain the patient's life. Equipment used for therapy rather than for life support generally does not qualify for the medical baseline rate.

SRS has applications for this special utility rate. Ask for the PG&E Medical Baseline application. You complete one side of the form and your doctor completes the other side.

Note: The Senior Resource Services (SRS) office hours for drop-in assistance are Monday, Wednesday, and Friday from 10 a.m. to noon. The SRS office is located in the Cribari Center across from the Post Office. You may also leave a message at 408-239-5253. The purpose of SRS is to provide education and general business and financial information. All assistance is free and confidential. You should ask your professional advisor about your individual situation.

We are so excited that the Club Board has approved replacement of four pieces of equipment in the fitness center. These pieces of equipment have exceeded their life expectancy and are often broken. We will be getting a new lat pulldown, seated leg press and a treadmill. We will be replacing one recumbent bike with a recumbent stepper. A recumbent stepper is similar to an elliptical machine except it is done in a seated position. It accomplishes a good cardio workout as well as arm and leg strength workout. According to our research, fitness centers as well as rehab centers carry this piece of equipment and it is highly recommended for the age group of our fellow Villagers. The Activities Office will order and receive this equipment as soon as possible.

We have had some inquiries regarding the time of our cleaning schedule. The center is closed from 12 to 1 p.m. daily for cleaning. This time is necessary because all of the cleaning staff at The Villages goes home by 1:30 p.m. There is no other time available. The workout mats are cleaned weekly, they are just worn.

"The King and I" is the fifth musical by the team of composer Richard Rodgers and dramatist Oscar Hammerstein II. The musical's plot relates the experiences of Anna, a British schoolteacher hired as part of the king's drive to modernize his country. Lawrence died unexpectedly of cancer a year and a half after the opening, and the role of Anna was played by several actresses during the remainder of the Broadway run of 1,246 performances.

Villages artist Jim Paradis retrospective exhibit draws significant numbers

The exhibit "Retrospective: Alternative Directions, The Art of H. James Paradis," sponsored by the Arts & Crafts Association, held the afternoon of Friday, November 10 in the Cribari Conference Room drew a large number of the artist's friends, family, colleagues and neighbors. The exhibit that showcased numerous works by the popular Villages artist, teacher and mentor drew an estimated crowd of between 300 and 400 persons that filtered through the exhibition during a two-and-a-half hour period, according to Barbara Gottesman, who helped organize the event.

The show, organized by Gottesman and fellow A&C member Jane Hink with the help of 17 other Arts & Crafts members, honored the beloved artist and his wife Adine. (The exhibit was lovingly dedicated to his wife, Adine, a fellow artist, teacher and Jim's biggest fan.) Several of Jim's and Adine's children and grandchildren were present—some coming in from as far as Indiana.

As I looked at the paintings and collages of Jim Paradis hung on the walls of the conference room, I could see the evidence of a seventy-year-long love affair with the works of Abstract Expressionists. The influences of the post-World War II art movement—that made New York City the center of the western art world—permeated Paradis' works like the vital lifeblood of his identity as an artist. To look into Jim's work is to see, as if through a window, Jackson Pollock's ambiguous expressionism, Mark Rothko's mastry of color, Willem de Kooning's haunting figures, Wassily Kandinsky's abstract spontaneity, and Anne Ryan's layered shapes and random componets—these among a long list of other artistic influences. Truly Jim's works reanimate these artists and bring them back to the exhibit room to be enjoyed once again.

On the table with the fruit and cheese tidbits were a selection of Paradis' ceramic pieces—a delightful mixture of whimsical abstract and functional pieces that communicated the joy the artist felt in producing these pieces. The love expressed by the spectators—friends, family and guests—and the fruits of Jim's long career as an artist, teacher, mentor, local celebrity and living art resource was palpable. Seldom have I breathed in such a positive atmosphere during any art exhibit.

I wished the room was larger so it would hold more of his works—I got the feeling the exhibit only scratched the surface of his long career.

As Jim and Adine gracioulsy greeted thier guests, I heard many testimonials from fellow artists who were bestowed with the gifts of his mentorship and his expertise (which he shared freely with all who sought it) and the warmth of his open and unassuming presence. Personally, I've sought Jim's advice from his vast store of artistic knowledge in several small endeavors over the years. Paradis always offered an open ear, a keen eye accompanied by kind and supportive comments. No wonder the room was filled to capacity!

If you weren't present at the retrospective, you should make it a point to visit the Conference Room and see a nice cross section of Jim's artwork. The exhibit will be up through November 30.



FROM THE BOOKSHELF

"Origin" by Dan Brown: Unlike other best-selling authors, Dan Brown does not pump out at least one novel a year, but generally waits several years. Consequently his novels are well researched and more believable although mostly science fiction. The current novel is about an astonishing breakthrough by Kirsch, a brilliant billionaire and futurist and one of Langdon's first students at Harvard—one that will answer two of the fundamental questions of human existence. The breakthrough is revealed at the Guggenheim museum in Bilbao Spain. But of course dark forces disturb the party and the discovery may be lost forever. Professor Langdon must flee for his life together with Ambra Vidal, the elegant museum director who worked to stage the presentation. In Barcelona they must locate the cryptic password that will unlock the secret, but the forces of darkness, possibly emanating from Spain's royal palace are not far behind. Following a trail illuminated by modern art and enigmatic symbols Langdon and Vidal uncover clues that bring them face to face with Kirsch's shocking discovery. Dan Brown fans rejoice, this may be Dan Brown's most exciting and mysterious novel to date. Mystery 2017. Standard and large print.

"The Rooster Bar" by John Grisham: This time not a suspenseful trial novel by Grisham, but a more contemporary legal problem. Mark, Tod and Zola came to law school to change the world. But now, as third year students they find out they are at a third rate for profit law school, so mediocre that they may never pass the bar exam. They have borrowed heavily and now find out that the shady billionaire, who owns the school also owns a bank specializing in student loans. Spectacular legal fireworks will soon follow. Find out if the good guys will prevail. Fiction 2017.

"The Cuban Affair" by Nelson DeMille: After five years in the army, Mac, 35 years old, has resettled in Key West, Florida, and owns a big charter fishing boat, with an even bigger bank loan. A Miami lawyer, heavily involved with anti-Castro groups approaches Mac for a 10-day fishing tournament in Cuba—to be accompanied by a covert mission and a sizable paycheck. A beautiful young Cuban-American woman is also involved. Be ready for lots of action of all kinds. Fiction 2017, large print.

"A Column of Fire" by Ken Follett: This is the third novel in the Kingsbridge Cathedral series, illuminating the medieval history of England, mainly from the perspective of the common man. Each novel, starting with the cathedral builders in the early Middle Ages (Pillars of the Earth), describes a critical period in England's history, but circumstances and people vary from novel to novel. The present novel describes the struggle for dominance by Roman Catholics, led by more dictatorially inclined monarchs and supported by the ultra catholic king of Spain, Phillip the second, and the more democratically inclined Protestants, supporting Queen Elizabeth the first. Everybody knows who eventually prevailed but it was a close call, with many plots to murder the queen. Fiction 2017, large print.

Everyone needs an Advance Health Care Directive. An unexpected accident, severe illness or old age could prevent you from selecting your own healthcare treatment. Without a legal record of your preference, the choice of your treatment could be put in the hands of distant family members or unsympathetic doctors. Without an Advance Health Care Directive, your doctors and other medical providers will have no idea how you want to be treated. With an Advance Health Care Directive, you can ensure that your treatment wishes are honored.


Although this workshop addresses the creation of an Advance Health Care Directive, you can also bring in an existing directive to have it updated.






PINSEEKERS

TENNIS TALK

Ever hear of osteoarthritis? I hadn't until last year. I've been playing tennis for years (more like decades) without serious issues with my body. Yes, I fell down a few times. Yes, various parts of my body would hurt now and again. Nothing lasted very long. I usually played thorough the pain. It's a guy thing!

I truly had convinced myself, because I had made it past 70 without a serious body issue, I no longer had to worry about it. This turned out to be one of the many times in my life when I made a very bad assumption. So much for the power of positive thinking!

It happened so innocently on a simple forehand shot. One second I am focused on the shot, next second I am focused on the pain in my right knee. What did I do? Kept playing, of course. This led to a trip to the Kaiser ER. In hindsight, going to the ER was a good thing as it allowed me to bypass a couple of process steps and get a referral to a sports injury doc immediately.

Almost a year later I was ready to play tennis again. It takes that long to see if it will get better on its own with physical therapy, try cortisone shots, decide on doing the surgery, and recover from the surgery. The key word in the beginning of this paragraph is "was". I am now scheduled for a left knee replacement in January. Same problem, other knee.

So, is there a pony in the middle of all of this? Yes. Knee replacements are almost outpatient surgery these days. What pain there is, is very easily controlled. You do have to work at the recovery (physical therapy) to get full strength and flexibility back. When done, you will have fully functional, pain-free knees. Play on!

Tips from the Pro. A few things to remember when playing uneven lies:

Downhill lie - the ball will come out low so take a club with more loft; choke down on the grip, play the ball back in your stance so you strike the ball before the ground, feel like you are swinging down the slope.

Uphill lie – the ball will come out higher so take a club with less loft; choke down on the grip, tilt your shoulders with the slope, feel like you are swinging up the slope.

Ball below your feet - Take 1-2 more clubs and grip at the end of the handle, bend your knees more like a squatting position, maintain knee flex and keep body still, lean back into hill for stability.

Ball above your feet – choke down on the handle / play one more club / aim a bit to the right / lean into the hill for stability.

Try the tips for uneven lies and let me know how they work. See you at the course!

'Pay me with an iTunes gift card'—Don't do it, it's a scam!

few emails popped into an inbox at The Villager from Villages residents' hacked email addresses from scammers asking for iTunes gift cards, so we took a look at the American Association of Retired Persons (AARP) website to see exactly what was happening.

The AARP webpage described a recent trend that scammers attempt to get your money without being traced. Like other swindler-preferred payment methods (wire transfers and prepaid debit cards), iTunes gift cards provide a fast, easy and virtually untraceable way for con artists to get cash.

No matter the ploy, it works like this: A scammer's message persuades the target to purchase (online or at a store), load money and then provide (via phone, email or text message) the 16-digit code on the back of one or more iTunes cards.

According to the Federal Trade Commission (FTC), as soon as you put money on a card and share the code, the money's gone for good. The card's value is then drained, traded or sold on the black market. All that remains is a worthless piece of plastic.

Because iTunes gift cards are the equivalent of cash, their popularity as a go-to tool in many scams has surged in recent months and should be an obvious "red flag" signaling an impending rip-off.

Some scammers try to frighten victims with threats from fake government agencies (IRS, law enforcement agencies, etc.) and demand that fines or tax debts be paid with iTunes gift cards or other gift cards. This is fraud, pure and simple—don't fall for it.

According to Apple, "iTunes Gift Cards are solely for the purchase of goods and services on the iTunes Store and App Store. Should you receive a request for payment using iTunes Gift Cards outside of iTunes and the App Store please report it at ftc. gov/complaint.

Swindlers also favor reloadable cards such as MoneyPak, Reloadit or Vanilla; Amazon gift cards; PayPal; and, of course, wire transfers like Western Union and MoneyGram, says the FTC. But no government agency nor any but a handful of businesses require any of these payment methods.

With iTunes gift cards proving to be a hit in many hoaxes, take this advice: Unless you're shopping for music at the iTunes store, you shouldn't be paying for anything with an iTunes gift card.

There are numerous agencies you can contact to report criminal activity. You may call the San Jose Police Depart-

Just before press time, a ment's 311 number to report credit card fraud or attempts to steal your identity. The FBI and Federal Trade Commission also have fraud departments. Furthermore, these attacks fall under the category of elder abuse. The county district attorney's Elder Abuse Unit can be reached at the toll free number 1-855-DAELDER or 1-855-323-5337.

West leads the 7 of Diamonds, East plays the King, continues with the Ace, South trumps, switches to a low Spade to the King on the board and East sluffs. South continues with a Spade from the board, covers with the 10, and West wins with the Queen. He leads another Diamond, South trumps and plays the Ace and Jack of Spades to pull the last trumps. He then leads a Heart, West takes the trick with the Ace, follows with another Diamond, and South uses his last trump. Great. The contract is made exactly.


