Here's a thought regarding driving Citations:

We are relatively new to The Villages and friends after a 3 hour drive were greeted to our new home by Public Safety and issued a citation. Our guests were embarrassed, as were we, when they showed up at our front door. First, we think a guest should be issued a warning NOT a monetary fine. Shame on this Rule, where we, as residents, are responsible for our guests' Citations when we are not even in the car. Has anyone ever heard of a non-passenger in a car be fined in some way? This practice is grossly unfair to us, the residents.

I have two suggestions to help cut down this practice of issuing Citations to visitors:

1. To have the Front Gate personnel add a simple sentence stating that please be aware that we have an enforced 25 mph speed limit on our streets; and/or
2. Adding a simple 25 mph hour sign placed just outside the gate.

In closing, are we truly concerned about the safety of our residents or penalizing them for the actions of others, or are we more concerned about lining the coffers of Public Safety?

Throwing threats and money to fix any problem only causes anger and does not solve anything. What is needed is education and understanding. We are not children and should not be treated as such.

First Rule 1.02: If a Villager violates the safety rules of safety, only he or she should be responsible for the infraction, not the entire household penalized. As for guests of said household, they should also be penalized as to their infractions.

Rule 1.54 Harassment should not have any fines, but I suggest a sit-down with appropriate parties to mediate the situation. Again, tossing threats of fines does not solve the problem.

I totally agree with Celeste DiGenova's Pulse letter published in the November 23 Villager regarding these matters.

When this happens, they often lose their natural fear of humans and can become aggressive. To prevent that, residents should not leave out any type of food, including canned food, in a manner that may become accessible to our furry and feathered friends.

Please comply with Villages Golf & County Club Rule 1.51.4, which states: "Feeding of waterfowl and other wild animals on a routine basis is prohibited for the protection of both residents and the animals."

In 2018, Medicare recipients will see changes to their Medicare premiums and to the surcharge tiers.

High income taxpayers pay an additional surcharge for Medicare Part B and D. High income is defined as more than \$85,000 for a single taxpayer and \$170,000 for a couple. The surcharge is an annual calculation based on your gross income from two years previously. Consequently, your surcharge for 2018 is based on your 2016 income tax return.

For 2017 a taxpayer paid \$370.80 a month in surcharges if their income was more than \$214,000 for a single taxpayer or more than \$428,000 for a married couple. For 2018, there is a slight decrease in the monthly surcharge to \$369.40. However, this surcharge is assessed at income of more than \$160,000 for a single taxpayer and more than \$320,000 for a married couple. Consequently, many more taxpayers will be paying Medicare B and D surcharges.

You can appeal the surcharges if your income has substantially decreased since 2016 because of certain life changing events. Examples include the following: getting married or divorced or becoming widowed; you or your spouse retire or reduce your work hours; or you lose income-producing property due to a disaster. Social Security Form SSA-44 is used to request a recalculation.

Unfortunately, a substantial gain on the sale of your previous personal residence is not considered a life changing event. Remember this is an annual calculation. If you had a windfall in 2016 creating a large surcharge in 2018, your 2019 premium will be calculated using your more usual income from your 2017 tax return.

Note: The Senior Resource Services (SRS) office hours for drop-in assistance are Monday, Wednesday and Friday from 10 a.m. to noon. The SRS office is in the Cribari Center across from the Post Office. You may also leave a message at 408-239-5253. The purpose of SRS is to provide education and general business and financial information. All assistance is free and confidential. You should ask your professional advisor about your individual situation.

Get help with your Medicare on December 21

Do you know the ABCD of Medicare? A HICAP counselor will be at The Villages on Thursday morning, December 21. HICAP (Health Insurance Counseling & Advocacy Program) is a non-profit volunteer-based counseling program to help senior citizens needing education and assistance with the complexities of Medicare and supplemental health insurance.

To schedule a one-on-one appointment at the SRS office, call Sourcewise at 408-350-3200, option 2, and tell them you want an appointment at The Villages. If you are already on Medicare, please bring your Medicare number and ID cards of any other health insurance plans you have. Also, please bring your detailed list of medications.

Based on a true story, "The King and I" traces the blossoming romance between an English governess and the King of 19th Century Siam. Part love story and part culture clash comedy, the show contains some of musical theatre's greatest numbers, from "Shall We Dance" to "Getting to Know You" to "I Whistle A Happy Tune."

"The King and I" is the fifth musical by the team of composer Richard Rodgers and dramatist Oscar Hammerstein II. It is based on Margaret Landon's novel, "Anna and the King of Siam" (1944), which is in turn derived from the memoirs of Anna Leonowens, governess to the children of King Mongkut of Siam in the early 1860s. The musical's plot relates the experiences of Anna, a British schoolteacher hired as part of the king's drive to modernize his country. The relationship between the king and Anna is marked by conflict through much of the piece, as well as by a love to which neither can admit.

The musical was an immediate hit, winning Tony Awards for Best Musical, Best Actress (for Gertrude Lawrence) and Best Featured Actor (for Yul Brynner). Lawrence died unexpectedly of cancer a year and a half after the opening, and the role of Anna was played by several actresses during the remainder of the Broadway run of 1,246 performances. A hit London run and U.S. national tour followed, together with a 1956 film for which Brynner won an Academy Award, and the musical was recorded several times. In later revivals, Brynner came to dominate his role and the musical, starring in a four-year national tour culminating in a 1985 Broadway run shortly before his death.



FROM THE BOOKSHELF

"Two From The Heart" by James Patterson, Frank Constantini, Emily Raymond, Bryan Sitts: This looks like a novel written by a committee, under the Patterson brand, but there are actually two novellas both about people who have lost touch with what matters most. The first story is about Anne, whose marriage has fallen apart and then a hurricane destroys her home. She goes on a cross-country trip to ask friends and relatives, "what's your best story?" The second is about a Silicon Valley billionaire, who does not have a life. Thus he commissions a struggling novelist to write one for him. Will fiction and reality meet? Mystery, 2017.

"The Shroud Conspiracy" by John Heubush: Dr. Jon Bondurant, an outspoken atheist and forensic anthropologist, is invited by the Vatican to examine the shroud of Turin, the purported burial cloth of Jesus and the most revered of all Roman Catholic artifacts. But then he meets Domenika, the beautiful and devout Vatican representative, who fervently believes the shroud is real. A sample of the blood on the shroud is stolen and may be used to clone Jesus Christ. Domenika disappears as well and a worldwide chase ensues to recover both. Is the shroud real? Will they live happily ever after?

"The Almost Sisters" by Joshilyn Jackson: On a tequila soaked night at a comic book convention, graphic novel artist Leia Birch Briggs is swept off her bar stool by a handsome and anonymous batman. She remembers he was tall, black and an excellent French kisser. It turns out the batman did more than French kissing, a baby is on the way, an unexpected but not unhappy development. But how will she break the news to her lily-white southern family, especially the biracial part? Upheavals in the family ensue and things become too complicated to summarize here, dangerous secrets going all the way back to the Civil War are revealed and more. Find out the details by reading this novel. Fiction, 2017.

"The Last Tudor" by Philippa Gregory: Another novel about British royals by P.G. Jane Grey is queen of England for nine days before her father's half sister, Mary Tudor, gathered an army, locked her up in the Tower of London and executed her when she refused to betray her protestant faith. Eventually Queen Elizabeth assumes the throne, executes Mary, the wife of King Phillip of Spain, the most fanatic Roman Catholic king in history. Thus the Protestant faith was victorious in Great Britain and in most of Northern Europe. However, this novel is mainly about all the court intrigues playing out at that time. See also Ken Follett's latest novel "A Column Of Fire" which illuminates other aspects of this area. Fiction, 2017.

Tips from the Pro: A good tip to help you with your iron ball striking...Try to return your left shoulder to its address position at impact. People who return their left shoulder to a higher position at impact tend to "hang back" and hit it fat or thin. This high left shoulder tilt at impact also causes hooks and slices with woods. So be cognizant of your shoulders at address and then try to return your left shoulder to the same position at impact. I guarantee this will help your ball striking! See you at the course!

The Villages Turf Rejuvenation Program

The purpose of this article is to update you on the progress of the turf rejuvenation program. The program was initiated several months ago. The purpose of the program is to in-fill and restore selected areas of turf that were negatively impacted by the drought. Generally these are areas that were taken over by undesirable grasses or weeds. The process consist of the following steps:

- Spray with herbicide to eliminate weeds or undesirable grasses.
- Wait 3-5 days for weeds to expire, or spray again to control undesirable grasses.
- Using mowers and dethatching equipment mechanically remove weeds and grasses to form a seed bed.
- Apply seed using a machine called a slice-seeder.
- Topdress with compost.
- Set watering schedule generally 2-3 days per day for two weeks.
- Monitor establishment.

During the process outlined above you generally will experience some noise generated by the equipment, possible odor from the compost, notice the irrigation system running during the day, and see the emergence of new grass plants.

At this time we are completing work in Sur Verano. We have begun spraying areas to be seeded in Del Lago. As soon as seeding is complete this week in Verano we will move the seeding team into Del Lago and then continue to work sequentially in the following neighborhoods:

- Del Lago
- Highland
- Glen Arden
- Olivas
- Fairways
- Sonata
- Valle Vista

We currently are targeting early January to complete all neighborhoods. Cold weather and rain may delay progress, but generally we're entering a good time of year to germinate seed and grow new grass. We will keep you updated on this program to enhance curb appeal and improve the overall appearance of the community turf grass.

He leads the 9 of Spades to the Ace in his hand, plays the Queen, Jack, and 8 of Hearts. Next he leads the King of Spades, and then plays a Spade to the Queen on the board, and now plays his last card, a trump. Great! He made 3 extra tricks, but bidding game in Clubs is difficult to consider.

** Some South players after hearing 1 NoTrump would jump to 3 Clubs showing a strong hand, but North's low HCP would put the breaks on him to bid any higher.*




