But personally, I'm going to engineer a "Great Escape" by heading to Cribari Auditorium on Sunday, March 18 at 2:30 p.m. for an afternoon of our Villages band's musical satire, spycraft, sci-fi, and sophistication. "Strike Up the Band," by George Gershwin, is part of a Broadway musical satire on war and militaristic music. And from "The Candide Suite," by Leonard Bernstein, comes "The Best of All Possible Worlds," a song from Broadway's politically and musically satirical "Candide." This piece will be conducted by our special guest José Rivera, current Executive Director of Stagebridge in Oakland (the oldest performing arts entity in the nation for older adults), and former professional theater and film producer, screenwriter, and classical pianist. Also joining the band are Naomi and Fiona Sun, both from the San Jose Youth Symphony. Naomi will solo on the harp with Impromptu-Caprice by Gabrielle Pierné; Naomi and Fiona together will perform two pieces by J. S. Bach on the marimba - Invention: D Minor and B Major.

Continuing the program, you'll experience the excitement of spymaster's music in the James Bond Suite, including the James Bond Theme, "Live and Let Die," "For Your Eyes Only," and "Goldfinger."

John Williams' "Fantasy of Flight" features music of sci-fi and fantasy with "Adventures on Earth," "Hedwig's Theme," "Duel of the Fates," and "Star Wars (Main Title).'

Further, the band will entertain us with Mancini Magic (as in the great Henry Mancini, famed composer of film and television scores). You'll hear Mr. Lucky, Baby Elephant Walk, Moon River, Charade, The Pink Panther, and Peter Gunn.

Finally, what could be more fitting on a journey of escape than a rousing rendition of the Tritsch-Tratsch-Polka, by Johann Strauss II. The title could mean "Chit-chat," referring to the Viennese passion for gossip, or it might mean Strauss' first wife's poodle, also named Tritsch-tratsch-who knows? 

Club and Association Boards met for regularly scheduled February meetings

The Villages Association and Club Boards of Directors met Tuesday, February 27 for their regularly scheduled meetings in the Villages Clubhouse. Numerous items of business were discussed and voted upon.

Association Financial Report For the month of January 2018

Association Operating Statement Review: Revenue was +\$2,200 favorable to the budget of \$615,300 for the month, due to higher than budgeted laundry concession income +\$2,200 (timing).

Expenditures for the month were -\$50,300 (9.5 percent) unfavorable to the budget of \$527,600. Water expense was the main driver with a negative budget variance of \$29,800 for the month. Water expense was accrued at 155 percent of budget as we prepare to receive another higher than normal water bill for the two-month period of January/February. Other notable unfavorable expense categories were repair and maintenance -\$12,200 (mostly interior repairs from plumbing leaks in Glen Arden, Montgomery and Olivas), electricity expense —4,100, legal fees -\$2,200 and pest control -\$2,000 (rodents and termites). There were no significant favorable to budget expenditure categories for the month.

Year-to-date (seven months of operations), total revenue is +\$3,400 favorable to the budget of \$4,314,900 due to higher than planned third-party assessments +\$1,600, laundry concession income +\$1,500 and golf cart electricity/storage fees +\$300. Year-to-date operating expenditures are \$4,555,700 or 3.3 percent higher than the budget of \$4,410,500. Water continues to plague the operating budget with a negative budget variance of \$228,000 (24.1 percent) higher than the budget of \$945,000. There are several contributing factors for the negative water budget variance: 1) slice seeding projects have required more water than estimated, 2) dramatic and unexpected water meter rate increases effective July 2017 (accounting for \$77,600 of the variance), 3) record hot summer of 2017, 4) lower than average winter rainfall and 5) residential water consumption is up 6 percent compared to the prior year. Other significant unfavorable year-to-date expenditure categories are pest control -\$6,100 (mostly Verano, Del Lago, Olivas and Valle Vista), electricity expense -\$3,800 and trash expense -\$3,400 (higher than budgeted rate increases). Notable expense categories that are favorable to budget are planting +\$69,500 (timing) and irrigation maintenance +\$30,600 (timing).

The year-to-date net negative operating budget variance is \$141,900.

Club Financial Report Operating Financial Commentary for the month of January 2018

January Operating Statement Review: Total revenue was +\$48,200 favorable to budget, 5.2 percent higher than the budget of \$925,600. The most significant favorable to budget revenue category was green fees +\$30,900 due to golf-friendly weather and optimal course conditions. Both member and guest play was strong in January, up by 1,367 rounds compared to last January. Despite the restaurant

being shut down for renovations during the first week of the month, food sales were +\$11,300 favorable to the budget of \$131,400. Villagers were eager to dine in the remodeled venue and enjoyed the improved ambiance created with new carpet, furniture and lighting. Other income in Public Safety was favorable to budget by +\$13,900 due to the timing of guest bar code renewal billings. No-table revenue categories unfavorable to budget were resident activities income -\$10,300 (timing), billable services -\$3,000 (timing) and guest room rentals -\$2,500.

Total expenditures were -\$11,600 unfavorable to budget, 1.2 percent more than the budget of \$1,004,100. Expenditure categories significantly unfavorable to budget were operating supplies -\$10,600 (billable services timing), repair and maintenance -\$9,900 (Public Safety Plaza and Clubhouse), water expense -\$7,600 and employee expense -\$6,800 (higher salaries/wages from compression offset by lower medical expense). Notable expenditure categories favorable to budget for the month were resident activities +\$8,400 (timing) and electricity expense +\$7,400.

The net positive operating budget variance for the month was \$36,600. See table below.

Year-to-date revenue is \$223,000 favorable to budget, 3.1 percent higher than the budget of \$7,276,000. Year-to-date expenditures are \$195,000 (2.7 percent) unfavorable to the budget of \$7,284,000.

The year-to-date net positive budget variance is \$28,000 (P&L). See table below for detail by department.

The bottom of the table shows the financial impact of the monthly solar lease payments and contribution to the balloon payment fund (to be paid in 2023) captured on the Club's balance sheet. The YTD total for these two items is \$127,000.

The table below shows G&A with the largest positive net variance of \$106,000 due to higher than budgeted revenue from HOA document sales, resale transfer

West leads the 4 of Hearts. East, the Queen, South covers with the Ace, plays the Jack of Clubs, West, the Queen, South wins with the King, continues with the Ace and is very happy to see everybody playing Clubs. He now runs the rest of the Clubs sluffing a Diamond, 2 Hearts, and 2 Spades from his hand. He then leads a Diamond to his King in his hand, next plays the Ace of Diamonds, then a Spade, which East takes with the Ace, follows with the good Queen of Diamonds, and leads his last card, the King of Hearts. Great. The contract is made with an overtrick.

* This is a preemptive bid showing 6 or 7 Clubs with 6 to 10 HCP. South likes the preemptive bid and has enough points with honors in all the other suits to bid game in NoTrump. By the way, 4 Clubs could also be made but bidding game in NoTrump produces far more points.

SENIOR RESOURCE SERVICES

Measure H parcel tax exemption filing March 23 & May 4

On March 23 or May 4, you may file for exemption from the annual \$100 Evergreen School District parcel tax on your principal residence if you are at least age 65 or will be age 65 by June 30, 2019. If there are joint owners of your principal residence, only one owner needs to be age 65.

If you had the exemption from the parcel tax for 2017/2018, your exemption has been automatically renewed by the School District. There is nothing more you need to do. The event on March 23 and May 4 is for new exemption requests.

If you would like to apply for the exemption for the 2018/2019 tax year, the School District is making it easy for you. Evergreen School District representatives will be at The Villages on Friday, March 23 and Friday, May 4 in the Cribari Forum Room from 1:30 to 4 p.m. to approve your parcel tax exemption request form.

You must file for the exemption in person with documents to prove (1) your property ownership, (2) your residency, and (3) your age.

Your 2017/2018 property tax statement will prove your ownership. Your driver's license or CA identification card will prove your residency and age. Your documents will be reviewed and immediately returned to you.

If you are new to The Villages and the address on your driver's license does not match your property tax statement, please also bring your PG&E bill to prove your residency. If you do not yet have a property tax statement, bring your escrow purchase statement and related papers.

Not sure whether you have the exemption? Go to your last property tax bill. Look under the section labeled "Parcel Tax / Special Assessments." If a line item is "Evergreen Measure H 2014" followed by "\$100" you are paying the tax. If you can't find this listing, you are currently exempt from the tax. Still not sure? The School District employees will have a list of the seniors with the exemption. Come on in and check with them.

You may also apply for the exemption at the School District Office at 3188 Quimby Road, Monday - Friday from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. through May 31, 2018. If you cannot get to the Cribari Center or the District Office, please call Pearl Casey of the District at 408-270-6863 to make personal arrangements.

Note: The Senior Resource Services (SRS) office hours for drop-in assistance are Monday, Wednesday and Friday from 10 a.m. to noon. The SRS office is located in the Cribari Center across from the Post Office. You may also leave a message at 408-239-5253. The purpose of SRS is to provide education and general business and financial information. All assistance is free and confidential. You should ask your professional adviser about your individual situation.



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Obituary

Raymond Henry Hallstein October 10, 1930 – January 7, 2018



Ray Hallstein was born and raised in Chicago, IL. After high school graduation, he enlisted in the U.S. Air Force, where he learned to fly, and was trained as an airframe and engine mechanic during the Korean War. He received numerous awards for bravery, including fixing and retrieving airplanes behind battle lines. Upon his discharge, he earned an Airframe and Engine Certification, achieved a degree in mechanical engineering, and won numerous flying awards from Lewis University.

After graduation, Ray was hired by Trans World Airlines—fueling planes—and, following Flight Engineer training, began his career in flight. It was then he met his wife of 56 years, Patricia, and in 1964 moved the family to San Jose and then Saratoga. He was soon promoted to First Officer and then Captain on the first commercial jets, later progressing to the L-1011 and 747.

Ray was approached by NASA to participate in studies on the effects of weightlessness and prolonged space flight on humans. He continued working with NASA in this capacity into the Space Shuttle era, and with TWA until his retirement at age 60.

Ray's first love was his family; when not traveling on business, he didn't miss his children's swim meets, baseball, or soccer games. Other loves included flying (which he imparted on his son Roy); skiing; and riding and restoring motorcycles, logging more than 100,000 miles on cross-country trips with the Harley Owners Group. He "hung up his skis" at the age of 70, his motorcycle boots at 80, and has since led a more relaxed lifestyle.

Ray is predeceased by his wife Patricia, and sisters Margaret and Donna. He is survived by his children Karen, Joan, and Roy (Kathy, and her daughter Zoe Saenz), and three generations of nieces and nephews.

The family will host a Celebration of Life on Saturday, March 10, from 2-4 p.m. at The Foothill Center in The Villages, San Jose. Ginny's return to the professional world was fruitful from that point forward. She became the General Manager of the Saratoga Country Club in the late 1970s, where she also met her second husband, Dom Fanelli. They married in 1982 and brought together the two families, which included Dom's four sons Mike, Steve, Nick and Joe and their families. Ginny also started her land development and management business, Fanelli Consulting, which engaged her for over 30 years. In 1982, Ginny was elected to a four-year term on the Saratoga City Council, making her an integral part of helping the city develop as the Silicon Valley grew around it. In 1984 and 1985, her fellow city councilors named her mayor.

The 1980s and 1990s were filled with adventures of many sorts, from family events to fun with friends to adventures at home and abroad. Ginny especially valued the opportunity to build relationships with Dom's and her extended families in Italy and England. Above all else, these were the decades when Ginny became a grandmother to nine wonderful grandchildren: Dominic, Ryan, Alexandra, Rachel, Aaron, Matthew, Helazo, Elisia and Anna. She thrived on her individual relationships with each and every one of them and devoted herself in every way she could to them.
