Association/Homeowners documents available via e-mail

Per an amendment to California Civil Code, homeowner associations are permitted, with owner's written consent, to distribute annual disclosures, (like the pro forma budget summary) and other specified association documents to owners via electronic mail, facsimile, or other electronic means (such as posting on the association's website) instead of sending those documents out by regular mail or personal delivery. This has the potential to provide cost savings to The Villages. Delivery and postage costs for the Villages' annual distribution of the pro forma budget summary alone are close to \$1,000, not to mention the paper and printing costs that run about \$8,000.

In order to transmit association documents via e-mail or by posting on the homeowners association's website, 1) the homeowners association must first receive the owner's written consent, and 2) the homeowners association sends a separate notice to the owner that the documents have been posted and are available for viewing.

Consent forms for owners to request delivery of documents have been developed for both The Villages Association and Homeowners Corporations. These forms provide an owner's consent to delivery electronically, of documents that are capable, under current laws, of being distributed electronically. Owners have the right to revoke this request and receive "hard copies" of the docu-

2018 Director Elections—Just around the corner!

The three Villages Corporations (Club, Association and Homeowners Corporation) are preparing for this year's annual membership meetings and elections.

Elections will be conducted in May and June and this year's annual meetings will be held on Wednesday, June 13 at 4 p.m. in The Villages Clubhouse. *The Villager* newspaper will soon begin publishing candidate statements and candidate questions and answers. **Candidates' Night is scheduled for Tuesday, May 8, at 7 p.m. in the Cribari Auditorium.**

Board of Directors Elections

Club. There will be three director vacancies on the Club Board. The Amended and Restated Bylaws of the Corporation provide that there shall be seven directors. The three directors for which terms expire are Howie Blumstein, Debbie Champion, and Mike Poellot. Per the Bylaws, all are eligible to run for reelection. Those who will continue to serve during the ensuing year are Rick Casey, Jim Neill, Wayne Weiler and Bob Wilk. There are four candidates for which nominations have been qualified for the ballot: Janet Atkins, Jan Champion, Mike Falarski, and Howie Blumstein. In addition, per the Club Bylaws, any Member in Good Standing may also place his or her in nomination for election to the Board by filing with the Secretary of the Club (Mike Poellot) a notice of intent signed by at least two percent (2 percent) of the Members in Good Standing of the Club (51). Self-nominations for the annual election of Directors must be received no later than 5 p.m. on May 1, 2018.

The Club Board has set May 1, 2018 as the Record Date (Bylaws Section 3.6) for the 2018 Director Election and IRS Resolution vote. Only those Members in the records of the Club on May 1, 2018, shall be entitled to notice, and only Members in Good Standing as of the Record Date shall be entitled to vote.

Association. On the Association's Board, there will also be three director vacancies. As with the Club, the Amended and Restated Bylaws of the Association Corporation provide that there shall be seven directors. The three directors for which terms expire are Sherry Benz, John Campbell, and Peter Nicholls. Per the Bylaws, Sherry Benz and Peter Nicholls are eligible to run for re-election. Those who will continue to serve during the ensuing year are Garry Ashby, Brooks Fuller, Matthew Giordono, and Frank Veloz. There are four candidates for which nominations have been qualified for the ballot: Diana Omo Hallock, Rajeev R. Singh, David L. Cook, and Julie Wash. In addition, any Member who satisfies the qualifications set forth in Section 5.2 of the Association Bylaws may place his or her name in nomination for election to the Association Board by giving written notice to the President (Peter Nicholls) or Secretary (Sherry Benz) of the Association. Notice of self nomination must be received prior to the Association's deadline for nominations which is May 1, 2018.

The Association Board has set May 1, 2018 as the Record Date (Bylaws Section 3.6) for the 2018 Director Election. Only those Members in the records of the Association on May 1, 2018, shall be entitled to notice and only members in Good Standing as of the Record Date shall be entitled to vote.



Meeting briefs – April 12, 2018

Director reports

Management Agreement – The Management Agreement review was conducted by the Homeowners' Corporation (HOC) Board in a work study session February 7 and subsequently presented to the Club Board President Debbie Champion. Debbie and General Manager Tim Sutherland attended the April 12 quarterly business meeting to address the review. Overall the review was a positive one with the Club Board meeting the Management Agreement duties, services and responsibilities.

Single-family homeowners email list – This is a list of homeowners and their Village address that is managed by the HOC Board. The list was originally used to solicit email addresses of homeowners to increase the board's ability to keep homeowners informed and increase transparency. The email addresses are not kept by individual board members, but rather kept on file in the General Manager's office. One concern homeowners have expressed is the number of rentals since there isn't an official rental cap for the single-family homes. Through maintenance of the homeowner list, the board can easily keep track of how many homes are owner occupied. Currently there are 15 rentals out of 227 homes.

2018 Safety Information Program – The safety information program for this year is a presentation by our local fire department and is part of the first annual homeowners' social, Thursday, May 17, 4 p.m., Gazebo Park.

Membership communication – The board continues its efforts with a goal to provide open and transparent communication while providing opportunities for input by homeowners. From January 11 to April 12, the HOC Board used homeowner emails, The Villager, Fast Lane, the Villages' website and the Single-Family Homeowners' Group on Nextdoor.com for a total of 21 informational communications to homeowners.

Website – The HOC Board reminded Villagers in attendance at the meeting that the Villages' website is a good source of information and that unlike a social media site, Villagers don't have to be concerned about security when visiting the site. The biggest difference in the Villages' website and social media is the inadvertent disclosure of private information to others. Our website never shares your information.

Annual homeowners' social – The first annual Homeowners' Social is Thursday, May 17 at 4 p.m. in Gazebo Park. Homeowners will receive flyers with more details soon.

Club and Association Boards met for regularly scheduled April meetings

The Villages Association and Club Boards of Directors met Tuesday, April 24 for their regularly scheduled meetings in the Villages Clubhouse. Numerous items of business were discussed and voted upon.

Association Financial Report

For the month of March 2018

March Operating Statement Review:

Revenue was +\$2,300 favorable to the budget of \$615,300 for the month due to higher than budgeted laundry concession income (timing).

Expenditures for the month were +\$3,000 (0.5 percent) favorable to the budget of \$556,300. Notable favorable expense categories were planting +\$21,000 and irrigation maintenance +\$10,100 although spending for these two line items is expected to be heavy during the upcoming spring months. Water expense was unfavorable to budget by -\$13,000 (budget of \$51,900). Water expense was accrued at 125 percent of the budget amount for March. Insurance expense was -\$6,800 unfavorable to the budget of \$92,900 as the new premiums became effective March 1 with a 12 percent increase over the prior year. Premiums have increased as a result of catastrophic losses faced by insurance companies in recent years, both in California (Napa and Sonoma fires) and in the southern United States (hurricanes).

Year-to-date (nine months of operations), total revenue is +\$4,000 favorable to the budget of \$5,548,100 mostly due to higher than planned laundry concession fees and third party assessments. Year-to-date operating expenditures are \$5,694,300 or 3.5 percent higher than the budget of \$5,500,200. Water expense continues as the biggest concern and is unfavorable to budget by -\$280,000, 26% higher than the YTD budget of \$1,049,000. There are several contributing factors for the negative water budget variance:

1) slice seeding projects have required more water than estimated, 2) dramatic and unexpected water meter rate increases effective July 2017 (which accounts for \$99,700 of the variance), 3) record hot summer of 2017, 4) lower than average winter rainfall and 5) residential water consumption is up 6 percent compared to the prior year. Other significant unfavorable year-to-date expenditure categories are repair and maintenance -\$11,900 (mostly Cribari, Montgomery, and Valle Vista), pest control -\$8,900 (Cribari, Verano and Del Lago), insurance -\$6,800 (all districts) and electricity expense -\$6,600 (in nearly all districts except Del Lago). Notable expense categories that are favorable to budget are planting +\$87,700 (timing) and irrigation maintenance +\$42,700 (timing).

The year-to-date net negative operating budget variance is \$190,100.

Club Financial Report

Operating Financial Commentary for the month of March 2018

Club Operating Statement Review:

Total revenue was +\$11,200 favorable to budget, 1.1 percent higher than the budget of \$1,004,200. In spite of the rain, it was a great month for food and bar sales, combining for a favorable to budget posting of +\$22,100, 11 percent higher than budget. Green fee revenue didn't fare as well with the rainy conditions with a negative budget variance of -\$14.600 (14.8 percent below the budget of \$98.300). Total golf rounds during the month were 1,922 compared to 2,621 last year. Strong demand for homes in The Villages showed in resale administration fees +\$4,000 higher than the budget of \$4,500. Besides green fees, notable revenue categories unfavorable to budget were billable services -\$5,000 (timing) and lessons/classes -\$4,900 (timing).

Total expenditures were -\$42,700 unfavorable to budget, 4.3 percent more than the budget of \$1,002,400. Expenditure categories significantly unfavorable to budget were repair and maintenance -\$26,500 (work related to pool openings and clubhouse repairs), employee expense -\$21,400 (pay equity adjustments) and water expense -\$5,300 (accrued at 25 percent of budget). The only notable expense category favorable to budget was electricity expense +\$8,400 (positive budget variance used to help pay solar lease).

The net negative operating budget variance for the month was \$31,500. See table below.

Year-to-date revenue is \$266,000 favorable to budget, 2.9 percent higher than the budget of \$9,253,000. Year-to-date expenditures are \$223,000 (2.4 percent) unfavorable to the budget of \$9,261,000. The year-to-date net positive budget variance is \$43,000 (P&L). See table on the next page for detail by department.

The bottom of the table on page 7 shows the financial impact of the monthly solar lease payments and contribution to the balloon payment fund (to be paid in 2023) captured on the Club's balance sheet. The YTD total for these two items is \$163,000.

The above table shows G&A with the largest positive net variance of \$118,000 due to higher than budgeted revenue from HOA document sales, resale administration fees and annual rental unit administration fees along with savings in employee expense from outsourcing the Human Resources Director position. Golf Course/ Pro Shop has fared well (green fee revenue) with the moderate climate for most of the fiscal year with a \$29,000 positive net variance. Community Activities is showing a \$17,000 positive net variance mostly from higher than planned income in resident activities, lessons/classes and community events. The Clubhouse/

Restaurant has posted a \$6,000 positive net variance due to favorable to budget food/beverage sales and savings in electricity expense (due to solar), offset by higher than planned employee expense (pay equity adjustments). Public Safety is running a negative net variance of \$15,000 due to higher than planned employee expense (pay equity adjustments as a result of wage compression).

Revenue was on budget at \$3,304 (non-Estates single family homes). Expenditures for the month were \$170 favorable to budget due to less than planned legal fees +\$112 and insurance expense +\$58. The year-to-date net positive operating budget variance is \$774.

Estates revenue tracked budget for the month at \$11,868. Expenditures were +\$1,671 favorable to budget, 15 percent less than the budget of \$10,748. Notable expenditure categories favorable to budget were planting expense +\$1,515 (timing), irrigation maintenance +\$250 (timing) and electricity expense +\$148. The only notable expenditure category unfavorable to budget for the month was water -\$390 (accrued at 125 percent of budget). **The year-to-date net positive operating budget variance is \$9,093.**

Play of a bridge hand


Play of a bridge hand includes not only bidding but defending and achieving the bids we make. This class will cover some review of five-card major system as well as declarer's plan and defensive tactics.

Water District property tax exemption If you are a low-income senior, you may qualify to have one of your parcel taxes removed from

If you are a low-income senior, you may qualify to have one of your parcel taxes removed from next December's property tax bill. If you qualify, act quickly. You must apply by June 30, 2018.

First, dig out your 2017-2018 property tax bill. Look at the list of Parcel Tax / Special Assessments in the center of the bill. Is there a line labeled "SCVWD Safe Clean Water"? The Santa Clara Valley Water District offers a property tax exemption from this special assessment for qualifying low-income seniors. Now is the time to request an exemption for your 2018-2019 property tax assessment.

To qualify you must be 65 years or older by June 30, 2019 – i.e. the end of the 2018/2019 property tax year. The qualifying senior or his/her living trust must be listed as an owner on the deed and the senior must live in the property as his/her primary residence. Rentals units you own do not qualify. Only one owner needs to be age 65.

Your 2017 total household income must have been less than \$50,804. Social Security and nontaxable income is included in the calculation of income. You are not required to send in any proof of income, but you sign the application under penalty of perjury that you meet the income requirement.

This income limit is based on 75 percent of California's Median Household Income so it changes every year. The income limit started at \$32,850 in 2000 and has now increased to \$50,804—an increase of 55 percent in 18 years.

Once you have qualified for this exemption, you will receive a verification form by mail each April. You verify that the address is still your personal residence and that your income does not exceed the new income limitation.

The one-page application form is available at the SRS office or online at www.valleywater.org. You will need to attach a copy of your driver's license or some other document to prove your age. Don't delay; the application is due by June 30.

Note: The Senior Resource Services (SRS) office hours for drop-in assistance are Monday, Wednesday and Friday from 10 a.m. to noon. The SRS office is in the Cribari Center across from the Post Office. You may also leave a message at 408-239-5253. The purpose of SRS is to provide education and general business and financial information. All assistance is free and confidential. You should ask your professional adviser about your individual situation.

<u>SRS Special Notice</u>: Notary handout changed

SRS has an updated handout for notary service. Currently there is one Villager volunteer who will provide free notary service to Villagers.

Also listed are three fee-based notaries who live in The Villages and will make house calls. The new handout is dated 04/2018. If you have an older list, please request a new one. Some residents, even though they no longer provide the service, are still receiving requests from Villagers who are using lists they were given long ago.

"Franklin D. Roosevelt: A Political Life" by Robert Dallek: The author attributes Roosevelt's success to two perceptive political insights. First, he made the presidency the central, most influential institution in the political system. Under his watch the country was able to recover from the Depression and entered World War II, but more controversially, he used that power in an unsuccessful attempt to pack the Supreme Court. Second, he understood that effectiveness in the American political system depended on building consensus and commanding stable, long-term popular support. In addressing the country's international and domestic challenges, Roosevelt recognized the critical importance of remaining attentive to the full range of public sentiment regarding policy decisions—perhaps his most important lesson in effective leadership, and one that remains vital today. 920. 2017

"Born A Crime" by Trevor Noah: This is the story of a mischievous young boy who grows into a restless young man as he struggles to find himself in a world where he was never supposed to exist. How to keep your brain in tip-top shape

It begins simply and gradually builds, scene by scene, until it evolves into a full choral finale with its power and majesty. It captures the underlying struggle for liberty and justice mirroring contemporary political movements in Europe and takes place in a Spanish state prison in late 18th century. Two years prior to the opening scene, the nobleman Florestan had attempted to expose certain crimes of the nobleman Pizarro. In revenge, Pizarro has secretly imprisoned Florestan in the prison over which Pizarro is governor. Florestan's wife, Leonore, seeking her husband, comes to the prison dressed as a boy seeking employment and is hired. She finds that Florestan has been given diminishing rations until he is nearly starved to death and is found digging a grave in the ruined well in the dungeon. She begs to be allowed to give Florestan a crust of bread. An alarm sounds and Pizarro brandishes a dagger, Leonore leaps between him and Florestan and reveals her identity. Pizarro raises his dagger to kill her but she pulls a gun and threatens to shoot him when a trumpet is heard, announcing the arrival of the minister. He learns of the treachery of Governor Pizarro who is then led away to prison. Florestan and Leonore and the townsfolk sing to the victory and justice.

Villages Veterans to meet on May 1

The Villages Veterans Club will meet at 2 p.m. on Tuesday, May 1, in the Foothill Center. All veterans, spouses, and interested Villagers are welcome.

This month, as a special feature, Al Girolami (US Army, 1962-1964; Cal Army NG 64-70), will share his thoughts about his "Reunion of Honor" trip to Guam and Iwo Jima, and the famous invasions of these Pacific Islands during World War II.

Guam was attacked by Japan on December 8, 1941, only hours after their attack on Pearl Harbor. The island was not well fortified, resulting in little resistance and a U.S. surrender after only two days. Returning in July 1944, the US liberated Guam from its 31-month Japanese in opposition on the island of Iwo Jima. During the fiveweek battle, with some of the fiercest fighting in the Pacific, more than 25,000 combatants lost their lives. Nearly everyone has heard of Iwo Jima and recognizes the icon of US Marines raising the American flag on top of Mount Suribachi—a symbol of patriotism and valor.

In 1985, forty years after the battle, the nations met again on lwo Jima, this time to bring together veterans to dedicate a monument in recognition of the sacrifices suffered by both nations. In 1995, ten years hence, surviving veterans of

the Iwo Jima Association of America and the Japanese IwoTo Association agreed to meet every year on IwoTo to commemorate the battle with a "Reunion of Honor." March 24, 2018, marked the 73rd Anniversary of the Battle of Iwo Jima.

The opening of The Royal Academy of Arts in London, founded to uphold professionalism, offer training and display contemporary art, which while open to women, held sanctions against most of the women crafts despite the fact that two of its 32 founding members were women—floral artist Mary Moser and painter Angelica Kauffman. This was the point in time where the hierarchy of "Art" over "craft" got established and remains debated in the art world today.

Nonetheless, it gives historical perspective to our name "The Villages Arts and Crafts Association."

The film introduces women artists who broke out into many new areas changing the textile industry, the center of the fashion world, possibilities for women in sculpture, architecture, historical painting as well as creating new financial markets for art. But for me, the most remarkable stories evolve around the ill-fated arts patron Marie Antionette and her two protégées, the beautiful portrait painter Louise-Elizabeth Vigée le Brun and fashion designer Rose Bertin. I will not give away the ending.

occupation. During the battle, more than 19,500 combatants lost their lives, 18,000 of which were Japanese. One Japanese soldier, discovered by local farmers in January 1972, after hiding for 28 years, was the last holdout.

In February 1945, the United States and Japan again met


of "Edelweiss" will conclude the medley.





Tips from the Pro—Are you hitting it fat? This means the club is hitting the ground behind the ball. This is the worst miss as the ball goes nowhere. The solution is to move the bottom point of your swing more forward. Here is a quick tip...place a scorecard 3 inches behind your ball; focus on the front of the ball and try to miss the scorecard when you swing. Be sure to feel like your club and your weight is forward/left at impact. If you hit the scorecard try again and again until you feel the right move and impact position. See you at the course!

Who is Clyne Soley and Why should I care?



As The Villages celebrates its 51st Anniversary, it's useful to look back on a key contributor to golf play at the Villages and around the world. Dr. Russell "Clyne" Soley and his wife Bertha, were the 29th and 30th residents of the Villages in 1967. Clyne Soley had a long involvement in golf in The Villages and was a key developer of the USGA golf handicapping system that is now used worldwide. Clyne Soley passed away in 1992.

Clyne Soley was the Club Champion for The Villages in 1968 when the course consisted only of the front nine holes. He played hundreds of rounds on the Villages courses, but his favorite was the Par 3 course. He had a total

of 86 holes-in-one on our short (Par 3) course, 2 on the regular 18-hole course, and 3 holes-in-one on other courses.

Dr. Soley was also a key member of the USGA Handicap Research Team that developed the handicapping system now used over most of the world.



Along the Way—a trip down Memory Lane

My brother and I were told growing up in the 1950s that wearing sunglasses would permanently weaken our eyes; that drinking "purified" water would rob us of the chance to develop immunities. Sunscreen lotion would prevent us from exposing our skin to the health-giving benefits of the sun. I don't really know whether those attitudes were limited to a very few among

the uneducated, lower middle-class families like ours, or whether they were more widely-held. We know in hindsight that Mom and Dad couldn't afford luxuries like sunglasses or the 1950s equivalents of bottled water and sun block. I remember being told that the heel of the bread was "the best thing in the world" for us. Spam, liverwurst..."Best thing in the world" for us. Does anyone else remember eating a sugar sandwich on white bread? I guess that was all we had just then. Remember when a certain brand of white bread "built strong bodies twelve ways"?

At age 17 I transitioned from Mom's guidance to the Army's, where I ate whatever they gave me, and did whatever they told me. At age 21 I met my future wife here in California, and we married a year later. I brought a lot of misinformation and bad habits with me into marriage. Boy, did she have her hands full trying to straighten me out! I imagine many of my fellow Villagers can remember and relate. There is a lot of truth to the idea that our wives had to raise us, along with our children, especially if we married young. I provided the second-hand smoke for our kids, just as Dad had done for me, until our oldest was 9 and our youngest was 4. I stopped drinking alcohol that same year, but not before the two oldest could remember and tell some "funny" stories that began with, "Remember the time when Dad..." Perhaps we can console ourselves with the old saying, "Everyone is good for something, even if it's a bad example."

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


