
My Fellow Villagers,

Association/Homeowners documents available via e-mail

Per an amendment to California Civil Code, homeowner associations are permitted, with owner's written consent, to distribute annual disclosures, (like the pro forma budget summary) and other specified association documents to owners via electronic mail, facsimile, or other electronic means (such as posting on the association's website) instead of sending those documents out by regular mail or personal delivery. This has the potential to provide cost savings to The Villages. Delivery and postage costs for the Villages' annual distribution of the pro forma budget summary alone are close to \$1,000, not to mention the paper and printing costs that run about \$8,000.

In order to transmit association documents via e-mail or by posting on the homeowners association's website, 1) the homeowners association must first receive the owner's written consent, and 2) the homeowners association sends a separate notice to the owner that the documents have been posted and are available for viewing.

Consent forms for owners to request delivery of documents have been developed for both The Villages Association and Homeowners Corporations. These forms provide an owner's consent to electronic delivery of documents that are capable, under current laws, of being distributed electronically. Owners have the right to revoke this request and receive "hard copies" of the documents by sending a written revocation signed by the owner, to the applicable corporation.

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The table at left shows G&A with the largest positive net variance of \$113,000 due to higher than budgeted revenue from HOA document sales, resale administration fees and annual rental unit administration fees along with savings in employee expense from outsourcing the Human Resources Director position. The Clubhouse/ Restaurant has posted a \$44,000 positive net variance due to favorable to budget food/beverage sales and savings in electricity expense (due to solar), offset by higher than planned employee expense (pay equity adjustments). Golf Course/Pro Shop has produced a \$26,000 positive net variance with favorable revenue from green fees, merchandise sales, driving range and golf cart rentals, offset by water expense and tree trimming expense. "All Other" category has a \$127,000 negative net variance primarily due to higher than budgeted water expense and pest control expense (wild pigs) as well as unfavorable billable services income (timing). Public Safety is running a negative net variance of \$17,000 due to higher than planned employee expense (pay equity adjustments as a result of wage compression).

The USS Potomac was originally built in 1934 as the Coast Guard cutter Electra, and converted to the presidential yacht in 1936 by President Franklin D. Roosevelt, who had her re-commissioned as a U.S. Navy vessel.

Attire—For your comfort and safety, dress is casual. Bring extra layers so that you'll be comfortable while enjoying the cruise. The Bay is often 20 degrees colder than the shore. The Potomac has limited indoor seating and the best views are from the boat deck and other outdoor areas. Also, because the yacht has steep ladders and may be slippery, please wear flat shoes with non-skid soles.

Boarding, Departure and Return—A brief 12-minute video on the history of the ship will be shown on the bus. We will board the Potomac at 10:15 a.m. and depart from the dock promptly at 10:30 a.m. Complimentary tea, coffee, and bottled water will be provided. Docents will be on hand to give tours of the ship.

New fees related to Club Facility Use

The Club Board of Directors approved fees in the budget process that may affect Board Recognized Organizations' and private uses of Club Facilities beginning July 1. The intent of the fees was to diversify The Villages revenue stream. In May a letter was sent to all Board Recognized Organizations indicating the upcoming changes related to fees. The changes include labor charges for custom room setups and a service charge for some events. It is very labor intensive to provide a custom room setup for every facility use. There are 38 facilities available and it is not uncommon to have 28-32 different facility uses in a single day. The Community Activities office has been working toward standard setups for more than two years. Together with the janitorial supervisor, we developed several "standard" setups that most organizations and private users are already using. This means we now offer a choice of generic setups that are available for an event. These are provided at no cost. These sample setups are available in the Community Activities office. Custom setups are still available, but labor charges will prevail.

Some organizations hold events that rely on the community (beyond their club membership) for a customer base and use the event to generate revenue for their organization. The Club Board felt that those types of events should help defray the cost The Villages incurs to support the event.

Service Charge Fee - An event support service fee will be charged for fee based and/or fundraising events. These events are open to the Villages Community at large (not a membership oriented event) and are revenue generating for a specific organization.

Custom Setup Fee - Four to six standard set-ups will be offered for each center at no charge. Departure from a standard set-up will be billed as a labor charge. The charge is based on the size of the facility.

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FROM THE BOOKSHELF

"Crime Scene" by Jonathan Kellerman and Jesse Kellerman: Natural causes or foul play? That's the question Clay Edison, a former athlete turned deputy coroner, must answer each time he examines a body. Figuring out motives and chasing down suspects aren't a part of his beat until a seemingly openand-shut case proves to be more than meets his highly trained eye. What emerges is a history of scandal and violence and an experiment gone horribly wrong that ended in a brutal murder. The twisting trail Clay follows will lead him into the darkest corners of the human soul. It's his job to listen to the tales the dead tell, but this time he's part of a story that makes his blood run cold. Mystery 2017.

"Forest Dark" by Nicole Krauss: Two unconnected people change the direction of their lives and travel to Israel, encountering unexpected people and situations and experiencing transformation and self-realization. At age 68 Jules Epstein is undergoing a metamorphosis, divorcing his wife, retiring from his New York law firm, and giving away his possessions. He finds himself involved with making a film about the life of David that is being shot in the desert. Meanwhile, a well-known young novelist meets a retired literature professor in Tel Aviv who proposes a project she can't turn down, and she is drawn into a mystery that alters her life in ways she cannot imagine. Fiction 2017.

"Sulfur Springs" by William Kent Krueger: This is the latest in the Cork O'Connor series. Cork O'Connor journeys to Arizona with his new wife, Rainy, to search for her son, Peter, who vanished after leaving a cryptic voice mail message in which he seemed to confess to a killing. As they desperately gather scraps of information, they begin to grasp that they've stepped into something much larger than they could ever have imagined. A war is going on along the border involving drug traffickers, illegal immigrants, and a small group of activists trying to help the most vulnerable survive against all odds. Mystery 2017.

"Take Out" by Margaret Maron: This is the latest in the Detective Sigrid Harald mystery series. Sigrid is called to investigate the deaths of two homeless men in the West Village. The police at first assume an overdose, until they realize one of the men shows no signs of drug use. When containers of poisoned takeout food are found nearby, the case is suddenly more complicated. As Sigrid investigates, she uncovers an intriguing neighborhood history: a haughty mafia widow and her disgraced godson, a retired opera star with dark secrets, an unsolved hitand-run, and the possible discovery of a long-missing painting that will rock the art world. Who killed the two homeless men, and why? And which one was the intended victim? Or was the poisoned food meant for someone else entirely? Mystery 2017.

"Hunting Hour" by Margaret Mizushima: This is the third in the Timber Creek K-9 mystery series. Deputy Mattie Cobb and her K-9 partner, Robo, get called to track a missing junior high student, who turns up dead. Soon another girl goes missing. Knowing that each hour a child remains missing lessens the probability of finding her alive, Mattie and Robo lead the hunt and community volunteers join in to search everywhere. When Robo does catch the scent, it leads them to information that challenges everything they thought they knew about the case. Mattie and Robo must rush to hunt down the kidnapper before it's too late. Mystery 2017.

Meet A Vet: Charles Mckain, Marine





Chuck is a Midwestern native, born in Olathe, Kansas and moved at a very early age to Westmont, Illinois, a suburb of Chicago where his father worked at General Motors during World War II. He joined the Marines in April 1958. After training he was assigned to the USS Ranger CVA-61.

In 1958 the Ranger was the largest combat ship in the world. It completed Westpac tours in 1959 and 1960 calling at many ports including Guam, Philippines, Hong Kong, Japan and Hawaii. During these visits the Marine Detachment conducted Honor Ceremonies in Dress Blues for the Governing Military, political and royal families of these nations. The detachment also conducted Jungle warfare training in the field in the area of Subic Bay in the Philippines.

For its work during the Formosa crisis in 1958-59 the USS

Ranger was awarded the China Extended Service Medal for the Formosa blocking incident and the Armed Forces Expeditionary award for the Quemoy and Matsu operation. Carrier group operations are a serious and dangerous business. During 1959 they lost six officers and three enlisted. During the 1960 cruise they lost five officers and two enlisted.



President/Director Reports

Director Election: President Teddy Morse announced the election by acclamation of Greg Stewart and Ron Steckel to the Homeowners' Corporation Board of Directors.

Election of Officer: A slate of candidates was presented and unanimously approved. Officers for 2018-19 are President – Teddy Morse; Vice President – Greg Stewart; Secretary – Jeannie Omel; Chief Financial Officer (CFO) – Mike Kane; Assistant CFO – Ron Steckel.

Homeowners Social and Safety Information Program: Vice President Greg Stewart reported that residents from 50 homes attended the first homeowners' social event held on Thursday, May 17. The event included a presentation by local firefighters and brief comments from General Manager Tim Sutherland. All comments following the event were positive and the boards' consensus is that we should add the event to our plans for next year in conjunction with National Night Out on Tuesday, August 6.

Membership Communication: Secretary Jeannie Omel reported that the board is trying to take advantage of every avenue of communication available in reaching out to homeowners --- The Villager, the Villages Resident Portal, Next Door, the Villages Fast Lane and individual email contact. Topics suggested for the next feature article included landscaping changes, reminding homeowners about providing a "back-up" key to public safety and the exterior paint application process and the paint discount at Kelly Moore. The board also agreed that information contained in these articles should be published on a regular basis.

Manager's Report: Assistant General Manager Julia Meadows gave a brief report for the month ending April 30, 2018. She reported that revenue was on budget for non-Estates single family homes and that expenditures for the month were \$170 favorable to the budget. In addition, Estates revenue tracked budget for the month at \$11,868 while expenditures were \$5,121 favorable to the budget. General Manager Tim Sutherland addressed a number of questions regarding current landscaping concerns and assured the board that management staff is working very closely with the landscape contractors to resolve current issues.

Committee Reports

Architectural Control Committee Report: Architectural Control Committee (ACC) Acting Chairman Ron Steckel reminded the board that he would continue to serve as Chair until such time as an appropriate Chair is named for the ACC. Ron reported that the committee has approved 24 applications year to date and that the ACC binder is now completely updated and accurate. Ron also presented two new candidates as associate members for the ACC: Mary McBride and Peter Ligeti.

Estates District Advisory Committee (DAC): The Estates DAC Chair Jeff Schlageter updated the board about the progress of the Estates landscaping plan and reported that Phase 2 of the water feature project is close to completion. Other projects underway include bridge sealing and Phase 2 of the water feature beautification plan. Jeff also reminded the board that there are now seven members on The Estates DAC.

Action Items

Wehner Mansion Resolution: A resolution was approved by the board directing General Manager Tim Sutherland to act as its agent to investigate the possibility of removal of the Wehner Mansion to a location outside the Villages where it can be restored and enjoyed by the public and review possible options for land use development.

Homeowners' Social Event: The board unanimously approved setting a date for the 2nd Annual Homeowners' Social for Tuesday, August 6, 2019 at Gazebo Park.

Goals and Objectives Work Study Session: Following discussion, the board agreed to hold a special meeting to set goals and objectives for 2018-2019 on Thursday, July 12 at 9 a.m.

Quarterly Homeowners' Corporation Meeting Dates: President Teddy Morse suggested that we continue our quarterly meetings on the 2nd Thursday of the month and suggested meeting dates for the coming year: October 11, 2018, January 10, 2019 and April 11, 2019. The board approved the dates as presented.

The next Homeowners' Quarterly Business Meeting is Thursday, October 11.

Homeowners' Operating Financial Commentary

For the month of May 2018

May Operating Statement Review: Revenue was on budget at \$3,304 (non-Estates single family homes). Expenditures for the month were \$170 favorable to budget due to less than planned legal fees of \$112 and insurance expense of \$58. The year-todate net <u>positive</u> operating budget variance is \$1,115 (mostly in legal fee expense).

Estates revenue tracked budget for the month at \$11,868. Expenditures were \$2,205 unfavorable to budget, 18.5 percent higher than the budget of \$11,933. Notable expenditure categories unfavorable to budget were water expense and planting expense. Electricity expense was favorable to budget. The year-to-date net <u>positive</u> operating budget variance is \$12,009 (favorable planting expense, electricity expense and irrigation maintenance).

SENIOR RESOURCE SERVICES *Pay attention to mail from Santa Clara County*

You are not required to pay your first installment of your 2018-2019 property tax until December 10, 2018. Around that tax payment date, a few Villagers will come to the SRS office stressed because they believe their property tax bill is not correct. But December is not the time to inquire about your bill. You need to think about your property tax now when you receive your Assessment Notification.

By June 30 you will receive your 2018-2019 Notification of Assessed Value from The County Assessor. This notice will show the assessed value of your home as of January 1, 2018. This assessed value is used to calculate your property tax due in December 2018 and April 2019.

What follows will help you navigate your notice information:

In the upper right corner are two lines labeled "Total," with a dollar amount directly to the right. The specific line you need is the first one labeled "Total." It appears just above "Homeowner Exemption." This is your Total Assessed Value for property tax.

In the first paragraph the notice indicates whether your assessed value is the "Factored Base Year Value" or the "Market Value." Your property tax each year is calculated on the lower of these two values.

Factored Base Year Value (known as Proposition 13 value): This is what you paid for your home plus an annual inflation

adjustment of no more than 2 percent. A California senior can make a one-time election to transfer his or her previous home's Factored Base Year Value to their Villages' residence if that amount is lower than the Market Value. The transferred base year is then adjusted by the same 2 percent each year.

Market Value (known as Proposition 8 value): This is the fair market value of your property as of January 1, 2018. The assessment notice includes website instructions and a PIN to learn which properties were used by the county for comparable sales to estimate your fair market value.



Wimbledon. The 1881 Wimbledon **final** in which William Renshaw defeated John Hartley, 6–0, 6–1, 6–1, lasted 36 minutes. Not far behind, Fred Perry defeated Baron Gottfried von Cramm, 6–1, 6–0, in the 1936 Wimbledon final in 40 minutes.

Did you know...to this day, golf is one of only two sports, along with the javelin throw, to have ever been played on the moon? Well, I kind of felt like I was playing on the moon today... lots of "moon shots" and "dust storms" in the sand. I suspect you can all relate!

We had a great turnout with 58 ladies teeing up and hitting the fairways. The weather was perfect and the day was even more memorable for Joy Rem, Susan Sunzeri and Mimi Steinhauer— all three had chip-ins. Congratulations, ladies!

Speaking of chip shots, do you know the difference between a pitch shot and a chip shot? They're not the same. The pitch is a short, high shot that's typically employed from 100 yards or less from the green. You'll play pitch shots when the ball is too far away to chip, when an obstruction in front of the green prevents you from chipping the ball, or when you need to hit a higher, softer shot to hold the green. A "chip shot" in golf is a shot played from close to the green, usually within a few yards of the putting surface, that results in the ball popping briefly into the air, then hitting the ground and rolling forward toward the hole. Chip shots are a part of golf known as "the short game."

It was great fun watching the young players attending "Golf Camp" this week. I witnessed some great chip shots into the practice nets. I'm wondering if their lower center of gravity helps?



He now plays the King of Diamonds, continues with another Diamond, trumps it on the board with the King of Spades since he knows East is out of Diamonds. He next leads a Spade, finesses the 10 of Spades, continues with the Queen and then the Ace of Spades. He is now left with two cards, trumps and claims. Well done. He makes 1 overtrick.






