PUBLIC SAFETY

For emergencies, establish a new 'L.I.F.E. File'

The San Jose Fire Department recently provided Public Safety a new L.I.F.E. File, which stands for Lifesaving Information For Emergencies. This is a newer version of the VIAL OF LIFE. The file is a magnetic sleeve, which can be stuck on your refrigerator. There is a sleeve in which to put the form or other documents, such as a DNR.

Both the VIAL OF LIFE and the new L.I.F.E. File are acceptable.

If you are interested in these items, please come by Public Safety Administration. We have a limited supply on hand.

What is Vial of L.I.F.E.?

What is the Vial of L.I.F.E.? The Vial of L.I.F.E. is "Lifesaving Information For Emergencies." It's a place for you to store important medical information that emergency medical personnel (firefighters, paramedics, Public Safety officers and hospital staff) need in a time of crisis. By completing the Vial of L.I.F.E. form, you can provide the emergency personnel with vital lifesaving information even if you are unable. It is very important that you keep this information up to date, accurate and placed in a prominent spot in your refrigerator - an empty or incomplete form does little to help those who need your medical history. By the way, it is also advisable to have completed, up-to-date forms in each of your vehicles to assist EMS in the event of an accident

The Vial of L.I.F.E. kit is available free as a public service from the San Jose Firefighters Union Local 230 and the San Jose Fire Department. It can be obtained by contacting Public Safety, the gate at 223-4665; Public Safety Administration at 239-5246 or San Jose Fire Department Emergency Medical Services Division at 277-4084.

Are you prepared?

When disaster strikes, it may be three or more days before assistance is available. EPC encourages you to read the information at the end of the Villages Phone Directory and in your red folder. Be prepared.



Service Animal vs Comfort Animal

Service Animals as defined by Title II and Title III of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA).

Service animal is individually trained to do work or perform tasks for the benefit on an individual with a disability, including physical, sensory, psychiatric, intellectual, or other mental disability. These tasks may include, pulling a



Service animals are allowed to accompany the handler to any place where members of the public are allowed, even if the facility has a "No Pets" policy.

When it is not obvious what service an animal provides, only limited inquiries are allowed. Staff may ask two questions:

Is the animal required because of a disability?

What work or task has the animal been trained to perform?

Emotional support animals are not covered under ADA. A doctor's note does not make an emotional support animal a service animal.

need another tie or a new blouse. Travel is a bit beyond them and going out to dinner is not as good as a great dinner at home but I do want to do something nice. Wait! Mom loved to play golf and Dad was an avid tennis player for over 50 years. I'm going to remember their sporting years with a donation in their names to the Foundation to be used for tennis projects and golf needs. This

SENIOR RESOURCE SERVICES

Help your favorite charity and pay less income tax

Recently two of the charities at The Villages received gifts of stock rather than cash. This type of donation is a very smart, well thought-out move on the part of the Villager donors. Let us explain: In recent years the stock market has been at record highs. Even with the market down a bit, many people still have huge gains that will be taxable when sold. If this is your situation, you have a golden opportunity to make a gift to your favorite charity and at the same time put yourself in a position to save money on your income tax. This wonderfully simple technique can work for you if you have stock, bonds or real estate you have owned for more than one year, and if these assets are currently worth more than you paid for them.

Here is how it works. Suppose you would like to give a gift of \$1,000 to your favorite charity. And, suppose you own stock worth \$1,000, which you purchased several years ago for \$100. If you directly sell the stock to give the \$1,000 to charity, you will have to report and pay taxes on the \$900 long-term capital gain. Presuming your combined Federal and California tax rate for long-term gains is 20 percent, you will pay \$180 tax leaving you only \$820 to give to charity. Now, if you make a gift of the stock directly to the charity, you get to claim the \$1,000 fair market value of stock as a charitable contribution deduction, and you will not have to report the stock disposition as a gain nor pay tax on the \$900 of capital gain. The charity will most likely sell the stock, but it will not have to pay any income tax on the stock sale because it is tax-exempt. Frequently the charity has a brokerage account at a bank or financial house, so your gift can



"The Monk of Mokha" by Dave Eggers: This is the story of a Yemeni American immigrant, living in the tenderloin of San Francisco, who, although smart and energetic, can't find his way in American society and ends up being a doorman of a high-end apartment complex. Upon discovering that Yemen, not Ethiopia, may be the place where coffee, as we now know it, first was brewed he gets obsessed with importing high end coffee beans from Yemen, where some coffee is still grown. He finds the money to visit Yemen, where his grandfather still lives and tours the highlands of Yemen to meet the few remaining coffee farmers and obtain coffee samples. In the meantime civil war breaks out and it becomes very difficult to export anything, while the Saudis bomb anything in sight. Nevertheless, he succeeds to bring high end coffee to market and now lives in the apartment complex, where he was once the doorman (nobody recognizes him). The book ends a few years ago. We wonder if his business still thrives, since the Yemeni civil war has intensified. 920, Biography, Alkanshali, Moktar, 2018

"The Temptation of Forgiveness" by Donna Leon: This the 27th detective novel about Guido Brunetti, Commisario of Police in Venice. No big crimes or bloodbaths here, Venetian life continues in all its blissful and sordid aspects. Truth is never straightforward, but reading the old latin classics spreads light on present behavior, both good and bad. In the end, when the criminals are brought justice they all go out, drink delicious Italian wine and consume some exquisite Venetian delicacies. Mystery 2018.

"Down the River into the Sea" by Walter Mosley: King Oliver was once one of NYPD's finest investigators, until he got framed for assault of a car thief by his enemies within the force. Now, many years later he runs a detective agency with help of his teenage daughter. When he receives a letter from a woman, who admits she was paid to frame him years ago, King decides to find out who on the force wanted him disposed of and why. A pattern of corruption and brutality against blacks is discovered. King must outrun dirty cops and outsmart craven lawyers and above all protect his daughter. Mystery 2018.



Geese Chasers – As we have all seen, there are many geese on the golf course this season. Although many residents like geese and ducks, geese can actually damage our golf course. Geese can eat the turf and create turf damage around the green complexes and on the tee boxes. Geese also defecate on highly sensitive turf, like our greens, which can cause turf damage on the greens. The geese droppings are also unsightly and get in the way of golfers and maintenance mowers. Therefore, we will be contracting Loosie Goosey Dog Service once the mulching season is over and it's allowable to abate geese. We feel returning to the dog service will go a long way toward moving the geese off the golf course.

Tips from the Pro-Set up for success...Putting: Your setup when putting is just as important as your set up on your full swing. Setting up to succeed means setting up with your angles square to the target line, especially your putter face; and also setting up with your eyes in line and over the ball. To help you set up properly when putting, a carpenter's chalk-line and a CD disc are great putting aids to have in your golf bag. The chalk-line is useful to help you with your alignment and stroke. Find a straight six to 10-foot putt on a practice green. Snap a chalk-line from the hole back to desired distance. Put a ball on line and make sure your putter and body are lined up properly. Try to roll the putt right up the chalk-line. Use the CD as a mirror. Lay the disc on the green and place a ball in the hole. Take you stance until your eyes are either directly over the ball or just inside. Let us know if these practice tips help your putting. See you at the course!

be transferred directly from your brokerage account to the charity's account. Just ask the charity for the institution's name and account number and give your broker the transfer instructions.

The charity needs to send you a receipt for the name of the stock, the number of shares and the date the stock was received. You will use the stock market information to determine your contribution dollar amount. Your charitable deduction will be the average of the high and low price of the stock on the day it transfers out of your account to the charity.

All in all, as long as it is a 501(c)(3) qualified charity it's one heck of a deal. You get the income tax deduction of \$1,000, you never pay the \$180 tax on your gain, and your Charity receives an asset worth \$1,000 – the amount of contribution you would like to make. Now increase your tax rate or add another zero to the numbers in the example and the law is even more exciting!

Ask your broker or financial advisor about this possibility as a way to help a favorite charity.



Dealer has 1 loser in Spades, 2 losers in Hearts, and at least 1 Diamond loser.

Strategy: Since West initially led a Club, cover with the Ace and finesse the 10 of Diamonds before pulling out trumps.

West leads the 2 of Clubs, South, the Ace from the board, switches to the 10 of Diamonds, East covers with the Queen, and now South has to play the King, which prevents South from getting 4 Diamond tricks. He plays the King of Spades, West ducks, continues with the Queen, still West ducks, South then leads the Jack, and West takes the trick with the Ace. He plays the King of Clubs, South trumps, follows with the 10 of Spades to take out the last trump. He leads a Heart, West uses his Ace, continues with a Club, South trumps, plays a Heart to the King on the board, and then leads a Diamond to the Jack in his hand, continues with the Ace, and leads his last card, a Diamond, which East wins with the 9. Great! The contract is made exactly. If East had not covered the 10 of Diamonds with his Queen, South would have made an extra trick since he would sluff his 7 of Diamonds on the 10 from the board.

* Quite a few players would not bid game due to their HCP but others give themselves an extra point for having a 5-card suit plus their honors were a King and an Ace rather than a couple of Queens or Jacks, which makes their hand stronger.

My mother and her 12 siblings were raised in abject poverty in New York City during the 1930s. She carried that poverty mindset into raising my brother and me on Long Island in the 1950s. The culture of poverty is a way of thinking that says, "We have very little; we will always have very little; this is our lot in life." It is about expectations as much as ambitions – rather like

the line in the chimneysweep song from Mary Poppins: "Now that the ladder of life has been strung, I find that I am on the bottom-most rung," or words to that affect. In hindsight, leaving that environment for three years in the military (before Vietnam) made all the difference. My fresh start in California began with meeting my future wife in 1965. I was an uneducated blue-collar worker, so her expectations in marrying me couldn't have been very high...but they were higher than mine!

California was a land of opportunity back then. My job loading airplanes at Pan Am, plus Sandy's meager clerical job at the bank enabled us to buy our first home. I started junior college in 1967, we bought our first home in 1968, and our first child was born in 1969. Our second and third children were also born while I was a full-time student and the sole breadwinner. We were able, on our single paycheck, plus an employee benefit from Pan Am and some help from the GI Bill, to put me through two years of junior college, two years at Stanford University, and two years at Cal Berkeley. A young blue-collar couple could probably never pull that off in today's economy. But attitude is still everything, and where there's a will there's still a way. Or as more than one motivational speaker has said, "I have been broke many times in my life, but I have never been poor!"





3.2.10 Estate and garage sales are permitted subject to the following:

A. A permit for the sale shall be obtained from the Public Safety Office prior to holding the sale and placement of advertising.

Also, effective July 1, 2012, all estate and garage sales in the Association will require a permit. The owner of the property must request the permit from Public Safety Administration in Building C.

The Villages Association Rule 2.02. 5., Residence Use and Occupancy Restrictions applies:

5. Estate and garage sales are permitted subject to the following:
