Notice from Public Safety: Golf Cart Reminders

All golf carts/LSVs in The Villages MUST be registered with Public Safety. Carts registered for use on the golf course will carry the owner's house number in black numbers and carts registered for non-golf course use only, will carry the owner's house number in red numbers.

You may not place your own numbers on your golf cart. Black and red numbers will be ordered and affixed to all golf carts and LSVs by Public Safety.

Anyone that does not have Public Safety issued numbers on their golf cart is in violation of Club Rule 1.05 and the violation must be corrected immediately. Non-compliant golf carts will not be allowed on the golf course, and you may receive a citation!

See Club Rule 1.05 Golf Cart/LSV Registration, specifically black and red numbers will be ordered and affixed to all golf carts and LSVs by Public Safety.

Further, if you sell your cart and/or purchase a new or used one, it is your responsibility to notify Public Safety Administration in Building C. Public Safety Administration will reorder your house number for your new/used cart.

Club and Association Boards met for regularly scheduled July meetings

The Villages Association and Club Boards of Directors met Tuesday, July 29 for their regularly scheduled meetings in the Villages Clubhouse.

Numerous items of business were discussed and voted upon.

Association Financial Report

For the Month of June 2018

Revenue was \$1,900 unfavorable to the budget of \$618,000 for the month due to less than budgeted laundry concession income (timing).

Expenditures for the month were \$240,200 (33.8 percent) unfavorable to the budget of \$710,800. The most significant unfavorable to budget expense category was water, \$124,800 higher than the budget of \$230,200. Other notable unfavorable to budget expense categories were planting (\$79,600 vs. budget of \$10,500 due to timing as year-end landscape work takes place), repair and maintenance (\$38,900 vs. budget of \$20,000 mostly in Cribari, Montgomery, Hermosa and Del Lago), irrigation maintenance (\$20,900 vs. budget of \$7,500 due to timing as well) and insurance (\$99,700 vs. budget of \$92,900 – premium renewal increase in March). There were no significant favorable to budget expense categories in June.

Year-to-date (twelve months of operations), total revenue is \$1,500 favorable to the budget of \$7,399,300 due to higher than planned third party assessments and golf cart electricity/storage fee income, offset by less than planned laundry concession income. Year-to-date operating expenditures are \$7,869,000, coming in 5.4 percent higher than the budget of \$7,468,800. Water expense is unfavorable to budget by \$339,900 which is 22 percent higher than the annual budget of \$1,550,500. There are several contributing factors for the negative water budget variance: 1) additional water commitment needed to re-establish and rehabilitate (post-drought) 327 acres of shrubs throughout the Association, 2) dramatic and unexpected water meter rate increases effective July 2017 (which accounts for \$133,000 of the budget variance), 3) record hot summer of 2017, 4) lower than average winter rainfall and 5) residential water consumption is up 5 percent compared to the prior year. Other significant unfavorable year-to-date expenditure categories are repair and maintenance at \$42,000 more than the budget of \$239,700 (mostly Cribari, Montgomery, Hermosa, Verano, Del Lago and Valle Vista), insurance expense at \$27,300 more than planned (all districts due to premium increase in March) and pest control expense at \$12,800 (11.6 percent) more than the budget of \$110,600 (predominantly Cribari, Verano and Del Lago). Notable favorable to budget expense categories are irrigation maintenance at \$25,300 (19.2 percent) less than budget and planting expense at \$13,100 (5 percent) less than budget.

Club Financial Report

For the Month of June 2018

Total revenue was \$145,500 favorable to budget, 13.6 percent more than the budget of \$1,067,700. Food and Beverage combined for a favorable to budget posting of \$45,300 (vs. budget of \$215,500) for the month with strong Bistro and banquet revenue. Green fee revenue, Pro Shop merchandise sales and driving range income accounted for \$21,300 of the positive revenue variance for the month with robust member and guest play. Billable services revenue was up \$44,600 compared to budget due to timing. Gains on the sale of obsolete/unused equipment accounted for \$11,800 of the positive budget variance during June. Resident activities and lessons/classes were up \$7,000 compared to budget for the month. Villagers were busy attending events such as Jersey Boys, Golden Gate Fields, Giants games, Presidio Tour or participating in fitness classes (yoga, tai chi, circuit training and water fitness, etc.).

Total expenditures were \$120,100 unfavorable to budget, 10.8 percent more than the budget of \$1,112,300. Expenditure categories significantly unfavorable to budget were employee expense at \$79,500 higher than the budget of \$621,000 (annual vacation accrual adjustment accounts for \$36,200), repair and maintenance at \$18,100 higher than the budget of \$22,000 (Cribari Center, Pro Shop, Vineyard Center, Foothill Center, streets/sewer and billable service), professional fees at \$8,700 higher than the budget of \$14,000 (HR outsourcing) and legal fees at \$6,900 more than the budget of \$2,200. The most notable favorable expense category was electricity, \$25,900 favorable to the budget of \$33,400 (positive budget variance used to pay solar lease).

The net positive operating budget variance for the month was \$25,400. See table below.

Year-to-date revenue is \$510,000 favorable to budget, 4.1 percent higher than the budget of \$12,432,000. Year-to-date expenditures are \$456,000 (3.6 percent) unfavorable to the budget of \$12,528,000. The year-to-date net positive budget variance is \$54,000 (P&L). See table on next page for detail by department.

The bottom of the table on the next page shows the financial impact of the monthly solar lease payments and contribution to the balloon payment fund (to be paid in 2023) captured on the Club's balance sheet. The YTD total for these two items is \$218,000.

The above table shows G&A with the largest positive net variance of \$72,000 due to higher than budgeted revenue from HOA document sales, resale administration fees and annual rental unit administration fees along with savings in employee expense from outsourcing the Human Resources Director position. The Clubhouse/Restaurant has posted a \$68,000 positive net variance due to favorable to budget food/beverage sales and savings in electricity expense (due to solar), offset by higher than planned employee expense (pay equity adjustments). Golf Course/Pro Shop has produced a \$39,000 positive net variance with favorable

revenue from green fees, merchandise sales, driving range and golf cart rentals, offset by unfavorable water expense, tree trimming expense and electricity expense (pump station). "All Other" category has an \$84,000 negative net variance primarily due to higher than budgeted water expense and pest control expense (wild pigs). Public Safety is running a negative net variance of \$34,000 due to higher than planned employee expense (pay equity adjustments as a result of wage compression).

The Villages Association Rule #2.08 section 9, states, "The use of open-flame cooking devices (for example charcoal or LPG-fueled barbecues) on limited common areas such as decks, patios and balconies is restricted by California Fire Code Sections 308.3.1 and 308.3.1.1 and San Jose City Ordinance 28167. These provisions generally require that such devices be operated at a minimum distance of ten feet from any combustible construction.

Register beginning Monday, July 30, in the Community Resource Center, Building B. The cut-off for registration will be on Thursday, September 6, with the final count due to the Potomac at this time.

Get here early for this one! The world-famous Blue Angels will be performing this year and if you have never seen the flyover by the Blue Angels you truly don't know what you have missed. If you have witnessed their flyover, had goose bumps, your spine tingling and your heart racing... well I guess I don't have to tell you know how great they are, you already know!

The cost is \$201 per person and your ticket for the Potomac is tax deductible (retain your ticket for your 2018, \$75, tax return). Your donation is for a very good cause as it goes toward education and maintaining this historic vessel for events such as ours. Once aboard the USS Potomac we will enjoy a three-hour cruise on the Bay and an air show. We will enjoy sandwiches, fruit, chips, dessert, soft drinks, coffee, tea or bottled water, and there is a hosted wine bar aboard the Potomac.



We will arrive by 12:15 p.m. at Jack London Square where the Potomac is docked. Enjoy the Farmer's Market, shops, book store, antiques, novelty stores and much more. Any purchases made may be left at the Potomac's Visitor Center during our cruise and picked up prior to leaving that day (bring a pen to mark your bag.) We board the Potomac by 1:15 p.m. for the sail time of 1:30 p.m. for a three-hour cruise. The Potomac will be positioned underneath the Blue Angels' flight pattern for this awesome show.

The USS Potomac was originally built in 1934 as the Coast Guard cutter Electra, and converted to the presidential yacht in 1936 by President Franklin D. Roosevelt, who had her re-commissioned as a U.S. Navy vessel. After the President's death in April 1945, the USS Potomac began a long and ignominious decline from her former role in world affairs. Falling into private hands and later seized in San Francisco Bay as a front for a drug-smuggling operation in 1980, the proud vessel's hull was pierced and she sank at Treasure Island. She was re-floated by the Navy two weeks later and sold by the U.S. Customs to the only bidder, the Port of Oakland, for just \$15,000. The Port of Oakland then spearheaded a cooperative effort with organized labor, maritime corporations and dedicated volunteers to complete a \$5 million restoration. The Association for the Preservation of the Presidential Yacht Potomac now operates this National Historic Landmark as an active memorial to Franklin Delano Roosevelt.

Inquisitive minds welcome at Astronomy Club


All inquisitive minds are welcome at the next Astronomy Club meeting on Tuesday, August 7, at 7:30 p.m. at Foothill Center.

Everyone needs an Advance Health Care Directive. An unexpected accident, severe illness or old age could prevent you from selecting your own healthcare treatment. Without a legal record of your preference, the choice of your treatment could be put in the hands of distant family members or unsympathetic doctors. Without an Advance Health Care Directive your doctors and other medical providers will have no idea how you want to be treated. With an Advance Heath Care Directive you can ensure that your treatment wishes are honored.

This workshop not only addresses creating an Advance Health Care Directive, but in addition if you already have a directive, you can bring it to the workshop for updating.

Tips for your next trip to the DMV

The SRS article about the California REAL ID driver license has produced many questions and comments. That article was published in the May 3 *Villager* on page 4. It's is still available online on The Villages website.

Remember this date—October 1, 2020. Beginning that date, a traditional driver license will not be acceptable to use as identification to board a domestic flight or to enter military bases and most federal facilities.

To board a flight, you will need a California REAL ID driver license or a valid U.S. passport, passport card, military ID or a Transportation Safety Administration (TSA) approved identification.

At your next driver license renewal date, if you are required to take the written test, we recommend you get a REAL ID. The cost is the same. The only difference for you at that time is you must bring certain documents to prove three things: who you are, your Social Security number and your California address.

The worst part of getting the REAL ID is to brave the DMV office. We are all hearing about six or seven hours spent at the DMV even when you have an appointment. Below are a few suggested tips for your DMV visit.

Don't go if you don't have to. If you don't need or want a REAL ID and you have the option to renew online or by mail, do it.

Calendar the date to make an appointment. You can make a DMV appointment up to 90 days in advance. The DMV sends license renewal notices about 60 days before the expiration date. Make the appointment as soon as you can rather than wait.

Include DMV in your vacation. Going to be headed up to northern California? Consider an appointment in Yuba City or Willows rather than the Bay Area.

Bring the proper paper work. On the DMV website is a detailed checklist of what you need to bring to your appointment for a REAL ID. Go to www.dmv.ca.gov and enter "REAL ID checklist" in the search box.

Don't rely on paying your fee with a credit card. DMV offices accept cash, check, money order and ATM/debit cards for payment of fees. They do not accept credit cards.

Bring sustenance. Officially the DMV doesn't allow food in its offices, but you might be there for six or seven hours. Pack some water and a power bar or two.

Bring entertainment. Don't forget your phone, iPad, book or newspaper.

Keep calm. No one is happy about the current DMV mess but taking your anger out on an employee will not help your situation.

The SRS office has a one-page handout from the DMV explaining whether you need a REAL ID and how to obtain one.

Note: The Senior Resource Services (SRS) office hours for drop-in assistance are Monday, Wednesday and Friday from 10 a.m. to noon. The SRS office is in the Cribari Center across from the Post Office. You may also leave a message at 408-239-5253. The purpose of SRS is to provide education and general business and financial information. All assistance is free and confidential. You should ask your professional adviser about your individual situation.

SRS Reminder:

Earthquake insurance

We have received questions from Villagers because their insurance agent recently sent them a notice about earthquake insurance. The Villagers presumed there is a major change in The Villages insurance causing their agent to contact them.

The Villages earthquake insurance has not changed. California law requires insurers to offer earthquake coverage to policy holders when a new policy is purchased and to offer it again every other year upon their policy renewal. What these Villagers received was simply the biannual information required by law.

SRS has a detailed memo explaining earthquake coverage in The Villages. You may also request a consultation with an insurance volunteer. Of course, you make the final decision on whether any parts of earthquake insurance are right for you.

Golf Course Trees—We have started the process of trimming some of the more top-heavy Eucalyptus trees on the golf course. We are currently trimming two trees on the right side of hole #8 and one tree on the left side of hole #9. This process of identifying trees that need trimming and then trimming them will continue throughout the summer and fall. Please stay safe when golfing near these areas. The trees will be coned off so if your ball comes to rest in or near one of these areas, please be safe and play from the nearest safe place with no penalty.

Golf Course Lakes—We hope you have noticed and will enjoy the re-activation of the fountain on the lake on hole #1. It will add some nice aesthetics to that lake, plus it will keep the surface rippling so that algae is less apt to form. Throughout the next year, we will be installing fountains on every stagnant lake on the golf course to create a consistent look throughout the golf course, and to upgrade the overall look and appeal of our golf course lakes. Although the irrigation lake on holes #6 & #7 is a continual challenge, we are making progress through continual applications of biologicals and scraping the surface algae bloom. We do plan to add more subsurface bubblers as well as two fountains to that lake to help abate the algae. Our long-term goals are to enhance the visual look of each lake on the golf course and to rid them of unsightly algae through several different year-round strategies.

Tips from the Pro—Dance with the girl that brought ya...

Is it possible to hit every golf shot straight? Obviously the answer is no. So which way does your ball normally curve? If you play a left to right shot, embrace it and set yourself up on the right side of the tee box and aim a bit left, and let it go left to right. Conversely, if you normally play a right to left shot, set yourself up on the left side of the tee box, aim a bit right and let go right to left. Once in the fairway, you have the opportunity to aim your shot left or right depending on your ball flight to get it on the green. Hitting fairways will result in hitting more greens, which will result in lower scores. So embrace the shot pattern you normally play and use it to your advantage. See you at the course!

Secondly, pieces can obstruct the flow of the bin contents, not allowing the container to empty fully into the truck. Wood should be recycled properly and not placed in the garbage bins.

Bring lumber or wood to the Corporation Yard dumpsters for a fee of \$25 per cubic yard.


Dealer has a Spade loser, a Diamond loser, and a loser in Clubs. Strategy: Take out trumps and set up Diamonds in order to get rid of the losers in the other suits.

West leads the Jack of Spades, South, the Ace, plays a Heart to the Queen of the board, continues with the King, overtakes it with the Ace, and plays the Jack of Hearts to collect the last Heart from the opponents. Now South has to make a decision on how to play the Diamonds low or high. If he leads King of Diamonds, he will notice that the 10 of Diamonds falls on the King, now it will be easier to finesse the next round of Hearts with the 9, still on the board, continues with the Ace, then lead the Jack, sluffing a Spade from his hand, and West takes the trick with the Queen or taking a chance and not play the King of Diamonds first. Instead lead a low card to the Jack on the board, then return to his hand covering the trick with the King, again finessing the 9 of Diamonds on the board, and finally playing the Ace of Diamonds to capture West's Queen. By this time South has sluffed a Spade on the fourth round of Diamonds, and still being on the board to run the last Diamond, sluffing a Club. Now all South has left are 3 trumps plus a Club that he will concede to East's Ace. This way allows South to make 6 Hearts even though he didn't bid slam. The other way playing the King of Diamonds first enables South to make only 5 and not taking such a big chance to have a finesse fail. It depends on the player to decide how much risk he will take to make overtricks.

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


