# Notice of Proposed Change to Association Policy <u>APr</u> 103-01 Board and Member Meetings – Study Sessions

The following proposed change to The Villages Association Board of Directors Policy APr 103-01 Board and Member Meetings – Study Sessions was conditionally approved by the Association Board of Directors at its July 31, 2018, monthly meeting. However, before formal approval consideration, the proposed change must be noticed and published 30 days as required by California Civil Code 4360. To that end, the proposed change will be considered for formal approval at the September 25, 2018, monthly meeting. The Board will consider oral and written comments regarding the proposed change at both the August and also the September monthly meetings. Response to the proposed policy changes may be made by one or more of the following methods: 1) Participation in the discussion of the proposed changes at the Association Board of Directors monthly meetings and 2) via written comments delivered to the Board through Maria Hernandez (mehernandez@the-villages.com) in the General Manager's office.

Deletions are noted in strikethrough font, additions are underlined, and the purpose of the change is in italics.

Purpose: The purpose of the change is to update the policy to reflect the current practice regarding study sessions.

#### **Study Sessions**

Regular monthly study sessions are generally held two Tuesdays before the formal board meeting. Exceptions to the meeting schedule are sometimes approved by the Board to avoid conflicts with holidays and scheduled events.

Study sessions will be called as needed.

A study session may be called by the President of the Association Board (Board) to discuss items of interest to the Board, Management or Members. In addition, two Board Members or the General Manager may request that the President call a study session. Upon that request, the President must call a study session within 14 days.

Except in the case of an emergency meeting or Executive Session meeting, notice of the time and place of a Board meeting including agenda items shall be posted at Cribari Center and via Fast Lane at least four (4) days in advance of the meeting and may also be posted on community television, and published in *The Villager*.

The purpose of the study session is to allow a topic to be studied by the Board in open session, prior to a formal decision being made at the monthly board meeting. Formal Board decisions will not normally be made at the study session, unless timing is such that a decision must be made. Rather, agenda items the Board deems appropriate will be brought back to the formal board meeting for consideration.

The President of the Board at his/her discretion shall conduct the meeting, dispensing with the normal formalities of the board meeting following the order of the agenda, which was published four days in advance of the study session. The President at his/her discretion may limit resident participation during the discussion of agenda items.

An opportunity will be provided for audience members to address the Board on any Association-related matter. The time allotted to each speaker will be determined by the Chair. The Chair has sole discretion to permit response to questions and opinions.

## Open Flames and Barbecues

As we are in the middle of BBQ season and enjoying the evenings on the patios, please keep the following in mind for your safety and the safety of others around you.

The Villages Association Rule #2.08 section 9, states, "The use of open-flame cooking devices (for example charcoal or LPG-fueled barbecues) on limited common areas such as decks, patios and balconies is restricted by California Fire Code Sections 308.3.1 and 308.3.1.1 and San Jose City Ordinance 28167. These provisions generally require that such devices be operated at a minimum distance of ten feet from any combustible construction.

# Golf Cart Reminders

All golf carts/LSVs in The Villages MUST be registered with Public Safety. Carts registered for use on the golf course will carry the owner's house number in black numbers and carts registered for non-golf course use only, will carry the owner's house number in red numbers.

You may not place your own numbers on your golf cart. Black and red numbers will be ordered and affixed to all golf carts and LSVs by Public Safety.

Anyone that does not have Public Safety issued numbers on their golf cart is in violation of Club Rule 1.05 and the violation must be corrected immediately. Non-compliant golf carts will not be allowed on the golf course, and you may receive a citation!

See Club Rule 1.05 Golf Cart/LSV Registration, specifically black and red numbers will be

ordered and affixed to all golf carts and LSVs by Public Safety.

Further, if you sell your cart and/or purchase a new or used one, it is your responsibility to notify Public Safety Administration in Building C. Public Safety Administration will reorder your house number for your new/used cart.

## Grandsons inherit Roth IRA?

Question: I have a seven-figure Roth IRA which I have had for many years. My wife is deceased, and I am considering naming two of my very young grandsons as the beneficiaries. I have three questions.

1) Will each grandchild hold his share of the funds in his own individual Roth account?

Answer: Yes. Your Ruth account should be split into two separate accounts properly titled as inherited Roth IRAs. For example, John Villager (deceased 11/01/25) Roth IRA for the benefit of Joe Grandson, beneficiary. The split should be done as a direct transfer to two new accounts and must take place by December 31 of the year after your death. The grandsons could not transfer the funds to their own Roth even if they already had such accounts.

2) Must each grandson begin taking distributions from his inherited Roth?

Answer: Yes, each grandson must take a required distribution each year from the inherited Roth. The size of each annual withdrawal is based on the IRA Single Life Expectancy table found in the IRS Publication 590-B.

3) Are distributions taxable to them?

Answer: No. The annual withdrawals will be tax-free to your grandsons. Indeed, the grandsons could withdraw more than the required minimum each year and it will all be tax-free from their inherited Roth.

This leads SRS to a question for you.

SRS question: Both grandsons are inheriting at least \$500,000 from you. Do you truly want very young grandchildren inheriting a six-figure account to spend as they please? What will happen to the money when they are teenagers or young adults?

We suggest you consider naming a trust for each grandson's benefit. It must be a valid trust which complies with IRS requirements for IRAs. Your estate attorney can give ideas and guidance and, if you agree, draft documents.

Note: The Senior Resource Services (SRS) office hours for drop-in assistance are Monday, Wednesday and Friday from 10 a.m. to noon. The SRS office is in the Cribari Center across from the Post Office. You may also leave a message at 408-239-5253. The purpose of SRS is to provide education and general business and financial information. All assistance is free and confidential. You should ask your professional adviser about your individual situation.

#### **SRS Request:** Call back

HICAP (Sourcewise) folks are diligent and try their best to get back to you in response to your message or an email but due to a variety of reasons such as time off, illness, large volume of phone calls and emails and the limited manpower resource, sometimes your call or an email may fall through the crack and you may not receive a call back. On the other hand, these folks call you back, but you may not be near the phone and miss their callback. So regardless of the cause, when in doubt, call HICAP back on the issue of your concern. Please remember, most of the people who provide services are volunteers.



# HIKING CLUB SCHEDULE

Saturday, August 11: Amy Meier will lead an 8-mile perimeter hike at Point Lobos beginning at Hidden Beach. An alternate route is available for Ramblers. At 12:30 p.m. we will meet Docent Reg Henry at Whalers Cabin and Museum for a 0.75 mile narrated tour along the North Shore Trail to the Information Station. After the tour we will continue down the South Shore Trail back to the parking lot. Maximum elevation is 500 feet. Because of the distance from Villages and limited parking, we will meet at 7:45 a.m. at Cribari and leave at 8 a.m. sharp. Ramblers may elect to leave the Villages later, park on the road near the park entrance and meet at the Whalers Cabin at 11 a.m. for the docent tour. Round trip 154 miles.

Wednesday, August 15 (Rambler): Johanna Bakker (408-223-2190) will lead a hike along Coyote Creek, going South to fish ladder and beyond. Depending on the weather, we can continue to Metcalf Rd and return the same way. Hike distance is about 4 miles. To reach the beginning point of the hike and the parking area from the Villages, turn left on San Felipe, right on Farnsworth, left on Silver Creek Valley Rd, left on Hellyer, right on Silicon Valley, immediately after crossing the bridge turn right on Eden Park. Park on the road next to the trail. Bring water and a snack. We will meet at the Cribari Center at 8:30 a.m. for an 8:45 departure. Saturday, August 18: Rich Bainbridge (408-499-1789) will lead a hike up our hill, meeting at the circle at the top of Village View Dr. This hike will be mostly in the shade including Meadow, Thistle, Bay, Buffalo, Oak and Skyway trails. Bring water and a snack. Meeting time is 8:30 for an 8:45 departure.

Wednesday, August 22 (Rambler): Sy Gelman (408-532-1239) will lead a hike on the Los Alamitos Trail. 

We will arrive by 12:15 p.m. at Jack London Square where the Potomac is docked. Enjoy the Farmer's Market, shops, book store, antiques, novelty stores and much more. Any purchases made may be left at the Potomac's Visitor Center during our cruise and picked up prior to leaving that day (bring a pen to mark your bag.) We board the Potomac by 1:15 p.m. for the sail time of 1:30 p.m. for a three-hour cruise. The Potomac will be positioned underneath the Blue Angels' flight pattern for this awesome show.

The USS Potomac was originally built in 1934 as the Coast Guard cutter Electra, and converted to the presidential yacht in 1936 by President Franklin D. Roosevelt, who had her re-commissioned as a U.S. Navy vessel. After the President's death in April 1945, the USS Potomac began a long and ignominious decline from her former role in world affairs. Falling into private hands and later seized in San Francisco Bay as a front for a drug-smuggling operation in 1980, the proud vessel's hull was pierced and she sank at Treasure Island. She was re-floated by the Navy two weeks later and sold by the U.S. Customs to the only bidder, the Port of Oakland, for just \$15,000. The Port of Oakland then spearheaded a cooperative effort with organized labor, maritime corporations and dedicated volunteers to complete a \$5 million restoration. The Association for the Preservation of the Presidential Yacht Potomac now operates this National Historic Landmark as an active memorial to Franklin Delano Roosevelt.

Without an Advance Health Care Directive your doctors and other medical providers will have no idea how you want to be treated. With an Advance Heath Care Directive you can ensure that your treatment wishes are honored.

This workshop not only addresses creating an Advance Health Care Directive, but in addition if you already have a directive, you can bring it to the workshop for updating.



Golf Course Trees - We have started the process of trimming some of the more top-heavy Eucalyptus trees on the golf course. This process of identifying trees that need trimming and then trimming them will continue throughout the summer and fall. Please stay safe when golfing near these areas. The trees will be coned off so if your ball comes to rest in or near one of these areas, please be careful and play from the nearest equitable place with no penalty.

Golf Course Lakes—We hope you have noticed and will enjoy the re-activation of the fountain on the lake on hole #1. It will add some nice aesthetics to that lake, plus it will keep the surface rippling so that algae is less apt to form. Throughout the next year, we will be installing fountains on every stagnant lake on the golf course to create a consistent look throughout the golf course, and to upgrade the overall look and appeal of our golf course lakes. Although the irrigation lake on holes #6 & #7 is a continual challenge, we are making progress through continual applications of biologicals and scraping the surface algae bloom. We do plan to add more subsurface bubblers as well as multiple fountains to that lake to help abate the algae. Our long-term goals are to enhance the visual look of each lake on the golf course and to rid them of unsightly algae through several different year-round strategies.

The answer is yes...Can you buy more distance...the answer is yes.

Highly forgiving, supersize drivers used to pay a penalty for slightly higher spin, but that compromise no longer exists. These new drivers give you higher launch with less ball spin, which means more carry and overall distance.

How much farther will one of these new drivers get you today compared to four or five years ago?

Golf Digest's robot testing at Golf Laboratories showed that at average golfer swing speeds, there's a gain of six yards on center hits, nine yards on heel and toe mis-hits, and 11 yards on low-face impacts. At the extremes, we saw some new drivers that were nearly 10 yards longer for on-center hits and 13 yards longer on off-center hits than older models.

Does that 10-13 yards make a difference... Yes it's a 1-2 club difference on your approach shots which means more greens in regulation. So if you are hitting clubs that are more than 5 years old, it's time to look at some newer and better performing equipment. As a testimonial...I recently changed from a PING G driver (4 years old) to a PING G400 driver with the same shaft; and I changed from a ProV1x to a Taylor Made TP5x; and I literally gained 10-15 yards off the tee...and I know my swing speed is not increasing as I get older! West leads the 7 of Clubs, East, the Jack, South, the Ace, switches to the Ace of Diamonds, and then a low Club to the Queen on the board. He then plays the King and Queen of Diamonds, leads a Club to the King in his hand, continues with the 8. He now leads the King and Queen of Spades, follows with the last Spade in his hand to the Ace on the board, next the 9 and then has to lead a Heart, which West takes with Ace and plays his last card, the good Jack of Diamonds. Great! The contract is made with 2 overtricks. By the way, 4 Hearts could be made if South doesn't play any trumps and takes 3 Spades, 3 Diamonds, 3 Clubs and finally gets a trick in Hearts because he has 5 of them.

\* South doesn't like his Heart suit; he feels he and his partner can take some Spade tricks and hopes his partner has some Diamond tricks and bids game in NoTrump. As it turns out NoTrump is easier to make and acquires more points at the five level.



## Some tips for choosing a contractor or service provider

Choosing the right contractor to do work in your home or a company to install appliances, heating/air conditioning or other "big ticket" items can be a challenging and exhausting ordeal if you are not experienced with the process. Here are a few suggestions for selecting contractors and/or service providers.

• If you already know a reputable company, you are in an excellent position to begin. If you don't you may have to rely upon relatives and friends to recommend companies that have provided them good service and products. (Have a trusted friend or relative sit in on the process if you are feeling insecure.)

Many types of businesses have professional associations with web sites where you can access directories of reputable service providers.

• It is a good idea to get estimates from at least three companies, so you can get a good idea of the price of the work or equipment. Shop around online or by making some informational calls before you set out to get a quote.

• If you need a work estimate, do not give your business to a company that only offers estimates over the phone without ever looking at the actual job or installation site.

Know what you want, don't let the bidder take charge—unless you are confident of his or her judgement.
A well-trained, industry-current contractor will generally not try to discourage you from purchasing high-efficiency equipment. Less qualified companies may discourage you from considering new and better equipment.
A good estimator will do a survey of your home and base the proposal on your specific situation. Be

cautious of those who pressure you to accept a "one size fits all" solution.

• A good company will give you a written bid (or proposal) outlining the work to be done and the equipment to be installed, and the price—including all labor costs.

• If installing equipment such as a furnace/air conditioner or other large-ticket appliances, ask for figures

on annual operating costs (energy bills).

• When you get multiple bids, the lowest price is not necessarily the best one—try to evaluate the value of the service or equipment. Be skeptical of extremely low bids, because they may conceal some costs or the bidder may be trying to unload outdated or unreliable equipment.

• Reliable contractors are professional. They are generally prompt, courteous and respectful. Their behavior in dealing with you will probably reflect how they will act when a problem arises or when service is required.

• Most reputable business have a permanent office and a specific address. Be careful with Post Office boxes or businesses in other states. An office location means that the company has been in business and intends to remain selling goods or offering services.

• High-pressure tactics such as asking you to make a snap decision and intimidating behavior such as threatening language or repeatedly demanding your credit card number may be red flags and require you to cut off the discussion. Remember, you are the customer and have the ultimate option of closing negotiations.

• Also, beware of door-to-door canvassers who want immediate access to your residence and criminals disguised as repairmen or representatives of companies. Ask for identification and phone numbers to verify their presence—if they really want your business they can schedule an appointment with you at a later time.

• In emergency situations, such as plumbing or heating or cooling failures, remain calm, request the aide of a neighbor or friend and find a solution to your problem using common sense by not giving in to panic.


