News from the Technology Advisory Committee WOW! Are You Ready?

On July 23, we had our first, very successful, Welcome to Our Website (WOW) event highlighting the Villages new Resident Portal on the website, and a second event is on the way!

Over 50 people attended the first event as Tim Sutherland, our General Manager, described the new features of the Villages web site. We then had breakout sessions to review and get hands-on practice with different services available from the website. The breakout sessions also provided one-on-one help from staffers and facilitator for those who wanted extra help.

All of the feedback from the first event was very positive. Molly Jackson reported "I thought it was a very worthwhile event and I learned a lot, especially because of the one-on-one help. I now can do work orders online."

On Monday morning, September 10, from 10 a.m. to noon in the Clubhouse, the Villages Technology Advisory Committee (TAC) and Villages Management will co-sponsor our next "Welcome to Our Website" (WOW) event. Fellow residents will provide demonstrations and clear take-home instructions to teach you everything you need to know about how to use these Villages self-service apps. Bring your laptop or smartphone, although it's not necessary to bring a device.

Thanks to the work of staffer Ken Patterson, the Resident Portal has gone through a number of positive changes over the last year including the addition of a growing number of self-service applications that allow you, the resident, to communicate with Villages services easily and effectively. You can now go online to make a Clubhouse restaurant reservation, pay your HOA dues, place a work order, or notify the Public Safety gatehouse of incoming visitors. Interacting via the Web means no more waiting, no more long phone calls or email exchanges with staff, no more uncertainty about confirmations or replies.

General Manager Tim Sutherland is committed to adding additional self-serve applications to give you even more control and satisfaction in your dealings with Villages Management and Staff.

Club and Association Boards met for regularly scheduled August meetings

The Villages Association and Club Boards of Directors met Tuesday, August 28 for their regularly scheduled meetings in Foothill Center.

Numerous items of business were discussed and voted upon.

Association Financial Report

For the Month of July 2018

July Operating Statement Review:

Revenue was \$600 unfavorable to the budget of \$719,800 for the month due to less than budgeted laundry concession income.

Expenditures for the month were \$1,800 (0.2 percent) unfavorable to the budget of \$838,800. Most expense lines were close to budget for the first month of the fiscal year. Irrigation maintenance was \$3,400 favorable to budget due to timing. Trash expense was \$2,400 favorable to budget. The City of San Jose approved a rate increase of 2 percent for trash collection effective July 1, while the budget assumed a 5 percent increase. The budget amount of \$311,740 for July water expense was accrued since water bills are received bi-monthly. Planting expense and repair and maintenance were each \$2,000 unfavorable to budget.

For the first month of the fiscal year, the net positive budget variance is \$1,200.

Club Financial Report

For the Month of July 2018

July Operating Statement Review:

Total revenue was \$12,100 unfavorable to budget, 1 percent less than the budget of \$1,178,300. Total food and beverage sales exceeded the budget by \$27,100 (11.1 percent higher than the budget of \$243,300) with healthy Bistro and banquet revenue. Nearly all golf-related revenue (except golf cart fees) performed below budget. Green fee revenue, Pro Shop merchandise sales, driving range income and golf cart rentals totaled for a \$26,300 negative budget variance for the month. July was warm and humid which has a negative impact on golf play. On the positive side, advertising income was \$4,100 (or 25.6 percent) higher than planned as well as lessons/classes at \$3,600 more than the budget of \$3,000. Besides golf, other significant negative budget variances were resident activities income and billable services revenue, both due to timing.

Total expenditures were \$56,400 favorable to budget, 4.7 percent less than

the budget of \$1,198,100. Expenditure categories significantly favorable to budget were electricity expense (\$11,500 vs. budget of \$21,900), printing expense (\$6,400 vs. budget of \$14,500) due to timing of the Resource Guide printing and employee expense (\$7,700 less than the budget of \$673,600) due to employee vacancies in several departments. Tree trimming on the golf course was the only significantly unfavorable budget variance for the month, although most of the \$10,200 variance is from work completed in June and will be reclassified to the prior fiscal year during the audit process.

For the first month of the fiscal year, the net positive budget variance is \$44,300. See table below.

PUBLIC SAFETY

Service Animal vs Comfort Animal

Service Animals as defined by Title II and Title III of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA). Service animal is individually trained to do work or perform tasks for the benefit on an individual with a disability, including physical, sensory, psychiatric, intellectual, or other mental disability. These tasks may include, pulling a wheelchair, picking up dropped items, reminding a person to take medication, or alerting a person of a sound.

Service animals are allowed to accompany the handler to any place where members of the public are allowed, even if the facility has a "No Pets" policy.

When it is not obvious what service an animal provides, only limited inquiries are allowed. Staff may ask two questions: 1.) Is the animal required because of a disability? 2.) What work or task has the animal been trained to perform?

Emotional support animals are not covered under ADA. A doctor's note does not make an emotional support animal a service animal.

Open Flames and Barbecues

As we are in the middle of BBQ season and enjoying the evenings on the patios, please keep the following in mind for your safety and the safety of others around you.

The Villages Association Rule #2.08 section 9, states, "The use of open-flame cooking devices (for example charcoal or LPG-fueled barbecues) on limited common areas such as decks, patios and balconies is restricted by California Fire Code Sections 308.3.1 and 308.3.1.1 and San Jose City Ordinance 28167. These provisions generally require that such devices be operated at a minimum distance of ten feet from any combustible construction.

The table on page 4 shows Community Activities with the largest positive net variance of \$17,000 due to less than budgeted employee expense and printing expense (timing). The Clubhouse/Restaurant has posted a \$14,000 positive net variance due to favorable to budget food/beverage sales offset by higher than planned employee expense. The \$12,000 positive net variance for the community centers was due to favorable utilities expense, repair and maintenance and intra-co cost transfers. Public Safety had a net positive variance of \$10,000 mostly due to less than planned employee expense. Golf Course/Pro Shop has produced a \$20,000 negative net variance with unfavorable revenue from green fees, merchandise sales, driving range and golf cart rentals, offset by favorable cost of sales, chemicals and electricity expense.

Homeowners' Financial Report

For the Month of July 2018

July Operating Statement:

Revenue tracked budget at \$3,263 (non-Estates single family homes). Expenditures for the month were \$112 favorable to budget due to less than planned legal fees of \$112. For the first month of the fiscal year, the net positive budget variance is \$110.

Estates revenue for the month was on budget at \$12,319. Expenditures were \$1,210 unfavorable to budget, 7.7 percent higher than the budget of \$15,639 due to the timing of planting expense (\$1,277 vs. budget of \$0). For the first month of the fiscal year, the net negative budget variance is \$1,209.

The Social Security Full Retirement Age (FRA) is increasing for new retirees. Seniors born between 1943 and 1954 need to be age 66 to qualify for their full social security benefit. In 2017 the FRA increased to 66 years, 2 months for those born in 1955. Now in 2018 it is 66 years, 4 months. And a two-month increase will continue each successive year, until 67 years is the FRA for those born in 1960 or later

Many workers ignore the fact that the age they claim Social Security impacts the maximum amount they receive each month in benefits. If you want to receive your full benefit, you need to wait until your full retirement age to make that claim.

The earliest age you're allowed to collect Social Security is 62 but claiming early comes at a cost. If you take benefits before reaching your full retirement age, you'll lose 6.67 percent of your full benefit amount for up to three years and then 5 percent a year thereafter. Consequently, if your full retirement age is 66 and you claim benefits at 62, you'll reduce your payments by 25 percent. Once the full retirement age increases to 67, those who start payments at age 62 will get 30 percent smaller payments.

On the other hand, if you delay Social Security past your full retirement age, you'll raise your benefits by 8 percent each year

On the other hand, if you delay Social Security past your full retirement age, you'll raise your benefits by 8 percent each year up until age 70, at which point the incentive to hold off runs out. Thus, if your full retirement age is 66 and you wait until 70 to take Social Security, you'll increase your payments by 32 percent.

Keep in mind that whatever benefit amount you first lock in will be the payment amount you receive for life. If you're eligible for a full benefit of \$1,500 a month at age 66 but claim Social Security at 62 to get your hands on that money sooner, you'll reduce your benefit to \$1,125, and, other than inflation index adjustments, that's all you'll collect each month from that point on. Your benefit won't go back up once you reach your full retirement age.

Because waiting until your full retirement age can help you maximize your Social Security payments, it's important to be aware of when you should be claiming benefits. The following table shows what your full retirement age will be based on the year you were born:

Year of Birth	n Full Retirement Age
1943-1954	66
1955	66 and 2 months
1956	66 and 4 months
1957	66 and 6 months
1958	66 and 8 months
1959	66 and 10 months
1960	67

Vehicle Parking

Public Safety has received numerous inquiries regarding residents parking in common parking areas. Per Villages Association Rule 2.17, "No vehicle that is incapable of being parked within the entire boundary of the garage, carport or driveway may be parked within the Condominium Development." This applies for all resident vehicles.

House Keys

The Villages Association Rule #2.15, "Keys and Lock" requires, "Every resident must provide a villa key to Public Safety for the protection and convenience of occupants." If Public Safety does not have a key to your unit, we may have to break open the door or window. If this is the case, damage repair will be at the owner expense. Recently the Fire Department had to break open a door due to Public Safety not having a key to the unit. This is normally the last resort and. unfortunately, very costly.



We will arrive by 12:15 p.m. at Jack London Square where the Potomac is docked. Enjoy the Farmer's Market, shops, book store, antiques, novelty stores and much more. Any purchases made may be left at the Potomac's Visitor Center during our cruise and picked up prior to leaving that day (bring a pen to mark your bag.) We board the Potomac by 1:15 p.m. for the sail time of 1:30 p.m. for a three-hour cruise. The Potomac will be positioned underneath the Blue Angels' flight pattern for this awesome show.

The USS Potomac was originally built in 1934 as the Coast Guard cutter Electra, and converted to the presidential yacht in 1936 by President Franklin D. Roosevelt, who had her re-commissioned as a U.S. Navy vessel. After the President's death in April 1945, the USS Potomac began a long and ignominious decline from her former role in world affairs. Falling into private hands and later seized in San Francisco Bay as a front for a drug-smuggling operation in 1980, the proud vessel's hull was pierced and she sank at Treasure Island. She was re-floated by the Navy two weeks later and sold by the U.S. Customs to the only bidder, the Port of Oakland, for just \$15,000. The Port of Oakland then spearheaded a cooperative effort with organized labor, maritime corporations and dedicated volunteers to complete a \$5 million restoration. The Association for the Preservation of the Presidential Yacht Potomac now operates this National Historic Landmark as an active memorial to Franklin Delano Roosevelt.



Tiger Woods by Jeff benedict and Armen Keteyian: All you want to know about Tiger Woods and more. By tracing his life from its origin as a mixed-race son of an attention seeking father and the original Tiger Mom, who programmed him not only to change the world of golf but the world as well, the authors provide a wealth of new insights into the human being entrapped inside his parent's creation. Nonfiction, 920, biography, 2018.

The Future of Humanity by Michio Kaku: Another book by a university Professor and TV personality predicting that we are entering a new golden age of space exploration. He claims that robotics, nanotechnology and biotechnology may allow us to terraform (forming earth like colonies on otherwise uninhabitable planets). He then speculates that we may find earth like planets, many light years away, and finally claims that nanoships, laser sails and fusion rockets may make interstellar travel possible. Does he first want to shrink us down to nano size? If we are nanosized, we may as well stay on earth as there will be lots of space for all of us. This book is more science fiction than space science, but may be a good read nevertheless. Nonfiction?, 500.5, Space Sciences, 2018.

Facts and Fears by James Clapper: James Clapper started his government career as a marine reservist and eventually became a 3-star air force general in charge of the Defense Intelligence Agency. After retiring in 1995, his career was resurrected just three days after 9/11 serving in various intelligence positions under both the Bush and Obama administration, ending up as Obama's Director of National Intelligence. This wide-ranging book not only describes what went on during his watch, such as the Snowden and Wikileaks affair, but also considers such controversial questions as: Is intelligence ethical?, what are the limits of what intelligence is allowed to do?, how can intelligence agents stay impartial? Nonfiction, 352.3, Executive Management, 2018.

The Woman in The Water by Charles Finch: This is an old-fashioned mystery novel in the tradition of Sherlock Holmes, appropriately set in 1850. An anonymous writer sends a letter to a paper claiming to have committed the perfect crime. The body of a young woman is found in a trunk, caught up in the rushes of a small island in the Thames River. A young, unproven detective, Lenox, is convinced that this is the chance to prove himself. Will he succeed before too many other victims are discovered? Mystery, 2018.

The Family Gathering by Robin Carr: The author has written more than 50 novels. Here is another one, trying to capture the emotionally charged, complex dynamics that come with being part of a large family. The story is set in Sullivan's Crossing, a location well known by Robin Carr's fans. Dakota Jones returns to Sullivan's Crossing after serving in the military. Things quickly get complicated. He is on the radar of every single woman in town. Unfortunately, he is mostly attracted to a woman who is not interested. I leave it to the reader to find out how it all ends up. Fiction, 2018.

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

When you grow up in a large family with a mother, brothers, and sisters who seldom backed down from the threats of others, it can cause a young child to take advantage because the family had their back. Such was the way I grew up. I would intentionally press the older teenagers' buttons and speak badly about them because I knew I had backup. You could say that because of the reputation that my family's name carried, I felt entitled to act the way I did.

Have you ever felt entitlement because of your family, your citizenship, your ethnicity, your money, your religion or your politics? You see, entitlement can be a good thing if used with discretion and wisdom. If you made a purchase and there was a 30-day return policy for a refund, you can exercise your entitlement for the refund by following the rules. Sometimes people like to push the boundaries.

As a youth, I had no right to push around and bully others because of my family's reputation. One day, as a young adult, I was standing on the corner waiting for a bus to arrive, and as two young men were approaching me and I overheard one say, "That guy is a Hayden and his brothers were some tuff dudes!" They stopped and then one said to me, "Are you a Hayden"? I heard that your brothers were some tuff dudes." My response was "yes" and out of nowhere came a right hook to my jaw! I stood there stunned with no backup. My brothers had moved out of state and my sisters had retired from the fighting business.

My entitlement to stand on the reputation of my older siblings had expired because, like most things, it had a time limit. Today, I can say that I will always have a backup even regardless of deceased brothers and much older sisters. I understand and accept that I am part of an extended family and that I will always have backup. "Yet to all who did receive Him, to those who believed in His name, He gave the right to become children of God— 13 children born not of natural descent, nor of human decision or a husband's will, but born of God." John 1:12-13 NIV

Tips from the Pro—Tempo and Rhythm...There's no such thing as the perfect tempo. Ideally each of us should adopt a swing speed that is consistent with our overall temperament. Lanny Wadkins swings quickly, but Lanny does everything quickly. Ernie Els is a more deliberate person, and his swing is slow and smooth. So suit yourself—but whatever tempo you adopt, be sure that you keep it consistent throughout the round, meaning full swing, chipping and putting. And try not to speed up when the pressure is on. If you find yourself quickening, consciously slow things down—slow down your walk, your speech, your club selection. As for rhythm, there is an ideal, but it can't be described in print. It must be absorbed. The best thing to do is to spend several minutes watching the swings of players with great rhythm, guys like Ernie Els, Freddie Couples, Jimmie Walker or Annika Sorenstam. Then walk—don't run— to the course and try to mimic them. See you at the course!

He then leads the Queen of Spades, follows with the Jack and next the 7 of Spades. Meanwhile, South has played the 9 and 10 of Spades and captures the 7 with his good 8. He next leads the King of Diamonds, then the Ace of Clubs, follows with a Heart to the King on the board. Now he has two Clubs left, leads one of them, East wins with the King and plays his last card, the Queen of Clubs. Great! The contract is made exactly. Sometimes a contract doesn't seem possible unless there is a good break in a suit and that happens in this contract with East's singleton Queen of Diamonds.

Along the Way—a trip down Memory Lane

My friends all called me by my last name, as a kid growing up, and they all pronounced it correctly. In fact, they all thought it was a cool name. I knew the pronunciation wasn't necessarily obvious, because new teachers each year had about a 50 percent chance of guessing correctly. I would tell them "Zades - rhymes with spades," or "Zades - one syllable." I remember one substitute teacher who had fun calling me "Zades one syllable" all day. The other kids in class thought that was funny. One year

the PE teacher, who knew my name, still decided that the volley ball team on my side of the net would be called "Zadies Ladies." None of this bothered me. It seems I have always had the ability to laugh at myself and not take myself too seriously.

I was accustomed to recognizing when any authority figure was trying to get my attention... until Jump School in Fort Benning, Georgia, in May 1962. A sergeant with a heavy accent was taking roll call our first day, and I never heard my name. Evidently, he was yelling "Zandez," and I did not pick up on it. Each soldier, as his name was called, would receive a packet or something and move off somewhere. I was the last one standing there. It was like trying to find your car in the parking lot by waiting until everyone else drove away. The Sergeant looked right at my name tag on my fatigue shirt and said "Are you Zandez?" I started laughing—the worst thing I could have done. My ability to laugh at myself wasn't coming in handy just then. He thought I was laughing at him. OK, maybe I was. He had me running all sorts of errands and performing all sorts of menial tasks until Jump School really started in earnest the following Monday. But I didn't mind. I was 18 years old. I was immortal.




