Public Safety is offering a voluntary program to assist you in helping your loved one who may have a tendency to walk away.

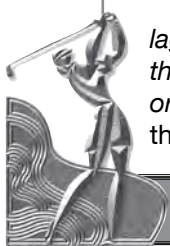
Public Safety will keep a photo and emergency contact information at the Plaza. This will help your Public Safety staff in identifying the individual and return him or her to you.

Association/Homeowners documents available via e-mail

Per an amendment to California Civil Code, homeowner associations are permitted, with owner's written consent, to distribute annual disclosures, (like the pro forma budget summary) and other specified association documents to owners via electronic mail, facsimile, or other electronic means (such as posting on the association's website) instead of sending those documents out by regular mail or personal delivery. This has the potential to provide cost savings to The Villages. Delivery and postage costs for the Villages' annual distribution of the pro forma budget summary alone are close to \$1,000, not to mention the paper and printing costs that run about \$8,000.

In order to transmit association documents via e-mail or by posting on the homeowners association's website, 1) the homeowners association must first receive the owner's written consent, and 2) the homeowners association sends a separate notice to the owner that the documents have been posted and are available for viewing.

Consent forms for owners to request delivery of documents have been developed for both The Villages Association and Homeowners Corporations. These forms provide an owner's consent to delivery electronically, of documents that are capable, under current laws, of being distributed electronically. Owners have the right to revoke this request and receive "hard copies" of the documents by sending a written revocation signed by the owner, to the applicable corporation.

Property tax postponement program

The State Property Tax Postponement (PTP) Program allows eligible homeowners to postpone payment of property taxes on a primary residence. The State Controller will begin accepting applications for the PTP Program beginning October 1, 2018.

To be eligible for PTP, you must:

- Be at least 62, or blind, or have a qualifying disability
- Own and occupy the home as your primary place of residence
- Have a total household income including Social Security of \$35,500 or less
- Not have a reserve mortgage on your residence **and**
- Have at least 40 percent equity in the property based on your January 1, 2018 assessment

Funding for the program is limited, and applications will be processed on a first-come, first-served basis with an estimate of 6 to 8 weeks processing time. Only current-year property taxes 2018-2019 are eligible for postponement. Past-due property taxes are not eligible.

If your application is approved and you have already paid your property taxes for the current year, or if the property taxes are paid by a lender, you will receive a refund from the county tax collector.

Repayment under the PTP Program becomes due when the homeowner:

- Moves from or sells the property
- Transfers title (e.g. to son or daughter)
- Defaults on a senior lien (i.e. mortgage)
- Refinances or obtains a reverse mortgage **or**
- Dies and does not have a spouse or registered domestic partner continue to reside in the property.

This program is intended for those individuals who may have difficulty paying their property tax when due. Realize of course that this is basically a loan which will have to be paid eventually by your estate with interest at 7 percent.

The application and instructions are a total of 18 pages. Also, there are many items you must include with the application.

What type of things will you need to copy and include?

- Proof of age (if not already submitted last year)
- Deed (if not already submitted last year)
- Recent mortgage statement
- 2017 income tax return or 2017 tax documents (form 1099, etc.)
- Trust agreement if personal residence owned by a Living Trust or other trust (if not submitted last year)
- 2018/2019 property tax bill

You may print an application from the State Controller's Office website. Go to www.sco.ca.gov and under Public Services click on Property Tax Postponement and then on Application. Alternatively, you may stop by the SRS office and a volunteer will print one for you.

Unfortunately, the 2018/2019 property tax bills have not yet been mailed by Santa Clara County. They are to be mailed by September 28, 2018. Also, they are to be available online on October 1.

The funding for this program is limited and is on a first-come first-served basis. We recommend that you complete the application and copy all the other required items before October 1. Then you can copy or print the tax bill on October 1 and be ready to mail your application.

Note: The Senior Resource Services (SRS) office hours for drop-in assistance are Monday, Wednesday and Friday from 10 a.m. to noon. The SRS office is in the Cribari Center across from the Post Office. You may also leave a message at 408-239-5253. The purpose of SRS is to provide education and general business and financial information. All assistance is free and confidential. You should ask your professional adviser about your individual situation.

Are you prepared?

When disaster strikes, it may be three or more days before assistance is available. EPC encourages you to read the information at the end of the Villages Phone Directory and in your red folder.

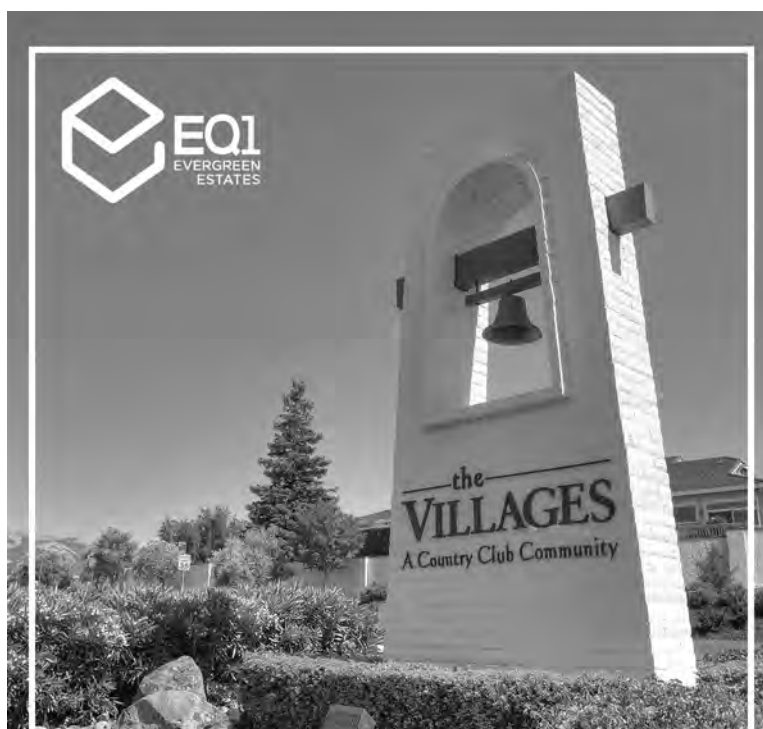
Estimated tax due September 17

If you file quarterly 1040-ES forms, the third payment of estimated tax is due Monday, September 17.

You can mail a check to the IRS in San Francisco. The check should be payable to the United States Treasury.

Rather than a check, you can use the online Direct Pay Service. Go to www.irs.gov and click on the box labeled "Pay" and then "Direct Pay." There is no fee to use the online Direct Pay service. There is a fee if you use a credit or debit card.

If you normally file a 540ES form, you will not have a September 15 payment. California wants its money sooner rather than later. Rather than paying 25 percent each quarter as you do to the IRS, California requires a payment of 30 percent on the first estimate, 40 percent on the second estimate, zero on the third estimate and the final 30 percent for the last payment.

Service Animal vs Comfort Animal

Service Animals as defined by Title II and Title III of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA). Service animal is individually trained to do work or perform tasks for the benefit of an individual with a disability, including physical, sensory, psychiatric, intellectual, or other mental disability. These tasks may include, pulling a wheelchair, picking up dropped items, reminding a person to take medication, or alerting a person of a sound.

Service animals are allowed to accompany the handler to any place where members of the public are allowed, even if the facility has a "No Pets" policy.

When it is not obvious what service an animal provides, only limited inquiries are allowed. Staff may ask two questions: 1.) Is the animal required because of a disability? 2.) What work or task has the animal been trained to perform?

Emotional support animals are not covered under ADA. A doctor's note does not make an emotional support animal a service animal.

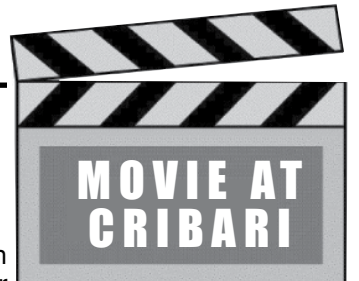

“By Invitation Only” by Dorothea Benton Frank: In the Lowcountry of South Carolina, Diane English Stiffler throws a barbecue to celebrate her son’s engagement. On this magical night the bride’s father, a wealthy power broker, discovers the limits of cell phone range, while the mother of the bride learns about moonshine and dangerous liaisons. Soon the story zooms to Chicago, where Diane encounters the antithesis of the bright lights and super-sophisticated guests while attending a second engagement party. These two very different worlds—of limousines and pickup trucks, caviar and pigs—feature characters who all have something to hide and a lot to learn. A headlong dive from grace and an abrupt twist reveal the truth of who they are, and demonstrates what kind of grit they have. Fiction 2018, large print.

“The Punishment She Deserves” by Elizabeth George: In the latest entry in the Lynley and Havers detective series, the cozy, bucolic town of Ludlow is stunned when one of its most respected citizens, the local deacon, is accused of a serious crime. Free afternoon of Opera, Wine and Cheese

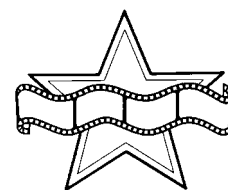

Dear, Oh Deer: News from the Deer Club

We continue to monitor both our established lower fence sites and two potential other sites. We monitor the potential sites to see how many deer are seen there and to look for untagged does that might be in that area. Furthermore we get a chance to see what predators, if any, are in that area. You can see all of the pictures from our cameras at our website, Sjdeer.com. We continue to be visited by one untagged doe who usually stays in the area of the stable and lower garden.



Thank you to all of the Villagers who watch for and record deer sightings and to those who call us whenever they have a concern about an animal. One such animal was a buck who had been living in Sonata and Del Lago for some weeks. He had a bad knee that grew increasingly large. Unfortunately he has not been seen for about three weeks. When an animal is hurt like that, there is nothing we can do for them but when appropriate call the California Fish and Game Department. Sadly they may make a one-time visit to see the animal and to treat it if they think it will help. Otherwise, the animal will be 'put down.' It's against the law for a private individual—even a veterinarian to treat a wild animal. All we can do is try to safeguard an injured animal in hopes that it will heal.

I am sad to say that during the last four to six weeks, doe #77 and #91 both died. Their deaths will certainly impact our Fall deer count that is scheduled for October 1, 3, 7, 8, 10. Noel Lanctot is in charge of the count and will be contacting potential counters.

Kent Webb, who works so hard for the Deer Club and who provided cameras, batteries and expert help has been on sabbatical and has written a paper on deer population in the U.S. He tells me that the deer population in the U.S. is 32 million and that 500,000 live in California (this figure is down from a peak of about 2 million in early 1960s).

You may have noticed that some of our bucks had developed unusual antlers. Accompanying this article is a picture of the most unusual one. We have read that this anomaly occurs as a result of injury to the pedicle during fights.

Riding Club: Did you know...?

· Horses have the largest eyes of any land mammal. Their eyes are about 9 times larger than that of a human. Their range of vision is 350 degrees with only two small blind spots, one directly in front and one directly behind them.



· While humans have only 3 ear muscles, horses have 10. This means they can move their ears 180 degrees and can single out a special area to listen to. They also use their ears to communicate with other horses.

· A horse's heart typically weighs between 9 or 10 pounds and is about the size of a basketball. A human heart weighs about 11 ounces and is about the size of a clenched fist.

· A horse's teeth take up more room in its head than its brain and they never stop growing. Male and female horses have a different number of teeth. Males have 44, while females have 36-40.

· Horses and adult humans each have about 206 bones. But unlike us, horses have a special locking mechanism in their legs that enables them to sleep standing up; and they sleep, on average, only 3 hours a day!

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

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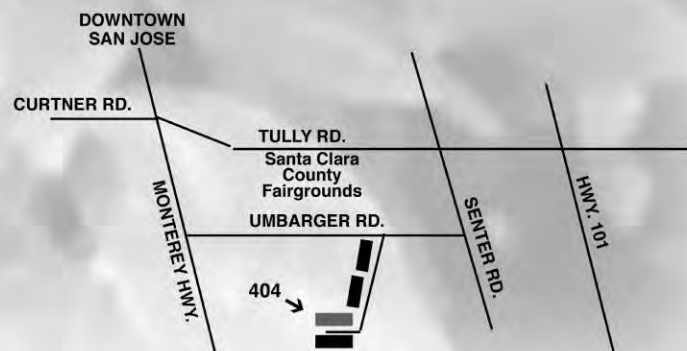

Tips from the Pro—Your Sand Wedge can be used for more than just bunker shots...

Lee Trevino popularized the usage of the sand wedge for putts back in the '70s. Nowadays, you can see almost every pro player uses the sand wedge putt. This can be a play quite intimidating for amateurs. In fact, there are very few amateurs that I've seen giving it a try. It's a shame since the sand wedge putt can definitely be a nice addition to anyone's arsenal. It is especially when your ball sits on the outer edge of the fringe and its back up against the rough. In this unique situation, you would often want to get the ball rolling at all costs, but yet the flat blade of your putter might have trouble gliding through any grass taller than the fringe. This is where the sharp and heavy club face of the sand wedge can fill the void. Here are some quick tips for "putting" with your wedge...

Keep your putting grip as usual. Hover the sand wedge about halfway up the ball. Use the leading edge of the sand wedge to strike the back of the ball. The ball will come off the sand wedge a bit faster than the putter so plan for that. This is where practice comes to play, but don't be afraid to try it. As you build your comfort with the sand wedge during these situations, you will find that you will eliminate a lot of risks when using the putter. See you at the course!

West leads the 3 of spades, low from the board, East, the 9, South wins with the Queen, continues with 4 of spades, West, the 10, and South, the Ace on the board. He plays a spade, South, the Jack, West takes the trick with the King. He then leads the Ace of Hearts, next plays a low heart, South covers with the King on the board, switches to a small diamond to the Queen in his hand. Now he leads the good 8 of spades, sluffs a club from the board, then leads a diamond to the dummy, and runs the rest of the diamonds. He then has one card left, a club, which he leads, and West covers with the Ace. Great, the contract is made with an extra trick.

* Remember when a responder has two four- card suits, he bids the lower one first, and if he has two five- card suits, he bids the higher one first.

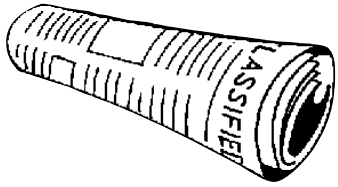
