Joe Simitian to speak at Clubhouse

Joe Simitian, President of Santa Clara County Board of Supervisors, will speak at the Clubhouse October 2. This Senior Academy event is free. Light desserts, coffee and tea will be served prior to the meeting beginning at 6:40 p.m.

Villagers attending will be treated to a talk delivered by a man who has also been elected and intensely involved in school board, mayoral, State Assembly, State Senate positions and authored many laws and received many honoring awards. He will speak at the Harrington Lecture at 7 p.m., Tuesday, October 2.



The title of Supervisor Simitian's talk is "Trump's America—Bridging the Divide." He made this talk (a sellout) at the California Commonwealth Club. Following Trump's election he traveled to three states, North Carolina, Pennsylvania and Michigan where he interviewed more than 100 people—most of whom had "flipped" to vote for Trump. The results of the interviews led to interesting conclusions, which will be reviewed.

There will be a question and answer period following the presentation and Joe will answer questions pertinent to Silicon Valley such as housing/homelessness, traffic, etc.

She won first and second prizes in her age group in various years. Classical ballerina Catherine Welsh returns to the stage with her stunning artistic interpretations.

In a humorous vein, the Inner Voices Ensemble sing "I Bought Me a Cat" adapted by Aaron Copland. Tenor Larry Miller stars in the role of the duck and Lucy Pousho debuts as the goose. For the traditional hymn "Simple Gifts" Tamara Welsh, accompanist for the Voices, and Nancy Miller accompany the ensemble with Nancy playing piano primo. Kellen Perry sings "Maybe This Time" from Cabaret.

Association/Homeowners documents available via e-mail

Per an amendment to California Civil Code, homeowner associations are permitted, with owner's written consent, to distribute annual disclosures, (like the pro forma budget summary) and other specified association documents to owners via electronic mail, facsimile, or other electronic means (such as posting on the association's website) instead of sending

those documents out by regular mail or personal delivery. This has the potential to provide cost savings to The Villages. Delivery and postage costs for the Villages' annual distribution of the pro forma budget summary alone are close to \$1,000, not to mention the paper and printing costs that run about \$8,000.

In order to transmit association documents via e-mail or by posting on the homeowners

association's website, 1) the homeowners association must first receive the owner's written consent, and 2) the homeowners association sends a separate notice to the owner that the documents have been posted and are available for viewing.

Consent forms for owners to request delivery of documents have been developed for both The Villages Association and Homeowners Corpora-

tions. These forms provide an owner's consent to delivery electronically, of documents that are capable, under current laws, of being distributed electronically. Owners have the right to revoke this request and receive "hard copies" of the documents by sending a written revocation signed by

the owner, to the applicable corporation.

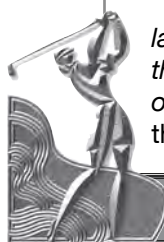

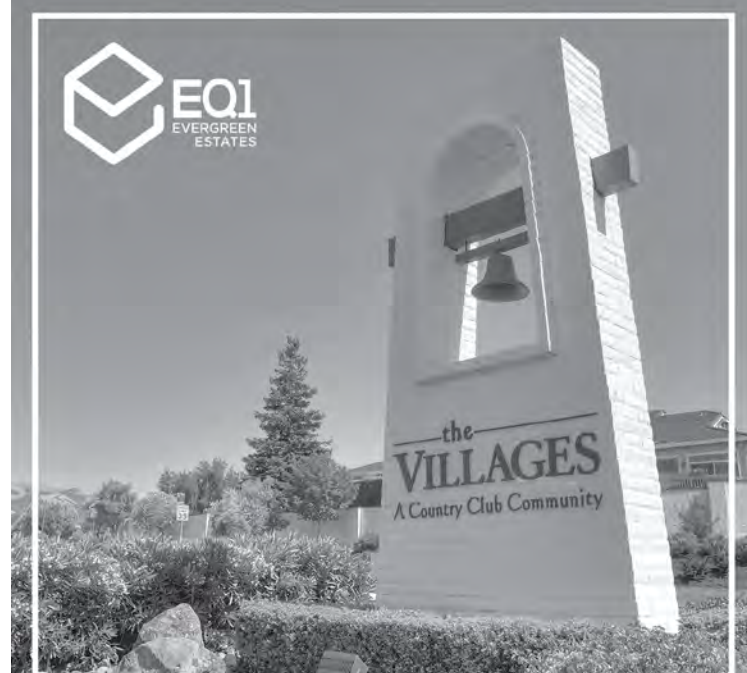

Durable power of attorney and living trusts

Neema's father-in-law (Papa) had a severe stroke. Papa, a widower, cannot speak or use either of his arms. Papa is being cared for in a skilled-nursing facility. The only legal document he has is a one-page will that leaves his estate equally to his three sons.

The utility bills are due on Papa's house. The convalescent hospital bills are no longer covered by Medicare and need paying. Papa has cash in a checking account and in certificates of deposit that should cover his expenses for several years. No one has any legal authority to access these funds.

Three months and \$8,000 in legal and court fees later, Neema's husband has been legally declared Papa's conservator. Neema is determined this will not happen to her widowed mother. She is also determined that it will not happen to her children if she and her husband are in a common accident. She and her mother have an appointment with an estate attorney to discuss such things as durable power of attorney designations and living trusts. Are you like Neema's father-in-law? Who will manage your resources if you become incapacitated?

SRS has a list of attorneys

who specialize in estate and trusts. Several are Villagers or live in this area and are willing to make house calls. Stop by the office for a list or call the SRS number and ask for the list to be e-mailed to you.

The SRS office is in the Cribari Center across from the Post Office. You may also leave a message at 408-239-5253. Your room keys, buffet tickets and show tickets will be handed out upon arrival at the hotel. You will be asked to remain on bus while the keys and tickets are procured.

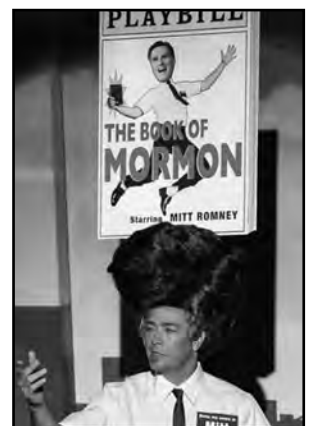
Cardio Workout—October through December

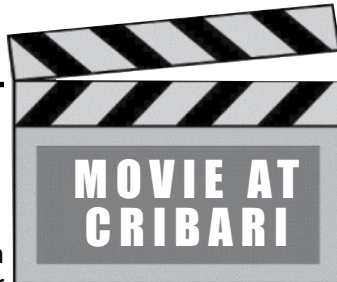

Hiking Club: 'Arctic Ocean Rowing Adventure'

On Monday, September 24 at 7:30 p.m. the Villages Hiking Club will present as their special presentation adventurer Carlo Facchino. Carlo was born and raised in San Jose. He was introduced to the sport of rowing as a freshman at the University of California Davis. In 2016 he competed in the Great Pacific Race as part of Team Uniting Nations. Carlo and his three crew mates set the Guinness Book of World Records for the fastest Pacific Ocean crossing from Monterey to Honolulu. As part of the 2017 Polar Row crew, Carlo and his teammates set numerous Ocean Rowing World Records and achieved the northernmost latitude ever reached by a rowing boat. Carlo will be talking about his adventure during the summer of 2017 when he along with the crew of the Polar Row set out from Tromsø, Norway and headed north into the Arctic Ocean. They were the first ever recorded to row from Norway to the Arctic Ocean archipelago known as Svalbard. Along the way the crew encountered killer whales, walrus, whales, dolphins and lots of cold water. The crew had to navigate through dangerous ice drifts and battle Arctic storms.

"To the Moon and Back" by Karen Kingsbury: A brand-new love story in the Baxter Family collection. Brady Bradshaw was a child when the Oklahoma City bombing killed his mother. Every year, Brady visits the memorial site on the anniversary to remember her. Years ago, he met Jenna Phillips, who was also a child when her parents were killed in the attack, and they shared a single beautiful day. But after that, Brady never saw Jenna again. Still every year he leaves a note for her. This year Ashley Baxter Blake and her family take a vacation trip that includes a visit to the memorial site. By chance Ashley meets Brady and determines to help him find Jenna. Deeply emotional and beautifully romantic, this is an unlikely love story about healing, redemption, and hope. Fiction 2018.

"The Third Victim" by Phillip Margolin: Rural Oregon. A woman stumbles onto a road; she tells a horrific tale of being tortured, battered, and bound. She's the lucky one—two other women, with similar burns and bruises, are found dead. Evidence found at the scene, Alex Mason's summer home, is damning. The prominent local attorney insists upon his innocence but his wife gives evidence about his sexual sadism. Criminal defense attorney Regina Barrister agrees to take on the case. The only clue is a patient named Susie Banks, who seems to be suffering from the same baffling condition. Hospitalized after an attempt on her life, Susie's jeopardy escalates as Cam's condition takes on a terrifying new dimension. Mystery 2018.

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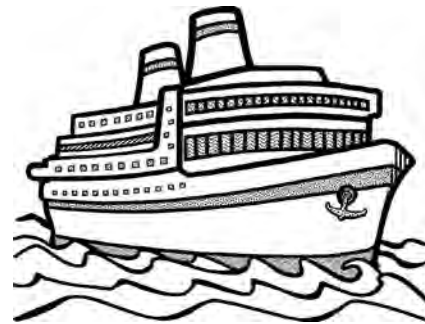

Louis Allamandola to speak at SIR Oktoberfest



SIR 114 and SIR 38 will hold their annual Oktoberfest luncheon Tuesday, October 9, in the Clubhouse. Lunch will feature Oktoberfest favorites Beer and Bratwurst.

The luncheon speaker will be Dr. Louis Allamandola from NASA's Ames Research Center who will speak on "What's Between The Stars And Why It Matters: from Astrochemistry to Astrobiology and Exoplanets." Lou is an internationally recognized science leader. He founded the Astrophysics and Astrochemistry Laboratory at NASA Ames Mountain View and has over 35 years of experience in pioneering laboratory and astrochemical studies focusing on organic materials and ices in deep space and the Solar System.

After majoring in Chemistry at St. Peter's College in New Jersey, Lou was trained in low temperature chemistry and spectroscopy at the University California, Berkeley. This was followed by postdoctoral research on energy transfer at very low temperatures at Oregon State University. Lou started the new Astrophysics Lab in the Netherlands and came to NASA in the 80's to develop the Ames Astrochemistry Laboratory. In 2012 he was recognized by Time magazine as among "The 25 Most Influential People in Space." Lou is now enjoying life as a retiree and a part time NASA contractor.

Osher Course: 'Salem Witch Trials'

The trial and execution in 1692 in Salem, Massachusetts of 19 persons for witchcraft is one of the most notorious episodes in early American history. At 10 a.m. on successive Wednesdays, October 10 and October 17 at the Vineyard Center, a two-session Osher course will not only explore why the Salem panic and subsequent witch hunt broke out when and where it did, it will also examine the personalities and tensions: religious, social, economic, demographic, and gender related, that permeated Salem at the time. It will also define the recurring conditions that have made the term "witch hunt" a description for later episodes in American and European history such as the French Revolution, the McCarthy era, and the panic after Pearl Harbor that led to the policy of Japanese internment.

Teaching the course is Robert Cirivilleri, who has a B.A. in Political Science and a Master's in Medieval History from San Jose State University. He taught American History at Evergreen Community College and Latin at Hillbrook School. His teaching specialties include U.S. History, Critical Thinking and World History.

The course is part of the Santa Clara University Osher program and is presented in cooperation with the Villages Senior Academy for Education. Membership in Osher and pre-registration is required at www.scu.edu/osher. The course fee is \$50.

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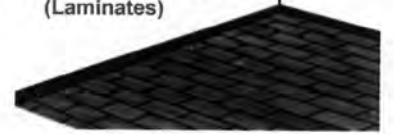

Villages Veteran Club profile: Dave Gordon

Dave Gordon was born in Brooklyn, NY, where he lived until 1963 when he came west and enrolled in Foothill College in San Mateo. He was drafted in 1965 before he could go on to complete his studies at San Jose State. His first assignment was in South Carolina for basic training. From there he was sent to the Aberdeen Proving Grounds for advanced training. He earned an appointment to Officer's Candidate School at Ft. Knox, KY, then finished OCS at Ft. Lee, Virginia's Logistics School.

After he completed OCS and was commissioned as a second lieutenant he was sent to Grafenberg, Germany. There he was the Officer and NCO Clubs Officer for the 2nd Army. While in Germany, his son was born.

In 1968, Dave was transferred to Viet Nam as a staff officer in Long Binh. While there, he was assigned as a Defense Attorney. With no legal training he was given a book detailing the job and legal issues. It was a fill in the blanks learning and test. Support was available from trained defense attorneys as needed.

The most dramatic assignment was as a company commander in Phuc Vinh. There he spent six months overseeing the transport of the remains of servicemen who had been killed in action. Dave said the most shocking experience he had was the first time he walked into a Quonset hut that contained a number of bodies of dead service men. He can never forget it.

In 1969, he resigned his commission and returned to the States.

On his return his wife and son were living in New York. He moved them to Mountain View. There, he worked for 30 years in various sales and marketing management positions in the electronics industry.

In 2001, he and his wife moved to Brookings, Oregon where he bought a printing business. Eventually, he became involved in local politics and was elected for two terms as a city councilman.

In 2014, his wife passed and Dave moved to The Villages to be near his son and family members.

The courses at Computer Classes for Adults (Almaden CCA, for short) can help you figure out what you need to know to be more comfortable using your electronic devices. Other courses offered in the fall session include Computer Basics, Windows 10, iPhones and Android phones, Word 2016, Google Photos, and how to use Gmail. Holiday Magic!, using Print Shop, shows you how to make your cards and decorations for all the year-end holidays.

Computer Classes for Adults (Almaden CCA) is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit, educational organization with a goal of helping you make better use of your computers, smart phones, and tablets so you can keep up with the modern world. There is no annual fee to take courses at Almaden CCA.

Almaden CCA uses PCs that run Windows 10. Students taking Apple and Android courses bring their own devices or laptops to class. Eight-week courses are \$20, four-week courses are \$15, and workshops are \$10. After registration, call 408-674-1401 to register for a course, or for additional information.

3-3. Doubt as to Procedure

a. Procedure for Competitor: In stroke play only, if a competitor is doubtful of his rights or the correct procedure during the play of a hole, he may, without penalty, complete the hole with two balls. To proceed under this Rule, he must decide to play two balls after the doubtful situation has arisen and before taking further action (e.g., making a stroke at the original ball).

1. The competitor should announce to his marker or a fellow-competitor that he intends to play two balls; and 2. which ball he wishes to count if the Rules permit the procedure used for that ball. 3. Before returning his score card, the competitor must report the facts of the situation to the Committee. If he fails to do so, he is disqualified.

Most important thing to remember about any questions about rules is to make sure that your question has been addressed by the rules committee *before* you post!

PICKLEBALL

Villages Pickleball is hot! No, not the temperature, but Club growth and participation. Our membership has grown by over 60 percent so far this year, with new members joining weekly. We’re now averaging 35 court reservations per week; there would be more if had more time slots available!

A recent article in AARP stated that playing pickleball, one of the fastest-growing sports in the U.S., may ward off depression as well as improve fitness, according to two new studies on the game’s health benefits. Pickleball is described as a little like tennis and a bit like ping pong, providing exercise, as well as social interaction.

A new Western State Colorado University study with middle aged and older adults found playing three times a week for one hour for six weeks, resulted in improved blood pressure and cardiorespiratory fitness. The researchers, who published in the International Journal of Research in Exercise Physiology, said the game’s “moderate exercise intensity,” combined with its “fun factor,” makes it “an ideal alternative form of physical activity”. Personally, I find it the ideal primary physical activity!

A Japanese study published in the journal Leisure Studies in May found older adults playing Pickleball were associated with lower levels of depression.

Advantages of Pickleball include aerobic exercise without a lot of risk of injury. Games usually last only 10 to 15 minutes of doubles play, as well as no serious running—making it easier on joints. With a lightweight paddle and a plastic ball, you’re less likely to have injuries such as tennis elbow.

The Villages is lucky to have Mike Walias available to provide instruction Wednesday and Friday for beginners at 1 p.m., followed by open drop-in play. Take advantage of this time to stop by and try out Pickleball! Are you looking for people to play with? Visit the Pickleball Scheduler (villagespickleball.org) to see available time slots! There is open play scheduled Sunday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday at 10:30 a.m. as well as the Wednesday/Friday time slots. Contact me if you need assistance in setting up a group!

Dealer may have a loser in Spades and 2 sure losers in Diamonds.

Strategy: Is to get rid of the 2 losing Spades before pulling trumps.

West leads the Ace of Diamonds, then the King, and now switches to a Heart, since he feels South doesn't have any more Diamonds. West plays the 10 of Hearts, East ducks, South trumps, and switches to the Ace of Spades, then a low Spade, which he trumps on the board. He leads a Heart, trumps it in his hand, leads another low Spade, trumps it on the board, and switches to a Diamond. He trumps it in his hand, and now plays the Ace, King and Jack of Clubs hoping the Clubs are split 3 - 2. Great! He is lucky, and now has two cards left, the good King and Queen of Spades. The contract is made with two extra tricks. If he wanted to be more careful he could have just trumped one low Spade, and then take out the trumps. In that procedure he just makes 4 Clubs.

* North has an interesting hand with not too many HCP. Some players would bid 1 NoTrump showing dislike for the Spade suit, others might bid 2 Hearts due to having 6 of them and a singleton in the partner's suit.

^ South has a very distributional hand and doesn't want NoTrump and has enough points to jump to 3 Clubs, and his partner is happier and doesn't have enough points to say anything else. By the way, when I played this contract, I didn't notice that West had only 2 Hearts. So after trumping the second low Spade in dummy, I led back a Heart, trumped it, and West over-trumped. The end result is that I went down 1 trick because after West over-trumped my Club, he led a Diamond that I had to trump. Now East ends up with a trump trick plus the Ace of Hearts trick.

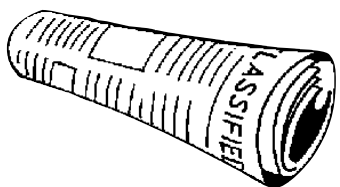

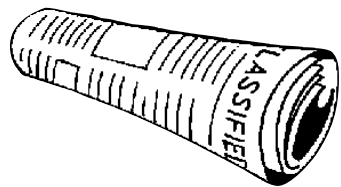

 Also, effective July 1, 2012, all estate and garage sales in the Association will require a permit. The owner of the property must request the permit from Public Safety Administration in Building C.
 The Villages Association Rule 2.02. 5., Residence Use and Occupancy Restrictions applies:
 5. Estate and garage sales are permitted subject to the following:
 A. Public Safety will not allow entry to anyone who is not authorized by name in advance (Club Rule 1.01, Access to the Villages).
 B. All sales activity and sale items must be contained with the residence or garage.
 C. Sales maybe held only between 9 a.m. and 4 p.m.
 D. Sales period may not exceed two days.
 E. Only one sale per resident household per year will be permitted. In the event of the death of a resident of the unit, a subsequent estate sale will be permitted. A permit is required and can be obtained from Public Safety.

Note: When placing classified ads for estate or garage sales in The Villager, you will need to attach proof of the permit to your Classified Advertising form.
