Honoring veterans for the 32nd year, the Villages Music Society in partnership with the Villages Veterans Club will commemorate Veterans Day this Saturday, November 10, at 2:30 p.m. at the LDS gymnasium on San Felipe just outside the villages. The event is free.

To open the ceremony, the United States Marine Color Guard from the Combat Logistics Battalion 453 Company in San Jose will present the colors. Lt. Colonel David K. Winnacker, Executive Officer, 23d Marine Regiment, will give the keynote address. Music will include "Under the Double Eagle," "I Love America," "America...the Dream Goes On," and "North and South.'

The Villages Concert Band under the direction of Jacque Leonard, the Village Voices under the direction of Ken Carter, and the Villages Handbells Ensemble under the direction of Earl and Kathi Levin will provide the musical tribute to the men and women of the armed services. Presenters, in addition to the keynote speaker, will be Jerry Neece of the Villages Veterans Club and San Jose Councilwoman Sylvia Arenas.



Lt. Colonel Winnacker, the featured speaker, most recently served as exercise planner in 2017 at Marine Forces Pacific in the G-3. Later he was assigned as the executive officer, 23d Marine Regiment, with headquarters in San Bruno, CA. In civilian life he is the Chief of the Moraga-Orinda Fire Department.

Villages Music Society and the Villages Veterans Club received medals of commendation for outstanding community service for their annual Veterans Day program from the City of San Jose. Over 600 people attend this annual event, said to be the second largest Veterans Day program in the city of San Jose.

Recently I received my Villages Financial Statement. I noticed that we spent \$1,215,038 on Comcast in 2018 – about \$30 per month per household. We Villagers get the cable as an included item in our HOA. This covers basic (Non-HD) services and an old set-up box.

Most Villagers have to pay extra for HD service and X1 set-up box. Which adds up to almost \$90 per month if internet is added.

I would like to have two options—if possible: 1) Villages Board should negotiate with Comcast to add HD service, including the HD set-up box, 2) or, cancel this item from our HOA and let individual Villagers have the type of cable they want.

Either way we Villagers could save some money each month. (Like the telephone service we pay for.) I hope management looks at this suggestion.

The VMA is a unique organization that benefits all the Villagers based on the principle of "Villagers taking care of Villagers." I have found the same principle practiced in dozens of countries using time banking solutions. The concept is that people participate in a system where people "earn" and "spend" time credits. When they spend one hour helping others, they earn one hour credit. If people donate money to fund such a system, the money can be translated into time credits at a pre-determined rate conversion. To make the VMA sustainable and encourage participation and donations, I suggest the VMA adopt a combination of time banking and free care. In other words, people who never participate in volunteering or donating to the VMA still get the free four times a month care. But people who have accumulated credit through time banking or donations may obtain more care based on available resources at that time. The current VMA system treats volunteers and non-volunteers with the same benefits, which fails to reward volunteers and makes it hard to sustain the program.

The Villages Golf and Country Club Notice of Emergency Rule Changes to <u>Rule 1.53 Disorderly</u>

Conduct and the **Rules Introduction – Enforcement of Rules**

Under the authority of Attachment D to the Club Rules, "If the Board determines that an immediate Rule change is required to address an imminent threat to public health or safety or an imminent risk of substantial financial loss to the Club, it may make an emergency rule change. No previous notice is required."

The purpose of these changes is to safeguard employee and resident safety, and provide a safe work and living environment, pending a Board hearing on certain Rule violations.

At the October 30 monthly meeting the Board approved the following changes effective immediately: Note: Deleted items are in strike through font, inserted items are in underlined font.

RULE 1.53 DISORDERLY CONDUCT

Any individual or group, including all non-residents, while on The Villages Club property will abide by normally accepted standards of behavior; e.g. abusive, unruly, intimidating, or disruptive behavior, is or any threatening statement or action, are not permitted. Violations of the Rule, at the discretion of the General Manager or his or her designees, may be dealt with immediately and could include removal from any Club facility or, in the case of non-residents, removal from The Villages premises. Any violation of this Rule should be immediately reported to Public Safety unless there is a compelling reason to call 911.

If the Board reasonably believes that a person's alleged rule violation is likely to recur, and presents a risk of intimidation, abuse, threat, or property loss or damage, to residents and/or employees, the Board may immediately suspend any or all of the person's rights to use or enter the Club's recreational and other facilities, including Club business offices, pending a hearing by the Club Board.

ENFORCEMENT OF RULES

The Bylaws establish the Board's authority to enforce Club Rules, including the imposition of a monetary penalty (fine) and the suspension of the right to use the Club's recreational and other facilities, not to exceed thirty (30) days for each violation. After an adequate investigation of an alleged violation, the resident and non-resident Owner, if applicable, will be notified and a hearing held, in accordance with the procedures outlined in the paragraph of Club Rule 1.02 titled Enforcement and Penalties for Traffic Violations, and Club Rule 1.71, Enforcement of Non-Traffic Rules.

These Emergency Rule changes expire on April 30, 2019, unless modified through the regular Rule changes provisions.

When should I begin taking my Social Security?

Many people are unsure of when to begin taking their Social Security benefit. At age 62? 66? 70? According to a recent Wall Street Journal article, a new website is now available to help you with this decision.

The website is www.opensocialsecurity.com. The site was developed by Mike Piper. Mike, who writes the Oblivious Investor blog, has authored many books such as "Investing Made Simple," "Social Security Made Simple" and "Can I Retire?"

This free calculator helps individuals and couples decide when to claim Social Security benefits to generate "the most total spendable dollars over your lifetime." Users enter their marital status, gender, date of birth and "primary insurance amount" - the amount of your monthly benefit at full retirement age as defined by the Social Security Administration. That figure can be found on your Social Security Statement or from the Retirement Estimator at www.socialsecurity.gov.

With that information, the calculator recommends a specific filing strategy, including the date and age when you should first claim benefits, and provides a chart with year-by-year benefit amounts. The website includes a good description about how the calculator works.

Of course, the calculations do not include personal information such as your expectation of a large inheritance within a few years or your having a disease which is expected to substantially shorter your life.

To quote the Wall Street Journal: "Overall, Open Social Security does a great job of simplifying one of the toughest and most important financial tasks in later life. Well worth your time.

The Medicare Open Enrollment Period started October 15 and runs through December 7. It is recommended that you review your Medicare B and D plans and your private Medigap plan annually to determine if they still suit your needs.

Villagers are fortunate to have a HICAP counselor (Health Insurance Counseling & Advocacy Program) available to come on site to assist with personal reviews. The next scheduled date is Thursday, November 15.

HICAP is willing to add additional counseling days at The Villages if there is enough interest. To schedule a one-on-one appointment at the SRS office, call Sourcewise at 408-350-3200, select option 2 and tell them you want an appointment at The Villages. If all appointments for November 15 are full, ask to be put on the wait list for The Villages. You will be contacted when additional days are added.

Please bring your Medicare number and ID cards of any other health insurance plans you have. Also, please bring your detailed list of medications including name, strength and dosage.



SRS Alert:

Change in Stanford Advantage plans

HICAP is calling attention to changes in Stanford Advantage Gold and Platinum Plans. Starting January 1, 2019, the most important change is the dental and vision coverage under these

Beginning 2019, unlike 2018 plans, dental and vision coverage are not included in the plans and the current members of these plans must sign up for dental and vision coverage separately for an additional premium of \$20/month. If the existing Stanford Gold or Platinum plan members do not take any action, beginning January 1, 2019, they will be dropped from dental and vision coverage.

Stanford has sent Change of Annual Coverage notices to all members, but the notice does not call attention to this subtle change and members may miss it.

An independent dental plan, similar to what Stanford offers, costs about \$141/quarter or \$564/year; vision may cost another \$500/year.

By paying \$240/year (\$20/month) for the Stanford Plan, the plan members get both the coverages at a better price.

If you wish to continue dental and vision coverage for an additional \$20/month, please call Stanford member services at 855-996-8422 before December 7, 2018.



Maj. General Ostenberg to speak to SIR 38

served honorably in the military during the period from November 1, 1955 to May 15, 1975. He will also present the newly issued Spousal pin to those SIR 38 spouses whose husband or wife served during the same period but have passed away. Service in Vietnam is not a requirement.

The SIR 114 Vietnam timeframe veterans and the spouses of SIR 114 Vietnam timeframe veterans who have passed away have also been invited to hear General Ostenberg speak and to receive pins. The Sir 114 veteran, spousal pin, and SIR 38 spousal pin recipients should arrive at the clubhouse at 12:30 p.m. Non-SIR members wishing to attend the after-lunch program should arrive at the Clubhouse at 12:30 p.m.

Maj. Gen. Ostenberg began his military career as an enlisted soldier in 1969. He attended the Infantry Officers Candidate School and was commissioned a second lieutenant in September 1970. He served in Vietnam from 1971 to 1972 as a platoon leader with the 1st Battalion, 6th Infantry and with the 1st Regiment, 1st Cavalry of the 23rd Infantry Division. Following active duty, Maj. Gen. Ostenberg joined the Army Reserve, where he served in every leadership position from Platoon Leader to Division level command.

In July 2005 through October 2008, when he retired, Maj. Gen. Ostenberg was the Director, Reserve Forces, with additional duty as one of five Domestic Attack Assessors, at North American Aerospace Defense Command (NORAD) and United States Northern Command (USNORTHCOM), Peterson Air Force Base, Colo.

"Hippie" by Paulo Coelho: From the author of "The Alchemist" comes the story about the journey of a Brazilian hippie, Paulo, with a goatee and long flowing hair, who wants to become a writer and sets out on a journey in search of a deeper meaning for his life. November Art Film: Norman Rockwell

On Tuesday, November 13 at 7 p.m. at the Vineyard Center, the video "Norman Rockwell: An American Portrait," produced by View Video 2004 will be shown. The event is presented by the Villages Arts and Crafts Association.

I have so many memories of this artist. Do you? This video shows not only many of his most popular illustrations but also includes the methods he used to create them. For example, in his work "Freedom From Want," the last of the four part series "The Four Freedoms" inspired by Franklin Roosevelt's 1941 State of the Union Address, Rockwell positioned our viewer's perspective facing the head of a family table as the Thanksgiving turkey arrives. This technique draws us into the visual story.

The other three Freedoms in this Saturday Evening Post series were Speech, Fear and Worship. These works are considered by many to be Rockwell's most successful. In 1977 he received the Presidential Medal of Freedom. President Gerald Ford said, "His (Rockwell) affectionate portraits of our country and ourselves have become a beloved part of the American tradition." Indeed. Rockwell's 4,000 original pieces including 320 Post magazine covers had brought over 12-14 million Americans through everyday life, WWI & II, the Great Depression, Korea, Vietnam, Civil Rights, plus to the moon and back!

Join us on Tuesday, November 13 in the Vineyard Center at 7 p.m. as we begin the holiday season reliving the works of the American Icon Norman Rockwell.

Investment Club: Stock Market Correction

The next meeting of the Investment Club will be held Thursday, November 15, from 10 to 11:45 a.m. at the Foothill Center. The Topics addressed will deal with recent price and technical changes to the U.S. Stock market, and potential withholding tax requirements for Villagers who may choose to take 2017- and 2018 market profits or losses.

The format for the meeting is in two parts:

- 10 to 10:30 a.m. - Edward deJong, will present a short fact sheet on the new 2018 federal taxes. The major changes and impact on required estimated tax payments to avoid penalties, will be addressed. - Next 30 minutes to 1 hour - The significance of the October market correction, the effect of changes to the prices of the "FANG" stocks, and possible upside and downside effects of November 6 election results on the market will be addressed in preliminary fashion. Present plans are to use short video segments of market analysis taken from market expert commentary on CNBC and Bloomberg television. This will include member questions, comments and discussion.

The investment club meets monthly and maintains an online library of investment newsletters that are available over the internet 24/7 to members with a password. The annual dues of \$30 per year pay for subscriptions to the newsletter, refreshments, and costs of meeting projectors and setup. The club itself does not make investments or give investment advice. Everyone needs an Advance Health Care Directive. An unexpected accident, severe illness or old age could prevent you from selecting your own healthcare treatment. Without a legal record of your preference, the choice of your treatment could be put in the hands of distant family members or unsympathetic doctors. Without an Advance Health Care Directive your doctors and other medical providers will have no idea how you want to be treated. With an Advance Heath Care Directive you can ensure that your treatment wishes are honored.

This workshop not only addresses creating an Advance Health Care Directive, but in addition, if you already have a directive bring it to the workshop for updating.

This revolutionary approach allows the horse to experience his own habitual patterns of movement and provides the horse with an opportunity to explore and learn new ways of standing on his feet and utilizing the ground for greater ease, comfort and confidence. Using a variety of stability and balance pads, horses discover how they are habitually standing. The pads give under the horse's weight bringing his attention to where he is placing his feet and providing new information to the balancing part of his nervous system. With this awareness the horse explores, shifts and alters his habitual patterns of standing and moving by himself, ultimately choosing a more secure and effective way to stand and move.

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

Service Animal vs Comfort Animal

Service Animals as defined by Title II and Title III of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA). Service animal is individually trained to do work or perform tasks for the benefit on an individual with a disability, including physical, sensory, psychiatric, intellectual, or other mental disability. These tasks may include, pulling a wheelchair, picking up dropped items, reminding a person to take medication, or alerting a person of a sound.

Service animals are allowed to accompany the handler to any place where members of the public are allowed, even if the facility has a "No Pets" policy.

When it is not obvious what service an animal provides, only limited inquiries are allowed. Staff may ask two questions:

Is the animal required because of a disability?

What work or task has the animal been trained to perform?

Emotional support animals are not covered under ADA. A doctor's note does not make an emotional support animal a service animal.

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



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

Tips from the Pro-Sometimes it's OK to "choke"...

Chipping is a bit like putting-it's built around feel and confidence-and if you can find a method that works for you, you should stick with it, no matter how strange it may seem. Still, there are a few undeniable laws of the short game, and one of them is to choke down on the club. Once I'm within about 60 yards of the hole, I start choking down on my grip—the shorter the shot I'm facing, the shorter the grip I take - sometimes right down to the bottom of the grip.

First, it improves touch. By choking down on the club you put your hands closer to the clubhead and the ball, and that enhances your feel for the shot-it's almost as if you're tossing the ball. Second, by shortening the distance between your hands and the clubhead, you shorten the arc of the swing. This automatically shortens the shot without you having to make big adjustments in your swing length or pace. You can make a crisp, authoritative swing without worrying about hitting the ball well past the pin. Let us know if these tips help. See you at the course!

Dealer has 1 loser in Spades, at least 1 or more Diamond losers, and 1 or 2 Club losers.

Strategy: Try to prevent more than 1 loser in Diamonds and in Clubs.

West leads the Jack of Spades, South wins with the King, switches to a low Heart to the Ace on the board, continues with a low Heart to the 9 in his hand. So far, South surmises that West has Spades and his first discard of the 7 of Clubs usually means he likes the suit and has at least an honor in it. Now South plays a low Diamond to the Queen on the board, East takes the trick with the Ace, then leads a Club, South, the Ace, and follows with the King of Diamonds. He then plays a Diamond, trumps it on the board with the Queen, continues with the Jack and overtrumps with the King in his hand, in order to lead his last Heart and pick up the outstanding trump. He proceeds to lead a Spade to the Ace on the board, continues with a Spade, West takes the trick with the 10. He now has two cards left—the King and Jack of Clubs. West plays the King and then the Jack, and South wins with the Queen. Great! The contract is made exactly. This is not an easy contract to make. South has to be careful in order to just lose one trick in Diamonds and in Clubs.

South has a good hand and feels with his HCP plus at least 12 HCP by the opener that they have enough points for game and bids it.

Retirement can be a time of self-discovery. Through my involvement with music groups here in The Villages I have come seem to know it. I am rather astonished as I wonder how in the world that melody and those lyrics ever took up residence in my brain. My best guess is that as a pre-kindergartener (who ever






