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## Spend Christmas season with the Foto Sisters

The Villages Music Society proudly presents the very delightful Foto Sisters—Adelyn, Katelyn and Gaylyn—on Wednesday, December 12 at 7:30 p.m. The Christmas program in Cribari Auditorium features this up and coming ensemble playing violin, viola, cello, six-hand piano and singing. "They remind me of the Celtic Women to some degree," said Ken Carter, director of the Village Voices.

The music of The Foto Sisters is a charming and unique blend of classical, cinematic, and pop styles, with that hint of Celtic. Audiences across the United States have been delighted and inspired by their heartfelt melodies and graceful instrumentation. For over 16 years, though still in their early 20s, this classically-trained sibling trio has appeared in many different venues, including conferences, schools, cantatas, churches, weddings, and charity events. "It's hard to remember life as sisters without music," said Gaylyn.

In addition to their regular appearances as a trio, the sisters have individually won concerto competitions, soloed and had leadership positions with youth orchestras in their native Louisiana. ## A Vote is required to build our Pickleball Park

#### **By Pickleball Ad Hoc Committee**

The Club Bylaws require a majority approval vote from Villagers on any project with an estimated cost of over \$235,000. To date, \$291,564 in donations processed through the Evergreen Villages Foundation has been raised for the proposed Pickleball Park with approximately another \$150,000 in donation commitments due by February. The Club Board of Directors (CBOD) has available up to \$400,000 from the existing capital improvement reserve fund. We

will have a high confidence cost number once the Planning Permit is approved, but the expectation is that no additional Club funding would be needed.

The CBOD created the Ad Hoc Pickleball Committee and our purpose is to familiarize and inform residents so that everyone has the best available information prior to the projected vote in early 2019.



Our committee's hope is that fellow residents will cast their votes with confidence-expecting no significant surprises on either the cost or timeline!

The next major milestone will be when the courts design firm meets with the City of San Jose planner and gets approval for the Pickleball Park Planning Permit. This is scheduled to happen within the next two to three months.

### Notice of Proposed Changes to Association Policy APo 210 Nominating Committee

Proposed changes to The Villages Association Policy APo 210 Nominating Committee were conditionally approved by the Association Board of Directors at its November 13, 2018, meeting. However, before formal approval consideration, the proposed changes must be noticed and published 30 days as required by California Civil Code 4360 and Association Policy APo 101. To that end, the proposed changes will be considered for formal approval at the January 29, 2019 board meeting. The Board will consider oral and written comments regarding the proposed changes at the December 11, 2018, and January 29, 2019, study session. Response to the proposed policy changes may be made by one or more of the following methods: 1) Participation in the discussion of the proposed changes at the Association Board of Directors study sessions, 2) via written comments delivered to the Board through Maria Hernandez in the General Manager's office at mehernandez@the-villages.com.

Deletions are noted in strikethrough font, additions are underlined, and the purpose of the change is in italics.

The purpose of the proposed changes is to clarify the composition of the committee, committee functions, and qualified guidelines.

#### **TITLE: Nominating Committee**

APo 210

OBJECTIVE: To define the process of appointing non-Board members to a Nominating Committee for the purpose of identifying and recruiting qualified candidates for election to the Association Board.

GOVERNING DOCUMENTS / LEGAL REQUIREMENTS: Article 6.1.1 of the Amended Bylaws of the Villages Association

POLICY: The Board shall annually appoint non-Board members to a standing Nominating Committee in compliance with Article 6.1.1 of the amended Villages Association Bylaws.

It shall further be the policy of the Board that the Nominating Committee, after it's initial orientation meeting, function totally independent of the Board. Board Members shall not make any independent contact either verbally or in writing with the Committee unless the Board Member is seeking re-election or such contact is initiated by the Nominating Committee Chair.

**IMPLEMENTATION PROCEDURES:** Refer to Association Procedure Number APr 210.

#### THE VILLAGES ASSOCIATION BOARD OF DIRECTORS NOMINATING COMMITTEE CHARTER

#### PURPOSE

The purpose of the Nominating Committee is to:

- 1. Provide awareness within the community of the need for qualified director candidates.
- 2. Seek and lidentify qualified director candidates.

3. Assist interested potential candidates in understanding the scope and responsibilities of a director, which include but are not limited to:

- term of office
- time commitments
- fiduciary responsibilities
- Association objectives
- administrative duties
- governance by Policy

4. Advise potential candidates of various campaign options, as well as the petition process. 5. Act independently of the Board influence.

#### **COMMITTEE ORGANIZATION**

1. Composition:

a. The Committee should consist of at least five (5) or more three (3) but no more than seven (7) members appointed annually by the Board.

b. The Board shall annually appoint new members to the Nominating Committee in October to serve the normal term of office. The Board shall appoint replacement members to serve the remaining term of any vacancies on the Nominating Committee at the next Board Meeting following the occurrence of a vacancy.

f. The Secretary shall maintain minutes of committee meetings in writing. Progress reports,

identifying the number of qualified candidates, shall be submitted to the Board monthly during the year and at the Board study sessions and the Board meetings during the sixty (60) day period prior to release of ballots for election of Directors.

g. The first meeting of the year shall be called by the ABOD Liaison to this committee, at which time an orientation is given reviewing the functioning of the Committee and the role of the Committee.

2. Term: <u>A Nominating Committee member may serve two consecutive</u> <u>one-year terms</u>. Two-year staggered appointments. Reappointment is possible subject to a two-term limit. There must be a one-year break in service after <u>any</u> two consecutive <u>one-year</u> terms.

#### **COMMITTEE FUNCTIONS**

- 1. Meet to conduct planning or discuss and evaluate potential candidates.
- 2. Acquire knowledge about qualifications and interests of potential candidates.

Encourage qualified persons to run for the Association Board of Directors.
 Conduct personal interviews with each potential candidate (refer to quali-

fication requirements and guidelines below). 5. Nominate as many qualified board candidates as possible, but not less than the number of positions required to be filled.

6. Announce the candidates by the deadline for nominations declared by the Board not less than 35 days and not more than 45 days prior to the date of the annual election of Directors at the Member Meeting held in June.

#### **QUALIFICATION REQUIREMENTS**

To be eligible to serve on the Association Board, a member must meet the following requirements:

- · Must be a resident owner and a member in good standing
- Cannot serve concurrently on the Club Board of Directors
- Only one owner of a particular unit may serve at any time

#### **DESIRED ABILITIES IN A CANDIDATE QUALIFICATION GUIDELINES**

Each candidate, should he/she be elected, is expected to contribute one or more of the total qualification <u>abilities</u> that a successful board needs to perform its functions. ## Partial payment of property tax

**Question:** I cannot pay my entire property tax payment due December 10, 2018. Should I go ahead and send them a partial payment?

Answer: Yes! Pay the amount that you can.

Prior to 2017, the County returned any amount that was less than the full amount stated on the first and/or second installment tax bills. The taxpayer would subsequently be assessed a 10 percent penalty, plus any applicable fees and charges, on the full amount of the delinquent tax bill.

Today, the County is kinder and gentler. The County accepts partial payment and only the unpaid amount on the first and second installment bills will be treated as delinquent tax on December 10 and April 10 of each year. The County will add a 10 percent penalty and applicable costs only to any unpaid tax amounts on the delinquency dates.

You can pay the remainder in any number of payments and can pay online at taxpayment.sccdtac.org. The amount due for the first installment must be paid in full before the Department will apply any payments to the second installment. The entire amount must be paid by June 30, the end of our county's fiscal year, or additional rules and penalties will apply.

If your payment is less than the amount due on the installment, you will receive a Balance Due Statement. On the Property Tax website there is a field displayed as "Amount Paid to Date" that will show the total payments made to date.

Note: The Senior Resource Services (SRS) office hours for drop-in assistance are Monday, Wednesday and Friday from 10 a.m. to noon. The SRS office is in the Cribari Center across from the Post Office. You may also leave a message at 408-239-5253. The purpose of SRS is to provide education and general business and financial information. All assistance is free and confidential. You should ask your professional adviser about your individual situation.

#### New limits for 2019 retirement contributions

Working taxpayers will be able to contribute \$6,000 to their traditional IRA accounts in 2019, up from \$5,500 which has been the amount since 2013. The additional \$1,000 for a catch-up contribution has not changed so a working Villager age 50 can contribute a total of \$7,000 in 2019.

Participants in 401(k) plans will be able to set aside up to \$19,000 next year, up from \$18,500. The catch-up contribution for 401(k) remains at \$6,000 for a total of \$25,000.


### Astronomy Club: 'Elements Throughout the Cosmos'

Stem cells are our body's natural internal repair system. They can accelerate the body's natural healing response and may lower pain without the need for medication. It must be pointed out that this is an elective procedure and it is not covered by Medicare. This workshop will help to educate you on the benefits of this relatively new way to treat our aging bodies. No registration or fee is required.

#### **Riding Club:** Understanding Horses

Horses are prey animals and, as the species developed, survival depended on a good flight response. That instinct is never far from the surface in a horse and so, seemingly innocuous things can spook them. Some horses are so tame that nothing fazes them. Others will go ballistic at the slightest pretext. Most are somewhere in between. Horses are also farsighted so things up close are blurry to them, and they cannot see directly in front or



behind themselves. When something comes around a blind corner and suddenly appears, the horse cannot readily identify what is heading toward it. When encountering a horse and rider, it's a good idea to step to the side of the trail and avoid sudden movements. Many equestrians also appreciate voice alerts-the human voice helps the horse identify the person as a friendly human and not a potential threat or predator. And it's always appreciated when bikers stop and dismount and when dogs are on leash. Happy Trails to all!

#### By Wate Bakker

"The Man Who Caught The Storm" by Brantley Hargrove: This is the biography of Tim Samara, who did not attend college but chased storms with brilliant tools of his own invention and pushed closer to tornadoes than anybody else ever dared. Thus he changed the science of tornadoes and other super storms, until he finally met his match in a face-off against the largest tornado ever recorded. The author has chased tornadoes himself and also explains scientific efforts to reverse engineer tornadoes using supercomputers. Nonfiction, biography, Tim Samara, 2018.

"The Soul of America" by Jon Meacham: This historical review of moments in American history explores contentious periods in American history, when chaos and dissent threatened to tear the fabric of the nation apart, but presidents and citizens came together to defeat the forces of anger, intolerance and extremism. Examples of such periods include the presidencies of Lincoln, Ulysses Grant, Theodore and Franklin Roosevelt, Truman, Eisenhower and Lyndon Johnson. Prominent citizens include early suffragettes Alice Paul and Carrie Chapman and Martin Luther King. Bad actors include McCarthy, Huey long and the Ku Klux Klan. The author believes that we have been sustained by a belief in progress, even in gloomiest of times. The good news is that we have come through such darkness before - as time and again Lincoln's better angels have found a way to prevail. This is somewhat in contrast to "Fantasyland "by Kurt Andersen, who suggests that a great deal of irrationality may be baked into the American character and the internet gives a voice to its darker, hateful side. "Feared" by Lisa Scottoline: Three men announce that they are suing the Rosato and Dinunzio law firm, run by female lawyers, Mary and Bennie, for reverse discrimination. To make matters worse, their only male employee intends to resign, claiming there is some truth to the case. The lawyer for the Plaintiffs is aptly called Machiavelli—determined not only to win but to destroy the firm. Then the case turns deadly. Can Bennie and Mary solve the murder and save their business?

**"The Tattooist of Auschwitz" by Heather Morris:** Lale Sokolov, a Slovakian Jew, is forcibly transported to the concentration camps at Auschwitz-Birkenau. His captors put him to work as a Tatowierer (the German word for tattooist), tasked with permanently marking his fellow prisoners, since he speaks several languages. He survives for more than two years, witnessing horrible atrocities, but also incredible acts of bravery and compassion. In late 1942 he tattoos prisoner 34902, a young woman named Gita and in that first encounter he vows to survive and somehow marry her. Will they succeed? Fiction 2018

"Shadow Tyrants" by Clive Cussler and Boyd Morrison: Juan Cabrillo and the crew of the Oregon are at it again. ## Holiday Faire helps fund many activities

We thank our members and the Villagers who made our Holiday Faire 2018 a great success for the Arts & Crafts Association this year. Arts & Crafts sponsors two major fundraising events each year. The first purpose is to raise funds to finance *free* events that Arts & Crafts offers to Villagers. The second purpose is to give Villagers a chance to display and sell their hand-made crafts and fine arts.

Our stated mission is to provide events such as classes, exhibits, special events and free demonstrations. Our fundraising events, such as Holiday Faire, provide funds to finance *free* events that Arts & Crafts offers to Villagers. Art Films cost us \$240 per year plus the cost of purchased and donated artist DVDs. The monthly *free* 

Guest Artist demonstrations cost us \$1700 per year. Exhibits and the Annual Members Juried Show reception costs \$650 per year. Other free events, such as Sandy Jones' free pastels class and the Beginning Artists Reception last May, cost us \$400, but were enjoyed as *free* by all Villagers. Total = \$2,990.

The Arts & Crafts Association provides low-cost classes to Villagers, at an average of \$60 for 18 hours of instruction. Comparable classes at Triton are \$175; at Santa Clara Watercolor Society, \$440; at University Art, \$240.

Tips from the Pro-Hybrids vs. Long Irons from the rough...Wouldn't it be nice if every single drive that you hit went right down the center of the fairway? The reality is that some of our tee shots find their way into the rough, and we just have to deal with it. So what club do you use when faced with a long shot from the rough?

When to use a hybrid club: When distance is more important than accuracy hybrid clubs are the way to go. They have a compact head that helps them glide easily through light rough, a low center of gravity that helps them pop the ball up quickly, and a forgiving design that delivers distance even on off center

hits. If there's not much trouble around and you want to blast the ball up to the green this is the way to go.

When to use a long iron: When accuracy is paramount leave your hybrid in the bag and reach for a long iron. Long irons can cut through the rough like butter, but if you don't hit them just right your ball won't travel very far. This lack of distance on a mishit can actually be a blessing if there is trouble to the left or right of your target and you can't afford to launch one off line very far. Dealer has 1 Spade winner, 1 Heart winner, a Diamond, and 4 Club winners.

Strategy: Needs to get rid of the losers in Diamonds while still having control over the other suits.

West leads the 6 of Clubs, South covers with the Jack on the board, switches to a Diamond East, the King, South the Ace, continues with a Diamond, West, the Queen, and East sluffs the 9 of Spades. Then West leads a low Spade, South wins with the Ace on the board, now plays a Club to the Ace in his hand, and follows with the King and Queen. He then leads the good Jack, next the 8, and 7 of Diamonds. He plays the Ace of Hearts, then leads a Heart, East covers with the King, and plays his last card, the Queen of Spades, Great. The contract is made with an over trick. However, if one of the opponents had led a Spade before the Queen of Diamonds was played, then South would have to give up a Spade trick and be kept to making just 9 tricks. West didn't like the idea of leading from a major since he only had 3 including an honor in each suit. Still when the opposition bids NoTrump and did not inquire about a fitness in the majors, then it is often a good idea to lead a card from one of the major suits.

\* Opener has too many HCP to open 1NT (15 - 17) and not enough HCP (20 -21) to open 2 NT. So after his first bid, he jumps to 2 NoTrump showing 18 – 19 HCP with his next bid.

\* North bids game thinking there is a possibility to make it in NT since his partner is now showing 18 – 19 HCP with the 2 NoTrump bid.




