Voyage Prepares its Next-Generation Self-Driving Car

In January of this year, self-driving taxis began popping up around The Villages, offering rides to residents as part of the Voyage Pilot Program. During the program, hundreds of community members had the opportunity to take a ride in one of Voyage's self-driving vehicles.

The Pilot Program provided Voyage with valuable insights, said Voyage CEO Oliver Cameron. "The community has been amazingly receptive to our technology. Every passenger has shared a unique perspective that helps focus our engineering team on delivering an amazing ride."

Those insights are now influencing the company's next-generation autonomous vehicles. "Everything on our new cars was influenced by riders at The Villages," said Mr. Cameron. "We selected a larger vehicle to make getting in and out easier. New sensors and software features were added for conditions unique to The Villages—like sharing the road with lots of golf carts."



Voyage's new vehicle is based on the Chrysler Pacifica Hybrid minivan, sporting room for more passengers. New vehicle capabilities also promise an improved riding experience for residents —including better sensors, predictions, and abilities to navigate more of The Villages community with updated maps.

So when will we get to see the new self-driving taxis here? Voyage is working on introducing its new fleet of vehicles to The Villages for testing in the coming weeks, with opportunities for passenger rides in early 2019! Holiday courtesy rides

To many people, the holidays are synonymous with parties and drinking. While this is a time to celebrate with family and friends, it is also a time when some may overindulge. An error in judgment could mean that someone might not survive to see the New Year. For those who may have celebrated a little too much, Public Safety officers will provide courtesy rides home to residents who reside within the Villages. Public Safety will additionally assist residents' guests in obtaining commercial means of transportation. Remember, you as a Villager are responsible for your guests while they are in the Villages.

Pedestrian Safety on our Villages streets

Walking in the Villages is great exercise and an excellent way to see our beautiful community. Walking can also be dangerous; however, one in six traffic fatalities is a pedestrian. To avoid being a statistic, take note of a few tips for walkers and drivers alike.

Always walk on the sidewalk. If there is no sidewalk and you have to walk in the road, always walk facing traffic, so you can see any car that might go out of control. Make eye contact with drivers and dress to been seen. At night, wear light or reflective clothing and carry a small flashlight.

Drivers of all vehicles must take care to respect the right-of-way of pedestrians. California Vehicle Code requires you to yield the right-of-way to a pedestrian crossing the roadway within any marked crosswalk or within any unmarked crosswalk of an intersection. This does not relieve pedestrians, however, from the duty of being cautious and watching out for their own safety.

2018/2019 Christmas tree pickup schedule

Christmas tree pickup this year will be on the following days:

- Wednesday, December 26 and Thursday, December 27
- Wednesday, January 2 and Thursday, January 3
- Place the tree at curbside no more than 24 hours before pickup day and note the following before putting out your tree:
 - 1. All tinsel, ornaments, garland, etc. must be removed.
 - All metal/plastic stands or buckets must be removed.
 - 3. Wood stands are acceptable.
 - 4. Trees should be cut to no longer than five-foot lengths.

BrightView Landscape will recycle all trees, except those that are flocked. Flocked trees cannot be recycled, but will be properly disposed of. If you have any questions you can call Customer Service at 408-223-4670.

A Villager's experience with identity theft

The Villager had a savings account at a local bank. Eight months ago, his account was reduced by \$1.45 for a PayPal charge. He didn't notice because it was so small.

Six months later our Villager noticed money was sent from his savings account to the same PayPal account. There were four charges totaling \$24,000. He quickly contacted the bank.

The bank refused to reimburse him. They went back to the initial \$1.45 charge and said he had 60 days to dispute that charge. Since he did not dispute, the bank claimed that the fraud had started with that initial withdrawal and the bank was not liable.

Unfortunately, everyone must remain vigilant against theft. Fraudulent transactions happen fast. Thieves will test an account with a small amount and then, at some later date, go to town. It is very important to catch fraud quickly. Banks will go back to the small, test transaction as the start of the fraud. Sixty days after the initial test/fraud event, the bank will claim that **you are responsible** for the loss. Everyone **must** review their statements **every month** and identify and report any transactions that you do not recognize. That is every bank account including seldom accessed accounts like CD's and money market accounts, and every credit card account.

Almost all banks offer some type of alerts. Alerts can be placed on checking and savings accounts, ATM and debit transactions, credit card accounts, certificates of deposit and mortgage accounts. Alerts can be push notifications, text messages or emails. Below are five banking alerts that everyone should activate.

When big purchases happen: You should know every transaction going in and out. If the transaction is not familiar, check with family members that have access to your account. Report any transaction, no matter how small that is not yours. Don't think the \$5.45 charge is not worth the effort—it just started the clock ticking for the bank.

Low balance alert: this alert will send you a text message or email when your bank account drops below a certain amount. This is an alert that will help you avoid overdrafts or spending money.

When your profile or password changes: If your personal information on your bank's website or app changes without your authorization, especially passwords, that is a sign of identity theft.

When an ATM withdrawal exceeds a certain amount: If you only grab your \$40 allowance every week, set up this alert so you'll know of any big withdrawals you didn't authorize.

When a debit card purchase occurs: This alert will let you see a real-time list of our purchases. When purchases occur at odd times, you will know right away that something is going on. Remember, you actually have more protection with a credit card than a debit card but there are retailers that take only cash or debit or their credit card (think Costco)—so sometimes you will use an ATM card.

The good news is the Villager's bank reconsidered and reimbursed the Villager for the loss. This was accomplished by escalating and when that appeared to be failing, to inform them that the next call would be to the Santa Clara County DA's Elder Abuse Department. The DA has lots of tips to prevent fraud and loss as well as resources to help recover any loss. Refer to the DA's website. Go to www.sccgov.org. Enter "District Attorney Departments" in the search box and then click on "Elder Fraud Unit".

Be safe and be vigilant.



Tips from the Pro-Tee for two...

Believe it or not, making a few small changes to how you tee up your driver can have a big impact on how far and straight you hit the ball. Next time you're stepping onto the tee box with your driver in hand follow these two tips to ensure you are setting yourself up for success.

Tee the ball up to its equator. This is by far the best way to consistently tee your ball up at the right height. Just set your driver down on the turf and push your tee in until half of the ball is above the head of your driver and half of it is below.

Another tip...tee it lower to hit a fade, tee it higher to hit a draw.

Line it up with your front foot. Unlike most of the other clubs in your bag, your driver is actually designed to be hit on the up-swing. The problem most golfers have is that they tee up the ball in the middle of their stance. This puts the ball at the lowest of your swing arc and makes it extremely difficult to hit on the up-swing. To solve this problem just move your ball up in your stance so it's lined up with the toe of your front foot. This will make it much easier for you to hit your driver on the up-swing without making any changes to your swing at all. Let us know if these tips help. See you at the course!



Strategy: Try to get more winners in Hearts and maybe another in Spades depending on where the honors are.

West leads the 10 of Clubs, North, low, East, the King, continues with a low Club, and South wins with the Queen. He switches to the Ace of Hearts, next the King, continues with the 9, West, the Jack, and East has no choice but to play his Queen. He then leads the Ace of Diamonds, continues with the King, then a Spade, and South wins with the Ace. He plays the last 2 Hearts in his hand sluffing the 9 of Spades and the Ace of Clubs from the board. He leads a Spade to the King on the board and follows with the last two cards, the Queen of Spades and the Queen of Diamonds. Great. The contract is made exactly.

* Some South players would pass 2 NoTrump, but South liked having a five-card suit that might make extra tricks in NoTrump. Also his partner did suggest a game is possible.

merous calls from residents who advise us that all of the common parking is taken by residents. This is very common during holidays. This causes your guests to park in the larger streets and walk great distances.






