

All Pulse letters must be 200 words or fewer on a single topic relating to life in the Villages. Each letter must also include name, address, phone number, date and number of words. Typed or legibly written letters must include your signature and may be hand delivered to the Pulse mailbox in Administration Building B or by mailing to the Communications Advisory Committee, 5000 Cribari Lane, San Jose, CA 95135.

One recent change to the Pulse is that a question conveyed in a letter is no longer answered. Previously, the Club Board directed the GM to review Pulse inputs and respond to questions concurrently with the publication of that question in the Pulse. Similarly, if a Pulse letter contained erroneous information, the GM's concurrent response would correct the error immediately thereby averting any unnecessary consternation in the populace. For example, a few weeks ago, Paul Miner asked via a Pulse letter for an update on the status of the Wehner Mansion asking if The Villages was considering acquiring that property. That question, of general interest to Villagers, received no response. Surely a quick status/interest report by the GM amended to Paul's letter at publication would have been appropriate.

My question is why has the policy of concurrent GM response to Pulse letters been suspended? WHOOPS-my bad-I just submitted a question.







### Fitness Center's recent ADA audit results

Villages management recently had an ADA consultant complete an audit on the fitness equipment layout in the Fitness Center. The Fitness Center building itself has been ADA compliant since it was built. There was concern, however, about the layout of the fitness equipment especially when considering new or additional equipment. The Villages is required to provide equal access and opportunity to individuals with disabilities including those in wheelchairs and other supportive devices.

The audit did find that some of the fitness equipment was not positioned in a way that allowed for access for those with disabilities. Those pieces of equipment were repositioned or moved. Repositioning allows them to be accessed from either the front or side. At least one "type" of exercise equipment must have clear floor space of 30" by 48" and a slope of 2 percent. One type means one treadmill, one cross trainer, one bicep curl and so on. The Fitness Center has many pieces of equipment that are the only one of that type. Please be mindful that The Villages is required to be in ADA compliance at all times. Please do not move the equipment. The benches are often moved around the facility. Please leave them in place.

### **PUBLIC SAFETY**

#### Golf carts are vehicles, too

While we see carts driven on all of our streets, paths, and the golf course, one must always remember that golf carts are defined as "motor vehicles" per the California Vehicle Code. As "motor vehicles," carts must be driven under the same rules as an automobile. Their lower speed requires them to be driven close to the right edge of the roadway.

While we do not find too many carts exceeding the posted speed limit, golf carts must comply with the basic speed laws. Simply stated, this means that drivers must never drive at an unsafe speed. Drivers must consider the roadway conditions, traffic, weather, and visibility. A safe speed is frequently determined by the proximity of pedestrians; extreme care should be taken when passing near pedestrians. As an added precaution, cart drivers should be particularly aware of pedestrians walking with the flow of traffic; they may not be aware of your presence and suddenly step into your path.

Contrary to what you may believe, golf carts do not automatically have the right of way any



more than any other motor vehicle. While it may be tempting to please a grandchild by letting him or her stand on the back of the cart, or drive the cart, you would not allow this to occur while driving your automobile.

Note: Golf cart parking on the Plaza area at Cribari Center is not permitted.

And on a final note, please stop for all stop signs. Remember that your cart is a vehicle and is required to come to a complete stop and to yield at yield signs. Think safety!

### Traffic within The Villages/Rules of the Road

As a reminder, all roads within the community are single lanes. Passing other vehicles, either on the right or left, is not permitted. Recently, Public Safety has received complaints or witnessed this type of driving behavior.

Also, remember the speed limits and stop signs within the community. Public Safety has a traffic officer working every day, including weekends.

Our goal is to make the community safe for all who live and work here.



"The Woman in the Woods" by John Connolly: When the body of a woman who apparently died in childbirth is discovered in the beautiful Maine woods, private detective Charlie Parker is hired to track down both her identity and her missing child. But someone else is following the trail left by the woman with an interest in much more than a missing child. Mystery 2018.

"Dark Tide Rising" by Anne Perry: Jacob's Island is a broken-down waterside slum, a place of perpetual gloom where William Monk is just as likely to lose a man to the mud and tides as to the criminals who hide in the shadows. Kidnappers have chosen this warren of tunnels and alleys as the site of a ransom exchange for Kate Exeter, the wife of wealthy real estate developer Harry Exeter. Harry asks the Thames River Police to secretly accompany him to the spot and ensure that no harm comes to him or his captive wife. But on arrival, Monk and five of his best men are attacked from all sides, and Monk is left wondering who could have given away their plans. It seems undeniable that one of his own men has betrayed him and he realizes how little he knows about the people he works with every day. As the case runs into a series of deadly obstructions, Monk must choose between his own safety and the chance to solve the mystery. Mystery 2018.

"The Take" by Christopher Reich: Prince Abdul Aziz ibn Saud's motorcade is ambushed in Paris, and most of hell breaks loose. Tino Coluzzi, a member of the Corsican Mafia, has robbed the prince not only of 600,000 Euros, but also of a letter that can be used to oust the Russian president. Simon Riske, a freelance industrial spy with a shadowy background and unusual talents and skills, is hired to get it back. Though Riske is reluctant at first, he agrees when he learns that Coluzzi is the thief because he has a long-standing grievance against him. All Riske's abilities are called upon as he tries to retrieve the letter and get a measure of revenge against Coluzzi. Mystery 2018.

"Pieces of Her" by Karin Slaughter: What if the person you thought you knew best turns out to be someone you never knew at all? Andrea believes her mother, Laura, has spent her whole life in the small beachside town of Belle Isle and she's never wanted anything more than a quiet life as a pillar of the community; she knows she's never kept a secret in her life. But all that changes when a trip to the mall explodes into violence and Andrea suddenly sees a completely different side to Laura. Because it turns out that before Laura was Laura, she was someone completely different. For nearly 30 years she's been hiding from her previous identity but now nothing will ever be the same again. Laura's innocence is on the line, but she won't speak to anyone, including her own daughter. Andrea is on a desperate journey following the breadcrumb trail of her mother's past. If she can't uncover the secrets hidden there, there may be no future for either one of them. Mystery 2018.

"In His Father's Footsteps" by Danielle Steel: As the Americans storm the Buchenwald concentration camp, among the survivors are Jakob and Emmanuelle, barely more than teenagers. Each of them has lost everything and everyone in the unspeakable horrors of the war. But when they meet, they find hope and comfort in each other. Jakob and Emmanuelle marry and resolve to make a new life in New York. They build a happy, prosperous life for themselves and their new family, but their pasts cast a long shadow over the present. Years later, as the '60s are in full swing, their son Max is an ambitious, savvy businessman, determined to throw off the sadness that has hung over his family since his birth. But as Max's life unfolds, he must learn that there is meaning in his heritage that will help shape his future. Fiction 2018.

## Game Warden Lt. John Nores to speak at SIR #38 meeting on February 19

Lieutenant John Nores Jr. will be the speaker at the SIR 38 luncheon meeting on February 19 in the Fairway Room at the Clubhouse. He will speak about the tactics and related environmental crime enforcement procedures used to identify and prevent drug trafficking on public and private land. Lt. John Nores is a game warden for the California Department of Fish and Wildlife on a mission to protect and defend our nation's wildlife resources by investigating environmental crime and wildlife resource destruction for the last 28 years. Specifically, his career is summarized in the title of his first book "War in the Woods: Combating the Marijuana Cartels on America's Public Land."

In 2013 John co-developed the Marijuana Enforcement Team (MET) and Delta Team, the CDFW's first comprehensive wilderness spec ops tactical unit and sniper element, aimed at combatting the marijuana cartel's decimation of California's wildlife resources.

The MET has been featured on Fox News, NBC Investigative Reports, CNN, and Dan Rather Reports, in three seasons of National Geographic channel's award-winning game warden reality television series, "Wild Justice," and highlighted in the Sportsman Channel's award-winning Patriot Profiles: Life of Duty documentary TV series. Nores has written articles for Sure Fire's Combat Tactics and American Patriots: Unsung Heroes magazines and articles for Nosler Bullets and KUIU Ultralight Hunting.

1. Bump your hips to the left at address





Homeowner Rule 3.2.10, Estate and Garage Sales states:

3.2.10 Estate and garage sales are permitted subject to the following: A. A permit for the sale shall be obtained from the Public Safety Office prior to holding the sale and placement of advertising.

Also, effective July 1, 2012, all estate and garage sales in the Association will require a permit. The owner of the property must request the permit from Public Safety Administration in Building C. The Villages Association Rule 2.02. 5., Residence Use and

Occupancy Restrictions applies:

5. Estate and garage sales are permitted subject to the following: A. Public Safety will not allow entry to anyone who is not autho-

rized by name in advance (Club Rule 1.01, Access to the Villages). B. All sales activity and sale items must be contained with the

residence or garage.

C. Sales maybe held only between 9 a.m. and 4 p.m.

D. Sales period may not exceed two days.

E. Only one sale per resident household per year will be permitted. In the event of the death of a resident of the unit, a subsequent estate sale will be permitted. A permit is required and can be obtained from Public Safety.

Note: When placing classified ads for estate or garage sales in The Villager, you will need to attach proof of the permit to your Classified Advertising form.


