Senior Academy: 'All About the Sun' - free lecture

Senior Academy will present a science lecture, "All About the Sun," on Friday, February 22 at 2 p.m. at Foothill Center. The event is free, and open to all Villagers.

Our bright, warm Sun provides light and energy to sustain us and all life, not to mention the wonderful sunrises, sunsets,

rainbows, and other such delights. This presentation by John Trudeau will cover topics ranging from the Sun gods of the ancient world to the nuclear reactions that today we know power the Sun. We will look at a variety of solar phenom-



ena such as rainbows, sun dogs, glories, the "green flash," and explore the nature of sunshine and why it's both good and bad for us. We will examine the structure and dynamics of the Sun, including solar flares, coronal loops, sunspots and more, and we'll look at how the solar wind affects our planet and creates beautiful aurorae near our poles. We will also see how the sun compares to other stars, how it was formed, how it will age, and where it (and we) fit in the structure of the Universe.

John Trudeau is an active Villager who has had a lifelong interest in Astronomy and Astrophysics. He has built a number of astronomical telescopes, lectured at public planetariums, visited some major observatories and chased down a few solar eclipses over the years. John holds advanced degrees in both Physics and Psychology.

Senior Academy will present a two-session course on "Impacting Climate Change." The speaker is Rod Diridon. Mr. Diridon will inform us about changes that are being made now and in the future in the area of transportation and the second session will integrate the critical housing effort. Mr. Diridon Sr. is known as the father of modern transit service in Silicon Valley. He has chaired numerous national and local programs related to this subject. Association/Homeowners documents available via e-mail

Per an amendment to California Civil Code, homeowner associations are permitted, with owner's written consent, to distribute annual disclosures, (like the pro forma budget summary) and other specified association documents to owners via electronic mail, facsimile, or other electronic means (such as posting on the association's website) instead of sending those documents out by regular mail or personal delivery. This has the potential to provide cost savings to The Villages. Delivery and postage costs for the Villages' annual distribution of the pro forma budget summary alone are close to \$1,000, not to mention the paper and printing costs that run about \$8,000.

In order to transmit association documents via e-mail or by posting on the homeowners association's website, 1) the homeowners association must first receive the owner's written consent, and 2) the homeowners association sends a separate notice to the owner that the documents have been posted and are available for viewing.

Consent forms for owners to request delivery of documents have been developed for both The Villages Association and Homeowners Corporations. These forms provide an owner's consent to electronic delivery of documents that are capable, under current laws, of being distributed electronically. Owners have the right to revoke this request and receive "hard copies" of the documents by sending a written revocation signed by the owner, to the applicable corporation.

Forms of owner's written consent are available in Business Administration Buildings A and B, and on The Villages web site, http://www.thevillagesgcc.com (Click on *Resident Info* and then Click on *Resource Files*.)

Measure EE parcel tax exemption filing March 8; April 12

On March 8 or April 12, you may file for exemption from the annual \$125 Evergreen School District parcel tax on your principal residence if you are at least age 65 or will be age 65 by June 30, 2020. If there are joint owners of your principal residence, only one owner needs to be age 65.

If you had the exemption from the parcel tax for 2018/2019, your exemption has been automatically renewed by the School District. There is nothing more you need to do. The event on March 8 and April 12 is for new exemption requests.

If you would like to apply for the exemption for the 2019/2020 tax year, the School District is making it easy for you. Evergreen School District representatives will be at The Villages on Friday, March 8 and Friday, April 12 in Montgomery Center from 1:30 to 4 p.m. to approve your parcel tax exemption request form.

You must file for the exemption in person with documents to prove (1) your property ownership, (2) your residency, and (3) your age.

Your 2018/2019 property tax statement will prove your ownership. Your driver's license or CA identification card will prove your residency and age. Your documents will be reviewed and immediately returned to you.

If you are new to The Villages and the address on your driver's license does not match your property tax statement, please also bring your PG&E bill or other bill to prove your residency. If you do not yet have a property tax statement, bring your escrow purchase statement and related papers.

Not sure whether you have the exemption? Go to your last property tax bill. Look under the section labeled "Parcel Tax / Special Assessments." If a line item is "Evergreen Measure H 2014" followed by "\$100" you are paying the tax. If you can't find this listing, you are currently exempt from the tax. Still not sure? The School District employees will have a list of the seniors with the exemption. Come to Montgomery Center and check with them.

You may also apply for the exemption at the School District Office at 3188 Quimby Road, Monday – Friday from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. through May 31, 2019. If you cannot get to the Cribari Center or the District Office, please call Pearl Casey of the District at 408-270-6863 to make personal arrangements.

Note: The Senior Resource Services (SRS) office hours for drop-in assistance are Monday, Wednesday and Friday from 10 a.m. to noon. The SRS office is located in the Cribari Center across from the Post Office. You may also leave a message at 408-239-5253. The purpose of SRS is to provide education and general business and financial information. All assistance is free and confidential. You should ask your professional adviser about your individual situation.





Fitness Center's recent ADA audit results

Villages management recently had an ADA consultant complete an audit on the fitness equipment layout in the Fitness Center. The Fitness Center building itself has been ADA compliant since it was built. There was concern, however, about the layout of the fitness equipment especially when considering new or additional equipment. The Villages is required to provide equal access and opportunity to individuals with disabilities including those in wheelchairs and other supportive devices.

The audit did find that some of the fitness equipment was not positioned in a way that allowed for access for those with disabilities. Those pieces of equipment were repositioned or moved. Repositioning allows them to be accessed from either the front or side. At least one "type" of exercise equipment must have clear floor space of 30" by 48" and a slope of 2 percent. One type means one treadmill, one cross trainer, one bicep curl and so on. The Fitness Center has many pieces of equipment that are the only one of that type. Please be mindful that The Villages is required to be in ADA compliance at all times. Please do not move the equipment. The benches are often moved around the facility. Please leave them in place.

"Presidents of War" by Michael Beschloss: Presidential historian Michael Beschloss uses original letters, diaries, declassified documents, and interviews to bring us into the room and the minds of a procession of Chief Executives who took the nation into major conflicts, mobilized Americans for victory, and seized greater power for themselves. From James Madison and the War of 1812 to Lyndon Johnson and Vietnam, these leaders struggle with Congress, the courts, the press, their own advisers, and antiwar protesters, seeking comfort from their spouses, families, and friends, and dropping to their knees in prayer. Understand how these Presidents were able to withstand the pressures of war both physically and emotionally or were broken by them. Nonfiction 355, Military Science, 2018.

"Lake Success" by Gary Shteyngart: When his dream of the perfect marriage, the perfect son, and the perfect life implodes, Barry Cohen, a self-made Wall Street millionaire takes a crosscountry bus trip in search of his college sweetheart, whom he hasn't seen or spoken to in years, searching for the ideals of youth. Meanwhile, reeling from the fight that caused Barry's departure, his super-smart wife Seema has her own demons to face. Fiction 2018.

"The Good Fight" by Danielle Steel: The child of prominent Manhattan lawyers, Meredith McKenzie is destined for top schools, elite social circles, and the perfect marriage. Spending her childhood in Germany as her father prosecutes Nazi war criminals at the Nuremberg trials, Meredith soaks up the conflict between good and evil as it plays out in real time. Later in the U.S., she blazes her own trail, determined to become a lawyer despite her traditional, conservative father's objections. She forges a lifelong friendship with a young German Jewish woman whose family died in the concentration camps. And while her grandfather rises to the Supreme Court, Meredith enlists in the most pressing causes of her time, fighting for civil rights and an end to the Vietnam War. Encompassing the remarkable people Meredith meets, the historic events she witnesses, and the sacrifices she must make, this is the story of a woman changing her world as she herself is changed by it. "White River Burning" by John Verdon: Tensions run high in White River as it approaches the one-year anniversary of a fatal shooting of a black motorist by a local police officer. The economically depressed, racially polarized city is on edge, confronted with angry demonstrations, arson, and looting. In the midst of the turmoil, a White River police officer is murdered by an unknown sniper. As the town spirals out of control, local authorities approach Dave Gurney to conduct an independent investigation of the shooting. More killings occur in what appears to be an escalating sequence of retaliations, but when Gurney questions the true nature of the bloodshed his involvement is suddenly terminated. Obsessed with evidence that doesn't support the official version of events, and despite intense opposition from the police, he begins to uncover an astonishing structure of deception, learning that nothing in White River is what it seems. "Between You & Me" by Susan Wiggs: Caught between two worlds, Caleb Stoltz is bound by a deathbed promise to raise his orphaned niece and nephew in Middle Grove, where life revolves around family, farm, faith, and long-held suspicions about outsiders. When disaster strikes, Caleb is thrust into an urban environment of high-tech medicine and the relentless rush of modern life. When a shocking accident brings Caleb into her life, Reese is forced to deal with a situation that challenges everything she thinks she knows, and ultimately emboldens her to question her most powerful beliefs. Then one impulsive act brings about a clash of cultures in a tug-of-war that plays out in a courtroom, challenging the very nature of justice and reverberating through generations, straining the fragile threads of faith and family. 

Sudden Cardiac Arrest (SCA) is a condition in which the heart quivers instead of effectively pumping blood throughout the body and strikes 325,000 people of all ages every year. AEDs are the definitive treatment for this condition, but for each minute that passes before defibrillation therapy reaches a victim, the chances for survival decrease by 10 percent. The American Heart Association estimates that 40,000 lives can be saved each year with AEDs that reach victims within 3-5 minutes of collapse, which is why we are pleased to have an AED program on our campus. Once turned on, the AED will talk the responder through the steps of using the AED and applying chest compressions.



Dealer has maybe 2 losers in Spades, possibly a Heart and a Diamond loser, and some losers in Clubs. Strategy: Need to trump the Club losers before pulling all

the trumps. and try to set up the Diamonds after taking out the trumps.

West leads the Jack of Clubs, King from the board, East covers with the Ace, switches to the 7 of Diamonds, South, 2, and West wins with the King. He plays a Heart, East, the Jack, South, the Queen, then leads a Club, trumps it on the board, plays a Heart, and wins with the Ace. He follows with his last Club, trumps it on the board with the King. He next plays a Diamond to the Ace in his hand, and switches to the 9 of Hearts to collect the last trump. He then plays a Spade, West takes the trick with the Ace, follows with a Club, South sluffs a Spade from the board, trumps the Club in his hand, and now leads a Spade to the King on the board. He plays the good Queen of Diamonds, and leads his last card on the board, a Diamond, and trumps it in his hand. Great! The contract is made with an overtrick. This is a difficult game to bid since the opener only has 10 HCP.


* Some players in the balancing seat (fourth seat) might pass. While other players might consider bidding since there have been three passes so far. Then that leaves the possibility of all the hands having about 10 HCP and that is enough for a partial game. Thus, these players will take the chance of bidding instead of allowing the deal to be passed out.
