Walking towards Building B the other day I was struck by how nice it is—the area in front of the office buildings. Sharp, clean and inviting pathways, green areas, triangle and rectangle shaped. That area looks nice! Look at it with new eyes next time you go there.

Envision that look, much expanded, for the Gazebo. Lots of intersecting paths that would allow wheelchairs and people with walkers and canes to have access. Green areas (could be artificial grass!) with picnic tables that seat eight! Tables which easy are to sit at and are easily accessible from a nearby path. The Gazebo redesign is taking too long, have we lost interest? In the past several years, too many picnics have gone unattended by our handicapped residents. As a retirement community we owe those residents an accessible picnic area to enjoy. This area doesn't need a new large structure; it needs the ground flattened out with paths which would be accessible to many handicapped residents who would like to be able to attend the summer picnics.

In a March 28, 2019 Villager Pulse letter Mike Swiontek, attempts to calculate how much outside tournaments with 28 golfers affect our Club assessment. His analysis is simplistic and flawed in several ways. First, it fails to consider there is more than one tournament per month. Second, most tournaments have more than 28 golfers. Third, sometimes there are two tournaments in a day bringing in even more outside revenue. Fourth, it completely fails to consider revenue from sales in the Pro Shop and food and beverage sales (including alcohol). Any Villager who wants to play golf on a weekend can find a tee time. Get up a little earlier or play a little later. We have lived here four years and play every Saturday and Sunday. Outside revenue is important because it keeps our dues down. In this day and age of failing golf courses (Rancho Cañada, Roddy Ranch, Diablo Grande, Ridgemark, Stevinson Ranch, Sunol Valley) revenue is even more important because if the course does not generate the revenue the alternative is homeowners' dues go up or worse—our golf course may not be here for long.

## Water District property tax exemption

If you are a low-income senior, you may qualify to have one of your parcel taxes removed from next December's property tax bill. If you qualify, act quickly. You must apply by June 30, 2019. First, dig out your 2018-2019 property tax bill. Look at the list of Parcel Tax / Special Assessments in the center of the bill. Is there a line labeled "728 SCVWD Safe, Clean Water"? The Santa Clara Valley Water District offers a property tax exemption from this special assessment for qualifying low-income seniors. Now is the time to request an exemption for your 2019/2020 property tax assessment.

To qualify you must be 65 years or older by June 30, 2020 – i.e. the end of the 2019/2020 property tax year. The qualifying senior or his/her revocable living trust must be listed as an owner on the deed and the senior must live in the property as his/her primary residence. Rentals units you own do not qualify. Only one owner needs to be age 65.

Your 2018 total household income must have been less than \$53,854. Social Security and other nontaxable income must be included in your calculation of income. You are not required to send in any proof of income, but you sign the application under penalty of perjury that you meet the income requirement.

This income limit is based on 75 percent of California's Median Household Income so it changes every year. The income limit started at \$32,850 in 2000 and has now increased to \$53,854 – a measure of inflation in California in nineteen years.

Once you have qualified for this exemption, you will receive a verification form by mail each April. You verify that the address is still your personal residence and that your income does not exceed the new income limitation.

The application form is available at the SRS office or online at www.valleywater.org. You will need to attach a copy of your driver's license or some other document to prove your age. Don't delay; the application is due by June 30.

Note: The Senior Resource Services (SRS) office hours for drop-in assistance are Monday, Wednesday and Friday from 10 a.m. to noon. The SRS office is in the Cribari Center across from the Post Office. You may also leave a message at 408-239-5253. The purpose of SRS is to provide education and general business and financial information. All assistance is free and confidential. You should ask your professional advisor about your individual situation.

## Estimated tax due April 15

We are sure you will remember your tax returns are due April 15, but don't forget that if you file forms 1040ES and 540ES, the first payment for the 2019 estimated tax is also due. Yes, we agree, it is unfair that the filing of 2018 returns and the first payment for 2019 are due the same day.

Rather than mailing a check to the IRS, you may use the online Direct Pay Service. Go to www. irs.gov and click on the box labeled "Make a payment" and then "Bank account – direct pay." There is no fee to use the online Direct Pay service. There is also no fee to use the online Web Pay service to pay your Franchise Tax Board California tax. Go to www.ftb.CA.gov and click on "Pay" and then "Web pay" (no fee).





First of all, thank you so very much for reviewing and updating (if needed) your HO6 insurance policy per the Association's governing documents and master insurance policy. As something that can be counted on, Villagers are immeasurably conscientious and consistently come through when asked. Your prompt attention to this very important requirement, along with sending in your Certificate of Insurance, is very much appreciated.

For the past couple of years, Association members have also complied with California Civil Code Section 4041(a), and for that too, we are grateful. What is California Civil Code Section 4041, and specifically, 4041 (a)? Well as you may know, The Villages Association is a common interest development (CID) subject to California Civil Code Sections 4000-6150 (also known as the Davis-Stirling Act). Effective in 2017, Civil Code Section 4041(a) was added requiring all CID owners (owners of condominiums) to annually and in writing, provide the HOA (The Villages Association), their contact information for sending HOA notices, and to inform the Association whether the residence is owner-occupied or rented out.

In addition, per Civil Code Section 4041(b), associations are required to solicit these notices from owners at least 30 days prior to the annual association disclosures. For The Villages Association, that includes the Annual Budget Report and Annual Policy Statements that are distributed in May. If an owner fails to provide these notices, the last address provided in writing by the owners, or if none, the property address shall be deemed to be the address to which notices are to be delivered.

## Cindy Chavez speaks to Democratic Club



## Kelly Nguyen to speak on Sepsis at SIR 38

Kelly Nguyen, RN, MSN, PHN, will be the speaker at SIR 38 luncheon meeting on Tuesday, April 16 in the Fairway Room at the Villages Clubhouse. Non-SIR members wishing to attend the presentation should arrive at the Clubhouse at 12:30 p.m.

Ms. Nguyen will present "Sepsis – Understanding and Recognizing the Symptoms." Sepsis is the leading cause of death for hospitalized patients, outnumbering deaths from AIDS, breast and prostate cancer. It is a major problem for patients 65 and older. Sepsis is a potentially life-threatening condition caused by the body's response to an infection. The body normally releases chemicals into the bloodstream to fight an infection. Sepsis occurs when the body's response to these chemicals is out of balance, triggering changes that can damage multiple organ systems.



With a background in emergency nursing and performance improvement, Ms. Nguyen earned a master's degree in nursing administration with the completion of the field study: "Sepsis Performance Improvement: The Role of the Registered Nurse." As the Manager of Sepsis Quality, Ms. Nguyen's responsibilities include: education of multiple levels of frontline staff, facilitating compliance with sepsis quality measures and spearheading improvement efforts related to the care of patients with varying degrees of sepsis. Ms. Nguyen has presented at international, national, regional and local venues such as: the International Sepsis Forum and the Surviving Sepsis Campaign. Most recently Ms. Nguyen has initiated a regional collaboration of sepsis coordinators and is honored to be a network adviser for the Sepsis Alliance's Sepsis

For some to accept the solid facts about life, you have to make it palatable, similar to the way my mother chose to feed some of us. She would break it down in such a way that it would be easy for us to swallow.


## **JEWISH GROUP**





The stream and pond repair on #9 & #18 has been delayed due to persistent inclement weather. The liner needs to dry for 10-14 days before repairs can starts. We hope to complete this project in late April if the weather will cooperate.

The first week of May, we will be repairing the ramps on hole #5 and #10 and adding a new material for safe foot traffic. This walking material will also be installed on the bridges on holes #9 and #18 at the same time.

The golf course landscaping areas will all be upgraded starting April 17. We will remove all the wooden dowels and add new fresh bark and landscaping plants and rocks to these areas. Some areas will also have nice borders installed around the landscaping. This will create a consistent and clean look to all of our landscaping on the golf course.

Tips from the Pro - Scott Steele

The Pressure Principle...

How often do you focus on your grip pressure, or pressure points? My guess is probably not often. But the fact of the matter is, grip pressure and how the fingers and hands hold the club are extremely important. Here are a few scenarios to think about:

**Grip pressure**...in golf, a softer grip pressure is preferable to a tight grip which inhibits wrist action and the resultant club lag needed to create speed.

Pressure points...feel the last three fingers of your left hand and the right thumb and forefinger as the pressure points...do not squeeze the grip with all of your fingers nor your palm. Deep Rough...to keep the club stable and avoid fast twisting in the rough, grip the handle tighter when playing out of deep rough.

High-soft pitch...in order to create a soft landing approach, reduce your grip pressure by 20 percent when hitting a high, soft pitch shot around the green.

If you tend to slice the ball, think about relaxing your left hand, and increasing the pressure on your right thumb and forefinger.

If you tend to hook the ball, try relaxing your right hand and increasing the pressure on the last 3 fingers of your left hand.




