Please plan on attending a Wildfire Preparedness Town Hall Meeting on Monday, October 14, from 3:30 p.m. to 5 p.m. in the



On Friday, the 13th, I contacted the corporate yard which had no record of my original work request. I sent them a copy of their original email. On Monday the 15th, it started to rain. At 8AM, I was awoken by hammering while the rain poured down. I think all work requests should be assigned a work order number before notifying the appropriate manager so they can be tracked thru the system. I question the quality of the work performed by this contractor given my experience. Our maintenance manager told me he had notified the contractor at the time of my original request but he was not permitted to force the contractor to act. I suggested that the contractor manager should contact me so they could receive a piece of my mind in a less restrictive manner. (199 words)

Beware of the latest PG&E telephone scam

A Villager informed Public Safety about a recent attempted PG&E scam. The callers represent themselves as PG&E agents. The caller says the account holder is late on a bill and PG&E will shut the power off the same day if the targeted person does not make a credit card payment over the phone. The caller then gives a secondary phone number for the account holder to call. (It is important to note that the caller ID shows "PG&E", but it is not a real PG&E phone number.)

If you get such a call, you may call the PG&E customer service number at 1-800-743-5000, if there any doubts about the origin of the call. PG&E's policy for non-payment is, 15 day, 48 hours written notice followed by an automated phone call.

Public Safety Tips to Avoid Scams

Many scams are aimed at senior citizens, and the reasons are obvious. Senior citizens are, in general, more trusting than younger persons; often live alone; and often have cash on hand, or other assets that can easily be converted into cash. While senior citizens make up approximately 12 percent of the population, they account for approximately 33 percent of all fraud victims. There are a few key things that you can do to avoid being a victim of a scam:

- 1. Let common sense be your guide. Do not let greed influence your decision-making process. Sleep on it. There is no need to rush into a decision. A reputable offer will wait (fraudulent offers won't).
- 2. Remember, there are very few things in this world that are free. So beware of any offer that says it is free.
- 3. Look out for "You Have Won" solicitations. These are common practices to lure you in. You cannot win a contest that you did not enter.
- 4. Seek the opinion of others. Have someone review the offer with you. Reputable offers will withstand the scrutiny of others.
- 5. Keep your vital information to yourself. Be very wary of anyone asking for your date of birth, Social Security number, credit card numbers, or PIN (personal identification number).
- 6. Some scams target your emotions, supposedly coming from a friend or family member in trouble. Think rationally before you make a snap decision based on emotion.

Also, be very wary of products or services that have a delayed delivery. The dishonest con artist could be in another state by the time the promised delivery date arrives.

Club and Association Boards met for regularly scheduled September meetings

The Villages Association and Club Boards of Directors met Tuesday, September 24 for their regularly scheduled meetings in Foothill Center.

Numerous items of business were discussed and voted upon.

Association Operating Financial Commentary

For the month of August 2019

August Operating Statement Review: Revenue was \$700 unfavorable to the budget of \$856,000 for the month, mostly due to less than planned third-party assessments and laundry concession fees.

Expenditures for the month were \$51,600 (5.4 percent) unfavorable to the budget of \$949,100. The most significant unfavorable to budget expense category was water with a \$33,500 negative budget variance (\$354,000 actual vs. budget of \$320,600) spread throughout most of the districts. The water variance shown in the August financial statements reflects the actual bi-monthly water bill for July and August. For FY20, the allocation of monthly water budgets was determined by using an average of usage for the past two fiscal years (FY18 and FY19). With most districts showing higher usage in July and August for FY19, this methodology skewed the monthly budget allocation downward for these summer months. The annual water budget should be adequate, barring any unusual dry weather for the remainder of the fiscal year. Required irrigation maintenance and repair expenses were also significantly higher than budget (\$39,600 actual vs. budget of \$18,200). The most notable favorable to budget expense category was repair and maintenance (\$18,300 actual vs. budget of \$22,400). The net negative operating budget variance for the month of August was \$52,300.

Year-to-date (two months of operations), total revenue is \$1,600 unfavorable to the budget of \$1,711,800 due to less than planned laundry concession fees, third party assessments and golf cart electricity and storage fees. Year-to-date, total operating expenditures are \$1,966,100 or 2.5 percent higher than the budget of \$1,917,400. The negative budget variance can be attributed to water expense that is \$33,500 or 5.2 percent higher than the budget of \$641,100, as well as irrigation maintenance expense that is \$29,700 or 89 percent higher than the YTD budget of \$33,200.

The year-to-date net negative operating budget variance is \$50,200.

Club Operating Financial Commentary

For the month of August 2019

August Operating Statement Review:

Total revenue was \$7,300 unfavorable to budget, 0.6 percent less than the budget of \$1,263,200. The most significant unfavorable to budget revenue category was green fees coming in \$6,600 (4.5 percent) lower than the budget of \$145,800, primarily from a decrease in 18-hole member play. Resident activities income was also unfavorable to budget (\$22,100 actual vs. budget of \$27,800) due to timing. On the positive side, food sales surpassed the budget for the month by \$10,100 or 4.8 percent.

Total expenditures were \$1,400 unfavorable to budget or 0.1 percent higher than the budget of \$1,257,000. Notable expense categories favorable to budget (both due to timing) were tree trimming (actual \$2,500 vs. budget of \$9,700) and resident activities expense (\$27,800 actual vs. budget of \$33,200). The most significant unfavorable to budget expense category was professional fees (\$18,000 actual vs. budget of \$9,800) due to HR consultant, offset in lower employee expense as the search for an HR Manager continues. Other notable expense categories unfavorable to budget were as follows: employee expense (\$718,900 actual vs. budget of \$712,100) with \$9,600 in temporary outside labor utilized for the restaurant; irrigation supplies/maintenance (actual \$11,700 vs. budget of \$5,300); and printing expense (actual \$14,600 vs. budget of \$8,600) due to timing of the *Resource Guide* printing. **The net negative operating budget variance for the month of August was \$8,700. See table below.**

Year-to-date revenue is \$9,000 favorable to budget, 0.4 percent higher than the budget of \$2,470,000. Year-to-date expenditures are \$41,000 favorable to budget, 1.6 percent less than the budget of \$2,533,000. **The year-to-date net positive operating budget variance is \$50,000.** See table on the next page for detail by department.

The bottom of the table on the next page shows the financial impact of the monthly solar lease payments and contribution to the balloon payment fund (to be paid in 2023) captured on the Club's balance sheet. The YTD total for these two items is \$38,000.

The above table shows Community Activities with a \$22,000 net positive variance mostly from less than planned resident activities expense, operating supplies and employee expense. Public Safety shows a \$12,000 net positive variance mostly from less than planned employee expense. The community centers have

an \$11,000 net positive variance from favorable intra-company cost transfers and utilities expense. Golf Course/Pro shop has a \$10,000 positive variance from less than planned chemical supplies and tree trimming expense (due to timing).

Homeowners' Operating Financial Commentary

For the month of August 2019


August Operating Statement Review: Revenue tracked budget at \$3,309 (non-Estates single family homes). Expenditures for the month were \$56 favorable to budget due to less than planned legal fees. The year-to-date net positive operating budget variance is \$112 (legal fees).

Estates revenue for the month was on budget at \$13,112. Expenditures were \$1,618 unfavorable to budget, 9 percent higher than the budget of \$18,045 due to higher than planned water expense (actual \$11,676 vs. budget of \$9,320), offset by less than planned irrigation maintenance expense and planting expense. All other expenditure categories were close to budget for the month. **The year-to-date net** negative operating budget variance is \$1,815 (water expense).





SRS SENIOR RESOURCE SERVICES

Do you wish to change your Medicare plan?

Health insurance companies may revise premiums, coverage of their Medicare health Advantage (HMO) plans, Medigap (also known as Supplement plan or PPO) and drug plans and add or drop providers and pharmacies from their networks at the time of Medicare Annual Enrollment Period (AEP).

The Medicare AEP opens October 15 and runs through December 7. During this period existing Medicare beneficiaries already enrolled in Advantage plan or Medigap and Part D plans may replace their Medicare Advantage, Medigap and Part D plan with the one they prefer for any reason such as better coverage, lower copays, etc.; there is nothing to change in Medicare Part A and Part B. You may be subject to rating based on your health and a higher premium when you make a plan change; you may even be denied enrollment into the new plan based on your preexisting condition.

Note that neither a Medigap plan nor a Part D plan is mandatory but think twice before dropping either one altogether if you already have them. You might not be able to reenroll in or get one down the road when your health deteriorates and if you get lucky enough to get one, you may end up paying higher premiums for both and a penalty for Part D for life.

Villagers in a Medicare health or prescription drug plan should always review the materials their plans send them, like the "Evidence of Coverage" (EOC) and "Annual Notice of Change" (ANOC). If your plan is changing, you should make sure your plan will still meet your needs for 2020. If your list of medications changed during 2019, it might be beneficial to you to change your free-standing Part D Plan that is not part of Medicare Advantage Plan.

When making a plan change, consider its STAR rating that Medicare assigns all the plans based on their past performance and anything specific you are looking for in the plan. Also, note that the Part D pharmacy you are used to in the current year may become non-preferred pharmacy next year which means your copay may go up. Ask your pharmacy if it will continue to be a preferred pharmacy for your drug plan before the AEP expires, and if not, choose a preferred pharmacy; no enrollment in a preferred pharmacy is required in such a case.

The Villages is fortunate to have a HICAP counselor who comes to the SRS office the fourth Thursday morning of each month.

If you wish to change your Medicare plan, consult your Medicare counselor and bring all your medications. When in doubt about your appointment with the Medicare counselor, make a proactive effort to confirm your appointment with Sourcewise 408-350-3200.

The California Department of Aging trained registered, rigorously trained HICAP (Health Insurance Counseling & Advocacy Program) counselors provide personalized, unbiased guidance for you.

SRS is calling your early attention to the enrollment period, so you have time to think about your needs.

Note: The Senior Resource Services (SRS) office hours for drop-in assistance are Monday, Wednesday and Friday from 10 a.m. to noon. The SRS office is in the Cribari Center across from the Post Office. You may also leave a message at 408-239-5253. The purpose of SRS is to provide education and general business and financial information. All assistance is free and confidential. You should ask your professional adviser about your individual situation.



Chinese Club to sponsor Artificial Intelligence talk

The Chinese Club's upcoming "Tech Talk" series is about Artificial Intelligence ("Al"), a very complex but essential topic. This talk will take place at Vineyard Center from 7 to 9 p.m., on Tuesday, October 1. Since there is limited space, we require you to pre-register by emailing to Albert Chan at cchan108@gmail. com to get a confirmation.

What is "Al" and why should you be interested? "Al" is a computer program designed for tasks normally requiring human intelligence (a human's ability to learn). It is not only a promise for the future, it is actually all around us today, maybe in names and forms we don't realize is Al. Siri, Google Now, and Cortana are all examples. It's also in vacuum cleaners, cars, lawnmowers, video games, Hollywood special effects, e-commerce software, medical research and international finance markets, etc. and growing faster than you can ever imagine.

Al holds significant promise as a superior tool for providing senior care. It can now be found in every step of the care-pathway, starting from intelligent tracking of biometric information to early diagnosis of diseases. Al is helping patients and their families understand the treatment pathways. It is also helping clinicians to treat the conditions more efficiently.

Family care partners currently shoulder much of the burden of caring for aging loved ones who remain in their homes, but Al-powered sensors and devices may take on a leading role over the next few years. As a budding technology, Al also comes with many unknowns. For example, if the human touch is fundamental to healthcare, can Al ever step in to play a role in the softer side of care?

To help you learn and understand more about AI, we are bringing in the Head of Emerging Artificial Intelligence at Intel, Abigail Hing Wen, to give you an educational Talk on Al. "Labyrinth" by Catherine Coulter: Another entry in the Savich/Sherlock FBI series. One afternoon, Agent Sherlock is driving in downtown Washington when her Volvo is suddenly T-boned at an intersection. As her car spins out of control, a man's body slams against her windshield and then - blackness. When she regains consciousness, she's told about the accident and the man she struck. From DNA, they discover he is Justice Cummings, a CIA analyst at Langley, and he's still missing. Meanwhile, in the small town of Gaffer's Ridge, Virginia, Special Agent Griffin Hammersmith rescues Carson DeSilva, a kidnapped woman who claims her captor had probably murdered three missing teenage girls. However, the man she accuses is the local sheriff's nephew and a member of a very powerful family, reputed to have special powers. When the sheriff arrests Griffin, he calls on Savich for help. Together they weave their way through a labyrinth of lies to find the truth of a terrible secret. Mystery, 2019.

"Life Will Be the Death of Me" by Chelsea Handler: The funny, sad, super-honest, all-true story of Chelsea Handler's year of self-discovery—featuring a nerdily brilliant psychiatrist, a shaman, four Chow Chows, some well-placed security cameras, various family members (living and departed), friends, assistants, and a lot of edibles. Non-fiction, 920 Biography, 2019.

"Summer of '69" by Elin Hilderbrand: It's 1969, and for the Levin family, the times they are a-changing. Every year the children have looked forward to spending the summer at their grandmother's historic home in downtown Nantucket. But like so much else in America, nothing is the same: Blair, the oldest sister, is marooned in Boston, pregnant with twins and unable to travel. Middle sister Kirby, caught up in the thrilling vortex of civil rights protests and determined to be independent, takes a summer job on Martha's Vineyard. Only-son Tiger is an infantry soldier, recently deployed to Vietnam. Thirteen-year-old Jessie suddenly feels like an only child, marooned in the house with her out-of-touch grandmother and her worried mother, each of them hiding a troubling secret. As the summer heats up, Ted Kennedy sinks a car in Chappaquiddick, man flies to the moon, and Jessie and her family experience their own dramatic upheavals along with the rest of the country. Fiction and Large Print, 2019.

"Someone We Know" by Shari Lapena: In a quiet, leafy suburb in upstate New York, a teenager has been sneaking into houses, and into the owners' computers as well, learning their secrets, and maybe sharing some of them, too. Who is he, and what might he have uncovered? After two anonymous letters are received, whispers start to circulate, and suspicion mounts. And when a woman down the street is found murdered, the tension reaches the breaking point. Who killed her? Who knows more than they're telling? And how far will all these very nice people go to protect their own secrets? In this neighborhood it's not just the husbands and wives who play games. Here, everyone in the family has something to hide. You never really know what people are capable of. Fiction, 2019.

"The Old Drift" by Namwali Serpell: On the banks of the Zambezi River, a few miles from the majestic Victoria Falls, there was once a colonial settlement called the Old Drift. In 1904, in a smoky room at the hotel across the river, an Old Drifter named Percy M. Clark, foggy with fever, makes a mistake that entangles the fates of an Italian hotelier and an African busboy. This sets off a cycle of unwitting retribution among three Zambian families (black, white, brown) as they meet and converge over the course of the century, into the present and beyond. Three families. Four generations. Fates collide as a nation is born and drifts toward ruin. Or is it revolution? Fiction, 2019.

What a wonderful pageant of color, music and raw emotion. Senior Academy: $Global\ Economy-date\ correction$

The past decades have seen a dramatic expansion in Global Trade. But is globalization now in danger? Recent developments around the world such as slowing trade growth, Brexit, and the current trade war with China have prompted many to fear that forces of globalization are going in reverse.

Specially designed to help Villagers gain a better understanding of the workings of The Global Economy, the Senior Academy is offering course a new two-session on **Wednesdays**, **October 9 and 16** (please note last week's Villager incorrectly said "Tuesdays") at 2 p.m. in the Vineyard Center. The course literally echoes the current newspaper headlines in its content.

This course will offer a clear and easily-understandable overview of how the global economy works: focusing on international commerce, cross-border investment, the effect of tariffs, and how policies should be crafted in an economically interconnected world. Special emphasis will be placed on how recent events may affect the American economy.

The course will be taught by a faculty member at Santa Clara University, Dr. Adina Ardelean, who teaches courses in International Economics and Microeconomics at the university. She has been recognized for her teaching and for her research, which focuses on empirical investigations in international trade, with a special emphasis on product differentiation, the gains we receive from trade, the barriers to trade, and political effects of tariff policies.

October Art Film: 'Rothko 1903-1970'



On Tuesday, October 8 at 7 p.m. in the Vineyard Center, the Villages Arts and Crafts Association will present lsy Morgansztern's "Rothko 1903-1970: An Abstract Humanist." Latvia, Russia-born Marcus Rothkovitch became Mark Rothko and a U.S. citizen on February 21, 1936. There are many puzzling stories about Rothko but the strength of this film is in the telling of his artistic journey in such an easy to follow way. It's complicated. Unlike other films we have seen, the artist himself is not present. His son, Christopher, just 6 years old when his father died, presents a 30-minute commentary about his father. Older sister Kate Rothko only makes a brief appearance. Art historians, artists and acquaintances lead us through this self-taught painter's work. His mission was to find art's meaning and then find how to execute that meaning into action for the viewer so that each one would "experience" a breakthrough on an immediate primitive level bypassing thought. The discussion for Rothko was not about color itself. Color, shape and form provided the means to the drama, which was the experience. The artist was not as important as his viewer's reaction. This may have been why his last masterpiece was the Rothko Chapel on the campus of the University of St. Thomas in Houston, TX. What this film succeeds at is showing us how to approach Rothko differently. Join us for this learning experience.



Had it not been for a young clergyman who re-directed my goal as a college sophomore, athletics would very likely have been my life's career. As it is now, I am just a fan in the stands.

There is a big difference between a fan or a follower of the team. The difference is the level of commitment. The ball park is filled with fans when the team is winning but loyalty fades and attendance drops and only the followers are present to watch the team become a "cellar dweller."

As I look back upon my ministry, I sense that I have often encouraged others to consider becoming fans of Jesus instead of followers. I made the mistake of trying to make Christian life Jesus offered as attractive as possible as if they joined up and became a fan of his, assuming that He would take care of them.

One day Jesus was speaking to a large crowd who became instant fans when they saw him miraculously feed 5000 of them. They saw him as their "free meal ticket." Their level of commitment to him dropped when he described the difference between a fan and a follower. He said to the crowd: "If any of you want to be my follower, you must identify with me and my program all the time." He called it "discipleship" Luke 9:23

To be a follower of Jesus involves more than:

- regular church attendance
- wearing a cross on a chain

owning one or more Bibleshaving you name and photo in the church directory

Following Jesus is more than being an admirer of him. It involves a committed relationship. It's the difference between sitting in the bleachers or competing on the field. Unfortunately, a church can be a stadium where people sit and cheer for Jesus on Sunday morning but have little interest

in following him the rest of the week. There is an investment involved for being a follower of Jesus, but the retirement benefits are out of this world!





FROM THE PRO

2019 Club Championship Results—After three long weeks, the men's and women's club championships are both complete. The competition was great and the camaraderie was even better. This is what country club golf is all about, good friends and good competition.

First of all, many congratulations to Monica Saneholtz who captured the 2019 Women's 18-hole Club Championship for the 15th time. Yes, I said 15 times! Monica plays very steady golf...hits fairways and greens and has a very competent short game. Monica also practices regularly (see it works!) and it shows. Our course from the #3 Tees plays difficult for the women due to its length; and Monica shot excellent scores of 85, 87, 82...a mark of consistency. Helen VarenKamp was the runner up shooting 82, 96 & 87.

Outplay, outwit, outlast, that is the motto for a match play club championship as was the case for the men's club. The dynamics of match play are quite different than that of stroke play, as the one on one nature of the game can be mentally challenging. Cheers to Jim Holt, our 2019 Men's Club Champion! Jim had to win three tough matches to claim the title. Jim beat Dave Dimmick 4 & 2 in round one, then took out Steve Grady 3 & 1 in the semis, and then outlasted Runner-Up Patrick Walter to capture the 36-hole final match by a score of 5 & 4. Jim played steady golf and his short game was ice-cold, which is what he needed to defeat his formidable opponents. This is the second Club Championship title for Jim as he also won in 2013. Jim told me, "in 2013, I thought it was beginners luck...this time it was all me." And it was, well played Jim!!

Play it Forward—Wouldn't it be fun if we could all have the capacity to be putting for birdie on every golf hole we play? Well the reality is that we can! Here at The Villages, we have five (5) sets of tees for you to choose from. All five sets of tees are rated and sloped for both men and women and are available for anyone to play at any time. The difference between the tees is the yardage each hole plays and the resultant total yardage of the golf course. The #5 Tees play at 6,630 total yards; the #4 Tees play at 6,306 yards; the #3 Tees play at 5,701 yards; the #2 tees play at 4,935 yards; and the #1 Tees play at 4,031 yards. That is a 5%-10% difference between each set of tees and a 40% difference between the #5 tees and the #1 Tees. So we have something for everyone to enjoy. And as we all age, it makes sense to move forward one tee box at a time so that we can maintain our ability to hit the greens in regulation. For instance, I am 52 years old...me and my college golf team mates used to always play the furthest back tees on every course we played, now we all know we do not hit it as far, and we have all moved up one tee box at every course we play, and we are having a blast and our egos have not been affected at all! So I suggest that you try to "Play it Forward" and move up one tee box and see how much fun it is. Here is another suggestion:

Handicap 0-9 Play the #5 Tees

Handicap 10-18 Play the #4 Tees

Handicap 19-27 Play the #3 Tees

Handicap 28-39 Play the #2 Tees

Handicap 40+ Play the #1 Tees

Tips from the Pro – Scott Steele: Just Like Tossing Horseshoes...

Many, many golfers have problems with chipping and pitching, and a lot of it comes down to confidence. Pitch shots in the 20 - 50 yard range are tricky. You need to have a good feel for the distance required before you hit the shot, otherwise you'll have a lack of confidence over these shots. And a lack of confidence over a golf shot is a killer. So here's a way to improve your feel and confidence on these pitch shots. Go out to a practice green, or even in your backyard, and spend five minutes or so tossing balls underhand onto the practice green, or to a set target at home. Doing this will help your rhythm and tempo when you go to pitch a ball, because the tempo and rhythm used to toss a ball should be similar to the tempo and rhythm required to hit good pitch shots. When you are underhand tossing the balls you should be aware of how your hand adjusts to produce different trajectories and distances. So, experiment and toss the ball at different trajectories and from different distances away from your target. Feel and notice the difference in your actions. After underhand tossing balls for at least 5 minutes, then hit some pitch shots from the distances you've been at. I employ this method all the time, and if you play golf with me, you will even see me pretend to toss a ball underhand to get the feel of a pitch shot, how high to hit it and where to land it. Dealer has maybe 1 Spade loser, 1 Heart loser, 2 or 3 Diamond losers and 2 losers in Clubs.

Strategy: Hope the Ace of Diamonds is in West's hand and let the opponents take a Club trick and trump the third Club on the board.

West leads the 6 of Hearts, 7 from the board, East wins with the 10, follows with the Queen of Clubs, South the Ace, switches to a Diamond, and West wins with the Ace. He plays a Heart, 9 from the board, East, the Jack, South trumps, then leads a Club. East takes the trick with Jack, and switches to a Diamond, and this time, West trumps. He then plays a Heart, King from the board, East, the Ace, and South trumps. He leads the 8 of Clubs, West, the King, South trumps on the board, continues with the Ace of Spades, then leads the last spade in dummy, plays the King from his hand and captures West's Queen. He next plays a Diamond to the King on the board, then leads the good Queen of Hearts, and plays the last card from dummy, the Jack of Diamonds, East, the Queen, and South covers with his last card, a trump. Great! The contract is made with an overtrick. This is not an easy hand to play. By the way, some North players would bid 3 Spades but this is not a smart move, since South had originally passed and North's hand has a minimum HCP.




