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# 'Noises Off'—take a look backstage

Attention all Villagers: In order to prepare ourselves for the "Big One," the **Emergency Preparedness Committee** (EPC) is facilitating the annual Earthquake Preparedness Drill on Monday, October 21 at 4 p.m. This involves displaying your **OK Sign** in a prominent place that can be



seen from the sidewalk or street in front of your residence. The EPC wants everyone to view this as if it were an actual disaster, so that when (not "if") it happens we will be truly ready. So, on this day, EPC volunteers will be inspecting every residence for a displayed OK sign, and also respond to specific health and building scenarios, as they would during an actual emergency. If you cannot locate your OK sign, you can pick up another one in Building B. Thanks for your willingness to participate in this important event. Remember, be prepared and be safe.

# Villages Age Certification Survey and Association Smoke and CO Detectors Statement of Compliance

Thank you to all Villagers who have returned the biennial age certification for all residents and for residents of The Villages Association (condos), the annual Association Smoke and CO Detectors Statement of Compliance. Unfortunately, we are still short of the required minimums and need your help. If you have not yet returned your forms, please do so now. Forms are available in Building A and on The Villages website https://resident.thevillagesgcc.com/resource-files/forms.

Age Survey: To continue our community's status as a senior community, The Villages must comply with the state and federal laws that govern California senior housing developments. The Villages Association and Homeowners' Corporation must conduct periodic surveys (every other year) to verify and document that the community is in compliance. Failure to satisfy the legal requirements may result in a determination that our community is not a lawful senior community and therefore would mean that we must allow persons of all ages to live here.

In order to fulfill the requirements imposed upon the Corporations, one resident of your condominium or home must complete and sign the Age Certification (under penalty of perjury). Please note that if you are an offsite owner, you must have one of the tenant(s)/resident(s) complete and sign the Certification. Offsite owners are responsible for ensuring completion and return of the Certification by one of their tenant(s)/resident(s).

Smoke and CO Detectors Statement of Compliance: In order to fulfill the requirements of The Villages Association Policies APo 408 Smoke Detectors Installations, Maintenance, Repair and Replacement and APo 410 Carbon Monoxide (CO) Detectors, each owner is required to inspect (or have inspected by a third party) his/her villa on an annual basis to ensure their detectors(s) are in working order.

State and local laws require a smoke detector in each sleeping room and in the hallway and that a carbon monoxide detector be installed outside of each separate dwelling unit sleeping area. Per the policies, the replacement of smoke detectors is required every ten years and replacement of CO detectors is required every five years. In addition, a statement of compliance shall be demonstrated annually.

Please complete and return the Age Certification (all residents) and Smoke and CO Detectors Compliance forms (for condo residents) as soon as possible:

or drop it in the box located at Building A. (For convenience, additional drop boxes are available; 1) Cribari Center just outside the Post Office and 2) in the parking lot adjacent to Building A.)

We appreciate you taking the time to complete and return these important forms. Please be assured that the information that you provide is used strictly for the Corporation's records and to document our community's compliance with applicable laws and the Association's governing documents. A summary of the age survey results (not including names or addresses) will be made available following completion of the survey.

# Swimming Pool reminders

Cribari, Montgomery and Foothill pools/spas will close for the season starting November 1. Vineyard Pool and spa will be open during usual hours throughout the winter and early spring seasons. Hours for children will remain at 2 p.m. to 4 p.m. daily.

Please note that using pool shower facilities for hair dyeing purposes is **strictly forbidden**. Hair dye leaves permanent or very hard to erase stains on sinks, tiles, grout, shower curtains, etc.

For optimal safety and health, we also ask that all pool users keep these rules in mind:

- Entry into any of the Villages pools is not allowed if you have an open wound or a rash of any kind. This also applies to swimmers who have a communicable disease that is still in an infectious state or while having symptoms such as a cough, cold sores or nasal or ear discharge. This is for your safety as well as for other swimmers.
- No swimmer, young or old, who uses incontinence products (e.g., diapers) should enter pools or spas.
- Remember to shower before you enter the pool or spa—this procedure removes an amazing amount of unwanted residues that would otherwise end up in our pools.



# **SRS SENIOR RESOURCE SERVICES**

# Don't get grounded. Fly with REAL ID.

October 1 began the one-year countdown for the REAL ID requirement. Beginning October 1, 2020, the Federal government will require your driver license or identification card to be REAL ID compliant if you wish to use it as identification to board a domestic flight or to enter military bases and most federal facilities.

This requirement is waived if you have a valid U.S. passport, passport card, military ID, or another form of Transportation Safety Administration (TSA) approved identification (e.g. Global Entry, NEXUS, SENTRI, FAST). You will be able to board a domestic flight using these documents in lieu of a REAL ID.

If you will never fly again, you don't need to get a REAL ID. But are you positive you will not change your mind about flying? What if your granddaughter in Texas gets married, your son in Boston is in a tragic accident or your grandson shocks you and finally graduates from college? If you might possibly fly and do not have a valid passport, you have a year to get to a DMV office and apply for a REAL ID. At the appointment you must be able to: 1) Prove who you are, 2) Prove your Social Security number and 3) Prove your California address.

- **Prove who you are**: Bring a certified U.S. birth certificate, valid U.S. passport, employment authorization document, permanent resident card or foreign passport with an approved form I-94. Name change documents such as a marriage certificate or divorce decree may be required if your identity document is name is different from the name on your REAL ID application.
- Prove your Social Security number: Bring your Social Security card, W-2 or paystub with your full SSN, or a Social Security Administration (SSA) 1099 form. (You may need to order a replacement SS card before your appointment.)
- Prove your California address: Bring two documents that include your physical California resident address. Documents addressed to a PO Box must include the physical resident address on them. Examples of acceptable documents are PG&E bill, medical insurance documents, car registration, bank records, IRS or FTB tax return, and credit card statements.

On the DMV website is a detailed checklist of what you need to bring to your appointment for a REAL ID. Go to www.dmv.ca.gov and enter "REAL ID checklist" in the search box.

Note: The Senior Resource Services (SRS) office hours for drop-in assistance are Monday, Wednesday and Friday from 10 a.m. to noon. The SRS office is in the Cribari Center across from the Post Office. You may also leave a message at 408-239-5253. The purpose of SRS is to provide education and general business and financial information. All assistance is free and confidential. You should ask your professional advisor about your individual situation.



# See 'James Tissot: Fashion & Faith' at Legion of Honor

Legion of Honor has the James Tissot collection on exhibit and we have docent led tours reserved for Thursday, November 7. Anglicized as James Tissot, he was a French painter and illustrator. He was a successful painter of Paris society before moving to London in 1871. He became famous as a genre painter of fashionably dressed women shown in various scenes of everyday life. He also painted scenes and characters from the Bible.

Jacques Tissot was born in the port town of Nantes, France and spent his early childhood there. His father, Marcel Théodore Tissot, was a successful drapery merchant. His mother, Marie Durand, assisted her husband in the family business and designed hats. A devout Catholic, Tissot's mother instilled pious devotion in the future artist from a very young age. Tissot's youth spent in Nantes likely contributed to his frequent depiction of shipping vessels and boats in his later works. The involvement of his parents in the fashion industry is believed to have been an influence on his painting style, as he depicted women's clothing in fine detail. By the time Tissot was 17, he knew he wanted to pursue painting as a career. His father opposed this, preferring his son to follow a business profession, but the young Tissot gained his mother's support for his chosen vocation. Around this time, he began using the given name of James. By 1854 he was commonly known as James Tissot; he may have adopted it because of his increasing interest in everything English.

A song recognizable from Manhattan Transer's version in the early '80's, Birdland was written by Joe Zawinul of the band Weather Report as a tribute to the Birdland nightclub in New York City. We spotlight our flute/piccolo section in a lilting Irish tune, "Pennywhistle Jig," written by Henry Mancini for the movie "The Molly Maguires." "America," from Rogers and Hammerstein's "West Side Story," features vibrantly Hispanic musical style and Latin percussion to highlight the positive qualities of American life.

Finally, the band plays a rousing march composed by Claudio Grafulla that takes its name from and honors the Washington Greys, the 8th Regiment of New York, headquartered at Kingsbridge Armory in the Bronx.

"Under Currents" by Nora Roberts: From the outside, the house in Lakeview Terrace looks perfect and the Bigelows seem like the perfect family. A perfect family in a perfect house living perfect lives. But perfect surfaces can hide dark undercurrents and behind closed doors lies a very different story. Teenager Zane and his younger sister, Britt, are terrorized by their violent father and dysfunctional mother. One dark, brutal night when their father's temper takes a horrifying turn for the worse, the perfect façade is exposed for the lie it is and Zane and Britt manage to escape. With the help of their beloved aunt, they rebuild their lives a day at a time, creating new families and trying to put their past behind them. Can Zane and Britt ever be free of their past? Fiction, 2019.

"Chances Are" by Richard Russo: One beautiful September day, three 66-year-old men convene on Martha's Vineyard, friends ever since meeting in college in the 60s. They couldn't have been more different then, or even today: Lincoln is a commercial real estate broker; Teddy is a tiny-press publisher; and Mickey is a musician beyond his rockin' age. But none of them has ever stopped puzzling over a Memorial Day weekend right here on the Vineyard in 1971. Now, 44 years later, as this new weekend unfolds, three lives and that of a significant other are displayed in their entirety while the distant past confounds the present like a relentless squall of surprise and discovery. "The Red Daughter" by John Burnham Schwartz: In one of the most momentous events of the Cold War, Svetlana Alliluyeva, the only daughter of the Soviet despot Joseph Stalin, abandoned her life in Moscow in 1967, arriving in New York to a nation hungry to hear her story. Persuading herself that all she yearns for is a simple American life, she attempts to settle into a suburban existence in New Jersey. But when this dream ends in disillusionment, Svetlana reaches out to Peter, the one person who understands how the chains of her past still hold her prisoner. As their relationship changes and deepens, unfolding under the eyes of her CIA minders, Svetlana's and Peter's private lives cease to be their own. Fiction, 2019.

"The New Girl" by Daniel Silva: At an exclusive school in Switzerland, mystery surrounds the identity of the beautiful girl who arrives each morning in a motorcade fit for a head of state. In truth, her father is Khalid bin Mohammed, the crown prince of Saudi Arabia. Once celebrated for his daring reforms, he is now reviled for his role in the murder of a dissident journalist. When his child is kidnapped, he turns to Gabriel Allon, the legendary chief of Israeli intelligence, who has spent his life fighting terrorists, including the murderous jihadists financed by Saudi Arabia. Gabriel regards Prince Khalid as a valuable, if flawed, partner. Together they become allies in a deadly secret war for control of the Middle East. Both men have made their share of enemies. And both have everything to lose. Mystery, 2019.

"Lost and Found" by Danielle Steel: Madison Allen is a renowned, career-driven photographer. She had three men in her life who were very important to her in different ways, but it was the fourth love, her job, which always won in the end. Consumed by old memories and with a forced pause in her demanding schedule, Maddie embarks on a road trip. She hopes to answer questions about the men she loved and might have married in the years after she was left alone with three young children. She hopes to learn that the decisions she made long ago were the right ones. And as her life comes into clearer focus, a new unexpected future takes shape, and is a valuable lesson to all of us who have ever wondered 'what if?' Fiction and Large Print, 2019.

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


# Dr. Jac Fitzenz featured in CFO magazine

According to Villages resident Dr. Jac Fitzenz, people have always been treated as an expense in business. Contrarily, 50 years ago he set out to prove that people are the primary source of value. Beginning in 1969 his research demonstrated the economic value generated by employees. Over the past decades he flew 4 million miles around the world training managers on how to measure the return on investment of money spent to hire, pay, train and retain human talent.

Dr. Jac's belief has always been that "the only asset capable of creating value in an organization is people. All other assets are inert. Facilities, equipment, even cash have no economic value until a human learns how to apply them in an organizational process."

In January 2019, the International Organization for Standardization in Geneva, Switzerland published the new standard metrics for human capital management. The 50-plus measures are based on Dr. Jac's system.



At 86, Dr. Fitzenz is still active in the field. Recently, he received an invitation to conduct a speaking tour of Chile, Colombia and Mexico.





# 'The Fairest of Them All'

I was moved in Spirit by a booklet I read by Andy Stanley called "Since Nobody's Perfect, How Good is Good Enough." In it, Mr. Stanley discusses a series of things people believe are necessary to get into Heaven. For instance, if your inner sense of right and wrong (your conscience) had the ability to reassure you when things were right between you and God, there would be no need for religion. We would know exactly where we stand. We wouldn't need other men and women telling us what we should, and should not do; it would be intuitive. And there would be agreement across cultural and generational lines regarding what is right, and what is wrong. But, we are not "saved" by being virtuous and right living people. Our path to Heaven has already been promised by our Savior, Jesus Christ, who sacrificed himself to forgive our sins.

The author uses a personal story to make his point. He writes:

"When my children were very young, I bought a new car. It was the nicest car I ever owned. It was beautiful, and I intended to keep it that way. One Saturday morning, as I was taking out the trash, I noticed something on the hood of my car. I walked over for a closer look and to my utter dismay discovered someone had scratched the letter "A" into the paint.

I was furious. Within seconds, my two sons were standing beside me as I demanded to know who scratched up my car. For a moment there was silence. Then my 5-year-old son Garret piped up - 'Allie did it!' Allie my youngest child, and only daughter was a whopping 3 ½ years old. I called out to her and said, 'Allie did you do that?' She sheepishly looked up at me and said, "Yes sir, Daddy.'

What was I going to do? There was no way in the world for me to explain to Allie the significance of what she had done. There was no point in telling her that now I was going to have to take the car to the shop, rent a car, and pay for the repair as well as the rental car. She had no context for understanding any of that. So what do you do in that kind of situation? Sever the relationship? Demand payment? Rant and rave? Of course not.

I did the only thing I could do for someone I loved as much as I loved her. I knelt down and said 'Allie, please don't do that anymore.' She said, 'Yes sir, Daddy,' then she hugged me and went back inside. I continued to love her as much as ever, and took care of the repair. I wasn't concerned about fairness. What was most appropriate was grace and mercy."

God sees your sin as a debt you can't pay. To think that being good will somehow make you square with God, would be like Allie promising to clean up her room to compensate for all the trouble she caused. Christianity teaches that when man sinned, God opted for forgiveness rather than fairness. He opted for grace and mercy rather than justice.





# FROM THE PRO

Sunday, October 13 - Men's Guest Day. Men may bring 1-3 guests for only \$45 each! Sign up in the Pro Shop.

Winter Schedule - Remember that we will transition into the golf Winter Schedule starting on Sunday, November 3 when DST ends. What does this mean? On Mondays the Open Shotgun will move to 12 p.m. On Mondays the Driving Range will close at 2 p.m. You will need to check the status of carts on the golf course via the Flag System at the range or by calling the Daily Maintenance Hotline at 408-223-4663. The first tee time of the day will be later depending on the Sunrise time. Twilight Rates will start at 2 p.m. instead of 3 p.m. Sunset will be earlier at 5-6 p.m. Please plan accordingly.

Combo Tees — The men's and women's clubs have both created what we call a Combo tee for the men and women. The men now have available a #3 Tee / #4 Tee Combo Tee option to play incorporating nine holes from the #4 Tees and nine holes from the #3 Tees. The result is a 6,007 total yards golf course. Holes #1, #2, #4, #8, #9, #11, #14, #15, #16 will be played from the #4 Tees; and Holes #3, #5, #6, #7, #10, #12, #13, #17, #18 will be played from the #3 Tees. The women now have available a #2 Tee / #3 Tee Combo Tee option to play incorporating eight holes from the #2 Tees and ten holes from the #3 Tees. The result is a 5,442 total yards golf course. Holes #2, #5, #6, #9, #10, #12, #17, #18, will be played from the #2 Tees; and Holes #1, #3, #4, #7, #8, #11, #13, #14, #15, #16 will be played from the #3 Tees.

We have temporary scorecards for each Combo Course available at the Pro Shop. If you play the Combo Tees, the score is postable, so be sure to page to the bottom of the "tees" option to get to the "Combo Tees" option for posting.

The Grip for The Chip...Have you ever tried chipping with your putting grip? This is something that I do, and some tour players do as well. It helps to keep the hands out of the chipping stroke and creates a softer rolling action. The intent with a chip shot is to get the ball on the green and rolling quickly so it reacts like a putt around the hole. And with all chips and putts, speed control is the most important element to success. If the hands and wrists get too active when you chip, the swing has too much force and two things can happen...the ball goes too far; or the golfer decelerates at the ball and hits it fat. So experiment with your putting stoke for chipping; be sure to play the ball back in your stance and set your hands ahead... then just stroke it like a putt. See if this doesn't help your chipping and speed control. Let us know if these tips help.

He leads the King of Spades and is very happy to see East has to play the Queen. South claims as his last 3 cards are trumps. Great, the contract is made exactly. By the way North/South can only make 2 NoTrump.

\*Responder doesn't have enough HCP to bid. He needs more than 15 HCP to bid since his partner opened with a preemptive bid showing 6-10 HCP.



### San Francisco Bay Area Sports Legend John Ralston

(1927 - 2019)

John Ralston, one of the San Francisco Bay Area's most popular and beloved college and professional sports figures, passed away peacefully in Sunnyvale, Calif., on September 14, 2019.

Mr. Ralston's impact on the Bay Area sports scene spanned 60 years from his days as a linebacker on the 1947 through 1950 University of California football teams playing for legendary coach Lynn "Pappy" Waldorf" into the 21st century as a special assistant to the athletics director at San Jose State University.

He was best known as a football coach with a positive approach to life that took Utah State University, Stanford University and the Denver Broncos of the National Football League (NFL) to unprecedented success.

Mr. Balston began his coaching career as an assistant football coach at San Lorenzo (Calif.) High in 1953.

Mr. Ralston began his coaching career as an assistant football coach at San Lorenzo (Calif.) High in 1953 and spent two seasons at Mt. Diablo High before returning to Cal. He moved to the University of California in 1956 as an assistant football coach and was on the staff for the 1958 Golden Bears' team that played in the 1959 Rose Bowl.

He was the head coach at Utah State (1959-62), Stanford (1963-71), the Denver Broncos (1972-76), the Oakland Invaders of the United States Football League (1983-84) and San Jose State (1993-96). Combining his college and professional head coaching records, his teams amassed a 140-126-7 win-loss record.

His Utah State teams played in the 1960 Sun Bowl and 1961 Gotham Bowl and his Stanford University squads won consecutive Pacific 8 Conference championships and Rose Bowls following the 1970 and 1971 regular seasons. The Broncos' first winning season in franchise history was in 1973, his second as a NFL head coach.

Mr. Ralston's coaching tree included former NFL head coaches the late Bill Walsh, Dick Vermeil, Jim Mora, Sr., Mike White, the late Rod Rust, the late Jack Christiansen and college head coaches the late Roger Theder, the late Tony Knap, Ed Peasley and Rubin Carter.

His best-known players included 1970 Heisman Trophy winner Jim Plunkett at Stanford and Pro Football Hall of Fame defensive lineman Merlin Olsen at Utah State.

His football experiences extended beyond coaching players and his assistants. He was the Denver Broncos' general manager and head coach. Mr. Ralston was a Philadelphia Eagles assistant coach to Vermeil in 1978. He was the vice-president of the San Francisco 49ers during the 1979 and 1980 seasons and the president of the Portland Breakers of the USF in 1984 and 1985.

Mr. Ralston scouted for the Seattle Seahawks in 1988 and 1989 and served three years, 1990 through 1992, as the coordinator for Operation Discovery, a search for foreign-born football players of the World League of American Football. His search took him to the Soviet Union and a short-lived position as head coach of the Moscow Bears, the U.S.S.R's first professional football team.

The one-time Dale Carnegie Courses instructor also served as an administrator for Major League Volleyball, a professional women's volleyball league, and the general manager of the Sacramento Capitols team tennis franchise.

The native of Oakland, Calif., was born on April 26, 1927, and spent a portion of his youth in Norway, Mich. He graduated from the University of California in 1951.

A World War II veteran, Mr. Ralston served in the Marine Corps, achieving the rank of corporal. He was stationed mainly on the S.S. Little rock in the South Pacific.

Mr. Ralston's lengthy list of accolades includes induction into the College Football Hall of Fame in 1992; the Rose Bowl Hall of Fame in 1996; the Bay Area Sports Hall of Fame in 1997; the San Jose Hall of Fame in 2001; and the sports halls of fame for San Jose State, Stanford, and Utah State. As a coach, Mr. Ralston was named Stanford's "Coach of the Century" when the university celebrated its centennial anniversary of football in 1991 and the 1973 United Press International's American Football Conference "Coach of the Year" in his second season with the Denver Broncos.

Mr. Ralston is survived by his daughter, Terry (Ralston) Zaffonato, four grandsons, two granddaughters, and one great granddaughter. He was predeceased by his wife of 46 years, Patty (Ward) Ralston; a son, Larry; a daughter, Sherry (Ralston) Brown, the twin sister of Terry; and Virginia Fanelli, his life's partner following the passing of his wife Patty.
