Why Club Facilities were closed before the power went out October 9

As you know, the Club amenities were shut down Wednesday, October 9, 2019 as PG&E advised The Villages multiple times that power would be shut off after noon on October 9, 2019. We shut down the facilities to minimize equipment damage and eliminate unsafe and unlit common spaces. Notices were posted on affected buildings and rooms. Once the power outage occurred, it was determined that facilities with power could safely be re-opened a few hours later. Opening was contingent on knowing that through Friday, October 11, 2019, they could once again be closed, weather and PG&E infrastructure dependent. Fast Lane email blasts were regularly updated as was information on Channel 26. EPC mobilized and had their sector chiefs distribute important information. Attention all Villagers: In order to prepare ourselves for the "Big One," the Emergency Preparedness Committee (EPC) is facilitating the annual Earthquake Preparedness Drill on **Monday, October 21 at 4 p.m.** This involves displaying your **OK Sign** in a prominent place



that can be seen from the sidewalk or street in front of your residence. The EPC wants everyone to view this as if it were an actual disaster, so that when (not "if") it happens we will be truly ready. So, on this day, EPC volunteers will be inspecting every residence for a displayed OK sign, and also respond to specific health and building scenarios, as they would during an actual emergency. If you cannot locate your OK sign, you can pick up another one in Building B. Thanks for your willingness to participate in this important event. Remember, **be prepared and be safe.**

FROM THE CLUB BOARD

Inviting the general public into The Villages for free tax preparation

By the Club Board of Directors

In making decisions, the Club Board must consider the benefits for the greater good of the approximately 4,000 residents of The Villages. Maintaining restricted gate access is a priority for the majority of our residents.

It is the Club Board's understanding that this AARP sponsored service requires that the tax consultants provide this free service to all seniors regardless of income or where they live. Thus, we cannot exclude non-residents. It is also the Club Board's understanding that 300 people use this service, 100 from the general public and 200 Villagers. In addition, the Club Board was told that because the service is so popular, general public appointments (which are made through the Evergreen Community Center) sometimes displace Villagers from getting an appointment.

The request for the secure internet connection requires ADA compliance because this program opens the community up to the general public. Just one complaint from a non-resident of an ADA violation could result in hundreds of thousands of dollars in compliance costs. ADA compliance evaluation would include a consultant to map out what needs to be done at an approximate cost of \$15,000, just for the consultant. We would most likely have to upgrade at least one bathroom in Cribari Center. Rossmoor just did this ADA compliance at a cost of approximately \$62,500 per restroom. All of this money spent to allow access by the general public for free tax preparation.

An additional community concern raised at the September 24 Club Board meeting was that golfers and others coming to The Villages for an event don't live here, yet because these are revenue generating the Club Board allows it. Unfortunately, our country club community cannot support our amenities without generating some revenue in the form of golf tournaments, Clubhouse events such as weddings, etc. The golf community recently tightened up its entry rules for guests playing golf and the Club Board and management continues to review entry procedures to restrict access.

On the bright side of this issue. There are facilities outside our gates where our current tax preparers and Villagers can go for the AARP free senior tax preparation.

Association/Homeowners documents available via e-mail

Per an amendment to California Civil Code, homeowner associations are permitted, with owner's written consent, to distribute annual disclosures, (like the pro forma budget summary) and other specified association documents to owners via electronic mail, facsimile, or other electronic means (such as posting on the association's website) instead of sending those documents out by regular mail or personal delivery. This has the potential to provide cost savings to The Villages. Delivery and postage costs for the Villages' annual distribution of the annual audit report alone is close to \$1,300, not to mention the paper and printing costs; and this is with more than 1,750 Villagers signed up for electronic delivery.

In order to transmit association documents via e-mail or by posting on the homeowners association's website, 1) the homeowners association must first receive the owner's written consent, and 2) the homeowners association sends a separate notice to the owner that the documents have been posted and are available for viewing.

Consent forms for owners to request delivery of documents have been developed for both The Villages Association and Homeowners Corporations. These forms provide an owner's consent to electronic delivery of documents that are capable, under current laws, of being distributed electronically. Owners have the right to revoke this request and receive "hard copies" of the documents by sending a written revocation signed by the owner, to the applicable corporation.

Forms of owner's written consent are available in Business Administration Buildings A and B, and on The Villages web site, http://www.thevillagesgcc.com (Click on *Resident Info* and then Click on *Resource Files*.)

Swimming Pool Reminders

Cribari, Montgomery and Foothill pools/spas will close for the season starting November 1. Vineyard Pool and spa will be open during usual hours throughout the winter and early spring seasons. Hours for children will remain at 2 p.m. to 4 p.m. daily.

Please note that using pool shower facilities for hair dyeing purposes is **strictly forbidden**. Hair dye leaves permanent or very hard to erase stains on sinks, tiles, grout, shower curtains, etc.

For optimal safety and health, we also ask that all pool users keep these rules in mind:

- Entry into any of the Villages pools is not allowed if you have an open wound or a rash of any kind. This also applies to swimmers who have a communicable disease that is still in an infectious state or while having symptoms such as a cough, cold sores or nasal or ear discharge. This is for your safety as well as for other swimmers.

- No swimmer, young or old, who uses incontinence products (e.g., diapers) should enter pools or spas.

- Remember to shower before you enter the pool or spa—this procedure removes an amazing amount of unwanted residues that would otherwise end up in our pools.

- We are well protected from a Paradise type fire because of our fuel reduction efforts, our topography (mostly grass), and our greenspace. Villages Age Certification Survey and Association Smoke and CO Detectors Statement of Compliance

Thank you to all Villagers who have returned the biennial age certification for all residents and for residents of The Villages Association (condos), the annual Association Smoke and CO Detectors Statement of Compliance. Unfortunately, we are still short of the required minimums and need your help. If you have not yet returned your forms, please do so now. Forms are available in Building A and on The Villages website https://resident.thevillagesgcc. com/resource-files/forms.

<u>Age Survey</u>: To continue our community's status as a senior community, The Villages must comply with the state and federal laws that govern California senior housing developments. The Villages Association and Homeowners' Corporation must conduct periodic surveys (every other year) to verify and document that the community is in compliance. Failure to satisfy the legal requirements may result in a determination that our community is not a lawful senior community and therefore would mean that we must allow persons of all ages to live here.

In order to fulfill the requirements imposed upon the Corporations, one resident of your condominium or home must complete and sign the Age Certification (under penalty of perjury). Please note that if you are an offsite owner, you must have one of the tenant(s)/resident(s) complete and sign the Certification. Offsite owners are responsible for ensuring completion and return of the Certification by one of their tenant(s)/resident(s).

<u>Smoke and CO Detectors Statement of Compliance</u>: In order to fulfill the requirements of The Villages Association Policies <u>APo 408 Smoke Detectors Installations, Maintenance, Repair</u> and <u>Replacement</u> and <u>APo 410 Carbon Monoxide (CO) Detectors</u>, each owner is required to inspect (or have inspected by a third party) his/her villa on an annual basis to ensure their detectors(s) are in working order.

State and local laws require a smoke detector in each sleeping room and in the hallway and that a carbon monoxide detector be installed outside of each separate dwelling unit sleeping area. Per the policies, the replacement of smoke detectors is required every ten years and replacement of CO detectors is required every five years. In addition, a statement of compliance shall be demonstrated annually.

Please complete and return the Age Certification (all residents) and Smoke and CO Detectors Compliance forms (for condo residents) as soon as possible:

We appreciate you taking the time to complete and return these important forms. Please be assured that the information that you provide is used strictly for the Corporation's records and to document our community's compliance with applicable laws and the Association's governing documents. A summary of the age survey results (not including names or addresses) will be made available following completion of the survey. More COMMUNITY NOTICES **SENIOR RESOURCE SERVICES** Changes in Medicare in 2020

The New Year brings changes to Medicare online access. This article describes only some of the changes. The Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) has updated the Medicare gov site and provides a lot more information than before.

Beginning with the 2020 Annual Enrollment Period (AEP) from October 15 through December 7, 2019, Medicare beneficiaries can print their own Medicare card at home. Go to your account at www.mymedicare.gov. In the dropdown menu under your name at the top of the page, click on Print my Medicare card. Follow the instructions to print your Medicare card.

The Medicare.gov portal allows you to pay your premium payment if you have original Medicare (not Medicare Advantage plans), view apps on your computer and smartphone that you may want to install to manage your health information. For example, an app can save claims and records for up to four years, appointments, health, and drug plans and more.

Beginning January 1, 2020, you can only use your new Medicare card and you should take it with you during your visit to every doctor you visit the first time in 2020, even those you have seen before 2020. Do not show the new card to anyone else and do not give your new Medicare number to anyone else who asks for it to prevent frauds.

After January 1, 2020, the new-to-Medicare enrollees cannot purchase a Medigap policy with plan C or F and there will be no federal guaranteed issue rights when already enrolled beneficiaries transfer out of Plan C and F to other plans.

Beginning January 1, 2020, Medicare Advantage Plan Open Enrollment Period (MA OEP) is January 1 through March 31. You must be already enrolled in an MA Plan to use MA OEP. New Medicare enrollees enrolling in Medicare during an Initial Enrollment Period (IEP) have three months to use MA OEP to make a change. During an MA OEP, you can switch MA Plans or leave an MA Plan to join Original Medicare and add Plan D for drugs (PDP). During MA OEP, however, you cannot switch from one PDP to another PDP or switch from the Original Medicare to MA. The Out of Pocket amounts for the plans have changed for 2020

An important change beginning January 1, 2020 that is worth noting is that Medicare now allows the pharmacies to disclose the difference between the price negotiated by your Medicare plan and the lower price the pharmacy may have for the same drug outside your insurance plan. You pay cash at the pharmacy and submit your claim to your plan for reimbursement and True Out Of Pocket (TrOOP) cost counting.

Medicare can be complicated. The Villages is fortunate to have a HICAP counselor who comes to the SRS office the fourth Thursday morning of each month.

If you wish to change your Medicare plan, consult your Medicare counselor and bring all your medications. When in doubt about your appointment with the Medicare counselor, make a proactive effort to confirm your appointment with Sourcewise 408-350-3200.

The California Department of Aging trained registered, rigorously trained HICAP (Health Insurance Counseling & Advocacy Program) counselors provide personalized, unbiased guidance for you.

Note: The Senior Resource Services (SRS) office hours for drop-in assistance are Monday, Wednesdav and Fridav from 10 a.m. to noon. The SI S office is in the Cribari Center acro from the Post Office. You may also leave a message at 408-239-5253. The purpose of SRS is to provide education and general business and financial information. All assistance is free and confidential. You should ask your professional adviser about your individual situation.







Anglicized as James Tissot, he was a French painter and illustrator. He was a successful painter of Paris society before moving to London in 1871. He became famous as a genre painter of fashionably dressed women shown in various scenes of everyday life. He also painted scenes and characters from the Bible.

Jacques Tissot was born in the port town of Nantes, France and spent his early childhood there. His father, Marcel Théodore Tissot, was a successful drapery merchant. His mother, Marie Durand, assisted her husband in the family business and designed hats. A devout Catholic, Tissot's mother instilled pious devotion in the future artist from a very young age. Tissot's youth spent in Nantes likely contributed to his frequent depiction of shipping vessels and boats in his later works. The involvement of his parents in the fashion industry is believed to have been an influence on his painting style, as he depicted women's clothing in fine detail. By the time Tissot was 17, he knew he wanted to pursue painting as a career. His father opposed this, preferring his son to follow a business profession, but the young Tissot gained his mother's support for his chosen vocation. Around this time, he began using the given name of James. By 1854 he was commonly known as James Tissot; he may have adopted it because of his increasing interest in everything English.





PICKLEBALL

By Linda Eige

The following are rules I have heard discussed/questioned on the courts recently. For clarification:

1. The entire score must be called **before** the server begins his or her service motion. This allows for discussion, if necessary, before play starts.

2. Double taps are legal, as long as it happens during one continuous motion, without a second intentional swing.

3. This one is supposedly unusual but I have seen it three times in the last few weeks. The ball is struck with so much backspin it bounces in the kitchen and then back over the net on its own! The point goes to the player that hit the ball. The receiver may reach over the net to strike the ball before it bounces in the original court. If the receiver is able to do this the ball remains in play. The receiver may not touch the net and their foot cannot move under the net to the other side of the court.

<u>18-HOLE WOMEN</u>

The emergency was declared over on Thursday, October 10 and life (and Table Tennis) resumed a normal schedule.


The Fall Tournament was put on hold until life returned to normal in The Villages and a new date could be selected. Watch this space for more information.

Tips from the Pro – Scott Steele

Are you properly grounded?

The golf stance is one set up aspect that is often overlooked, but very important to performance. If your stance is too wide, it locks up your lower body and inhibits athleticism...a stance that is too wide also will inhibit turn and create either lack of motion or too much left to right lateral motion. A stance that is too narrow will cause a lack of balance and as a result the golfer's swing will get too short and vertical. Jack Nicklaus used to say that he used 13 different stance widths...one for each club in the bag; narrow with the short irons to wide with the woods and driver. I like that philosophy! Start with a 7-iron and put your feet about shoulder width apart. Widen the stance about ½ inch for each club longer than the 7-iron up to your driver. Your driver stance should be about 2 inches wider than your 7-iron stance. Then narrow



your stance about ½ inch for each club shorter than the 7-iron. Your sand wedge stance should be about 2 inches narrower than your 7-iron stance. Work within these parameters and see if it helps your balance and footwork. And remember that if you are losing flexibility, flare your toes out 45 degrees, this will open up your hip flexors for more ability to turn...Let us know if these tips help.



Dealer has 2 winners in Spades, 1 in Hearts, 1 winner in Diamonds, and 4 Club winners.

Strategy: declarer needs 5 winners in Clubs. This will be easy if the suit is divided 3-2 but not if it is 4-1. When playing 5-3 or 4-1, the AK, AQ or KQ along with the 10 or 9 in the hand with the greater length (the long hand), facing Axx, Kxx or Qxx in the short hand, begins with a high honor from the long hand. Then crosses over to the remaining honor doubleton in the short hand. If the second hand shows out, the declarer will be in the proper hand to take the finesse.

West leads the 3 of Hearts, East, 10, South, the Ace, switches to the Ace of Clubs, then a low Club to the King on the board; continues with the last Club on the board, finesses the 10, follows with the Queen capturing the Jack, and finally leads the last Club. Next, he plays the Ace of Spades, then the King, switches to the Ace of Diamonds, then a Heart, West wins with the Queen and plays another Heart, East takes the trick with the King; next leads the King of Diamonds, and plays his last card, the Queen of Spades. Great! The contract is made exactly. When the player on lead has a choice between a minor and a major with equal values and length, then it is better to lead the major since the minor is often hidden in the bidding.

* South's opening bid of 2 Clubs is an artificial bid showing a hand with 22 HCP or more.

2 Diamonds is also an artificial bid showing less than 8 HCP and is waiting to hear South's suit.

^^ 2 No Trump shows a flat hand with 22 – 24 HCP. When responder has a flat hand (4-3-3-3) with a 4-card major, with a Jack high or less, responder does better to raise No Trump rather than asking if his partner has a 4-card major.


