New golf 'Registered Guest Program' begins January 1

Beginning January 1, 2020, we will be instituting the new golf **Registered Guest Program (RGP)**, which will replace the discontinued "Preferred Unaccompanied Guest Program" (PUGP). In an effort to improve our community security we will begin this new Guest program, which will still allow The Villages to share our golf course and its amenities with selected sponsored guests but in a more controlled and monitored fashion than was provided under the previous PUGP.

- 1) The Villages resident will still be able to **register any number of guests**. After approval by the Pro Shop and VGC, these registered guests will be able to play and make reservations independently of a Villages member.
- 2) The **Annual registration** of each guest will incur a **\$10** administrative fee chargeable to the Villages sponsor. The registration will be *only* good for the calendar year beginning January 1 and ending December 31 (no prorated fee applies). *All* registered guests will be purged from the system by January 15 of the following year and it will be up to their sponsor to reregister them for continued independent play.
- 3) The Registered Guest and their individual guests will only be granted access to The Villages, the golf course and its amenities (driving range, putting green, and short game areas) on the date they have a reserved tee time and their names are on the daily play sheet.

These changes in our RGP are for the sole purpose of improving our community security. The VGC and the Pro Shop still look forward to continuing our valued relationship with all guests but in a more orderly manner. Thank you for your understanding.

Notice of Revisions to Proposed Changes to Club Rule 1.40 Villages Board Recognized Clubs

At the November 12, 2019, Club board meeting, the Board approved to publish for 30-day notice proposed revisions to the changes to Club <u>Rule 1.40 Villages</u> <u>Board Recognized Clubs</u> prior to formal approval consideration at the January 28, 2020, board meeting.

As previously noticed, the entire proposed <u>Rule 1.40</u> is to replace the entire existing <u>Rule 1.40</u> which can be found on The Villages website or in Bldg. A. The purpose of the proposed changes is to provide clarity and direction to clubs, and potential clubs, by listing reasonable requirements for clubs to meet to gain Board Recognized status and listing the benefits of Board Recognition.

The Board will consider oral and written comments regarding the proposed changes at the January 28, 2020, monthly meeting. Response to the proposed rule changes may be made by one or more of the following methods: 1) Participation in the discussion of the changes at the January 28, 2020, board meeting, 2) via e-mail with comments sent to the General Manager's office at least seven (7) days prior to the meeting (jmeadows@the-villages.com), and 3) via written comments to the General Manager's offices delivered at least seven (7) days prior to the meeting.

1.40 Villages Board Recognized Clubs

The Club Board (Board) encourages residents to form resident clubs (club) among themselves to share their interests. The following benefits (1) are available to those clubs which meet the listed required minimum standards (2).

- A. Benefits of Board Recognition for a club:
 - Master Calendar access for reservation of facilities, subject to appropriate availability
 - 2. Fast Lane for announcements
 - 3. Channel 26 for announcements
 - 4. Resource Guide listing
 - 5. Telephone Directory listing
 - 6. The Villages website listing
- 7. New Resident OrientationB. The Board requires these minimum standards be met by each club:
 - 1. The club must not engage in any illegal activity, or violate any rule of the VGCC, Association, or Homeowners Corporation.
 - 2. The club must be open to all residents who meet membership requirements.
- Only residents can be members of clubs. Non-residents may be invited guests of a resident club member at all club activities, subject to any club restrictions on guests. Non-residents cannot vote, be directors, or hold office.
- A club must have written operating rules (or Bylaws) which must include these provisions and be approved by a majority-of the membership:
 - a) If the club requires election of directors, the election must be open to all members, and each member must be given an equal opportunity to run for such position. Directors can only be removed by vote of all members.
 - b) The club must notify all members of all meetings.
 - c) All meetings must be open to all members unless an executive session is required for reasonable purposes as specified in the operating rules.
- 5. The club must have at least 20 active members attending a minimum of 80 percent of the clubs functions because of the high demand on our limited facilities. At least 20 members must attend 60% of club functions reseved yearly through the Community Activities Annual Master Calendar."
- 6. The club must register annually with VGCC Community Services in Building B with a written list of their current officers and directors (if any), and the names and addresses of every current active member.
- 7. No club, nor any club member, shall by any means whatsoever invite the general public to any club activity.
- 8. Clubs may not obtain bids or estimates from contractors for suggested changes to Club facilities.
- C. The club must be fair and reasonable in all matters. Clubs are prohibited from political opinions or endorsements with the exception of the partisan political clubs' political activity within their own club. If the Board determines the club has not acted fairly or reasonably in any particular matter or has not complied with any section of this Rule, the Board may revoke its Board recognition status and cancel all benefits.
- D. To receive Board recognition as a club, submit an application to the Community Activities Office with a list of members and addresses, proposed operating rules or Bylaws and expected facility use. A set of model Bylaws is available in the Community Activities Office.

2019 Villages Age Certification Survey Results

In order to maintain our community's status as a senior community, The Villages must comply with the State and Federal laws that govern senior housing developments. To that end, Federal law requires that at least one person 55 years of age or older reside in a minimum of 80 percent of the occupied units. To validate the foregoing, Federal law requires The Villages Association and Homeowners' Corporation to conduct periodic surveys (every two years). Failure to satisfy the legal requirements could result in a determination that our community is not a lawful senior community and therefore mean that we must allow persons of all ages to live here.

This year's survey has determined the both The Villages Association and The Villages Homeowners' Corporation have satisfied the legal requirements to maintain The Villages status as a 55+ senior community.

Out of 2,309 units (condominiums) for The Villages Association, 2,251 are occupied, and 1,957, or 84.8 percent of Association residents returned completed surveys certifying that a least one member of the household is 55 years of age or older.

Veterans Club Profile: Carol Littleton





Upon re-launch, here are some of the new elements to the WHS...Handicaps will be derived by using the best 8 out of the last 20 scores, tournament scores will weigh the same as any other score, abnormal course and weather conditions will have impact on a player's posted score, handicaps will be updated daily instead of bi-monthly, there will be a limit of Net Double Bogey as the maximum hole score (for handicapping purposes only), a maximum handicap limit of 54.0, regardless of gender. I am conducting presentations for our six golf clubs explaining these changes, and please feel free to ask us in the Pro Shop any time. And YES, this will affect everyone's handicap, including yours!

2020 Resident Golf Activities Calendar—The 2020 Golf Activities Calendar starting January 1, 2020 is now available for your review on the website. Remember that this is a fluid document so as the schedule changes or events are added, we will update the calendar on-line. We will also be posting the calendar 2 months out in the golf Posting Room for your review. If your group wants to schedule a golf event for 2020, please contact PGA Director of Golf, Scott Steele in the Pro Shop.

New Registered Guest Program—The new and updated Registered Guest Program will go into effect January 1. What does that mean?

The current database of Preferred Unaccompanied Guests will be completely purged.

All Registered Guests will have to be re-signed up, and will now be referred to as "Registered Guests."

The Registered Guest signup form will be new and every resident will have to complete the new form.

There will be a \$10 annual fee for all Registered Guests.

Registered Guests will be able to reserve tee times on their own up to seven days in advance.

Registered guests will only be permitted to practice on the day they play.

All Registered Guests and any one in their party must be added to the Chelsea tee sheet by name in advance or they will not be allowed through the gate...i.e. everyone playing golf must be listed on the tee sheet.

An "Unaccompanied Guest" is defined as a guest of a resident who plays golf without the resident...the resident must make all reservations. A "Registered Guest" is defined as a regular guest of The Villages who has completed the Registered Guest Form and paid the \$10 fee, and may make reservations on their own without resident involvement. Every adult needs a Will

Good News and Bad News for today. The Good News—we live in a beautiful community. The Bad News—humans have a 100 percent mortality rate. None of us are making it out alive. Every adult needs a Will and/or Living Trust. It doesn't matter if you are married or single, age 21 or 91, a parent or not. A Will is a gift to your family. And more good news, a simple, legally binding Will can be obtained for free in California.

In California it is even possible to create a valid will for only the cost of a notary to certify your signature. Our state law recognizes a free "fill-in-the-blanks" form called a Statutory Will. The form allows you to select:

- · who is to inherit your assets;
- · who is to be guardian of your minor children;

• who is to be executor of your estate and the custodian of any assets left to minor children. Your children will receive the assets at age 18 to 25 – your choice of age.

This Statutory Will is designed for single, married and divorced people with relatively small estates. If you have a large estate or you have a complicated family or business situation, or unusual provisions are desired, an attorney should draft the document for you.

The Statutory Will form is available free from the Sacramento Law Library at www.saclaw.org. Click on Forms; Estate Planning; Will (California Statutory Will form). SRS has made copies of the Statutory Will form if you would like to pick one up at our office. You may wish to get a copy for your grandchildren's parents (your kids!)—and encourage them to get a Will. Too often young families do not have a Will because of the cost. This one is free!

While at the site, you can also print the Uniform Statutory Power of Attorney form. This is used if you are incapacitated and need another person to act on your behalf. Again, SRS has copies available.

Now where to find a notary? SRS has a notary list which includes four Villagers. You can also usually find notary service at any private mail center (FedEx or UPS Stores or Postal Annex sites).

Strategy: Take out the trumps and hope they don't switch to a Diamond before setting up the Clubs and that appears very doubtful at this point.

West leads the Ace of Spades, follows with the King, and now East plays the 10 of Spades to tell his partner that he would like Diamond to be led since the board only has 2 Spades and West must choose another suit to lead next. West obeys his partner and plays the 9 of Diamonds, East covers with the Jack, and South wins with the Ace. He now takes three rounds of Hearts to take out all the trumps. He then plays the Ace of Clubs, continues with another Club, finesses the 10, and East takes the trick with the Jack. He next leads the Queen of Diamonds, continues with the Jack, and South trumps. He then plays three more rounds of Hearts, next leads his last card, a Club to the King on the board. Great! The contract is made exactly. Three Clubs can also be made but 3 Hearts provides more points.

* South has a good hand with 6 Hearts and 17 HCP and raises the bid since West is in the over call position and can have as few as 8 to 17 HCP at the one level. Also, South knows that East passed in the beginning and is just raising him 1 level which doesn't show many points.



Along the Way—a trip down Memory Lane

In one of my Junior College accounting classes we did a deep dive into how to process and prepare a paycheck. There were so many laws and rules and options and calculations that I began to despair. It could take hours to process just a few checks; the likelihood of making an error was great; and there is nothing more important to the employee than a correct paycheck, on time.



After letting us sweat it out for a few days, the teacher mentioned that there were computerized payroll services. All you had to do was keep certain master file records updated, input the current activity, and the payroll service would process, prepare and deliver the checks. These were rudimentary systems in the late 1960s and early 1970s, but they were mechanized and saved a lot of time and avoided a lot of mistakes.

When the teacher first revealed to us the existence of payroll services, it annoyed me. Why did I have to go through all this learning, memorizing and practicing, when the computer was going to do it for me? Years later as an auditor and accounting manager, it was immeasurably helpful to understand and appreciate the complexities and degree of difficulty that goes into maintaining the payroll system, complying with the many state and federal laws (and changes therein), company policies (and changes therein) and paying every employee on an accurate and timely basis each pay day.

Without that understanding it would have been impossible to audit the process or to support the function as a Controller. A CFO once told me that payroll is simple; that we should just be able to "set it and forget it." I knew he had no idea what he was talking about. CFOs often do not come up through the accounting ranks and may have no real appreciation for the complexities. Ignorance may be bliss for CFOs, but not for the accountants who report to them.

Toward the end of my career, clients were using systems and tools that I did not understand. Technological change had swept past me while I was not paying attention. I had come full circle and felt like that student who was unaware of the tools available. But this time, the energy and motivation of a college student was behind me. It was time for me to "set it and forget it." In retirement I found that ignorance and bliss really don't belong in the same sentence. I wonder if that CFO already knew that.




