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## New golf 'Registered Guest Program' begins January 1

Beginning January 1, 2020, we will be instituting the new golf Registered Guest Program (RGP), which will replace the discontinued "Preferred Unaccompanied Guest Program" (PUGP). In an effort to improve our community security we will begin this new Guest program, which will still allow The Villages to share our golf course and its amenities with selected sponsored guests but in a more controlled and monitored fashion than was provided under the previous PUGP.

- 1) The Villages resident will still be able to register any number of guests. After approval by the Pro Shop and VGC, these registered guests will be able to play and make reservations independently of a Villages member.
- 2) The **Annual registration** of each guest will incur a **\$10** administrative fee chargeable to the Villages sponsor. The registration will be only good for the calendar year beginning January 1 and ending December 31 (no prorated fee applies). All registered guests will be purged from the system by January 15 of the following year and it will be up to their sponsor to reregister them for continued independent
- 3) The Registered Guest and their individual guests will only be granted access to The Villages, the golf course and its amenities (driving range, putting green, and short game areas) on the date they have a reserved tee time and their names are on the daily play sheet.

These changes in our RGP are for the sole purpose of improving our community security. The VGC and the Pro Shop still look forward to continuing our valued relationship with all guests but in a more orderly manner. Thank you for your understanding.

# Association/Homeowners documents available via e-mail

Per an amendment to California Civil Code, homeowner associations are permitted, with owner's written consent, to distribute annual disclosures, (like the pro forma budget summary) and other specified association documents to owners via electronic mail, facsimile, or other electronic means (such as posting on the association's website) instead of sending those documents out by regular mail or personal delivery. This has the potential to provide cost savings to The Villages. Delivery and postage costs for the Villages' annual distribution of the pro forma budget summary alone are close to \$1,000, not to mention the paper and printing costs.

In order to transmit association documents via e-mail or by posting on the homeowners association's website, 1) the homeowners association must first receive the owner's written consent, and 2) the homeowners association sends a separate notice to the owner that the documents have been posted and are available for viewing.

Consent forms for owners to request delivery of documents have been developed for both The Villages Association and Homeowners Corporations. These forms provide an owner's consent to electronic delivery of documents that are capable, under current laws, of being distributed electronically. Owners have the right to revoke this request and receive "hard copies" of the documents by sending a written revocation signed by the owner, to the applicable corporation.

# Club and Association Boards met for December meetings

The Villages Association and Club Boards of Directors met Tuesday, December 10 for their regularly scheduled meetings in Foothill Center.

Numerous items of business were discussed and voted upon.

### **Association Operating Financial Commentary**

For the month of October 2019

### **October Operating Statement Review**

Revenue was \$200 unfavorable to the budget of \$855,600 for the month, mostly due to less than planned laundry concession fees.

Expenditures for the month were \$80,500 (8.9 percent) favorable to the budget of \$899,700. The most significant favorable to budget expense category was planting with a \$32,500 positive budget variance (\$7,800 actual vs. budget of \$40,300) due to timing. Other notable favorable to budget categories were water expense (\$202,700 actual vs. budget of \$223,800), irrigation maintenance (\$11,400 actual vs. budget of \$33,000) and repair and maintenance (\$15,400 actual vs. budget of \$22,400). The only notable unfavorable to budget expense category was legal fees (\$2,900 actual vs. budget of \$800). The net positive operating budget variance for the month of October was \$80,300.

Year-to-date (four months of operations), total revenue is \$2,100 unfavorable to the budget of \$3,422,900 due to less than planned laundry concession fees, third party assessments and golf cart electricity and storage fees. Year-to-date, total operating expenditures are \$3,633,900, or 1.6 percent less than the budget of \$3,692,700. The positive budget variance can be attributed to the timing of planting expense (\$19,000 actual vs. budget of \$75,700). Repair and maintenance is also favorable to budget (\$75,100 actual vs. \$89,400 budget). The most significant unfavorable to budget category is water expense, coming in 1.1 percent higher than the YTD budget through October.

The year-to-date net <u>positive</u> operating budget variance is \$56,700.

### **Club Operating Financial Commentary**

For the month of October 2019

### **October Operating Statement Review:**

Total revenue was \$33,300 unfavorable to budget, or 2.8 percent less than the budget of \$1,196,700. The most significant unfavorable to budget revenue category was directory income (\$0 actual vs. budget of \$19,000) due to timing. Food and bar sales were also unfavorable to budget by \$13,300 (or 5.5 percent) due to the expected PG&E power shutoff that ultimately did not impact the Clubhouse. However, in anticipation of the power shutoff, banquets totaling approximately \$20,000 in gross revenue were cancelled. Resident activities income was unfavorable to budget as well (\$13,000 actual vs. budget of \$23,900) due to timing. On a positive note, green fee revenue was higher than the budget (by \$11,600 or 10.4 percent) due to nice weather, with strong guest rounds and member 18-hole rounds. All other revenue categories tracked fairly close to budget for the month.

Total expenditures were \$39,700 favorable to budget or 3.4 percent lower than the budget of \$1,165,300. Most of the positive variance came from less than planned utilities (favorable by \$16,700 or 7 percent) and employee expense (favorable by \$13,300 or 1.9 percent). The most significant unfavorable to budget expense category was professional fees (\$16,500 actual vs. budget of \$10,300), offset in lower employee expense (from the unfilled HR Manager position). The net positive operating budget variance for the month of October was \$6,400. See table below.

Year-to-date revenue is \$10,000 unfavorable to budget, 0.2 percent less than the budget of \$4,852,000. Year-to-date expenditures are \$140,000 favorable to budget, 2.8 percent less than the budget of \$4,934,000. The year-to-date net positive operating budget variance is \$130,000. See table below for detail by department.

The bottom of the table on the next page shows the financial impact of the monthly solar lease payments and contribution to the balloon payment fund (to be paid in 2023) captured on the Club's balance sheet. The YTD total for these two items is \$77,000.

The above table shows Golf Course/Pro Shop has a \$53,000 positive variance from less than planned tree trimming expense (due to timing), electricity expense, professional fees, chemical supplies, advertising and promotion, operating supplies and water expense. The community centers have a \$36,000 net positive variance from favorable utilities expense and intra-company cost transfers. All Other has a \$33,000 net positive variance due to less than planned Comcast fees,

planting expense and repair and maintenance. Public Safety shows a \$27,000 net positive variance mostly from less than planned employee expense. Community Activities has posted a \$19,000 net positive variance from less than planned resident activities expense. Clubhouse/Restaurant shows a \$40,000 net negative variance due to less than planned bar sales and higher than planned employee expense, food cost of sales, repair and maintenance, water expense, operating supplies and laundry service.

### **Homeowners' Operating Financial Commentary**

For the month of October 2019

### **October Operating Statement Review:**

Revenue tracked budget at \$3,309 (non-Estates single family homes). Expenditures for the month were \$56 favorable to budget due to less than planned legal fees. The year-to-date net positive operating budget variance is \$224 (legal fees).

Estates revenue for the month was on budget at \$13,112. Expenditures were \$5,241 favorable to budget, 29.7 percent less than the budget of \$17,615, mostly due to less than planned planting expense (timing), water expense and irrigation maintenance expense. All other expenditure categories were close to budget for the month. The year-to-date net positive operating budget variance is \$4,231 (planting expense and irrigation maintenance expense).



## Inheritance mistakes to avoid

Are you hoping to receive an inheritance? Perhaps rather than hoping to receive an inheritance you are hoping to leave an inheritance to a loved one. Give them this article. Use it as a means to talk about your hopes and expectations.

Below is a list of the common inheritance mistakes.

Mistake 1: Having great anxiety immediately about what to do with the inheritance. Take your time. Then act deliberately.

Mistake 2: Spending the money on frivolous purchases. A dollar of inherited money is no less valuable than a dollar in your savings account. Treat it that way.

Mistake 3: Letting others exploit you with financial schemes or risky ventures because of your new money.

Mistake 4: Giving excessively to charities. Charity is laudable but set charitable giving at reasonable levels. Don't give away too much and have nothing left for you.

Mistake 5: Lending money to friends and relatives can be risky. It's a kind-hearted gesture, but it can backfire and ruin relationships. Be cautious and follow standard business procedure, including using legal forms.

Mistake 6: Thinking you know more about investing than others. Think again. Read up on investing basics or work with a financial adviser.

An AARP study of people receiving an inheritance found that 75 percent spend all of it within one year. If the time period was lengthened to three years, 90 percent had spent the entire inheritance. Don't be part of the 90 percent unless you intentionally plan to spend it all.

## PG&E Energy Savings Program

The Energy Savings Program makes home improvements at no cost to you to keep your home energy efficient through a PG&E approved sub-contractor. PG&E requests that you apply for the program either online at www.pge.com/energysavings or by calling 800-933-9555.

To qualify for this program, you must have income in the lower range or are currently on a qualifying public assistance program such as Medi-Cal or Cal Fresh. PG&E will explain the requirements, check that you qualify and have a contractor call you.

It is important that you start the process by contacting PG&E. Cases of rogue contractors contacting the public directly and not explaining the required qualifications have been noted.

You don't want PG&E to charge you for your home improvements if it's determined that you don't qualify for the program.







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## FROM THE PRO



By Scott Steele, PGA Head Golf Professional

World Handicap System 2020 - Remember that starting January 1, 2020, our handicap system is being completely revised. The system will go dark from January 1 to 5 and everyone's handicaps will be updated. Upon re-launch, here are some of the new elements to the WHS... Handicaps will be derived by using the best 8 out of the last 20 scores, tournament scores will weigh the same as any other score, abnormal course and weather conditions will have impact on a player's posted score, handicaps will be updated daily instead of bi-monthly, there will be a limit of Net Double Bogey as the maximum hole score (for handicapping purposes only), a maximum handicap limit of 54.0, regardless of gender. I am conducting presentations for our six golf clubs explaining these changes, and please feel free to ask us in the Pro Shop any time. And yes, this will affect everyone's handicap, including yours!

2020 Resident Golf Activities Calendar - The 2020 Golf Activities Calendar starting January 1, 2020 is now available for your review on the website. Remember that this is a fluid document so as the schedule changes or events are added, we will update the calendar on-line. We will also be posting the calendar 2-months out in the golf Posting Room for your review. If your group wants to schedule a golf event for 2020, please contact PGA Director of Golf, Scott Steele in the Pro Shop.

New Registered Guest Program-The new and updated Registered Guest Program will go into effect January 1. What does that mean?

The current database of Preferred Unaccompanied Guests will be completely purged. All Registered Guests will have to be re-signed up, and will now be referred to as "Registered Guests."

The Registered Guest signup form will be new and every resident will have to complete the new form.

There will be a \$10 annual fee for all Registered Guests. Registered Guests will be able to reserve tee times on their own up to seven days in advance. Registered guests will only be permitted to practice on the day they play. All Registered Guests and any one in their party must be added to the Chelsea tee sheet by name in advance or they will not be allowed through the gate...i.e. everyone playing golf must be listed on the tee sheet.

An "Unaccompanied Guest" is defined as a guest of a resident who plays golf without the resident...the resident must make all reservations. A "Registered Guest" is defined as a regular guest of The Villages who has completed the Registered Guest Form and paid the \$10 fee, and may make reservations on their own without resident involvement. Let us know if you have any questions.

Men's Guest Day-Due to inclement weather, it's now Sunday, December 15. Men may bring up to three guests for \$45 each! Sign up in the Pro Shop.

Winter Rules - From now until further notice, we are playing Winter Rules defined as 6-inch relief, lift, clean and place, through the green (all standard playing areas, no sand bunkers or penalty areas).

### Tips from the Pro-Soft turf is a slippery slope

We've all heard it, we've all done it...there are many terms for it: "I hit fat," "I hit it heavy," "I laid the sod over it," "I chunked it," "I hit behind it" and they all mean the same thing; hitting the ground before the ball taking a large piece of turf and the ball goes nowhere. It is very easy to do, especially when the rain hits and the turf get very soft underfoot. Did anyone see the Masters in 2019 or 2018?? This year Francisco Molinari hit it fat on Hole #12 and his ball landed in the lake, and that was the beginning of the end as Tiger Woods took the title. In the 2018 Masters Jordan Spieth hit it fat on the same hole #12 and his ball landed in the water and then he took his drop in the drop zone and did the same thing with his wedge...ended up making a 7 on the Par-3 which opened the door for Patrick Reed to seize the title. The point here is that everyone does it.

So here are some tips to help you to not hit your irons and hybrids fat when the turf is wet: Play the ball 1 inch further back in your stance than normal.

Keep your head still.

Focus on the front of the ball.

Keep your wrists "calm" on the backswing...a shallow angle of attack is better than a steep angle of attack.

Be sure you get into your left side on the downswing...hanging back on your right foot is a uaranteed fat shot.

Use "Winter Rules" to your advantage...take your 6 inches and perch the ball on a good lie that you have confidence in.

West wins with the 9, leads the Jack of Clubs, and South trumps, now plays a Diamond, Queen from the board, and East takes the trick with the Ace. He continues with the Jack of Diamonds, South trumps, plays the Queen of Hearts, and leads his last card, the 10 of Hearts, and West takes the trick with the Jack. Great! The contract is made exactly. As it turns out South loses 3 tricks, a Diamond, heart, and a Club.

\* South does have enough HCP to open 2 NoTrump, but his hand is too distributional and is better off in a suit contract. It turns out 3 NoTrump and 4 Hearts can also be made. When North gives a weak response showing 6 - 9 HCP, South jumps to game knowing he has 20 HCP and can handle a weak hand and doesn't even offer North an invitation to accept game by bidding 3 Spades.
