I have recurrent problems with courier deliveries (USPS, FedEx, UPS), including delivery of my medications/medical supplies. Every few weeks tracking shows packages delivered to me, yet they are nowhere to be found, not even neighbors' porches/mailboxes. They're being mis-delivered, not stolen. "Lost" packages may show up on my porch days to weeks later-if ever-sometimes opened and re-taped closed. Only once has a neighbor left a note apologizing for opening something not meant for them.

Mis-deliveries result in significant effort: contacting shipper and courier, delays waiting for replacements, checking credit cards for duplicate charges, etc.

Especially during the holiday season with so many packages, I'm requesting Villagers to:

1. Make sure any packages received are addressed to YOU before opening them — especially if you're not expecting a package!

2. If a package isn't yours, please bring it to correct addressee ASAP or at least phone them letting them know where their package is - before they expend the effort tracking it down.

Leave a note on package with your name and address – no need for embarrassment if you opened it by mistake. This will help couriers figure out how and why packages are being misdelivered so frequently.

Moving to accommodate a disability

Justin's life has changed dramatically! He has a medical condition that requires him to be confined to a wheelchair for the rest of his life. This makes living in his Villages condo almost impossible. It is a downstairs unit with steep stairs. A contractor has informed him that there is not enough room to make a legally permitted wheelchair ramp.

He has a lead on a wheelchair friendly condo that will be coming available soon. It seems like an answer to prayer, until he considers the property taxes on a new home.

Justin, 64, moved to The Villages nine years ago. He transferred his tax base from his home to his current condo. He knows this tax transfer election, called Proposition 60, may be made only once. His property tax on the possible new condo would increase from the current \$2,000 he pays annually to more than \$7,000.

An SRS volunteer suggested Justin may qualify for tax relief under another property tax law. Proposition 110 allows homeowners who are severely and permanently disabled to transfer an existing tax base to a new residence to meet the needs of their disability even if the homeowner has already used Prop. 60.

Like Prop. 60 the market value of the replacement residence must be equal to or less than the market value of the residence sold. And the replacement residence must be purchased within two years either before or after the current residence is sold.

As well as filing an application with the County Assessor to transfer his tax base, Justin will need to include a Certificate of Disability form. The top part of this form must be completed by a physician describing the patient's disability and dwelling needs. The lower half of the form is completed by Justin, as Claimant, and describes how the replacement dwelling meets his disability-related requirements. For Justin that will be simple to explain: there are two steps outside that already have a well-build Architectural Committee approved ramp over them; the doors are wide; the shower can be rolled into; the kitchen counters are low-you get the idea!

Both the Proposition 110 form and the Certificate of Disability Form are available on the web at www.sccassessor.org or stop by the SRS office and a volunteer can print the forms for you.

Please note that this property tax law requires a severe and permanent disability. The aches and pains of age alone will likely not qualify you

SRS Announcement: It will be age 66 and 8 months

You can claim your Social Security benefits at any point after reaching age 62. However, you only receive 100 percent of your benefit if you wait to claim until your full retirement age. In 2020, Social Security's full retirement age will be 66 and 8 months for people turning 62 in 2020. It increases by two months annually until it reaches age 67 for people born in or after 1960.

Saturday, December 21: Kimberly Sandstrom will lead a hike in Rancho Cañada del Oro Open Space Preserve. We will do a 9-mile hike with 1550 ft elevation gain on the Mayfair Ranch, Longwall Canyon, Bald Peaks and Catamount Trails to complete a loop. If the hikers are up for it, we will detour briefly onto the Chisnantuck Trail, although expect it to be too early to spot blooming trilliums. We will enjoy expansive views of Calero reservoir and the surrounding valleys. Bring lunch, snacks, water and sticks. Wear boots and layers. Heavy rain cancels. The drive is about 35 miles, round trip.

Wednesday, December 25 (Rambler): Christmas Day. No Hike. Saturday, December 28: Amy Meier will lead a hike in Bear Creek Redwoods Open Space. The Preserve is accessible from Bear Creek Road off Hwy 17. We will hike up Alma and Redwood Springs Trails to Madrone Knoll at elevation 2400 ft. for an elevation gain of 1400 ft. and return either on Alma trail or retrace our steps on Redwood Springs trail for a distance of approximately 7.5 miles. The trail passes through 2nd growth and old growth redwoods, Douglas fir and oak. Bathrooms are available at the beginning and end of the hike. There are no bathrooms on the trails. Dressing in layers is recommended. Bring lunch and be prepared to sit on logs or on the ground at lunchtime. Meet at Cribari at 8:15 a.m., leave at 8:30 a.m. due to limited parking. Rain cancels.

Saturday, January 4: Dan Kato will lead a long hike at Henry Cowell Redwoods state park. We will take the Eagle Creek and the Pine trails to the observation deck where we will have lunch (so bring one) and enjoy the scenic views. Returning we will likely take the pipeline road. Vertical climb is about 1000 feet and the total hiking distance 9 to 10 miles. The will be no water crossings on this one. Real flushable bathrooms available at the trailhead. Optional food stop afterward for those so inclined. Round trip from the Villages is about 80 miles. Meet at Cribari at 8 a.m. to get an early start. Heavy rain will cancel.



<u>From the VGC</u>: New golf 'Registered Guest Program' begins January 1

Beginning January 1, 2020, we will be instituting the new golf **Registered Guest Program (RGP)**, which will replace the discontinued "Preferred Unaccompanied Guest Program" (PUGP). In an effort to improve our community security we will begin this new Guest program, which will still allow The Villages to share our golf course and its amenities with selected sponsored guests but in a more controlled and monitored fashion than was provided under the previous PUGP.

1) The Villages resident will still be able to **register any number of guests**. After approval by the Pro Shop and VGC, these registered guests will be able to play and make reservations independently of a Villages member.

2) The Annual registration of each guest will incur a **\$10** administrative fee chargeable to the Villages sponsor. The registration will be *only* good for the **calendar year** beginning January 1 and ending December 31 (no prorated fee applies). *All* registered guests will be purged from the system by January 15 of the following year and it will be up to their sponsor to reregister them for continued independent play.

3) The Registered Guest and their individual guests will only be granted access to The Villages, the golf course and its amenities (driving range, putting green, and short game areas) on the date **they have a reserved tee time and their names are on the daily play sheet.**

These changes in our RGP are for the sole purpose of improving our community security. The VGC and the Pro Shop still look forward to continuing our valued relationship with all guests but in a more orderly manner. Thank you for your understanding.

Jeff has been with the Santa Clara County District Attorney's office since 1995. Before joining the District Attorney's Office, he worked for prominent law firms in Los Angeles and Washington, D.C. He received his undergraduate degree from UCLA and law degree from UC Berkeley School of Law. Jeff's wife serves as a Superior Court Judge for the State of California and they have two daughters.

January Art Film: John Vanderlyn: America's First Artist

On Tuesday, January 14 at 7 p.m. in the Vineyard Center, the Villages Arts and Crafts Association will present "America's First Artist: The Life and Times of John Vanderlyn," a film by Toby Carey. By the time John Vanderlyn was born in 1775, his family lived in the Kingston, NY and worked as artists for three generations.

As a talented portrait painter of the area's influential citizens, Vanderlyn acquired the patronage of Aaron Burr. This resulted in Vanderlyn formally training in Paris rather than London which was the preference. Burr supported France as an ally to American interests against Britain. Vanderlyn became the first American artist to study at the École des Beaux-Arts, the first to be awarded a medal for his painting Marius Amid the Ruins of Carthage. Also on exhibit at the Salon was his painting, Ariadne Asleep on the Island of Naxos, praised by the French but this public introduction to the nude genre scandalized Colonial America. French color techniques for skin tones were far too superior.

Today Vanderlyn's works are displayed at the Smithsonian American Art Museum, The MET, and Capitol Rotunda, Washington D.C. His most ambitious work, America's first 360-degree panorama 165-foot painting, Palace and Gardens of Versailles, is on permanent exhibit at The Met. Napoleon and historic figures are shown strolling the grounds.

This is a film for both artist and history buff alike.

FROM THE BOOKSHELF

"Blue Moon" by Lee Child: "This is a random universe," says Jack Reacher, "Once in a blue moon, things turn out just right." This isn't one of those times. Reacher is on a Greyhound bus minding his own business, with no particular place to go, and all the time in the world to get there. Then he steps off the bus to help an old man who is obviously just a victim waiting to happen. But you know what they say about good deeds. Now Reacher wants to make it right. An elderly couple has made a few well-meaning mistakes, and now they owe big money to some very bad people. One brazen move leads to another, and suddenly Reacher finds himself a wanted man in the middle of a brutal turf war between rival Ukrainian and Albanian gangs. He teams up with a fed-up waitress who knows a little more than she's letting on, and sets out to take down the powerful and make the greedy pay. It's a long shot. The odds are against him. But Reacher believes in a certain kind of justice, the kind that comes along once in a blue moon. Mystery 2019.

"The Guardians" by John Grisham: In the small Florida town of Seabrook, a young lawyer named Keith Russo was shot dead at his desk as he worked late one night. The killer left no clues. There were no witnesses, no one with a motive. But the police soon came to suspect Quincy Miller, a young black man who was once a client of Russo's. Quincy was tried, convicted, and sent to prison for life. For 22 years he has languished in prison, maintaining his innocence. But no one was listening. He had no lawyer, no advocate on the outside. In desperation, he writes a letter to Guardian Ministries, a small nonprofit run by Cullen Post, a lawyer who is also an Episcopal minister. Guardian accepts only a few innocence cases at a time. Cullen Post travels the country fighting wrongful convictions and taking on clients forgotten by the system. With Quincy Miller he gets far more than he bargained for. Powerful, ruthless people murdered Keith Russo, and they do not want Quincy Miller exonerated. They killed one lawyer 22 years ago and they would kill again. Fiction 2019.

"Daughter of Molokai" by Alan Brennert: Honolulu 1917. Standing on the porch was a tall unfamiliar sister in a rain-soaked habit. She was holding a bundled child, its face tucked into her shoulder. "Her name is Ruth Utagawa," Sister Catherine said, "and we've come from Kalaupapa." Infant Ruth arrives at the Kapi'olani Home for Girls after being taken from her mother, Rachel, who has spent most of her life guarantined at the isolated leprosy settlement of Kalaupapa. Ruth is adopted by a Japanese couple who raise her on a strawberry and grape farm in California. She later marries, but in the midst of WWII her world is turned upside down as she and her family face internment at Manzanar Relocation Center. Then, one day after the war. Ruth receives an unexpected letter. The signature at the bottom reads, "Rachel Utagawa." This rich and spellbinding novel tells the story of the 22-year-long relationship between two women who never expected to meet, much less come to love each other. Fiction 2019.

"The Long Call" by Ann Cleeves: In North Devon where two rivers converge and run into the sea, Detective Matthew Vern stands outside the church at his estranged father's funeral. On the day Matthew left the strict evangelical community he grew up in, he lost his family too. Now as he turns and walks away again, he receives a call from one of his team. A body has been found on the beach nearby: a man with a tattoo of an albatross on his neck, stabbed to death. The case calls Matthew back to the people and places of his past, and deadly secrets hidden in their hearts are revealed. His new life is forced into a collision course with the world he thought he had left behind. "The Long Call" is a spectacular new novel, told with deep compassion and searing insights. Mystery 2019.

Veterans Club: Learn about USS Hornet CV-12

The Villages Veterans Club meeting on January 7 at 2 p.m. at the Foothill Center will feature a program on the USS Hornet CV-12, a WWII Aircraft Carrier. The ship participated in actions in 1944 in New Guinea, Palau, and Turk and most notably in the Battle of the Philippine Sea, known as the Great Mariana Turkey Shoot. Post-war, it recovered the Apollo 11 and Apollo 12 astronauts as they returned from the moon. The ship is currently a



floating museum docked at Alameda and is open daily 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. except for three holidays. Besides the ship itself, there are many aircraft on display from the WWII and Vietnam era.

The speaker will be John Suckow who currently volunteers as a docent at the Museum. He is still working with 39 years in the printing business for California Printing, Califorms, Corporate Express, and Sierra Office Supply and Printing. John will share a unique view, as he was a Navy pilot from 1964 to 1971 with combat experience in the Vietnam era in 1967 and 1969. He had over 150 catapult launches and carrier landings on four different ships. More specifically, he flew missions from the USS Bon Homme Richard, a sister ship of the USS Hornet. We are sure he will explain why there is an escalator on the ship as one might think steps or elevators are quicker!



Did You Know? Villages author publishes memoir

Villages author Ken Kookjoo Choi has published a personal memoir about his parents' lives and sacrifices and his immigration to the United States. Published in July of 2019, the book "Return To The Motherland, My Journey To Find The Truth" tells the story of his father, a South Korean journalist and politician captured by North Korean soldiers in 1950. His father, a comrade of Kim II Sung—first leader of North Korea from 1948 until his death in 1994—disappeared without a trace after his capture.

Ken's story describes the hardships that he and his mother endured in Korea and his arrival in Portland, Oregon in 1969 as a penniless immigrant. His personal hardships continued, even though he became a very successful entrepreneur in America.

In 1993, 43 years after the author's father disappeared, Ken and his mother were invited to Pyongyang to re-unite with his half-brothers and attend a surprise luncheon with Kim II Sung, and an honorary burial service for his father. While in Korea, Ken searched for the answer to the question of who killed his father.





The book takes you along on the author's



journey as he experienced human suffering in times of war and during his other tribulations; constantly stabilized by familial love, he continued toward his eventual destination of success through achieving the American Dream.





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# FROM THE PRO

### By Scott Steele, PGA Head Golf Professional

**World Handicap System 2020**—Remember that starting January 1, 2020, our handicap system is being completely revised. The system will go dark from January 1 to 5 and everyone's handicaps will be updated. Upon re-launch, here are some of the new elements to the WHS... Handicaps will be derived by using the best 8 out of the last 20 scores, tournament scores will weigh the same as any other score, abnormal course and weather conditions will have impact on a player's posted score, handicaps will be updated daily instead of bi-monthly, there will be a limit of Net Double Bogey as the maximum hole score (for handicapping purposes only), a maximum handicap limit of 54.0, regardless of gender. I am conducting presentations for our six golf clubs explaining these changes, and please feel free to ask us in the Pro Shop any time. And *yes*, this will affect everyone's handicap, including yours!

**Christmas & Holiday Schedule**—Remember that on Christmas Eve, the Pro Shop closes at 1 p.m. The last golf cart rental will be at 10 a.m. Anyone playing after 1 p.m. will be asked to sign in on the Pro Shop door.

On Christmas Day, the Pro Shop, Driving Range, and Clubhouse are all **closed** for the day. On December 26, open play starts at 7 a.m.

We are open on New Year's Eve and New Year's Day as normal.

Happy Holidays from the Pro Shop! 2020 Resident Golf Activities Calendar—The 2020 Golf Activities Calendar starting January 1, 2020 is now available for your review on the website. Remember that this is a fluid document so as the schedule changes or events are added, we will update the calendar on-line. We will also be posting the calendar 2-months out in the golf Posting Room for your review. If your group wants to schedule a golf event for 2020, please contact PGA Director of Golf, Scott Steele in the Pro Shop.

**New Registered Guest Program**—The new and updated Registered Guest Program will go into effect January 1. What does that mean?

The current database of Preferred Unaccompanied Guests will be completely purged. All Registered Guests will have to be re-signed up, and will now be referred to as "Registered Guests."

The Registered Guest signup form will be new and every resident will have to complete the new form.

There will be a \$10 annual fee for all Registered Guests. Registered Guests will be able to reserve tee times on their own up to seven days in advance. Registered guests will only be permitted to practice on the day they play. All Registered Guests and any one in their party must be added to the Chelsea tee sheet by name in advance or they will not be allowed through the gate...i.e. everyone playing golf must be listed on the tee sheet.

An "Unaccompanied Guest" is defined as a guest of a resident who plays golf without the resident...the resident must make all reservations. A "Registered Guest" is defined as a regular guest of The Villages who has completed the Registered Guest Form and paid the \$10 fee, and may make reservations on their own without resident involvement. Let us know if you have any questions.

**Tips from the Pro—Here are some tips to battle against the wet golf course conditions... Driver:** Strive for a higher trajectory. Play the ball 1 inch more forward than normal. Tee the ball one notch higher than normal. Tilt your right shoulder down more at address = more vertical shoulder tilt. Loft your driver up 1 degree using the wrench and hosel adjustment.

**Approach Shots:** Play the ball 1inch further back in your stance to be sure you hit the ball first. Play 1-2 clubs more than normal from the same yardage (the ball will not fly as far nor roll out as much as in summer months). In the rough, grip it a bit tighter as wet rough can grab and manipulate the club-head through impact.

**Short Game:** The greens are slower and thicker, so hit it harder! When chipping or pitching go down one club...i.e. instead of a lob wedge, use a 54 degree; or instead of an 8-iron bump and run, use a 7-iron. When pitching, chose a landing spot that is a bit closer to the hole.

**Putting:** Try gripping it a bit tighter to impart more force into the ball. Make your backstroke longer to allow the ball to roll out more. Strive to putt past the hole on your first putt.

Here are some other wet weather tips and things to experiment with:

1. Try using a firmer, less spinning golf ball...for instance instead of a Titleist ProV1, try an AVX or Tour Soft. Some less spinning high performance balls are: Titleist AVX or Tour Soft; Callaway ERC, Srixon Q-Star or Soft Feel, Bridgestone E12.

2. Try aiming for the first cut of rough. I know this sounds "crazy" but hear me out. Take a 40 yard pitch...I much prefer being in the light rough for this shot than in a short cut fairway, as it's simply easier to hit. Well think of a fairway approach in wet conditions...wouldn't you much rather have a nice fluffy lie in the light rough than a tight and wet lie in the fairway? It's OK to think outside the box as I do...and nobody cares if you hit the green from the fairway or rough. 3. Wear soft spikes instead of spikeless shoes. Balance and traction are key in wet conditions...so set yourself up to succeed by wearing soft spikes and leave those spikeless shoes in the closet until the summer returns.

4. Clean your clubs off. Don't let your clubface and grooves get full of mud or wet grass as this will negatively affect your shots. So bring a brush and a towel, and clean your clubs after every shot.

Dealer has maybe a Spade loser, 1 in Hearts, 1 in Diamonds, and at least a Club loser.

Strategy: When South looks at his hand and his partner's, it appears this deal has distributional issues. So to ensure his contract and maybe get extra tricks, he will try to set up the Diamond suit and rough some Clubs before dealing with trumps.

West leads the 9 of Clubs, South trumps, switches to a Heart, wins with the Ace, tries a finesse with the 9 of Diamonds from his hand, hoping West has the Jack and the King. West plays the 8, 4 of Diamonds from the board, East the 3, and South continues with his last Diamond from his hand, West, the Jack, Queen from the board; and then plays the Ace and sluffs his losing Heart from his hand. He leads a Heart, trumps it in his hand, follows with a Club, trumps it on the board, plays a Heart, East, the 7 of Spades, and South wins with the Queen. He then leads a Club, trumps it on the board, follows with another Heart, East covers with the 8 of Spades, South, the King, next plays the Ace of Spades, then the Jack of Clubs, and East wins with the Ace. He then leads his last card, the Jack of Spades and captures South's little Spade. Great! The contract is made with 2 overtricks. If South uses the Queen of Diamonds on the first Diamond finesse, he will only make 3 Spades due to not being able to sluff a Heart before the opponents get the lead.

\* Some West players might bid 3 Clubs, and they should go down 2 tricks or less but this isn't too bad since they are not vulnerable, and South might not bid any further. Another scenario is that South could double the 3-Club bid.

### Along the Way—a trip down Memory Lane

Once upon a time, we all sent and received dozens of Christmas cards each season. I remember as a young married couple how we would carefully log all cards received and sent on lists that tracked them year to year. We watched for any new ones to ensure that we reciprocated. And we watched for anyone who stopped sending to us at least two years in a row and would then stop sending to them. It was easy to be cynical and note via the mailing dates which people had planned to stop the exchange, but lost their nerve when they received one from us. I knew

because we did the same thing! As a teenager I had been oblivious to this whole process, except for how Mom would string the cards received and loop them across the entryway into the kitchen. Sandy and I did the same thing most years back then.

For the first ten years or so of our marriage, from the mid-1960s to the mid-1970s, we received a Christmas card each year from a couple named Thelma and Lefty. And each year I would ask Sandy to remind me again who these people were. She would patiently explain that Thelma was a cousin of "Grandpa Fitz" (Fitzhenry,) her maternal grandfather, who had already passed away. She hadn't seen Thelma for many years and didn't remember ever meeting Lefty. For a few years after the mid-1970s the cards were signed only by Thelma, and we knew that Lefty must have died. The year finally came when there was no card from Thelma at all, and we knew she was gone, too. Along the way, I gained an appreciation for the little lifelines that these Christmas card rituals represented. My cynicism was revived, however, during my last working years when a client's computer faithfully sent Holiday Greetings to my computer. I knew they had never met.

I remember the annual trek up the mountain to get our tree. It was always the day after Thanksgiving. Our favorite lots sold

"Any tree - \$25." We had a vaulted ceiling, so the room could handle a pretty big tree. And my natural tendency was to get the biggest tree that could possibly fit in our house for \$25. We still remember how our oldest would not give in until she had seen every tree and was convinced that the one we had chosen was the best. Only then did Dad use the saw and claim the tree.

Well, Mount Umunhum is becoming a regional park now; our oldest just turned fifty; and most of us pull a fake tree out of storage each year now. But don't we all decorate the trees with memories and mementoes? Don't we like to tell the stories again, especially to the grandkids, who want to experience Christmas the way their parents did when they were children? Don't we all wish each other a blessed holiday season again this year?

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


### Michael Phillip Myers July 30, 1934 – December 6, 2019



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
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
