At the end of this year, Mayor Sam Liccardo is termed out as he will have completed his two terms as mayor of San Jose. On June 7 there will be a Primary Election for us to select a new mayor. San Jose uses a top-two primary system; if no candidate receives a majority of the June 7, 2022 vote, a runoff will be held between the top two candidates on November 8, 2022.

On Monday, April 18 from 6:30 p.m. – 8 p.m.) the Villages Democratic Club is sponsoring a Mayoral Forum in the Clubhouse Fairway Room. Moderated by The League of Women Voters, this is a non-partisan event and open to all Villagers. It appears that since the residents of The Villages are a captive audience and not enough avenues are explored to reduce the constantly growing HOA fees; in some cases additional superfluous services are being considered to be added (e.g. the dog park and sidewalks!).

I understand that one of the potential increases for this year is to build up the savings for new roofs here in Del Lago. The existing roofs will last a long time, far longer than what the manufacturers indicate as the life expectancy of the roofing material; after all, it's in the best interest for the roofing manufacturers to scare us into prematurely buying new roofing. The number given for life expectancy are for far more harsh climates than those we experience here.

I feel it's issues like the roofing (and formerly the requirement for painting) that need to be looked at from a logical direction and modify some of the "fixed" maintenance requirements.

We residents have but two options. One is to suck it up, and the second being to sell hoping the new buyers don't have an issue with the exorbitant, and perennially growing, HOA fees. -Ed McJay

I see staff published the "Waterfluence Irrigation Audits." These are scores from Waterfluence Water Use Monitoring reports (BrightView averages 47.7). These reports can be very misleading. Monitoring reports look at overall water used compared to estimated usage but not how it is applied. You can have a perfect score but some areas could be dying (some areas are over watered and some under watered). "Irrigation audit" is a standard industry term requiring specific information including distribution uniformity (water applied evenly means less water can be applied) and irrigation efficiency (over/under spray, broken/blocked sprinklers, alignment, runoff, misting, soil type, exposure, scheduling, etc.). For example, north facing lawns should be on a different watering schedule than the sunnier south facing lawns (but they don't appear to be in Sonata). In other words those scores do not show you how efficient our system could be. Waterfluence's Field Surveys are closer to an audit although due to their limited time on site they only check some areas for irrigation efficiency. I have measured the distribution uniformity in several areas where I live and the values were 63%, 54% (incorrect sprinkler installed), 38% (sprinkler problem), and 62% (70+% is ideal and 60+% OK).

Association/Homeowners documents available via e-mail

Per an amendment to California Civil Code, homeowner associations are permitted, with owner's written consent, to distribute annual disclosures, (like the pro forma budget summary) and other specified association documents to owners via electronic mail, facsimile, or other electronic means (such as posting on the association's website) instead of sending those documents out by regular mail or personal delivery. This has the potential to provide cost savings to The Villages. Delivery and postage costs for the Villages' annual distribution of the pro forma budget summary alone are close to \$1,000, not to mention the paper and printing costs.

In order to transmit association documents via e-mail or by posting on the homeowners association's website, 1) the homeowners association must first receive the owner's written consent, and 2) the homeowners association sends a separate notice to the owner that the documents have been posted and are available for viewing.

Consent forms for owners to request delivery of documents have been developed for both The Villages Association and Homeowners Corporations. These forms provide an owner's consent to electronic delivery of documents that are capable, under current laws, of being distributed electronically. Owners have the right to revoke this request and receive "hard copies" of the documents by sending a written revocation signed by the owner, to the applicable corporation.

Forms of owner's written consent are available in Business Administration Buildings A and B, and on The Villages web site, http://www.thevillagesgcc.com (Click on *Resident Info* and then Click on *Resource Files*.)

FROM THE CLUB BOARD

General Manager Update

This is the first in a series of bi-weekly updates from the Club Board of Directors (CBOD) on the search for a replacement for General Manager, Tim Sutherland, who resigned March 29. Reminder, Tim's last day will be April 29.

Fortunately, the General Manager search process from five years ago was well documented. That process has already been fully reviewed, and some items are already being put in place by the CBOD.

Organizational meetings have started and the CBOD has assigned some responsibilities to Board Directors. The CBOD is also refining the relevant requirements documents and job description for this critical leadership position.

The CBOD wishes to emphasize that finding the right candidate is more important than rushing the process. The CBOD will perform due diligence in exploring all possibilities. While the CBOD has the final hiring decision, all three elected boards will be involved throughout the process.

Assistant General Manager Julia Meadows, with the assistance of the CBOD, will step in as Interim General Manager, taking over management of the day-to-day affairs of The Villages until a replacement can be hired. All other senior staff personnel will remain in their current roles during this time.

Management

Coyote reminder and tips

Coyotes may try to escort walkers out of an area to protect their pups or food sources when encountered on a trail or street. Humans may perceive this behavior as stalking, which is usually not the case. They may also view your pet as prey. To allow coyotes to be wild while keeping yourself and pets safe, please follow these pointers:

• Never feed coyotes—it is illegal to feed coyotes in most places. Feeding endangers your family and neighbors because it lures coyotes into neighborhoods.

• Keep unattended cats and dogs indoors or in completely enclosed runs, especially at night, and do not assume that a fence will keep a coyote out of your backyard.

• Accompany your leashed pet outside. Make sure you turn on lights if it is dark to check your backyard for unexpected wildlife.

• Keep dogs on short leashes while walking outside; the Division of Wildlife recommends a leash no longer than 6 feet.

• Keep noisemakers on hand to scare away coyotes that may enter your yard. Some examples of noise makers are whistles, horns or metal cans with small rocks or coins that rattle.

· Never run away or turn your back on a coyote.

• Do not allow a coyote to get between you and your pet or child-keep children close to you.

• Yell, clap hands, blow a whistle or rattle a can and try to make yourself look larger if you have a close encounter with a coyote.

• An empty soda can with pennies sealed with duct tape makes a very good noise maker when shaken.

Reminder to all small pet owners: A recent rise in coyote aggression has been seen with small dogs, most unleashed. *Please always leash your pets. Keep leases short.* Coyotes will try to get between you and your pet if the leash is extended far enough. Coyotes are known to attack leashed dogs when the owner gets distracted. Please stay cautious and aware of your surroundings when cleaning up after your pet, talking to a neighbor, checking the mail, etc. Coyotes are opportunists and may make their attacks when you are not paying attention.

Carry a noise maker and always be alert. Use caution when walking past wooded areas, hiding spots between homes, and the golf course. They are widespread in The Villages and can truly be anywhere.

There is no way to completely eliminate coyotes from The Villages so always use caution when walking, especially with pets. Also, coyotes tend to be most active around sunrise and sunset. Pick different times for walks.

The shredding truck is coming!

On Saturday, April 23 a shredding truck will be in the Cribari Center east parking lot from 9 a.m. to 11:15 a.m. The completion of tax preparation is the ideal time to sort and organize those ancient record files. Which financial records should you keep a while longer and which have served their purpose for reference or proof of a transaction?

SRS has a handout titled "Record Retention: What personal documents should you keep and for how long?" This handout classifies things by length of time: What to keep for one year, four years, seven years, while still active, and keep forever.

The federal income tax statute of limitations for making changes to your tax return by either you or the IRS is three years after filing. However, if the IRS determines your gross income was under reported by more than 25 percent, the IRS then has six years to change your return. For your state income tax returns, the California Franchise Tax Board adds one more year to these two limitations, i.e., four or seven years. Consequently, many professionals recommend saving your tax data and a copy of your tax returns for seven years.

Purchase records of assets, such as your home or financial investments, should be kept until the asset is sold to document the cost and consequent gain. If you receive an asset as a gift, the giver should include a copy of the giver's federal gift tax return (form 709) for you to keep until the asset is sold. If you inherit an asset, you should also receive IRS form 8971 listing a beneficiary's basis in inherited assets.

Because of the risk of identity theft, shred any records that contain your Social Security number or bank account number. Don't forget that Monday, April 11 is the last date for paying your second installment of your Santa Clara County real estate tax for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2022.

You may pay online at https://payments.sccgov.org/propertytax/. There is no fee for paying electronically. Just have your checkbook in front of you so you can record the routing and account number. This way you don't have to worry about your check getting lost in the mail and you immediately receive a payment receipt by e-mail if you give them your e-address.

There is a 2.25 percent fee for paying with a credit or debit card rather than from your bank account. If you pay with a paper check, your payment envelope needs to be postmarked by April 11 and you need to hope the mail goes through efficiently.





I remember as a child during Easter my siblings would come together as a family in my aunt and uncle's home, where three of my sisters lived. I was the youngest and lived with another aunt, uncle, and cousin. My father had left my mother with seven children in the early 1950s.

My sisters would wear floral dresses, pig tail hair styles, Easter bonnets, patent leather shoes, with gloves and purses which were all purchased by our relatives. The boys would always wear white shirts, bow ties, and black trousers.

My aunt, who was an excellent cook, prepared dinner while others would hide the decorated eggs which were prepared the day before. After dinner, we enjoyed chocolate bunnies, peeps, jellybeans and of course the eggs we found that had been hidden in the yard and around the house.

As a young man, I learned the significance of the single most important event in human history. The event which changed the trajectory of humanity was Easter... the Resurrection of Jesus Christ, the Son of God. In His death, burial and resurrection all sins would be forgiven with the assurance of eternal life upon repentance and believing in His name.

Holy Week

The Catholic celebration of Holy Week, the seven days prior to Easter Sunday devoted to remembering the Passion (suffering) and death of Jesus Christ, begins this Sunday (Palm Sunday). During Holy Week, Catholics around the world ritually re-enact the last days of Jesus' life, particularly on the last three: Holy Thursday, Good Friday, and Holy Saturday, known collectively as the "Triduum." Holy Week is the most sacred week in the church year, and its elaborate services are ancient.

April 10: Palm Sunday, Catholics dramatize Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem. Carrying palms, they often process around the church, imitating the crowds that laid palms on the ground before Jesus, who entered Jerusalem on a donkey. Mass: 8:15 Cribari, St. Francis Chapel: regular Sunday Schedule, see parish website for details.

April 13: Wednesday, celebration of the ancient liturgical service of Tenebrae. Scriptural passages related to the Passion are read as twelve candles are slowly extinguished, darkening the church. St. Francis Chapel: 7 p.m.

April 14: Holy Thursday commemorates the Last Supper and marks the origin of two sacraments: the Eucharist and Holy Orders. Mass includes washing the feet of 12 attendees representing the apostles. Historically, the Eucharist was removed from the church to a side chapel, the altar stripped of linens, and decorations removed so as to create a sense of desolation in anticipation of Jesus' suffering and death. Mass: St. Francis Chapel: 7 p.m.

April 15: Good Friday Services: Morning Prayer - 8:30 a.m. (Chapel), Confessions: 9 - 11 a.m. (Chapel). Liturgy of the Word, Adoration of the Cross and Holy Communion: Cribari 2-3 p.m. St. Francis of Assisi: 12 p.m., 3 p.m., 7 p.m.

Passover

"My father was wandering Aramean." These words from the Torah, the Five Books of Moses, are repeated on Passover at the Seder (the ritual meal of Passover). They remind us that we were nomads. We were without a fixed home. The Egyptian Hieroglyphic for us consisted of two feet (walking). We



were from over there (literally, the Hebrew word for a Hebrew is Ivri, from the word Iver, across). We were so different that the Egyptians would not even eat with us, according to the Torah. Although the first ghetto was established to house us and lock us up at night, in Venice, Italy in the 16th century, perhaps our first real segregation came in Egypt when we were shuttled off to the Land of Goshen, out of the mainstream. It is much easier to oppress, or at least control, a people if they are in a defined space. You can find them, count them, hunt them, starve them, track them, or even as our story goes, enslave them.

We choose not to hide from our heritage. Instead, we retell the story of Pharaoh's attempt to kill us through genocide every year and thereby uphold up our history, with pride. With the Parsley dipped in the salt water at the Seder, we say, "That is where we started, but just look at us now." Born in tears that were shed, we have arrived at a spring time moment that affirms that new life (represented by the green parsley, the fruit of the earth) has triumphed once again over the stark, darkness of winter. You may bind us up, in the case of our slavery for 430 years, but you cannot strip is of our hope. Hope is the lifeblood of freedom. If we hold onto our hope, our collective soul is still free. You may imprison us, but our spirit will remain free.

During Passover we also eat Matza, the poor bread, the bread of affliction. We do so not just because of Tradition. We do so to remind ourselves of what we have been through. We do so to remind ourselves of the kinship we have with other afflicted human beings, who may not look or worship like us, but suffer oppression as we have. We do so to remind ourselves of the obligation that comes with our continued survival, lest it become a meaningless exercise in existence. Let us not lose the lessons of Passover. We are commanded to teach them to our children. We are commanded to eat horseradish, bitter herbs, so that we feel that sting every year, and act to redeem others from their unwarranted discomfort.

At this time, my thoughts turn to the Ukraine, where parts of my family lived. At the end of the Seder, when we say, "Next year may all be free", may those words motivate us to care even more about the suffering of others and push us to take merciful action to ease that suffering.

April 16: Holy Saturday: In the evening, the church celebrates its most sacred and elaborate liturgical ritual of the year, the Easter Vigil when Catholics recall and celebrate Jesus' resurrection. Services begin in the dark. Outside, a bonfire is generally set ablaze and blessed. From its flames candles are lit and carried into the church, then passed from person to person to illuminate the dark interior. During this Mass, Baptisms and some Confirmations take place. The mood is joyous and the service filled with hymns and multiple readings from Scripture.

April 16: (Saturday night) Easter Vigil Mass: St. Francis Chapel: 8 p.m.

April 17: Easter Sunday Masses Cribari: 8:15 a.m., St Francis: 6:30 a.m., 8 a.m., 10 a.m., 12 p.m., 2 p.m. (Spanish), 4 p.m. (Vietnamese)

Palms and Protest

This weekend marks Palm Sunday, one of the pivotal events in the Lenten journey towards Easter. Our Sunday rituals and music recall Jesus' entry into Jerusalem-mentioned in all four Gospels-just about a week before his crucifixion. Palm branches were, of course, one of several symbols declaring his entry to the city as king. The ceremonial entry was thus triumphant and tinged with foreboding. Palm branches were both a celebration of Jesus' way of peace, and a protest against the imperial power of Rome.

Curiously—and perhaps not so coincidentally—this weekend also celebrates another martyr of the church. Dietrich Bonhoeffer was a German Lutheran pastor, theologian, and anti-Nazi dissident. Bonhoeffer was associated with a plot to kill Hitler; a painful theological contradiction for a Christian committed to peace. He was hanged in 1945 by the Nazi regime on the verge of collapse.

In his transformative book The Cost of Discipleship, Bonhoeffer wrote: "Grace is costly because

it calls us to follow, and it is grace because it calls us to follow Jesus Christ. It is costly because it costs a man his life, and it is grace because it gives a man the only true life. It is costly because it condemns sin... Above all, it is costly because it cost God the life of his Son." Ride on, ride on in majesty, as the old hymn declares: and let's lift our palms for Jesus and all his disciples who risked everything for God's sake.



ment to the target with both the lower body and the delivery of the club. And it is done at their tempo, which allows for body harmonization with the club and the resultant prefect balance. So, if you feel yourself rocking backward or flat footed or off balance, look at these images and try to emulate their finish positions. I guarantee you will make better contact.

A great drill to practice ...put a tee in the grass to use the range tee with no ball and make a full effort driver swing...try to clip the tee and hold your finish up on your back toe for 30 seconds.




