## Non-Partisan Mayoral Forum to be held at Villages

Come and possibly meet the next mayor of San Jose. At the end of this year, Mayor Sam Liccardo is termed out as he will have completed his two terms as San Jose mayor. On June 7 there will be a Primary Election for us to select a new mayor. San Jose uses a top-two primary system; if no candidate receives a majority of the June 7, 2022 vote, a runoff will be held between the top two candidates on November 8, 2022.

On Monday, April 18 from 6:30 p.m. – 8 p.m. the Villages Democratic Club is sponsoring a Mayoral Forum in the Clubhouse Fairway Room. Moderated by The League of Women Voters, this is a non-partisan event and open to all Villagers. The mayoral candidates will offer an opportunity for Villagers to hear and ask about our special concerns. The candidates are: **Cindy Chavez**, Democrat (Santa Clara County Supervisor); **Dev Davis**, Independent (San Jose City Councilmember); **Matt Mahan**, Democrat (San Jose City Councilmember); **Travis Nicholas Hill**, Independent (Student); **Raul Peralez**, Democrat (San Jose City Councilmember); **Jim Spence**, Republican (Former San Jose Police Department officer), **Marshall Woodmansee**, Independent (Student).

There are many issues facing our community including homelessness, public transport and safety to highlight just a few. Do join us on April 18 for this special opportunity to meet the leading contenders to be elected to the Office of Mayor or compete in the November 8 runoff. Hear what they have to say, raise your own concerns and be ready to choose your candidate in the June 7, Primary Election.

## Association/Homeowners documents available via e-mail

Per an amendment to California Civil Code, homeowner associations are permitted, with owner's written consent, to distribute annual disclosures, (like the pro forma budget summary) and other specified association documents to owners via electronic mail, facsimile, or other electronic means (such as posting on the association's website) instead of sending those documents out by regular mail or personal delivery. This has the potential to provide cost savings to The Villages. Delivery and postage costs for the Villages' annual distribution of the pro forma budget summary alone are close to \$1,000, not to mention the paper and printing costs.

In order to transmit association documents via e-mail or by posting on the homeowners association's website, 1) the homeowners association must first receive the owner's written consent, and 2) the homeowners association sends a separate notice to the owner that the documents have been posted and are available for viewing.

Consent forms for owners to request delivery of documents have been developed for both The Villages Association and Homeowners Corporations. These forms provide an owner's consent to electronic delivery of documents that are capable, under current laws, of being distributed electronically. Owners have the right to revoke this request and receive "hard copies" of the documents by sending a written revocation signed by the owner, to the applicable corporation.

We all have our excuses... "I know, I know, I'm going to do it. I have plenty of time to fill out that form!" "I'm healthy and don't need to do it right now." But the time is now to get it done! The VMA is sponsoring a workshop on Wednesday, April 20 at 10:30 a.m. in the Cribari Conference Room to help you get this important document completed. An advanced Health Care Directive is a legal document that appoints one or more individuals you trust to make medical decisions for you when you are unable to do so. It sets forth the types of medical treatment you want to receive and the medical treatment you do not want. It ensures that your treatment wishes are honored. It is different from a Living Will.

The workshop will be presented by Sabine Hass, who is a Nurse Practitioner with Grace Hospice. She will help you complete the forms to create this legal document.

## EPC: More than Emergency Response

Villager volunteers from the Emergency Preparedness Committee have multiple missions. Yes, they are community guardians in an emergency. But the group's ongoing mission day in and day out is to help Villagers prepare themselves for emergencies large and small.

So, it is not just about checking on neighbors and identifying needs *during* an earthquake or fire. It is more about helping us know what to have on hand, and what we need to do to put us in the best position of safety when something does happen.

Most of us do not like to think about the inevitability of disaster. It is easier to pretend it isn't going to happen. But that is not reality.

Which is why the EPC developed its "red folder" of information that is distributed to all Villagers at move-in. It contains invaluable checklists, such as a homeowner disaster preparedness list, a family three-day survival pack list, and an emergency supply and water storage checklist. But it also helps you in daily life with information on the benefits of dryer vent cleaning, tips for homeowners who have a water heater and on kitchen safety. If you own a pet as many of us do, it has info on how to keep pets safe during power outages.

There's a lot in that red folder that you truly need to know. Do you know where *your* red folder is? If not, contact Rebecca Dreitlein in Building B at 408-754-1336 for another copy. ## Notice of Proposed Changes to Association Rule 2.24 Outside Holiday Decorations

Proposed changes to The Villages Association Rule 2.24 Outside Holiday Decorations were approved for publication and member comment period prior to formal approval consideration at the May 31, 2022, regular monthly meeting.

The purpose of proposed changes is to update the rule to allow a district to apply to the Association Board of Directors for temporary non-political decorating during another time or in another area in their district for up to a three week period once per year.

Deletions are noted in ~~strikethrough~~ font; additions are underlined.

Response to the proposed rule changes may be made by one or more of the following methods: 1) Participation in the discussion of the proposed changes at the Association Board of Directors board meetings (April 26, and May 31, 2022), or 2) via written comments delivered to the Board through Maria Hernandez in the General Manager's office at [mehernandez@the-villages.com](mailto:mehernandez@the-villages.com).

Holiday spirit is encouraged at the Villages. However, some residents do not remove their decorations for extended periods of time. Here are the rules to follow:

### 1. December Holiday Season Decorations.

Each Village should exercise common sense in the Common Areas to keep the decorations from being a problem. The committees should arrange for their displays to be removed no later than January 15.

Residents must remove lights (colored, plain, icicle or flashing) and other decorations by January 15.

### 2. Other Holiday Decorations.

These are to be removed from Villas and Common within seven days after the holiday. This includes lights (as mentioned above) and other decorations such as, but not limited to, inflated objects, pumpkins, posters, baskets, large eggs, statues and streamers.

### 3. Decoration Location

While decorations provided by individual districts through DAC Decorating Committees are typically limited to regularly celebrated holidays and in the areas adjacent to the specific Village signs, any district may apply to the ABOD to allow for temporary non-political decorating during another time or in another area in their district for up to a three week period once per year. No decorations may impede traffic on roads, cart paths or walking paths.

So, if you take an offer that is at the last price sold in this market, you may very well be underselling your home. ## Call 911 for medical emergencies

**Public Safety Reminder:** In case of a medical emergency, please remember to dial 911 first. Public Safety monitors all emergency calls through San Jose Fire Dispatch. We will respond at the exact same time as the Fire Department and Paramedics. Calling the front gate can only delay response time by emergency personnel. It is always quicker to call 911. It is the only phone call you will need to make.

## Coyote reminder and tips

Coyotes may try to escort walkers out of an area to protect their pups or food sources when encountered on a trail or street. Humans may perceive this behavior as stalking, which is usually not the case. They may also view your pet as prey. To allow coyotes to be wild while keeping yourself and pets safe, please follow these pointers:

- Never feed coyotes—it is illegal to feed coyotes in most places. Feeding endangers your family and neighbors because it lures coyotes into neighborhoods.
- Keep unattended cats and dogs indoors or in completely enclosed runs, especially at night, and do not assume that a fence will keep a coyote out of your backyard.
- Accompany your leashed pet outside. Make sure you turn on lights if it is dark to check your backyard for unexpected wildlife.
- **Keep dogs on short leashes while walking outside; the Division of Wildlife recommends a leash no longer than 6 feet.**
- Keep noisemakers on hand to scare away coyotes that may enter your yard. Some examples of noise makers are whistles, horns or metal cans with small rocks or coins that rattle.
- Never run away or turn your back on a coyote.
- Do not allow a coyote to get between you and your pet or child—keep children close to you.
- Yell, clap hands, blow a whistle or rattle a can and try to make yourself look larger if you have a close encounter with a coyote.
- An empty soda can with pennies sealed with duct tape makes a very good noise maker when shaken.

**Reminder to all small pet owners:** A recent rise in coyote aggression has been seen with small dogs, most unleashed. **Please always leash your pets. Keep leashes short.** Coyotes will try to get between you and your pet if the leash is extended far enough. Coyotes are known to attack leashed dogs when the owner gets distracted. Please stay cautious and aware of your surroundings when cleaning up after your pet, talking to a neighbor, checking the mail, etc. Coyotes are opportunists and may make their attacks when you are not paying attention.

Carry a noise maker and always be alert. Use caution when walking past wooded areas, hiding spots between homes, and the golf course. They are widespread in The Villages and can truly be anywhere.

There is no way to completely eliminate coyotes from The Villages so always use caution when walking, especially with pets. Also, coyotes tend to be most active around sunrise and sunset. Pick different times for walks.

## **(SRS) SENIOR RESOURCE SERVICES**

### *Time to file – time to pay*

Monday, April 18, is Tax Day. The final day for the SRS free tax preparation service was April 11. If you can't file on time, what should you do? First advice: Do not panic. You may request a Federal six-month extension of time to file. You do not need to explain why you are asking for additional time. However, note that an extension only extends the date to **file** your return; it does not extend the date to **pay** your tax. The final payment date of your 2021 income tax is April 18, 2022.

There are three ways to request an automatic extension of time to file from the IRS. 1) The fastest and easiest way is through [irs.gov](https://www.irs.gov). Enter "Free File Extension" in the search box. Taxpayers can electronically request an extension on Form 4868. This service is free for everyone, regardless of income. Filing this form gives taxpayers until October 17 to file their tax return. Remember, to get the extension taxpayers must estimate their tax liability on this form and pay any amount due.

2) You may pay your estimated income tax due and indicate that the payment is for an extension using Direct Pay, the Electronic Federal Tax Payment System, at [irs.gov](https://www.irs.gov). There is no need to file a separate Form 4868 extension request when making an electronic payment and indicating it is for an extension. The IRS will automatically count it as an extension. There is no charge for a direct deduction from your checking or savings account. However, there is a fee for a debit card or a credit card.

3) You may file a paper Form 4868 and enclose the payment if tax is due. Don't have a computer to print the form? The SRS office will be open on Monday, April 18 and can print you a Form 4868.

If you believe you do not owe any California tax, no form is required to be filed with the Franchise Tax Board. Your due date for filing a return is automatically extended for six months. If you estimate you owe California taxes, the FTB requires a "Payment Voucher for Automatic Extension for Individuals" (FTB Form 3519) postmarked by April 18 or your taxes paid electronically from your home computer at [ftb.ca.gov](https://ftb.ca.gov)

Taxpayers should file an extension even if they can't pay the full amount of estimated tax due. By filing either a regular return or requesting an extension by the April 18 filing deadline, they will avoid the late-filing penalty, which can be 10 times as costly as the penalty for not paying.

California has comparable interest and penalties.

## ***Full retired age changed again***

For the Villagers not yet on Social Security (SS) we remind you that the full retirement age (FRA) has again changed. FRA is the age when you can get your standard benefit.

For anyone who turned 66 in 2021, FRA was 66 years and two months. But for anyone who won't celebrate their 66th birthday until this year, 2022, FRA will be 66 and 4 months—two full months later. That means you will have to wait longer to claim benefits if you want to avoid losing some of your monthly income due to an early claim.

SS amendments passed in 1983 is gradually shifting FRA back from 65 to age 67 for people born in 1960 or after.

Brilliantly paced, unsettling, and unapologetically fierce, “Such a Pretty Smile” is a powerful allegory for what it can mean to be a woman, and a rallying cry for anyone who has ever been told to sit down, shut up, and smile pretty. **“Think Again” by Adam Grant:** The author examines the critical art of rethinking: learning to question your opinions and open other people’s minds, which can position you for excellence at work and wisdom in life. Intelligence is usually seen as the ability to think and learn, but in a rapidly changing world, there is another set of cognitive skills that might matter more: the ability to rethink and unlearn. Too many of us favor the comfort of conviction over the discomfort of doubt. We listen to opinions that make us feel good instead of ideas that make us think hard. ### 'Risen, Indeed'

A traditional Easter greeting in the church is the exclamation "He is risen!" followed by the response is "He is risen, indeed!" In liturgical traditions, like the Episcopal church, this exchange of words is called the "Paschal greeting". The words are sometimes accompanied, depending on the specific church and culture, by an exchange of kisses on alternate cheeks. Myself, I say it calls for a high five!

Exactly how this practice came into common Eastertide usage is not known, but it is clearly based in Luke 24:34 wherein the two disciples who had met Jesus on the way to Emmaus returned to Jerusalem. There the other disciples told them "The Lord has risen indeed, and has appeared to Simon!" That is to say, the Good News was spreading fast!

In the Eastern Orthodox tradition, Mary Magdalene is credited with popularizing this greeting, when she supposedly addressed Emperor Tiberius with the words "Christ is risen". This cannot have earned her the approval of the Emperor, but she clearly had another goal in mind. She wanted to announce the truth of God's triumph over death, and the certainty that life cannot ultimately be extinguished by the abuse of power. That's the work all Christians share, most especially during the 50 days of Easter. Spread the Good News, my friends: the resurrection of Christ is our salvation and our hope.

On this Easter we are again privileged and blessed to celebrate the Resurrection of Jesus as the central mystery of our faith. We, too, can almost feel out of breath like Peter and the Beloved Disciple after their run to the tomb, and feel the surprise of Mary on seeing the empty tomb. (Jn. 20:1-9)

Here we are, thousands of years later, remembering this act of God in raising Jesus. Remembering what the angel said to Mary, at the Annunciation, "Nothing will be impossible for God" (Lk 1:37). Elsewhere, Saint Luke tells us, "God raised him up, having freed him from death." (Acts 2:24) And the Risen Christ is a pledge of what is in store for all those who live believing in Him.

Through Baptism, we share in the life of the Risen Christ now. St. Paul tells us, "When Christ your life appears, then you, too, will appear with him in glory." (Colossians 3:1-4)

**Tips from the Pro—The Short Way to Success**

With over 60 percent of your strokes coming from inside of 100 yards, it is essential that you spend a proportionate amount of time on your **short game** as you practice. You should devote most of your short game practice to putting and pitching. These two shots make up the majority of your short game strokes. And lucky enough, it just so happens that here at The Villages we have ample areas to practice your short game. So as I have said before, spend 10 minutes per day putting...use 1 ball and simulate real golf. Then go spend another 20 minutes chipping and pitching at one of our fine practice greens. 

## OBITUARY

### Charles Bee Langenstein Jr. February 11, 1921 — March 23, 2022



Charles 'Chuck' Langenstein died shortly after a bad fall in his home. He was 101. He was born in Freeport, IL, the son of Charles Langenstein Sr. and Lydia (Buethe) Langenstein. Charles grew up in northern Illinois. As a child he permanently lost most of his hearing during a bout with German measles. He overcame this by becoming a very proficient lip-reader. He graduated from Freeport High School, Class of 1939 and attended Univ. of Illinois majoring in Engineering prior to being drafted into the Navy during WWII. His tour of duty included time in San Francisco, Hawaii, the Aleutian Islands and Japan on the USS Anderson.

During a stay in San Francisco, he met Irene Fay at a USO dance. They became engaged two weeks later and, after his release from the service, were married December 2, 1945. Irene was the love of his life. They were happily married for the next 68 years. She passed away in 2013 after a long battle with dementia. Charles was the sole caretaker for Irene during this time.

After his tenure in the Navy, Charles completed his Mechanical Engineering degree at Univ. of Wisconsin. His professional career was primarily in the paper, gypsum, and cement industries where he put his engineering talent to work. Late in his career he was responsible for the construction of cement plants in the U.S. and Hong Kong for Kaiser Cement and Gypsum.

Charles was amazingly healthy during his long life. He loved projects, especially building things and, later, managing his real estate properties. This kept him active and contributed to his longevity. He lived in The Villages for almost 30-years, initially in Olivas, then Verano, finally in Del Lago. He loved the pace of life and the community activities that were available. He especially enjoyed the sport of Bocce Ball and social activities with friends.

Charles is survived by his four children: Mary Edwards, Thomas Langenstein, Elisa Ligon and Charles James Langenstein and their spouses, Jim Edwards, Naomi Kitajima and Karen Langenstein. Charles also had six grandchildren: Michael Edwards, Stephen Edwards, Jonelyn Langenstein, Seth Ligon, Jeffrey Langenstein and Jacob Langenstein, one surrogate grandchild, Lisa Nishamura and five great grandchildren: Ava Edwards, Zachery Edwards, Elena Edwards, Callie Maekawa and Clyde Maekawa.

The family will be hosting a casual 'Celebration of Life' at his Village condo at 3404 Lake Garda Dr. on Sunday, May 1st from 4 – 6 p.m. Friends are invited.

**Rambler Hike, April 20:** Gary Lohr (408-912-5124) will lead a hike to Evergreen College and Montgomery Hill Park. We'll meet at Cribari at 8:50 a.m. and depart at 9 a.m. We'll walk to the campus and then up Yerba Buena to Falls Creek Dr, back to the campus and on to the shopping center for coffee. There is a moderate elevation gain going up Yerba Buena.

**Rambler Lite Hike, April 20:** Please note change in time. Bonnie Preston will lead a hike to Hermosa. Park at Montgomery Center at 8:50 a.m. and begin our hike at 9 a.m. and we'll walk up to Chenin Blanc Lane along the southern border and to the Winery Ct water way and back to our cars. Info: 408-531-1513.

**Long Hike, April 27:** Amy Meier (409 799-4274) will lead long hikers on a 7-8 mile hike in Purisima Creek Redwoods Open Space Preserve. This hike is in the western section of Purisima Creek Redwoods Open Space Preserve. Directions to hike: Hwy 280 North, left turn on Hwy 92 toward Half Moon Bay. Left turn on Hwy 1, 4.5 miles. Left on Purisima Creek Rd to parking and trail head. If no spots in parking lot, park on Purisima Creek Rd. up to the No parking beyond this point sign. No fee for parking. There are bridges whenever the creek is crossed by the trail. There are no designated lunch areas, no picnic tables and the only bathroom on this hike is the porta-potty at the trailhead. **Start at the Higgins-Purisima Trailhead on Purisima Creek Trail**, going past the porta-potties. Keep going straight on Purisima Creek Trail following the creek. Look for banana slugs! At the fork turn left onto Craig Britton Trail (formerly Soda Gulch Trail), which is signed as a hiking only trail but does get bicycle traffic. Craig Britton Trail winds along canyon walls through a deep redwood forest then dips back under the redwoods, crossing Soda Gulch Creek. At the next open, grassy area, look to the west for views to the ocean on a clear day. As Craig Britton Trail climbs uphill through a series of switchbacks, the vegetation shifts to chaparral. At the junction with North Ridge trail continue to the left on Harkins Ridge trail. At the junction bear right toward the bridge and trailhead. Elevation 1800 ft. Hiking distance approximately 8 miles. Optional snack or lunch is available, on your own, at multiple locations in Half Moon Bay. We will stop for lunch or snacks on the trail. Meet at 8 a.m. at Cribari for 8:15 a.m. departure. Temperature above 70 degrees cancels unless another hike leader volunteers. 114 miles round trip.

**Rambler Hike, April 27:** Santa Teresa County Park Rich (408-499-1789) and Wendy will lead a hike on the Hidden Springs and Mine Trails, a 3.8 loop trail with moderate elevation.
